Laser Mobile Visits Iuka

In an effort to significantly expand access to NASA educational materials, the concept of a mobile TRC (Teacher Resource Center) has been introduced through a new NASA education initiative called Project LASER (Learning About Science, Engineering, and Research). The LASER Mobile Teacher Resource Center (MTRC) is a NASA Teacher Resource Center on wheels. Being a mobile unit, the MTRC can provide special services to communities distant from NASA center TRC's and regional TRC's, and is configured to accommodate 10-12 teachers per workshop session. Funding for the MTRC is provided by private corporations in cooperation with NASA. Presently there is only one MTRC, and the number of communities it can visit throughout the USA in a year is limited.

Each Mobile Teacher Resource Center (MTRC) comprises a tractor and a climate-controlled showroom. A 50 KW generator (isolated on the tractor) powers the MTRC and its electronic work stations. Each MTRC will be equipped with six teacher work stations, comprising of computer, video duplication unit, slide duplicating station and a 30 foot wide Discovery lesson plan module.

On Monday, November 11, the LASER Mobile was in Iuka, providing local teachers an opportunity to visit the unit and bring new perspectives and ideas into their classrooms.

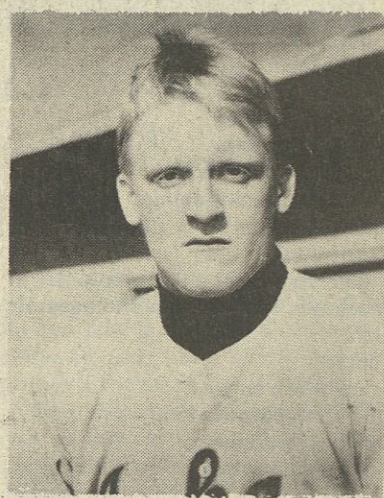

Burnsville Christmas Parade

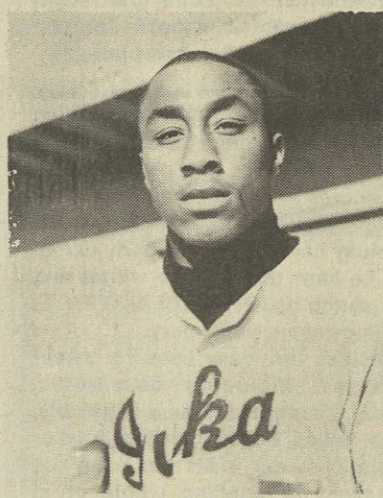

Local Athletes To Sign Ole Miss Scholarships

Two Tishomingo County Magnet High School seniors will sign athletic scholarships with the Ole Miss Rebels today. According to T.C.H.S. baseball coach, Jerry Long, Richy Harrelson and Shaune Holiday will sign with the Ole Miss Baseball team and received reasonable offers as far as college scholarships are given. Coach Long, the two athletes, and their parents Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Harrelson and Mr. and Mrs. Milt Holiday, will be at the official signing

for the press today.

The two had impressive careers with the Iuka Chieftains during their four years starting and led Iuka to a 146-30 record during the time. During their final year of high school play they will hit the field for the newly consolidated Class 4A Tishomingo County Magnet High School.

Harrelson, Iuka's ace pitcher, is a two-time selection to the Daily Journal's All-Area honor and was last year's All-Area Player of the year.

Holiday, an outfielder, earned the

Journal's All-Area honor.

According to Long, "This is the first time I can remember two players from the same school signing Division I scholarships to the same place in the same year." Harrelson and Holiday will become the first two students in T.C.H.S.'s history to sign athletic scholarships.

Holiday, who has never hit lower than .310 at the prep level, hit .377 last season and has 116 stolen bases in his career.

Harrelson has a 57-8 career record on the mound and figures to break the national record for wins (64) this season, barring injury.

Offensively, his lowest season average was last year, hitting .380. He hit .502 in the club's title season. He's projected in college as an everyday infielder, with possible spot duty from the mound.

"Richy also has a chance at the state record in hits," Long said. "We're still trying to confirm the figures, but Richy has well over 200 hits already."

"They had options, but Ole Miss is going to be a good choice for them," Long said. "I'll be surprised if both don't make solid contributions before they graduate in four years."

Body Of Missing Man Found Near Ramer, TN

Skeletal remains found near Ramer, TN were identified Wednesday, November 6 as that of Kenneth T. Mathieu, 42, formerly of Dennis. Mr. Mathieu, who was a resident of Corinth, was reported missing on March 30 of this year. The victim's body was identified through dental records obtained at Red Bay, AL and spinal X-rays obtained in Tupelo. Mathieu's body was discovered by a deer hunter on October 5 about 40 feet off the Selmer - to - Ramer Road, a well-traveled, black topped rural county road in Tennessee.

No cause of death has been determined according to McNairy County Sheriff's Department.

Mr. Mathieu was an employee of Cartell Business Machine and a member of the Missionary Baptist Church.

Services were held at 2 p.m. Saturday at the Salts Funeral Home Chapel with the Rev. Charles Wooten and the Rev. John Stockton officiating. Burial

was in the Lindsey Cemetery.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth E. Mathieu; one sister, Dorothy "Dottie" Elrod, all of Dennis; two brothers, Rex Mathieu of Belmont and Shane Mathieu of Dennis.

Tishomingo Chamber Of Commerce Forms Support Committee

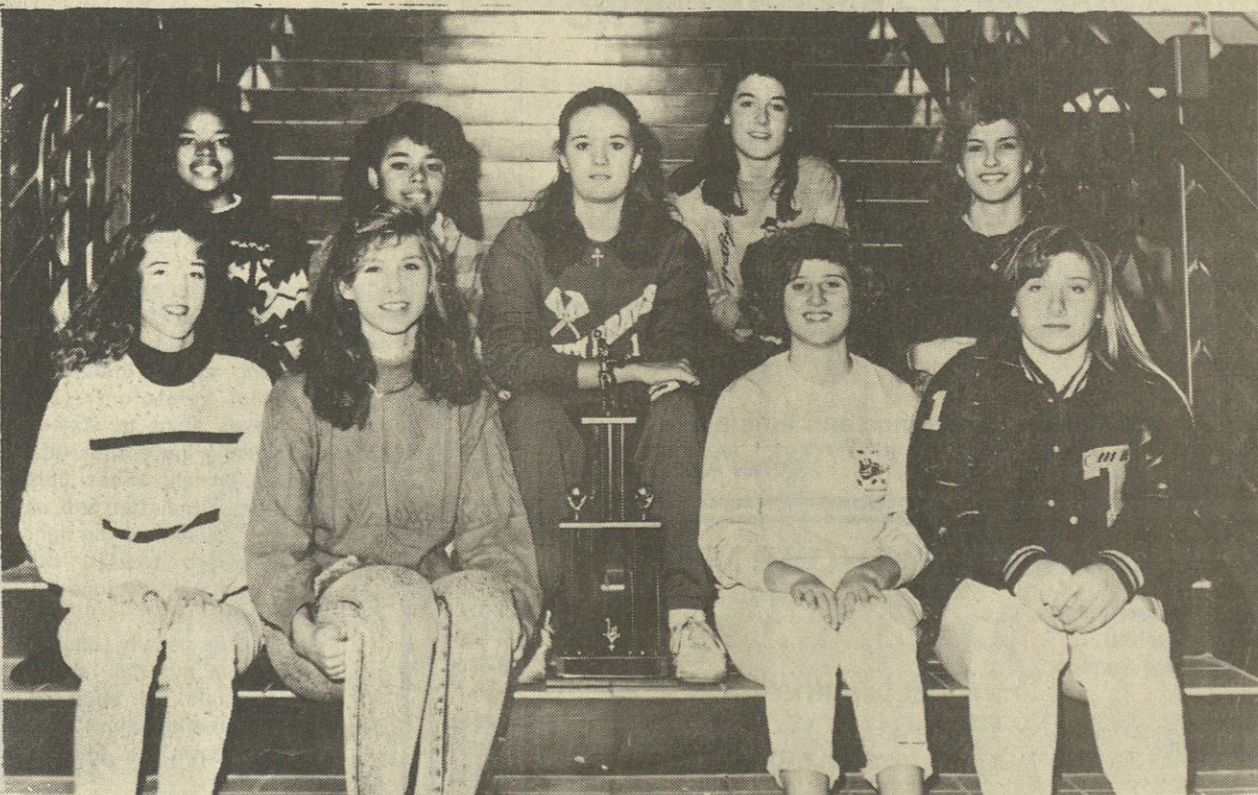

Home Economics Tips

SWEET POTATOES BOOST ECONOMY AND HEALTH

The new crop of Mississippi sweet potatoes are being cured and stored now through spring. The curing process makes the sweet potato sweeter and improves and cooking quality.

Sweet potatoes are loaded with carotene, the bright orange substance that is converted to vitamin A in the body. Some studies indicate that eating foods rich in carotene are associated with reducing the risks of certain cancers.

Sweet potatoes are also a good source of fiber and are low in fat (the plain ones that is). A one-half cup serving of sweet potatoes contains 102 calories. Making candied yams or sweet potato casserole can increase the caloric content by at least 50 percent. Ingredients traditionally added to a sweet potato casserole also increase the fat content considerably.

When buying sweet potatoes, select firm, sound roots without

blemishes. Sweet potatoes bruise easily so handle them carefully.

Storage in a dry, cool place at 55 to 60 degrees F will keep them at peak quality. Those that are well matured, carefully handled and properly cured, can be kept through the winter and into spring. DO NOT REFRIGERATE. Chilling causes cold injury.

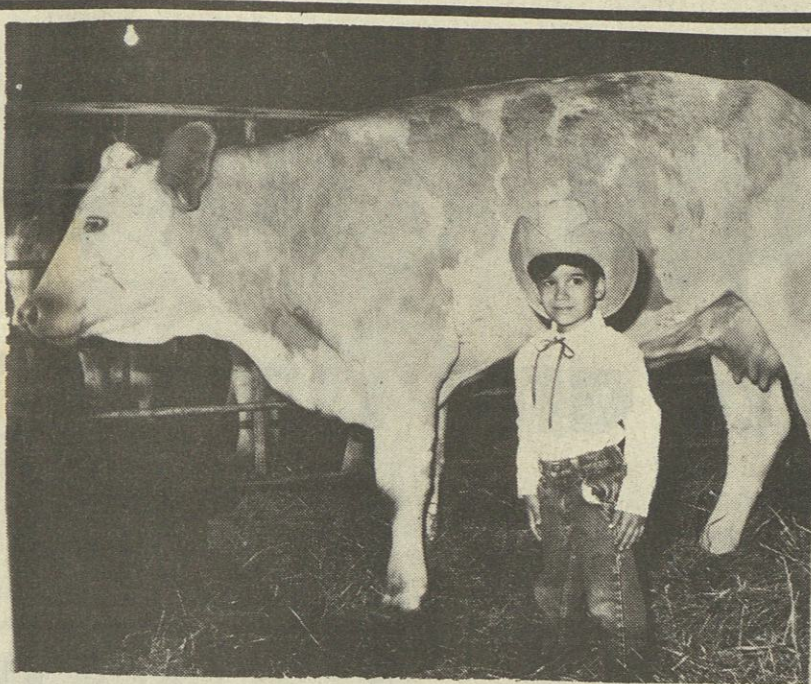
Besides the many uses for sweet potatoes, including casseroles, breads, desserts and as a vegetable, either baked, boiled, candied, fried or broiled, sweet potatoes can be preserved by canning whole or in pieces or frozen whole, sliced or mashed.

Two to three sweet potatoes generally make a pound. One pound of fresh sweet potatoes will yield three 1/2-cup servings mashed or five 1/2 cup servings sliced. For canning, an average of 2-1/4 pounds fresh sweet potatoes make 1 quart.

A yam is a yam -- is a sweet potato -- in Mississippi, that is. The controversy has gone on for years over whether there is a difference between a yam and a sweet potato. Actually there is a difference.

Yams are grown in more tropical regions of the world and to a small extent in Florida and Louisiana. But what we call yams in most parts of the South are actually large sweet potatoes. And this root vegetable is not kin to the white potato, but to the morning-glory vine!

SWEET POTATO CASSEROLE

Casserole:
3 cups mashed, cooked sweet potatoes
1 cup sugar
1/2 cup milk
1/4 cup margarine
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 eggs, slightly beaten
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
Dash cinnamon
Dash nutmeg

Mix together all ingredients of casserole. Place in 2-quart casserole dish.

Topping:

1 cup brown sugar
1/3 cup all-purpose flour
1/4 cup margarine
1 cup chopped nuts

Mix topping ingredients. Spread over top of potatoes. Bake at 350 degrees uncovered for 35 minutes.

YIELD: 8 servings.

County Agent's Notes

SAVE TIME, MONEY

There's a way to save on next year's fertilizer bill without spending an arm or leg, or hurting yields. Use a soil test.

You may have built up soil fertility to a high level by applying fertilizer in past years. If so, you may be able to cut back fertilizer next year without reducing yields.

The only way you can know for sure is by having your soil tested. Call the Tishomingo County Extension Office for more information.

TREE PLANTING

It's almost time to make plans for tree-planting season.

At this point in time, you should have secured a supply of seedlings from a commercial, private or industry nursery. You also should have contacted a professional vendor to plant the seedlings, documenting planting date, time and price in a contract.

If you haven't followed through, you may be far behind in getting your trees planted.

Any landowner who wants to grow timber should locate a vendor and establish a firm, written agreement well in advance of the tree-planting date. The closer landowners get to

planting season, the lesser the chance they have of finding a vendor who isn't booked up.

The bottom line is this: you'll never get a return on your timber if your trees aren't planted. And if you don't have the seedlings to plant, you won't plant.

HOLIDAY PLANT CARE

Many people in Tishomingo County will be receiving beautiful poinsettias and other greenery for the holidays. Here are tips to keep those plants looking their best.

Place holiday plants where they can get as much bright light as possible. Windows are often several degrees cooler than room temperature, so keep plant leaves several inches from the windowpanes.

Heaters take much of the humidity out of indoor air. Prevent plants from drying out too quickly by keeping them away from heaters and out of drafts. Water plants as needed, but don't overwater.

Remove gift wrap if possible. Cut any wrap covering the bottom of the container so the plant won't hold too much water.

LANDSCAPE CARE

Rake leaves as needed to prevent lawns from smothering. Use the leaves for compost, piling them in an out-of-the-way spot.

Sprinkle a little soil and fertilizer over each 6 or 8 inch layer of compost. A light dusting of lime or wood ashes will neutralize organic acids given off by the decaying leaves.

Moisture is important for compost piles. Make the tops of the piles slightly concave to collect rainfall.

Leaves or pine straw will be used to mulch shrubs if such material is piled in a 6 or 8 inch layer around the plant. The mulch insulates soil, protects plant roots from extreme temperatures and conserves water.

Wait until late winter or early spring to prune roses, crapemyrtle, hydrangeas and other summer blooming plants. Do not prune spring bloomers such as azaleas, hollies and forsythias. Shoots from these spring plants can be removed for holiday decorations. Be careful not to ruin plant shape by random cutting.

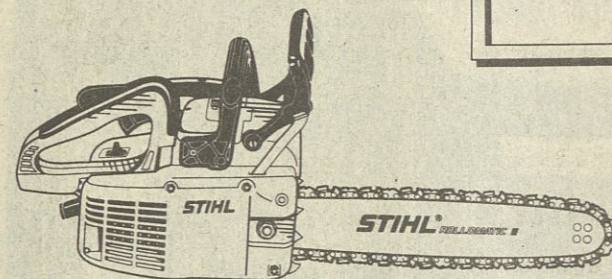

INSIGHT INTO EYESIGHT

RADIAL KERATOTOMY

Radial keratotomy is a relatively new surgical procedure used to reduce nearsightedness (myopia). The surgery is available now but on a limited basis.

In the nearsighted eye, the light rays are focused in front of the retina, resulting in blurred vision when looking at far distances. During radial keratotomy, the surgeon makes eight to sixteen freehand cuts in the cornea (like spokes in a wheel). These cuts cause the cornea to flatten and, as a result, the focusing of the light moves backward toward the retina. The operation is done under local anesthesia.

This procedure usually reduces nearsightedness but the results are unpredictable for each individual. Also, the long-term risks will not be known for another decade or two.

As with all surgery, radial keratotomy should be considered only as a last resort. Anyone who can achieve satisfactory vision for everyday living with glasses or contact lenses would be wise, at this time, to continue with them.

Elderly Should Take Precautions For Cold Weather

With cold winter weather just around the corner, elderly Mississippians are urged to take steps to avoid becoming victims of hypothermia.

"Cold weather can be extremely dangerous for older adults unless proper safeguards are taken," said Billie Marshall, director of the Mississippi Department of Human Services' Division of Aging and Adult Services.

Hypothermia results when body temperature falls so much that it causes serious health problems, even death. "Older persons are more susceptible to hypothermia because of their bodies' decreasing ability to

regulate responses to changing temperatures," Marshall said. "Some victims say they don't even feel very cold."

Senior citizens living in poorly heated homes are at particular risk of suffering hypothermia. Certain medical conditions, such as arthritis, diabetes and head injuries, increase the risk because these conditions may interfere with the body's ability to regulate responses to changing temperatures.

Symptoms of hypothermia include confusion, difficulty in speaking, slow breathing, shivering, a puffy face, cool or cold skin and stiff muscles.

"If you think someone has this condition, call for medical assistance immediately, and keep the victim warm with a blanket or extra clothes until assistance arrives," Marshall said. "Be especially careful to keep the head covered, and treat the victim gently to minimize shock to the heart."

Aging and Adult Services recommends these additional safety tips to reduce the risk of hypothermia among the elderly:

--Wear several layers of loose, warm clothing inside the outside and a hat and scarf because body heat is quickly lost from the head and neck.

--Use an electric blanket or extra blankets, wear warm socks at bedtime and keep shades or curtains closed to keep rooms warmer at night.

--Maintain a temperature of about

70 degrees in rooms where the most time is spent, and close off unused rooms.

--Engage in moderate exercise and maintain a proper diet to produce body heat.

--Stock a variety of canned goods and other foods for days when it's too cold to go outside.

--Keep in touch with family, friends and neighbors to ensure that any health problems are known.

In the event of extreme cold weather emergencies in Mississippi Area Agencies on Aging will open shelters for the elderly.

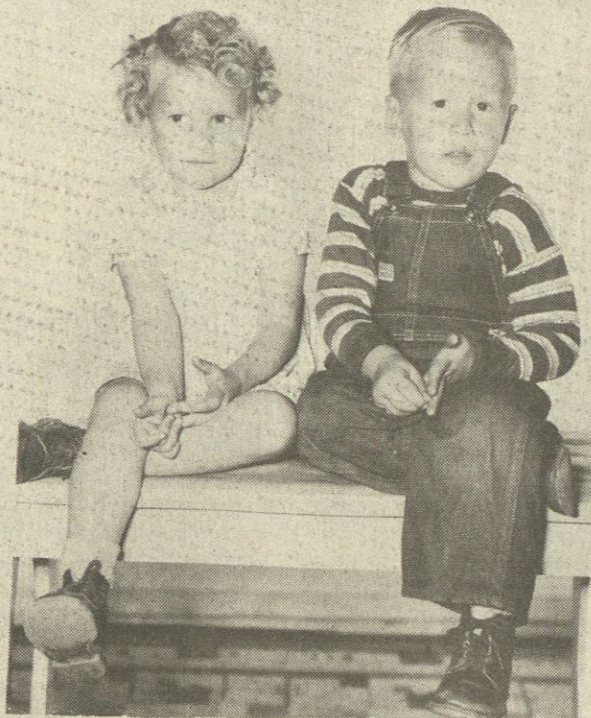

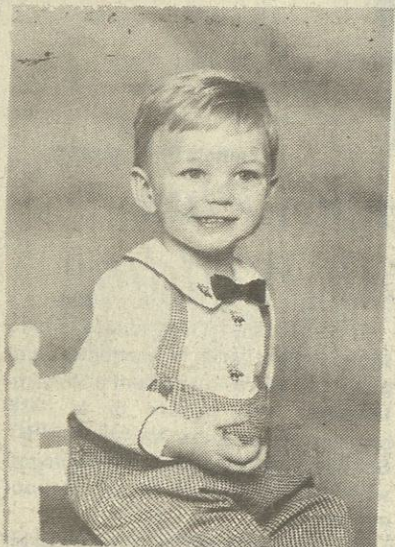

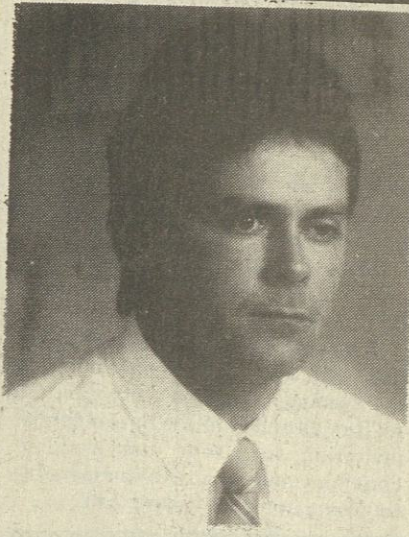

County Agents Notes

FRUIT TREE CARE

Fruit trees in Tishomingo County are going dormant and dropping leaves for the winter. Don't let these leaves pile up on the ground. Remove diseased or shriveled fruit and fallen leaves to rid the area of the primary sources of disease.

Mulch fig trees and blueberry bushes with pine straw or other porous material to reduce cold damage to roots. If young trees are mulched, place the mulch in a ring around the tree. Leave from 3 to 4 inches of open space around the base of the trunk.

Leaving an open space regulates moisture in the soil and protects roots against freezing and thawing damage.

PREGNANCY TEST FOR COWS

If the number of calves in a herd dwindles, it's because the cows aren't pregnant.

Cows that are not pregnant may need to be culled from the herd. Producers have two choices: culling

open cows at calving time or testing cows for pregnancy.

Pregnancy testing can save time and money. It eliminates guesswork. A cow can't be a little pregnant - either she is or she isn't.

The expense of carrying a pregnant cow in the herd is really not that much greater than carrying one that is not pregnant. More than 70 percent of the annual carrying cost of a cow will already be incurred by a producer regardless of cow pregnancy.

COOL SEASON GRAZING

Producers in Tishomingo County can do several things to help cool season grazing stands weakened by weather. Calves can be creep-grazed; larger animals can be kept from grazing.

Cows and older livestock can be fed other feeds such as hay or row crop residues. Additional fertilizer can be added, if needed, to promote growth in cool season forages.

Don't overgraze your forages. Give them a chance to recover and reestablish.

WOOD HITCHHIKERS

Firewood that has been cut and

stacked is an excellent hiding place for many kinds of insects. While most of these pests won't threaten people, pets or houses, they can annoy homeowners once inside.

Wood stacked on the ground can be infested by beetles, borers, ants, spiders, wasps, sawbugs and termites. If insects are found in wood stacks, the soil under the wood may have to be treated.

Don't treat the wood itself because dangerous fumes can be produced when the wood is burned in a fireplace.

Cutting in fall will allow wood to dry, thus reducing the insects that may be living in the wood. Also keep insects out of the home by bringing in wood only as it is needed and by stacking wood off the ground.

New Funding Available For Rural Fire Dept.

The Mississippi Forestry Commission (MFC) will again receive approximately \$50,000 in federal grant funds for sub-granting to rural community fire departments under the Rural Community Fire Protection (RCFP) program, according to an announcement by State Forester Jim Sledge, Jr.

Community fire departments desiring funding should apply promptly. Application information may be obtained at any MFC district office or by writing Curt Fulgham, Fire Control Officer, Mississippi Forestry Commission, 301 N. Lamar St., S-300, Jackson, MS 39201 (Pho:359-2818).

Applications must be submitted by 5:00 p.m., January 13, 1992. Completion date for any approved project will be August 13, 1992.

Since 1975, when the RCFP program was first funding by Congress under Title IV of the Rural Development Act, 494 sub-grants totaling \$844,000 have been awarded to rural volunteer fire departments across the state. The Forestry Commission issues the sub-grants under an agreement with the U.S. Forest Service, which administers the RCFP program nationwide.

Preventing Middle Ear Infections in Children

According to a recent report in the medical journal *American Family Physician*, more than 80 percent of all children in the United States have at least one middle ear infection (*otitis media*) by the time they reach three years of age. We now know that middle ear infections in children sometimes can be prevented.

The results of a recent study of almost 200 children at day care centers in Finland indicate that vaccinating children with flu (influenza A) vaccine may reduce the incidence of ear infections. The number of children who did not get the vaccine and had one or more middle ear infections was significantly greater than the number of children who got the vaccine and did not have an ear infection. This study suggests that reducing the incidence of viral infections, such as the flu, may help prevent ear infections.

Several studies in the United States and Europe have shown that giving children antibiotics, such as amoxicillin and sulfisoxazole, reduces the number of episodes of ear infections. According to *Postgraduate Medicine*, these studies suggest a 50 percent or greater reduction in the risk of infection. Other methods of reducing middle ear infections in children include the surgical placement of ventilating tubes in children's ears and surgical removal of the adenoids.

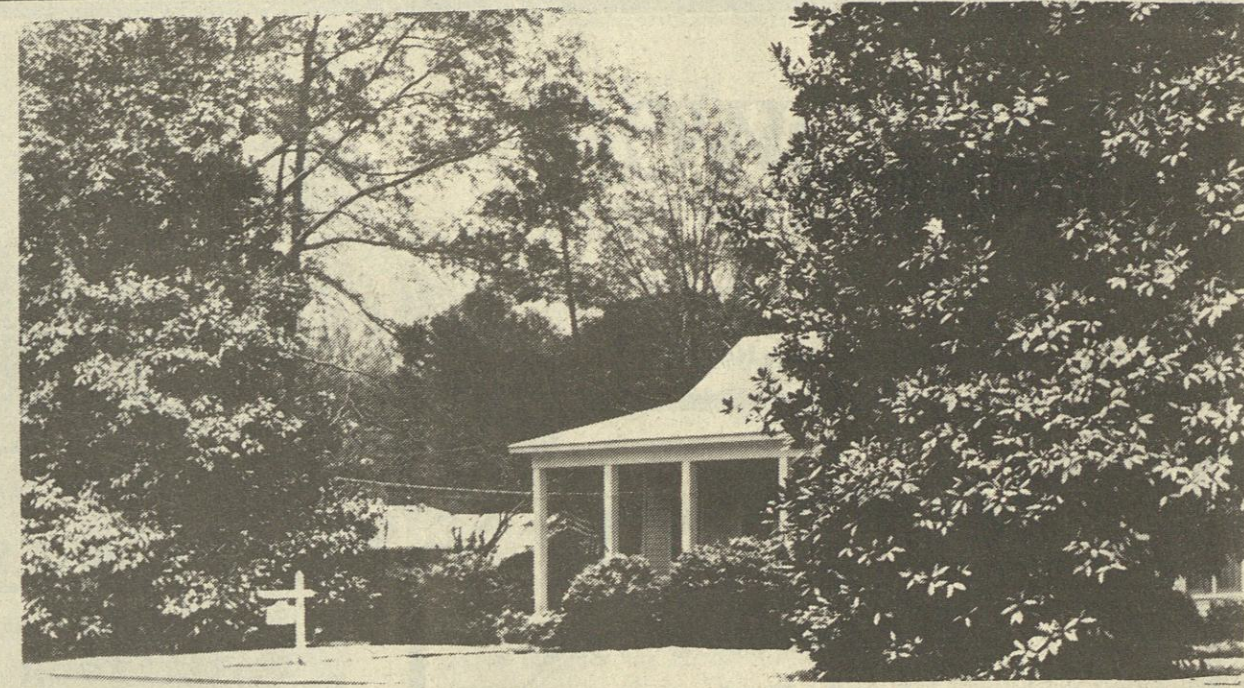
Kilby Child Development Center Meets Needs Of UNA Students

Knowing their children are happy and being taken care of alleviates much of the stress of being a parent and a college student at the same time for Elaine Belue and Nancy Bradley, both non-traditional students at the University of North Alabama.

Their children attend the Child Development Center at UNA's Kilby Professional Laboratory School. The center, which opened this fall, is designed to help non-traditional students, a group who comprise 25 percent of the student body at UNA. In fact, their representative group - the Re-Entering Students Association - initiated the talks with President Robert L. Potts, when he first arrived on campus, that led to the creation of the CDC.

Belue and Bradley, both early childhood majors, start their days at the crack of dawn in a hectic pace trying to get their families going.

Belue, a senior from Route 1 Iuka, MS and her husband Rick begin their day at 4:30 a.m. She must leave for the Shoals at 6:30 a.m. in order to leave her four-year old daughter Meghan at the center and get to class by the time the eight o'clock bell rings. "When Meghan arrives at Kilby, someone is always there to greet

her," said Mrs. Belue.

"I have to change hats from being a mother to being a student, but still my family comes first. Knowing my child is being taken care of helps me be able to study. I can go across campus during the day and spend time with her," said Belue.

The teachers and Dr. Jacqueline Osborn (the center coordinator) are the main assets of the center, according to Mrs. Belue. "The center atmosphere is family-oriented and every moment is put to use for the children."

Bradley, who is a nurse, and her husband John also have hectic mornings, but the pressure has been eased since she can have her sons, Matthew (age four) and Patrick (three), on campus at the center.

"It's convenient being able to take them to the center. I'm not so rushed, and I can leave in plenty of time," the Florence resident said.

The children in the center get close and personal attention from the student assistants. Bradley said the center provided high quality, appropriate instruction with qualified people. Dr. Osborn said the student assistants are work-study students, home economics child development students and nursing practicum students.

"It's a wonderful program. I've noticed already the children are more outgoing and speaking better and in more complete sentences. They're also happier," Mrs. Bradley said.

Her son Patrick has a "special teacher" who takes walks with him and she has even visited him at home, which he enjoyed. Each home economics child development student from UNA is assigned a child with whom to work.

The classes of three and four year olds are in a program that stresses development in physical motor skills, emotions, play skills and language skills, Dr. Osborn said.

Belue and Bradley are at ease, while attending classes at UNA, knowing their children are close by. They do not have guilty feelings about neglecting their children while they (the parents) are going back to college.

Admission to the center is open to the public, but the children of UNA students and faculty are given

priority.

Also, both parents agree that they have saved money because most daycare services charge for an entire week even though a child might not be there everyday. Since college students have odd class schedules and breaks between semesters, the center, which follows the same operational schedule as UNA, has given them more options.

"UNA seems to be responding and moving in the right direction," said Mrs. Bradley, who is also a senior. Change takes time, especially in times of proration, but she sees the Child Development Center as a good first step.

Thirty-three children are enrolled at the CDC this semester. Twenty-two are children of UNA students, six are offspring of UNA faculty and staff and five are from the community.

Dr. Osborn said there are some openings for the spring semester. Registration for the spring will be during the first week in November. For more information, call Dr. Osborn at (205)760-4244.

The article last week in this column about Dick Merrill was not the only clipping Mr. J.C. McCulloch saved. In 1937 Merrill flew the first round trip commercial air flight in record time to pick up pictures of King George the VI coronation. The flight was historical not only as the first commercial round trip, it also made record time for that era. As I have mentioned in previous articles, Merrill had the plane loaded with ping pong balls for ballast in case of an ocean crash. The hull and wings were filled with reportedly over a million balls.

For this feat, Merrill was awarded the Harmon Trophy for outstanding aviation. Mr. McCulloch also had a clipping on this.

The headline reads "World's Best" FDR Hails Flier Merrill (Presents Harmon Trophy to Mississippi Hero).

UNITED PRESS
Washington - March 17 - President Roosevelt yesterday presented the Harmon Trophy to Henry T. (Dick) Merrill of Iuka, MS as the world's outstanding pilot during 1937.

The award was based on the flight of Merrill and co-pilot Jack Lambe from New York to London and return during the coronation of King George VI last year.

It was the second consecutive year an American has been awarded the trophy. Howard R. Hughes, Sportsman Pilot, was awarded the trophy last year.

Merrill is the only Pilot who has flown the Atlantic non-stop four times.

From what little I have found on Merrill, I know that he set many world speed records during his career. He flew both propeller motor aircraft and jumped right into the heyday of the commercial jet age. Merrill didn't stop at crossing one ocean, by the end of his flying career, Dick has flown around the world several times and crossed the seven seas as well as all continents. He still holds the record for more air hours (44,110) and more air miles (over 1 million) during his recorded career. Merrill died in 1982 yet no pilot has broken these records as well as many others that belong solely to the Great Aviator from Iuka.

In a related footnote on Earnie Pyle, Merrill's friend whose article I quoted in last week's column was stationed in New York when the 1936 or 1937 article was written. Pyle was a famous journalist of the depression era yet his first hand accounts of WWII fighting in the Pacific Theatre

These rate increases are effective immediately and stem from a 25% increase in our rate from the City of Iuka and the \$10,000 fee for the water system analysis mandated in order to plan update of the system.
