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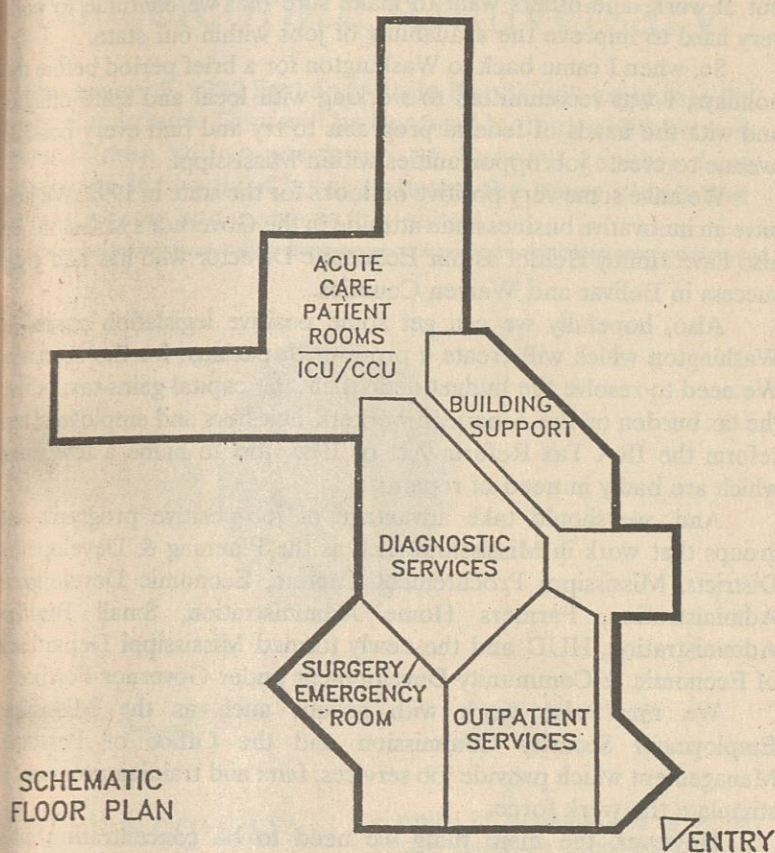

DECD Awards \$2.6 Million Grant For Construction Of New Iuka Hospital

A \$2.6 million Mississippi Major Economic Impact Authority Grant for construction of a proposed new hospital for Tishomingo County has been awarded to Tishomingo Health Services.

The awarding of the grant to Tishomingo Health Services comes after months of discussion concerning ownership of the new facility. Both Tishomingo Health Services and the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors have contended that they should own the physical facility. The Iuka Medical Center will be operated by Tishomingo Health Services, a subsidiary of North Mississippi Health Services, which is the parent company of North Mississippi Medical Center, a 650-bed regional referral center in Tupelo in Lee County. NMHS will provide \$2.2 million to complete construction costs. No county funds or local bonds are required for the hospital.

"The Iuka Medical Center will be a model facility offering a wide range of services close to home for Tishomingo area residents and immediate access to a full range of subspecialty medical services at North Mississippi Medical Center, said NMMC President John D. Hicks.

NMMC Vice President Glendon Spigner said, construction for the new 48-bed Iuka Medical Center is slated to begin as soon as the final architectural plans are completed. The 41,000-square-foot building will include 40 private hospital rooms dedicated to general acute care, and eight beds designated for an Intensive Care Unit. Acute cardiac care as well as the other customary intensive care services will be provided.

The plans also include a state-of-the-art Emergency Services Department with full capability to respond to a wide range of medical emergencies. The ambulance service will be based at the Iuka Medical Center, and patients who need an advanced level of care will have access to aero-medical transportation via North Mississippi Medical Center's helicopter service, Spigner said.

The center will also include a Laboratory, equipped with sophisticated equipment that will enable the hospital to provide a broader spectrum of diagnostic procedures. Most laboratory tests will be provided on the spot, and when needed, additional lab testings will be performed by NMMC or its key reference labs.

"The Physical Therapy Department will be expanded and its staff will work aggressively with injured employees from

local industries to rehabilitate them to return to work quicker. This approach will reduce Workers' Compensation costs for the employer and lost work time for the employee and employer," Spigner said.

"In addition, the Physical Therapy Department will work in close harmony with the residents of Iuka who receive orthopedic services in Tupelo or other locations but who would like to receive their physical therapy closer to home," he said.

The Iuka Medical Center will include a new Respiratory Care Department, and a fully equipped surgical suite and recovery area. "The Surgery Department will provide a broad range of general elective and emergency surgeries and will be designed to serve as a triage area in conjunction with the Emergency Department for major industrial or natural disasters," Spigner said. A board-certified surgeon will be recruited.

The new facility will provide radiographic, fluoroscopic, ultrasound, nuclear medicine, and CT diagnostic services. New radiographic and fluoroscopic equipment will be installed to enhance the provision of these necessary services.

In addition, the Iuka Medical Center will include the following support services: an administrative area, business office, medical records, purchasing, central supply, dietary, pharmacy, housekeeping and maintenance.

North Mississippi Health Services will continue to operate the existing Iuka Hospital until the completion of the new Iuka Medical Center, a project that should be completed in 15 to 16 months. Once the new building is operational, Iuka Hospital's patients will be transferred to the new Iuka Medical Center in an orderly fashion. The Iuka Medical Center will employ approximately 133 employees. Once the Iuka Medical Centers opens, NMHS will continue to operate the nursing home.

NMMC's affiliation with the current Iuka Hospital began in 1987. The hospital's name was changed from Tishomingo Hospital to Iuka Hospital at that time.

NMHS also has affiliate hospitals in Aberdeen, Eupora, Fulton, Pontotoc, and West Point, and a nursing home facility in Baldwin. The goal of the Affiliated Hospital System is to strengthen health care in rural areas and to provide health care in a comprehensive regional manner, Spigner said.

Following the Review Committee's selection of 150 Coca-Cola Scholars, these students will attend the National Competition in Atlanta from April 2-4, 1992, where they will compete for designation as a National or Regional Coca-Cola Scholar. The 50 National Scholars will receive awards of \$5,000 per year and the 100 Regional Scholars will receive \$1,000 per year, both renewable for up to four years.

Tishomingo County Hospital Plan Approved By Board of Supervisors

Tishomingo County residents are the recipients of a new \$4.8 million hospital following the board of supervisors' endorsement today of agreements among North Mississippi Health Services, Inc. of Tupelo, the Mississippi Major Economic Impact Authority and Tishomingo County.

The agreement calls for the construction of the Iuka Medical Complex, a 48-bed state-of-the-art facility offering both general acute and intensive care medical services to county residents.

"Through this agreement, Tishomingo County citizens will have a hospital offering the high quality medical services they deserve," said D.W. McKee, board president. "The concerns previously expressed by the board have been solved, and we see a bright future in the county's health care system."

The endorsement by the board on a 5-0 vote followed lengthy negotiations among North Mississippi Health Services, the Impact Authority and the board to resolve several issues concerning the facility. The hospital was one of the original projects selected by the Impact Authority for funding in December 1989.

"The Iuka Medical Complex we announce today is a better facility than first proposed in 1989," said J. Mac Holladay, director of the Mississippi Department of Economic and Community Development which administers the Impact Authority. "The negotiations positively addressed those concerns raised by the local medical community, North Mississippi Health Services, and the board of supervisors. We have received many letters of support from citizens, members of the medical community, local industry, and public officials."

The winners in this process are the people of Tishomingo County and the future residents of the area. Another important piece of Tishomingo Coun-

ty's infrastructure for the future is now in place," Holladay said.

Construction of the Iuka Medical Complex will be funded by \$2.6 million from the Impact Authority and \$2.2 million from North Mississippi Health Services, parent company of North Mississippi Medical Center. No county funds or local bonds are required for the hospital. North Mississippi Health Services will own and operate the facility and will be responsible for providing the medical staff, new and existing equipment, and hospital management through its subsidiary, Tishomingo Health Services, Inc. Employment at the hospital will be approximately 133 jobs and will be staffed by residents

of Tishomingo County. The grant agreement between North Mississippi and the Impact Authority provides a 10-year guarantee of services and creates a seven member local advisory board.

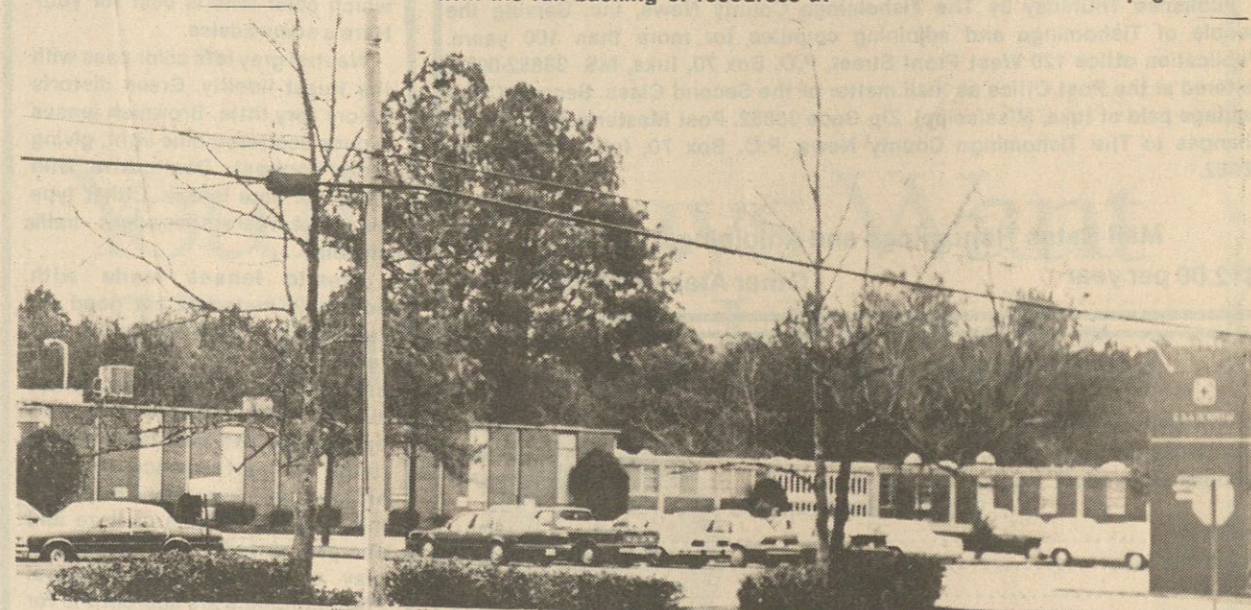
"We are pleased with this agreement and pledge to provide Tishomingo County residents with the best medical service available," said J.C. Whitehead, past chairman of the board of trustees, North Mississippi Health Services. "North Mississippi Medical Center is dedicated to serving the people of northeast Mississippi, and the Iuka Medical Complex will meet the health care needs of Tishomingo County with the full backing of resources at

the medical center in Tupelo."

The Iuka Medical Complex will have 40 private beds dedicated to general acute care along with an eight-bed intensive care unit, which will provide acute cardiac care as well as customary intensive care services. The Emergency Services Department and hospital-based ambulance service will be fully equipped to handle most emergencies. More serious cases will have access to helicopter transportation to North Mississippi Medical Center.

The facility will have a surgical suite, physical therapy and respiratory care departments, and a

The fate is unknown for the existing Iuka Hospital Facility which is owned by the county. When the construction of the new Iuka Medical Center is completed, the future of the existing hospital located on Quitman Street is in doubt. According to Deleanor McKee, president of the board of supervisors, at press time there had been no decision as to what will become of the existing hospital. The decision to convert the hospital into a nursing home has not been determined. It will depend upon the agreement between the county and Tishomingo Health Services as to the outcome of the facility.



Local Area Students Spend Summer In Marine Science Course

Some local area students spent part of this past summer learning about the Gulf of Mexico's coastal environments while attending the Discovery Hall Program, a high school field marine science course taught at the Dauphin Island Sea Lab. Completing the program were Jason Townsend, student at Humphrey's Academy and Jamie Ballard of Iuka

High School.

Each summer, Discovery Hall offers two sessions of the four-week program, during which time students enhance knowledge gained in a structured classroom setting with various laboratory and field activities. Being a highly academic program approved by the Alabama Department of Education, students participate in lectures, individual and group assignments, laboratory investigations, field projects, oral presentations, and written and practical examinations. A few of the field

activities include the exploration of a salt marsh community, beach and dune profiling, shark tagging research, and trawling aboard the Sea Lab's 65 foot research vessel, the A.E. Verrill. Other Activities include identifying marine species from various habitats, an individual research project, and a panel discussion with professionals in marine science. Home Economics Tips

REDUCE CHANCES OF PIPES FREEZING

With winter's cold weather, the chances of pipes freezing and subsequently bursting is a reality homeowners and renters alike would like to avoid.

Pipes most susceptible to freezing are usually located in poorly insulated crawlspace or along cold walls on the north or northwest side of the house.

There are several ways to prevent frozen pipes: keep a trickle of water running from the faucets; beam a small lamp or heater at exposed pipes; wrap uninsulated pipes with newspapers, heating wires, foam or tape; or keep doors ajar between heated and unheated rooms. If you have pipes and fixtures that have frozen previously and you have made no repairs. You might suspect a problem to occur at that point.

If pipes freeze despite your attempts to prevent it, you can usually thaw

the area without professional help.

Pour boiling water over rags wrapped around the frozen pipe. A hair dryer will also work as a heat source to thaw a frozen pipe.

When thawing a pipe, work slowly away from an open faucet toward the frozen area. That will keep steam pressure from building up and bursting the pipe. With the faucet open, you will see when the ice melts.

If the frozen pipe is underground or in a wall, call the plumber.

Once the pipe is thawed, take action to avoid the problem recurring. Wrap electrical heating tape around the pipes, or cover pipes with insulation. The thermostatically controlled tape will heat automatically during cold weather. An even better remedy is to caulk cracks and crevices, weatherstrip around doors and windows and insulate the walls of crawlspace or the basement to minimize heat loss.

To minimize tension when water pipes freeze, be familiar with your main water supply. Locate the valve which is usually in the basement or utility room. Check the condition of the valve and learn how to operate it. Look for rust or corrosion and make

sure the valve is functional. If it is not in proper working condition, have it repaired.

Despite your efforts to keep pipes from freezing, it may be necessary to relocate some pipes to provide increased protection from extremely cold temperatures. If you will be remodeling parts of a room, that would be the time to make this change.

Insulating water pipes provides little protection from freezing; no heat is added to the pipes and the insulation only slows the rate at which the temperature of the pipes approaches that of their surroundings. Instead, apply insulation to the crawlspace walls to maintain higher temperatures. The insulation also will make the floor above warm and, thus, save on fuel costs.

If you will be gone during part of the winter, consider closing down the plumbing system rather than just turning down the thermostat. To winterize your plumbing, turn off the main shutoff valve or have the water company turn off service to the house.

Starting at the top floor, open all faucets indoors and out. When the last of the water has dripped from the taps, open the plug at the main shutoff valve and let it drain. Turn off power to the water heater and open its drain valve. Empty water from the traps under sinks, tubs and showers by closing clean-out plugs or removing the traps.

Empty toilet bowls and tanks, add a gallon of automotive antifreeze/water solution into each toilet bowl. If the home has a basement floor drain or a main house trap, fill each with full-strength automotive antifreeze.

WHICH SUNGLASS LENS COLOR?

The time has come to look cool in the sun. How do you decide which color lens is best for you? Here's some advice.

Neutral gray lets color pass with the truest fidelity. Green distorts colors very little. Brownish lenses reduce scattered blue light, giving more contrast. Don't drive with yellow or blue lenses. Either type can make wearers misjudge traffic signals.

Plastic lenses made with polarizing materials are good for cutting glare from horizontal surfaces, such as water and car metal. Glass photochromic lenses automatically adjust for the sun's brightness. The best ones have a range of performance, turning amber on overcast days to minimize the effects of haze and sharpen details, and becoming gray or brown on bright days. Photochromics are appropriate for skiing, tennis and sailing. Another type is the gradient lens, becoming progressively darker from the bottom up. Often lightly tinted, gradients serve more for flair than for glare.

KING RANCH CHICKEN

1 (3-4 pound) chicken
1/2 cup onion, chopped
1/2 cup green pepper, chopped
1 (10-ounce) can tomatoes and chilies
2 (10 3/4 ounce) cans chicken soup
2 (10 3/4 ounce) cans mushroom soup
1 (10 ounce) bag taco flavored tortilla chips
8 ounces shredded Cheddar cheese
1 cup chicken broth

Boil chicken until tender, drain off broth and save it. Debone chicken and cut in small pieces. Add the onions, peppers, tomatoes, and soups. Mix well. In a greased 9x13 inch casserole dish, layer with chips, cheese, chicken mixture and ending with chips on top. Pour 1 cup of chicken broth over casserole. Bake in preheated 325 degree oven for 30 minutes.

4-H Communicates

WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT IS FOR THE BIRDS AND THE ANIMALS

Four-H members can learn about taking care of wildlife by enrolling in the 4-H Wildlife Project. Many of the activities teach young people about providing habitat for the wildlife that share this environment. This includes songbirds and squirrels, which live in the backyard, as well as deer, turkey, quail and other animals that live in the forest and fields. Over the next few weeks this column will address different aspects of the 4-H Wildlife Project.

What is the 4-H Wildlife Project? The 4-H Wildlife Project is a good way to study your natural environment. Project members learn that the most important thing for survival is the number and kinds of habitat available to wildlife. Habitat is a place that provides all needs of an animal.

The 4-H Wildlife Project is designed for all 4-H'ers - those that live on the farm and in the city. If you live on a farm, your own property probably serves as a habitat for some species. If you live in the city, wildlife can be observed in the city park, vacant lots, or even your own backyard.

Building bird houses and feeders - one of the many projects to improve the wildlife in your backyard - is to build and install nesting boxes and feeders for birds. Birds are divided into three groups based on the location they choose for nesting sites.

Some birds, such as the wild turkey, whip-poor-will, quail, or killdeer build their nests on the ground. This group of birds is called ground nesters. A second group of birds is called cavity or hole nesters. These birds build nests in holes or cavities of trees. Some examples of this group are wood ducks, owls, woodpeckers and purple martins. The third group of birds is called elevated nesters. These birds build their nests above ground. The nests are usually built of twigs, grass or vines on the limbs of shrubs and trees.

Bird houses, properly built and installed provide excellent nesting sites for cavity nesters. Following are a few simple rules to use when building a bird house.

1. Birdhouses can be made from a wide variety of materials. Make sure wood is treated to make it decay resistant.

2. Avoid using metal - it gets too hot.

3. Provide ventilation and drainage. Several small holes in the bottom will provide drainage. Leave a crack where the sides meet the top for ventilation.

4. After the nesting season is over, take down the birdhouse, clean out the old nesting materials and store for next year.

5. Fasten your birdhouse securely in the cavity of the tree, on a fence post or against the trunk of a tree.

6. When selecting a site for birdhouses, make sure food and water are close by.

7. Select a location that will be difficult for predators, such as cats, to get to the birdhouse.

8. Birdhouses should be spaced at least 30 feet apart. Birds like to "have

their own space" too.

While enrollment at many community college and universities has declined, Northeast Mississippi Community College has experienced a substantial increase for the fall semester, making it the largest community college in Northeast Mississippi.

A report issued by the State Board for Community and Junior Colleges shows that Northeast's enrollment climbed 16.7 percent over the same period in 1990. Six of Mississippi's 15 community colleges show a decline in enrollment.

The report indicates a 4.7% increase in community college enrollment state-wide.

Northeast enrolled 2,737 full-time day students from 30 Mississippi counties and 14 states. In addition another 1457 students are participating in classes at the Corinth Extension Center, evening college, adult education and continuing education programs.

Northeast President Joe M. Childers said rising enrollment is certainly good news, but no surprise.

"I think enrollment has increased so dramatically because more students are realizing what Northeast has to offer in the way of quality education, facilities, superior housing and social environment," Childers said.

"I do want to emphasize that the student is the most important person at Northeast," Childers added.

"Perhaps it is because of this philosophy that Northeast has experienced such significant growth while other institutions have shown decreases."

This marks the eighth year in a row that Northeast's enrollment has increased, during a time when many education demographers had predicted a leveling off or decline in college credit enrollment.

Other figures released by Northeast's Office of Admissions shows a marked increase in the number of non-traditional students (those

over the age of 21). This group comprises 23 percent of the student body, according to Director of Admissions Ronnie Sweeney.

J. Connie Drown, dean of the college, said that he believes another reason enrollment continues to increase is because students are aware that they can leave Northeast as well prepared as, or many times even better prepared than, those students who begin their education at a senior college.

"Our advisers are trained to work with students to assure that all their coursework will transfer," Drown said.

"We also have an outstanding student activities program that allows students to grow and develop in many areas. When you add this to quality education and facilities, students will certainly be attracted to our campus," Drown added.

Unemployment Drops Full Percentage Point

Mississippi's unemployment rate dropped a full percentage point to 7.1 percent in October, according to information from the Mississippi Employment Security Commission.

The state registered the highest number of non-manufacturing jobs in state history. The 708,200 non-manufacturing jobs in October was up nearly 2000 from September's record high of 706,300.

Factory jobs also increased to a near record level. October's tally of 248,600 manufacturing jobs lagged only 500 jobs behind the October 1990 high of 249,100.

"Combining both manufacturing and non-manufacturing nets the highest establishment-based employment in Mississippi's history--956,800 jobs," said Liston L. Thomasson, MESC interim executive director.

Also on the bright side, the unemployment rate fell for the fourth straight month, down from an adjusted rate of 8.1 percent in September. At 7.1 percent, the October rate was still considerably higher than the one year ago figure of 6.6 percent.

Seasonal factors largely explain the drop in the rate from September as public schools became fully staffed and returning students exited the labor force. Also, the labor force shrunk. The pool of workers was down by 7,300 since September and by 6,700 from October 1990. MESC labor market analyst Raiford Crews attributes the drop in part to a gain in the number of dual job holders and to smaller numbers of private household workers.

Establishment-based employment (jobs based on place of work) was up by 2,400 jobs over September, with gains in durable goods production of 300 jobs. Non-manufacturing industries increased by 1,900 jobs, mostly in public education.

Compared to a year ago, five

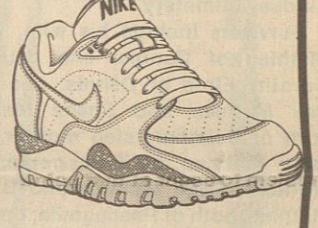
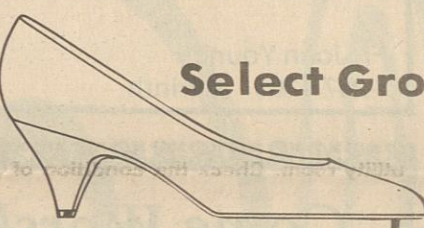
manufacturing categories increased employment: transportation equipment (2,300); food products (1,000); apparel (400); chemicals (300); and petroleum, rubber and leather (100). Losers were lumber and wood producers (1,300), electrical machinery (800) and machinery except electrical (1,000).

In non-manufacturing, large gainers from a year ago were wholesale and retail trade, growing by 3,100 jobs, and services, gaining 5,500. In contrast, contract construction lost 2,700 jobs.

Agricultural employment was up compared to the previous month and to a year ago.

Tenn-Tom Today

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway, recently revised their policy allowing reservations to be made at campgrounds on the Tenn-Tom Waterway for clubs and groups requesting ten or more sites. This is the only exception to the "first-come, first served" concept that applies to individuals wishing to camp. Clubs or groups must arrive no later than 6:00 PM on the first day of the reservation period to avoid having the sites released for individual use.

There is a \$2.00 per site reservation fee which should be received by the resource office at least 14 days prior to a party's arrival, in order to secure the reservation. Once arriving at the campground, the group will pay the camping fees individually. The fee is \$10.00 per night unless a valid Golden Age or Golden Access is presented, which reduces the fee by 50%. These cards only apply to the campground use fee, not the reservation fee of \$2.00 per site. The club or group's representative will be mailed a receipt for the reservation fee once the resource office receives a check or money order for the appropriate amount made payable to: FAO. Mobile District. This reservation fee is non-refundable. Reservations can be made Monday-Friday between the hours of 8:00 AM and 4:00 PM. Reservations will be accepted a maximum of 90 days in advance. Reservations will not be accepted for holiday periods falling within the heavy use seasons (Independence Day, Memorial Day, and Labor Day).

SBA Designates Disaster Area

SBA District Director Jack Spradling said that Clarke, Itawamba, Kemper, Lauderdale, Lowndes, Monroe, Noxubee, Tishomingo, and Wayne Counties were designated because they are contiguous to one or more of the primary counties declared in the State of Alabama. SBA recognizes that disasters don't usually stop at county or state lines. For that reason, counties adjacent to primary counties named in a declaration are included.

Eligible small agricultural-dependent businesses and small agricultural cooperatives that are experiencing difficulty paying bill and meeting current expenses, as a direct result of the declared disaster, are encouraged to inquire about these loans. Loan funds cannot be used for refinancing of long-term debt or to provide capital which was needed prior to the disaster. The business or cooperative must be able to show that it is unable to obtain funds from other sources. The interest rate is 4 percent and loans may be for up to 30 years. Actual loan amounts and terms are set by SBA based on each applicant's financial condition. The maximum loan to a business is \$500,000. Farmers are not eligible to apply to SBA.

Spradling advised that loan applications and program information is available by calling toll-free 1-800-334-0309. SBA loan officers answer these telephones on weekdays from 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m., Eastern Time. Applications are also available by writing the U.S. Small Business Administration, Area 2 - Disaster Assistance, One Baltimore Place, Suite 300, Atlanta, Georgia 30308.

The economic injury loan application filing deadline is May 12, 1992.
