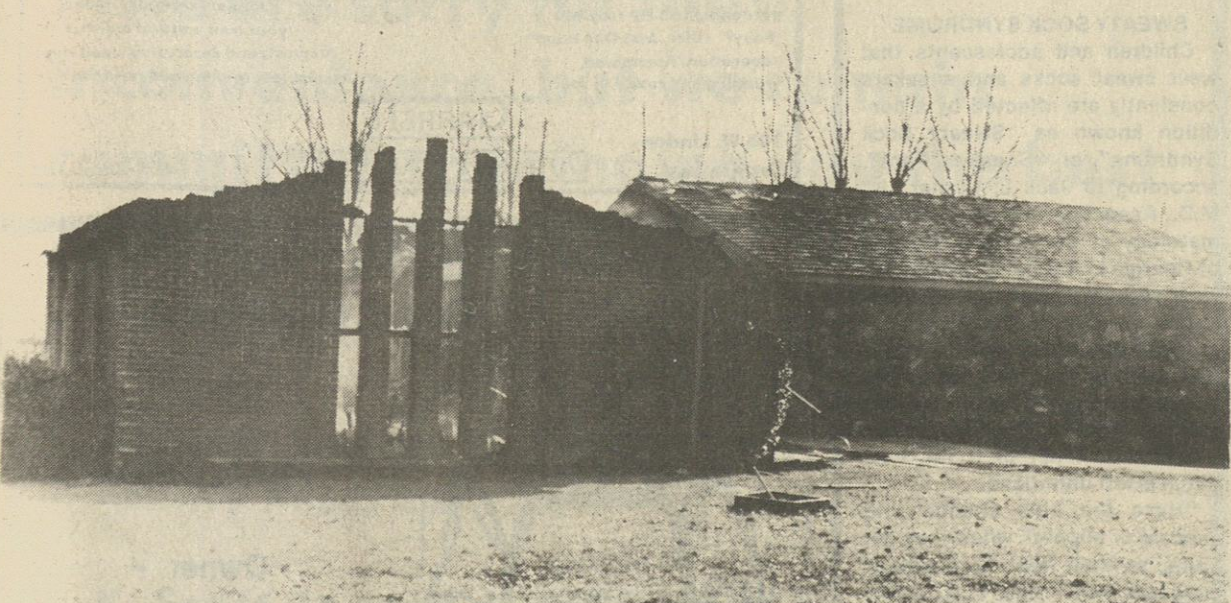
This work will be re-scheduled if severe weather conditions develop.

Tishomingo County Electric Power Association Offers New Services and Schedule of Service Charges

Effective February 3, 1992, Tishomingo County Electric Power Association will begin offering the following new services to qualifying residential customers who have established a good credit history:

Levelized Billing/Even Payment Plan - This plan will allow customers to pay (based on prior years' usage) the same amount each month for eleven months and settle their account in full on the twelfth month (May). Your meter will continue to be read as usual.

Senior Citizens' Plan - This plan will allow retired or disabled customers to pay their bill on the fifth of the month without a penalty if the bill is paid by that date. This plan is available to customers age 55 and over who are drawing retirement or disability income.

If you are interested in either of these options, drop by our main office on Hwy. 25 N. Iuka, MS to see if you qualify or to sign up. If you need additional information, you may call our office at 423-3646 during regular business hours.

Two Vehicle Crash Monday Night

Two Iuka youths were hospitalized Monday night, January 27, as a result of an automobile accident on Hwy. 25 at the bypass.

Karisha Vaughan, 16, and Loughn Vaughan, 10, were headed south when their vehicle collided with an 18-wheeler which apparently turned in front of the car. The 1989 International truck was driven by Nicholas Brandner of Medford, Wisc. Both of the injured were taken to the Iuka Hospital by ambulance and transferred to Humana Hospital in Muscle Shoals.

Two Sentenced To Prison

Two Tishomingo County residents appeared before Circuit Judge Frank Russell in Alcorn County Monday for sentencing. The two had pled guilty in Tishomingo County Circuit Court.

Leon Powell, 51, of the Petertown Community apologized to the family of George Lee Richardson, who he had shot two years ago. Richardson, 34, of Shannon, was killed January 3, 1990 by a single shot to the face with a rifle.

Powell was indicted on a murder charge which was reduced to manslaughter in exchange for a guilty plea.

Powell was sentenced to 20 years in prison, 10 years suspended and ordered to make restitution to the family for funeral costs and other out-of-pocket expenses involved in the case.

In another action, Jessy Thomas Roach, 25, of Iuka pled guilty to sexual battery, was sentenced to 15 years in prison with 10 years suspended. Roach was indicted on a charge of capital rape but pled guilty to a reduced charge in a plea negotiation.

The case involved a county girl who became pregnant in 1988 at the age of 11.

Before the sentencing Russell noted that Roach has taken steps to legitimize the son born to the girl. He consented to pay \$25 a week in child support and half of all medical expenses incurred.

Both Roach and Powell are to report to the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office at 5 p.m. Sunday to await transportation to the state penitentiary at Parchman.

Home Economic Tips

COOLER WEATHER MEANS FIRE DANGER FROM SPACE HEATERS

Space heaters bring comforting thoughts and feelings as they take the chill out of a room. But, warm thoughts often turn to alarm when fires begin from an improperly handled heater.

Following manufacturer's instructions and using common sense are keys to safety when space heaters are in use during the cold weather ahead.

Space heaters are basically safe if you follow their written instructions. But, when people become careless with them, the danger of a fire becomes much greater.

House fires often occur when people place a space heater too near combustible material. Locating the heater in the center of the room is not necessarily the answer because of the danger of knocking it over. Place the heaters no closer than 2 feet to the wall.

Of the two types of space heaters, convective and radiant, the latter requires the most attention. Radiant heaters heat a smaller, specific area compared to convective heaters, which circulate air in one or more rooms.

Heaters that operate on kerosene, gas, propane or butane are most often responsible for causing house fires. Along with the warnings and instructions that come with the heater, the specialist stressed the importance of never adding fuel to a warm heater.

When purchasing a heater, look for the Underwriters Laboratory (UL) seal of approval which indicates the heater meets certain safety standards. Some of those standards may include a safety device that will automatically shut the heater off if it is tipped over. Select heaters that are bottom heavy rather than supported by legs or stands to provide additional balance.

Oxygen depletion sensors, which will stop the fuel-burning heater if the oxygen level in the room drops below that necessary to sustain life, are also beneficial.

Some other basic safety suggestions when purchasing fuel-burning heaters include selecting those with push button ignitors to eliminate the use of matches. If matches must be used, never leave the box near the heater.

Although safer than fuel heaters, electrical heaters have been known to cause fires when the voltage capacity of the electrical wall outlet is not adequate to support the heater and an overload occurs.

Never use extension cords with any type of heating device, including irons and hair dryers, unless the cords are rated for such heat producing appliances. Most extension cords are not heavy enough to support the current needed.

An advantage of electrical heaters over fuel heaters is that the electrical heaters do not deplete the oxygen in the air or produce poisonous gases such as carbon monoxide. Fuel heaters need good ventilation, which may include having a door or window slightly ajar.

Never use aerosols, gasoline or flammable solvents in the same room where a space heater is operating because they can ignite and cause flash fires.

When buying a heater, describe the

heating needs to the salesperson. Usually the salesperson will be familiar with the equipment and be able to recommend the most suitable heater for the job.

Remember to pay careful attention to the manufacturer's instructions and use proper safety precautions.

BEST EVER PORK CHOPS

6 pork chops, 3/4 inch thick
4 tablespoons catsup
2 tablespoons cooking oil
1 tablespoon lemon juice
2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce
1 tablespoon soy sauce

Arrange pork chops in a single layer in 9x13-inch baking dish. Combine catsup, oil, lemon juice, Worcestershire sauce, and soy sauce. Spread half of the mixture over chops. Bake uncovered for 30 minutes at 350 degrees. Turn chops over and spread remainder of sauce over them. Bake uncovered for 30 minutes longer. YIELD: 6 servings.

CROSSED EYES

There are a number of misconceptions concerning crossed eyes (strabismus). For instance, many people think of crossed eyes as looking at each other. Actually, they can assume many forms. One eye may turn up or down, in or out, even a combination such as in and up. The eye may also be crossed constantly or only occasionally.

It is also commonly thought that crossed eyes are caused by weak muscles. This is simply not true. A person with crossed eyes generally has the same range of eye movement as anyone else. The problem is that their two eyes do not work TOGETHER.

There can be a number of causes for this. The eye doctors must first determine the type and degree of the crossed eyes. Once the condition is diagnosed, the treatment can be embarked on to straighten the eyes. Provided the condition is discovered early, results are very favorable. That is why it is so important for parents not to ignore crossed eyes.

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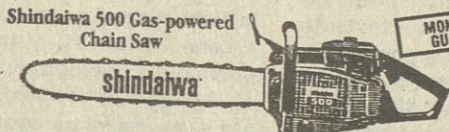

Boats With A Head May No Longer Dump Sewage Into Waters

Tennessee's General Assembly, concerned with the dumping of raw sewage into Tennessee's waterways, has enacted a law to strictly regulate marine sanitation devices (marine toilets on boats), according to Ed Carter, chief of boating for the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency (TWRA).

The new law also spells out the responsibilities for marinas and docks that store or moor boats and that are equipped with tanks to hold sewage.

Senator Ray Albright, from Chattanooga, was the bill's primary sponsor. "My constituents were concerned about waste discharge from boats, especially around marinas or in small coves," Albright said. "This legislation assures that any waste which comes from a boat is properly treated, and that there are an adequate number of pump-out facilities throughout the State." The Senator said he first proposed the law two years ago but withdrew it then for further study.

The five major provisions of the

new law follow:

1. Discharge of untreated sewage is prohibited from all vessels.

2. The only discharge allowed is from a U.S. Coast Guard approved Type I or Type II marine sanitation head.

3. It is illegal to operate a vessel capable of discharging untreated sewage. That includes vessels with "Y-valves" that divert sewage from the holding tank or discharge device into the water. "However, a vessel with an uncertified device would be legal if the device were made inoperable."

4. All docks and marinas which store or house vessels with holding tanks must either provide facilities for sanitary pumping and disposal of sewage or contract to have another boating facility, dock or marina dispose of the waste. All facilities must meet health department rules and laws.

5. The TWRA is responsible for enforcement of this new marine sanitation law.

"To give marina operators time to decide whether they want to provide the disposal service or contract with another source to do the work, the TWRA's will make sanitation checks incidental to their routine inspections for both boats and marinas. Except for extreme or unusual cases, warning citations will be issued for first-time offenders until July 1, 1992," Carter said.

This new State legislation is similar to a federal law which became effective in 1980. The federal law deals with marine sanitation devices, not pump-out facilities, and is more detailed in terms of discharge from boats, actually classifying some bodies of water as "no-discharge." The U.S. Coast Guard is responsible for its enforcement. In contrast, the new State law addresses both pump-out facilities and discharge from boats, but does not designate "discharge" and "no-discharge" waters.

Tree Planting Grant Announcement

The Mississippi Forestry Commission is currently taking applications for tree planting grants under the U.S. Small Business Administration's Natural Resources Development Program.

This national tree planting program is designed for the purpose of contracting with small businesses to plant trees on land owned or controlled by state or local government.

The program is designed as a 55% Federal, 45% non-Federal matching program. The non-federal share may be in the form of cash or in-kind contributions.

Grantees must utilize small businesses to plant the trees and,

when feasible, allow more than one firm to perform work under the project. In addition, if purchased, the trees are to be bought from small businesses. A small business is defined as one having no more than 100 employees.

The State of Mississippi is eligible to receive a total of \$151,072 in 1992 for projects to be carried out between September 1992 and May 1993.

The program was first implemented in 1991 when Mississippi received over \$149,000 for projects that are currently underway. When completed, it is estimated that some 2,500 trees will have been planted in 15 communities under the program in 1991-92.

ASCS Farm News

ASCS ANNOUNCES DISASTER PAYMENT PROGRAM

The Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service will administer a crop disaster assistance program to compensate eligible producers for crop losses caused by drought, flood, and other natural disaster in either 1990 or 1991.

"To be eligible, producers with crop insurance must have had losses greater than 35 percent," said county ASCS official Horn. "Producers without crop insurance must have had losses greater than 40 percent."

Program applications may be filed from February 3 through March 13.

The 1990-91 crop disaster program provides cash payments for production losses on participating program crops of wheat, feed grains, upland cotton, extra long staple cotton, and rice; nonparticipating program crops; peanuts, soybeans, sunflower, sugar

beets, sugarcane and tobacco; and all commercial nonprogram crops.

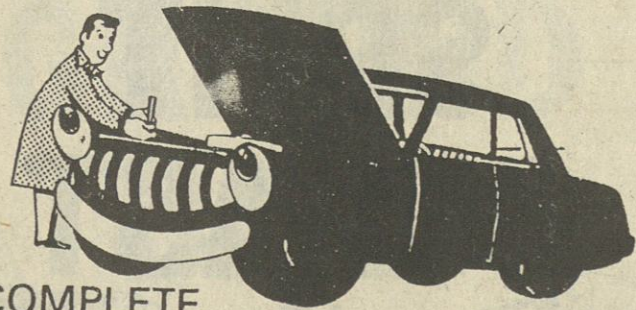
Producers who intend to file should begin to assemble their records now, so they will be ready when the program opens. Farmers have received a special mailing with specific information on the program this month. If a producer does not receive the disaster program information in the mail by February 3, he or she should call the county ASCS office."

Horn explained that a producer may not file on one crop on a farm for one year and a different crop on the same farm for the other. "However, the producer may request benefits for 1990 on one farm and for 1991 on another farm."

The ASCS official said disaster payments would be computed according to the 1990 Farm Hill, and expects to begin issuing payments to farms by April 16. Further details of the disaster payment program may be obtained from the local ASCS office.

Caution Urged With Unvented Gas Heaters

Mississippians with gas heaters are reminded to be very cautious when heating their homes this winter.

Natural gas experts agree, is safe, dependable and economical. However, according to the Department of Human Services' Division of Aging and Adult Services consumers

must be careful when using gas. "This is especially true of elderly persons, who often live alone, using gas heaters," said Billie Marshall, director of the division.

When installing and using unvented gas heaters, consumers should keep the following safety measures in mind:

*Read the owner's manual carefully and completely before attempting to assemble, operate or service any heater.

*Keep all furniture, draperies and clothing at least three feet from the front, top and sides of the heater.

*Never operate heaters in areas where flammable liquids, vapors or high dust content exist.

*Don't stand near heaters with loose fitting clothing.

*Don't forget yearly inspections which should be done by a local gas company.

Aging and Adult Services warns the state's elderly that if heaters are not used properly, serious injuries and deaths can occur due to fire and carbon monoxide poisoning. "If gas is smelled, windows should be opened, any open flames extinguished and no electrical switches touched," Marshall added. "Early symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning resemble the flu, with headaches, dizziness and nausea. If any of these symptoms are detected, victims should get fresh air at once."

For safety inspections and information on fire hazards, Mississippians should contact the local gas company or fire department. For information on subjects relating to the elderly, contact an Area Agency on Aging or Aging and Adult Services in Jackson at 949-2070. From other areas of the state, call toll-free 1-800-345-6347.

"WINTERIZING" YOUR HORSES

4-H horse owners, don't be caught off guard. The following are some suggestions that should help you prepare your horses for the additional cold weather to come.

Horses do quite well being outside on pasture during the winter months if they are in good condition and receive adequate feed and shelter.

When pasture becomes short or non-existent, hay should be fed. If the nutrient quality of the hay is unknown, a good rule-of-thumb is to feed 1 to 1.5 pounds of hay for each 100 pounds of body weight. If additional nutrients are needed to maintain condition, grains or commercial horse feed also can be fed. Try not to feed more grain than hay.

Check the teeth of older horses. Signs of faulty teeth include losing feed while chewing, holding head to one side when eating and a lot of whole grain in the manure. If your animal has tooth problems they can usually be corrected by having them "floated."

Horses should be on a regular vaccination program. If you are unsure of a horse's immune status check with your veterinarian and get started on one. Long winter hair can hide puncture wounds that can be ideal for tetanus.

Horses should be on a regular deworming program. Use standard deworming products every four to six weeks. Use an ivermectin product after a good killing frost and again before spring grazing is available.

Some type of shelter is needed to provide protection from wind and rain. A heavy hair coat can provide protection from cold, but a wind blows away vital body heat and a wet

coat loses its insulating ability. A horse's energy requirements increase about 1 percent for every degree below freezing (based on wind chill).

Clean fresh water is a must for healthy horses. See that they have a good supply of water (not ice or snow) available at all times.

Don't neglect hoof care during the winter. Horses with shoes on are subject to mud and ice caking. Barefoot horses are less susceptible to this problem, but hooves should be trimmed to prevent splitting and cracking.

These workshops will be directed by various professionals in the field of early childhood education. For example, an \$80,000 30 year loan at 10 percent has a monthly payment of \$702.06; that drop to \$587.02 a month if the loan were financed at 8 percent.

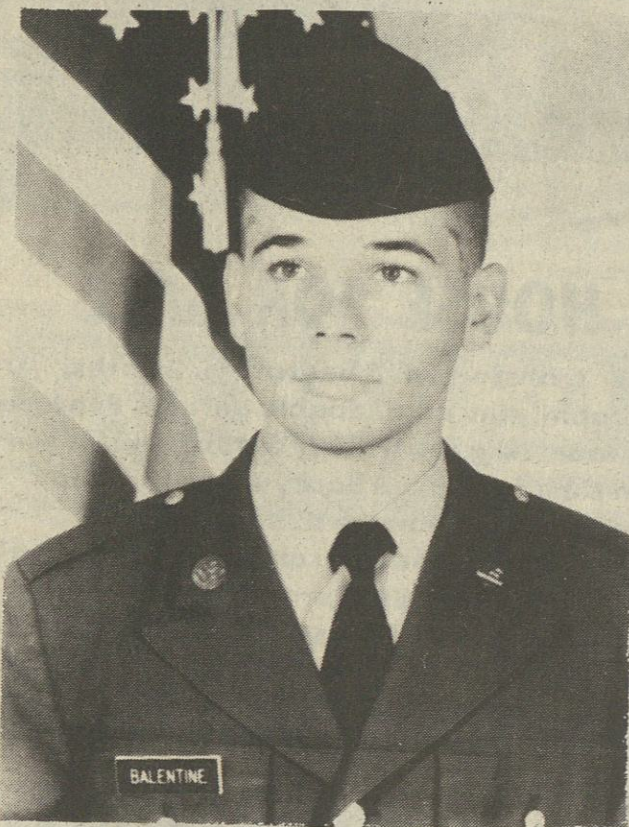
