Iuka, Burnsville Teams Take County Tournament

The annual Tishomingo County Jr. High Basketball Tournament was held January 25, 28 and 30 at the Tishomingo County Magnet High School Gym.

Seventh grade teams from the county competed on Monday. The 7th grade girls team from Tishomingo defeated the Burnsville 7th grade girls, 19-13. Seventh grade girls from Belmont won against Iuka's girls, 12-3.

In boy's action, the Belmont 7th grade team shut out the 7th grade team from Burnsville with a final score of 30-2. Iuka's 7th grade boys topped Tishomingo's boys, 21-6.

Eighth grade boys and girls teams played Thursday night during the Tourney. Burnsville's 8th grade girls team defeated the Belmont 8th grade girls with a final score of 31-15. Tishomingo's 8th grade girls won against the Iuka girls, 23-14.

Also winning were the 8th grade boys from Tishomingo who defeated the team from Belmont, 34-15. Iuka's 8th grade boys topped the Burnsville team, 29-11.

During the finals of the tournament, held on Saturday, the 8th grade Lady Cardinals from Belmont crushed the 7th grade Lady Bulldogs from Tishomingo, 41-1. Belmont's 7th grade boys won against the 7th grade Iuka Chieftains, 16-11.

Burnsville's 8th grade Lady Mustangs won over the

Tishomingo Lady Bulldogs during the finals with a score of 23-20. In boy's action, the Iuka 8th grade chieftains defeated the Tishomingo Bulldogs, 29-12.

The individuals high scorers at the conclusion of the tourney were 7th grade girls, Carla Austin of Burnsville, 11 points; 7th boys, Brian Taylor of Belmont, 10 points; 8th girls, Cristy Glidewell

of Burnsville, 16 points; and 8th boys, Terrell Franklin of Tishomingo, 17 points.

Total points of each individual team at the end of the tournament were Tishomingo 7th grade girls, 19 points; Belmont 7th grade boys, 30 points; Burnsville 8th grade girls, 31 points; and Iuka 8th grade boys, 39 points.

Commodity Distribution At Fairgrounds In Iuka

The Tishomingo County Department of Human Services will distribute surplus commodities to all eligible recipients on Tuesday, February 23, 1993, beginning at 2 o'clock at the Tishomingo County Fairgrounds. Commodities will not be distributed at the courthouse, as in the past. Items to be distributed are butter, pork, green beans, great northern beans, and orange juice.

Eligibility is based on household size and income. All individuals and households who receive food stamps are automatically eligible. Low income individuals and households who do not receive food stamps, but wish to participate in the distribution must apply at the Tishomingo County Department

of Human Services beginning February 16, 1993. Applications may be made the day of distribution at the fairgrounds.

All eligible recipients must have a commodity voucher which must be signed by them and presented at the time commodities are picked up.

Surplus commodities are issued through THE EMERGENCY FOOD ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (TEFAP) of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. This program is available to all eligible recipients regardless of race, color, national origin, religion, age, sex, or handicap.

Iuka Man Suspect In Triple Slaying

A Cherokee woman and two of her children were found fatally wounded, another child was critically injured and a former Iuka man shot himself Saturday, January 30.

According to Colbert County Alabama Sheriff Buddy Aldridge, Alonzo Lydell Burgess, 25, formerly of Iuka is the only suspect at this time in the murders.

Sheilia Long Nnodimele, 31, Brotherton St., Cherokee, Ala., and two of her children, Latoria Andrae Long, 14, and Alexis Ijeoma Nnodimele, 8, were

struck in the head and strangled, Aldridge said. Two-year-old Larico Devon Long was the only family member to survive the injuries. He remained in satisfactory condition at the Children's Hospital in Birmingham.

Apparently Burgess, Nnodimele's live-in companion, shot himself in the chest with a .20-gauge shotgun in front of a neighbor, Larry Cosby Saturday morning.

Burgess called Cosby to come over to the residence, according to reports, and when he knocked and opened the door, Burgess

pulled the trigger. Cosby found the bodies of the family members while at the residence.

Burgess, who has not yet been charged with the murders, remains in Helen Keller Hospital in Tuscumbia, Ala. in satisfactory condition, according to a hospital spokesman. Aldridge stated that Burgess has been under too much medication for his department to conduct questioning however, he is being guarded until questioning can take place.

A bumper jack with dried blood was found by authorities near the victims. The assumed murder weapon has been sent to the Forensics Lab. Aldridge said that they are also awaiting results of autopsies.

Aldridge said that warrants had been signed by Nnodimele previously accusing Burgess of assaulting her.

Investigations are still underway in the case by Colbert County authorities and by the Cherokee Police Department.

Annual Tree Planting Week Scheduled February 12-18, 1993

Mississippi's Nineteenth (19th) Tree Planting Week will be held February 12-18, 1993, according to State Forester Jim Sledge, Jr., Chairman of the state Tree Planting and Forest Development Committee, which held its kick-off meeting for the 1993 event on December 17, in Jackson.

In recent years the annual week-long "Celebration of Trees" has been held beginning on Mississippi's Arbor Day (second Friday in February) and continuing for the week thereafter.

"Some communities choose to schedule commemorative dates other than the official Tree Planting Week each year, but that's okay," the State Forester noted. "The main thing is that they care enough to hold the event at all and recognize the contributions trees make to all our lives," he said.

Mississippi's Tree Planting Week features special planting events at schools, on public park and streets and on private residential sites. The event captured National attention shortly after it was started here in Mississippi in 1975 and many

other states have now established similar special dates to highlight both the economic and environmental benefits provided by trees.

Since 1975 nearly sixteen (16) million seedlings have been given away, or provided to school children and adults at a nominal cost, for planting during Tree Planting Week in Mississippi. Each year an average of 450 schools have taken part, with an average of over 70,000 participating.

Tree Planting Week has been sponsored in virtually all 82 counties of the state since 1975 by the Mississippi Association of Conservation Districts and its Soil and Water Conservation Districts located in each county. Mississippi's garden clubs, forest industries, county agents, State and Federal Forestry Agencies and civic organizations annually pitch in to help with the events.

This year's Tree Planting Week Chairman is Harold Prather of Meadville, Chairman of MACD's Forestry Committee. Local Tree Planting Week committees will again be set up in each county to distribute trees and plan local tree planting events.

Persons interested in participating in Mississippi's Tree Planting -1993 should watch their

local papers and monitor local radio - T.V. for more information a little later on about tree seedling giveaways, etc. Local S.C.S offices, county foresters and county agents will also have local seedling distribution information.

Several Urban Forestry Grant programs are also available for community tree planting projects. (See your County Forester for specifics.)

One unique tree planting project has already been scheduled as a significant adjunct to Tree Planting Week - 1993. The Mississippi Association for Family and Community Education (MAFCE) in cooperation with the Mississippi Forestry Commission, will plant a pair of trees for each couple getting married during 1993. The overall project calls for the planting of over 50,000, pine trees on public land (Sixteenth Sections, city streets, schoolyards) by personnel of the Mississippi Forestry Commission. The pine seedlings for the commemorative tree planting project were purchased by MAFCE, while a hundred hardwood seedlings will be provided in each of ten regions of the State by the Forestry Commission. The hardwoods will be planted on more urban sites such as streets and school grounds.

Each married couple will receive a MAFCE information kit advising them of the trees planted in their honor and urging them to begin a family tradition by planting trees for every child born to them.

Home Economics Tips

HELP YOUR PRESCHOOLER LEARN

Your child was born with the ability to learn and a desire to grow. One of the chief ways young children learn is by having something to do. They learn by doing, by touching, feeling, seeing, smelling and hearing.

With a little creativity on your part, you can give your child these opportunities, and the learning activities will cost very little because most of the activities involve materials found in and around the home.

Young children are beginners. To them the world and all the items in it are new. These items need to be explored and used. In the process of exploring and doing, a young child gains confidence in himself and in his ability to use everyday objects. A young child learns through all his senses. Hence, smelling a carrot is as important as seeing it.

He learns many skills, such as labeling, differentiating and classifying.

Labeling means giving names to things and people. Being able to give names helps the child communicate.

Differentiating means understanding the ideas of sameness

and difference and being able to put the objects in groups.

Let's look at each of these.

- Labeling. As you work around the home, name different objects. "Joe, this is a measuring cup, it's used to measure flour," or "Sue, this is a saw, I use it to cut wood". Don't expect the child to remember the name the first time. Repeat it each time you or he comes into contact with it. Don't assume the child knows an object. Remember, he's a beginner.

- Differentiating. Point out differences between people or objects. "Harry, this is a carrot, that is celery, they are both vegetables."

- Classifying. "Mary, look in the refrigerator, and see how many different kinds of fruits we have." "John, put all the plates in one stack and saucers in another." Help the child learn that apples, grapes and oranges all fit under one general category, while cups, dishes and saucers fit under another.

ASK QUESTIONS

The young child is an expert at asking questions. The parent must also ask question after question. As you go about the house ask the child to label something and to name another object that is like it.

Begin slowly and don't rush the child into classifying until he has learned to label and differentiate. It takes months even years for a child to master these skills. So be patient. Besides the ordinary objects in the home there are hundreds of activities you can initiate.

- Cut a 2-by-2-inch square out of different kinds of cloth. Have the child feel each one and talk about how it feels. He can count the squares, arrange them in piles, sorting by color or texture.

- Do the same thing with pieces of paper. Cut different shapes from pieces of construction paper or paper bags, shelf paper, writing paper, and so forth.

- Have your child pour water into a small bowl, place it in the freezer section. When frozen, let him explore it. Talk about how water is a liquid or solid. Let him taste it, hold it, play with it -- both before and after freezing.

- Place a small amount of water in a sink or dishpan. Have your child float different objects. Try a marshmallow, nail, rubberband, small stick, rock or small bottle.

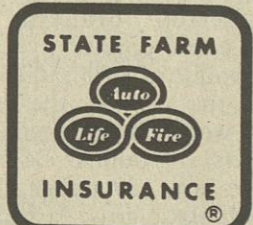
- Place different objects in small containers like empty margarine bowls or baby food jars. Into each, place a slice of apple, orange, a drop of perfume or vinegar, and so forth. Have them identify the smell. At first allow him to look as he smells. Once he has learned the odor,

FUZZY FOCUSERS

Focusing or accommodation gives us detail, separating the figure from the background. Because it is related to reading and putting objects into categories, it appears to be closely connected with intellect. Focusing is the ability to adjust the eyes to know WHAT something is.

People who have such problems will have trouble seeing the difference between "e" and "o", "these" and "those". Fuzzy focusers frequently do not have good language skills, but surprisingly, some of them turn up in occupations such as editor, in which sustained ability to focus for long periods of time is a necessity. The person who chooses to fight through the discomfort may end up with a physical problem, or simply be one irritable editor by mid-afternoon.

Possible signals that focusing is a problem include unusual fatigue when concentrating on a target, finding that letters and lines run together or jump around, seeing a blur when reading or writing and holding reading matter excessively close.

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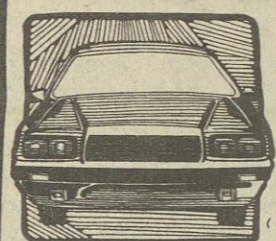

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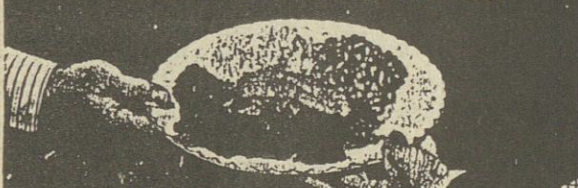

Surprise Birthday Celebration!

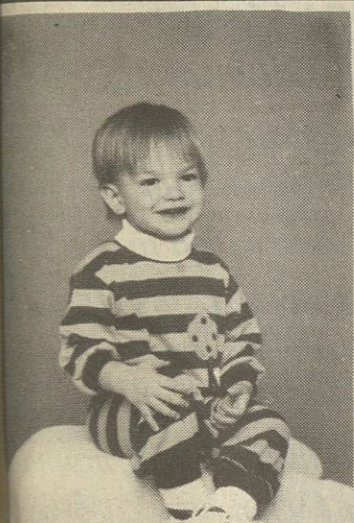

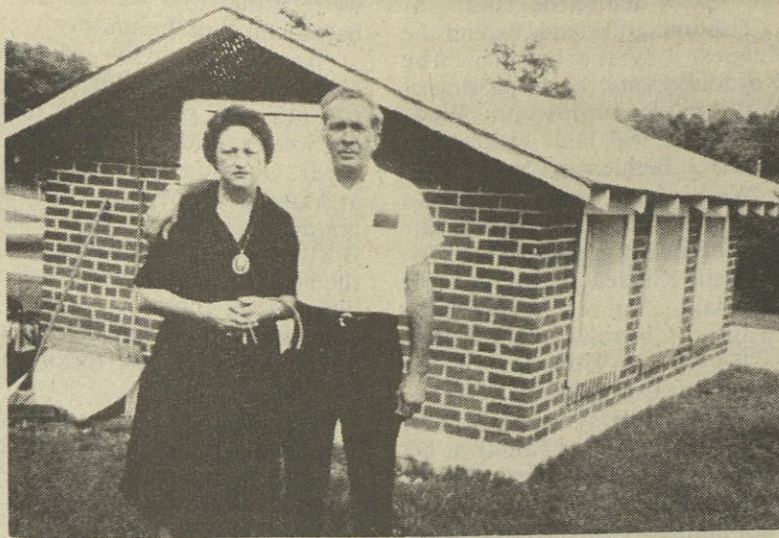

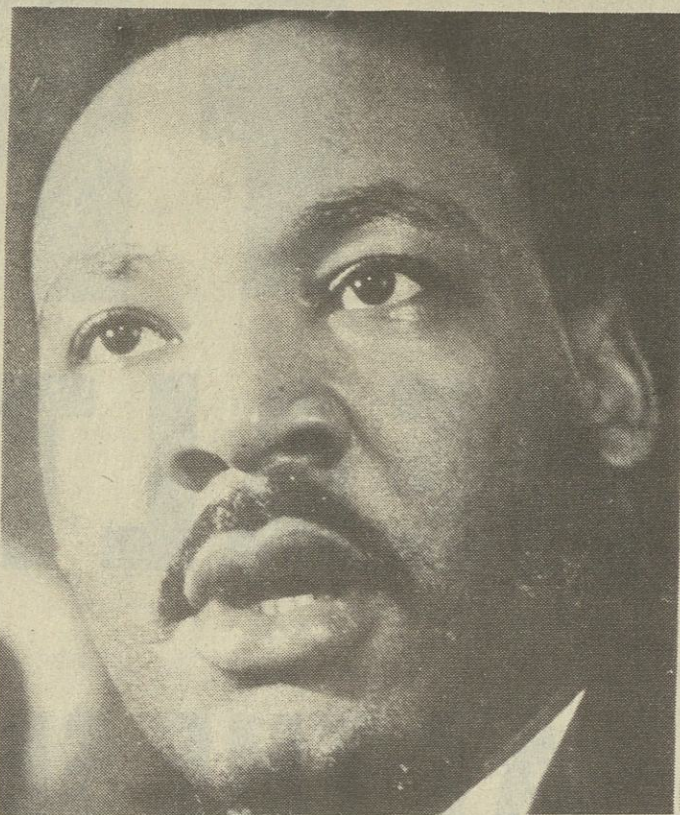

County Agents Notes

FORAGES

When fields dry and tem-
peratures warm up, then it is time
to fertilize and get some new
growth from cool season grass
crops. If you applied enough
phosphate and potash at planting
then you only need to add
nitrogen. Winter annual grasses
can use about one pound of ac-
tual nitrogen per acre for each
day of grazing. Broadcast the
nitrogen when the grass is grazed
down.

There are several sources of
available nitrogen and several
methods of application. They can
be equally effective. Use the
method that best fits your
situation. Liquids may be more
economical if you plan to include
weed control chemicals such as
2,4-D. It could save an extra trip
over the field and help clean up
problem weeds such as yellow

flowered buttercup.

Shiloh National
Military Park's
100th Anniversary

Early preparation for Shiloh National Military Park's 100th anniversary have received a boost thanks to the generosity of a Houston business man interested in preserving the role of Texas troops in West Tennessee's famous April 1862 Civil War battle. Park Superintendent Woody Harrell has announced. A donation by Mr. John L. Nau, III, President of Silver Eagle Distributors, has underwritten the cleaning and repainting of each cast iron plaque marking the positions of Texas units on the battlefield.

"Dating from the late 1890s, the historic tablets are one of the most important cultural resources on Shiloh battlefield today," according to Superintendent Harrell. "The early park commission, made up of actual veterans of the battle, designed a system of over 475 plaques to tell the story of each unit involved at Shiloh. Even from a distance, the

colors and shapes tell at a glance to which army the regiment or battery noted belonged, and on which day that unit saw action at that particular location."

In recent years park budget cuts have led to neglect of needed preservation work. Now refurbishing the markers in time for the park's 100th anniversary on December 27, 1994, has been made a top park priority. "We have established a three year cyclic program to treat our tablets. The cost of cleaning and repainting each plaque is about \$35.00. Although that may seem like a small amount, when you consider the large number of plaques involved, it adds up to a considerable expense. With Mr. Nau's help we were able to meet our goal of one third of the markers for 1992. However, our overall budget is even tighter for 1993. We still have over twenty states whose historic markers need attention before we can meet our overall goal. I would like to invite interested groups or individuals to adopt one or more markers, and underwrite their maintenance costs. If people

from other parts of the country can represent their states as well as Mr. Nau has Texas, Shiloh Park may be able to enter its second century with its historic tablets gleaming as they did at the turn of the 20th Century."

'FLEX,' ASCS SAYS

Farmers were urged today by Phillip A. Horn, County Executive Director of the Tishomingo County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, to be especially mindful this year of the flexible features of farm programs as they make their spring planting decisions.

Horn said there is wide latitude for farmers in current programs, including recently-authorized permissions to plant soybeans or other oilseeds on "optional" flexible acreage. Production from this acreage, equal to 10 percent of a farm's base acreage, is eligible for price support loans.

4-H Communications

The statistics concerning teenage pregnancies and crime involvement are startling. But even more startling is the way many responsible teenagers are being stereotyped by the actions of their peers.

Many of us have formed hurtful and negative stereotypes about our young people without thinking that most teenagers are responsible people. The work I do with young people has shown me that most teenagers want more responsibility.

We shouldn't put all adolescents into one group. We can't assume they are all alike any more than we can assume that all people between 55 and 65 are all alike.

Too often statistics on adolescents that are paraded before us tend to indicate all the problems are only true of adolescents. Seldom do the same statistics indicate that similar problems occur with other age groups.

For example, we are told of the large number of teenagers who run away from home. But what about the large number of parents who leave their children - such as the highly publicized "Home Alone" cases?

We shouldn't minimize the severity of the problems encountered by some adolescents or try to act like the problems do not exist. But we should avoid generalizing the entire adolescent population.

This kind of thinking is dangerous and destructive. It is unfair to the majority of adolescents who are individuals and very normal persons. It is also unfair to parents who can easily be lead to fear the approach of each day living with an adolescent.

It is good to remind ourselves that adolescence, like other stages of development, is a period in its own right. Each period in human life has not only its problems and woes, but also has many joys and happy times - if we could just see them!

Local Doctor Certified As Family Practice Specialist

Dr. Jerry A. Turner of Iuka, MS has been named a diplomate of the American Board of Family Practice (ABFP) as a result of passing a certification examination offered by the ABFP. The physician is now certified in the medical specialty of family practice.

The intensive written examination is designed to prove the candidate's ability in the areas of internal medicine, surgery, obstetrics and gynecology, pediatrics, psychiatry and community medicine.

To qualify for the examination, a physician must have successfully completed three years of residency training in family practice. There are some 390 such training programs in teaching hospitals and university medical centers across the United States.

ABFP diplomates must continue to show proof of competence in the field of comprehensive, continuing care of the family by being recertified every six years. The family practice specialty was the first to require diplomates to be recertified on a continuing basis.

The latest group of diplomates

brings the total number certified to more than 40,000. Most are members of the American Academy of Family Physicians, the national association of family doctors. The Academy was the first national medical group to require members to take continuing medical study, and was chiefly responsible for securing specialty status for family practice.

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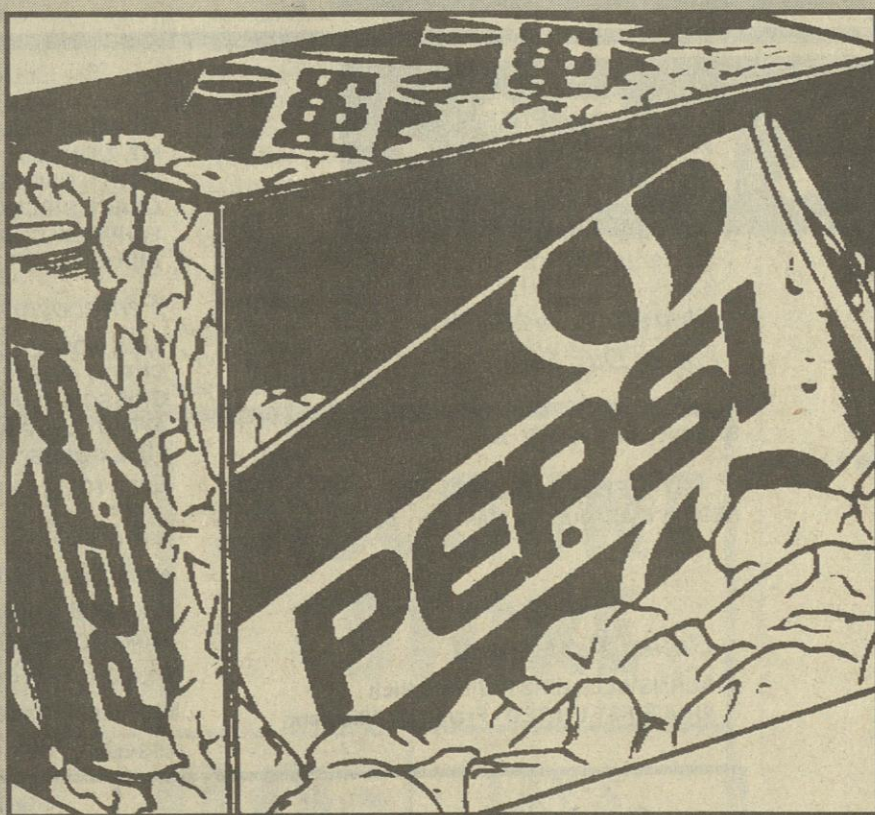

Jarod Dawson Wins Geography Bee

Jarod Dawson, a 7th grader at Tishomingo Middle School, won the school-level competition of the National Geography Bee on Jan. 6, and a chance at a \$25,000 college scholarship.

The school-level Bee, at which students answered oral questions on geography, was the first round of the fifth annual National Geography Bee, which is sponsored by National Geographic WORLD, the Society's magazine for children, and Amtrak.

The kick-off for this year's Bee was the week of Jan. 4, with thousands of schools around the United States, the District of Columbia, and five U.S. territories participating. The school winners, including Jarod, will now take a written test; up to 100 of the top scorers in each state and territory will be eligible to compete in their state Bee in April 2.

The National Geographic

Society with its co-sponsors will provide an all-expenses-paid trip to Washington, D.C., for state champions and their teacher escorts to participate in the National Geography Bee national championship on May 25 and 26. The first-place national winner will receive a \$25,000 college scholarship; the second-place winner, a \$15,000 scholarship; and the third-place winner, a \$10,000 scholarship.

Alex Trebek, host of "Jeopardy!", will moderate the national finals, which will air as a prime-time special on the Public Broadcasting Service at 8 p.m. May 26.

The National Geographic Society developed the National Geography Bee in response to a growing concern about the lack of geographic knowledge among young people in the United States. A 10-country Gallup survey conducted for the Society in 1988 and 1989 found that people

in the U.S. ages 18 to 24 - the youngest group surveyed-knew less about geography than young people in any of the other countries in the survey.

The National Geographic Society, with nearly 10 million members, has as its mission the "increase and diffusion of geographic knowledge." In addition to the National Geography Bee, the Society sponsors a number of other geography education initiatives, including the Summer Geography Institute for teachers, the National Geographic Society Education Foundation, and the Geographic Alliance Network, which is currently working in almost every state and Puerto Rico.

House Notes

Voters would have a way to initiate a proposed amendment to the state constitution under a bill recommended by a house committee as the Legislative session enters its second month.

The measure is designed to implement a constitutional amendment ratified by the people last fall providing a method for voters to propose and adopt constitutional amendments through a so called "initiative" process. The legislation is restricted to constitutional amendments and does not apply to the general laws of the state.

Under the new constitutional provision, a petition to initiate an amendment must be signed by a minimum number of voters, totaling not less than twelve percent of the number of voters cast in the last gubernatorial election. At least one-fifth of the required signatures must come from each of the state's five congressional districts.

Among other things, the legislation specifies that the sponsor of an initiative proposition must identify the amount and source of any revenue needed to implement the proposal. An initiative measure would have to be filed with the secretary of state's office within 10 months prior to the regular session of the legislature at which it is to be submitted. Most provisions in the bill track the conditions spelled out in the initiative amendment adopted in the November elections.

The bill was approved yesterday by the apportionment and elections committee in the House and now goes to the full House for consideration.

Numerous other bills also were reported out by committees Monday, Feb. 1, in a drive to meet a crucial Legislative deadline.

Tuesday was the last day for House and Senate committees to act on general bills and constitutional amendments originating in their own chamber.

More than 200 bills already have been sent to the crowded House calendar dealing with a wide range of topics.

Other bills gaining committee approval Monday include proposals to set minimum standards for the appointment and training of auxiliary law enforcement officers...Provide a method to terminate parental rights when a parent or guardian is convicted of rape or other sex offenses involving a small child...and establish a statewide law for the regulation and licensing of pawnshops. Another

measure would allow the jury in a trial involving a capital offense to sentence a person to life imprisonment without parole. Under present law, the jury has only two options when sentencing a person convicted of a capital crime; the death penalty, or a life sentence with eligibility for parole in not less than 10 years. This bill would give a third option of life without parole.

Environmental Tobacco Smoke Clouds Americans' Future

The dangers of environmental tobacco smoke are no longer clouded in doubt.

The findings in a recent American Heart Association scientific position paper have cleared the air about ETS' harmful effects on non-smokers:

•An estimated 35,000 to 40,000 cardiovascular disease-related deaths will occur each year.

•Another 3,000 to 5,000 people will die from lung cancer each year.

•About 2,500 perinatal deaths will occur each year because of maternal smoking.

ETS, also called second-hand and passive smoke, is exhaled or emitted from the burning end of cigarettes, cigars and pipes. It contains 40 known carcinogens and 4,000 chemicals, including carbon monoxide, which can cause serious problems to your heart. ETS can also aggravate the illnesses of those who already have heart or lung diseases, asthma or allergies. It can also irritate the eyes, nose and throat of a non-smoker as well as cause headaches and nausea.

Furthermore, cigarette smoke increases blood clotting and can damage the layer of cells that line all blood vessels. It can also hurt cell membranes, which leads to an increased risk of atherosclerosis, a process in which fat, cholesterol and other substances build up in the artery walls. This slows blood flow or blocks off blood vessels completely, causing either a heart attack or stroke.

About 50 million non-smoking adults over age 35 are regularly exposed to passive smoke, the AHA says. Meanwhile, about 50 percent of all children live in families with one or more

smokers.

Thus, the risk of death from heart disease is about 30 percent higher for those exposed to ETS at home and could be much higher in those exposed at work.

But you can help protect yourself and others. If you smoke, quit (more than 435,000 Americans die yearly from cigarette smoking-related illnesses). If you won't stop, then don't smoke around others.

More first-hand information on second-hand smoke can help you clear the air. So call the American Heart Association at 1-800-AHA-USA1.

Senator Lott Opposes Social Security Cuts & Taxes

U.S. Senator Trent Lott, R-Miss., said that he strongly disagrees with the Clinton administration's suggestions to make Social Security recipients bear the burden for reducing the budget deficit.

"I was floored to learn that the new administration is even considering reducing Social Security

cost-of-living adjustments, taxing social security benefits or raising the retirement age," said Lott, a member of the Senate Budget Committee and Republican Leadership.

Lott, who appeared Sunday on ABC's *This Week With David Brinkley*, asked, "Why should the burden of the deficit and higher taxes be placed on the backs of the elderly and retirees?"

"Social Security is not the problem," Lott said. "It did not cause the deficit and it is not adding to the deficit. There is a surplus in the Social Security trust fund. Social Security should be left alone."

The Clinton administration is considering raising the retirement age by two years from 65 to 67, taxing social security benefits and reducing COLAs.

"I'm having trouble understanding why this new administration, in only week two, is discussing tax increases when I have not even heard a word about cutting federal spending," Lott said. "The new administration has its priorities all wrong."

Kaskaskia, in the "Illinois country," was the first objective for George Rogers Clark in his daring plan during the American Revolution to end Indian raids that were advocated by British troops. In 1778, Clark and a small group of Kentucky "Long Knives" took the Mississippi River town without a shot and achieved similar success in the nearby villages of Prairie du Rocher and Cahokia. Clark was able to persuade the mostly French inhabitants to renounce their allegiance to the British crown and to negotiate a short truce with Indian tribes. American presence was maintained in the Northwest territory throughout the Revolutionary War and made possible the permanent sovereignty that was granted by the Treaty of Paris. The Chief Tishomingo Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, notes the significance of this daring expedition.
