Two Arrested In Undercover Plot

County and state officials executing an undercover drug investigation arrested two Belmont residents last week.

According to Tishomingo County Sheriff, Johnny Nunley, Robert W. Foster, 36 of Tusculum, AL and Belmont and Tammy Cleveland, 28, of Belmont, were charged with conspiracy to possess cocaine with the intent to distribute.

They were arrested Tuesday, March 24 at about 5:45 p.m. in a parking lot in Midway as they apparently purchased 1 kilo (2.5 lbs.) of cocaine

from an undercover narcotics agent. Authorities seized \$7,000 used to purchase the cocaine, a 1987 Buick Century and a 22-caliber rifle at the scene.

Agents with the Mississippi Bureau of Narcotics, Northeast Mississippi Narcotics Task Force, Frankie Daniel with the Alcohol, Beverage Control Commission, and members of the Sheriff's Department participated in the arrest.

According to Sheriff Nunley, Foster and Cleveland are being held in Oxford, Mississippi waiting a federal bond to be set.

School Complex Wins Design Citation

The Council of Educational Facility Planners International held their national convention recently in Atlanta. The Council's goal is to advance the planning and construction of educational facilities through research and recognition of visionary educational projects which go beyond the norm and set the tone for the future. The Council chose as a recipient of their Design Citation, the Tishomingo County High School Complex at Iuka, Mississippi. This new 9-12 high school was designed by Johnson Bailey Architects, P.A., with offices in Tupelo, Columbus and Jackson, with associate architect Concordia. The school was noted for its approach as a community resource center for education and community activities. The facility is planned for a solar observatory as a focal point for teaching math and science. The complex includes state of the art technological advances which link the high school to the Tri-State Educational Initiative administered by NASA and located on the campus, as well as a distance learning center to link the community educationally to the world. The project was partially funded by the State of Mississippi's Economic Impact Authority as an enhancement of local educational opportunities for county residents

and prospective employees of the Yellow Creek NASA facility at Iuka. Gary C. Bailey, AIA, Partner in Charge of the project stated "this project is truly a collaborative effort of architects, educators and the community to make education the core of this community."

Richy Harrelson Breaks State Pitching Record

March 28, 1992, will be a day always cherished by Richy Harrelson. This was the day he set a new State Pitching record as he recorded his 62nd career victory. The old record of 61 was held by Ronnie Richardson of Columbus. The record breaking game was played on the Braves home field. They beat Booneville 12-0 in a one-hitter.

Richy started playing baseball at age 6 in the Iuka Dixie Youth Minor league for Shoe Mart. His coaches were Wayne Underwood and W.T. Carson. Richy then moved up to the Dixie Youth league where he also played for Shoe Mart. His Coaches were Charlie Robinson and Buddy McAnally the first year. The second year he was coached by Buddy McAnally and Jerry Harrelson. During his last two years, he was coached by Jerry Harrelson and Milt Holiday. While in Dixie Youth Richy played on the 10 year All-Stars two years, and the 11-12 year old All-Stars two years. These All-Stars went to the State Tournament all four years. When Richy was 12 he set a Dixie Youth State Record for strike-outs in one game with 16. Iuka won the 1-0 over Washington County in the State Tournament. Brian Bullard hit a home run in the last inning for the only run of the game. Richy then moved up to the Dixie Boys 13-14 league where he played both years on the All-Star team. Jerry Harrelson, Milt Holiday, Gary Bullard and Paul Nunley were the coaches. Richy then moved up to High School where he has been playing for the last 6 years. Present TCHS coach Jerry Long has coached Richy all of his high school years. Steve Thomason Assisted Coach Long for three years and present

Assistant coach Donnie Davis is Assisting Coach Long during Richy's senior year. Richy won 15 games and lost 3 in his two Junior High years. During his 9th grade year, Richy was 13-1 as the Iuka Chieftains won the State Championship. Iuka also set a State Record for wins with 41. They were 41-8. Richy was 14-2 his 10th grade year; and Iuka was runner-up in the State Championship series. Richy was 15-2 his 11th grade year as Iuka was again runner-up in the State Championship series. Richy is currently 5-0 this season as a member of the Tishomingo County High School Braves Baseball Team.

When asked about the record, Richy replied "Without God, my Team-Mates, Coaches, fans, all my teachers and all the School Officials, both at Iuka High School and Tishomingo County High School and my family this would not have been possible." He said he has been blessed with the greatest team-mates, Coaches, and Fans and family a Baseball player could ask for. Richy also said, "This is not an individual record-it goes to all the players, coaches, and fans who have been together the last six years along with my family."

Shaune Holiday, close personal friend and team-mate and Richy have both signed to play with the Ole Miss Rebels next year.

Team-mate Shaune Holiday said one thing he will never forget about Richy was when he hit a home-run against Cherokee in Little League and tripped as he rounded third-base and fell face first on the third base line. These boys who have played together for these last few years and the parents of these players have many,

many fond memories that they have shared along the way. Richy and his parents will always cherish these memories.

Richy is the son of Jerry and Lana Harrelson of Iuka. His grandparents are Mrs. Kathryn (KK) Dawson and the late Winfred (Pa) Dawson of Booneville, Mrs. Wilma (Mama) Harrelson of Wheeler, and the late Boyce Harrelson whom he never got to see. plant about 4000 acres of beans.

Given these conditions and past history, growers should carefully consider input costs. Don't radically change the operation of the bean enterprise. Staying with the basics is a good way to keep production costs in check; unnecessary expense is an unwanted burden in 1992.

As we approach soybean planting season in the county, it's helpful to review a few recommendations. This advice is based on years of research by agronomists at Mississippi State University.

The best planting dates are May 1 to June 10. These dates insure the best opportunity for high yields in most circumstances. Many of our producers have good yields with late June planting -- there is always an exception to the rule -- but May and early June are still optimum times.

Many times growers will comment that they can't afford to lime. But given the pH readings of some of the soil samples from across the state, many growers cannot afford NOT to lime their soils.

Cotton planting time is almost here. It's typical to see some cotton planted by April 24, but many producers may have to wait to plant because of cool temperatures and wet soil.

Soil temperature and moisture level are really more important in determining a planting date than the calendar is. Cotton seed is most susceptible to chilling injury the first 24 to 36 hours after it is planted. This is the period when seed soak up water.

The temperature of the soil should be at least 65 degrees and the weather forecast favorable for five days if producers want to plant.

Selection of preplant and preemergence herbicides should be based on weed pressure in fields. Rate selection should approximate the recommended rate for a particular soil type.

FUNGUS-FREE FESCUE

If some producers have tried and lost with fungus free fescue, they shouldn't give up. Many stand losses of this forage have been caused by old seed with low vigor, accidental mixing with ryegrass seed and overgrazing from cattle.

As new varieties and better seed supplies become available, expect the fescue situation to improve.

VEGETABLE PLANTING

People are preparing the land for home gardens. While out working in the soil, check for soil insects such as white grubs, wireworms and corn rootworms.

Homeowners should have their spring garden spots cleared. After removing trash and other debris, turn under soil to expose insects to predators and weather.

The sooner you treat garden spots, the fewer insects you will find when you start planting. If you think you'll have problems with soil insects, you can apply Diazinon (either granular, liquid infurrow or broadcast incorporated) for control.

The Pediatrician's Corner



EARACHE

Even a mild earache may require medical attention, and for this reason you should be on the alert for signs of this ailment in your children. If a child is too young to talk, your only clue may be his or her behavior. He may become very fussy and irritable and cry when swallowing. Young children with earache also may have a fever. Whatever his age, if a child complains of pain in his ear, your physician should be contacted. Left untreated, some earaches may seem to improve by themselves but they may still cause serious damage.

If there is a leakage or discharge from the child's ear, this may mean that the eardrum has torn under pressure from the infection. This does not necessarily mean that the child has a serious infection. It may only be a response to the build-up of excess pressure in the ear.

The most common cause of pain in the ear is a condition called otitis media or infection of the middle ear. Whatever may be causing the earache, your child's hearing should be protected by having the problem treated as soon as possible.

PESTICIDE APPLICATION CERTIFICATION

Before anyone can purchase and apply a "RESTRICTED USE PESTICIDE" they must be certified. This certification involves viewing a videotape that we have in our office. After viewing the tape you will receive a card in the mail with a license number that you must present when purchasing any of these chemicals. Please call the Extension office to make an appointment to view the tape. (423-7016)

TICK BITES

Always take precaution against tick bites. Some species carry organisms that cause Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever or Lyme disease. It's important to note a tick bite by marking your calendar just in case you do become ill.

If you make a notation, you will have a record for your physician if you do experience sudden health problems. Most ticks we encounter in Tishomingo County cannot carry these diseases. This is not to say we are completely safe from ticks that do carry them.

Avoid tall grass and bushes. Wear high boots and tuck in pant legs. Spray clothing with an approved repellent.

If you are bitten by a tick and then notice a red rash or red-ringed inflammation near the bite, consult a physician. Other symptoms to be wary of include fever, chills, muscle aches, dizziness and swollen joints.

CROP PLANTING TIME

The 1992 growing season is approaching. Statewide, soybean acreage may be down 5 percent or a little more -- farmers expect to plant just under 1.9 million acres of beans. In Tishomingo County, we expect to

DEPENDENCE ON GLASSES

Have you ever had the feeling that you're too dependent on glasses or contact lenses? Does wearing them for long periods of time make you feel uncomfortable? You probably won't hurt your eyes by not wearing your glasses all the time. There may be times when you don't really need to see clearly and not wearing your glasses gives you a restful feeling.

But a note of caution is needed here, especially when the word "comfort" is mentioned. If you feel more comfortable without your glasses or contact lenses, even though your vision is impaired, what you may need is not a rest from wearing them but an eye examination.

Your eyes don't stay the same as you get older. The near-focusing muscles lose some of their strength. This can cause eyestrain and headaches because your eyes are straining to see even when you're wearing glasses.

If you haven't had an eye examination recently, it would probably be a good idea to make an appointment.

Shiloh Battlefield Marks 130th Anniversary

"Living History" demonstrations, a special presentation by the captain of the U.S.S. Shiloh, and the 3rd Annual Shiloh Art Show will highlight activities marking the 130th anniversary of the Battle of Shiloh. Shiloh National Military Park will host this wide range of events on Saturday, April 4th, and Sunday, April 5th, the weekend closest to the actual anniversary dates of the April 6-7, 1862, Civil War battle.

At 2:00 P.M. on Saturday, Captain Bayard W. Russell, first Commanding Officer of U.S.S. Shiloh (CG-67), and Mrs. Patricia Adkins Ball, the ship's sponsor, will present a model of the new warship to the National Park Service in a ceremony at Cloud Field. Shiloh Park Superintendent Woody Harrell will accept the donation on behalf of the park. Hardin County Executive Kim Stricklin will also offer remarks at the observance. In case of inclement weather the ceremony will be held indoors at the Shiloh National

Military Park Visitor Center Auditorium.

U.S.S. Shiloh will be commissioned in July at Bath, Maine. The new 567 foot Guided Missile Cruiser is equipped with the sophisticated Aegis weapons radar system, a computer-controlled weapons system designed to combat and defend American aircraft carriers against enemy aircraft, submarine, and surface to surface attacks. "Shiloh" joins other Ticonderoga-class cruisers such as "Gettysburg," "Chancellorsville," and "Vicksburg" in commemorating famous Civil War battles. Shiloh is the first U.S. Navy ship to carry to sea the name of the bitter two-day battle fought near Pittsburg Landing, Tennessee. The first major battle in the western theater, Shiloh resulted in 23,746 casualties. Shiloh is a battle that epitomizes the determined spirit of the American soldier.

Cloud Field will also be the site of a two-day Civil War encampment featuring tactical Living History demonstrations that will recreate a glimpse of 19th Century warfare. This year over 350 volunteer Civil War demonstrations will portray Confederate infantry, cavalry and artillery. A total of eleven separate demonstrations will be presented throughout the day on Saturday and on Sunday afternoon. This annual event has proved quite popular: last year's observance attracted over 10,000 visitors. The Shiloh demonstrations will differ from the standard battle re-enactment in that only Confederate demonstrators will be utilized during the event. All activities will reflect authentic Civil War battlefield troop deployment, maneuver, and battle tactics as experienced by soldiers at Shiloh. These activities involve live fire scenarios, without attempting to recreate or present simulated combat scenarios with opposing lines of fire and the taking of casualties. Thirdly, a Civil War Art Show at the

park Visitor Center will be held in conjunction with the weekend activities. Co-sponsored by the Park and the Savannah, Tennessee, Art Guild, the show will feature artwork in several different media from local area artists, and will cover the themes of the Battle of Shiloh, the Civil War, and Shiloh National Military Park. Area artists and photographers must register their work on April 1st or 2nd between 8:00 am and 5:00 pm. Registration will take place in the Visitor Center. The artwork will be on display in the Visitor Center Auditorium between the hours of 8:00 am and 5:00 pm.

Shiloh National Park Superintendent Woody Harrell invites the public to take part in any or all of these activities. The only charge will be the regular entrance fee to the park.

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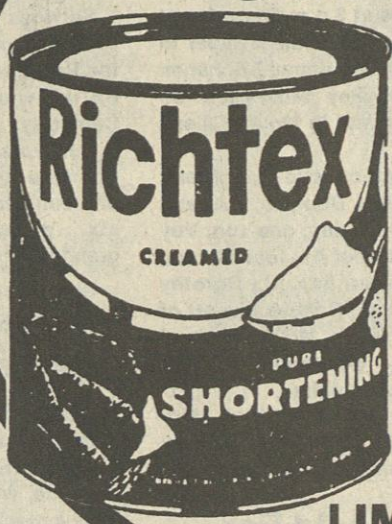

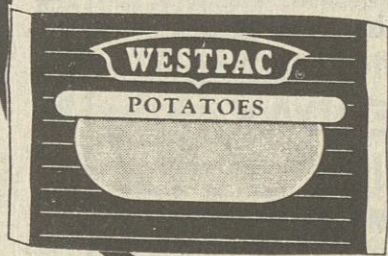

THE RESURRECTION

A controversy over the virgin birth of Christ and His resurrection arose in 1990 in the Church of England General Synod. Synod member Margaret Brown proposed the resolution: "This synod affirms that Jesus Christ, Son of God, was miraculously conceived, through no human fatherhood, a virgin mother, and that after his crucifixion, his dead body, which had been laid in the tomb, was raised to life by the power of God and revealed glory to his disciples." (National & International Religion Report, 12, 1990.)

The resolution was defeated. One might ask why the decision of such a group matters anyway. The holy scripture teaches the resurrection of Christ, what difference does it make if a synod rejects it? The answer is that the synod is composed of people who are extremely influential over religious folk.

Actually, God's word was written to common people who are given the power for being able to understand it for themselves. Jesus preached to the common people, and they were encouraged to "search...the scriptures daily..." (Mark 12:37; Acts 17:11)

The scriptures teach that Jesus was bodily resurrected from the dead. All four gospel writers (Matthew, Mark, Luke and John) went to great lengths to verify that fact. The apostle Paul stated called to witness the apostles and over 500 folks who saw Christ after the resurrection. (1 Cor. 15:3-8)

No honest person would have any interest in a religion based on a lie. Christ were not raised from the dead. Perhaps this gross inconsistency is the reason many mainline churches of today are declining in number. Condemning sin and preaching hope are difficult if the source book is not what the paper it is written on.

"If in this life only we have hope in Christ, we are of all men the most pitiable. But now Christ is risen from the dead, and has become the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep." (1 Cor. 15:19-20)

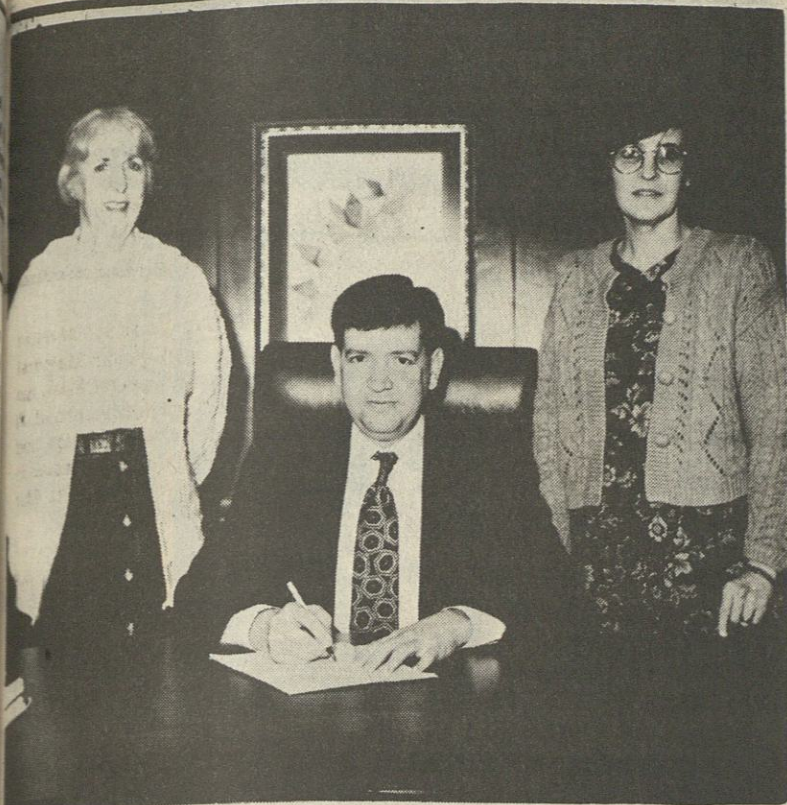

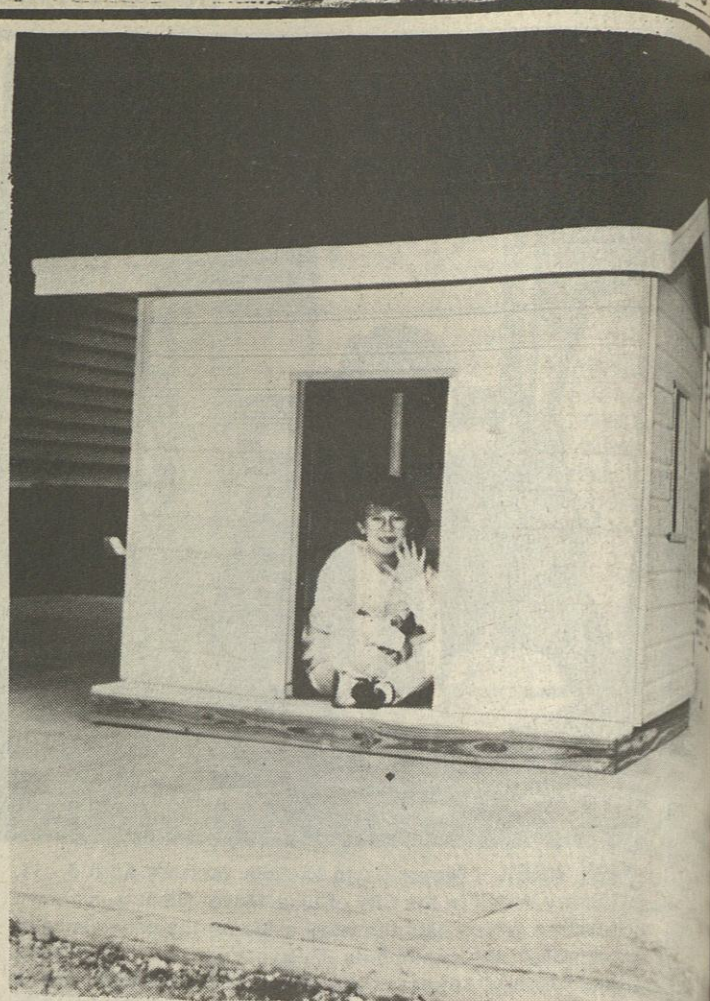

New Silverado At Vo-Tech

Tishomingo County Vocational Center has received a 1992 Silverado from Chevrolet Motor Division to enhance the school's automotive program and afford the students an opportunity to become familiar with the latest in automotive technology.

So far, nearly 10,000 new Chevrolet passenger cars and trucks damaged in transit or by flood have been donated to schools for in-classroom instructional purposes. In the past 20 years educational institutions in most of the 50 states have received donated vehicles for their vocational/education programs.

This program was started in 1972 when Chevrolet started diverting damaged cars and trucks (previously scrapped) to schools for training purposes. In addition to damaged

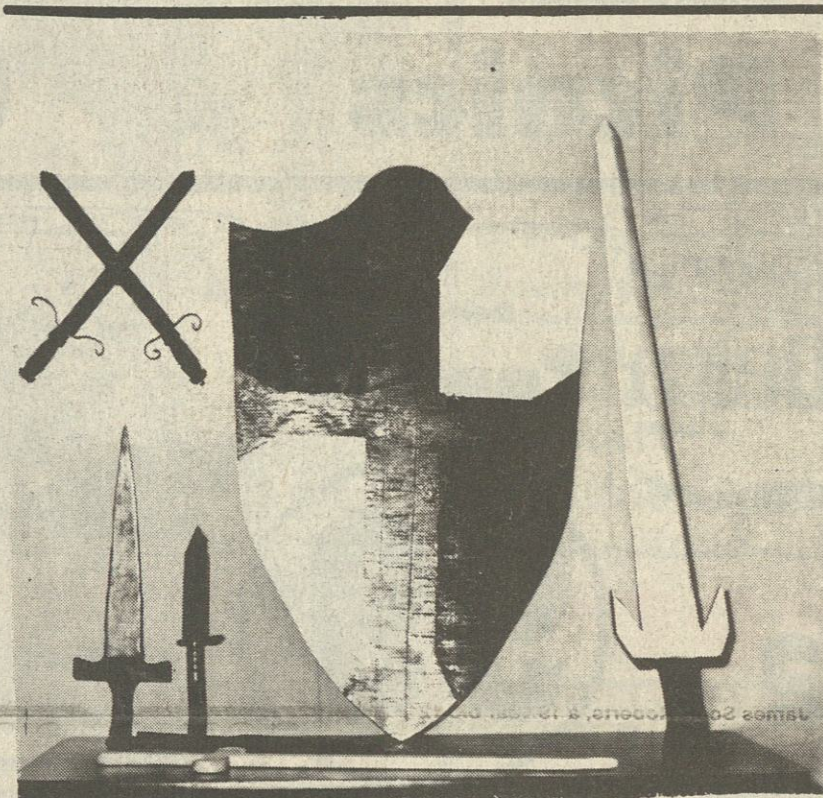
vehicles, engineering test and pilot line vehicles not suitable for sale are included in the program.

The Chevrolet program also includes donations of passenger car and truck engines, transmissions, tools and various major automotive components used for testing or design development. Any secondary public and parochial school, private nonprofit secondary and technical school, and community and/or junior college with a terminal vocational program for automotive service training may qualify for the donation of a vehicle or vehicle component.

The institution must sign a legal affidavit acknowledging they fully understand that the vehicle is to be used in classroom instruction only and cannot be licensed, titled or

driven on any road, public or private, nor can any component or components of a donated vehicle be used on or in any vehicle that will be licensed, titled, or driven on any road, public or private. Donation labels are affixed to the vehicles, and Chevrolet advises appropriate agencies that the vehicle has been removed from service and can never again be licensed or titled.

The Service Staffs at Chevrolet's 22 Branch Offices keep a current request list from qualified schools. Once a vehicle is determined to be eligible for donation, the respective Branch Office obtains the necessary documents and approval. It is then the school's responsibility to arrange transportation of the vehicle to their site.

Lott Meets With Army Officials About Future Of Army Ammo Plant

Senator Trent Lott said Thursday that he is "hopeful" that the Mississippi Army Ammunition Plant in Hancock County may once again provide jobs and an economic boost to the Mississippi Coast.

Lott met Thursday in Washington with Gen. Jimmy Ross, commander of the Army Materiel Command, to

discuss the plant and other issues. The Materiel Command has authority over the mothballed ammo plant.

The Army is working to sign a contract for ongoing maintenance and property management of the facility. Once that phase is completed, contracts can be signed that will allow use of the plant for commercial purposes.

"I strongly urged Gen. Ross to do everything that he can to bring these contract discussions to completion as quickly as possible and get some work going on again out at the plant site," Lott said.

The Army is close to signing a con-

tract for continued maintenance and oversight of the plant. In addition, at least eight private companies and government organizations are discussing contracts to use space at the plant.

"The news today from the Army is very hopeful," Lott said. "The ammo plant is a tremendous facility and it should be used in a way that is beneficial to the community and the government. I am very hopeful that several of these groups will locate there."

Exploring The Future

As a member of the Senate Commerce, Science & Transportation Committee, I was able to quiz Daniel Goldin during his confirmation hearings for the position of NASA administrator about the future of our space program and projects such as ASRM (Advanced Solid Rocket Motor).

He sites four core values for the future of NASA:

- ▶ **Human interaction in space** -- to invest in our children and their future by exploring the opportunities that space offers and to quench the human desire to understand space and the unexplored;
- ▶ **Planet Earth** -- to continue with the learning process of our planet and what affects it environmentally and scientifically;
- ▶ **Universe** -- to gather information about other planets and solar systems, discover new elements and discover the universe's origins;
- ▶ **Continued leadership** -- to keep America as the world's leader in aeronautics and to profit from the spin-offs of space exploration such as jobs, technology and science.

I was impressed with Goldin's emphasis that as we make policy decisions and changes that affect the economy and the environment, we need to base such decisions on data and not just intuition. And, I agree that decisions should be fortified and not hastily made because of concerns or fears.

During the hearing, I asked Goldin about ASRM at Yellow Creek. He said that the program is an issue very worthy of evaluation. He said a tremendous amount of time and money has already gone into it, and if confirmed, he will get on top of the issue promptly.

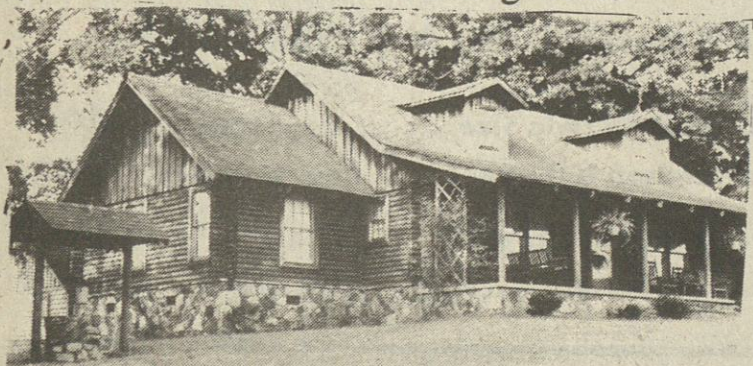
Goldin acknowledged that there was a problem with the President's budget concerning funding for ASRM, and concluded by saying, "If confirmed, will Daniel Goldin look at ASRM? You bet!"

What puzzles me is why terminate ASRM when NASA contends that it will cost millions of dollars and require three space shuttle missions, estimated at \$480 million each? Already, \$1.2 billion has been appropriated for ASRM, and the people of Mississippi are \$63 million vested in the project. Where's the fiscal responsibility?

Also, the people of the area have suffered enough from the broken faith promises of the federal government. There already is a horrible scar on the earth left by TVA for the construction of a power plant which was never completed and now, once again, nearly half-way through, it's okay to just walk away. It's a disgrace and a slap in the face of the dedication of the people of Mississippi, Alabama and Tennessee.

But beyond broken faith and more wasted money, we truly need ASRM, the next generation of rocket, to carry us into space. If NASA wants to implement the core points made by Daniel Goldin and justify itself as a benefit to our and our children's future, it needs ASRM and, beyond that, to carry through with commitments made and the development of research. Miss. Game & Fish Commission Awarded \$5 Million

The Mississippi Game & Fish Commission has been awarded \$5,019,769 in funding from the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service, according to the state's U.S. senators.

U.S. Senators Trent Lott and Thad Cochran, both R-Miss., said that the money will be used to help finance fish and wildlife programs within the state.

"These funds will help the Mississippi Game & Fish Commission to promote wildlife conservation," Lott said. "We are fortunate in Mississippi to have such plentiful game and fish resources, and it is important that we invest in them for all generations to enjoy."

\$2,418,637 will be used for wildlife restoration and hunter education (\$417,443 for hunter education). The money was awarded under the Pittman-Robertson Act.

\$2,601,132 will be used for fish restoration programs. The money was awarded under the Wallop-Breaux Act.

Mississippi will match the funds with a 20 percent share. The Game & Fish Commission will draw against the \$5,019,769 account to access the funds which are for FY 1992.
