Voice Vote Authorizes Construction Of ASRM

A spending authorization bill for NASA's Tishomingo County Advanced Solid Rocket Motor plant passed the U.S. House of Representatives recently by a voice vote.

The bill allotted \$340 million (\$260 million for development and \$80 million for construction) toward the \$520 million requested for fiscal year 1993 for the plant. The proposal also included language that would restore the full funding requested for the project in the event that the Appropriations Committee provided the full \$15.25 million funding for NASA's overall budget, according to a spokesman for Mississippi's 1st District U.S. Representative Jamie Whitten, Chairman of the committee. At present, \$14.3 billion is all that has been authorized for 1993. The bill will now go to the House Appropriations Committee.

Whitten spoke out in favor of the bill during a recent meeting of the Appropriations Committee saying that the continuation of the program in Tishomingo County is vital not only to the national space program, but also to northeast Mississippi and that it would not be "reasonable or responsible to discontinue the program."

The NASA plant is scheduled for completion by mid-1993. It will employ approximately 1,000 people and provide a \$40 million payroll, according to reports.

Many of the artist have interacted with Guild in surrounding areas.

The opening of the Gallery is the first public Gallery to be opened in Tishomingo County.

There has been several workshops hosted in the county. Mary Linville a professional artist from Florence hosted the first workshop. The essay contest, jointly sponsored by the March of Dimes and Blue Cross & Blue Shield of Mississippi, is designed to encourage teenagers to begin thinking about the responsibilities of parenthood.

Tuesday night's opening game with Hernando was rained out and was rescheduled for Wednesday in Senatobia. At press time results of the game were unavailable. Game time is set at 6:00 at the Ronnie King Field on Hwy. 25 North in Iuka.

This should be outstanding competition play as Hernando defeated Tishomingo County twice in regular district play earlier in the season.

Corinth Child Dies As Result Of Meningitis

An 8-year-old girl died Sunday, May 17, as a result of spinal meningitis while two other cases in the second grade at East Corinth Elementary School have been confirmed.

According to a spokesman for Magnolia Hospital, the cases of meningitis were diagnosed over the weekend at the hospital there and were transferred to Le Bonheur Hospital at Memphis.

Tishomingo Health Department officials reported that only those in close, regular contact with an infected person are at risk of contracting meningitis. However, the other students in the second grade at East Corinth Elementary and those children riding the same bus as the students diagnosed were treated with preventive medication.

The medication, rifampin, in a liquid form, was prepared in Jackson and flown into Corinth Tuesday. It was then distributed to those who were considered to be in contact or possible contact with the infected persons. Dr. Ed Thompson, State Epidemiologist said. The rifampin is administered twice a day for two days.

Symptoms associated with meningitis include fever, headache, stiffness of the neck, nausea, drowsiness and occasionally a bright red rash. Area Health officials warn that if these systems arise, and after attempts to alleviate them with over the counter medications such as Tylenol fail, contact your physician.

Tishomingo County Health Department nurse Edna Earl Tapp explained that the state Health Departments offer a Hib vaccine for the prevention of meningitis to children age 5 and under. The vaccine is optional and parents may want to check their child's immunization record to

see if they have received it.

Meningococcal meningitis is caused by a bacteria, Neisseria meningitidis, that is spread from one person to the next through the respiratory route from the nose and throat of infected persons, through droplets sprayed into the air by sneezing and coughing or by direct contact. About 15 percent of healthy adults and children are carriers of this strain of bacterial meningitis however, most often the disease will never surface and the person will never have any problems from it.

Home Economics Tips

THE GIFT OF GRANDPARENTING
Special joys and lifelong memories are treasured by children and older adults who have shared a positive grandparent and grandchild relationship. In today's society, this important relationship is often disrupted or nonexistent.

Separations occur due to divorce, living far away, or even feelings that grandparents should not get involved or interfere in the lives of their children's families.

Enrichment of lives of grandparents and grandchildren occurs through contact with each other. Children develop positive attitudes about aging, gain links with the past and learn much from the extensive

knowledge of their elders.

Many grandparents express comfort, satisfaction and pleasure from their grandparenting role. This role creates a sense of connection with the child and allows the grandparent to serve as a resource and feel young again. It offers emotional fulfillment and an extension into the future by involvement with children.

Encourage and work to strengthen this relationship whether the child and older person live near each other or long distances separate them. Create family bonds across generations by special times or special events.

Family customs, traditions and rituals often are a source of nourishment for everyone. They create memories and provide an atmosphere conducive to reminiscing and are of special interest to older family members. Grandparents enjoy sharing stories with the younger generation

and teaching them about days gone by.

Caring for each other and a genuine interest in each other are the two primary requirements in a grandparent-grandchild relationship. In addition, humor and appreciation are elements that bind the relationship together. Shared moments and experiences can occur either in person or by long distance via the telephone or the mail. Exchange items like special notes, pictures, family stories, audiotapes and videotapes.

Think about your family and how you can enhance a special grandparenting relationship. Give your imagination free reign. The following list of gifts for your grandchildren will get you started:

*Spend time with each grandchild individually.

*Ask them about themselves and really listen to their concerns as well as their joys.

*Send special letters, notes or audiotapes just for them, especially when nothing special is happening.

*Offer championship for activities they enjoy.

*Share your history and family traditions.

*Get the child involved in traditions by telling stories that help show the personal side of their ancestors.

*Be a role model to show grandchildren that older people can be fun and enjoy life.

Show grandchildren acceptance of who they are, as they are. Let them know that each is a wonderful and special person.

4-H Communicates

TEST TIPS

What's a necessary evil that happens at school in the state about this time of year? TESTS! There are some things you can do beginning now that can keep the evil from becoming "vile."

Do something -- don't just sit there. Get organized. Get a calendar and write down test dates and due dates for papers, reports, speeches. Get started.

Let's use tests as an example. The big biology test is two weeks from now. Which study or lab sheets will you be tested on?

To study printed material most effectively begin by reading the chapter title and then subheads, making mental questions about what the section might deal with. Read sections for main ideas.

After reading the chapter, go back and make up questions about what you've just read. Be tough on yourself -- don't just ask questions your teacher has asked on tests in the past. If you're unsure about any answers, reread that section.

Use your senses to help you learn. Read -- that uses your visual senses. Listen in class -- that employs your auditory or hearing sense. Write notes; write questions; write answers -- the tactile sense of touch. Read notes aloud; talk out answers; use vocalization to help you learn.

Research has proven that the more often you go over material in spaced intervals, the more you retain. Cramming the night before may be better than no study, but it is the least effective method.

The most effective is to start several days ahead and go over the material each day until the test. Use the last night for a brief review. Good preparation. Good preparation. Good luck!!

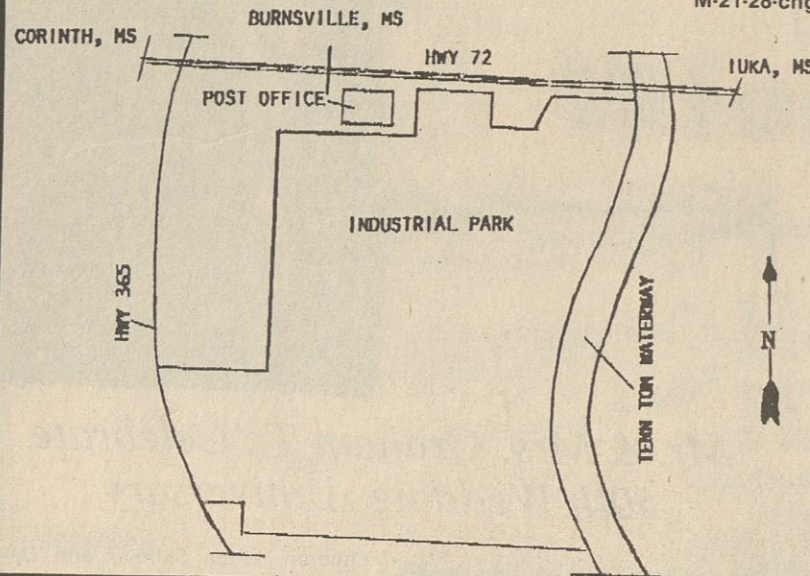

Child Find Publicity Campaign And District Confidentiality Letter

The Tishomingo County Special Municipal Separate School District is participating in an ongoing statewide effort to identify, locate, and evaluate children through the age of twenty-one who have a physical, mental, communicative and/or emotional disability. Early identification of children in need of special educational experiences is most important to each child. Furthermore, this information gathered from contacts with parents and other agencies will be used to help determine present and future program needs as progress is made toward the goal of providing a free appropriate public education to all children with a disability.

Information which could identify an individual child will be maintained by this agency and will be provided to other agencies only in accord with the Family Rights and Privacy Act and EHA-B. As a parent, you are guaranteed the right to inspect any such information about your child and to challenge its accuracy. Access to this information is forbidden to any unauthorized person without informed consent. If you have questions regarding the collection, maintenance and use of data about your child, please contact Betty Barnes, Child Fund Director for the Tishomingo County Special Municipal Separate School District by calling 438-7471 or writing to her at the following address: The Education Center, P.O. Box 98, Tishomingo, MS 38873.

The Child Find Director implements child identification, location and evaluation of children birth through twenty-one who have disabilities, regardless of the severity of their disability, and who are in need of special education and/or related services. The Child Find Director works with the local Headstart, Welfare, Health and Mental Health agencies, as well as local education agencies, physicians and other individuals to identify and locate children out of school and in school who may be in need of special education services.

Once a referral is made, it is the responsibility of the Child Find Director to insure that the Referral-to-Placement procedures are followed. The director works with Local Survey Committees at each school to implement this procedure. The following activities briefly describe the procedures.

Prior to evaluation, a copy of the Parent Information Pamphlet and Procedural Safeguards are given to

parents. District personnel explain the Parent Information Pamphlet to parents and insure that they understand the Procedural Safeguards.

After parental consent for testing is obtained, a nondiscriminatory evaluation is conducted. Students are evaluated in all areas related to the suspected disability by qualified personnel.

Parents are notified when a student is ruled eligible for a special education program. An Individual Educational Plan is developed for the student before the student is placed. Parents must sign permission for placement. Parents, teacher and students participate in this process. All students receiving special education services are reassessed at least once a year and reevaluated at least once every three years.

We now have twenty-five special education classes in our district which serve students who have physical, mental, communicative and/or emotional disabilities. It is the goal of the Tishomingo County School District to provide free appropriate education to all children with disabilities through age twenty-one by the year 2000.

Memorial Day 1992

Seventy-five thousand were herded into the dreadful procession. Only 54,000 completed the journey. Many escaped to unknown fates or eventual freedom; thousands died on the road. They were tortured, starved, and executed. To say it was brutal would be an extraordinary understatement.

Fifty years ago in April, the Bataan peninsula, a sentinel at the entrance to Manila Bay in the Philippines, fell to the Japanese. The Americans and Filipinos who had conducted a tenacious defense against four months of unyielding bombardment were now prisoners. Those who survived the infamous 70-mile Death March across Bataan, faced the cruelty, deprivation and forced labor of prison camps where hundreds more died.

Francis Agnes was a 19-year-old Army Air Corps sergeant from Everett, Washington. This is his description of the atrocities that commenced as the Japanese tanks moved in on the morning of April 9, following the surrender of the peninsula:

"They corralled us with other groups of prisoners and started us marching. Suddenly, we were thrust into a different world. The harassment started. They removed the personal items they wanted, stripped us of everything including our dignity. The less you had, the less opportunity there was for harassment...When we reached the first compound, we expected food and water. This did not happen.

The men had already lost 40% of their body weight before the march began. We started hungry. After four days of marching, I received one rice ball about the size of a teacup...During the night, we might find a stream which we could sneak water from...they made us sit for hours with that hot sun beating down...During the march, you didn't dare offer to help a buddy who had fallen. Any break in rank was an excuse to terminate your life...they would either shoot you or bayonet you. We saw many dead bodies in water holes along the way, and there were many beatings. One incident stands out: I saw a person buried alive. An American had to dig his own grave and other Americans were forced to cover him up. You couldn't resist because you knew you were as good as dead."

For Sgt. Agnes, the unthinkable trek took four days; for others, as many as 12. He was to remain a prisoner for 42 months, which included two years of forced labor in Japan. About his ordeal, he recently had this to say: "Don't take anything for granted; appreciate everything. I learned a lot about myself...I don't want to see anyone else have to endure such a thing...But I'll tell you this, if there were hostilities and any of us were called on, we still would be right there defending our country."

Every American citizen, certainly every policymaker and legislator, ought to have that statement emblazoned into their consciences. Subjected to physical harm, even death, many placed in an arena of unimaginable ruthlessness, our defenders have proudly accepted and magnificently represented the

uniform of their country. And they would do it again if they were needed.

The United States is second to no other nation on Earth in caring for our veterans. That does not mean, however, that we do everything that should be done. In recent years, efforts to help our veterans have been hampered by the attention focused on the budget deficit and on other special interests. I would say to you, however, that there is no matter of greater importance to this nation than taking care of those who have responded to aggression and preserved the peace. They should be the first and greatest beneficiaries of Freedom's gifts. Allowing this commitment to falter would necessarily diminish us all and weaken the republic.

This Memorial Day, remember not only those who have fallen on the battlefields and elsewhere in the line of duty. Think of Francis Agnes. For what he and others like him did, for what they endured and how they dealt with it, our freedom was left more than just intact, it was immeasurably reinforced.

When fall came, Johnny walked to school with tears in his eyes. Johnny was not able to read.

This is not a make-believe fable and fairy tale. It happens in classrooms across the country every day. Students who do not practice reading during the summer lose from 10 to 50 percent of their reading skills.

Don't let this happen to your child. Let the Summer Library Program be a part of Johnny's summer.

Remember, your child must have re-registered since last summer. If they have not done so, please bring them in prior to the program. This is most important, or they may have a delay in checking out books.
