South Central Bell Files To Reduce ACP Rates

South Central Bell announced today that it has filed \$11.9 million in rate reductions with the Mississippi Public Service Commission as a result of the Rate Stabilization Plan (RSP). The reductions, to be effective July 1, were part of the company's semiannual earnings report filed with the Commission.

"We are happy to be able to pass on to our customers, through these rate reductions, the benefits of efficiencies we have generated in our operations," said Kelly Allgood, South Central Bell president-Mississippi.

Rates to be reduced are identified by a schedule established when the RSP was approved in 1990. Those to be reduced July 1 include zone mileage charges for customers of the Area Calling Plan (ACP), long distance charges within South Central Bell

calling zones, "hunting" service for ACP customers, the ACP access line charge for business customers, and access charges paid by interexchange long distance carriers.

The monthly zone mileage charge will be reduced from individual line ACP customers from \$4.85 to \$2.80 for Zone 2 and from \$7.20 to \$4.05 for Zone 3. Zone 1 will remain unchanged at \$2.00 per month. This charge addresses the extra expense involved to serve customers located outside the base rate area.

"This will make service even more affordable for customers who live outside the base rate area," Allgood said. "This reduction supports our goal of universally affordable telephone service."

The long distance reductions will affect initial and additional minute rates for calls 41-392 miles within

South Central Bell calling zones. The combined effect of these reductions will be \$4.2 million.

The RSP was established to create incentives for South Central Bell to operate more efficiently, develop new products, generate additional revenues and control costs. Under the plan, customers and the company share 50-50 for earnings outside the PSC-set range of 10.74%-11.74% return on investment base. The company is to file reports every six months based upon nine months of actual and three months of forecasted data.

This was the fourth report under the RSP. Including this report, rates have been reduced by \$37.5 million since the plan began in 1990.

Law Making Seats To Be Voted On Again This Fall

Friday, June 5th - Deadline To Qualify For Election

New district lines have made it necessary for a special election to be held this fall, to fill seats in the Mississippi Senate and House of Representatives, filled temporarily during the 1991 election.

Qualifying deadline for the House and Senate Special Election is set for June 5, 1992 at 5:00 p.m., according to Tishomingo County Circuit Clerk Gerald Parsons. "Those qualifying will participate in the first primary to be held August 4, 1992," he added.

The reason for this special election is the reapportionment of the district lines as directed by the Federal Courts after the boundaries were approved by the U.S. Justice Department. Those chosen in last year's election must re-qualify and run again. Each party's state executive Committee is responsible for the election.

"Candidates may qualify through the Democratic or Republican Executive Committees in Jackson or, if in a single county district, in their individual counties," Parsons said.

The reapportionment evens out the amount of voter representation between Alcorn and Tishomingo counties, according to reports.

At present, only three candidates have qualified for the District 1 Mississippi House of Representatives seat through the Tishomingo County Circuit Clerk's office. They are Harvey Benderman, Lamar Skinner and David Yarbrough.

New districts and the precincts that include are as follows:

•4th Senatorial District-Presently represented by Travis Little, includes most of Alcorn county, approximately half of Tippah county and the following precincts in Tishomingo County: Hubbard-Salem, North luka, Cole's Mill, North Burnsville, West Burnsville, Burnsville, East luka and a split box in Midway for a total of 51,342 qualified voters.

•5th Mississippi Senatorial District-Presently represented by John White, includes portions of Prentiss County and Itawamba County plus the following precincts in

Tishomingo County: luka, West luka, East luka, Midway, Paden, West Tishomingo, Tishomingo, Dennis, North Belmont, Cotton Springs, Belmont, East Belmont and Golden for a total of 50,836 qualified voters.

•1st Mississippi House of Representatives district-Presently represented by Harvey Benderman, includes four precincts and one split box in Alcorn County and Tishomingo County precincts including: Hubbard-Salem, North luka, luka, West luka, Cole's Mill, North Burnsville, West Burnsville, Burnsville, East luka and a split box in Midway for a total of 20,061 qualified voters.

•19th Mississippi House of Representatives district-Presently represented by Bill Wheeler, includes portions of Lee and Itawamba Counties with precincts in Tishomingo County including Paden, West Tishomingo, Tishomingo, Dennis, North Belmont, Cotton Springs, Belmont, East Belmont and Golden for a total of 20,153 qualified voters.


School near luka. She was a member of the Belmont United Methodist Church and a former member of the D.A.R.

Rodney Alexander Wins Scholarship Award





work for the Company during the summer while attending college. Rodney is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy William Alexander of Tishomingo.





The Pediatrician's Corner

Infant Sleep Position Is Linked To SIDS Risk

The American Academy of Pediatrics has made a new recommendation concerning infant positioning and sudden infant death syndrome (SIDS). The academy has recommended that all healthy infants be placed on their sides or backs when they are put down to sleep. This new recommendation questions the United States tradition of placing babies on their stomachs. While there is no data regarding how the stomach position evolved as the standard in this country, it is a practice that doctors have tended to advise based upon the assumption that it would reduce the possibility of choking. The AAP reviewed multiple studies from around the world that showed significantly increased incidents of SIDS among infants who sleep on their stomachs. No data studied showed on advantage to the stomach position in reducing the incidents of SIDS. There also were no reports that proved sleeping on the back or side position is harmful to the normal infants.

Sleeping on the stomach does not cause SIDS. The risk of SIDS for an infant placed on the stomach position is extremely low, but it is even lower when the infant is placed on the side or back. If a baby was born at term and has no complications, perhaps the best way to put them down to sleep is on their backs or sides. If a baby is more comfortable on their stomach, then that is all right too. The parents should make an effort to see what position works best for their baby.

There will be many 2 to 3 month old babies who have slept on their stomachs and will not tolerate sleeping on their backs or sides but if it isn't working they should allow the infant to sleep on their stomachs comfortably.

It would be wrong for parents to feel that they should keep checking on their babies throughout the night, they should put them down to sleep on their backs or side and leave them to sleep. Six to seven thousand babies die of SIDS in this country every year. Many doctors and researchers are trying to find a way to reduce this number. Millions, if not billions, of babies sleep on their backs throughout the world. We are clearly in the minority in the United States putting our infants on their stomachs for sleep. There is no data to support this United States tradition, it has just evolved over time.

There are still good reasons for placing certain infants on their stomachs for sleep. For premature infants with respiratory distress, for infants with symptoms of gastroesophageal reflux, or with certain upper airway anomalies, and perhaps for some other reason the stomach position may be the best. The proposed change in position is for healthy, sleeping, infants only.

completing a brief study of volcanoes when Tim Harp, a resident of Washington, visited the class. He lives near Mount Helens.



4-H Communicates

DAIRY MONTH:
An excellent time to increase calcium June is dairy month. It's a time when we can best salute the dairy industry by taking advantage of some of the month's specials on dairy products.

Increasing calcium intake is especially important for teens, because it's a time when adequate calcium can provide the best protection against future bone problems such as osteoporosis. After the teen years, it's getting too late to affect the body's bone structure.

During the teen years, there are often dramatic skeletal growth spurts, and the bones are significantly increasing in length. This growth spurt is most evident in females age 11 to 15 and males age 12 to 17. If adequate milk is consumed, bone density and growth will increase.

After the teen years, bone density can continue to increase (until about age 35), but at a much slower rate than during teen years. At age 40, your bones will start to become thinner as a normal part of the aging process.

Unfortunately, many teens consume calcium at levels well below the Recommended Dairy Allowance. In fact, studies show that as calcium (milk) intake declines, the consumption of soft drinks and alcohol, especially beer, has steadily increased for this age group.

Half of the teen girls in the United States consume less than 70 percent of the calcium they need, and one-third of the boys consume less than 70 percent of the calcium they need.

Continued studies show that postmenopausal women who had an adequate amount of calcium during adolescence exhibited higher bone density and were less likely to develop osteoporosis than postmenopausal women whose calcium intake was inadequate during the teen years.

The recommended intake of calcium for teens is 1,200 milligrams, which equals four or more servings daily. Foods rich in calcium, but low in fat include lowfat cheese; collard greens; cream soups; ice milk or reduced fat ice cream; macaroni and cheese; lowfat milk; cheese pizza; pudding made from lowfat milk; salmon, sardines or mackerel with bones; tacos; tofu; and lowfat yogurt.

Research further shows that a daily intake of 1,500 milligrams (or five servings) can help teens achieve the optimal peak bone mass.

Let this dairy month celebration mark a time for change, for the better, with your eating habits.

Home Economics Tips

How To Remove Musty Odors
Musty odors indicating mold growth may be a problem in basements, shower stalls or any damp, warm, poorly-aired and poorly-lighted area.

Give special attention to remove the odor as soon as it is detected. Not only should your house be rid of offensive odors, but prompt attention will most likely prevent damaging mold growth. Sometimes musty odors will disappear if the area is well heated and dried, or if it can be cleaned, aired and fumigated.

Eliminate musty odors from concrete floors, tiled walls and floors by scrubbing with a diluted solution of chlorine bleach (1/2 to 1 cup of liquid household bleach to a gallon of water).

Rinse with clean water and wipe as dry as possible. Keep all doors open while the area dries. Wear waterproof gloves to protect skin when cleaning. Be very careful with plastic and asphalt tile to avoid spotting the surface.

In crawl spaces under the house, a light coating of chlorinated lime will usually remove musty odors. Use extreme care when handling this chemical. Wear protective gloves, eye wear and a respirator when working with this substance.

Household products that are effective in absorbing odors are baking soda, talcum powder, silica gel, charcoal, disinfectants, bleaching powders, washing soda, rubbing or denatured alcohol and moth crystals. Using vinegar rinse water in cleaning or washing articles is also effective in controlling odor.

Should You Make Your Own Home Repairs

Owning a home has long been an American dream. For most families, buying a home represents their most significant lifetime investment. People know well the initial cost of a house, but many are not aware of the continuing cost of maintaining and repairing it. As costs of materials and labor increase, more home owners are assuming the role of "handyman."

The chief reasons for making home repairs are to maintain and improve the condition of the building to prevent it from deteriorating and losing its value. Houses grow old. Their parts and materials wear out with use and time. Hidden damage or decay can become a serious problem. The parts of a house depend on and affect each other.

Examine your house once a year. Know the condition of the materials on or under the surface. Make a plan. Do not make repairs piecemeal.

After you have examined your house, decide whether you will make the repairs yourself or call a professional. Can You Do It Yourself?

To decide whether you should make the repair yourself or hire an expert, ask yourself these questions: What type repair must be made and

how extensive is the job?

Do you know how to do the job well or can you learn? Base your planning on your own abilities, not those of people you know.

Is there someone you can pay for advice if you become stumped? Avoid the cost of having to repeat the same repair because you did a poor job or used faulty materials.

Are reputable repairment available? How are their prices?

Will the repair require more materials than labor or more labor than materials? Remember, you must pay for the materials whether you do it yourself or not.

Are standard types of materials required? Can you buy the materials in your area with no problem?

How much will you save if you do the work yourself? How important is the amount of money you could save compared to your time? The cost may not compare to the difficulty of the job, but price will help you set the upper limits beyond which you may not wish to risk your money and time.

How much time will it take? Do not begin a repair unless you have time to do it right.

Once you begin a repair and invest your time and money, do not expect a professional to come in and finish the job for substantially less than what he or she would have originally charged.

Odom Wins Scholarship

District 1 winner was Michael Jason Odom of Tishomingo County Magnet High School. Michael is the son of Tommy and Sandra Odom of Burnsville.

Seventy-five Mississippi high school seniors have been awarded Robert C. Byrd Honors Scholarships in the fourth year of this national scholarship program.

SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION:

The Federal Emergency Management Agency gives notice of the proposed determinations of base (100-year) flood elevations, in accordance with Section 110 of the Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973 (Pub. L. 93-234), 87 Stat. 980, which added Section 1363 to the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968 (Title XIII) of the Housing and Urban Development Act of 1968 (Pub. L. 90-448), 42 U.S.C. 4001-4128, and 44 CFR Part 67.4 (a).

These elevations, together with the floodplain management measures required by Section 60.3 of the program regulations, are the minimum that are required. They should not be construed to mean the community must change any existing ordinances that are more stringent in their floodplain management requirements. The community may at any time enact stricter requirements on its own, or pursuant to policies established by other Federal, State, or Regional entities. These proposed elevation will also be used to calculate the appropriate flood insurance premium rates for new buildings and their contents and for the second layer of insurance on existing buildings and their contents.

Pursuant to the provisions of 5 USC 605 (b), the Administrator, to whom authority has been delegated by the Director, Federal Emergency Management Agency, hereby certifies that the proposed flood elevation determinations, if promulgated, will not have a significant economic impact on a substantial number of small entities. A flood elevation determination under Section 1363 forms the basis for new local ordinances, which, if adopted by a local community, will govern future construction within the floodplain area. The elevation determinations, however, impose no restriction unless and until the local community voluntarily adopts flood-

plain ordinances in accord with these elevations. Even if ordinances are adopted in compliance with Federal standards, the elevations prescribe how high to build in the floodplain and do not prohibit development. Thus, this action only forms the basis for future local actions. It imposes no new requirement; of itself it has no economic impact.


