Unemployment In County Drops In Mid-April

According to Charles Smith, Manager of the Mississippi State Employment Service, unemployment in Tishomingo County dropped to mid-April to 8.8 percent. This compares to 10.9 percent in March and 11.8 percent in April, 1991.

The civilian labor force for the county numbered 8,090, 50 more than the previous month, and 350 more than April, 1991. Approximately 7,380 Tishomingo County residents held jobs at mid-April while 710 were out of work.

Manufacturing jobs in the county numbered 3,250, 60 more than March, and 440 more than April, 1991. Non-manufacturing jobs in the county numbered 3,530, approximately the same as March, but 220 more than April of last year.

W.E. "Will" Cresap, 73, died Tuesday, June 2, 1992 at the Iuka Hospital. He was a Methodist.

Property Purchased For New Hospital

The purchase of 11 acres of property by Tishomingo Health Services in mid-May brings Tishomingo County residents one step closer to the construction of a new, modern medical facility in Iuka.

The property is located at the intersection of Highway 25 South and Curtis Drive on the west side of Iuka at the entrance to Independence Square Subdivision, about one mile from the present hospital site. The new 41,000-square-foot hospital will include 40 private hospital rooms dedicated to general acute care, and eight beds designated for an Intensive Care Unit.

The new Iuka Hospital will be constructed with funds from a \$2.6 million Mississippi Major Economic Impact Authority Grant coupled with \$3.2 million from North Mississippi Health Service, Inc., the parent company of North Mississippi Medical Center, a 650-bed regional referral center in Tupelo in Lee County.

"The Iuka Hospital will be a model facility offering a wide range of services close to home for Tishomingo area residents and immediate access to a full range of subspecialty medical services at North Mississippi Medical Center," said NMMC President John D. Hicks.

The new Iuka Hospital will be owned by Tishomingo Health Services, a subsidiary of North Mississippi Health Services. NMHS will continue to operate the existing Iuka Hospital until the completion of the new facility, a project that should be completed in about 15 months. NMMC Vice President Glendon Spigner said a groundbreaking ceremony will be held in late summer with construction scheduled to begin immediately afterward.

"The community is excited about the new hospital, that it's about to happen," said Bill Rutledge, administrator of Iuka Hospital. "Buying the property is the first step toward actually having a new physical facility, and the employees and county residents are certainly ready for that. The morale is high here at the hospital and in the community."

NMMC's affiliation with the current Iuka Hospital began in 1987. NMHS has five other affiliate hospitals and a nursing home facility. The goal of the Affiliated Hospital System is to strengthen health care in rural areas and to provide healthcare in a comprehensive regional manner, Spigner said.

New Magnet High School Has Successful First Year

14 Candidates Qualify For August 4th Primary

A total of 14 candidates will vie for state legislative seats to be voted on by Tishomingo Countians during the first primary this fall.

Party primaries will be August 4 with runoffs on August 25. The general election is slated for November 3, 1992, according to election officials.

Those who qualified to run for the District 1 Mississippi House of Representatives seat are Harvey Benderman (D) of Corinth, incumbent; Lamar Skinner (D) of Burnsville; David Yarbrough (D) of Iuka; Richard O. Dobbs (D) of Iuka; and J.R. Long (R) of Iuka.

Qualifying to run in District 19 for the Mississippi House of Representatives seat are Bill Wheeler (D) of Belmont, incumbent; Guyton Hinds (D) of Mantachie and Donald Deaton (R) of Belmont.

Senatorial candidates who have qualified to compete in the District 4 are Travis Little (D) of Corinth, incumbent; and Jo Ann Biggers, (Independent) of Corinth.

Qualifying to run in District 5 for the Mississippi Senatorial seat are John White (D) of Baldwin, incumbent; William McCrary (R) of Baldwin; Mark A. Hatfield (R) of Booneville; and Perry D. Rather (D) of Fulton.

This special election will fill the positions that were temporarily filled during the 1991 election. Those elected this fall will serve three years.


Vocational Education Works!

Home Economics Tips

PACKING BAGS FOR VACATION
The weeks between Memorial Day and Labor Day represent the time when most families take vacations. Successful trips start with careful planning, especially when it comes to packing.

Start by making a day-by-day list of activities you will be doing and plan clothes accordingly. Study the climate of various areas you will travel. Plan around outfits that can be mixed and matched so that you will not have to take as many items on the trip.

Easy-care garments (such as wash and drip dry synthetics) are great choices because they can be hand-washed in the hotel room or a nearby coin-operated laundry. Prints and darker neutrals work well because they hide soils and wrinkles.

Include clothes that can perform double duty like a blouse that can become a jacket, socks that can double as slippers, or a shirt/dress that can be used as a coat. Plan for weather extremes. Lightweight tops can get you through heatwaves, but long sleeves are needed for when the temperature drops.

A few carefully planned accessories can dress-up casual coordi-

ates. Leave valuable jewelry at home at a safety deposit box. Many hotels also have safes where valuables can be checked.

Carry only your most comfortable shoes because aching feet can spoil any trip. Consider a big enough handbag for carrying extra shoes, sweaters, umbrellas, toilet articles and camera for daily jaunts.

When selecting the right suitcase to take, remember that larger ones require little, if any, folding. In packing hanging bags, you can hang two or three shirts or blouses with jackets, and pants and skirts on the same hanger.

Lightweight portable luggage carts and suitcases with built-in wheels can help protect your back. If traveling by public carrier, remove all prior routing tags to avoid confusion in routing your luggage.

The following tips can help you during the actual packing process: Make a list as you pack and carry it along in your purse or pocket in case your luggage is lost.

Do not pack valuables or medication; carry these with you instead.

Place heavy items (such as travel iron, shoes) on the bottom. Place crushable items in the middle and easy wrinkling items on top.

Plastic cleaner bags are great for wrinkle resistance.

Carry extra hangers. Hotels provide them, but it's usually not enough.

Lay pant tops, dress bodices and

skirt tops with the lower portions hanging over the edge. Place folded clothes on top, then fold the over-the-edge portions over. Alternate the directions of necklines and bottoms as you layer blouses, skirts and jackets.

Pack sleepwear on top so that it can be removed without disturbing the other items.

Plastic re-closable bags are wonderful aids for organizing items such as shoes, make-up and snacks. Tissue paper stuffed in shoes can help them hold their shape.

Prevent damage to leather belts by lying them around the edge of the packed items.

Pack sample-size toiletries. Small plastic salt shakers are ideal for body powder and film canisters are great make-up holders or containers for emergency sewing or mending.

Masking tape makes a great lint brush. It also can be used to prevent leaking.

Be sure to take along basic first-aid supplies.

TAKING THE FEAR OUT OF SNAKE SIGHTINGS

Yes, it's that time of year. Sightings of snakes will soon be frequent, and undoubtedly, each snake seen will be bigger than the one before.

As our Tishomingo County young people head outdoors for summer activities, they need to know which snakes are best avoided.

Snake bites are common in the United States and in the South, but these bites are seldom fatal.

Michael Hughes, managing director of the Mississippi Regional Poison Control Center at the University of Mississippi Medical Center in Jackson, said about 30,000 snake bites are reported nationwide each year. About 7,000 to 8,000 of those bites are venomous (poisonous) snakes, but fewer than 15 people die from snake bites each year.

People who die from snake bites usually fail to seek medical treatment. Hughes said that there are antivenins for all poisonous snakes in Mississippi, and some bites, even from poisonous snakes, do not require antivenins.

Four types of poisonous snakes can be found in Mississippi: copperheads, cottonmouths (water moccasins) rattlesnakes and coral snakes.

Of the many types of water snakes, only the cottonmouth, also known as the water moccasin, is poisonous. This snake is recognized by its triangular-shaped head and snow white mouth.

Rattlesnake are recognized by rattles on their tail, and their triangular-shaped head. Copperheads, true to their name, have a copper-colored, triangular head. The coral snake is the only poisonous snake in Mississippi not recognized by the triangular-shaped head.

Coral snakes have a round head, and are recognized by their colorful bands of red, yellow and black. One way to remember how to identify coral snakes is "red on yellow, kill a fellow; red on black, is a friend Jack." If the bands of Yellow and red are next to each other, it's a coral snake.

Snakes, even the poisonous ones, are beneficial to humans. They prey on insects and rodents. Cohen said snakes are not aggressive by nature and will usually try to run first, but if cornered, they can become aggressive or defensive.

Hughes said even if a poisonous snake bites, it doesn't mean the vic-


Water Aerobics To Be Offered At NEMCC

SIGNS OF DYSLEXIA

If you know of a child who has dyslexia, one of the things he has in common with other children who have this problem is poor reading ability. This can be true in spite of good intelligence, supportive parents, and strong motivation. If a child has dyslexia he may find it difficult to understand what others see or hear or be able to distinguish one letter or word from another. Words and letters confuse them. They confuse b with d, saw with was, the 12 with 21, etc. When they try to draw geometric figures, squares become rounded, oblique lines become vertical or horizontal or vice versa. Sometimes the frustrations in learning cause serious emotional problems.

These are just some of the problems associated with dyslexia. It is a serious handicap and no one knows exactly what causes it. Fortunately the majority of children are born without this problem. If they have difficulty in learning how to read because of a vision problem, help is available from your eye doctor to correct it.



INSECT & DISEASE CONTROL

Beware of insect and disease problems in around your home and garden. I've seen one case of tomato spotted wilt virus which is one of the most serious diseases of tomatoes. Blossom rot has been reported in squash, pepper, and tomato. Disease become more of a problem during moist humid conditions. The recent wet weather could cause problems.

Aphids (plant lice) are building up in high numbers. These insects feed on many different plants and can cause severe damage. 
CARPENTER BEES

Carpenter bees continue to pose problems for homeowners in Tishomingo County. These insects make tunnels in soft wood around homes, garages and barns. They use these tunnels as sites to raise young bees.

Control the bees with insecticide dusts or sprays. Treat holes with an approved insecticide and leave them open for 24 hours. The holes can then be sealed with wood putty or a dowel.

County School Board Meets

A new Assistant Superintendent, the addition of computers, and changes in the athletic departments of the county's school were all topics addressed during the Tishomingo County School Board meeting Monday night.

Stanley Magill, Curriculum Coordinator with the Tishomingo County Special Municipal Separate School District, was approved by the Board for the position of Assistant Superintendent of Education.

The position of Assistant Superintendent will include the duties currently covered by the Curriculum Coordinator job description, as well as several new responsibilities, according to Tishomingo County Superintendent of Education Bob Ferguson.

"One additional responsibility will be to keep a check on the school's transportation systems," Ferguson said.

Magill has been Curriculum Coordinator in the Tishomingo County School System since 1988.

The Board also okayed the placement of computers in Burnsville and Tishomingo Elementary Schools.

Money, in the form of a grant from the Appalachian Regional Commission, will be used to install computer assisted instruction at Burnsville Elementary School's Kindergarten and first grade. The "Write to Read" program is nationally renowned for it's success among this age group, according to Ferguson.

A Chapter one grant will apply toward the Tishomingo Elementary computer installation.

Athletics was another topic which brought action at the Monday night meeting.

Jeff Vanderheiden was approved as Basketball Coach for Belmont High School. Vanderheiden will take the boys team, while Coach Kuykendall coaches the Lady Cardinals.

Discussions of the position of head Basketball Coach at Tishomingo County Magnet High School were also addressed during the meeting. One applicant was approved during the meeting, however no one had been hired at press time.

USDA Announces Signup Dates, Details For Pilot Program

ASCS Administrator Keith Bjerke today announced that landowners in nine states may submit bids on a volunteer basis to place eligible land in the pilot Wetlands Reserve Program (WRP) during a June signup period.

Owners of land accepted into the program must grant permanent easements to ASCS and no longer farm the land.

"The Wetlands Reserve Program is one of the most important environmental provisions of the 1990 Farm Act," Bjerke said. "The program will go a long way toward restoring the hydrology and wildlife habitat of America's natural resource base."

The Congress appropriated approximately \$46 million to provide for acceptance of up to 50,000 acres into WRP during Fiscal Year 1992 and recommend that the WRP be conducted initially as a pilot program.

The signup dates for participation in the pilot program, by states, are: June 1-26, Iowa, and June 15-26, California, Louisiana, Minnesota, Mississippi, Missouri, New York, North Carolina and Wisconsin. The June 15-26 dates are the same as for the Conservation Reserve Program 12th signup period.

On February 6 Secretary of Agriculture Edward Madigan announced a WRP pilot program for eight states. Wisconsin has been added as the ninth pilot state.

The President's budget recommends that the program be offered nationwide for Fiscal Year 1993. The WRP's goal is to enroll one million acres by the end of 1995.

Program participants can receive payments for cost-share assistance for eligible practices, will be paid for the purchase of the easement, and will also be reimbursed for certain fair and reasonable legal expenses. Cost-share assistance for installation of required practices on permanent easement is limited to 75 percent of the owner's out-of-pocket costs. Landowners who grant permanent easements have the option of taking the total easement payment after completion of the required practices

or equal annual payment installments over a 10-year period. Owners granting a permanent easement are not subject to a payment limitation with respect to the amount of easement payments received.

Easement payments will compensate owners for retiring eligible land from crop production. The cost-share payments will partially reimburse farmers for the one-time costs of restoration and establishment of permanent cover.

For landowners electing not to receive a lump sum, payments for an easement will begin as soon as an acceptable easement is filed; the remainder will be paid in equal amounts annually for the 10-year period.

Landowners electing the lump sum will be paid one-tenth of the amount due as soon as an acceptable easement is filed with the remainder being paid at the time the required restoration has been completed.

Owners who violate the terms of their easement are subject to judicial action and are liable for costs to establish practices to protect the easement area.

Landowners in the nine states interested in participating in the pilot WRP should contact their ASCS county office during the specified signup period.

Other USDA agencies and the Department of the Interior's Fish and Wildlife Service will provide technical assistance to landowners. The Soil Conservation Service will develop a wetlands reserve plan of operation and Forest Service representatives will assist when tree planting is required. The Extension Service will provide information and education efforts.

Also State and local organizations and agencies will lend assistance. State wildlife and conservation organizations may manage easement areas at the landowner's request, he said. All restoration plans will be approved by local conservation districts.

April Unemployment Drops

Mississippi's jobless rate plummeted by nearly a full point in April to stand at 7.3 percent, according to figures released by Mississippi Employment Security Commission. This compares to 8.1 percent in March 8.3 percent one year ago. There were 1,064,800 people employed and 83,600 unemployed to produce a labor force of 1,148,400.

The labor force stands at 11,400 below last month and 41,600 below one year ago. This represents a loss of 700 employed from one month ago and 26,000 from April 1991. The number of people who were unemployed decreased 10,700 from one month ago and 15,400 from one year ago.

MESC labor market analyst Ralford Crews said, "The labor force continues to be smaller because of smaller numbers of self-employed and unpaid family workers and domestics. Also, dual job holders, discouraged workers, and fewer younger workers coming into the labor market contributed to the smaller labor force."

"Establishment based jobs continued to grow," Crews said. "There are 3,300 more establishment based jobs than one month ago and 10,900 more than in April 1991." He further noted that the increase continues in manufacturing which is up 1,400 from one month ago and 6,000 from one year ago. During the same period, non-manufacturing posted 1,900 and 5,000 gains respectively.

When you consider manufacturing, you find only one sector which lost employment from one month ago and one year ago. This was primary and fabricated metals, which lost 300 jobs from March and 1,700 from April 1991. Only three other sectors registered losses from March, they were lumber and wood (-400), food (-600), and paper (-100). From one year ago only electronic manufacturing (-300) registered losses in addition to the one sector which had losses during both periods.

In non-manufacturing the only job losses from March were mining (-100) and government (-600). From one year ago only mining (-600) and transportation and public utilities (-1200) showed losses. All other sectors registered gains with wholesale and retail trade posting the largest increase, 1,400 from March and 3,300 from April 1991.

Another good sign for the economy was the fact that there was a decrease in continued unemployment claims. Continued claims were down 5,987, or 19.1 percent, from March and down 2,546, or 9.2 percent, from April of last year.

"If this trend continues through the next few weeks, the date indicates the back of the recession may have been broken during the last few months," Crews said. "With more jobs added each passing month, the only questions remaining are what effects that election year politics and military and space downsizing will have on Mississippi's economy."

ETERNITY

The rational mind can understand that there is such a thing as infinity. There is no end to how high a person can count. One cannot imagine that at some point in the past there was nothing, because if there was nothing, there would still be nothing. Nothing can come from nothing. Something has always been, and that something is eternal.

By far, that realm of study by which man deals with eternity is religion. Other areas of study, like math, might help one understand eternity better, but not to deal with it better. Jesus certainly addressed the subject. "And these will go away into everlasting punishment, but the righteous into eternal life." (Matt. 25:46)

Jesus promised a judgment. Of the billions of souls who have lived each will be sentenced to either eternal life in heaven or to eternal punishment in hell. (II Thess. 1:7-9.) If Jesus spoke the truth, and He did, the instructions He gave in getting to heaven are extremely important.

The worst thing about hell will be that it will never end. Punishment and bad experiences in this world come to a close. Even when a person suffers from a painful terminal disease, folks often say "It's best that he's gone, he suffered so." Jesus described hell as the place where "their worm does not die and the fire is not quenched." (Mk. 9:44-48) Even after a soul has been there for a hundred billion years, he will be no closer to the end than when he started. There will be no end.

People sometimes complain about the Biblical description of hell. Some say that surely hell is figurative. But the same Bible that tells about Jesus' resurrection and heaven also tells of the doom of the lost.

The first step in preparing for eternity is to obey the gospel and become a Christian. This step involves confessing one's faith in Christ (Rom. 10:10); repenting of one's sins (Acts 2:38;3:19); and being baptized for forgiveness of sins (Acts 2:38; 22:16).

The second step involves living a life according to the Lord's teachings. (Matt. 28:20)
