Investigation Continues Into Shooting By Officer

A Marietta man was hospitalized in Memphis Tuesday, June 30, after being wounded by a Tishomingo County constable.

The Mississippi Highway Patrol Criminal Investigation Bureau, upon request of Tishomingo County Sheriff Johnny Nunley, is assisting in the investigation of the shooting.

According to CIB Director Joey Ounce, Constable Joe Moyers was responding to complaints of drinking and disorderly activity in a campground on the Tenn-Tom Waterway. The area is located about two miles north of the NASA facility at the area

Anthony R. Webb, 30, received buckshot wounds while being arrested for public drunkenness and possession of beer. Tonya Lea South, 23, and Tracy D. South, 27, both of Booneville, were charged along with Webb and also an unidentified juvenile, reports indicated.

Webb was transported to North Mississippi Medical Center at Tupelo and later transferred to a Memphis Hospital. At last report, he was listed in stable condition.

State Highway Commission States Resurfacing Plans

A stretch of Mississippi Highway 25 approximately 11.24 miles long is on the State Highway Commission's agenda for resurfacing this summer.

According to Paul Swindle of the State Highway Department bids are being taken for milling and overlaying a strip of Highway 25 between Tishomingo and Iuka. The overlaying will be one and a half inches thick.

"Although we are just accepting bids at this time, the project should be beginning in mid to late August," according to Swindle. He explained that the completion date for the project should be near the end of October or maybe earlier according to weather conditions.

As a part of the project, the shoulders of the highway will be graded to match the resurfacing and the lines will be re-striped.

The section of Hwy. 25 to receive the face-lift is a part of the State Highway Department's three-year program of highway maintenance. Swindle explained that his department draws up a three year plan according to need and based on a normal maintenance schedule. The Hwy. 25 section will be resurfaced as a part of this plan and also based on observations by the Highway Department.

Bids are being taken for the milling and overlaying beginning this week.

Third Annual Waterway Festival In Burnsville

The Burnsville Area Chamber of Commerce is hosting its third annual Waterway Festival Friday, July 10 and Saturday, July 11 on the Burnsville School campus on Highway 72.

The event is being held in conjunction with the annual Antique Car Show put on by the Wheels of Northeast Mississippi Car Club.

Beginning at 6:30 p.m. Fri. the Waterway Festival Queen Pageant will be held. Girls ages two through eighteen will be vying for the title of Waterway Festival Queen. On Saturday, beginning at 8:00 a.m., will be a 5-K Run. Registration/Package pick-up will be between 6:45 a.m. to 7:45 p.m. Entry fee is \$10.00. Trophies will be awarded to men and women for the first three places in the following age divisions: 0-14; 15-19; 20-29; 30-39; 40-49; 50-59 and 60 and over. Trophies will be given to overall winners for first, second and third places for male and female. No duplications of trophies. All entrants will receive tee shirts. There will also be post-race refreshments; splits called each mile and water station on the course. The course is flat and everyone is invited to come out and set a new personal record.

Registration for the car show will be from 8:00 a.m. until 12 noon at the parking lot of Burnsville School. There will be 45 class divisions with special trophies. Other attractions during the show will be entertainment by Charlie Kyle and the band Misbehavior. Concessions will also be available. There will be a 50/50 pot given away also.

From 9:00 a.m. till 12 noon, there will be a Mobile Unit set up at First American National Bank, sponsored by Segars Clinic in Iuka, for the screening of blood pressure, glucose and cholesterol.

Entertainment and lots of music will be ongoing during the day Saturday and will include several local youngsters. Groups performing include the Show Stoppers 1, 2 and 3; Nightriders and Grace Bible Praise, just to name a few.

Officials Attempt To Clean-up Roadside Park

The Sheriff's Department's recent surveillance of the park has led to 15 arrests. The aim of the Department is to return the park to a safe environment for families to use.

Recent undercover investigations at a Tishomingo County roadside park near the Tennessee State Line has led to the arrest and conviction of 13 men from Tennessee and Mississippi with two others awaiting trial.

According to Tishomingo County Sheriff Johnny Nunley, the roadside park, located approximately one and a half miles from the Tennessee State Line on Highway 25, had become filled with men soliciting sex. "Travelers and others stopping at the park to picnic or fish could not do so without being harassed or propositioned. We had received numerous complaints so, we began the undercover operation that led to the arrests," Nunley said.

Nunley went on to explain that the park had become run-down and was badly in need of repairs. "We wanted to clean up the park for families to use once again so we contacted the Mississippi State Highway Department who have come in and painted over the lewd graffiti on the bathroom walls and also did a general clean-up of the park," Nunley said. Two garbage dumpsters that were located at the entrance of the roadside park were also removed.

Nunley stated that the arrests were made over the last three weeks. The latest arrest of a 79-year-old male was made Tuesday morning while a representative of the News was at the scene. Fines collected from the men arrested ranged from \$422 to \$627.

Among those arrested during the three-week long undercover monitoring of the park and later convicted in the Justice Court of Tishomingo County by Judges Willie Joe Sparks and James Ray Blakney were:

- Hubbard C. King, 36, Memphis, Tenn., solicitation and loitering.

The Mississippi Code section 973537, sub-section A and B (Mississippi Code Annotated, 1972) defines the charge of loitering as "Persons wandering or strolling about in idleness, persons leading an idle, immoral or profligate life. The charge of solicitation is defined, under Mississippi Code 97-29-49 (in the same publication) by saying that it is unlawful to reside in, enter or remain in any place, structure, or building for the purpose of lewdness, assignation or prostitution. "This includes verbal contact, insinuation or proposition, Nunley confirmed.

Nunley stated that there will be continued surveillance in the park to maintain a clean and safe environment.

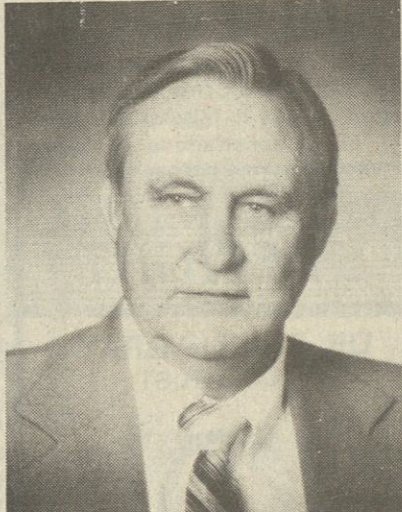

County Agents Notes

FIRE ANT CONTROL

I have received several calls concerning the best fire ant control. We now have a new publication that gives may control options. Call the Extension office if you would like one of these publications (423-7016).

TOMATO DISEASES

Tomato diseases are becoming a serious problem here in the county this year. The most common and the most serious seems to be "spotted wilt virus". This disease has many symptoms because the virus has several strains but the most typical symptoms are small, dark spots appear on the leaves around the top of the plant. These leaves may curl up and later die back. Plants may produce fruit that are small and unsightly or produce no fruit at all. The fruit may develop irregular yellow blotches that have a "ringspot" appearance.

Control is difficult. The disease is mainly transmitted by insects called "thrips". A fungicide will not control this disease but these insects can be controlled by spraying with "malathion" or "Cygon" on a regular basis. It is recommended that you pull up infected plants and get rid of them. The disease is not in the soil so you can replant. The disease overwinters and survives in weeds. Removing the weeds around the garden is recommended but is limited in value because thrips are small and can be blown by the wind for great distances. Using a shiny mulch (aluminum foil or plastic sprayed with aluminum paint) can be helpful. Research shows that thrips have a hard time locating the plants because of the light reflection.

It is a good idea to include a fungicide with the insecticide for the prevention of other diseases because weather conditions thus far have been excellent for disease development. A good spray schedule is essential.

STATE MEETING AT MSU

Five residents of Tishomingo County attended the recent state meeting of the Mississippi Extension Homemakers Council at Mississippi State University. During the three-day meeting, voting delegates agreed to join their national organization in changing their name to the Association for Family and Community Education, Inc.

"We hope that the new name of the organization will more accurately reflect the overall mission of family and community education," said Jean Starkey, one of the delegates.

The Mississippi Association for Family and Community Education has 8,200 members statewide and 160 in Tishomingo County. About 600 members from 79 counties attended the annual state meeting.

The Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service serves as the primary educational resource for family and community education clubs. In turn, the club members serve as a volunteer extension of MCES in reaching a larger population of the community with educational material.

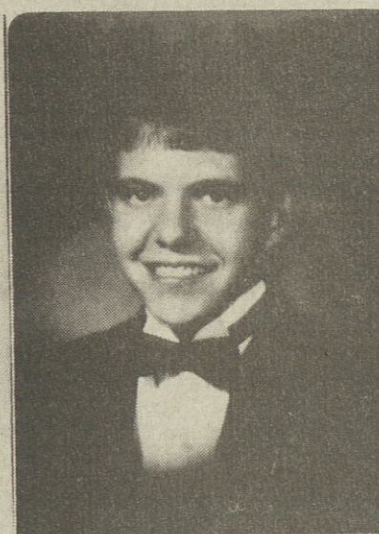
Northeast's freshman orientation program is designed especially to assist each student into making a smooth transition into college life.

A Victory For Property Owners

The Supreme Court has demonstrated the power of its gavel with a recent ruling in the Lucas v. South Carolina Coastal Council case. This landmark decision will have immediate impact on how the courts deal with private property rights in Mississippi and across this nation.

The case evolved when a gentleman by the name of David Lucas spent \$975,000 in 1986 for two beachfront residential lots on the Isle of Palms, S.C. His intentions where to build two single family housing units on the land.

However, in 1988, the S.C. Legislature ruled that under the new enacted Beachfront Management Act that Lucas could not develop the land because of coastal zoning laws.

The Supreme Court ruled that states must show clear reasons why their laws can prohibit property owners from using their land.

I was very pleased to see this ruling because there has been a steady erosion over the past years of property rights and a lack of compensation for land use restrictions. For the first time in a long time the courts have said that people owning property should be compensated by the government if their right to use their land is taken.

Now it's a well known fact that the laws of eminent domain include monetary compensation. But, it has been unclear about who has to be paid if the government tells you not to use your land without buying it, and that is why this decision is important.

I grew up enjoying the natural beauty of Mississippi's woods and beaches, and I do believe that we need to protect our pristine wetlands forest and shores. But, when we tell a property owner that he can't build a business or house on his or her land to protect it from development, then that individual must be compensated.

Perhaps the land in question in the Lucas case should be protected. I'm not sure, never having seen the lots. But, if they are deemed "restricted" then Lucas should be recompensed.

Although the Lucas decision is narrow, it is a step in the right direction. Private property rights are a very important part of the Constitution, and I think that land owners should be allowed to use their property as they see fit or else be justly compensated. (7/6/92)

Commodity Distribution Schedule

The Tishomingo County Department of Human Services will distribute surplus commodities to eligible recipients on Tuesday, July 21, 1992, beginning at 2 o'clock at the Tishomingo County Courthouse. Items to be distributed are butter, cornmeal, peanut butter, canned pork, and raisins.

Eligibility is based on household size and income. All individuals and households who receive food stamps are automatically eligible. Low income individuals and households who do not receive food stamps, but wish to participate in the distribution must apply at the Tishomingo County Department of Human Services beginning July 16, 1992. Application may be made the day of distribution also.

All eligible recipients must have a commodity voucher which must be signed by them and presented at the time commodities are picked up.

Surplus commodities are issued through THE EMERGENCY FOOD ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (TEFAP) the U.S. Department of Agriculture. This program is available to eligible recipients regardless of race, color, national origin, religion, sex, or handicap.

ASCS Farm News

WHEAT PROGRAM CONTAINS ZERO ACREAGE REDUCTION

Farmers who participate in the 1993 Wheat Program will not be required to reduce their plantings to qualify for price support loans and deficiency payments, according to Phillip Horn of the Tishomingo County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. The 1993 program contains a zero percent acreage reduction.

"This means that there is no requirement to place eligible cropland into an Acreage Conservation Reserve," Horn said.

He said this level was chosen from the statutory range of 0 to 15 percent to ensure sufficient wheat supplies for domestic and export needs.

Wheat program benefits include target price protection at \$4.00 per bushel, the same as last year, and price support loans at \$2.45 per bushel, 21 cents more than the previous year. "To be eligible for loans, purchases, and payments on the 1993 wheat crop, producers must not plant to excess of their wheat acreage base plus plantings permitted on flexible acres," Horn said. A paid land diversion will not be implemented, he said.

Other 1993 wheat program provisions will be announced at a later date.

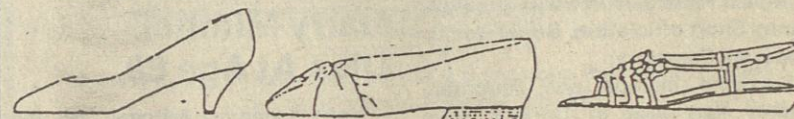

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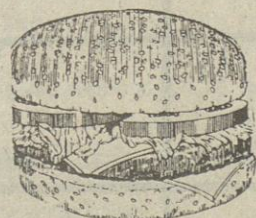

100th Anniversary Of Shiloh National Park

With an eye to the upcoming 100th anniversary of Shiloh National Military Park, supporters of the battlefield will meet at the park Visitor Center at 6:30 p.m. on Thursday, July 9th, to create a "Friends of Shiloh Battlefield" organization, it was announced today by Park Superintendent Woody Harrell. "The newly formed Hardin County Tourism Association has asked to host a meeting to explore the interest for a friends group. They propose an organization with a nationwide membership and a regionwide focus which will provide widespread participation, and support for the park and its programs. There is certainly a need for such an organization, and I welcome this effort by the Tourism Association. The National Park Service is always willing to work in partnership with park neighbors on projects of mutual concern."

Kent Collier, local battlefield preservationist and Civil War buff, has agreed to chair the initial exploratory meeting. Collier sees three broad goals for a Friends of Shiloh Battlefield. "I believe the immediate focus should be on planning a suitable observance for the Park's 100th anniversary on December 27, 1994. Second, a friends group should help Shiloh Park retain, for the next hundred years, its place as the nation's best preserved Civil War battlefield. Third, I believe a friends group can be invaluable in insuring that the Park's interpretive facilities are of the highest quality, designed to

meet the needs of a nationwide constituency."

Collier stressed that the organizational meeting is open to all interested persons: "To be successful, a 'Friends of Shiloh Battlefield' will have to draw on the talent and resources of folks not only in the local three state area, but also from across the country. I ask anyone from the Alabama, Mississippi, and Tennessee area with an interest in Shiloh Battlefield and its future to attend this first meeting. One hundred years ago, actual battle veterans nationwide worked hard to establish Shiloh as a monument to our heritage. Today we have an opportunity to continue their vision by rendering 'Second Century Support' to the commemoration, preservation, and education needs of Shiloh National Military Park."

Whitten Announces Agriculture Bill

Congressman Jamie Whitten, D-Miss., Chairman of the Committee on Appropriations, said the House on Tuesday passed the Rural Development and Agriculture Appropriations bill.

"We have brought you a bill which addresses many of our Nation's needs, both for our cities and our rural areas," Congressman Whitten told his colleagues in the House. "Agriculture is critical to bringing our national and international debt under control while continuing to control inflation at home."

Congressman Whitten noted that the Rural Development and Agriculture Subcommittee, which he chairs, held 5 weeks of hearings with 235 witnesses.

Once again, he noted that the Appropriations Committee has done its part to hold the line.

"Since 1945, Appropriations bills have been \$188.8 billion below the total amounts requested by the various Presidents," he said. "Since I become chairman in 1979, Ap-

propriation bills have been \$31.8 billion below the Presidents' requests."

He pointed out that the bill included funds for feeding programs such as school lunch, food stamps, elderly nutrition, the Women, Infants and Children Program (WIC), rural development programs such as rural housing, water and sewer, conservation programs "which protect our soil and water resources for future generations," as well as agriculture

research, Extension and programs.

Congressman Whitten closed saying: "This is a good bill. It protects the consumer programs while getting out that production comes before consumption. This bill within the President's recommendation and is really an investment in our own country for the benefit of present and future generations."

The House voted 312 to 99 in favor of the appropriations bill.

Totally Depraved?

Calvinism teaches that we are born Totally Depraved of the ability to do good - with "inherited sin." This doctrine is based on the unbiblical doctrine of "original sin," which says that man's nature changed when Adam and Eve first sinned in the Garden.

While it is true that while in the flesh individuals have weaknesses, the Bible does not teach that man is incapable of doing good. Quite to the contrary, Jesus said that each will be judged by whether he has done good or bad. (John 5:28-29)

Advocates of the "original sin" doctrine misinterpret certain passages. For instance, David wrote in remorse of his adultery, "Behold, I was brought forth in iniquity, And in sins my mother conceived me." (Psm. 51:5) David stating only that he was born into a world where sin dominates.

The Jews on Pentecost said, "...How is it that we hear, each in our own language in which we were born?" (Acts 2:8) They were not born speaking different languages, but were born among people where their language dominated. So it is with sin. Furthermore, David and others in the Bible repented of specific instances of transgression, not a nebulous "inherited sin."

Can sin be inherited? Not according to the Bible. "The soul who shall die. The son shall not bear the guilt of the father, nor the father bear the guilt of the son. The righteousness of the righteous shall be upon himself, and the wickedness of the wicked shall be upon himself." (Ezek. 18:20) Therefore, Jesus said concerning children, "...Of such is the kingdom of heaven." (Matt. 19:14) They are not in sin. They do not need baptism.

The first tenet of Calvinism is false.
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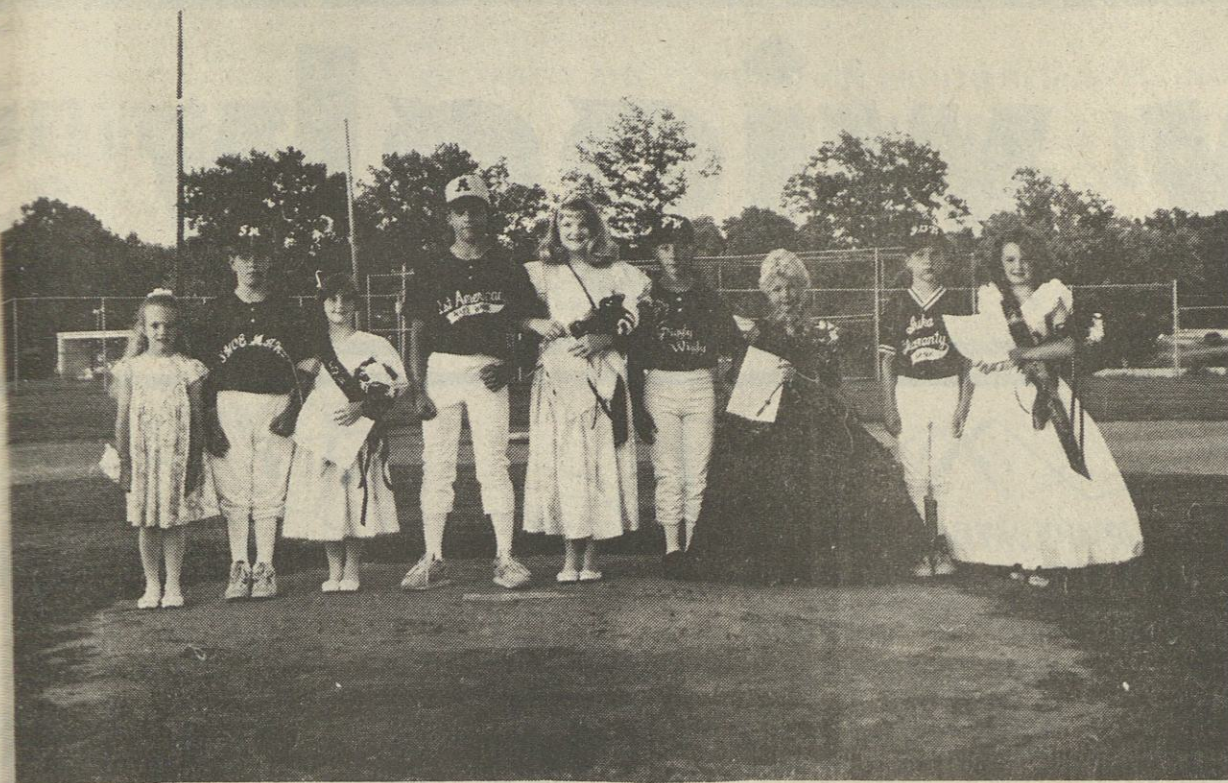
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Iuka Dixie Youth Little League Queen And Court

channel which created an area called a bendway. Some people refer to these areas as oxbows. The cutoffs along the river section shortened the Tombigbee River by a distance of 41 miles. A total of 35 bendways are located in the river section of the Tenn-Tom, ranging from .3 to 9.8 miles in length and comprising 71 miles of severed river channel.

Where are bendways located? In the river section of the Tennessee Tombigbee Waterway which extends northward a distance of 149 miles from the junction of the Tombigbee and Black Warrior Rivers near Demopolis, Alabama, to a point 3

miles south of Amory, Mississippi where the navigation channel leaves the Tombigbee River.

The Tenn-Tom river section is defined as a length of the river that was widened (generally along one bank) but contains riparian habitat (fallen trees, stumps, etc.) along one bank. The bendways, navigation cutoffs and the old river channel are now integral features of the aquatic ecosystem along the river section of the Waterway.

To address the environmental impacts of the design changes and to ensure a positive contribution towards wildlife, fisheries and recreation, an interdisciplinary task force was appointed. Under their guidance, field investigations, sediment collections, and impact analyses were conducted. They identified a siltation problem (rapid sediment deposition) in the upstream ends of some of the bendways. After evaluating alternatives, top of bank blockage structures were installed at the upstream ends of eight bendways in order to preserve their water depth and structural form. These included Morgan Bendway on Aberdeen Lake, James Lockridge,

New Hamilton, Cane, and Denmon Bendways on Columbus Lake, and Big and Owl Creek Bendways on Gainesville Lake. Longer bendways such as McKinley Creek on Columbus Lake and Hairstone Bendway on Aliceville Lake were dredged at the upstream ends and reshaped more nearly at a 45 degree angle to reduce coarse grain sediments from entering the bendways.

The Corps contracted a five year fishery study (1986-1990) to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. Fish populations were studied in three distinct areas; bendways, cutoffs, and the old river. Field assistance was also given by Corps personnel, Mississippi State University, and the state fishery agencies in Alabama and Mississippi.

The bendways were identified as a valuable resource. Sport fish populations (bass, crappie and bream) were abundant in these areas. Species diversity was also high. Good concentrations of sport fish, particularly in the spring, indicate that these areas are used for reproduction and as nurseries by juvenile fishes. Underwater structure was also more available in bendway areas to concentrate fish. In addition, bendways provide fisherman refuge from rough water conditions more prevalent in the main river areas. Management measures such as the top of bank blockage structures proved successful in reducing sediment from the main river channel. No significant difference was found in fish population abundance between bendways without or with blockage structures that had been in place the latter half of the study.

The cutoffs and the old river areas contained more commercial fishes such as catfish and buffalo. Water movement is somewhat higher in these areas and structure is not as available. Where structure such as trees and brush is available these areas were holding good numbers of sportfish.

This information should be useful in helping you find a few good fishing spots. Practice being a safe and courteous sportsman so that others can enjoy our water resources as well.

Molpus Announces
Record Profit - \$1.1 M

Secretary of State Dick Molpus announced that his office will turn over to the state treasury \$1.1 million in profit generated during the 1992 fiscal year, which ended today (June 30).

This is a record return for Molpus' office and marks the seventh straight year the agency has made a profit for the taxpayers. The Secretary of State's Office has returned more than \$6 million to state coffers since the end of Fiscal Year 1986. In Fiscal Year 1991, his agency returned almost \$700,000.

The turnback came from increased income in the agency's operation and savings resulting from increased efficiency, Molpus said.

National economic factors accounted for part of the profit. "The growing popularity of mutual funds and other investments has meant increased securities and corporate registration with our office. Certainly, this income is not something we can count on every year, but it will be good for all of us who are taxpayers in Mississippi nonetheless."

FROM TAX DRAIN TO
PROFIT-MAKER

Since Molpus took office in 1984, the agency has gone from a \$200,000-a-year drain on the taxpayers to a profit center, while automating and improving service. Now recognized as one of the most technologically advanced in the nation, the Secretary of State's Office is a multi-faceted agency responsible for filing corporate charters, oversight of elections and public lands management, and registration of securities offerings, and personnel.

Molpus recalled that early in his tenure as Secretary of State he went to heavy users of the office's services and asked if they would be willing to pay fees equal to the Southeastern average for faster and more efficient service. The answer was uniformly yes, he said.

"The result has been speedier service for users and more than \$6 million returned to the taxpayers," Molpus said. "It's a situation where everyone wins."

As the Secretary of State's Office nears completion of agency wide automation, Molpus predicted that faster, more efficient service should result.

During Fiscal Year 1992, the agency:

- Obtained 37 convictions on eight defendants who received sentences up to 20 years to serve and were ordered to pay \$6,789,889 in restitution for investment scams.

- Responded to more than 120 inquiries about investments.

- Approved 6,372 requests for new foreign and domestic corporation charters

- Handled 9,456 corporate charter amendments, mergers, dissolutions

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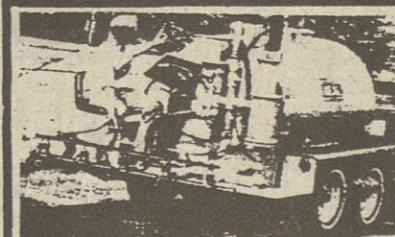

It is important that some record of your life be preserved. If you do not make an effort to record your personal existence, your relationship to this world will disappear when you die.

If you don't write down something about your life one day your grandchild, great grandchild, or great-great grandchild will wonder who you were.

You know your mother's and father's names, probably their birthdays, and maybe the day they married. Do you know where they were when they married? Where their marriage record is located? How they met? Who will know these things if you don't preserve them.

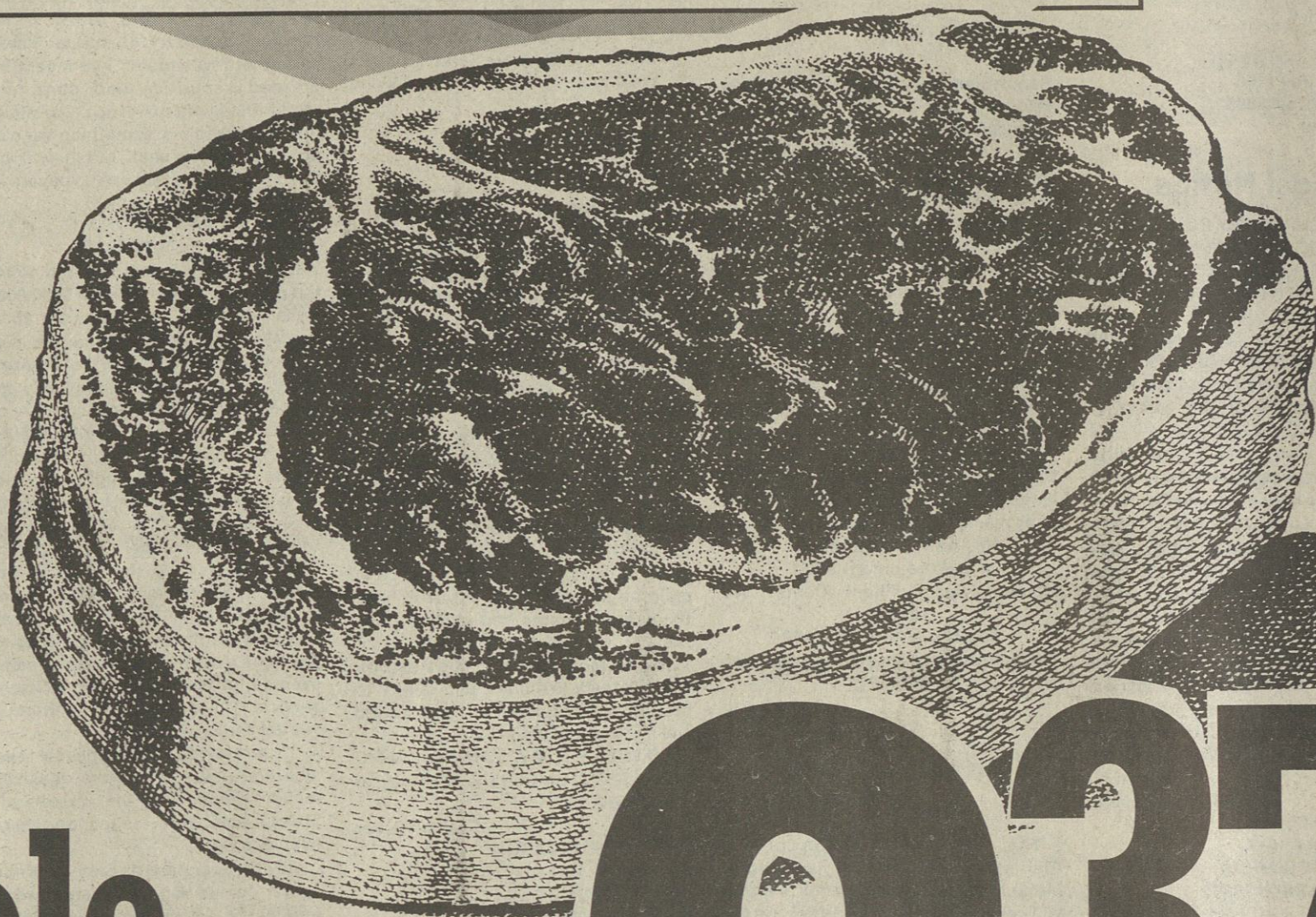
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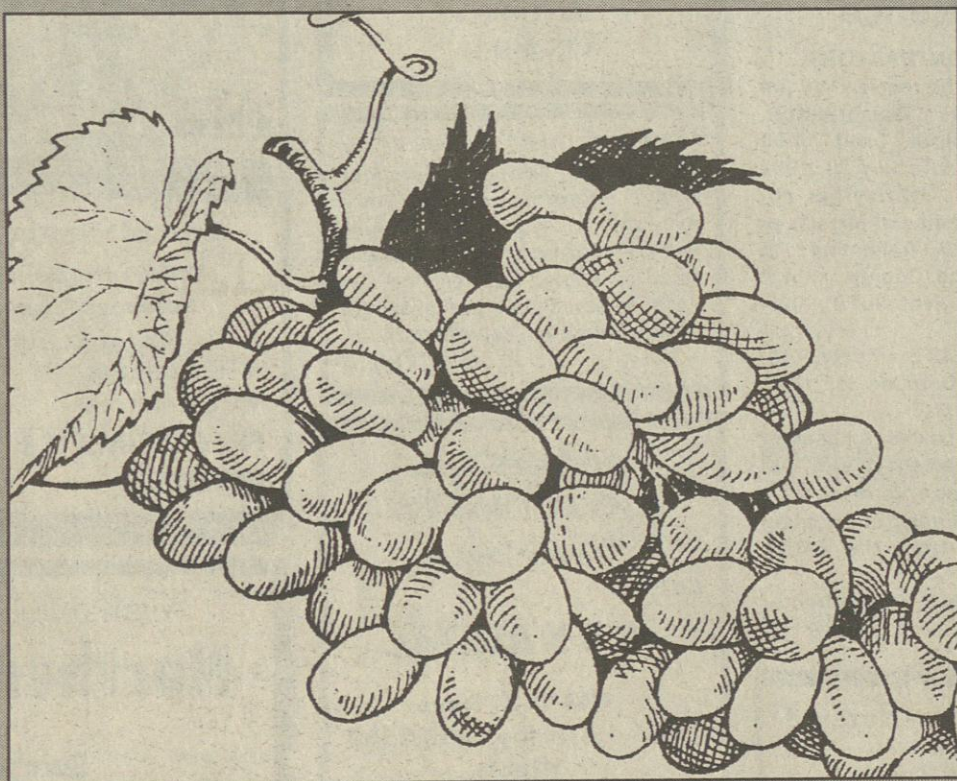
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
