Belmont Youth Dies In One Vehicle Crash

A 12-year-old Belmont boy died Wednesday, June 17, as the result of a one-vehicle accident.

Gary Stephen Pharr was pronounced dead at the Red Bay Hospital after the accident which occurred at about 6:20 p.m., according to Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department Deputy Ricky Brasel.

Reports said that the car was being driven by Jennifer Pharr, 17-year-old sister of the victim. One other passenger, Dana Pharr, another sister, was also in the car.

Both of the girls were treated and released from the Red Bay Hospital Wednesday night according to hospital officials.

Brasel stated that the driver apparently swerved to avoid a dog in the road and lost control of the Nissan car she was driving. The wreck occurred on Red Bud Road not far from the Alabama state line. Tishomingo County Deputy Donald Deaton also investigated the accident.

Gary Stephen Pharr, was a student at Belmont High School where he was active in the athletic program, and he attended the Chapel Hill Church of God.

Services were Friday, June 19 at the Belmont School Auditorium with Bro. Billy West and Bro. Emmanuel Jackson officiating. Burial was in the Belmont Cemetery. Senter Funeral Home of Fulton was in charge of the arrangements.

Survivors include his father, Gary Pharr of Belmont; his mother, Rebecca McNatt of Belmont; his stepmother, Katrina Pharr of Belmont; four sisters, Jennifer Pharr, Dana Pharr, Tiffany Pharr and Stephanie Wiggington, all of Belmont; his grandmothers, Mrs. Dean Pharr of Belmont and Shirley Williams of Iuka; his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Orvil Wiggington of Belmont; his great-grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Ernie Hughes of Tishomingo and Beuva Green of Memphis, TN.

Pallbearers were members of the school baseball team. Honorary pallbearers were Michael Pharr, Anthony Tate and Brent Taylor.

Farmer's crops and gardens were also damaged, and some destroyed, by the high winds, hard rains and hail. Many large trees had the tops twisted off, although the National Weather Service did not verify that there was a tornado in the area. The N.W.S. did however, issue a severe thunderstorm warning. Construction Begins--Gradation has begun on the Tishomingo County Magnet High School's football playing and practice fields adjacent to the new school complex. Construction Begins On New Football Stadium

Construction is presently underway for the new football field at Tishomingo County Magnet High School, also, the hiring of a new basketball coach has been finalized.

According to Tishomingo County Superintendent of Education Dr. Bob Ferguson, preliminary construction is underway for the T.C.M.H.S. football playing field with the help of the Tishomingo County Supervisors. A practice field, adjacent to the playing field, is also in progress.

Supervision of the project, at this point, is by T.C.M.H.S. Coach Danny Coward and assistant principal and newly appointed athletic director, John Mullins.

"The playing field will offer a new turf-type Bermuda. Both fields will have an underground watering system with a computer timer, to be located in the field house. This will allow nighttime watering of both fields," according to Coach Coward.

The seating capacity for the football stadium will be 2,300 and completion is slated for around the time school opens in the fall.

"Other athletic facilities will come along as the year progresses," Ferguson said. Among the other projects planned is a baseball field.

The total cost of the athletic facility is not available pending the return of several bids still out for things such as lighting, fences, concessions, sidewalks and seating, according to Ferguson.

Quitman Sullens, a native of Mississippi, will be stepping into the position of head basketball coach at T.C.M.H.S. beginning this fall.

Coach Sullens is coming into the Tishomingo County program from a position within the Illinois public school system and a part-time coaching position at Northwestern University, Evanston, Ill.

He has returned to the area, along with his mother who lives at Red Bay.

Good News For Mississippi

There was great success in the Senate Commerce, Science & Transportation Committee reauthorization bill hearing on issues of interest and concern to Mississippi.

The Committee voted to fund the Advanced Solid Rocket Motor (ASRM), repeal the Coast Guard recreational boat user fee, and restructure Columbus & Greenville (C&G) Railway's federal loan payback period.

ASRM

The Committee approved full funding for ASRM of \$480 million by voice vote. The rocket is to be built at the Yellow Creek plant in Tishomingo County near Iuka.

ASRM is important to both Mississippi and NASA. The rocket motor will allow the space shuttle to carry larger loads into space and will pave the way for greater astronaut safety.

I must emphasize that this is only one step in several that we need to take this year to ensure ASRM is funded. But, getting this authorization is a very big step toward further development of the next-generation of rockets.

Coast Guard User Fee

I have been opposed to the Coast Guard user fee since day one, because it is not a "user fee" at all, but rather just another tax in camouflage. That is why I offered an amendment to repeal it in the 1993 Budget Resolution, and that is why I offered the same measure to the Commerce, Science & Transportation Committee.

The money raised from this tax goes straight into the federal treasury. It serves merely as a revenue raiser for the spending habits of Congress and is not even used for boating related needs.

I believe that within the next year-and-a-half you will see that the user fee will be completely eliminated.

C&G Railway

We also got some help for the C&G Railway. This railroad, which crosses the heartland of Mississippi, is very important to economic development in the Delta and the northeast portion of the state. It is a vital link between Mississippi and to the rest of the nation.


C&G is having some financial difficulties and owes the principals and interest on two federal loans. So, I offered an amendment that would allow for the railway to subordinate the federal loans to a private loan, or get an extended deferral. The deferral would allow C&G more time to improve tracks and get new business.

All of these measures are good news for Mississippi. ASRM is important to the future of NASA operations; boat owners should not be taxed to use and enjoy the lakes, rivers and oceans; and the C&G Railway should be given the opportunity to prove profitability and provide service to Mississippi. CAN YOUR CHILD SEE WELL?

County Agents Notes

PESTICIDE RECORDKEEPING:
PROPOSED RULE

This is a proposed rule that is awaiting comments from the public before final adoption. If you have comments about the rule they should be submitted as soon as possible to USDA.

The rule proposes that all certified applicators keep the following records on restricted use pesticides (RUP):

1. Brand/product name, formulation, and EPA registration number.
2. Total amount and rate of application of the RUP applied
3. Address/location, size of area treated, target pest, crop, commodity or stored product to which RUP was applied.
4. Month, day, and year on which RUP application occurred.
5. Name, address and certification number (if applicable) of the certified applicator who applied or who supervised the application of the RUP.

Information shall be recorded in a timely manner following application. All records must be kept for two years from the date of application.

Commercial applicators must provide within 30 days the appropriate records to the person for whom the applications were made.

The records shall be made available upon oral and written requests and presentation of written credentials by an authorized representative of the Secretary of the USDA.

The applicator is to supply the records and any label information to a licensed health care professional who needs the records in providing medical treatment for a person exposed to the RUP for which the record is maintained.

The health care professional is not to release the information on those records to anyone else.

There is a \$500 fine for not providing the records for the first offense and a \$1000 fine for each following offense. These fines may be waived if circumstances warrant.







Letter To The Editor

Danielle McDeavitt, Miss Tishomingo County for 1992, helped organize and direct the first Mini-Camp for Tishomingo County's Foster Children. The purpose of the project was to give the foster parents a respite time and to provide meaningful activities for the children. The camp originated at luka Mineral Springs Park.

Danielle was responsible for planning activities, recruiting volunteers, and providing entertainment and care for the children as needed. We served twelve foster children from ages four to thirteen. The first day, Danielle supervised play activities on playground equipment, led group singing and arranged for a ride on a 1941 restored fire truck. The children were delighted and loved the ride through town. A picnic lunch was served in the park. Also, this worker presented information on "Good Touch - Bad Touch", prevention of

sexual abuse.

The second day the group visited a farm and the children enjoyed riding horses. They also fed the horses and this was a wonderful event. We had lunch at the luka Middle School Cafeteria.

The third day the children were entertained with a film at the luka City Library, given a tour of the library, and met a representative running for reelection to the state legislature.

Danielle presented each child with a photograph and special message. She had a good rapport with the children and they interacted with her in a very positive way. These children are victims of abuse and neglect and many suffer from emotional and adjustment problems.

My overall assessment of the three-day mini-camp, hours 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m., is that it was a big success and Danielle's warm and caring personality made the children feel special. The foster parents were very cooperative and appreciative of the help. The hours of the camp should be extended to be from 9:00 a.m. to

12:00 p.m. next year.

In addition to the camp, Danielle accompanied this worker who transported a foster mother and eighteen-month old foster child to LeBonheur Children's Hospital, Memphis. Danielle became familiar with the medical needs of this baby who was removed from its fifteen year old natural mother when it was four months old due to failure to thrive and serious neglect problems. Danielle talked to a social worker who worked with the Crisis Center and learned some of the services provided to abused children.

This was a very worthwhile project and my recommendations are for the mini-camp to become an annual event. Danielle is to be highly commended for her efforts in reaching out to our foster children.



SAVE OUR DRINKING WATER
In early May, Americans recognize National Drinking Water Week, the theme "Give Drinking Water a Hand," each of us were issued a challenge to care for the water way we care for the earth - to protect and protect it.

As with so many of today's problems, it is our young people who will suffer from our abuse and neglect of natural resources.

We've talked about "water before, but as we enter the hot summer months when water use increases, I want to ask all of you young and old, to help protect water supplies.

Try these "at home" tips:
*Inspect all pipes and faucets for leaks, as hundreds of gallons of a day could be dripping away.

*Check toilets for hidden leaks. Tank-to-bowl leaks can waste a quart of water with each flush, a few drops of food coloring in the tank. Wait 15 minutes and see if color appears in the bowl. If so, you have a leak.

*Insulate your water heater and hot water pipes. Less water is wasted before hot water flows.

*Defrost frozen food without running water over the packages. Food in the refrigerator over a defrost in the microwave.

*Recycle water from fish tanks using it to water plants.







Home Economics Tips

BEWARE OF SHORTCUTS
WHEN PRESERVING FOOD

Sacrificing safety by choosing the quickest, easiest method to preserve home vegetables and fruits could cost time and health in the long run.

People often omit or shorten the blanching, boiling water bath or pressure canning portion of putting up produce.

Blanch all vegetables, except onions, peppers, and garlic, before freezing. Blanching will kill some of the bacteria, making the food safer and less susceptible to spoilage, and will denature or kill enzymes in the food.

A common mistake in preserving field peas and okra is not blanching them. The freezing process will not kill bacteria -- it only slows down activity. When the food is thawed, bacteria will reactivate.

Another shortcut some people take is to freeze corn in the shucks. Without washing and blanching the

corn, dirt, insects and worms can be frozen with the corn and will be more difficult to remove when thawed.

Enzymes that otherwise would be killed, will continue to be active in the freezer, causing a change in taste and texture.

Process everything that is canned in a boiling water bath or a pressure canner to prevent spoilage. Jams, jellies, preserves, pickles, relishes, fruits, juices and tomatoes are suitable for processing in a boiling water bath. Use pressure canners when canning any vegetables (except tomatoes), meats or combinations including these foods.

Tomatoes require special attention. For years, home canners were processing tomatoes without acidifying them. Because of the danger of food poisoning or spoilage, specialists are recommending lemon juice or citric acid be added when processing.

Low-acid, home-canned foods such as vegetables, meats and their combinations should be emptied into a pan and boiled for 10 to 15 minutes before tasing or eating.

One of the most common questions home economists receive this time of year is: "What do I do if the jar doesn't seal?"

If the jar hasn't sealed within 24 hours after processing, there are three options:

*Put a new flat on the jar and re-process (bringing cool jars up to temperature slowly) and process for the same amount of time as originally recommended.

*Empty the contents into a freezer container and freeze.

*Go ahead, open and start eating produce immediately.

If the jar has gone for more than 24 hours without sealing, throw it out.

Just because a jar seals doesn't mean it's safe.

Before using any home-canned foods, look for spoilage signs such as cloudy liquid, bubbles, mold, changes in color, odor or texture (mushiness), or liquid spurting from

the jar when opened.

For the current recommended processing times and additional recommendations, contact the local county extension office at 423-7016 or come by our offices in the Tishomingo County Courthouse.

ASCS CLOSES GRAZING PERIOD

The official grazing period closed May 1 for acreage conservation reserve (ACR) and conservation use (CU) acreage for pay (including the required 8%).

The Tishomingo County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service advises that 1992 farm program participants are not authorized to graze these acres between May 1 - September 30. The wheat, feed grains, cotton and rice programs prohibit haying and grazing of designated acreage during the principal growing months. "Farmers who fail to comply with these restric-
