Schnadig Personnel To Move To Belmont Plant

Schnadig Corp., the Chicago-based furniture manufacturing company, announced recently that it will be moving its engineering, product development and research staff to the company's Belmont location.

Schnadig manufactures upholstered furniture and has been in Belmont for about five years. President of the corporation, Don Belgrad said that the decision comes as the result of a quality improvement process aimed at locating engineering near a manufacturing site to better adjust to customer needs.

According to reports, the transfer will be done in three phases. Beginning in the next few weeks will be the relocation of the manufacturing and

engineering personnel. This should be completed by the first of March, 1993.

Phase two will consist of the transition of the product development group after the October furniture market to meet the April 1993 introductions from the Belmont location.

The final phase will move the research and development group. No set time has been designated for this transition.

The availability of furniture expertise and closeness to suppliers were cited as reasons for the relocation to the Belmont facility, according to Belgrad. The plant is presently one of the most modern facilities for furniture manufacturing in Northeast Mississippi, making use of robotics and other advanced technology.

Schnadig's 350,000 square-foot plant opened in 1987 at their Belmont location and employed between 400 and 500 workers presently, according to industry records.

Belmont Mayor Bob Yarber said that the move is good news for the city. "It is going to be a plus for us, another step in the direction of making this area the furniture capital of the world."

Congressional Primary To Be Held August 4th

The first party primary for the state legislative seats will be held Tuesday, August 4.

New district lines have made it necessary for this special election, which will fill the seats in the Mississippi Senate and House of Representatives that were filled temporarily during the 1991 election.

A run-off election, within the parties, will be held August 25 with the winners of that election being placed on the November 3 general election ballot.

Among those qualified to run in the District 1 Mississippi House of Representatives race this Tuesday (August 4) are democrats Harvey Benderman of Corinth, incumbent; Lamar Skinner of Burnsville; David

Yarbrough of Iuka and Richard Dobbs of Iuka. J.R. Long of Iuka is an unopposed Republican candidate for the District 1 Representative seat and will advance automatically to the Nov. 4 election as an opponent to the winner of the Democratic run-off.

Qualifying to run in the District 19 Representatives race are Democrats Bill Wheeler of Belmont, incumbent; and Guyton Hinds of Mantachie.

Qualifying to run in the District 5 Senatorial race are Democrats John White, incumbent; and Perry Rather of Fulton. Republican candidates competing for the 5th District Senate seat are William McCrary of Baldwin and Mark A. Hatfield of Booneville.

Senatorial candidates who qualified to run in the District 4 race are Democrat Travis Little, incum-

bent; and Independent candidate JoAnn Biggers, both of Corinth. Since there is no competition in either of the candidates' parties, both will advance to the November 4 ballot.

The reapportionment of the district lines, as directed by the Federal Courts after the boundaries were approved by the U.S. Justice Department, evens out the amount of voter representation between counties, including the previously disproportionate representation in Alcorn and Tishomingo counties. These new district lines have resulted in the change of districts by some polling places.

A run-down of the new districts and voting precincts are as follows:

•4th Senatorial District-Presently represented by Travis Little, in-

cludes most of Alcorn County, approximately half of Tippah County and the following precincts in Tishomingo County: Hubbard-Salem, North Iuka, Cole's Mill, North Burnsville, West Burnsville and Burnsville.

•5th Mississippi Senatorial District-Presently represented by John White, includes portions of Prentiss County and Itawamba County plus the following precincts in Tishomingo County: Iuka, West Iuka, East Iuka, Midway, Paden, West Tishomingo, Tishomingo, Dennis, North Belmont, Cotton Springs, Belmont, East Belmont and Golden.

•1st Mississippi House of Representatives District-Presently represented by Harvey Benderman, includes four precincts and one split box in Alcorn County and Tishomingo County precincts including: Hubbard-Salem, North Iuka, Iuka, West Iuka, Cole's Mill, North Burnsville, West Burnsville, Burnsville, East Iuka and a split box in Midway.

•19th Mississippi House of Representatives District-Presently represented by Bill Wheeler, includes portions of Lee and Itawamba counties with precincts in Tishomingo County including: Paden, West Tishomingo, Tishomingo, Dennis, North Belmont, Cotton Springs, Belmont, East Belmont and Golden.

Tishomingo County Circuit Clerk Gerald Parsons said that he urges all of the qualified voters of the county to participate in this primary. "These are the people that will make our laws and we need to take an active roll in electing the most qualified people for the job," Parsons said.

Those elected this fall will serve a total of three years.

House Appropriations Committee Approves \$480 Million For ASRM

The House Appropriations Committee approved \$480 million recently for National Aeronautics and Space Administration's advanced solid rocket motor plant at Yellow Creek.

According to a spokesman for U.S. Congressman Jamie Whitten (D-Miss.), Chairman of the House Committee on Appropriations, there was no debate before the funding was ap-

proved Thursday, July 23, by the full committee. Opposition to the bill, however, is expected when it reaches the House floor from Rep. Wayne Owens (D-Utah). Owens' state of Utah is home to Thiokol Corp. that manufactures the redesigned solid rocket motors currently in use by NASA on its space shuttle fleet.

The advanced solid rocket motors

will replace these Utah-made motors. NASA reported that the ASRM design will improve safety and restore 12,000 pounds of payload capacity lost to the redesigned motors. Time and transportation costs would also be greatly reduced by utilizing the Tishomingo County Facility.

The Senate has already authorized the \$480 million for the project.

Although \$520 million was requested for the project by the Lockheed-Aerofjet partnership responsible for constructing the ASRMs, the reduced funding level will only delay the construction a few months, according to Lockheed Project Manager John Thomas.

The ASRM facility at Yellow Creek is slated for completion by the summer of 1993. Launch of the first Mississippi-made rockets is scheduled for early 1997.

Iuka Man Charged With Murder

An Iuka man has been charged with the murder of Reginald "Bubba" Fuqua of Cherokee, Ala.

William Southward, 32, of 707 Pike St. in Iuka, is charged with the murder in connection with Fuqua's death, according to Iuka Chief of Police Amos Bates.

Fuqua, 24, was killed by a single gunshot wound to the head July 20, Bates confirmed. The death, which was at first thought to be a suicide, was ruled a homicide after an intensive investigation by the Iuka Police Department.

Southward is being held in the Tishomingo County Jail on \$25,000 bond. He has also been charged with possession of a firearm as a convicted felon.

Bates said that investigations into the incident are still underway.

J.W. Lambert, 73, has been a farmer in the Doskie Community for most of his life. This summer, however, he discovered an unusual thing growing in his garden. J.W. doesn't have to look to the heavens at night to observe the moon and stars. He only has to look at this

Due to various reasons, during the past several years we have seen a great increase of new landowners in Tishomingo County. Some are building their homes and living in the county, while others are buying the

land as an investment or for weekend retreats. Regardless of the reason that they bought the land, the majority of these landowners want a pond or a lake on the property. Whether they have 5 acres or 500 acres, they want water on the property, and I don't blame them, I would too.

Many landowners are not aware of what steps should be taken before they construct a pond, and are not aware of the services available from the SCS. The following are many of the questions that we receive each week concerning ponds and lakes.

Can I receive financial assistance in building a pond? Only if by constructing the pond you will be solving some type of erosion or water quality problem. The ASCS has a cost-share program in which they will help pay for the cost of the pond if it solves one of these problems. Because of these requirements, many of the sites that we check will not qualify for cost-share assistance.

What type of assistance can I receive from the SCS? The Soil Conservation Service Staff will provide you technical assistance which includes checking the site to see if the soil is suitable for holding water; designing the dam and spillway and providing cost estimates; checking the dam for proper construction; and providing a list of contractors that you could contact to secure bids for construction. We can also provide you assistance with fishpond management, and order fish for new ponds in cooperation with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. Also, there may be some lake projects that will be too large for us to undertake, so we would have to refer you to a private engineer.

Are there any requirements that I will have to meet before I build a pond? Yes, there could be. If your pond is to be constructed on soil that is classified as being wetland, you will first have to secure a permit from the U.S. Corps of Engineers before the SCS can provide you with any technical assistance. Also, if the pond in question has over 50 acres of drainage, you will have to obtain a permit from the Mississippi Department of Natural Resources in order to construct the dam. We can advise you as to the amount of drainage and whether or not the soil is wetland.

To receive assistance from the SCS, just contact the office and we will make an appointment with you to look at the pond or lake site. Don't go off half-cocked. Check with us before you start to build that pond. You will be glad you did.

Home Economics Tips

Extension Home Economist AIMS AT EXPANDED AUDIENCE

Changing needs in the diverse society of the 1990s is motivating Mississippi's extension home economists to adapt their programs to meet growing segments of the state's population.

"Extension home economics has always tried to strengthen families through education," said Barbara Guinn, Tishomingo County home economist. "This year, we're looking not only at what we're teaching, but also at who needs the information."

Economic strains and the hardships on the family unit is resulting in an increased number of at-risk

families. Financial and emotional pressures on adults and children are reaching epidemic proportions.

"By identifying the segments of our populations who can benefit from extension's educational materials, we can increase efficiency and improve lives," said Guinn.

"By identifying the segments of our populations with the greatest need for help from extension home economics, we can increase efficiency and improve life in Tishomingo County," said Guinn.

Barbara Guinn said her office offers educational materials on family topics such as improving family communication, positive parenting techniques, food safety, nutritional health, housing issues, homebased businesses, family economics, and clothing and textiles.

Special programs on weight control, child caregiving and budgeting are popular topics for county residents.

One method Tishomingo County residents learn about issues affecting the home and family is through extension's Family and Community education clubs. Formerly known as Extension Homemaker Clubs, the national and state organization recently changed the name to better reflect the overall mission of family and community education.

Each of the 12 clubs in Tishomingo County are open to people of all backgrounds and needs.

"Our family and Community Education clubs allow members to learn from Extension and from each other," Guinn said.

County Agents Notes

TOMATO DISEASES

I have received several calls concerning "tomato spotted wilt virus". People are concerned with the safety of consuming tomatoes infected with the virus. DON'T WORRY. The virus only affects plants and not humans. Be sure that you have identified the disease. Early blight looks similar except it starts at the bottom and goes up the plant. Spotted wilt virus usually starts at the top on new growth.

Because of the humid conditions that we are having in the county we must use a good spray program to prevent disease. The old "ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure" applies here. Spray once a week with an all-purpose fungicide/insecticide mixture and keep mixture and keep gardens clear of weeds and grasses.

SWINE TIPS

Animal fats such as tallow. Lard and fish oil as well as oils from plants such as soybeans, peanuts, and cottonseed can serve as an energy source for swine. The problem is that swine eat to satisfy their energy needs. This will cause them to eat less ration and thereby receive less of the other nutrients. If fats and oils are added to swine diets then other nutrients (protein, vitamins, etc.) should be added. The addition of fats and oils should be limited to 5% of the ration for finishing. It has been demonstrated that an addition of a maximum 7.5% to the diet of sows 7-10 days before farrowing and during lactation will improve pig survival and increase the fat content of both colostrum and milk which is good for the pigs.



HIGH RISK FOR EYE CANCER

The National Cancer Institute states that exposure to strong sunlight, particularly in early childhood, may increase the risk of intraocular malignant melanoma (eye cancer). This disease affects about 2,000 people each year and can be fatal if left untreated.

Being born in the south, having blue eyes, indulging in sun bathing and not wearing sun glasses all appear to increase the risk. Being born in the south increase the risk three-fold. Blue-eyed people had the highest risk. Brown-eyed people were 60% less likely to develop the disease.

Some practical advice: Always shield your youngster's eyes from the sun with hat or sunglasses. By filtering out the ultra-violet light rays, they also help prevent night blindness. As we get older, the crystalline lens of the eye helps in filtering out these harmful rays. Heed the advice of these experts and avoid undue exposure to sunlight unless you have adequate eye protection.

FARMERS MUST CONTROL WEEDS ON ACR

To qualify for full benefits on 1992 program crops, Phillip Horn, County Executive Director of the Tishomingo County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, says farmers must control weeds on cropland removed from production by the acreage reduction programs. The programs diverted approximately 600 acres of Tishomingo County cropland from production to the Acreage Conservation Reserve (ACR) and other conserving uses (CU).

Horn said maintenance measures must begin soon after conservation protection has been established on the land. "Farm program participants must not neglect the acreage and allow it to grow into weeds or to become a harboring place for insects and rodents."

Under the 1992 farm program contract, producers are required to use adequate control measures on ACR and CU for payment acres to prevent weeds, insects and rodents. They are also required to protect the designated acreage from wind and water erosion by planting approved cover crops or establishing approved conservation practices on the land.

"Keeping the land free from weeds is essential and farmers who fail to do so will be out of compliance and could lose payments on other program benefits," ASCS official Horn said.

Jobs Program Uses Child Care To Promote Employment

Hundreds of former welfare recipients in this state can now claim gainful employment, thanks to the JOBS program administered by the Mississippi Department of Human Services.

JOBS, the Job Opportunities and Basic Skills Training program, is available only to those individuals receiving Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) and is

part of the nationwide "welfare reform" initiative mandated by the U.S. congress through the Family Support Act of 1988. JOBS started in nine Mississippi counties in 1990 and expanded to sixteen in 1991. In October, the program will go statewide. One important factor in the overall success of JOBS is the child care assistance provided to the participants.

"The staff of the JOBS program have received many positive reports from clients," said Sue Hathorn, executive director of the Mississippi Department of Human Services. "Virtually none of our good results would have been possible without the availability of quality child care assistance."

Child care is provided as needed at little or no cost to the JOBS participant. With their children's needs met, the JOBS clients can then direct their full attention to the education,

training, and job search components of the program. Participants in the JOBS program who no longer qualify for AFDC benefits due to successful placement in employment may continue to receive child care assistance for a transitional period of up to twelve months.

Hidden Treasures Of The Forest Touch All Our Lives

The forests of Mississippi are one of our most valuable resources. Forests are made up of many individual trees, both pine and hardwood, and are an important economic resource to forest landowners and to the people who live in Mississippi.

Some people may think of our forests in terms of sawtimber, pulpwood, lumber and paper. Forests grow trees that are cut and manufactured into products that touch almost every facet of our lives. But under the basic raw material (trees) that is produced in our forests are many hidden treasures that touch all of us in some form or fashion.

How much soil erosion occurs in a

forest? Forests are probably the best watershed protection in Mississippi. Soil erosion in the state averages 10 to 12 tons an acre per year on cropland, but less than 250 pounds an acre per year erodes on our forestland.

In fact, soil erosion ceases to exist on some forest stands, and the forests actually build up soil fertility. When you see a clear stream or lake, look at what is adjacent to them. It will probably be a forest. Clean water and trees go hand in hand.

If you are a sports enthusiast, where do you go when hunting season opens? Probably to the forest or woods, because forestland provides the habitat for most of our game species, especially deer, turkey and squirrels.

The value of this habitat is also rising in our state. Hunting leases on forestland are a good source of income to landowners. Lease values

range from \$1 to \$20 per acre per year in Mississippi.

Peace and quiet, tranquility and beauty are all associated with our forests. How much value do you place on these abstract benefits? Many people would not trade the beauty and peace of mind that a forest brings for all the money in the world.

A large sprawling oak tree, a tall, straight loblolly pine, or a hickory tree full of squirrels. These and other sights are sometimes worth more than money.

Our forests do contain many hidden treasures that benefit all of us. The economic value of the trees that make up our forests are extremely important, but the hidden treasures that the trees provide are also very important. How much value do you put on our soils, clean water, and recreational benefits, such as hunting and sightseeing? If you value these things, then you value the hidden treasures of our forests.

A new program, the Forest Stewardship Program, is available to provide professional assistance to landowners who wish to manage their forestland for multiple benefits such as wildlife, erosion control, timber, water quality and recreation.

In conjunction with the Forest Stewardship Program there is a Stewardship Incentive Program. THIS PROGRAM IS DESIGNED TO PROVIDE LIMITED FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE TO LANDOWNERS COMMITTED TO MULTIPLE-USE MANAGEMENT OF THEIR LANDS UNDER THE Forest Stewardship Program.

impact to a minimum.

"One of the things that people need to be aware of is that when we say 'landfill,' we are not talking about a 'dump,'" Brasel said. The proposed landfill will be covered daily, will have a large, fenced buffer zone, and will be accessible by a new road from the nearest highway so that trucks will not be traveling through communities to the landfill, Brasel said. Local transfer stations will be built to collect garbage to be taken to the landfill, he said.

Avoid Back-To-School Rush!

The Mississippi State Department of Health encourages parents to

avoid one part of back-to-school rush by having their children immunized as soon as possible.

While Mississippi parents do a good job of getting their children immunized for school -- a 99 percent compliance rate -- many parents postpone immunizations until the last minute.

"Parents and children get frustrated when they have to wait to get immunizations at county health departments," said Dr. Ed Thompson, chief, Bureau of Preventive Health. "The best way to avoid the frustration is to not wait until the last minute. Parents should have their children immunized now."

Parents can take their children to the county health department or their

private physician for immunizations. Many county health departments schedule special immunization clinics as well.

The Mississippi State Department of Health provides 85 percent of childhood immunizations. Those immunizations include protection against polio, diphtheria, pertussis (whooping cough), tetanus, measles, mumps, and rubella.

Children entering kindergarten must have either a Temporary Compliance Form that proves they've received the first series of shots or a Certificate of Immunization Compliance, also called the "blue slip" that verifies all shots plus the booster have been given.

Children starting first grade need a permanent compliance certificate.

Children transferring to Mississippi schools from out-of-state must also provide proof of immunization.

MSDH recommends but does not require a second dose of MMR (measles, mumps, and rubella) vaccine for all children entering school this fall. MMR vaccine for the two-dose schedule is available at county health departments.

"We've had several outbreaks of measles this year -- at Ole Miss, Hernando, and Clinton -- which prove the importance of a second dose of MMR," Thompson said.

Counties Meet Deadline For Solid Waste Plan

Northeast Mississippi's public waste disposal authority has cleared a major hurdle in its effort to develop a long term solution to the region's garbage problems.

The Northeast Mississippi Solid Waste Management Authority last week submitted a plan to the Mississippi Department of Environmental Quality which proposes specific methods for dealing with long term disposal of solid waste generated within the region. While the plan is under DEQ review, the authority is proceeding with its effort to locate an appropriate site for a regional landfill.

"We are all very happy that we got our plan finalized," said Booneville Alderman Billy Brasel, who is treasurer for the Northeast regional authority. "This was an area that none of us had a great deal of experience in to start with, but the counties and cities came together for a common goal. We realized that this is something that we would have to set our differences aside and work together to do what's best for the people. Now we've got to decide where the regional landfill will go."

The authority encompasses the counties of Alcorn, Benton, Marshall, Prentiss, Tippah and Tishomingo and the cities of Booneville, Corinth, Iuka, Osprey, Ashland and Holly Springs. The plan submitted to DEQ was in the works for more than a year and was approved by county supervisors, city officials and the authority in June. It was developed by Neel-Schaffer, an engineering firm with offices in Iuka and Jackson, and submitted to DEQ prior to a state-imposed deadline of July 9.

The plan details how much garbage the region is expected to generate over the next 20 years. By exercising its own authority to dispose of the region's waste, local governments hope to prevent private companies from building large landfills within the area to accept mostly out-of-state waste.

The Legislature last year enacted laws directing cities and counties to develop a plan to meet the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's rigid new Subtitle D solid waste disposal guidelines. All landfills must meet the new regulations by October 1993, and state officials say that only a handful of existing landfills can do so. The Legislature also passed a law enabling cities and counties to band together to dispose of solid waste.

Subtitle D regulations require landfills to be underlain with impermeable clay or lined with impermeable materials to prevent rainwater and other liquids from seeping into underground water supplies. Groundwater in the vicinity of the landfills must be monitored for 30 years after the facility is closed.

The Northeast authority decided that a regional landfill was the cheapest way to dispose of solid waste and has asked Neel-Schaffer to propose four possible sites. The plan includes alternative cost estimates for using two regional landfills and for individual landfills in each county. Another alternative would be to contract with a private waste disposal business, although that would diminish local government control.

Randy Thompson, spokesman for Neel-Schaffer, said the authority's plan calls for a large buffer zone around the landfill and for waste reduction measures, recycling and composting to reduce the volume of garbage that must be disposed of in the landfill.

"Any way you look at it, disposal is going to be expensive," Thompson said. "The first thing you have to do, after you've found an appropriate site, is come up with ways to reduce the waste going into the landfill so that you can get as much use as possible over a long period of time."

Brasel said authority members are aware of the concerns residents have about a landfill in their area. "Everybody realizes we've got to take care of our own garbage, but no one wants the landfill at their back door," Brasel said. "We will study the proposed sites carefully to keep the



Irresistible Grace

Calvinism says that man is born in sin (Totally depraved), not given a choice in his salvation (Unconditionally elected), and that Christ did not die for some (Limited atonement). It also affirms that God sends a miraculous working of the Holy Spirit upon the "elect" who are thus made acceptable to God through this "irresistible grace." (Next week's article will cover Perseverance of the saints.)

Does God save people by extending to them a personal grace which cannot be resisted? In a land where racial, sexual, and other discriminations are appalled, it would seem that folks could see that God will allow anyone to come to repentance. (Acts 10:35).

In the Bible conversion was always conditional upon how a person responds to God's word. There were the Jews on Pentecost - 3000 of them. (Acts 2) There was Cornelius, a devout man, but lost, until he heard the same gospel message preached to the Jews. (Acts 10, 11)

There was Simon the Sorcerer, a "con man." He obeyed the gospel just as everyone else. And when he sinned afterward, he was instructed to repent and pray, that "perhaps the thought of his heart would be forgiven him." (Acts 8)

Saul of Tarsus obeyed the gospel in the same way as the others. (Acts 9, 22) There were Lydia, the jailer, the worldly Corinthians, and many more.

Their conversion did not depend upon a miraculous operation of the Holy Spirit, or some irresistible grace. They simply heard the gospel message and responded in obedience.

"For the grace of God that brings salvation has appeared to all men, teaching us that, denying ungodliness and worldly lust, we should live soberly, righteously, and godly in the present age..." (Tit. 2:11-12)

Alabama Music**Hall Of Fame To****Celebrate 2nd Anniversary**

Drawing on the depths of talent which sprang from the Shoals area, the Alabama Music Hall of Fame will celebrate its second anniversary by saluting the legacy of Muscle Shoals Music with an outdoor concert Saturday, August 1, featuring the dynamic Clarence Carter and a reunion of Muscle Shoals bands of the 60s. Members of these bands became the studio musicians, song writers and producers who established Muscle Shoals as the "Hit Recording Capitol of the World."

Carter gained world renown with hits such as "Patches," "Slip Away," "Snatchin' It Back" and "Strokin'," which were recorded in the Muscle Shoals area over two and half decades. The talented singer-song writer-musician is a native of Montgomery. He came to the Shoals area in the 1960s, working first with Producer Rick Hall at Fame Recording Studio, then later at Broadway Sound and Muscle Shoals Sound Studios.

Many of the studio musicians who worked in the recording studios in the early days of the industry received their music education as members of bands working out of the Muscle Shoals area during the early 1960s. Bands such as The Mark V with Dan Penn, The Del-Rays, Terry Woodford and the Mystics, Hollis Dixon and the Keynotes, Travis Wammack and the Little Richard Band, Bobby Denton and the Trays, The Weejuns and Mickey Buckins and the New Breed. These groups will come together to recreate the dynamic sounds which were the very roots of the Muscle Shoals recording industry.

Members of these bands have developed into some of the most successful studio musicians, song writers, record producers and studio owners in the Southeast. They have worked with artists such as Elvis Presley, Bob Dylan, Lionel Richie, Aretha Franklin, The Allman Brothers, Rod Stewart and hundreds of other top talents in all facets of the music industry.

Additionally, Muscle Shoals song writers and recording artists Lenny LeBlanc, Robert Byrne and Walt Aldridge, will perform some of their hits. Don Von Tress, writer of the Billy Ray Cyrus hit "Achy Breaky Heart", and The Muscle Shoals Jazz All Stars will also perform.


Planning for 1993 Heritage Day has already begun, by the committee and Dr. Kitchens who will be the chairperson for the next year.
