Benderman - Yarbrough In Run-off August 25th

The federally mandated special election held to fill seats in the Mississippi House of Representatives and Senate resulted in high incumbent totals.

In the race for the District 1 House of Representatives seat, unofficial totals place Harvey Benderman of Corinth incumbent, first with 1,054 votes. He will square off against David Yarbrough of Iuka, who had 443 votes, in the August 25 run-off. The winner of that election will face Republican J.R. Long of Iuka in the November 3 general election. Candidate Lamar Skinner of Burnsville received 359 votes and Richard Dobbs of Iuka received 311 votes.

In the District 19 House race, incumbent Bill Wheeler of Belmont finished ahead of opponent Guyton Hinds of Mantachie with a vote of 1288 to 757. Wheeler will face Republican L.C. Kitchens in November.

The unofficial totals in the state Senate, District 5 Democratic race saw John White of Baldwin, incumbent, garnering 71 percent of the vote. White received 3,444 votes to democratic opponent Fulton's Perry Rather's 1414.

The District 5 Republican race saw Mark A. Hatfield of Booneville receiving 181 votes with William McCrary of Baldwin receiving 89 votes. White and Hatfield will square off in the November 3 general election.

All totals are unofficial.

The program should be a memorable event for students, in bringing history to life.

Bonds Construction Awarded Contract

Transportation Commissioner Zack Stewart has announced that a contract has been awarded for improvements to Highway 25 in Tishomingo County.

Bonds Construction, Inc. of Burnsville, Miss. was awarded the contract with a low bid of \$770,922.00.

Stewart said the project is for an asphalt overlay on 11 miles of Highway 25 between Tishomingo and

Iuka.

He said the work will be done under traffic, and motorists will encounter lane closures.

The commissioner asks motorists to observe all construction advisory signs while driving through the project.

The contract completion date for the project is 40 working days or October 31, 1992, whichever comes first.

Six Counties to Benefit From ARC Landfill Grant

The Northeast Mississippi Solid Waste Management Authority has been awarded a \$460,000 grant from the Appalachian Regional Commission, according to the state's U.S. senators.

U.S. Senators Trent Lott and Thad Cochran, both R-Miss., said the grant will be used for the improvement of an existing sanitary landfill in the six county Northeast Mississippi Planning and Development District.

"This landfill serves more than 132,000 residents in Alcorn, Benton, Marshall, Prentiss, Tippah and

Tishomingo Counties," Lott said. "This grant will help to improve the existing landfill and bring it up to today's federal environmental standards."

The Landfill improvements will include groundwater monitoring wells, a liner and leachate collection system, scales, a small office and fencing around the site.

The Northeast Mississippi Solid Waste Management Authority will contribute \$158,524 to the overall project for an adjusted budget and project cost of \$618,524.

School Immunizations Tuesday, August 11th

The Tishomingo County Health Department will be having a special day for school immunizations on Tuesday, August 11th from 8 a.m. until 4 p.m.

Children entering kindergarten must have either a temporary compliance form that proves they've received the first series of shots or a certificate of Immunization Compliance, also called the "blue slip" that verifies all shots plus the booster have been given.

Children transferring to Mississippi schools from out-of-state must also provide proof of immunizations.

MSDH recommends but does not require a second dose of MMR (measles, mumps, and rubella) vaccine for all children entering school this fall.

Senate Works To Renew ASRM Funds

The Advanced Solid Rocket Motor plant at Yellow Creek failed to receive funding from the U.S. House of Representatives Wednesday, July 29, but was included in a Senate bill Friday, July 31, which recommended a portion of the initial funding.

The House voted 249-159 to kill the ASRM project. Rep. Wayne Owens, D-Utah, offered an amendment to NASA's appropriations bill to cut the ASRM project. Reports indicate that Owens is running for the U.S. Senate in Utah where the Morton-Thiokol Company is the sole producer of the redesigned rocket boosters presently in use by NASA. The ASRM would replace those boosters and eliminate the need for the Utah-made rockets.

The Senate Appropriations Committee, chaired by Sen. Barbara Mikulski, D-Md., restored partial funding to the project. Although only \$50 million of the requested \$480 million was included, this will allow Senate supporters to work for the passage of the bill. The bill will be voted on later this month. It will also allow for work toward increased funding when it goes to a House & Senate conference committee sometime in September.

U.S. Senators from Mississippi, Thad Cochran (R) and Trent Lott (R) began working to keep the plant on the budget for fiscal 1993.

Approximately 750 people are presently working on the planning of the rocket with about 500 working in construction at the site.

Congressman Jamie Whitten (D-Miss.) chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, said that efforts to continue the ASRM plant will continue despite the House vote.

"We were extremely disappointed that our colleagues voted against a very sound program," he said. "Our committee recommended \$480 million for the ASRM program, and I remain hopeful that full funding will

be restored as the bill now goes to the Senate and then to Conference Committee."

The advanced solid rocket motor project came into being following the 1986 explosion of the space shuttle Challenger, on the recommendation of the Presidential Commission of the Space Shuttle Challenger Accident and NASA. However, neither NASA officials nor President George Bush included funding for the ASRM plant in the fiscal year 1993 NASA budget proposals. Reports indicated that language was left in Bush's budget that would keep the program alive with the condition that Congress was able to secure funding.

Approximately \$1.2 billion has already been spent on the research and development, as well as construction of the facility. According to reports, this is almost half of the total amount of the entire project. If the project is cut, it will mean a waste of close to \$2.4 billion by the federal government on two separate projects-ASRM and the canned Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant.

Whitten concluded that "It is essential that funds for this project be restored. It is important to our people in northeast Mississippi, Alabama, and Tennessee, to the Nation and to the future of NASA's space program."

Senator Trent Lott said in a statement issued Thursday, July 30, that "while the House vote was disappointing and a set back, we are committed to saving ASRM in the Senate so the matter can be favorably resolved in conference. I am very hopeful that we'll be able to save ASRM."

Cochran Comments

U.S. Senator Thad Cochran (R-Miss.) made these comments following the U.S. Senate Ap-

propriations Committee's approval of his proposal to provide funding for operations and construction of the Advanced Solid Rocket Motor Plant in Iuka, Mississippi:

"This is a great victory. The Senate Appropriations Committee reversed an earlier decision made by a subcommittee and provided funds to continue the construction of the Advanced Solid Rocket Motor facility at Iuka."

"We hope to be able to resolve this issue in conference with the House of Representatives Appropriations Committee members when the bill gets through the Senate."

"The Senate Committee approved \$50 million to keep the project underway until we can resolve this issue with the House. We think that we're going to be able to achieve success."

"We were encouraged today, particularly in view of the last couple of days that have put this project in jeopardy. The unexpected amendment offered in the House of Representatives dealt a very serious setback to the project, but the program is now back on track. We can continue to negotiate with the Administration and with the House of Representatives to get the funding problem solved."

"We're working with all members of the Mississippi delegation and with Senators in the area, Tennessee and Alabama in particular, to try to make sure that we get this issue behind us and we keep this program going."

"There are very compelling and good arguments for the continuation of this project. The fact that the government has invested such a sizeable amount of money in this plant and in this site is a very strong argument in favor of continuing the ASRM facility and program. Other persuasive arguments in favor of continuing the project are safety and the efficiency in our space program."

Belmont Plant Changes Ownership

Kaydee Metals, a furniture manufacturing plant located in Belmont, was purchased Monday, July 3, by Falcon Products, Inc.

The St. Louis, MO-based company specializes in furniture manufacturing, sales and national and international marketing.

Frank Jacobs, Chairman of the Board, President and Chief Executive Officer of Falcon, explained that his company was interested in expanding its metal chair production and the purchase of Kaydee would make that possible. "Kaydee will now be a subsidiary of Falcon. We are a good sales and marketing company and our present sales are about \$50 million a year. Most of our metal chairs were coming from Italy. Now we'll be able to make them here," Jacobs said.

The buy-out of the company means

good news for the employment outlook of the area. According to now former owner of Kaydee, Alan Rubin, the increase of sales should be

around 30 to 35 percent, meaning that the plant will need 30 to 35 percent more employees over the next year. Rubin and all other current employees will be retained with the additional employees being hired locally. "We intend to hire local people to fill both white and blue collar jobs," Jacobs stated.

The transition should begin within the next two months. Kaydee, which was established in 1969, presently employs approximately 180 workers with about \$14 million sales annually.

Besides Falcon's home office in St. Louis and the newly acquired Belmont plant, the corporation has facilities in Juarez, Chic., Mexico; Newport, Tenn.; and Louisville, Ark. They have showrooms in New York, Chicago, Los Angeles and just outside Paris, France. There are also representatives for the company in practically every country in western Europe and also countries such as Hong Kong, and Japan, just to name a few.

Falcon not only specializes in furniture, but also in interiors. "We do the complete interiors of businesses and many of the major chains such as Kentucky Fried Chicken, Taco Bell, Red Lobster, Denny's, etc. We will go in and design the entire business interior and put it in place or remodel an old interior," Jacobs said.

Belmont Mayor Bob Yarbrough stated that he believes that the transfer to Falcon will be greatly beneficial to the town and surrounding areas. "We

are glad to see industry in the area growing," Yarbrough commented. According to Yarbrough it is industries such as this which keeps Belmont's unemployment much lower than the county average.

Rubin said a special thanks should go to the town of Belmont and to the local supervisors who helped the company's transition go quickly and smoothly.



also been a couple of reports in Tishomingo County. These insects prefer lush green grasses or grass crops such as grain sorghum but when this is not available they will migrate or move in masses, hence the name "army" worm, to other areas looking for food. High populations can be devastating. They feed mostly at night but will be active during overcast days. Control can be difficult, especially if you are dealing with large worms. Sevin, malathion, chlorpyrifos, methyl parathion, and methomyl "depending on label restrictions" can be used. Be on the lookout and call if you need help.

FORAGE ESTABLISHMENT

If you plan to establish cool season forages such as fescue, ryegrass, legumes, or mixtures then start planning now. The first step is to determine the fertilizer and lime requirements by taking a good random soil sample. Lime needs to be applied as soon as possible to allow time for the pH to adjust as much as possible before planting this fall. Use quality seed and plant at the proper time. We have an information sheet that shows varieties, planting dates and rates. Call or stop by and pick one up. Tilled seedbeds should be relatively firm after lime and fertilizer is applied especially for small seeded forages like the clovers. If a large amount of weeds have been tilled into the soil, allow enough time for decay since this will harbor insects and can tie up plant nutrients. Fields should be smoothed so that harvest will be more efficient and equipment damage is held to a minimum in future years. For more information contact the Extension Office at 423-7016.

Home Economics Tips

**SHOULD YOU STOP PAYMENT ON
LOST CHECKS?**

Loosing a checkbook can be a devastating experience. Not only are you unsure of your checkbook balance, but it is easy to envision someone writing multiple checks and signing your name.

When such a situation occurs, many people think that putting stop-payment orders on the missing checks is the only solution. The problem for the consumer, however, is that financial institutions often charge customers \$10 to \$15 -- or more -- to place each stop-payment order. Considering that there are typically 25 checks inside a checkbook, the total cost should become overwhelming.

The better solution for the consumer is to keep the checking account open. Any legitimate checks will clear. If and when forgeries show up with a monthly bank statement, the consumer only needs to spot the phonies and refuse to accept those checks from the financial institution.

The financial institution is liable, not the consumer. It is the financial institution's responsibility to verify your signature against the one kept on file.



Parents Form Partnerships With Teachers

A partnership attitude between parents and teachers can increase educational achievements and decrease discipline problems in the classroom.

Early and regular parent-teacher communication is the key to avoiding problems during the school year, said Dr. Ann Jarratt, youth development specialist with the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service at Mississippi State University.

"Every teacher deserves the opportunity to be known individually by the parent and not judged solely on the words of the child," Jarratt said. "With regular communication between the parents and teachers, report card grades should not be a big surprise."

One of the best things for parents to do is to get involved by attending school open house events, joining the schools' parent-teacher organization, chaperoning field trips and assisting with class parties.

"Parents can help teachers by organizing study times and places in the home and monitoring their child's homework," Jarratt said. "Teachers who view the parents as their partners in the child's education can alert the parents to problems early and work together to assist the student."

The youth specialist said there is a psychological benefit for the child who sees these significant people work together in the student's best interest.

"Parents should teach respect of authority figures at home and practice positive discipline," Jarratt said. "Children should know the rules and be expected to follow them. Parents should be consistent with discipline

and have logical consequences for not following rules."

There is no such thing as perfect parents, perfect children/students or perfect teachers. When differences of opinion arise, Jarratt said those involved need to explain their concerns in a non-accusatory way.

"When a parent disagrees with the teacher, he or she should avoid verbally blaming the teacher," she said. "By approaching the problem through positive communication, the strengths of the teacher and the parent can be directed toward helping the child."

Parents can try to help teachers' understand their children's weaknesses and strengths, then they can work together to help the children succeed.

"Although the parent and/or child may not agree with something the teacher does, children need to learn that adapting to different people is part of life," Jarratt said. "Students should realize that disagreeing with the teacher is not a reason to skip class or not to try to do well."

They Keep Going And Going...

Female students going to The University of Mississippi this fall mark the 110th year that women have been attending Ole Miss. Though they didn't have women's dormitories for another decade or so - female students were not allowed to live on campus, except in faculty members' residences - they were admitted on the same basis as men beginning in 1882, becoming one of the first three universities in the South to admit women. The first graduating class with women was three years later in 1885.

The Snakes Are Crawling

An old legislator's tale had it that the "snakes began to crawl" in the back rooms and the cloakrooms in the last hours of a legislative session. That's when the taxpayers had to hold on to their wallets and their purses.

Here is a message for taxpayers in 1992: "The snakes are crawling." Hold on. Better advice: Be prepared.

The issue popping up again is the worn-out question of the operations of county road systems.

Voters in forty-six counties told their county supervisors in the 1989 elections to forget the beat system, forget five road systems per county, forget five road crews and five sets of expensive equipment.

Voters in those forty-six counties chose the proven savings and efficiencies of the unit system of county road operations - a single system - over the traditional, but wasteful, beat system.

The 1989 law provided that once the elections on county unit were over, they were over for five years. The unit system would be given time to prove its worth.

Then, in a reversal, the 1992 Legislature changed the rules. Legislators agreed to elections on county unit this year.

The law now provides that 15 percent of the voters in a county, or 1,500 voters - whichever is less - may petition for a county unit election this fall.


Deadline for the filing of petitions is September 4.

The word is out. Some county supervisors want the unit systems to fail. Some still want to work as road foremen, ignoring the various other duties of the office. Some still want to purchase equipment, control the jobs, just divide the money five ways, regardless of countywide priorities.

Those who do are quietly making the rounds, quietly circulating petitions, gearing up for November elections.

Voters beware. The "snakes are crawling"...or riding county roads in county-owned pickup trucks.

You will want to watch for the "snakes" in your county.

MEC Encourages Choice In Education

Much of what we hear in public debate these days focuses on the right of choice in our society. Arguments fly back and forth about this right, and the arguments are as varied as the issues on which they focus.

One of those issues is choice in education, and it has been a strong point of contention within the ranks of educators and parents across Mississippi.

In an effort to provide more information on the subject, the Mississippi Economic Council has released a report entitled "The Issue is Choice." The result of a two-year study on choice in education, the MEC report reaches the conclusion that greater choice in Mississippi's public school system will work to strengthen the schools.

According to the report, two necessary ingredients for improved education include greater parental involvement and the creation of competition within the school system. The report also calls for returning

control of public schools to the local level, providing administrators, teachers and parents with a stronger voice in their schools.

Recognizing the fact that there are some forms of choice already in place in Mississippi schools, the MEC report provides the following recommendations:

1. Parents should be given the choice of enrolling their children in any public school in any school district, consistent with federal guidelines, with state funds to follow the student.

2. Local school districts should be given the authority and responsibility for adopting their own curricula for meeting the needs of students, consistent with state accreditation requirements.

3. Local school districts should be given the authority to define their own missions, within state accreditation requirements.

4. Local schools should have the flexibility to employ teachers deemed accomplished in their fields, even though such teachers may not have completed professional education courses for certification. The goal

should be to attract the best teachers available to the classroom. While the report endorses choice within and between public schools, it does not recommend the use of public funds for private schools.



Pollution. What does it mean?
Ozone depletion, greenhouse effect,
litter, waste, acid rain...

These are just a few of the problems that Americans hear about often. The biggest problem, however, is that most of us don't realize that if we are not part of the solution, we are part of the cause. Pollution affects our water, our air, our wildlife and plants - including agriculture. It also affects our health and destroys the beauty of our surroundings. What can we do? A lot!

Did you know that nearly half of the U.S.'s air pollution comes out of the tailpipes of our vehicles? And that you can save money by helping out? Here are a few things you can do...

Run all your errands at the same time. A warm engine uses less gas than a cool one.

...Car Pool.
Check your tire pressure. Underinflated tires take more fuel to turn.

...Avoid fuel wasters such as fast starts and stops, as well as accelerating on hills.

...Use the air conditioner only when you really need it. Don't use it out of habit!

...Plant a tree. Make it a special occasion. Trees release oxygen that will help reduce air pollution, as well as carbon dioxide in the air that contributes to the greenhouse effect.

Do you know the 3 R's? Reduce, Recycle, Reuse...

Did you know that...
...the average person throws away 4

lbs of trash per day, including paper, glass, aluminum, plastic, and metal, most of which is recyclable or reusable?

...every 3 months the United States throws away enough aluminum to rebuild a whole commercial airline fleet? Using recycled aluminum takes only 5% of the energy as making items from scratch.

...paper production is one of our main causes of pollution? By recycling you not only save trees, but also energy?

...you can reduce the amount of paper you use by recycling what you buy and buying what has been recycled? You can also help by B.Y.O.B. (Bringing Your Own Bag to shop), using cloth towels instead of paper towels, and putting a stop to all the junk mail you receive. You can write companies that already have your name, and stop others from getting it by writing: Mail Preference Service, Direct Marketing Association, 6 E. 43rd St., N.Y., NY 10017. This could save 1 1/2 trees per year per person.

...by snipping plastic six pack rings with scissors before you toss them, you can save wildlife. Animals sometimes catch one of the loops around their bill or neck, and either strangle themselves or starve to death.

...by buying in bulk you're being packaging smart and reducing waste? Each American uses about 190 lbs. of plastic per year, of which about 60 lbs is packaging, discarded as soon as the package is open.

...The energy saved from recycling one glass bottle will light a 100-watt bulb for four hours?

...that disposable diapers take up

to 4% of our landfill space in some areas, and they can take up to 500 years to decompose? Cloth diapers decompose in 1-6 months and can be reused.

...biodegradable means able to decay quickly? The problem is that our modern landfills are designed to be nearly air and water tight to prevent settling and oozing, which can release dangerous substances. But if there is no air or water, there is no decay, and you would be able to dig up a 10 year old newspaper to read?

...you can keep biodegradable garbage out of landfills by starting a compost pile. Using kitchen scraps (excluding grease and meats) and yard trimmings is harmless and beneficial.

...by avoiding non-recyclable products such as styrofoam, you not only cut down on waste, but also cut back on the dangerous chemicals used to produce them?

...we are running out of landfill space, and the next one may be in our backyard?

State Department Of Health News

According to UNICEF, between 3,000 and 4,000 babies die every day from Diarrhea and acute respiratory infections even though breast-feeding could have saved their lives. The World Alliance for Breast-feeding Action encourages this life-saving behavior worldwide; with support from UNICEF, they've declared August 1-7 as World Breast-feeding week.

In Mississippi, Governor Kirk Fordice has proclaimed August Breast-feeding Awareness Month.

The Mississippi WIC Program -- the federally-funded Special Supplemental Food Program for Women, Infants, and Children -- plans special breast-feeding promotion activities during

August. WIC provides nutritious food to some 110,000 women and children, including some 30,000 infants.

"Mothers give their babies so much more than food when they breast-feed," said Debbie Webb, WIC breast-feeding promotion coordinator. "Babies get some immunities against disease and a perfect balance of vitamins and minerals for their first months of life. And, economically, breast-feeding is a great benefit, especially for low-income families."

Webb works with other WIC staff members to create programs to encourage breast-feeding. One of the most successful -- peer counseling -- has drawn attention at the regional level.

Acting USDA Regional Director Charlie Simmons, Supplemental Food Programs, said peer counseling is one of the best ways of providing breast-feeding support.

Simmons said that the Department of Agriculture, the administrative agency for the WIC Program, supports increasing breast-feeding rates. But, he said, "it's only through the efforts of individual states, like Mississippi, that this goal can be realized."

State breast-feeding promotion leaders met in Jackson July 23 for the first meeting of the Breast-feeding Promotion Coalition. The group discussed barriers mothers face in breast-feeding; they'll also look for ways to overcome those barriers.

year. Sen. Chris Dodd of Connecticut introduced the Senate version of the bill, S.5, a week later.

Quite simply, the bills would allow workers to receive up to 12 weeks of unpaid leave a year to take care of a new baby, sick spouse or an aged parent. Most importantly, employees in this predicament would know that their jobs would be waiting for them when they return.

But the most attractive feature of this bill lies in the fact that it won't cost taxpayers a single penny -- a rarity in today's world. Far from being a burden on business, the legislation sets a minimum standard of decency and financial protection for America's families by requiring businesses with more than 50 employees to provide limited periods of unpaid leave to employees in cases of birth or adoption of a child, and serious personal or family illness.

Seniors, parents and children all stand to benefit from this legislation. In the case of seniors, family members providing care to sick and frail elderly parents too often are forgotten and overlooked. Yet, these family members are making an invaluable contribution to the independence and dignity of older Americans.

The bottom line is that family caregivers need and deserve a safety net of protection so that their jobs and livelihood are not threatened when a family crisis occurs.

So what are we waiting for? Enacting the Family and Medical Leave Act will extend a helping hand to struggling families in their time of need. Your representatives in Congress need to hear from you now.

Building An Urban Center

Mississippi, like all states, is engaged in a constant effort to attract new and expanding industries. And, like those other states, our success or failure in that effort is dependent on several factors.

4-H Communicates

HOME CANNING
Many Tishomingo County 4-H'ers have selected "FOOD PRESERVATION" as their main project and are out to beat inflation with a garden hoe and a jar lid.

Many of these gardeners have produced some prize-winning blisters and backaches. They have reached a low level of despair with jelly that didn't gel, pickles that didn't pickle, and preserves that didn't preserve. Other 4-H'ers, though, have found they had an unsuspected green thumb. They have showered friends and loved ones with fresh-from-the-garden produce and take-home presents. They have packed their pantries with home-preserved fruits and vegetables.

Home canning gives a great feeling of pride and accomplishment. It brings family members together in creative activity. It provides security in having food within an arm's reach. It offers a supply of food prepared according to family preferences and special dietary needs.

For these and other reasons, the United States Department of Agriculture and the Cooperative Extension Service have provided the home food preservationist with instructions and tips for best preserving the garden's bounty. We have the latest information on home canning techniques for fruits, vegetables, jelly, jam, preserves, pickles and relishes.

EQUIPMENT - Spoilage and botulism are always threats to home canning. To produce home canned foods that are safe to eat, always use the right equipment.

When you can fruits and vegetables, heat them to a high enough temperature for a long enough time to destroy spoilage organisms and stop enzyme action. Do this processing either in a boiling water bath canner or a steam pressure canner. The type of canner you use depends on the kind of food

you're canning.

For fruits, tomatoes, and pickled vegetables, use a boiling water bath canner. These foods contain enough acid to be safely processed in boiling water.

STEAM PRESSURE CANNERS - For common vegetables except tomatoes, use a steam pressure canner. Processing these low-acid foods safely in a reasonable length of time takes a temperature higher than a boiling water bath.

Before you use a steam pressure canner, be sure to check out all parts for safe operation during canning. Before and during the canning season, clean the petcock and safety-valve openings by drawing a string or narrow strip of cloth through them. Also have the pressure gauge checked for accuracy to be sure your

processing temperature is high enough to keep the food from spoiling. (If you don't know how to check your pressure gauge, ask your Extension Home Economist.) If you have a weighted gauge on your pressure canner, clean it thoroughly. Check dial gauges for accuracy before use each year and replace if they read high by more than one pound at 5, 10, or 15 pounds of pressure. Low readings cause over-processing and may indicate that the gauge is inaccurate.

Make sure your canner is very clean. Wash it if you have not used it for some time, but don't put the cover in water. Wipe it with a clean, damp cloth and dry it well.

WATER BATH CANNERS - You can buy water bath canners for canning fruits and other high-acid content

foods. However, you can use any big metal container as long as it is deep enough for the water to be 2-4 inches over the tops of jars and still boil freely.

The canner must have a tight-fitting cover and a wire or wooden rack. If the rack has dividers, the jars will not touch each other or fall against the sides of the canner during processing.

Be sure that all glass canning jars and closures are in perfect condition. Discard any with cracks, chips, dents, or rust; defects prevent airtight seals. When you're buying lids, be sure to buy the ones that fit your jars - whether wide-mouth or regular.

Wash the glass jars, lids, and bands in hot, soapy water and rinse well. Metal lids with sealing compound on them may need boiling or holding in

boiling water for a few minutes.



John is married to Jennifer Martin Garrett. They are the parents of one son, Brian.





Children Grade School Clothing

Parents may pay for school clothes, but it is the children who test the clothing and decide whether it gets a passing grade or not.

The best way to ensure that children like their school clothes is to involve them in the selection process, said Dr. Beth Duncan, extension apparel and textiles specialist at Mississippi State University.

"Involve children in the selection process at the time of purchase and before each school day," Duncan said. "In addition to knowing that the child likes the clothing, this involvement can help build a healthy self concept."

Duncan said parents can encourage creativity and individualism, but need to realize that some conformity is natural. Children want to wear what is most popular among their classmates.

As parents help their children select clothing, they should look for durability, comfort and affordability.

"Select clothing that is sturdy enough to last through active school play times -- jeans with re-enforced knees, double stitched/secure seams, strong fasteners and tightly woven, sturdy fabric," she said.

Duncan said Mississippi's fall climate should not deceive shoppers into buying a lot of fall sweaters and heavy clothing.

"Mississippi's fall temperatures are hot, so cool clothing should be a priority," Duncan said. "To further

ensure comfort, make sure the clothes fit correctly and are not restrictive or too loose for active children."

Sizing is especially important in selecting back-to-school shoes. Duncan said the foot problems of adults often are the result of improperly fitted shoes when they were young.

Canvas, leather and manmade materials are the most common shoe materials. For children whose feet are still growing, Duncan recommended canvas shoes.

"Canvas is the easiest to maintain; just throw them in the washer and let them air dry," Duncan said. "Canvas shoes are also less expensive. The child will probably outgrow the shoes before they wear out."

Back-to-school clothing can be a major set back for a family's budget. Duncan recommended families itemize and prioritize needs to help control expenses. Select the best quality clothing that is within the family budget.

"High prices do not necessarily mean high quality. Secondhand clothing may have only been worn a few times by a fast-growing child," she said. "Don't rule out hand-me-down clothes from family or friends."

The Mississippi Environmental Quality Permit Board will hold a public hearing at 7:00 p.m. on September 17, 1992, at the Tishomingo County High School auditorium concerning the National Aeronautics & Space Administration (NASA). NASA has submitted an application to the Mississippi Department of Environmental Quality for a Permit to Construct a Thermal Treatment Area Open Burn Pad at their Yellow Creek Production Facility. This is not a major stationary source as defined by the Prevention of Significant Deterioration (PSD) Regulations, Regulation APC-S-5. NASA has also applied for a RCRA permit. This hearing will be a joint hearing concerning the RCRA application and the air emissions application.

The impact of the emissions of air contaminants from the project has been evaluated and the staff of the Permit Board believes that, with proper constraints and limitations on NASA, this project will operate within all State and Federal air pollution control laws and standards and will protect public health and welfare. Therefore, the staff of the Board has preliminarily decided, based on available information, to recommend to the Board that a permit be issued containing numerous regulatory constraints specifically stated in the draft permit. However, before proceeding further with the staff evaluation, public comments are being solicited. The staff recommendation to the Board, as well as the Board decision, will be made only after a thorough consideration of all public comments.

The Permit Board is created by Mississippi law for the purpose of issuing or denying, under such conditions and limitations as it may prescribe, environmental protection permits to control or prevent the release of contaminants into the air and water of the State. By law, the Board is composed of the Chief of the Office of Environmental Health of the State Department of Health; the Director of the Office of Fisheries and Wildlife of the Department of Wildlife, Fisheries & Parks; the Director of the Office of Land and Water Resources of the Department of Environmental Quality; the Supervisor of the State Oil and Gas Board, the Director of the Office of Marine Resources of the Department of Wildlife, Fisheries & Parks; the Director of the Office of Geology of the Department of Environmental Quality; and the Commissioner of Agriculture and Commerce.

The purpose of this hearing is to explain the proposed project and to receive comments from the public regarding the environmental aspects of the project and particularly the draft permit. Upon arrival at the public hearing, everyone will be asked to register and note if they expect to make a statement. Statements will be received in the order of registration (i.e., first to register will be first to give public comment). However, everyone will be given an opportunity to comment including those who indicated during registration that they did not expect to comment.

Persons commenting will not be limited to any specific time so long as the comments are reasonably concise and relate, at least generally, to the responsibility of the Permit Board. However, because a large number of people often wish to speak, comments should be as brief as reasonably possible and can be presented in writing if preferred. In order to help facilitate understanding between citizens and the Permit Board staff, the staff will attempt to answer questions at the hearing. However, such interchanges should be as brief as possible so that everyone who wants to speak has that opportunity as promptly as possible.

All comments made during this public hearing will be transcribed and made a part of the Permit Board file in this matter. Before making any decision, the Board will consider all issues and concerns raised regarding environmental protection. Any interested party aggrieved by the decision of the Permit Board may file a written request for a formal hearing before the Board. The Board will then hold a formal hearing, after which the Permit Board will make its final decision in the matter and any person aggrieved by that decision may appeal to the chancery court in the county of the proposed project.

In addition to commenting at the public hearing, anyone wishing to comment on this project can do so by mailing comments directly to Jay Barkley at the above Permit Board address. Such comments should be submitted as soon as possible; however, all comments will be considered so long as they are received by September 18, 1992.

NOTICE OF PROPOSED ISSUANCE OF A HAZARDOUS WASTE TREATMENT AND STORAGE PERMIT UNDER THE RESOURCE CONSERVATION AND RECOVERY ACT (RCRA), AS AMENDED BY THE HAZARDOUS SOLID WASTE AMENDMENTS OF 1984, AND THE MISSISSIPPI SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL ACT, TO THE NATIONAL AERONAUTICS & SPACE ADMINISTRATION (AS OWNER) AND LOCKHEED MISSILES & SPACE COMPANY (AS OPERATOR) FOR THE YELLOW CREEK PRODUCTION FACILITY NEAR IUKA IN TISHOMINGO COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI

The National Aeronautics & Space Administration (as owner) Lockheed Missiles & Space Company (as operator) have jointly submitted an application to the Mississippi Department of Environmental Quality and EPA to treat and store hazardous waste and for the investigation of waste management units for releases of hazardous constituents at Yellow Creek Production Facility located near Iuka in Tishomingo County, Mississippi. The Staff of the Mississippi Environmental Quality Permit Board and EPA, after reviewing the application and pertinent standards and regulations, have tentatively determined that a permit should be issued. This action is being proposed since the staff of the Permit Board and EPA have determined that the permit will be protective of public health and the environment.

The staff of the Permit Board and EPA believe that, with proper constraints and limitations contained within the proposed permit, this project will operate within all State and Federal hazardous waste laws and standards and will protect health and the environment. Therefore, the staff of the Permit Board and EPA have preliminarily decided, based upon available information, to recommend to the Board that a permit be issued containing numerous regulatory constraints specifically stated in the draft permit. However, before proceeding further with the staff evaluation, public comments are being solicited. The staff recommendation to the Board, as well as the Board's decision, will be made only after a thorough consideration of all public comments.

Concurrent with this action, comments are being solicited on proposed issuance of a State of Mississippi Air Pollution Control Permit. Information on this proposed permit and on the public comment process are also being published today in a separate notice.

Persons wishing to comment on the Board's and EPA's tentative decision are invited to submit comments to the Permit Board at the address no later than September 18, 1992. All comments received by that day will be considered in formulation of a final decision to issue the permit. Additionally, a public hearing will be held at 7:00 p.m. on September 19, 1992, in the auditorium of Tishomingo County High School, Highway 80 West, Iuka, Mississippi. All comments received will be considered in formulating a final decision.

On November 8, 1984, President Reagan signed the Hazardous and Solid Waste Amendments of 1984. These amendments to the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act have a number of provisions affecting hazardous waste permitting that are immediately effective for any facilities with RCRA hazardous waste permit had not been issued as of November 8, 1984. In addition, the provisions are applicable in all states whether or not a state has received interim or final authorization under RCRA.

The State of Mississippi has been granted authorization for those portions of the RCRA Hazardous Waste Program that were in effect prior to passage of the Hazardous and Solid Waste Amendments of 1984. The State of Mississippi has made the necessary program revisions and received authorization from the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) for those portions of the 1984 amendments. EPA will administer the requirements of the 1984 amendments.

EPA has determined that the National Aeronautics & Space Administration (NASA) and Lockheed Missiles & Space Company (LMSC) are subject to sections of the Amendments pertaining to prior/contingent releases from solid waste management units. EPA proposes to issue a permit to these entities for the applicable Amendments.

The draft EPA permit includes procedures for NASA and LMSC to investigate potential releases from solid waste management units located at Yellow Creek property. If releases of hazardous constituents from solid waste management units have occurred, NASA and LMSC must perform corrective action according to the procedures stated in the permit. NASA and LMSC submitted a permit application to treat and store hazardous waste under RCRA. Mississippi Department of Environmental Quality (MDEQ) in conjunction with the EPA reviewed the initial application and sent comments to NASA and LMSC. These entities revised the application and submitted it to MDEQ and EPA. The revised application was determined to be complete under 40 CFR and MHWMR Part 270, and is being placed before the public for a 45-day comment period.

All comments received during the public comment period or at the hearing will be considered in the formulation of final determinations regarding the permits. After consideration of all written and oral comments, requirements and policies of RCRA, and appropriate regulations, the EPA Regional Administrator and the Permit Board will make their decision regarding permit issuance. All persons submitting comments will be notified by the EPA Regional Administrator and the Permit Board of final permit decisions. If the determinations are substantially changed, the EPA Regional Administrator and the State Director will issue a joint public notice indicating the revised determinations.



New School Offers A New Beginning

Moving to a new school, whether the move is from across town or across the nation, can evoke many feelings for the "new kid," especially fear or apprehension at the prospect of making new friends and not fitting in.

But before fear takes control, the student should take control, said Dr. Ann Jarratt, youth development specialist with the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service at Mississippi State University.

"Moving to a new school offers a new beginning," Jarratt said. "This is a wonderful opportunity to look at what you may have been unhappy about at the old school, learn from those things, and leave them behind. This is the chance to practice all the new things you want to be and do."

Jarratt said if parents and children believe the new school will be a positive experience, it probably will be.

"They must keep a good attitude. Look at what is to be gained such as new teachers, new classes and new opportunities for extracurricular activities such as band, student governments or athletics," she said.

"Make the assumption that each new teacher will be prepared, supporting, willing to help and interested in you. If you go into class with these assumptions, they are more likely to be proven true than not," Jarratt said.

Good relationships with teachers begin by meeting their expectations, being interested in what they are teaching and talking with them so they have the opportunity to get to know you.

"Play the observer for a while. Find out which people or groups seem to have the same interests and beliefs as you, and then reach out to them," Jarratt said. "Don't sit back and wait for them to reach out to you. This is an opportunity to meet new people and make friends who share your interests."

When it comes to selecting extracurricular activities, Jarratt said students should select one or two things that interest them the most, but don't get so caught up in new adventures that they get over extended.

"Parents and students should be supportive of school activities, and it is especially important that parents support the choices their children make," Jarratt said. "That support may mean providing transportation, renting a musical instrument or just being present for an activity."

The specialist said parents also should be observant of possible problems at school and be willing to talk with counselors or teachers.

"Parents need to view the school as their partner in making their child's school experience a positive one," Jarratt said.


