Benderman - Yarbrough In Run-off August 25th

The federally mandated special election held to fill seats in the Mississippi House of Representatives and Senate resulted in high incumbent totals.

In the race for the District I House of Representatives seat, unofficial totals place Harvey Benderman of Corinth incumbent, first with 1,054 votes. He will square off against David Yarbrough of luka, who had 443 votes, in the August 25 run-off. The winner of that election will face Republican J.R. Long of luka in the November 3 general election. Candidate Lamar Skinner of Burnsville received 359 votes and Richard Dobbs of luka received 311 votes.

In the District 19 House race, incumbent Bill Wheeler of Belmont finished ahead of opponent Guyton Hinds of Mantachie with a vote of 1288 to 757. Wheeler will face Republican L.C. Kitchens in November.

The unofficial totals in the state Senate, District 5 Democratic race saw John White of Baldwyn, incumbent, garnering 71 percent of the vote. White received 3,444 votes to democratic opponent, Fulton's Perry Rather's 1414.

The District 5 Republican race saw Mark A. Hatfield of Booneville receiving 181 votes with William McCrary of Baldwyn receiving 89 votes. White and Hatfield will square off in the November 3 general election.

All totals are unofficial.

School Immunizations Tuesday, August 11th

The Tishomingo County Health Department will be having a special day for school immunizations on Tuesday, August 11th from 8 a.m. until 4 p.m.

Children entering kindergarten must have either a temporary compliance form that proves they've received the first series of shots or a certificate of Immunization Compliance, also called the "blue slip" that verifies all shots plus the booster have been given.

Children transferring to Mississippi schools from out-of-state must also provide proof of immunizations.

MSDH recommends but does not require a second dose of MMR (measles, mumps, and rubella) vaccine for all children entering school this fall.

Senate Works To **Renew ASRM Funds**

The Advanced Solid Rocket Motor plant at Yellow Creek failed to received funding from the U.S. House of Representatives Wednesday, July 29, but was included in a Senate bill Friday, July 31, which recommended

a portion of the initial funding. The House voted 249-159 to kill the ASRM project. Rep. Wayne Owens, D-Utah, offered an amendment to NASA's appropriations bill to cut the ASRM project. Reports indicate that Owens is running for the U.S. Senate in Utah where the Morton-Thiokol Company is the sole producer of the redesigned rocket boosters presently in use by NASA. The ASRM would replace those boosters and eliminate

the need for the Utah-made rockets. The Senate Appropriations Committee, chaired by Sen. Barbara Mikulski, D-Md., restored partial funding to the project. Although only \$50 million of the requested \$480 million was included, this will allow Senate supporters to work for the passage of the bill. The bill will be voted on later this month. It will also allow for work toward increased funding when it goes to a House & Senate conference committee sometime in September.

U.S. Senators from Mississippi, Thad Cochran (R) and Trent Lott (R) began working to keep the plant on the budget for fiscal 1993.

Approximately 750 people are presently working on the planning of the rocket with about 500 working in construction at the site.

Congressman Jamie Whitten (D-Miss.) chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, said that efforts to continue the ASRM plant will continue despite the House vote. "We were extremely disappointed that our colleagues voted against a very sound program," he said. "Our committee recommended \$480

he restored as the bill now goes to the Senate and then to Conference Committee."

The advanced solid rocket motor project came into being following the 1986 explosion of the space shuttle Challenger, on the recommendation of the Presidential Commission of the Space Shuttle Challenger Accident and NASA. However, neither NASA officials nor President George Bush included funding for the ASRM plant in the fiscal year 1993 NASA budget proposals. Reports indicated that language was left in Bush's budget that would keep the program alive with the condition that Congress was able to secure funding.

Approximately \$1.2 billion has already been spent on the research and development, as well as construction of the facility. According to reports, this is almost half of the total amount of the entire project. If the project is cut, it will mean a waste of close to \$2.4 billion by the federal government on two separate projects-ASRM and the canned Yellow **Creek Nuclear Plant.**

Whitten concluded that "It is essential that funds for this project be restored. It is important to our people in northeast Mississippi, Alabama, and Tennessee, to the Nation and to the future of NASA's space program.

Senator Trent Lott said in a statement issued Thursday, July 30, that "while the House vote was disappointing and a set back, we are committed to saving ASRM in the Senate so the matter can be favorably resolved in conference. I am very hopeful that we'll be able to save ASRM."

Cochran Comments

U.S. Senator Thad Cochran (R-

propriations Committee's approval of his proposal to provide funding for operations and construction of the Advanced Solid Rocket Motor Plant in luka, Mississippi:

"This is a great victory. The Senate Appropriations Committee reversed an earlier decision made by a subcommittee and provided funds to continue the construction of the Advanced Solid Rocket Motor facility at luka

"We hope to be able to resolve this issue in conference with the House of **Representatives Appropriations** Committee members when the bill gets through the Senate.

"The Senate Committee approved \$50 million to keep the project underway until we can resolve this issue with the House. We think that we're going to be able to achieve success.

"We were encouraged today, particularly in view of the last couple of days that have put this project in jeopardy. The unexpected amendment offered in the House of Representatives dealt a very serious setback to the project, but the program is now back on track. We can continue to negotiate with the Administration and with the House of Representatives to get the funding problem solved.

"We're working with all members of the Mississippi delegation and with Senators in the area, Tennessee and Alabama in particular, to try to make sure that we get this issue behind us and we keep this program going."

"There are very compelling and good arguments for the continuation of this project. The fact that the government has invested such a sizeable amount of money in this plant and in this site is a very strong argument in favor of continuing the ASRM facility and program. Other persuasive arguments in favor of con-

Six Counties to Benefit From ARC Landfill Grant

The Northeast Mississippi Solid Waste Management Authority has been awarded a \$460,000 grant from the Appalachian Regional Commission, according to the state's U.S. senators.

U.S. Senators Trent Lott and Thad Cochran, both R-Miss., said the grant will be used for the improvement of an existing sanitary landfill in the six county Northeast Mississippi Planning and Development District.

"This landfill serves more than 132,000 residents in Alcorn, Benton, Marshall, Prentiss, Tippah and Tishomingo Counties," Lott said. "This grant will help to improve the existing landfill and bring it up to today's federal environmental standards."

The Landfill improvements will include groundwater monitoring wells, a liner and leachate collection system, scales, a small office and fencing around the site.

The Northeast Mississippi Solid Waste Management Authority will contribute \$158,524 to the overall project for an adjusted budget and project cost of \$618,524.

Belmont Plant Changes Ownership

Kaydee Metals, a furniture manufacturing plant located in Belmont, was purchased Monday, July 3, by Falcon Products, Inc.

The St. Louis, MO-based company specializes in furniture manufacturing, sales and national and international marketing.

Frank Jacobs, Chairman of the **Board, President and Chief Executive** Officer of Falcon, explained that his company was interested in expanding its metal chair production and the purchase of Kaydee would make that possible. "Kaydee will now be a subsidiary of Falcon. We are a good sales and marketing company and our present sales are about \$50 million a year. Most of our metal chairs were coming from Italy. Now we'll be able to make them here," Jacobs said.

The buy-out of the company means

good news for the employment outlook of the area. According to now former owner of Kaydee, Alan Rubin, the increase of sales should be around 30 to 35 percent, meaning that the plant will need 30 to 35 percent more employees over the next year. Rubin and all other current employees will be retained with the additional employees being hired locally. "We intend to hire local people to fill both white and blue collar jobs," Jacobs stated.

The transition should begin within the next two months. Kaydee, which was established in 1969, presently employs approximately 180 workers with about \$14 million sales annually.

Besides Falcon's home office in St. Louis and the newly acquired Belmont plant, the corporation has facilities in Juarez, Chic., Mexico; Newport, Tenn.; and Louisville, Ark. They have showrooms in New York, Chicago, Los Angeles and Just outside Paris, France. There are also representatives for the company in practically every country in western Europe and also countries such as Hong Kong, and Japan, just to name a few.

Falcon not only specializes in furniture, but also in interiors. "We do the complete interiors of businesses and many of the major chains such as Kentucky Fried Chicken, Taco Bell, Red Lobster, Denny's, etc. We will go in and design the entire business interior and put it in place or remodel an old interior," Jacobs said.

Belmont Mayor Bob Yarber stated that he believes that the transfer to Falcon will be greatly beneficial to the town and surrounding areas. "We are glad to see industry in the area growing," Yarber commented. According to Yarber it is industries such as this which keeps Belmont's unemployment much lower than the county average.

Rubin said a special thanks should go to the town of Belmont and to the local supervisors who helped the company's transition go quickly and smoothly.

also been a couple of reports in Tishomingo County. These insects prefer lush green grasses or grass crops such as grain sorghum but when this is not available they will migrate or move in masses, hence the name "army" worm, to other areas looking for food. High populations can be devastating. They feed mostly at night but will be active during overcast days. Control can be difficult, especially if you are dealing with large worms. Sevin, malathion, chlorpyrifos, methyl parathion, and methomyl "depending on label restrictions" can be used. Be on the lookout and call if you need help. FORAGE ESTABLISHMENT

If you plan to establish cool season forages such as fescue, ryegrass, legumes, or mixtures then start planning now. The first step is to determine the fertilizer and lime requirements by taking a good random soil sample. Lime needs to be applied as soon as possible to allow time for the pH to adjust as much as possible before planting this fall. Use quality seed and plant at the proper time. We have an information sheet that shows varieties, planting dates and rates. Call or stop by and pick one up. Tilled seedbeds should be relatively firm after lime and fertilizer is applied especially for small seeded forages like the clovers. If a large amount of weeds have been tilled into the soil, allow enough time for decay since this will harbor insects and can tie up plant nutrients. Fields should be smoothed so that harvest will be more efficient and equipment damage is held to a minimum in futue years. For more information contact the Extension Office at 423-7016. Parents Form Partnerships With Teachers

A partnership attitude between parents and teachers can increase educational achievements and decrease discipline problems in the classroom.

Early and regular parent-teacher communication is the key to avoiding problems during the school year, said Dr. Ann Jarratt, youth development specialist with the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service at Mississippi State University.

"Every teacher deserves the opportunity to be known individually by the parent and not judged solely on the words of the child," Jarratt said. "With regular communication between the parents and teachers, report card grades should not be a big surprise."

One of the best things for parents to do is to get involved by attending school open house events, joining schools's parent-teacher the organization, chaperoning field trips and assisting with class parties.

"Parents can help teachers by organizing study times and places in the home and monitoring their child's homework," Jarratt said. "Teachers who view the parents as their partners in the child's education can alert the parents to problems early and work together to assist the student."

The youth specialist said there is a psychological benefit for the child who sees these significant people work together in the student's best interest.

'Parents should teach respect of authority figures at home and practice positive discipline," Jarratt said. "Children should know the rules and be expected to follow them. Parents should be consistent with discipline and have logical consequences for not following rules."

There is no such thing as perfect parents, perfect children/students or perfect teachers. When differences of opinion arise, Jarratt said those involved need to explain their concerns in a non-accusatory way.

"When a parent disagrees with the teacher, he or she should avoid verbally blaming the teacher," she said. "By approaching the problem through positive communication, the strengths of the teacher and the parent can be directed toward helping the child."

Parents can try to help teachers' understand their children's weaknesses and strengths, then they can work together to help the children succeed.

"Although the parent and/or child may not agree with something the teacher does, children need to learn that adapting to different people is part of life," Jarratt said. "Students should realize that disagreeing with the teacher is not a reason to skip class or not to try to do well."

They Keep Going And Going...

Female students going to The University of Mississippi this fall mark the 110th year that women have been attending Ole Miss. Though they didn't have women's dormitories for another decade or so -- female students were not allowed to live on campus, except in faculty members' residences -- they were admitted on the same basis as men beginning in 1882, becoming one of the first three universities in the South to admit women. The first graduating class with women was three years later in 1885.

Hold on. Better advice: Be prepared.

The issue popping up again is the worn-out question of the operations of county road systems.

Voters in forty-six counties told their county supervisors in the 1989 elections to forget the beat system, forget five road systems per county, forget five road crews and five sets of expensive equipment.

Voters in those forty-six counties chose the proven savings and efficiencies of the unit system of county road operations -- a single system -over the traditional, but wasteful, beat system.

The 1989 law provided that once the elections on county unit were over, they were over for five years. The unit system would be given time to prove its worth.

Then, in a reversal, the 1992 Legislature changed the rules. Legislators agreed to elections on county unit this year.

The law now provides that 15 percent of the voters in a county, or 1,500 voters -- whichever is less -- may petition for a county unit election this fall.

Deadline for the filing of petitions is September 4.

The word is out. Some county supervisors want the unit systems to fail. Some still want to work as road foremen, ignoring the various other duties of the office. Some still want to purchase equipment, control the jobs, just divide the money five ways, regardless of countywide priorities.

Those who do are quietly making the rounds, quietly circulating petitions, gearing up for November elections.

debate these days focuses on the right of choice in our society. Arguments fly back and forth about this right, and the arguments are as varied as the issues on which they focus.

One of those issues is choice in education, and it has been a strong point of contention within the ranks of educators and parents across Mississippi.

In an effort to provide more information on the subject, the Mississippi Economic Council has released a report entitled "The Issue is Choice." The result of a two-year study on choice in education, the MEC report reaches the conclusion that greater choice in Mississippi's public school system will work to strengthen the schools.

According to the report, two necessary ingredients for improved education include greater parental involvement and the creation of competition within the school system. The report also calls for returning

Recognizing the fact that then are some forms of choice already in place in Mississippi schools, the MEC report provides the following recommendations:

1. Parents should be given the choice of enrolling their children in any public school in any school district, consistent with federal guidelines, with state funds to follow the student.

2. Local school districts should be given the authority and responsibility for adopting their own curricula for meeting the needs of students, consistent with state accreditation requirements.

3. Local school districts should be given the authority to define their own missions, within state accreditation requirements.

4. Local schools should have the flexibility to employ teachers deemed accomplished in their fields, even though such teachers may not have completed professional education courses for certification. The goal College Registration time



August. WIC provides nutritious food to some 110,000 women and children, including some 30,000 infants.

"Mothers give their babies so much more than food when they breast-feed," said Debbie Webb, WIC breast-feeding promotion coordinator. "Babies get some immunities against disease and a perfect balance of vitamins and minerals for their first months of life. And, economically, breast-feeding is a great benefit, especially for lowincome families."

Webb works with other WIC staff members to create programs to encourage breast-feeding. One of the most successful -- peer counseling -has drawn attention at the regional level.

Acting USDA Regional Director Charlie Simmons, Supplemental Food Programs, said peer counseling is one of the best ways of providing breast-feeding support.

Simmons said that the Department of Agriculture, the administrative agency for the WIC Program, supports increasing breast-feeding rates. But, he said, "it's only through the efforts of individual states, like Mississippi, that this goal can be realized.

State breast-feeding promotion leaders met in Jackson July 23 for the first meeting of the Breast-feeding Promotion Coalition. The group discussed barriers mothers face in breast-feeding; they'll also look for ways to overcome those barriers.

Quite simply, the bills would allow workers to receive up to 12 weeks of unpaid leave a year to take care of a new baby, sick spouse or an aged parent. Most importantly, employees in this predicament would know that their jobs would be waiting for them when they return.

But the most attractive feature of this bill lies in the fact that it won't cost taxpayers a single penny - a rarity in today's world. Far from being a burden on business, the legislation sets a minimum standard of decency and financial protection for America's families by requiring businesses with more than 50 employees to provide limited periods of unpaid leave to employees in cases of birth or adoption of a child, and serious personal or family illness.

Seniors, parents and children all stand to benefit from this legislation. In the case of seniors, family members providing care to sick and frail elderly parents too often are forgotten and overlooked. Yet, these family members are making an invaluable contribution to the independence and dignity of older Americans.

The bottome line is that family caregivers need and deserve a safety net of protection so that their jobs and livelihood are not threatened when a family crisis occurs.

So what are we waiting for? Enacting the Family and Medical Leave Act will extend a helping hand to struggling families in their time of need. Your representatives in Congress need to hear from you now.

Building An Urban Center

Mississippi, like all states, is engaged in a constant effort to attract new and expanding industries. And, like those other states, our success or failure in that effort is dependent on several factors.

Those factors vary along a wide spectrum -- from availability of a skilled workforce to access to decent schools, from proximity to major markets to attractive tax incentives, from fair governmental regulations to a state that is simply eager to do business.

Memphis, New Orleans and Mobile are Mississippi's major urban centers. These are the big cities that attract business and industry, that attract our college graduates to bigger salaries and job potential.

We aren't far from having a vibrant, forward-looking urban center in Mississippi. Our capital city of Jackson, with its colleges and graudate schools, its performing arts and its growing reputation as a transportation hub, has much to offer. The Gulf Coast is growing as an international port of entry and is well located for further growth, both areas have great potential, and the continued development of one of them should be a priority with the state.

At the same time, jobs can often be jeopardized by a family emergency. For instance, can you imagine the. added burden to suddenly having to care for a sick child or ailing parent, or perhaps the birth of a child, as well as juggling work and family? Not only is it not easy, but many employees in such predicaments fear that they will lose their jobs if they take time off to provide the necessary care.

Public policy currently provides little or no support to sustain them through what can be an overwhelming physical, emotional and financial burden. That is why we need to ensure job protection rights for employees caring for seriously ill members of their family, as well as for those caring for newborn or adopted children.

The Family and Medical Leave Act of 1990 would have provided just. these guarantees. It was passed by Congress last year, but was later vetoed by the President.

I am happy to report that the legislation is back this year and off to a fast start in Congress. In the House of Representatives, the new bill, H.R. 2 with Rep. William Clay of Missouri as its chief sponsor, was the second piece of legislation introduced this







HOME CANNING Many Tishomingo County 4-H'ers have selected "FOOD PRESER-VATION" as their main project and are out to beat inflation with a garden

you're canning. For fruits, tomatoes, and pickled vegetables, use a boiling water bath canner. These foods contain enough acid to be safely processed in boiling water.

STEAM PRESSURE CANNERS . For common vegetables except tomatoes, use a steam pressure canner. Processing these low-acid foods safely in a reasonable length of time takes a temperature higher than a boiling water bath.

Before you use a steam pressure canner, be sure to check out all parts for safe operation during canning. Before and during the canning season, clean the petcock and safetyvalve openings by drawing a string or narrow strip of cloth through them. Also have the pressure gauge checked for accuracy to be sure your

processing temperature is high enough to keep the food from spoiling. (If you don't know how to check your pressure gauge, ask your Extension Home Economist.) If you have a weighted gauge on your pressure canner, clean it thoroughly. Check dial gauges for accuracy before use each year and replace if they read high by more than one pound at 5, 10, or 15 pounds of pressure. Low readings cause overprocessing and may indicate that the gauge is inaccurate.

Make sure your canner is very clean. Wash it if you have not used it for some time, but don't put the cover in water. Wipe it with a clean, damp cloth and dry it well.

WATER BATH CANNERS - You can buy water bath canners for canning fruits and other high-acid content

foods. However, you can use any big metal container as long as it is deep enough for the water to be 2-4 inches over the tops of jars and still boil feely.

The canner must have a tightfitting cover and a wire or wooden rack. If the rack has dividers, the jars will not touch each other or fall against the sides of the canner during processing.

Be sure that all glass canning jars and closures are in perfect condition. Discard any with cracks, chips, dents, or rust; defects prevent airtight seals. When you're buying lids, be sure to buy the ones that fit your jars . whether wide-mouth or regular.

Wash the glass jars, lids, and bands in hot, soapy water and rinse well. Metal lids with sealing compound on them may need boiling or holding in

boiling water for a few minutes. For more information on home canning call your county Extension office at 423-7016.

botulism are always threats to home anning. To produce home canned oods that are safe to eat, always use the right equipment.

When you can fruits and regetables, heat them to a high enough temperature for a long nough time to destroy spoilage and stop enzyme action. Do this processing either in a boiling water bath canner or a steam ressure canner. The type of canner you use depends on the kind of food

The apostle Peter says, ".. Beware lest you also fall from your own stee fastness, being led away with the error of the wicked ..." (II Pet. 3:17)





New School Offers A New Beginning

Moving to a new school, whether the move is from across town or across the nation, can evoke many feelings for the "new kid," especially fear or apprehension at the prospect of making new friends and not fitting in.

But before fear takes control, the student should take control, said Dr. Ann Jarratt, youth development specialist with the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service at Mississippi State University.

"Moving to a new school offers a new beginning," Jarratt said. "This is a wonderful opportunity to look at what you may have been unhappy about at the old school, learn from those things, and leave them behind. This is the chance to practice all the new things you want to be and do."

Jarratt said if parents and children believe the new school will be a positive experience, it probably will be.

"They must keep a good attitude. Look at what is to be gained such as new teachers, new classes and new opportunities for extracurricular activities such as band, student governments or athletics," she said.

"Make the assumption that each new teacher will be prepared, supporting, willing to help and interested in you. If you go into class with these assumptions, they are more likely to be proven true than not," Jarratt said.

Good relationships with teachers begin by meeting their expectations, being interested in what they are teaching and talking with them so they have the opportunity to get to know you.

"Play the observer for a while. Find out which people or groups seem to have the same interests and beliefs as you, and then reach out to them." Jarratt said. "Don't sit back and wait for them to reach out to you. This is an opportunity to meet new people and make friends who share your interests."

When it comes to selecting extracurricular activities, Jarratt said students should select one or two things that interest them the most, but don't get so caught up in new adventures that they get over extended.

"Parents and students should be supportive of school activities, and it is especially important that parents support the choices their children make," Jarratt said. "That support may mean providing transportation, renting a musical instrument or just being present for an activity."

The specialist said parents also should be observant of possible problems at school and be willing to talk with counselors or teachers.

"Parents need to view the school as their partner in making their child's school experience a positive one," Jarratt said.
