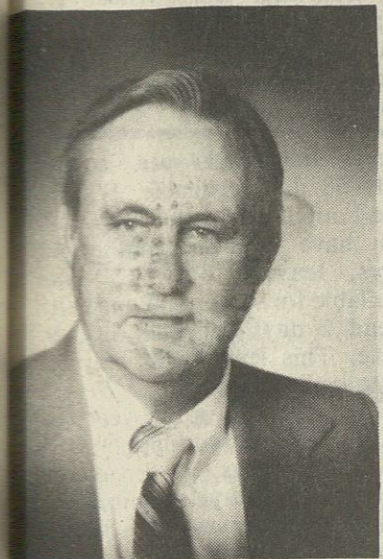

Rep. Harvey Benderman Takes First Step In Journey



Incumbent District One Representative Harvey Benderman announced his candidacy for re-election to the post he has held since January of this year. Benderman is the Democratic nominee.

"I want to express my appreciation to the voters of District 1 who have supported me through this campaign. Running for public office is a privilege, and I have been very fortunate to have had tremendous confidence displayed in me during five elections in the past year," said Benderman. "With the support and guidance of those who live in Mississippi's Number One District, I've taken the first step in what traditionally is a four year journey. Having made this first step, I am eager and better prepared to make the longer strides necessary to affect positive change in our area. I hope the voters of this district will allow me to continue in the role of serving them."

"The 1992 legislature presented both the privilege of representing this district and a significant number of challenges," said the first term legislator. "The committees on which I served, Education, Transportation, Agriculture, Municipalities, and Investigation of State Offices are among those which will have the greatest impact on the quality of life for Mississippians and the future of our state."

"The past legislative session saw some significant accomplishments. One of the most important was a bill that earmarked

over one hundred million dollars for education only. This bill also returns thirty million to counties to help lower your ad valorem taxes for schools. For the first time, the state cannot budget over 98% of projected revenues. This 2% cushion should help prevent cuts similar to the ones that occurred last fall and earlier this year.

A new program was approved to assist beginning farmers which we believe will be an important boost to Mississippi's agricultural industry. The plan is designed to encourage people to go into farming by making funds available at lower interest rates to first-time farmers for specified purposes.

We passed a tough new DUI bill. One of the key provisions will allow the department of public safety to confiscate a person's care when convicted of drunk driving three or more times. Another new bill calls for maximum utilization of prison farmlands for the purpose of feeding prisoners using inmate labor. We returned the vote to you on issues like state lottery, term limitations for the lieutenant governor and initiative and referendum.

I have tried to bring state government back to the people by having community meetings during the 1992 legislative session. Serving the people of the district for the past eight months has strengthened my commitment to moving Mississippi forward. This past session saw progress on key issues. It also saw a healthy amount of conflicts of ideas. It is in this marketplace of ideas where our democracy is most effective. I hope to use the insights gained by being a participant in that marketplace to serve the people of District One during the coming three years.

I urge each of the voters in District One to aid me in representing our district. Your comments are always welcome and I am here to represent you. If I am unable to visit with each of you before the election, I hope you will go to the polls on November 3, 1992, and vote for Harvey Benderman, in order that I might continue to make positive changes concerning the key issues in our legislature."

County Constable Sued For \$2.25 Million

Tishomingo County constable Joe Moyers and his bonding company are being sued for \$2.25 million in federal court by a Marietta man.

According to reports, Anthony R. Webb is suing Moyers for injuries sustained on June 30 while being arrested in Tishomingo County at a camping area known as the Steel Bridge.

Booneville attorney Thomas Comer filed a complaint in Northern District Federal Court charging that Moyers illegally attempted to arrest Webb on misdemeanor charges of possession of beer and public drunkenness when he knew the Prentiss County man was not guilty of a misdemeanor offense.

The suit states that during the arrest, Moyers shot Webb with a shotgun and then refused to offer the wounded man aid or to let anyone else offer him aid. The suit continues that Moyers proceeded to carry the plain-clothed Webb to the hospital and refused to administer any first aid during such time" and when arriving at the hospital, the suit says Moyers ordered Webb out of his car and left him alone to enter the hospital to seek treatment for his wounds.

Excessive physical force in the light of the circumstances of the arrest is a charge in the lawsuit.

Webb is demanding \$1 million in punitive damages, \$1 million in

compensatory damages, plus attorney fees and costs incurred. He is also asking the Western Surety company--Moyers' official bonding company--for \$25,000, the full amount of the constable's bond.

The complaint filed gives only Webb's grievances. Moyers will be able to present his side of the story in a court hearing.

\$360 Million Approved For Yellow Creek ASRM Project

The future of NASA's Advanced Solid Rocket Motor program at Yellow Creek looks much brighter after U.S. Congressman Jamie Whitten (D-Miss.), Chairman of the House Committee on Appropriations, announced Tuesday, September 24, that \$360 million was agreed upon by a House of Representatives/Senate appropriations conference committee for the project.

Congressman Whitten said conferees on the Veterans Administration, HUD and Independent Agencies Appropriations Bill provided \$195 million for development of the Solid Rocket Motor and \$165 million for construction of the plant facility.

Tishomingo County Development Foundation's Executive Director Mack Lloyd Wadkins stated that he believes that it was the influence that Congressman Whitten projected that played a major role in securing funding for the rocket. "Thanks to his efforts, construction on the ASRM will continue," Wadkins said.

Congressman Whitten stated that "our bill ensures that the important project at Yellow Creek will continue. I appreciate my colleagues on both sides and in the conference working with us to ensure continued funding for the ASRM project."

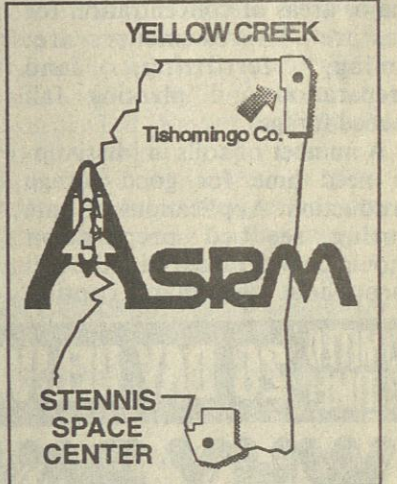
Congressman Whitten again pointed out to his colleagues that ASRM was developed after the

Challenger Shuttle tragedy in 1986 on the recommendation of the Presidential Commission on the Space Shuttle Challenger Accident and NASA. The recommendation was made to improve shuttle safety and reliability, to increase shuttle payload by 30

percent and to replace all asbestos materials.

"I am proud of the work our Committee has done in working out a bill that provides for the needs of several agencies while staying within the budget limitations," Whitten stated. "I am gratified that the conference committee agreed with us on the importance of the ASRM project."

When finished, the conference report goes to the House and Senate for approval.



Groundbreaking Planned For New Hospital Facility

A groundbreaking ceremony will be held at 4:00 p.m. October 1 for Iuka Hospital, which will be located on the west side of Iuka about one mile from the present hospital site.

The construction site is located at the intersection of Highway 25 South and Curtis Drive in Iuka at the entrance to Independence Square Subdivision.

John D. Hicks, president of North Mississippi Health Services, will join Mississippi

Governor Kirk Fordice to preside over the ceremony. NMHS is the parent company of Tishomingo Health Services, owner and operator of Iuka Hospital, and North Mississippi Medical Center in Tupelo. The hospital is being constructed by and will be managed by Tishomingo Health Services.

Construction of the new Iuka Hospital will take approximately 15 months, NMHC officials said. The new 41,000-square-foot

hospital will include 40 private hospital rooms dedicated to general acute care, and eight beds designated for an Intensive Care Unit.

The new hospital will be constructed with funds from a \$2.6 million Mississippi Major Economic Impact Authority Grant coupled with \$3.2 million from North Mississippi Health Services.

"Iuka Hospital will be a model facility offering a wide range of

services close to home for Tishomingo area residents and immediate access to a full range of subspecialty medical services at North Mississippi Medical Center," Hicks said.

NMMC's affiliation with the current Iuka Hospital began in 1987. The goal of NMHS' Affiliated Hospital System is to strengthen health care in rural areas and to provide health care in a comprehensive regional manner, NMHC officials said.

Paden Man Killed In Crash

A Paden man was killed early Wednesday morning, September 23, in a wreck near Tishomingo.

According to Tishomingo County Sheriff Johnny Nunley, Charles W. "Dude" Wilson, 30, was traveling toward Hwy. 25 on County Road 123 near Tishomingo when he apparently lost control of his pickup truck. The truck left the road and crashed into a tree.

The Sheriff's Department responded to the accident at 2:40 a.m. The Midway Jaws of Life was called to the scene, Nunley said.

A female passenger in the vehicle at the time of the accident was transported by helicopter to Tupelo. No details about her condition or other details about the wreck were available at press time.

Tishomingo County Deputy Donald Deaton investigated the accident.

Accidental Shooting Kills North Crossroads Man

A North Crossroads man was killed as the result of an accidental shooting Monday, September 21.

Willard Wood, 69, was found near his barn at his residence on Hwy. 365 dead from a gunshot wound, according to Tishomingo County Sheriff Johnny Nunley.

Nunley said that it appears that the fatal wound was made by a 16 gauge shotgun that accidentally discharged into Wood's chest.

The Sheriff's Department was called at approximately 5:00 p.m.

The body has been sent to Jackson for an autopsy. (Obit. pg. 10)

September Is The Month To Improve Pastures

September and October are generally considered to be good times to perform numerous types of pasture improvements. Some major areas of concentration for pasture improvements are: liming, fertilizing, land preparation and planting fall seeded forages.

A number of soils in Mississippi need lime for good forage production. Applications of lime during seedbed preparation should be well mixed with the soil throughout the plant rooting

zone. A good mixture of lime with soil will usually correct soil pH for an extended period of time. A soil pH between 5.6 and 6.5 usually produces the best forage growth.

A good forage growth is determined by an effective fertilizing system. Fall is a good time to apply mixed fertilizer to soils that commonly need phosphorus and potassium. A soil test will help you determine the needs of your soil.

Fall is also a good time to correct soil drainage problems. The Soil Conservation Service in your area can provide information and assistance in ad-

ressing these drainage problems.

Conservationists also suggest a survey of your livestock during these months. Livestock producers are especially interested in information on developing forage management systems that will allow them to cut feed bills and ultimately boost profits. Livestock producers generally agree that effective winter grazing programs can best facilitate this effort.

Forages of small grains, ryegrass, clovers and mixtures of these are usually planted during September and October. This is also a good time to seed tall fescue because during this time a better root system is established.

Winter pastures are important and can be profitable but sometimes do not produce to their full potential. It is imperative that producers utilize the proper techniques and know-how in preparing winter pastures. It should be noted that legumes added to your mixture in winter pastures will improve the quality of forage and reduce the amount of nitrogen fertilizer needed for efficient productions.

When asked about the effect of Hurricane Andrew on winter pasture preparation, Dave Sanders, SCS assistant state resource conservationist, said that the rains in Mississippi that resulted from the hurricane would probably have a positive effect in that the rain would provide needed moisture to the pastures.

Farm Safety

The week of September 23, 1992 is Farm Safety Week. Since autumn is the most dangerous time of the year for farm families, Farmers Home Administration wants to remind farmers to keep safety "first" in their hurried schedules. Farming is one of the oldest and most important occupations in existence. Unfortunately, it is also the most dangerous.

In recent years, farming has surpassed mining and construction as the nation's deadliest occupation. Due to this startling fact, farm accident prevention has become a major issue. Each year, thousands of adults and children die or are injured in farming accidents. These accidents may be due to out-dated, unsafe equipment or just plain carelessness. However, some mishaps involving children may be a result of something else—curiosity. To children, the farm is a huge playground. Climbing, hiding and exploring are their entertainment. Sometimes this sense of adventure can be disastrous, resulting in death or serious injury. Did you realize that each year over 300 children under the age of 16 die from farm related accidents; more than 25,000 children are injured each year; and that a week rarely passes

without a child being killed in a farm accident?

For the past three years, Farmers Home Administration has been involved with Farm Safety for "Just Kids", a non profit organization to help prevent farm-related accidents involving children. It was founded by Marilyn Adams of Earlham, Iowa, following the death of her eleven-year-old son, Keith in a farm accident. The goal of "Just Kids" is to educate concerned persons, organizations and groups about the importance of farm safety. Please contact our office for more information on Farm Safety for "Just Kids". Home Economics Tips

TIPS FOR STRAIGHTENING FABRIC

September is National Home Sewing Month. With children back in school and the family settling back into a regular routine, it's a good time to sew, whenever the opportunity presents itself.

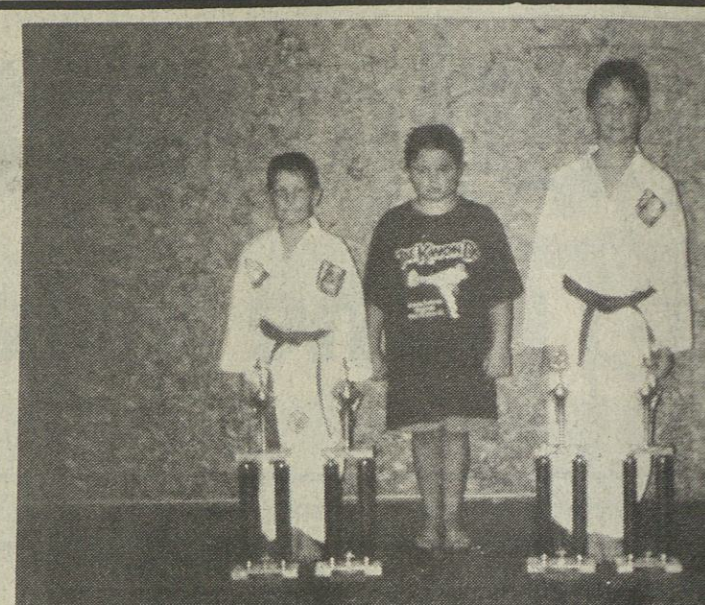
One of the first challenges facing the home sewer is to evaluate the grain of the fabric (determine whether the fabric is cut on or off grain). Woven fabric cut off grain will not hang as well as the pattern or fabric designers intended. To straighten fabric, one can perform a tug-of-war technique which involves getting a partner and pulling the fabric back on grain, or straighten the fabric by the washing machine method.

The bias tug-of-war methods starts with pulling threads (one at a time) on each end of the fabric until one pulls across the entire width of the fabric. Next the two diagonals of the rectangle fabric are measured to determine which diagonal is shorter. The tug-of-war is done to lengthen the shorter diagonal line. The pulling is done along the entire length of the fabric.

The machine method can be used with washable fabrics and does not require a partner. Start by pulling a thread on both cut ends of the fabric as described for the first method. Then fold the fabric with right sides in so that the right selvege is directly over the left selvege, matching crosswise threads. Machine baste along the selvege ends. Then place the fabric bundles in the washing machine and wash and dry using fabric label directions.

Some fabric finishes will not allow the fabric to relax enough to be straightened. These techniques will not work on fabrics with heavy permanent press finishes.

THE GOSPEL: NOT MAN'S BUT GOD'S SALVATION

"For by grace you have been saved through faith, and that not of yourselves; it is the gift of God, not of works, lest anyone should boast." (Eph. 2:8-9)

God has provided a means of salvation. Through His grace and mercy He sent His own Son to atone for our sins. (Jn. 3:16) If one is to be saved, he must come to Christ.

How does one come to Christ? One comes to Christ today just as the first Christians came to Christ. They accepted the fact that Jesus is the Son of God with all authority in heaven and on earth. Jesus said, "...If ye do not believe that I am He, you will die in your sins." (Jn. 8:24) They were willing to confess their faith in Christ. "For with the heart one believes to righteousness, and with the mouth confession is made to salvation." (Rom. 10:10) They turned from their sins. "Repent therefore and be converted, that your sins may be blotted out..." (Acts 3:19) And they were baptized. Other major work underway includes the four laning of Highway 98 from Hattiesburg to the Alabama line and Highway 45 from Tupelo to the Tennessee line.

Ranked above Mississippi in the report were New Mexico, South Dakota and Wyoming.

Farmers Find Protection From Agricultural Pesticides

When Mississippi farmers take to the fields next summer, they will be equipped and prepared to protect themselves from agricultural chemicals.

The Worker Protection Standard for Agricultural Pesticides goes into affect in June 1993, and the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service, and agency charged with educating farmers about the new regulations, is putting its educational plan to work.

"Extension will be providing training sessions through the winter and spring to inform farmers about the new regulations," said Herb Willcutt, extension agricultural engineer at Mississippi State University.

"The Environmental Protection Agency, through the Division of Plant Industry, will enforce the regulations, but the Extension Service is charged with educating the farmers and the public about compliance," he said.

Willcutt said the standard is intended to protect any farm worker who handles restricted pesticides, and others who might come in contact with the stored

or applied chemical.

"It requires that the applicator be equipped with any protective gear that is stated on the label as needed for the application of that chemical," he said. "This may be as simple as a pair of rubber gloves or as extensive as full body protective wear."

In addition to having prescribed protective wear, several other items must be available at the application site. These include an eye washing solution, enough potable water to wash the entire body, soap or hand cleaner, a complete change of clothing and garbage bags to put any contaminated clothing in.

"These are the items required at the sprayer fill site, but in the safety kit that we use for demonstrations we also include syrup of ipecac (to induce vomiting), the material safety data sheet or label for the chemical being used and a first-aid kit," said Trent Spencer, extension program assistant for worker safety.

Other stipulations include regulations for posting land where chemicals are being used, and proper training for anyone who will be handling restricted-use pesticides.

"We are working on publications that summarize the standard, and these will be available to farmers and the public before the standard goes into effect," Willcutt said.

Chemical hazards are only one of many hazards that face agricultural workers. According to the National Safety Council, agriculture-related work accidents resulted in 1,400 deaths and 140,000 disabling injuries in 1991. These statistics rank agriculture among the top three hazardous occupations.

President Bush proclaimed the week of Sept. 20 through 26 as National Farm Safety Week. Using the theme, "Take Charge of Your Safety and Health," the observance will be used to highlight the need for greater attention to agriculture safety and health.

A study recently released by the University of North Carolina at Charlotte ranked Mississippi highways as the fourth best in the nation and the best in the South.

Mississippi, according to the study, has generally less than average funds, and they have been declining. In spite of this, very significant progress has been made on pavement conditions

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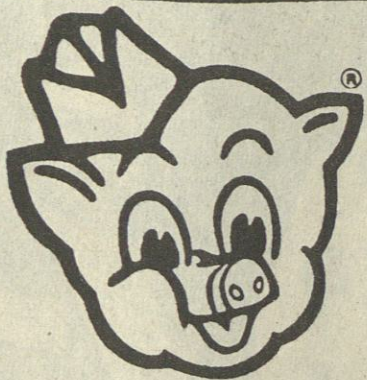
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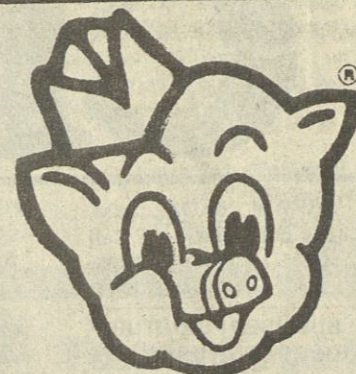
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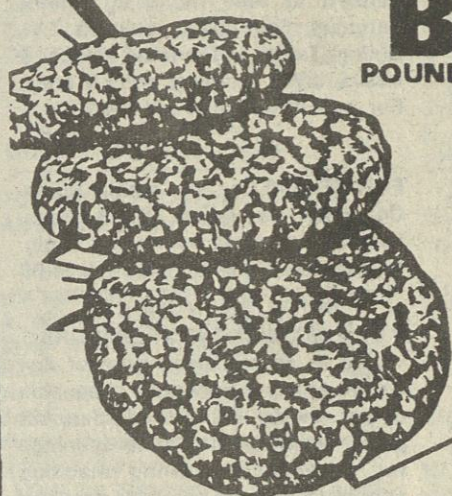
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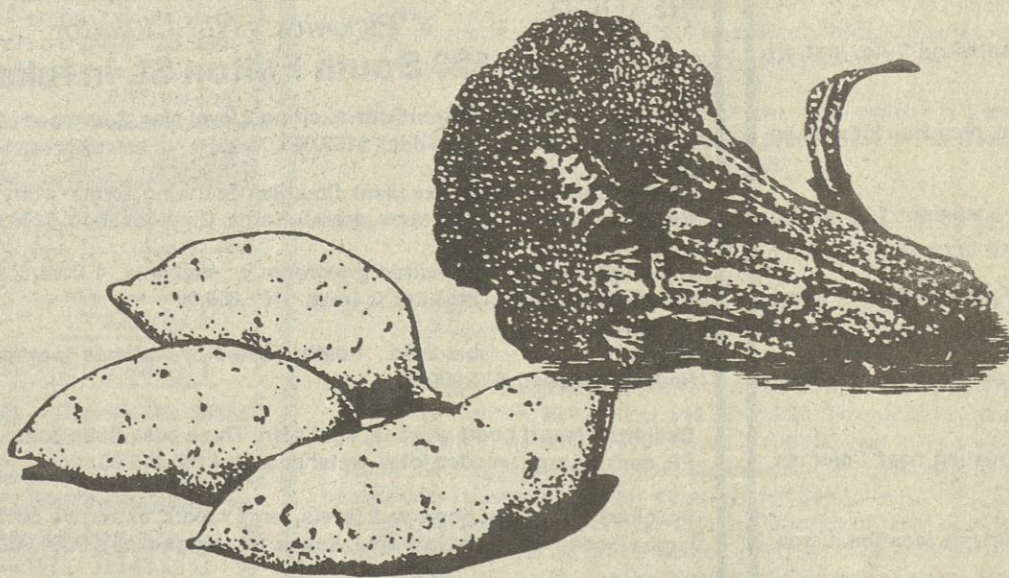

Operation Liftoff

Four hundred thousand Mississippi adults can't read. It's a tragic statistic that keeps the state at the bottom of the nation's literacy ladder.

If just one quarter of these men and women learn to read and write, the state's literacy ranking will climb to 20th from its current position of 50th.

And that's the goal of Operation Liftoff, a statewide initiative to enroll 100,000 Mississippians in literacy and GED classes.

The three-day enrollment, the first of its kind in Mississippi, begins Friday, September 18 through Sunday, September 20 at more than 1,000 locations statewide. Registration booths for both literacy and GED classes will go into shopping malls, libraries, schools, colleges, community buildings, businesses and churches. A number of counties

will open voting polls for the sign-up. People may enroll, too, by calling the toll-free Operation Liftoff Hotline, 1-800-466-READ.

Already, some 2,800 volunteer tutors are in place to teach the literacy and GED classes.

To publicize the sign-up, a battery of entertainment and sports personalities will fan out to various sites around the state and are scheduled for TV and radio talk show interviews. Amen star Clifton Davis will appear, as will actor/singer and former L.A. Rams defensive tackle Rosey Grier, and recording artists Marilyn McCoo and Billy Davis Jr.

Joining them are Miss USA 1992 Shannon Marketic, rap artist Mike E, and decathlete Dave Johnson, the 1992 Olympics bronze medalist.

Gov. Kirk Fordice leads in endorsing the drive. Joining him are

the Mississippi Association of Broadcasters, the Mississippi Press Association and hundreds of government, business, community and civic leaders across the state.

Operation Liftoff comes from Heads Up, an educational outreach of Christian Broadcasting Network in Virginia Beach, Va.

CBN chairman Pat Robertson said his motivation is not to help Mississippians, but to help the nation. "Situations like the riots occur," he said, "when people lack education there is no opportunity, no hope for advancing."

Since 1988, CBN has more than \$1 million in Mississippi for literacy materials and technical support. Robertson predicts other with significant illiterate populations will adopt "Mississippi Miracle" format.
