Trailer Explosion Investigated By Local & State Officials

A Tishomingo County man's life was saved from an explosion at his place of residence Tuesday morning by his waterbed.

According to Tishomingo County Sheriff Johnny Nunley, Jerry "Butch" Hatcher, Route 4 Iuka, was not injured when an explosive device went off under

his mobile home at about 3:30 a.m. Tuesday. The explosion, which originated under the bedroom where Hatcher was sleeping, demolished the bedroom floor, blew out the windows and the trailers underpinning, Nunley stated.

Apparently the waterbed Hat-

cher was sleeping on cushioned the impact of the blast and also helped prevent fire from spreading, Nunley stated. Although Hatcher was unable to get up and run from the House, he was not physically injured, reports indicated.

The Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms was called in to head up the investigation since an explosive device was used, Nunley said. Lt. Steve Williams of the Mississippi Highway Patrol Criminal Bureau of Investigation along with Sheriff Nunley are also working on the case.

Hatcher, 45, operator of B & J Supermarket in Burnsville, was renting the mobile home. It is located about a half mile north of North Crossroads on Highway 25.

One Arrested In Drug Raid

A raid in the City of Iuka by the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department led to the arrest of one just after midnight Monday evening.

According to Sheriff Johnny Nunley, Jimmy L. Pruitt, 24, was arrested and charged with possession of marijuana with the intent to sell, at Doncrest Apt. 10D. Sheriff Nunley, Investigator Terry Jones, and other officers from the Department confiscated some three ounces of marijuana with a street value of \$3,000.

Pruitt was released Tuesday on bond.

Sheriff Nunley also reported the arrest of a Corinth man in connection with several break-ins in the lake area in Tishomingo County.

Nunley said that Johnny Austin of Route 5, Corinth has been arrested and charged with six counts of burglary and six counts of grand larceny.

No additional information in the case is available at press time.

ASRM Funding Ok'd By House and Senate

Awaits Bush's Approval

A bill allocating \$360 million for NASA's Advanced Solid Rocket Motor Plant at Yellow Creek was passed by both the House of Representatives and Senate and now is awaiting President Bush's signature into law.

Included in the bill were provisions to safeguard the project's funding in the future. A joint House/Senate conference committee worked out the bill recently that passed in the full House 286-97 and by a voice vote in the full Senate. It now awaits action by President Bush who must sign the bill in order for it to be finalized. Bush failed to include funding for the ASRM project in his 1993 budget.

According to U.S. Congressman Jamie Whitten (D-

Miss.), "This bill not only includes adequate funds to keep the project going, but it instructs NASA to amend its 1994 budget request in order to maintain ASRM operations."

The first launch of the advanced solid rocket motor has been postponed until December of 1998 due to budgetary considerations, Whitten said.

This agreement was ironed out by the House/Senate conference committee who included in the agreement that NASA would restructure the program, pushing back plans to include the ASRM in the 12th flight instead of the sixth, scheduled for space station assembly. The committee also agreed that NASA, in its 1994 budget, should propose adequate funding to keep the planned first launch on schedule.

Congressman Whitten said the Committee has been advised by NASA Administrator Daniel S. Goldin that the agency will follow through on Conference Report language that altered the schedule for ASRM and that the Fiscal Year 1994 budget request to OMB will support this plan.

Goldin congratulated the House conferees for formulating a bill "that provides funding for a balanced civil space program, including Space Station Freedom."

"I am glad to have the support of the Administrator for our vital program at Yellow Creek and for the recommendations in the Conference Report," Whitten said.

"Our report ensures that the partnership between Mississippi and NASA will be a long and mutually beneficial one."

Suspects In Murder Case Bound Over To County Grand Jury

An Iuka City Judge has bound over two of three suspects connected with the July murder of an Alabama man to the Tishomingo County grand jury.

Iuka City Judge Mike Cooke bound over William Southward, 27, 705 Pike St., Iuka, and Charlotte Eilene Thompson, 22, of Iuka, to the grand jury based on testimony presented at a hearing and because of evidence gathered during the investigation of the murder of Reginald "Bubba" Fugua, 27, of Cherokee, Ala.

Southward is being charged with murder while Thompson is charged with accessory after the fact of murder in the July 20 incident that occurred at Southward's Pike St. residence.

A third suspect, Carolyn Renea Stanback, 25, last known address, Sheffield, Ala., has been charged with accessory after the fact of murder however, she is still at large and has yet to be arrested by the Iuka Police Department, according to Iuka Police Chief Amos Bates.

Testimony by Iuka Police officer Ricky Cornelison at the preliminary hearing in Iuka Municipal Court Wednesday, September 23, stated that Fugua was shot in the face with a .22-caliber handgun belonging to Southward. The two women, who are sisters, were present at the residence at the time of the incident.

The suspects told investigators that Fugua, himself, fired the fatal shot, but according to Cornelison, an autopsy revealed that the wound was made by a shot that was fired from several feet away and therefore could not have been self-inflicted.

Both Southward and Thompson remained free on their initial bonds pending grand jury action.

The Tishomingo County "Life Chain" will be held Sunday, October 4.

The "Life Chain" is a silent protest of abortion as a means of birth control. Those wishing to participate in this protest should meet Sunday, beginning at 2:30 p.m. on Hwy. 25 S. across from Piggly Wiggly in Iuka where signs will be available (Iuka Church of

Christ parking lot).

Those choosing to participate will stand along Hwy. 25 holding the signs in silent protest.

Organizers of the event give the following list for potential participants: If you believe abortion is not birth control. If you believe abortion is the taking of human life. If you believe tax dollars should not be used to fund abortion. Join them -- Celebrate Life.

Iuka Men Sentenced In Circuit Court Action

Two Iuka men have been sentenced in Tishomingo County Circuit Court recently in cases involving an arson and burglaries.

According to Assistant District Attorney Jim Pounds, Clifford Allen McBee, 20, and Lawrence Dillard, 21, both of Iuka, pled guilty Monday, September 21, to two counts of burglary and arson in the burning of a barn.

Both men were sentenced to 10 years on the charge of arson and seven years on the charges of burglary.

McBee's sentence is to run concurrent and suspended. He paid \$4,500 in restitution toward the loss of the barn in a plea bargain agreement, Pounds said.

Dillard's sentence is to run

concurrently. He was recommended for the Regimented Inmate Discipline (RID) program. After completion of this program, he will be sent to a restitution center so that money can be earned to pay restitution to be determined.

Stephen V. Adams, 21, of Iuka, had been sentenced earlier in the same case, Pounds stated. Adams pled guilty to one count of burglary and arson. He received concurrent terms of seven and 10 years and was recommended for the RID program also. He was ordered to pay \$4,500 restitution to the victim.

Pounds said that there are still charges pending against two others in connection with the case.

Fall Fling For The Young At Heart At State Park

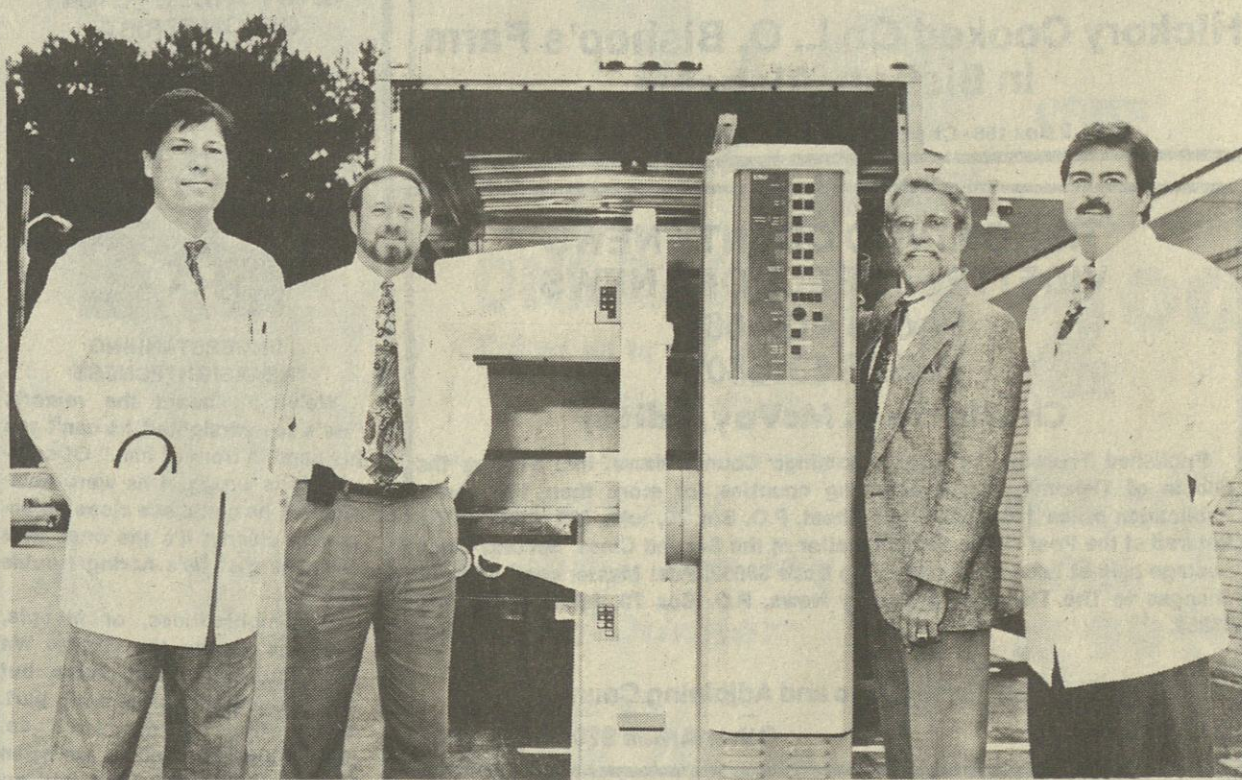

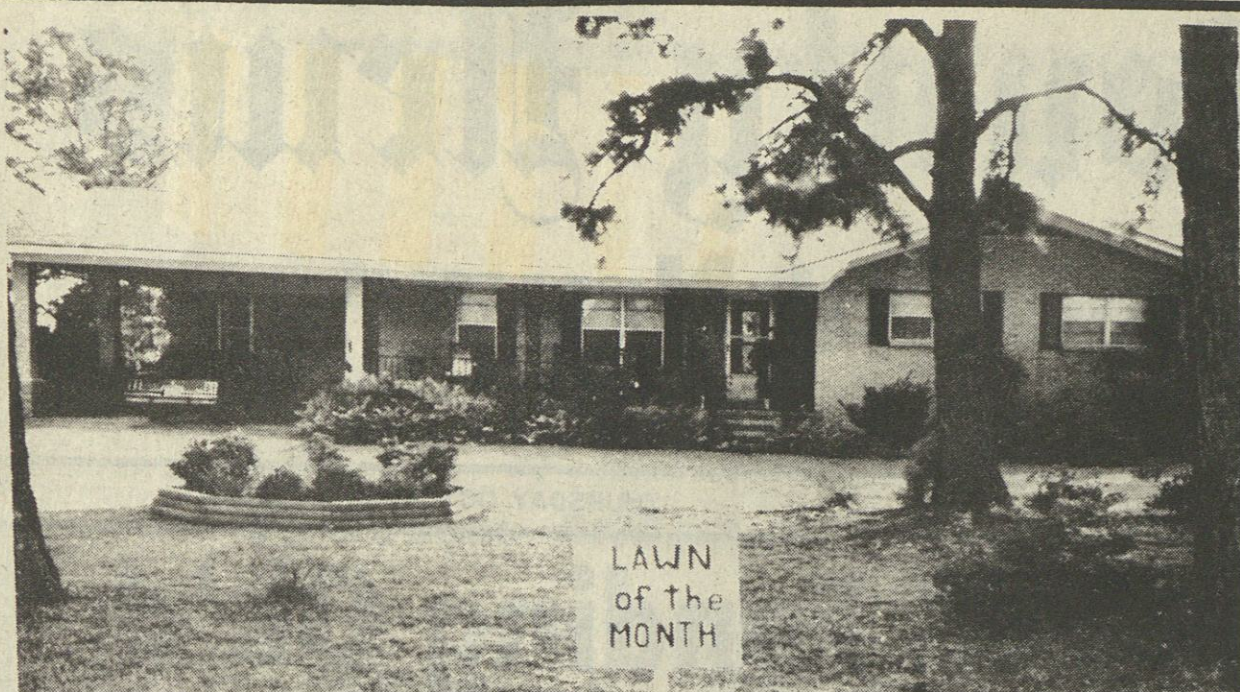

Home Economics Tips

**LEARN ABOUT
NUTRITIONAL RICE**
As fall approaches, Mississippi rice farmers will be harvesting the

rice crop. Rice is clean, never touched by human hands from the field to the sealed package. Many years of research have made American grown rice the highest quality rice in the world.

The following questions and answers will clear up any misinformation about rice.

1. What is brown rice?

Brown rice grains have passed through the first stage of the milling process. Only the hull and a small amount of the bran layer have been removed, leaving rice that is light tan in color. Many valuable nutrients are contained in the bran layer. Brown rice has a nut-like flavor and a slightly chewy texture.

2. What is "parboiled" rice?
In parboiling rice, grains with the hull and bran layers still on are subjected to a steam-pressure process. After milling, the rice has a golden and slightly translucent appearance. Then when it is cooked, the grains are firm and separate because the earlier steam-pressure process has modified the starch. Parboiled rice takes a little longer to cook than regular milled white rice. Follow package directions.

3. Is "pre-cooked" rice the same as parboiled?
No. Pre-cooked rice has been completely cooked, then dehydrated. It can be prepared quickly because all that is necessary is to replace the water that was removed.

4. What is regular milled white

rice?

By far the largest volume in rice sold in the United States is called "regular milled white rice" by the industry. However, the package may only read "long grain rice" or "medium grain rice."

5. Is long grain rice similar to short grain rice?

Not at all. Generally speaking, the shorter the grain, the more the cooked grains tend to cling together. This has advantages in desserts, molds, or croquettes or when eating rice with chopsticks! The long grain rice cooks into fluffy and separate grains.

6. Isn't rice fattening?

Not really. Cooked rice contains about 82 calories per half cup. It's low in fat too. Many weight control diets include rice because it is satisfying, yet adds fewer calories preserving than many other foods in the diet.

7. Is it necessary to rinse rice before or after cooking?

No, unless the package specifies washing before cooking. The custom started when rice was harvested by hand and contained stones, twigs and other inedible material that really needed to be rinsed away. However, the rice consumed in the United States has been grown here and is planted, harvested and packaged by the most automated system in the world.

From the time it's planted until packaging, U.S. rice is untouched by human hands. Rinsing merely removes valuable vitamins and minerals.

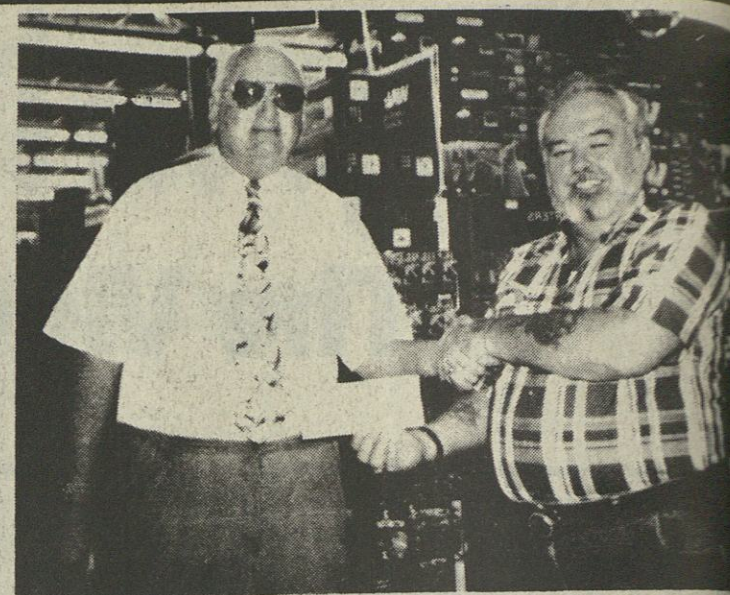
8. What is the best way to cook rice?

Follow the package directions carefully. Use exact amounts of water and rice and accurate cooking time. Do not rinse or drain. Butter or margarine added before cooking helps to keep the grains separate.

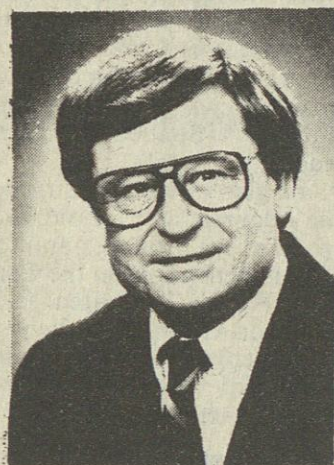
Media Advisory Pickwick Summit

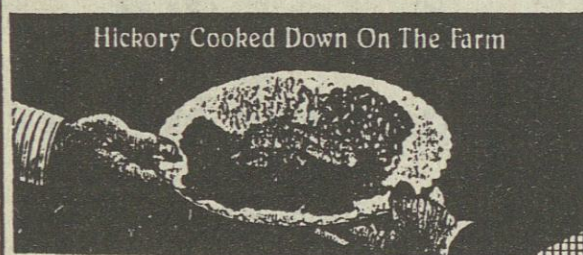

UNDERSTANDING
NEARSIGHTEDNESS

We've all heard the remark: "He's so nearsighted, he can't see his hand in front of him." Of course this is wrong. If he were nearsighted, he could see close objects very clearly; it's the ones at a distance that he's having trouble seeing.

Near-sightedness, or myopia, develops among the young. We don't know the exact cause, but diet undoubtedly plays a big part. Also, other factors such as growth and metabolism are often blamed. Youngsters who read excessively seem to develop myopia more easily than their sport-oriented counterparts. So, if your youngsters tells you that he can't see what the teacher has written on the blackboard unless he gets close to it, expect myopia.

Too often parents tend to dismiss his complaints and, as a result, the child's grades begin to suffer. After all, if he can't see it, he can't learn it.

If an optometric evaluation reveals that your child is nearsighted, corrective eyeglasses or contact lenses can be procured to correct the condition.

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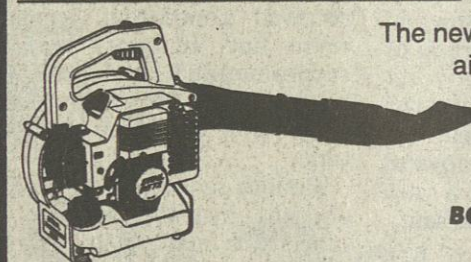


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Grisham Receives Highest Award

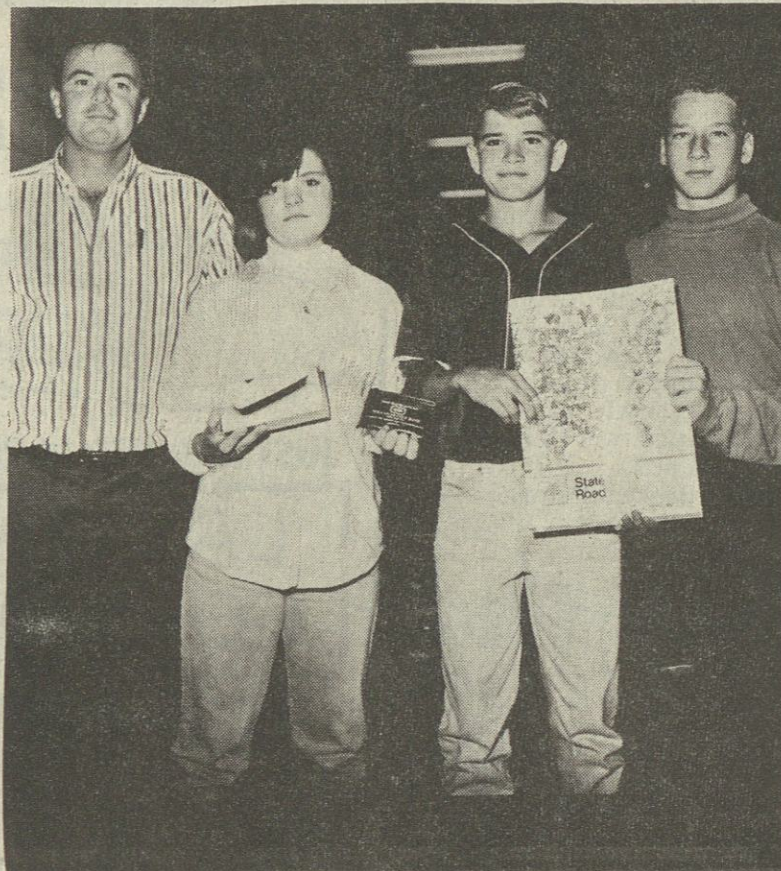

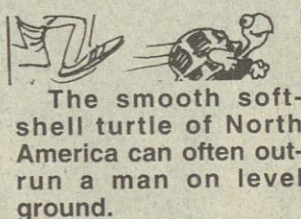
Opposing The Lottery

\$10 Million For The Natchez Trace Parkway

Congressman Jamie Whitten, Chairman of the House Committee on Appropriations, said recently that \$10 million for the Natchez Trace Parkway has been provided by an appropriations conference committee.

Congressman Whitten said the Conference Report on the Interior bill, finished today, includes funding for operation and continued construction of the Trace, along with several other projects in Mississippi.

The conference report also included \$750,000 for the Natchez Historical Park, \$200,000 for a park study at Vicksburg and normal operating funds for the Private John Allen Fish Hatchery in Tupelo.

"I am particularly proud of this bill, because it provides investments in America -- our public lands, wildlife refuges, fish hatcheries, national parks, and national forests," Congressman Whitten said. "It includes funds for energy conservation and fossil energy development programs. These programs are vital to the development and support of our country."

By dialing 1-900-776-6978, callers may help these two young people have a second chance at life. Callers must be at least 18 years old or have their parents' permission in order to call.

Cindy Todd Starling was born with a congenital heart disease. She must have a heart and double lung transplant in order to survive. Before the University of Alabama Hospital in Birmingham, Ala. will agree to do the surgery, Cindy must have at least \$165,000. Starling is married and she and her husband, Rodney, have two children, a 3-year-old foster child and a 1-year-old child they adopted at birth.

Chris Presley is a 1992 graduate of Itawamba Agricultural High School and is

suffering from Cystic Fibrosis, a lung disease that also affects the digestive system. Chris is presently taking 60 different medications a day and is treated weekly at University Hospital in Jackson. He desperately needs a double lung transplant in order to survive. A total of \$120,000 is needed, of which approximately \$10,000 has been raised thus far.

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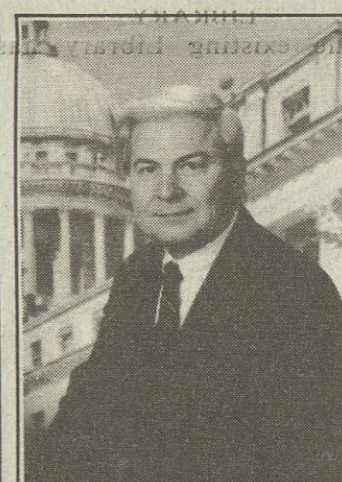

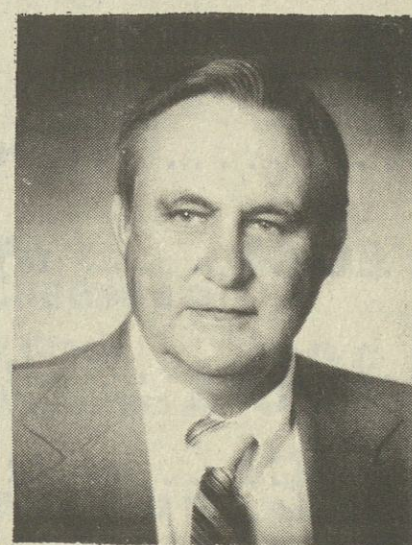

Insurance Co. Eases Policyholders

Congress' current focus on the independent Blue Cross and Blue Shield organizations across the nation has left many customers of Blue Cross & Blue Shield of Mississippi wondering how secure they are with their health care coverage.

Soil Conservation News

A fishpond is a delightful part of a farm or ranch. It adds beauty to the land and provides recreation for farmers, ranchers, and their friends.

A good fishpond must be properly located, designed and constructed. Before you build a pond you should seek assistance from the Soil Conservation Service on locating a suitable site.

From an economic view point, locate the pond where the largest storage of water can be obtained with the least amount of earth fill. A good site usually is one where a dam can be built across a narrow section of a valley. The side slopes should be steep, and the slope of the valley floor permits a large area to be flooded. The soil should also be suitable for a pond, clay and silty clay are good soils for a ponded area, sandy clay is generally suitable. Sand, gravel and sand gravel mixtures and not suitable for pond sites.

A good pond site must have a satisfactory water supply - enough spring flow, well water or silt-free runoff to fill the pond in

a year or less and to replenish the water lost by seepage and evaporation.

Other factors to consider when construction a farm pond are the top width it should be from 8' feet to 12' depending on the height. This makes the dam safe from serious damage by muskrats that may burrow into it. It also provide a safe roadway for crossing. The spillway is for keeping floodwater from going over the top of the dam. It needs to be wide enough to keep its flow shallow so big fish can't swim out. Don't screen the flow to trap the fish. The screen will trap trash as well as fish and end the usefulness of the spillway, the little fish that will escape in shallow flows will be replaced by reproduction.

Wild fish sometime enter ponds by swimming up the spillway from the creek below. But a 24 to 36" vertical overfall below the spillway prevents this.

Most disappointments on farm pond result from mistakes in construction, stocking and management. If you have any question concerning your pond contact the Soil Conservation Service.

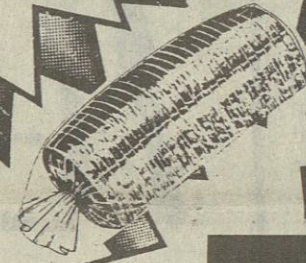

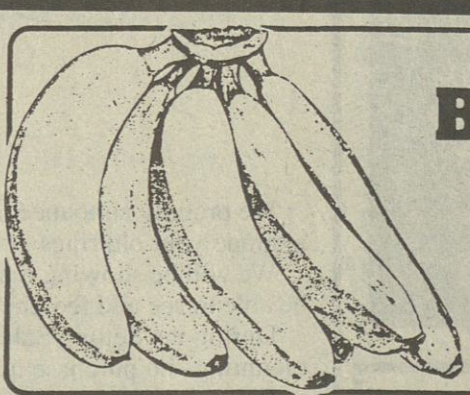

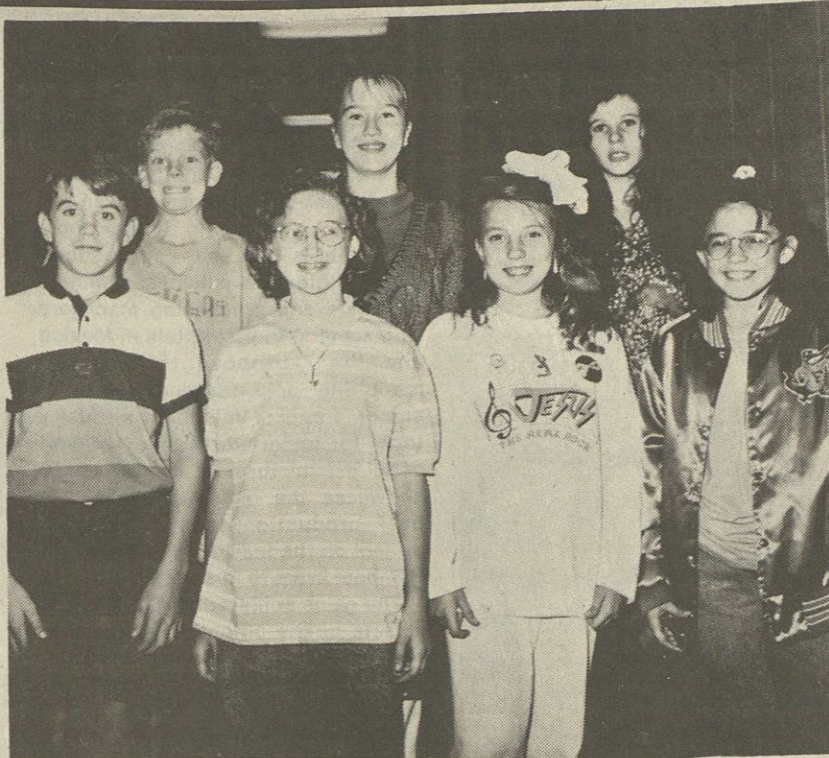

Forestry Meeting To Focus On Need For Involvement

Not all forestry activities take place in the woods. Once a year, for example, many foresters, forest landowners and associated groups come to town for a big meeting. The meeting is the Mississippi Forestry Association Annual Meeting, and this year the town is Tupelo.

The 55th annual meeting of MFA will be Oct. 27 through 29 in Tupelo. This will be the first MFA annual meeting held north of Jackson and is part of an effort by MFA to involve the forestry community throughout the state.

The theme of this year's meeting is "Landowners Without Rights" and reflects the feelings of many in the forestry community that we must all get involved. MFA represents the interests of many groups including landowners, wood products, companies, loggers, banks, utilities and the many vendors who supply products and services to the forest industry.

Forestry directly affects many Mississippians, and it is vitally important that the rights of landowners who produce the resource be protected from misguided regulation.

The MFA annual meeting gets more exciting every year as we see more county forestry associations, called CFA's, becoming affiliated with the state

association. MFA has about 20 CFA affiliates now, and more are developing.

The Stone County Forestry Association, for example, is the most recent CFA to be voted in as an affiliate by the MFA Board of Directors. The Hinds, Prentiss and Walthall County Forestry Associations are awaiting approval of their affiliation by the MFA Board of Directors at the annual meeting in October. Pearl River, Yalobusha and Clay counties all have local forestry associations in some advanced stage of development.

Registration for the MFA annual meeting will begin on Tuesday, October 27 at 4 p.m. The general membership meeting starts at 9 a.m. on Wednesday, Oct. 28. Wednesday afternoon's technical sessions include topics such as deer management, estate planning, forest taxation and insurance coverage.

The Thursday morning program theme is "Activism in the '90s." Speakers include Steven Parker of the Southeastern Legal Foundation in Atlanta and Bruce Vincent, a logger from Libby, Mont.

The MFA annual meeting is an exciting time for tree farmers, loggers and others who are actively involved in forestry. Awards will be presented to the Tree Farmer of the Year, the Outstanding Tree Farm Inspector, the Outstanding Logger of the Year and the prestigious Meritorious Service to Forestry Award.

If you have an interest or in-

volvement in forestry, you could benefit from the MFA annual meeting. Advance registration will be helpful to the MFA staff. Call them at (601)354-4936 in Jackson for an annual meeting registration packet or contact your local county extension office for more information.

Tishomingo County Beef Producers Help Lessen U.S. Export Deficit

With the annual U.S. trade deficit hovering around \$70 billion, increased exports of agricultural products help lessen the effects of this deficit on the U.S. economy. Tishomingo County beef producers contribute to programs that promote U.S. Beef in foreign countries through their beef checkoff dollars.

The June 1992 edition of the Survey of Current Business, produced by the Bureau of Economic Analysis of the U.S. Commerce Department, reveals that the U.S. trade deficit has dropped from \$108 billion in 1990 to its current rate.

Cattle and beef products are helping lead the charge toward a balance of trade. According to figures by the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the research firm, CattleFax, exports of U.S. beef, veal and variety meat products have risen 389 percent since 1980, while imports have increased 140 percent. Total exports of U.S. beef, veal and variety meat products reached an all-time high of \$2.1 billion in 1991, with imports totaling \$1.9 billion last year.

Nationwide, beef producers invested \$11.4 million in foreign market development programs between 1987 and 1991, exporting a total of \$8.4 billion worth of beef, veal and variety meats.

According to Mississippi Cattle Industry Board Field Director Tom Healey, U.S. cattle producers receive \$5.65 per hundredweight more for their fed cattle and \$12.16 per hundredweight more for calves because of the additional demand for U.S. beef in foreign markets.

Japan is the largest foreign market for U.S. beef, purchasing 54 percent by value of all U.S. beef exported. Canada, Mexico and South Korea are also leading markets.

U.S. grain-fed beef is considered the international standard for taste and quality in markets throughout the world. Another competitive advantage of the U.S. product is the application of new technology, as well as the size and flexibility of the U.S. beef production system. Checkoff-funded research allowed U.S. exporters to extend the shelflife of U.S. beef from 45 days to more than 60 days -- a crucial step in becoming more competitive in foreign countries where chilled product is in demand.

The U.S. beef industry is a relatively new player in the export market. Australia is the United States' major competitor in the Asia Pacific. Heavily subsidized product from the European Economic Community is the predominant source of beef to the former Soviet Union and

to both eastern and western European countries.

In 1992, checkoff dollars are being used to develop or research more than 50 foreign markets. The beef checkoff program supports: consumer cook-offs in Japan, Taiwan and Hong Kong, showing foreign consumers how U.S. beef can be incorporated into local cuisines; seminars for chefs and purchasing managers from leading tourist hotels in Mexico and the Caribbean to highlight marketing opportunities and consumer trends; U.S. beef industry tours for importers and government officials in foreign countries to showcase the high quality of U.S. beef production; and a research project on the feasibility of exporting U.S. beef to Russia.

The gains achieved to date are just a taste of the potential for the U.S. beef industry in foreign markets, Healey said. Like the checkoff program itself, foreign marketing is an investment -- an investment that is paying off for all producers, including those in Tishomingo County.

ASRM Subscale Test Fires Successfully

The sixth in a series of subscale tests to evaluate materials for the Space Shuttle Advanced Solid Rocket Motor, ASRM, was fired successfully last night at the Marshall Space Flight Center in Huntsville, AL. The 17.5 foot long, 48-inch diameter motor was test fired for the full duration of 30 seconds at 7:30 p.m. The test was conducted by the Aerojet ASRM Division, principal subcontractor to Lockheed Missiles and Space Company, for the design and production of the ASRM. Lockheed is the prime contractor under NASA for the ASRM.

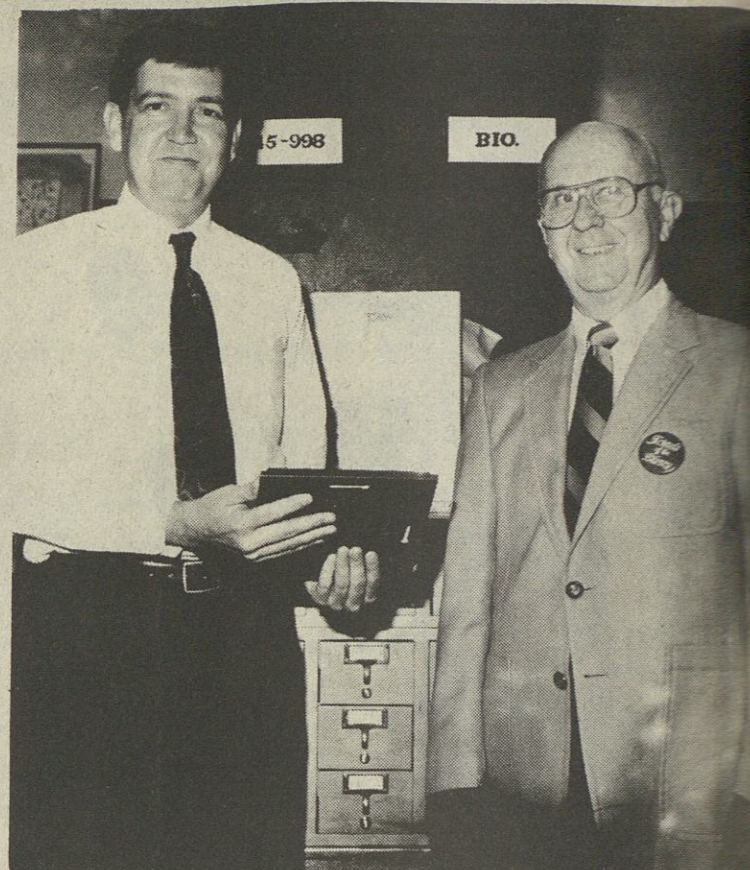
The test motor weighed approximately 40,000 pounds and included two propellant cartridges weighing about 10,000 pounds. Approximately 155 instruments were located throughout the motor to measure temperatures, pressures, strains, and other motor characteristics during the firing. The test motor consists of one steel case segment, two solid propellant cartridges, a forward dome loaded with inert propellant, an aft dome segment with insulation, the test nozzle, an igniter, and a safe and arm device. Firing results will be used to evaluate materials for the ASRM nozzle.

"The test went right on schedule, and preliminary results indicate all objectives were met," said Lou Hickok, director of test operations for Aerojet. The next ASRM subscale test is scheduled for early November.



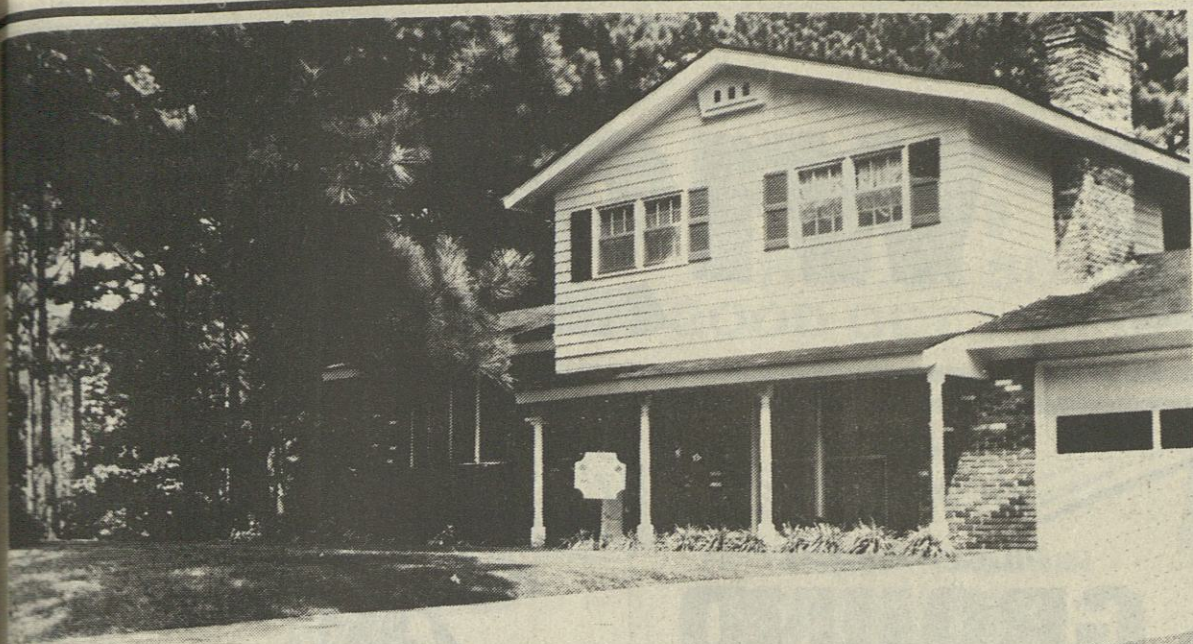

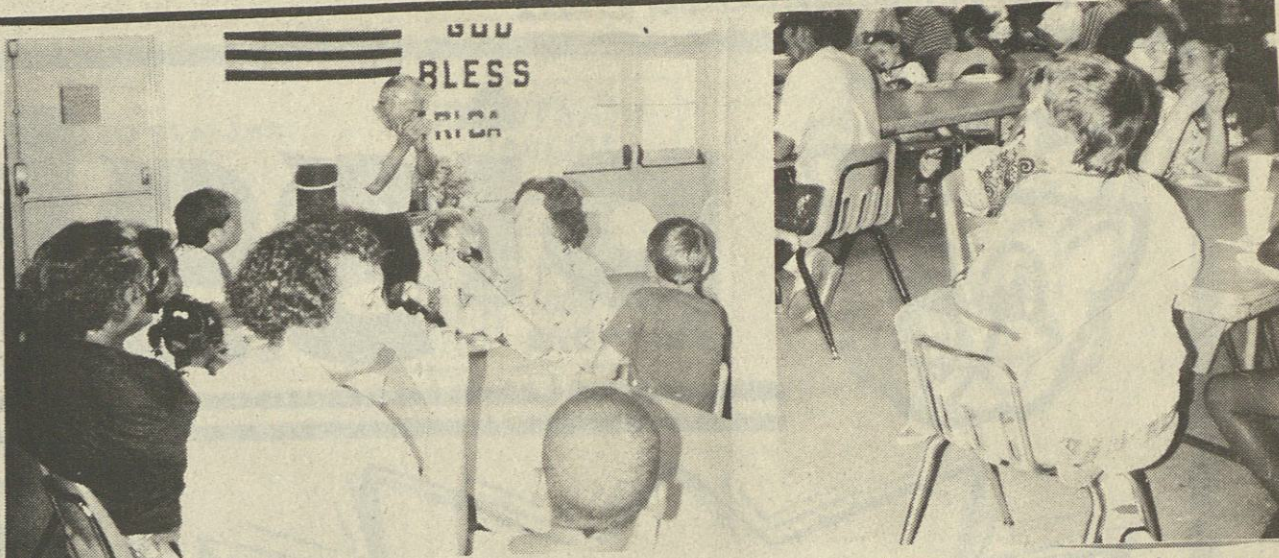
On September 9, 1992 Friendship Homemakers met at Timber Hills for a picnic-style lunch with members and staff.

Unemployment Slips In August

Mississippi's August unemployment rate edged down marginally from July's rate of 9.5 percent. The August rate was 9.2 percent, according to the monthly labor report released today by the Mississippi Employment Security Commission. The rate was 8.7 percent in August 1991.

"The drop from July's rate reflects normal school related change. Teachers and students returned for the fall session in August in those schools which end the first semester at Christmas. Also, some school related personnel and students who had not started back to school were still in the labor force," said Raiford Crews, MESC labor market analyst.

The labor force fell by 19,300 persons from the previous month but rose by 24,000 from August 1991. The total labor force in August numbered 1,198,100. Of these, 1,088,100 were employed and 110,000 were unemployed.

The increase of 24,000 in the labor force from last August was composed of 16,400 more employed and 7,600 more unemployed. Crews attributes this increase to growth of nearly 21,000 jobs in non-agricultural wage and salary jobs. There was a decrease of 7,000 in agricultural jobs from one year ago.

"Jobs based on place of work were seasonally down from July," Crews said. Some manufacturing still suffered the usual layoffs which occur each summer to cover inventory adjustments and vacation.

Two durable goods manufacturing sectors -- machinery and transportation equipment--reported losses from July. The only non-durable sector losses were in food, apparel, and chemical and allied products.

There were 2,800 fewer manufacturing jobs than during August 1991, led by a decline of 2,100 jobs in apparel.

Non-manufacturing industries posted a seasonal gain of nearly 6,600 jobs from July and 13,600 from one year ago. Showing losses from the previous month were mining, contract construction, finance, real estate and insurance, and services and miscellaneous. Education led increases with 7,600 from July because of the beginning of the fall school session in many school districts.

MESC's labor market

specialists are forecasting continuing declines in unemployment for September and October. Manufacturers should increase production, retailers will begin building towards the holiday season and harvests will begin in earnest. Consequently, economic gains will likely be greater in urban areas, industrialized areas, and in counties with high concentrations of farm-related jobs.

Wetlands 'R US

"What is a wetland, and what does it mean to me?" Have you ever wondered just what all the hubbub was about? Here it is, in a nutshell:

The official "government" definition of a wetland is as follows: those areas that are inundated or saturated by surface or ground water at a frequency and duration sufficient to support, and that under normal circumstances do support, a prevalence of vegetation typically adapted for life in saturated soil conditions (Whew! What a mouthful!). Wetlands are simply those areas that are covered by water or have waterlogged soils for at least five percent of the growing season.

Section 404 of the Clean Water Act requires that anyone interested in depositing dredged or fill material into "waters of the United States, including wetlands", must receive authorization for such activities. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has been assigned responsibility for administering the Section 404 permitting process.

How can you recognize a wetland? The Corps uses three criteria for determining wetlands: plants, soils, and hydrology. At least one indicator of all three parameters must be present before any specific site is considered to be a wetland. The 1987 Wetlands Delineation Manual is currently being used by the Corps to identify wetlands.

What good are they (wetlands, that is)? Wetlands are more important than you may think. In addition to food production, nesting and general habitat for waterfowl and other wildlife, wetlands are important as erosion

barriers, storage areas for storm and flood waters, ground water discharge and recharge areas, as well as water purification zones.

So the next time you see a beaver pond, slough or marsh, I hope that you will look beyond the mosquitoes and the muck and see the valuable natural resource that we need to protect.
