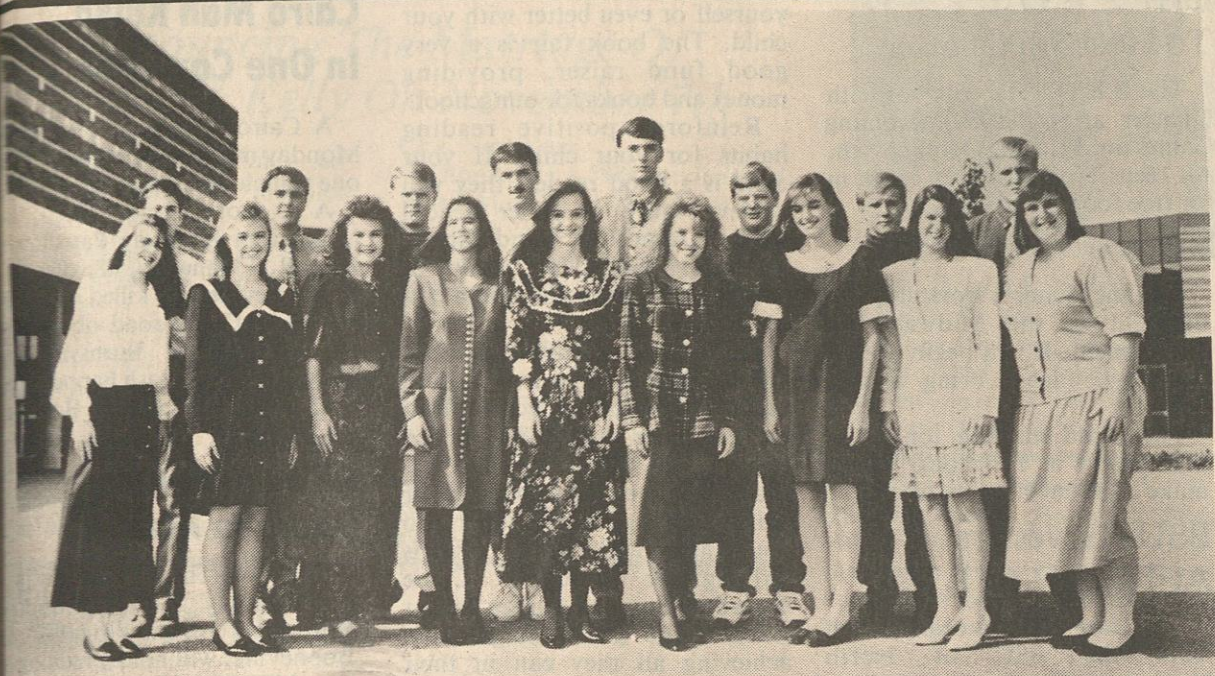

President Signs Solid Rocket Bill

President George Bush signed the FY93 VA-HUD Appropriations bill late Tuesday afternoon giving the Advanced Solid Rocket Motor Program \$360 million for the new budget year.

The bill requires NASA to provide enough funding in 1994 for the project to meet a new deadline of December, 1998 for the first launch of the Mississippi made motors.

This final step in the long process of securing funds for the motor facility to be built near Iuka should justify the continuation of the program. To date more than \$1 billion has been spent on the project.

Of the \$360 million approved Tuesday, \$195 million is for design and development of the rockets and \$165 million is for construction of the facility to be built at Yellow Creek.

U.S. Congressman Jamie Whitten of Mississippi issued the following statement to The News early Wednesday morning:

"I am pleased that the President has signed our bill providing for the Advanced Solid Rocket Motor program at Yellow Creek. I also appreciate my colleagues on the House side who worked for the program and in the Senate for going along."

This has been a difficult year, with all we have had to overcome to keep this vital project alive, but our bill not only provides for this year. It ensures that NASA will include the project for 1994 as well."

"I am so proud of the people of our area, who have done so much to make this project a success. I have the highest hopes for the future development of northeast Mississippi and for the future of our space program because of ASRM and NASA's partnership with our great State."

U.S. Senator Thad Cochran of Mississippi had the following comments regarding the President's signature:

"We have had a real team effort to keep the appropriations process moving along. This is a big victory and we had some serious challenges along the way. I hope we have passed the last big hurdle in having to justify the Advanced Solid Rocket Motor facility in Iuka, Mississippi, but we'll continue to meet any challenges if they come along."

Groundbreaking Held At Site Of New Iuka Hospital

After almost three years of plans and negotiations, Iuka's new \$5.8 million hospital is on its way to becoming a reality.

Construction on the 41,000-square-foot facility to serve Iuka and Tishomingo County could begin within several weeks, said Bill Rutledge, administrator of the present county-owned Iuka Hospital.

Groundbreaking ceremonies were held Thursday afternoon, October 1, at the site, located at the intersection of Highway 25 South and Curtis Drive near the entrance to Independence Square Subdivision.

Bids may be taken in the next week or so for sitework, Rutledge said. The State Department of Economic and Community Development is slated to further review the plans for the facility, he said.

The new Iuka Hospital will include 40 private hospital rooms for general acute care, eight beds for intensive care, surgical suite, an emergency room, respiratory department, acute cardiac care unit, laboratory, radiology department, physical therapy, and industrial occupation facilities, said John Hicks, president of North Mississippi Health Services.

NMHS is the parent company of North Mississippi Medical Center in Tupelo and will construct and manage the new Iuka Hospital through its subsidiary,

Tishomingo Health Services, Inc.

The health services corporation is investing \$3.2 million in the hospital with the state Major Economic Impact Authority contributing the remaining \$2.6 million. No local funds will be required.

Hicks presided over the ceremony which included guest speaker Gov. Kirk Fordice.

Fordice reminded the crowd that he had been in Tishomingo County on several occasions recently.

"Every time you look at something new in Tishomingo County, it reminds you of what a thriving economic area this is becoming, can become and will become if we all hang behind the principle that Northeast Mississippi is never going to back up again," Fordice said.

Those attending the ceremony included representatives of North Mississippi Medical Center, Iuka Hospital employees and staff, local officials, area citizens and business persons, and residents of the nearby neighborhood.

Members of the advisory board for the new hospital recognized were the following local citizens: Donnie Brown of Iuka, State Farm Insurance agent; Cathi Day of Tishomingo, material manager at the Heil Company; Gene Jourdan of Iuka, vice president, Iuka Guaranty Bank; Charles Levin-sky of Iuka, president, Aerojet

ASRM Division; Gerald Parsons of Burnsville, Circuit Clerk of Tishomingo County; Margaret Riley of Iuka, county director of the Department of Human Services; Harold Oswalt of Dennis, owner and president of Oswalt Construction Company; and Milt Burton, owner of Carpets Unlimited.

The hospital will be completed within 15 to 18 months after construction begins, Rutledge said, and should be open in the spring of 1994. There will be approximately 135 employees in the facility, he said.

Gov. Ray Mabus made the original commitment of Impact Authority funding for a new healthcare facility in Iuka in December 1989.

Two Tishomingo County Men Indicted For Murder

Greg Dingler and Danny McGee, both of Dennis, were indicted by a federal grand jury Friday, October 2, in connection with the death of a Iuka man.

The jury indicted the two with first degree murder and conspiracy to commit murder in the death of Thomas Alan Byram. The beating death occurred September 2 at the Pharr Mounds on the Natchez Trace.

The two are being held without bond in Lafayette County Jail in Oxford.



New Stadium Ready--The Braves football squad will play their first game in the newly completed football stadium Friday night, October 9. The Braves will face Cherokee in the 1992-93 Homecoming game. The standard size playing field which is fully fenced is located at the new Magnet High School located on highway 72 between Burnsville and Iuka. It has a seating capacity for 1,800 home fans and 500 visitors. Additional features include high intensity lighting on 80 foot polls, new scoreboard, and a large press box with camera facilities on top. A field house with showers for both teams, a coach's office, dressing facility for game officials and air conditioning is also at the site. Concrete walkways will connect the stands with a concession stand with public restroom facilities and there will be plenty of parking near by, including handicapped spaces. Admission will be \$3.00. IMPROVING NEAR VISION

"Life may begin at 40", but vision problems do as well. The reason is that we lose the ability to focus small letters at 16 inches. Our crystalline lens is less elastic. That's why we have to hold the fine print at arm's length. The light rays don't enter the eye as divergently as they do at 16 inches.

Here's a little trick to keep your lens elastic and improve your near vision. Hold a small card with the fine printing on it about 14 inches from your eyes. Then select a distant object (like a tree) at least 20 feet away. Read a word or two from the card, then raise your eyes to look at the tree. Read another few words, then back to the tree.

When you read from the card, the crystalline lens is at maximum convexity; when you look at the tree, it flattens. What you're doing is exercising your focusing mechanism. Do this exercise about 5 or 10 minutes at a time - no longer, or your eyes will ache. You should see some improvement in a couple of weeks.

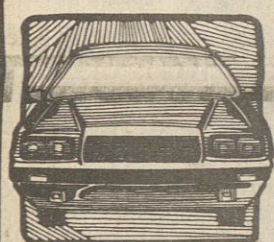

Unemployment Drops In Mid-August

According to Charles Schoenberger, Manager of the Mississippi Employment Service, unemployment in Tishomingo County dropped to 9.8 percent in mid-August. This compares to 10.4 percent in July and 10.4 percent in August of last year.

The civilian labor force in Tishomingo County numbered 8,600, 183 more than the previous month, but more than August, 1991. Approximately, 7,760 Tishomingo County residents held jobs in mid-August while 840 were unemployed.

Manufacturing jobs in Tishomingo County numbered 3,290, up from July, and 190 more in August, 1991.

\$3.6 Million For Resurfacing Natchez Trace Parkway

A contract for nearly \$3.6 million has been awarded for resurfacing work on the Natchez Trace Parkway in North Mississippi, the state's U.S. Senators announced.

Senators Thad Cochran and Trent Lott (R-Miss.) said the Federal Highway Administration has awarded a contract of \$3,599,918 to Bonds Company, Inc., of Burnsville, MS, for the project.

The agency said the contract calls for resurfacing 21.5 miles of the Natchez Trace Parkway from just north of Mathiston to state Highway 32 near Okolona. Additional work will include fixing potholes along the parkway.

The FHA said the work is scheduled for completion by June 1, 1994.

Influenza Immunizations Offered October 22nd

The Tishomingo County Health Department will begin its influenza immunizations with special clinics in Iuka on Thursday, October 22 from 8:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. and in Belmont on October 30th from 9:00 to 12:00 and 1:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m.

If you are unable to come in on these special days, please call for an appointment.

Many people expect every year to spend a week or two in bed with a fever, chills, and body aches from influenza.

What those people don't realize is that 788 Mississippians died last year from influenza and its most common complication, pneumonia.

"Influenza isn't always a minor illness, especially for senior citizens," said Dr. Ed Thompson, state epidemiologist. "Coupled with pneumonia, it continues to be one of the top five causes of death in people 65 years of age and older."

The Mississippi State Department of Health, with support from the Mississippi Chapter of the American Lung Association, encourages Mississippians to visit their county health department or private physician to get the influenza vaccine and protect themselves against the virus.

Thompson said while the vaccine isn't 100 percent effective, it's still the best way to avoid the disease. The vaccine provides protection against common influenza strains during the current season, but immunity isn't permanent. Health officials recommend a new shot each year because the vaccine changes yearly to protect against current viral strains.

MSDH offers flu shots before flu season; the best time to get the shot is in October or early November. Flu season began early last year, but usually starts around December and can last through April.

One major change this year is that Medicare won't pay for the flu shot.

Mississippi was one of 20 states that participated in a two-year Influenza Demonstration Project, which paid for the shots. The project goals were to get high risk populations immunized and encourage cooperation from doctors and nurses to increase immunization levels.

Project sponsors will present the trial study's results to the United States Congress this year. Congress will decide whether the study proved effective enough to warrant making flu shots a standard part of Medicare coverage.

Since MSDH gets no state or federal funds for flu vaccine, county health departments charge a \$6 fee for the flu shot, but Thompson stressed that no one will be turned away from inability to pay.

MSDH recommends flu shots for:

Anyone who want to avoid the flu.

Certain groups at increased risk for serious complication if they get the flu, such as:

*Adults or children with chronic disease of the cardiovascular or pulmonary system, including children with asthma.

*Persons 65 years of age or older.

*Nursing home patients, with approval from their attending physician.

*Adults and children who have required medical follow-up or hospitalization during the previous year because of chronic metabolic disease, renal dysfunction, or immunosuppression.

ction, or immunosuppression.

*Children six months to 18 years who are receiving long-term aspirin therapy, and therefore may be at risk of developing Reye syndrome after influenza.

Health care workers, especially those working with patients in one of the above groups.

Persons whose absence from work could result in disruption of essential services, including school teachers, certain military personnel, police officers, and firefighters.

In addition, public health officials recommend the vaccine for persons who provide care for or live with a high risk person.

People with allergies to eggs or persons with illnesses accompanied by fever should not get the influenza vaccine.

For more information about influenza or the vaccine, readers, should contact their physician or county health department.

AMENDMENT NO. 1 SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 512

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION TO REPEAL SECTION 98, MISSISSIPPI CONSTITUTION OF 1890, WHICH PROHIBITS LOTTERIES, SALES OF LOTTERY TICKETS AND LOTTERY ADVERTISEMENTS.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI, TWO-THIRDS (2/3) OF THE MEMBERS ELECTED TO EACH HOUSE, THAT THE FOLLOWING AMENDMENT TO THE MISSISSIPPI CONSTITUTION OF 1890 BE SUBMITTED TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF THE STATE FOR RATIFICATION OR REJECTION AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON THE FIRST TUESDAY AFTER THE FIRST MONDAY OF NOVEMBER, 1992:

Repeal Section 98, Mississippi Constitution of 1890, which reads as follows:

Section 98: No lottery shall ever be allowed, or be advertised by newspapers, or otherwise, or its tickets be sold in this state; and the Legislature shall provide by law for the enforcement of this provision; nor shall any lottery heretofore authorized be permitted to be drawn or its tickets sold.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Secretary of State is hereby directed to give public notice of an election in the manner and for the time provided by Section 273 of the Constitution for the purpose of submitting this amendment to the qualified electors of this state for ratification or rejection at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday of November, 1992, in the manner provided by law for a statewide general election.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the explanatory statement of the substance of this proposed constitutional amendment for the ballot shall read as follows: "This amendment repeals the section that prohibits a lottery and the advertising and ticket sales related to a lottery."

AMENDMENT NO. 2 SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 526

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO SECTION 152, MISSISSIPPI CONSTITUTION OF 1890, TO REMOVE THE REQUIREMENT THAT THE LEGISLATURE DIVIDE THE STATE INTO 20 CIRCUIT AND 20 CHANCERY COURT DISTRICTS AND REQUIRE ONLY THAT THE LEGISLATURE DIVIDE THE STATE INTO AN APPROPRIATE NUMBER OF CIRCUIT AND CHANCERY COURT DISTRICTS.

Section 152. Mississippi Constitution of 1890, is amended as follows:

Section 152. The Legislature shall divide the state into an appropriate number of circuit court districts and chancery court districts.

The Legislature shall, by statute, establish certain criteria by which the number of judges in each district shall be determined, such criteria to be based on population, the number or cases filed and other appropriate data.

Following the 1980 Federal Decennial Census and following each federal decennial census thereafter, the Legislature shall redistrict the circuit and chancery court districts. Should the Legislature fail to redistrict the circuit or

any federal decennial census thereafter, the Supreme Court shall, by order, redistrict such circuit or chancery court districts. Any order by the Supreme Court which redistricts the circuit or chancery court districts shall become effective at a date to be set therein and shall, without alteration of the composition of the districts established in such order, be enacted by the next succeeding session of the Legislature.

The circuit and chancery court districts established by the Legislature prior to the approval of this amendment shall remain in force and effect until such time as they are redistricted under the provisions of this amendment.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Secretary of State is hereby directed to give public notice of an election in the manner and for the time provided by Section 273 of the Constitution, for the purpose of submitting this and other proposed amendments to the Constitution to the qualified electors of this state for ratification or rejection at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday of November 1992, in the manner provided by law for statewide general elections.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the explanatory statement of the substance of this proposed constitutional amendment for the ballot shall read as follows: "This proposed constitutional amendment removes the requirement that the Legislature divide the state into twenty (20) circuit court and twenty (20) chancery court districts and requires only that the Legislature divide the state into appropriate number of circuit and chancery court districts."

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Attorney General of the State of Mississippi is hereby directed to submit this resolution, immediately upon adoption by the Legislature, to the Attorney General of the United States or to the United States District Court for the District of Columbia, in accordance with the provisions of the Voting Rights Act of 1965, as amended and extended.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI, TWO-THIRDS (2/3) OF THE MEMBERS ELECTED TO EACH HOUSE, THAT THE FOLLOWING AMENDMENT TO THE MISSISSIPPI CONSTITUTION OF 1890 BE SUBMITTED TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF THE STATE FOR RATIFICATION OR REJECTION AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON THE FIRST TUESDAY AFTER THE FIRST MONDAY OF NOVEMBER, 1992:

Section 131. When the office of Governor shall become vacant, by death or otherwise, the Lieutenant Governor shall possess the powers and discharge the duties of the office. When the Governor shall be absent from the state, or unable, from protracted illness, to perform the duties of the office, the Lieutenant Governor shall discharge the duties of said office until the Governor be able to resume his duties; but if, from disability or otherwise, the Lieutenant Governor shall be incapable of performing said duties, or if he be absent from the state, the President of the Senate Pro Tempore shall act in his stead; but if there be no such president, or if he be disqualified by disability, or be absent from the state, then the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall assume the office of Governor and perform the duties; and

in case of the inability of the foregoing officers to discharge the duties of Governor, the Secretary of State shall

convene the Senate to elect a President Pro Tempore. The officer discharging the duties of Governor shall receive as compensation while performing such duties, the compensation to which he is regularly entitled by law for service in the position to which he was elected and, in addition thereto, an amount equal to the difference between such regular compensation and the compensation of the Governor. Should a doubt arise as to whether a vacancy has occurred in the office of Governor or as to whether any one of the disabilities mentioned in this section exists or shall have ended, then the Secretary of State shall submit the question in doubt to the judges of the Supreme Court, who, or a majority of whom, shall investigate and determine the question and shall furnish to the Secretary of State an opinion, in writing, determining the question submitted to them, which opinion, when rendered as aforesaid, shall be final and conclusive.

Amend the Mississippi Constitution of 1890 by repealing Section 270, which reads as follows:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO SECTION 273, MISSISSIPPI CONSTITUTION OF 1890, TO PROVIDE THAT AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION MAY BE PROPOSED BY INITIATIVE OF THE PEOPLE AND TO SET FORTH THE PROCEDURE FOR THE EXERCISE OF THE POWER OF INITIATIVE.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI, TWO-THIRDS (2/3) OF THE MEMBERS ELECTED TO EACH HOUSE, THAT THE FOLLOWING AMENDMENT TO THE MISSISSIPPI CONSTITUTION OF 1890 BE SUBMITTED TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF THE STATE FOR RATIFICATION OR REJECTION AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON THE FIRST TUESDAY AFTER THE FIRST MONDAY OF NOVEMBER, 1992:

Amend Section 273, Mississippi Constitution of 1890, to read as follows:

Section 273. (1) Amendments to this Constitution may be proposed by the Legislature or by initiative of the people.

(2) Whenever two-thirds (2/3) of each house of the Legislature, which two-thirds (2/3) shall consist of not less than a majority of the members elected to each house, shall deem any change, alteration or amendment necessary to this Constitution, such proposed amendment, change or alteration shall be read and passed by two-thirds (2/3) vote of each house, as herein provided; public notice shall then be given by the Secretary of State at least thirty (30) days preceding any election, at which the qualified electors shall vote directly for or against such change, alteration or amendment, and if more than one (1) amendment shall be submitted at one (1) time, they shall be submitted in such manner and form that the people may vote for or against each amendment separately; and, notwithstanding the division of the Constitution into sections, the Legislature may provide in its resolution for one or more amendments pertaining and relating to the same subject or subject matter, and may provide for one or more amendments to an article of the Constitution pertaining and relating to the same subject or subject matter, which may be included in and voted on as one (1) amendment; and if it shall appear that a majority of the qualified electors voting directly for or against the same shall have voted for the proposed change, alteration or amendment, then it shall be inserted as a part of the Constitution by proclamation of the Secretary of State certifying that it received the majority vote required by the Constitution; and the resolution may fix the date and direct the calling of elections for the purposes hereof."

(3) The people reserve unto themselves the power to propose and enact constitutional amendments by initiative. An initiative to amend the Constitution may be proposed by a petition signed over a twelve-month period by qualified electors equal in number to at least twelve percent (12%) of the votes for all candidates for Governor in the last gubernatorial election. The signatures of the qualified electors from any congressional district shall not exceed one-fifth (1/5) of the total number of signatures required to qualify an initiative petition for placement upon the ballot. If an initiative petition contains signatures from a single congressional district which exceed one-fifth (1/5) of the total number of required signatures, the excess number of signatures from that congressional district shall not be considered by the Secretary of State in determining whether the petition qualifies for placement on the ballot.

(4) The sponsor of an initiative shall identify in the text of the initiative the amount and source of revenue required to implement the initiative. If the initiative requires a reduction in any source of government revenue, or a reallocation of funding from currently funded programs, the sponsor shall identify in the text of the initiative the

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI, TWO-THIRDS (2/3) OF THE MEMBERS ELECTED TO EACH HOUSE, THAT THE FOLLOWING AMENDMENT TO THE MISSISSIPPI CONSTITUTION OF 1890 BE SUBMITTED TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF THE STATE FOR RATIFICATION OR REJECTION AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON THE FIRST TUESDAY AFTER THE FIRST MONDAY OF NOVEMBER 1992:

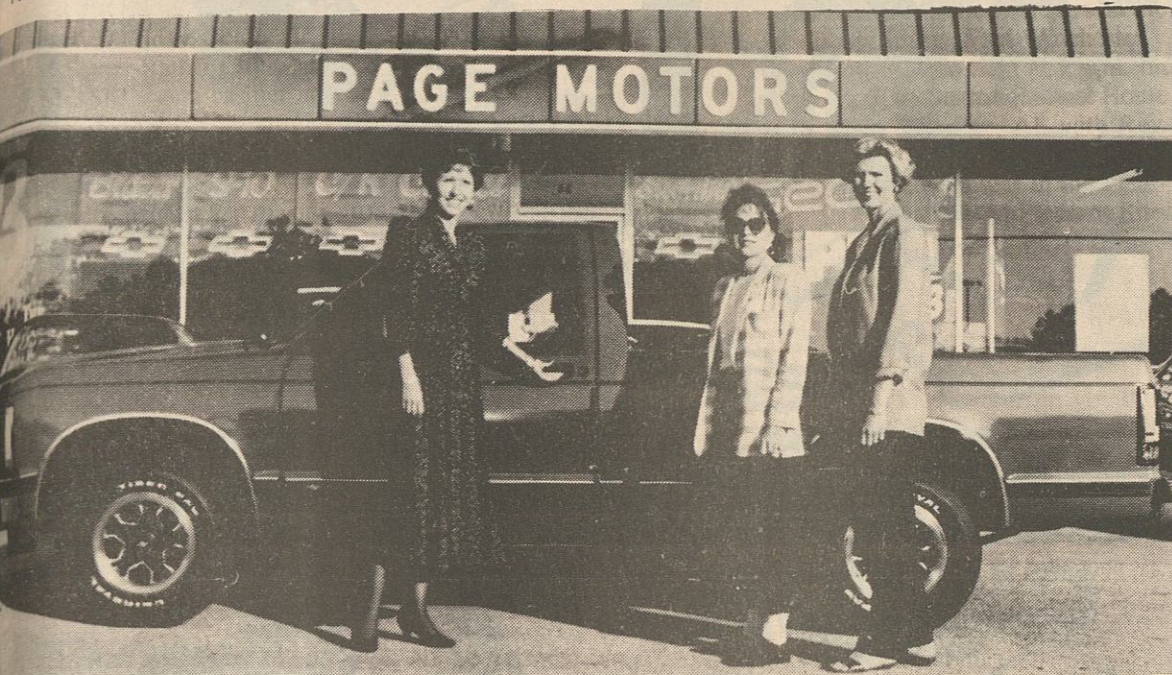
