Strict Regulations Set For Proposed Landfill

New federal regulations that take effect in October, 1993, will ensure that a public landfill proposed for the Northeast Mississippi region is a model of environmentally sensitive design, said an engineer working on the public waste disposal project.

"The landfill proposed by the Northeast Mississippi Solid Waste Management Authority will be a far cry from the old, open dumps that most people are accustomed to," said Nelson Lucius, project manager for Neel-Schaffer Engineers, of Tupelo, which helped the authority draw up its long range waste disposal plan and is now screening the region for potential landfill sites.

"Problems with the old, open dumps are the very reason for the new regulations," Lucius said. "The regulations are very strict in

terms of protecting the environment and public health and limiting the impact on neighboring communities."

The new regulations, known as Subtitle D, carry penalties of up to \$25,000 per day for governments that do not comply. Since no public landfills in the Northeast region currently can meet the regulations, it is expected that all available facilities will close by October, 1993.

The authority has decided to develop a single, regional facility for several reasons: as a way of avoiding uncontrollable price increases resulting from a private monopoly on waste disposal in the region; as a way of prohibiting the importation of out-of-state waste; and as a way of sharing the expense of siting a facility that could meet the regulations. The authority, which

is made up of Alcorn, Benton, Marshall, Prentiss, Tippah, and Tishomingo counties and their municipalities, has submitted its long term disposal plan for approval by the Mississippi Department of Environmental Quality, as required by law. In addition to the regional landfill, the plan calls for recycling, yard waste composting and waste minimization as ways of reducing costs and extending the life of the proposed disposal facility.

The majority of the plan deals with the new Subtitle D regulations, which govern the construction and operation of all non-hazardous solid waste facilities.

-Airports. Federal regulations prohibit within 10,000 feet of a runway used by turbojets, or within 5,000 feet of those used by smaller aircraft unless it can be shown that birds will not create a hazard to aircraft.

-Floodplains. The regulations do not allow any earthworks that restrict the flow of a 100-year flood; reduce the temporary water storage capacity of the floodplain; or result in solid waste washing into the floodplain.

-Wetlands. Disposal areas are barred from designated wetlands unless no reasonable alternative exists, losses are mitigated and water quality is not degraded.

-Groundwater. Disposal areas must be located in areas with low permeability subsoils and a natural or synthetic liner must be installed to prevent groundwater contamination; groundwater monitoring wells must be installed and operated for the life of the facility and for 30 trouble-free years thereafter, and the operator must be financially prepared to correct any damage that might occur. State regulations require that any water wells on the site be plugged.

In addition to these location requirements, the authority contracted with Neel-Schaffer to survey the region for potential sites which are located on sizeable tracts of land, are not in the floodplain and have acceptable subsoils, adequate buffer zones capabilities and appropriate transportation systems available.

In addition to these location restrictions, federal and state operations regulations governing the proposed landfill stipulate that:

-Programs must be in place to detect and prevent the disposal of hazardous wastes and

polychlorinated biphenols (PCBs).

Access to the landfill must be controlled to prevent illegal dumping.

-Liquid wastes must be excluded from the landfill, except those associated with normal household use.

-Refuse must be covered with six inches of dirt daily to control vectors such as insects and rodents and to prevent fires, odors, blowing litter and scavenging.

-Methane gas buildups must be monitored and controlled.

-Open burning must be prohibited except in certain cases, such as for disposal of vegetative debris during landfill construction.

-Surface waters running on to and off of the site must be controlled through the use of berms and sedimentation ponds to prevent any contamination, and there can be no disposal within one half mile of the intake of a public surface water supply, within 1,000 feet of a public water well, or within one half mile of a water body designated for recreational or shellfish harvesting.

-Operations cannot adversely affect endangered species nor nationally significant historic sites unless properly mitigated under federal guidelines; disposal areas cannot be within one half mile of a public park without written consent of the operator, or of any designated wilderness area.

-Disposal cannot take place within one half mile of a hospital, day care center, school or nursing home, or within 1,000 feet of a permanent church.

-Buffer zones must surround disposal areas for a width of 250 feet is timbered or 500 feet if open, and disposal cannot take place within 1,000 feet of the right-of-way of a primary highway unless properly screened or zoned for industrial use.

-Traffic associated with the disposal facility cannot significantly increase the safety risk within five miles of the site.

-Operations must not conflict with local regulations and ordinances and must be consistent with the state-approved disposal plan.

-Operations documentation must be kept at the facility.

-Before disposal begins, plans must be approved for closing the facility and for monitoring and maintaining it for 30 years after it is closed.

High Speed Chase Leads To Arrest Of Florida Fugitive

A car chase by a local Mississippi Highway Patrolman resulted in the arrest of a fugitive wanted by Florida authorities.

According to Mississippi Highway Patrol officer Ricky Marlar, he was patrolling U.S. Hwy. 72 near the Mississippi/Alabama state line Wednesday, October 7, when he clocked a Mercedes Benz traveling at 110 miles per hour. He pursued the vehicle which finally pulled over near the Tishomingo County Magnet High School after reaching a speed of approximately 112 miles per hour in the school zone, Marlar said.

The officer ran an identification check through the National Crime Information computer on the driver and passenger.

"The check revealed that the passenger, Patrick Eugene Craig, mid-twenties, of North Miami, Fla., was wanted in Florida on charges of second degree organized fraud," Marlar said.

He was arrested and held without bond in the Tishomingo County Jail in Iuka until he was

extradited back to Florida Saturday, October 10. Seized during the arrest, at the request of Florida authorities, were items used in connection with telemarketing schemes for which Craig was wanted.

The driver of the 1986 Mercedes, Denise Ann Abruzzese, 22, of Fort Lauderdale, Fla., was arrested on charges of speeding, traveling 112 miles per hour in a 40 mile-per-hour school zone and reckless driving. She was released on bond, according to Marlar. Abruzzese's 3-year-old son was also traveling in the car with the couple. Both Craig and Abruzzese stated that they were enroute to Memphis, Tenn. and the home of Abruzzese's mother.

Marlar said that if he had been in a regular patrol car, he probably would not have been able to catch up to the speeding vehicle, but he has been issued one of the new Ford Mustangs, one of 21 in the state and one of two in the district, that is specially designed for high performance. It is also equipped with a video camera with which he recorded the vehicle chase.

City of Iuka Awarded \$500,000 DECD Grant

Mayor David Nichols announced that the City of Iuka has been awarded a \$500,000 grant from the Mississippi Department of Economic and Community Development. Mayor Nichols states that the grant funds will be used to construct much needed sewer lines on the south side of town.

Mayor Nichols had these comments regarding the grant: "I am certainly pleased with the announcement from Jackson regarding the approval of our grant of \$500,000. The City continues to be successful in attracting Federal and state grants to assist us in our efforts to upgrade our infrastructure."

James B. Heidel, Executive Director of the Mississippi Department of Economic and Community Development had this comment in his letter to Mayor Nichols: "Through this application for funding, the City

of Iuka has demonstrated local commitment in addressing the community development needs of Mississippians. I commend you for this initiative and for helping to improve the quality of life in your community."

Mayor Nichols stated that construction of the proposed sewer lines should begin in about six months.

Three Cities In County Receive Block Grants

Governor Kirk Fordice announced today the selection of 49 communities across the state to receive more than \$15.2 million in public facilities grants, three communities of which are in Tishomingo County.

The grants are issued through the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program by the Mississippi Department of Economic and Community Development (MDECD).

"The State's Community Development Block Grant Program has an established track record of assisting Mississippi communities to improve their quality of life," said Governor Fordice. "I am pleased that we can assist these communities in achieving quality living conditions for their citizens."

"A comprehensive economic development strategy must focus on developing and strengthening local communities' infrastructures," said Jimmy Heidel, MDECD executive director. "The major thrust of the CDBG Public Facilities program is to provide the financial support necessary to improve those basic elements lacking in a community's infrastructure."

"I want to compliment the local teams, represented by the mayors, the supervisors, the planning and development

district officials and private consultants who supported these projects. The joint efforts show the importance of working together to create economic growth."

MDECD received a total of 142 applications requesting more than \$47 million in public facility grants. MDECD uses a rating system for determining which CDBG Public Facility applications will be funded. The maximum score a project can receive is 400 points. The projects funded scored between 323 and 396.5 points.

The grants will be used to assist communities with improvements in water, sewer, street/storm drainage, public buildings, roads, bridges, and other similar facilities.

Communities in Tishomingo County receiving public facilities grants include: Burnsville, \$170,000; Golden, \$350,000 and Iuka, \$500,000.

The CDBG program, administered by the MDECD Community Services Division, provides funding to localities with populations of 50,000 or less for economic development, housing, planning, public facilities, urgent needs, and rural health care.

Home Economics Tips

CARE OF LEATHER AND VINYL

Leather was long used for upholstery and other furnishing surfaces. Today because of the cost of hides, tanning and production, leather is a luxury material used in expensive furnishings.

If you buy new leather furniture, follow the manufacturer's instructions for care. Manufacturers caution not to use oils of any kind, even those customarily used on leather. This is because the tanning process incorporates sufficient oils and other finishes to make the leather last indefinitely without drying or cracking. The use of leather creams, saddle soaps or oil treatments on treated leather can actually harm the finish.

If no instructions are available,

treated leather simply needs to be dusted with a soft dry cloth regularly and occasionally cleaned with a solution of mild soap and warm water. Be sure to wipe the suds away thoroughly with a clean, damp cloth, then lightly buff the leather with a soft dry cloth.

Clean untreated leathers or leathers with little surface protection by dusting. An art-gum eraser may remove ordinary dirt. The uncoated surface absorbs liquids and oil substances. Stains may be impossible to remove. Avoid use of strong detergents, furniture polishes or dry cleaning solvents.

Do not cover leather furniture with plastic covers. The leather needs an air supply to stay supple. Keep the room temperature between 70 and 80 degrees, and do not expose the leather to direct sunlight.

VINYL -- Clean vinyl by wiping with a clean damp cloth. For heavier soil, sponge with warm water and mild detergent solution. Allow the sudsy mixture

to maintain contact for a few minutes, then wipe with a damp cloth and polish with a dry one.

Do not let the washing solution seep into the upholstery padding. Rinse well and pay special attention to areas in contact with hair oils, such as head rests. Clean these areas frequently, because hair oils and tonic make vinyl brittle.

Household cleansers may be effective on very soiled vinyl, but you run the risk of damage if these cleansers contain ingredients such as ammonia or chlorine which can cause damage. Abrasive cleansers may scratch the surface. Dry cleaning solvents can cause the fabric to stiffen and layers to separate. Check labels for products that are "safe for all vinyl." Some special cleaners for automobile upholstery are also safe.

Nail polish and polish remover will damage vinyl permanently if left on the surface. Sponge with synthetic turpentine or mineral spirits. Test first.

Ball point ink marks may be permanent. Try rubbing with alcohol. If this does not work, cover the area with a white cloth soaked in a 6 percent solution of hydrogen peroxide for about 30 minutes. Be sure to test first.

Felt-tip markers will usually leave permanent stains even if wiped up immediately. They may respond to treatment with mineral spirits. Test first.

Vinyl sometimes picks up dye from colored objects with which they come in contact. Use white cloths for cleaning. After using a cleaning agent, wash and rinse the surface with water.

ASCS Farm News

FCIC TAKES MAJOR ROLE IN FEDERAL PLAN TO AID FARMERS

The Bush administration and Congress are placing increased emphasis on the role that federal crop insurance should play in protecting farmers from crop failure. The plan is to make certain that farmers who seek disaster assistance have also signed up for insurance on their 1993 crops.

As the federal government's primary risk management tool for farmers, crop insurance is the mechanism that assures risks of crop losses do not cause an economic catastrophe for the farmer of the federal budget. FCIC will be coordinating with the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) and other Department of Agriculture agencies to ensure farmers get the full benefit of crop insurance as part of their disaster relief plans for the present and the future.

The proposed disaster relief plan links crop insurance with receipt of crop loss disaster assistance payments for farmers. The law required that, with some exceptions, farmers must purchase crop insurance on their 1993 crops as a condition for

receiving disaster payments for 1992 crop losses.

In order to help farmers comply with the law, FCIC has extended the sales closing date for purchase of insurance on wheat, oats, barley, nursery crops, potatoes, rye, and sugar cane with sales closing dates of September 30, to October 31. This will allow farmers an opportunity to meet the crop insurance requirement for ASCS disaster assistance. Farmers cannot avoid the crop insurance requirement by delaying disaster sign-up. Farmers who purchase crop insurance as a requirement for receipt of ASCS disaster payment or debt forgiveness, will be required to obtain a 30 percent or higher market price election.

FCIC is also working with other Department of Agriculture agencies concerning procedures and deadlines to file claims for other 1992 crops. We want to eliminate confusion and make the aid process as quick and easy as we can for farmers.

FCIC has been listening to farmers' concerns and making significant changes in the federal crop insurance program. Expanded options now give farmers a chance to select coverage that more closely meets their needs. Increased attention is also being given to uniform loss adjustment procedures to ensure that good farmers who use the program as intended don't carry the load for the few who might abuse it.

FCIC currently offers insurance on 51 crops that comprise 75 percent of agricultural production. The agency plans to expand coverage over the next five years to include 95 percent of agricultural production.

FCIC is a wholly-owned government corporation established in 1938 as an agency within the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It currently offers insurance coverage on 51 crops in over 3,000 counties across the United States, serving the national interest by improving the economic stability of agriculture through a sound system of crop insurance.

Producers who need additional information concerning crop insurance requirements under the 1992 disaster relief legislation should contact their nearest FCIC field office or their insurance agent.

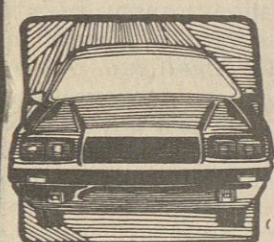

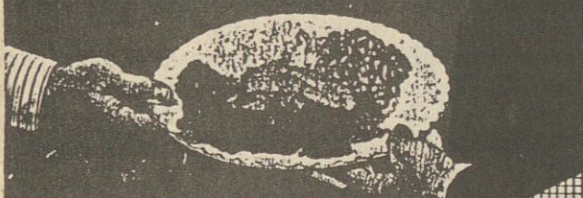


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VISION AND AUTO ACCIDENTS

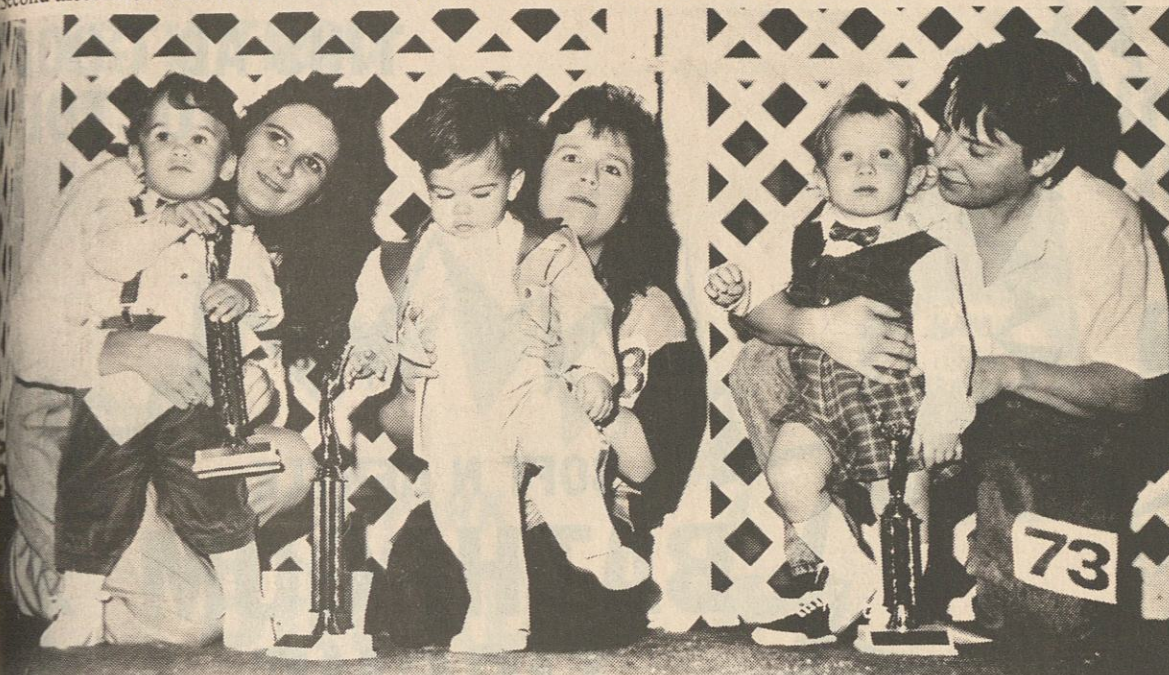

Ten County Residents Arrested On Drug Charges

Reduction Of County Home Insurance Rates

Commissioner of Insurance George Dale is advising homeowners in the Valley Grove Fire District in Tishomingo County that they can expect a reduction in their future home insurance rates due to a change in their fire rating classification.

"The rating was changed from a tenth to ninth class due to improvements made by the district in their fire protection," Dale said. "An average reduction of approximately 19 percent on home insurance premiums could be seen."

He noted that the amount of savings may vary depending upon the company insuring the property, the type construction of the home and special coverages added to a homeowners policy.

Each municipality and certified fire protection district is inspected by the Mississippi State Rating Bureau. Whenever the city or district improves their fire protection services, state inspectors conduct an on-site survey to

verify whether the improvements meet qualifications for a better rating.

"Investing in better fire protection will help not only save lives and property, but it also indicates that the community is committed to a better future for their citizens," Dale said.

lamps are used to warn other traffic about what the school bus is doing. When the bus is approaching a loading or unloading area, the yellow lights will flash. Red lights will flash when the bus is stopped to load or unload students and a stop arm will be extended from the side of the bus.

This system was adopted a number of years ago because it more closely follows other traffic regulations. The alternately flashing yellow lights means CAUTION to other motorists because the bus is preparing to stop. The flashing red lights and stop arm mean STOP. Motorists are required by law to stop at least 20 feet from a stopped school bus that is displaying flashing red lights and a stop arm.

One of the most common bus driver complaints, according to Mr. Magill is that motorists frequently violate the school bus law stop. "Motorists are required to stop for stopped school buses that are displaying flashing red lights and a stop arm," said Mr. Magill. Sometimes the drivers are not fully alert and pass a stopped bus. This action creates a very dangerous situation for the children, especially the younger ones who may not be watching traffic as closely as they should. Students have been killed because motorists did not stop for the school bus while it had its red lights flashing and its stop arm

out. "The school transportation system is a big business," Mr. Magill said. "Last year, our district spent over \$467,403 in transportation services." Mr. Magill went on to explain that besides being big business, pupil transportation is also important business. "Our main concern is safety. We maintain our buses in as safe a condition as possible and they are subjected to inspections by both the State Department of Education and the Mississippi Highway Safety

Patrol. This year the board has replaced 12 older with 12 newer buses in interest of safety, comfort, economics. Both drivers and students are given instruction in safety."

Mr. Magill concludes saying, "I hope that all citizens will work with the district and continue to make our pupil transportation system as safe as it can be."

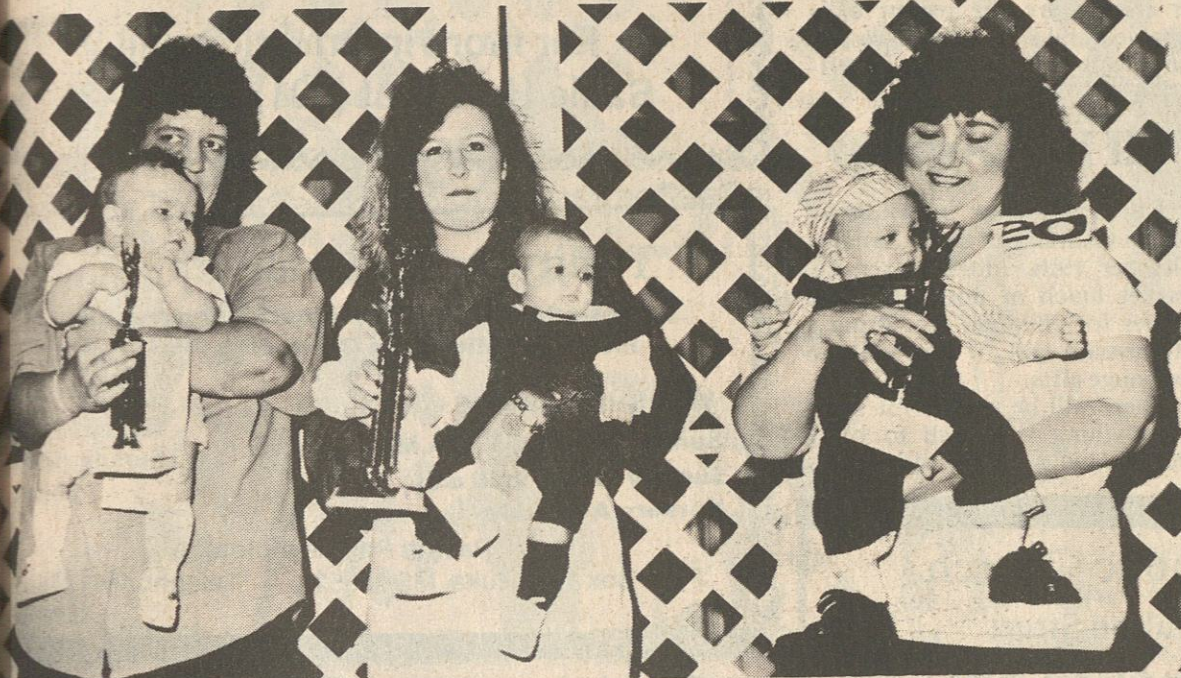

NEMPDD Sponsors Respite Service

Caring for a handicapped or disabled child is often a twenty-four hour a day job. Parents of disabled children often have to serve as therapists, psychologists, and nurses, in addition to performing their normal parental duties. Such constant care can often become mentally and physically exhausting. The Mississippi Department of Human Services will soon be relieving a portion of the burden.

Northeast Mississippi Planning and Development District is sponsoring a new respite program through the Department of Human Services that will provide parents of disabled children an opportunity to take time out from their parenting duties. The Department of Human Services will offer free training to persons interested in caring for disabled children.

The goals of the new Respite care and training are:

- 1) To provide training to caring respite providers.
- 2) To locate families with disabled children and link these families with trained respite providers.
- 3) Assist needy families with the cost of respite services, when necessary.
- 4) Promote community awareness to the need of such services.

This service will be available to families with children age 18 and under. This respite care is not intended to be a full-time service. Rather, it provides parents with occasional assistance so that they can take time out from their normal caregiving schedules to run errands or attend other activities outside the home. It is hoped that this service will give

parents time to recuperate so that they can return to their duties refreshed and rested.

Respite providers will attend 2½ days of training before receiving state certification. The training will focus on CPR and general first aid. The training will also include tutoring in the proper care of disabled children, covering such areas as feeding techniques, communication, and positioning.

This training will take place on October 23, 24, and 31 in Booneville, MS. Certified respite care providers will receive \$5 to \$9 an hour for their services, with the actual fee determined by the physical needs of the child. The Mississippi Department of Human Services will even assist families in paying the caregiver's fee, when necessary.

Parents who register for respite care will be given a list of certified care providers. Parents can then choose their caregiver from this list and contact that person themselves. If the parents have already selected a person to be their child's caregiver, training will be provided free to that person.

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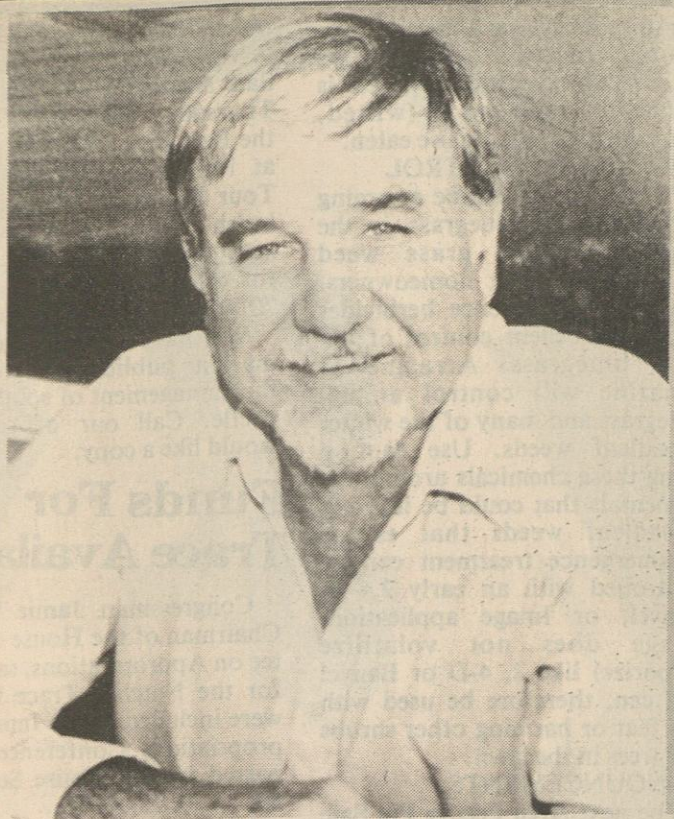
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Chautauqua Speaker To Visit Schools

Chautauqua speaker, Dr. Kit Carson Carter, portraying Jefferson Davis will speak to classes at the Tishomingo County Magnet High School and the Belmont High School on Friday, October 16, 1992. The Tishomingo County Presenting Arts Association, and the Mississippi Humanities Council will present this special program for the students of Tishomingo County.

Dr. Carter teaches history at the Mississippi University for Women in Columbus and has made a special study of Jefferson Davis for this past summer's Chautauqua presentations. The original Chautauqua, which featured well-known speakers on a variety of topics, was described

as "entertaining adult education". The presentation at the Old Tishomingo County Courthouse on August 8th this year proved the concept has not lost its appeal.

Dr. Carter observes Jefferson Davis as an army officer, a congressman, Mexican War hero, U.S. Senator, Secretary of War, defeated gubernatorial candidate, President of the Confederacy, author, unreconstructed rebel imprisoned as a traitor. Before the Civil War, Jefferson Davis was successful in most all of his endeavors. Yet history remembers him as the unpopular president of the failed Confederacy rather than for his long and distinguished career before the war.

Dr. Carter states "In studying the man in preparation for the Mississippi Chautauqua 1992, I begin to see Davis as something

approaching a classic Greek tragic hero. He strove successfully in early life and achieved a great measure of success, approval, and a generally productive and accepted place in the social structure of his time. Then, through no evil intent or unsavory plan of his own, he began to fall into tragic circumstances. The extremes of his character prompted odd and harsh reactions. As a result, history has dealt harshly with Davis. His loser's position has been exaggerated when he is compared, always unfavorably, to Lincoln."

It is with pride that the TCPAA brings this educational program back to the students of Tishomingo County.

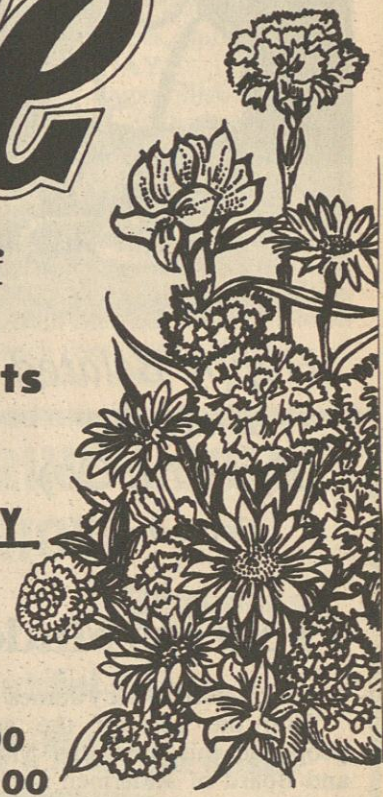

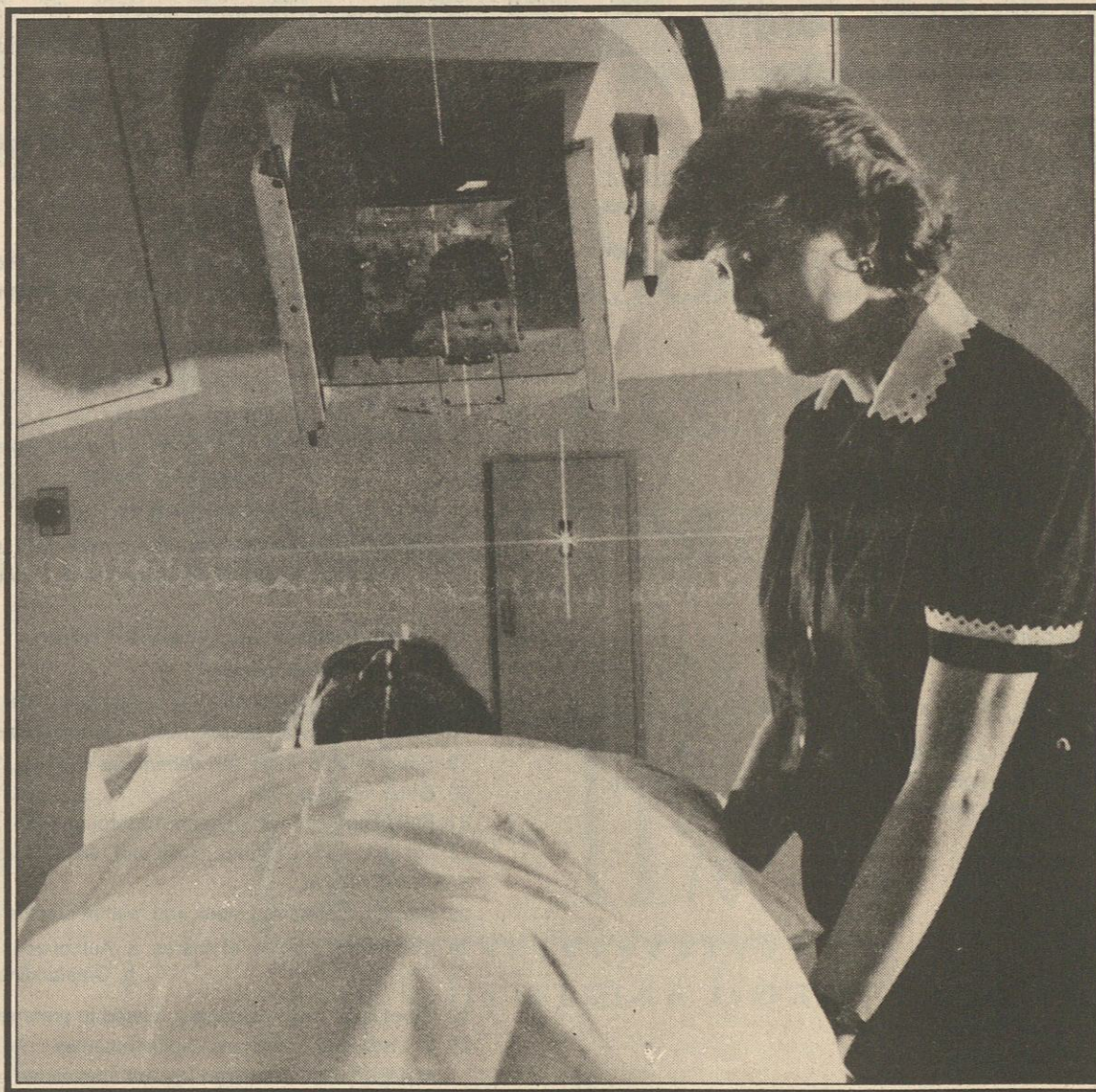

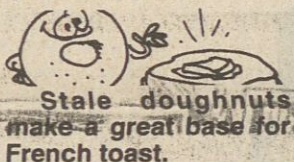

HORTICULTURE QUESTIONS

Why are tomatoes, eggplant, peas and peppers not maturing? These warm season vegetables are reacting to the cold night temperatures. All of these require temperatures above 65 degrees in order to grow well. The night temperatures in the 40's have slowed progress until tem-

peratures move back up.

Can frosted vegetables be eaten? Any vegetable which is visibly damaged (wilted, blackened) should not be eaten.

LAWN WEED CONTROL

Winter weeds will be emerging soon. Annual bluegrass is the primary winter grass weed problem for most homeowners. Several preemergence herbicides provide excellent control of annual bluegrass. Atrazine or simazine will control annual bluegrass and many of the winter broadleaf weeds. Use caution using these chemicals around ornamentals that could be injured. Broadleaf weeds that escape preemergence treatment can be controlled with an early 2,4-D, Banvel, or Image application. Image does not volatilize (vaporize) like 2, 4-D or Banvel and can, therefore be used with less fear of harming other shrubs and trees in the lawn.

In areas of good habitat and deer population, supplemental plantings are not always necessary to maintain deer. However, plantings can be very important to deer in areas of low habitat quality (such as extensive commercial pine forests) or during stressful climatic conditions (droughts, mast failures, etc.).

Deer utilize plantings as small as those found in fire lanes and as big as agricultural fields of several hundred acres. For our purposes, we will discuss food plantings as plots or patches from one to five acres, with an optimum size of two acres. Establishing food plots may be as inexpensive as disking and seeding idle farmland to bulldozing clearings in mature forests. Easy access acres are power and gas line rights of way (check with authorities), logging roads, and loading decks. In pine regeneration areas, coordinating food plot establishment with site preparation can aid in reducing costs.

In establishing any planting, it is important to consider location and soil type. Placing food plots in transitional areas will greatly enhance their attractiveness to deer. Choosing an area with well drained soil improves the quality of any planting.

Good food plots are the result of good seed bed preparation, proper planting time and depth, and adequate fertilization. There is no need to over fertilize, so remember the rule of thumb; use adequate fertilization to keep the plants green and vigorous. When trying a new food planting, check with the local experts and be willing to experiment. Adjust planting times and food varieties to suit local conditions and your desires. Finally, a good deer patch also provides food and cover for other wildlife. From deer to songbirds, good habitat management pays off.

We all wished we could have bottled the wonderful air and brought everyone a bottle. The trip was a grand and glorious experience for all three.

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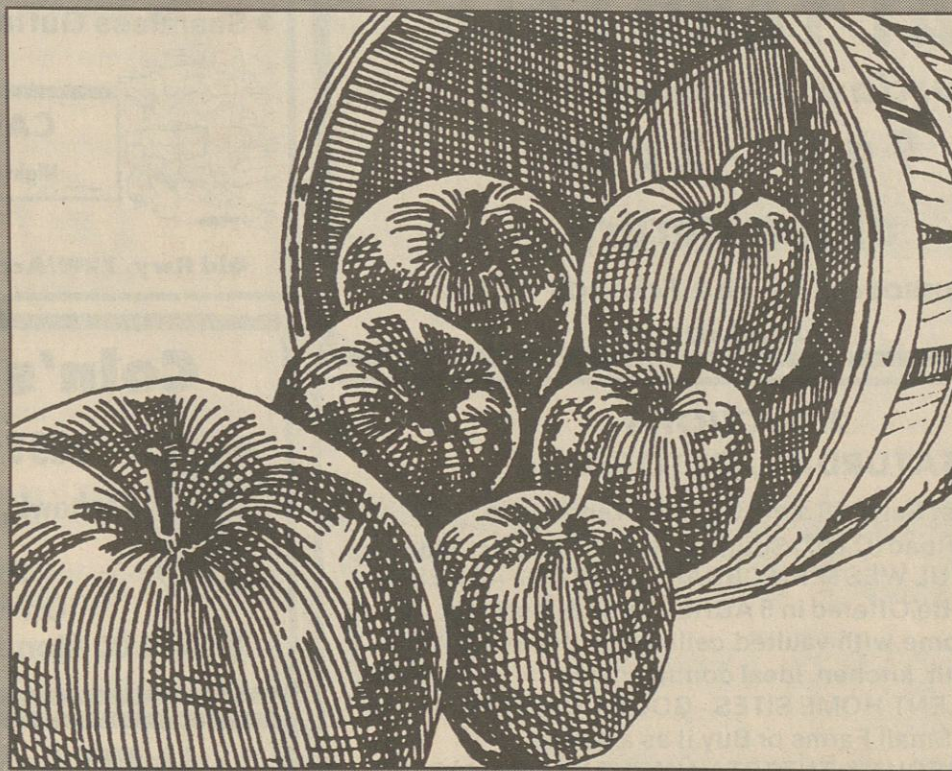
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
