Many Offices To Be Decided In Tuesday's Election

On Tuesday, Nov. 3, voters will go to the polls to vote on the nations highest and most important elected office--the Commander and Chief, the President of the United States.

Along with voting for the office of President, Tishomingo County voters will be voting on seats in the state legislature, U.S. House of Representatives, state Supreme Court and election commission commissioners. Voters in the second district will be voting on their school board member.

Also on the ballot will be eight constitutional amendments. The following is a breakdown of the ballot and voter precincts (A complete SAMPLE BALLOT, sponsored by First American National Bank, is available inside this edition):

PRESIDENT/VICE PRESIDENT

All voters in the county will be able to choose from the following candidates for President/Vice President: (Democratic Party) Bill Clinton/Al Gore, (Republican Party) George Bush/Dan Quayle*, (Libertarian Party) Andre Marrou/Nancy Lord, (Mississippi Taxpayers Party) Howard Phillips/Albion Knight, (Independent) Lenora B. Fulani/Maria Elizabeth Munoz, (Independent) Bo Gritz/Cy Minett, (Independent) John Hageline/Mike Tompkins and (Independent) Ross Perot/James Stockdale.

U.S. HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

All county voters will choose between candidates Jamie L. Whitten (D)* and Clyde E. Whitaker (R) for the seat in the U.S. House of Representatives--First Congressional District.

STATE SUPREME COURT JUDGE

Also on the ballot in all precincts will be James L. Roberts, Jr. (D), unopposed, for Supreme Court Judge--District 3 (Northern)--Position No. 1-- and Lenore Loving Prather (D), also unopposed, for Supreme Court Judge-- District Three (Northern)--Position No. 2.

STATE LEGISLATURE

New District lines have made it necessary for a special election to fill seats in the Mississippi Senate and House of Representatives, filled temporarily during the 1991 election.

The reason for this special election is the reapportionment of the district lines as directed by the Federal Courts after the boundaries were approved by the U.S. Justice Department. The candidates elected in last years election were required to run again in this election in order to be re-elected to the office.

New Mississippi legislative districts, the precincts that they include and the candidates are as follows:

John White (D)* and Mark A. Hatfield (R) will run against each other.

STATE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES (DISTRICT 1)

Includes Tishomingo County Precincts Hubbard-Salem, North Iuka, Iuka, West Iuka, Cole's Mill, North Burnsville, West Burnsville, Burnsville, East Iuka and a split box in Midway

Harvey Benderman (D)* will run against J.R. Long (R).

STATE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES (DISTRICT 19)

Includes Tishomingo County Precincts Paden, West Tishomingo, Tishomingo, Dennis, North Belmont, Cotton Springs, Belmont, East Belmont and Golden

William R. (Bill) Wheeler, Jr. (D)* will run against L.C. Kit-chens (R).

STATE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

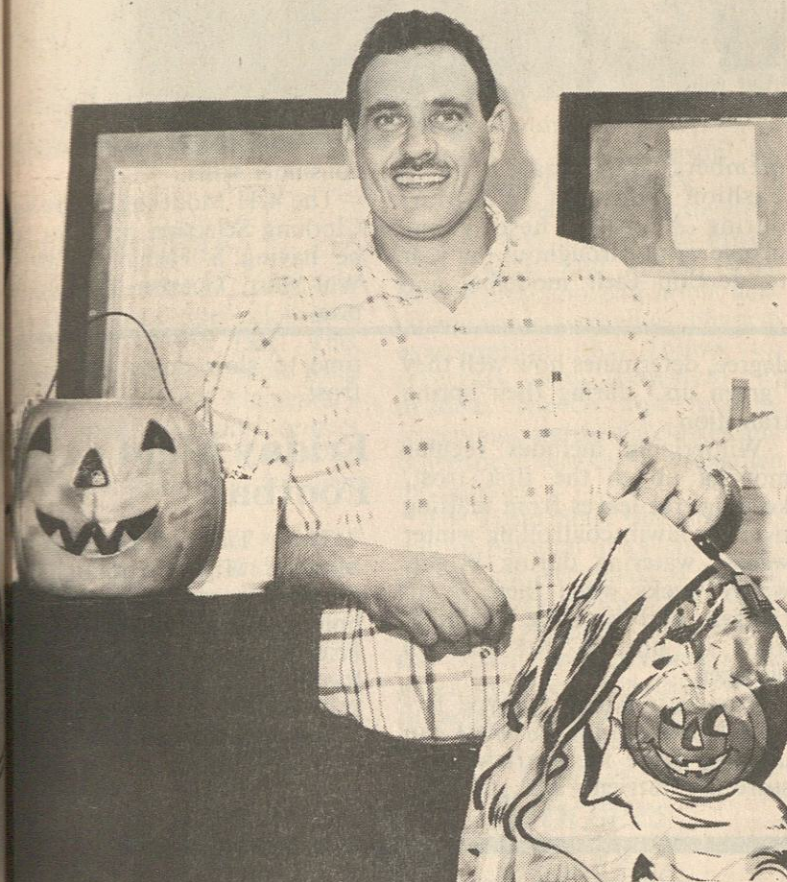
Also on the ballot will be eight amendments that will alter the Mississippi Constitution if passed.

E.S.I. Interested In Locating In County

Public Meeting Set For Wednesday, November 11

A public meeting aimed at acquainting the public with Euthenergy Systems, Inc., a waste conversion company, will be held Wednesday, November 11 at 6:30 p.m. at the Tishomingo County Courthouse.

All interested citizens are encouraged to attend and participate in this public discussion.

Euthenergy Systems, Inc. is a nationally operating company, reaching overseas. Euthenergy Systems, Inc., (ESI), has presented responsible credentials for 28 years, specializing in the process of converting waste to energy. Their plan is to convert industrial, hospital and local municipal waste in our area on the following basis:

1. Engineer and design a 500 ton per day system.
2. Build a modern plant.
3. Provide finance estimated at \$40,000,000.
4. Operate the facility using the largest percentage of local labor.
5. At nominal capacity, employ 250 workers at above local scale.
6. At nominal capacity, project a profit sharing plan to the county amounting to \$25,000 per month.
7. Support a LOCAL PAYROLL of \$5,000,000 per year.
8. Systems to function as a HUB drawing other industries into the adjacent area utilizing steam, power and other advantages.

Arrests Made At Belmont Party

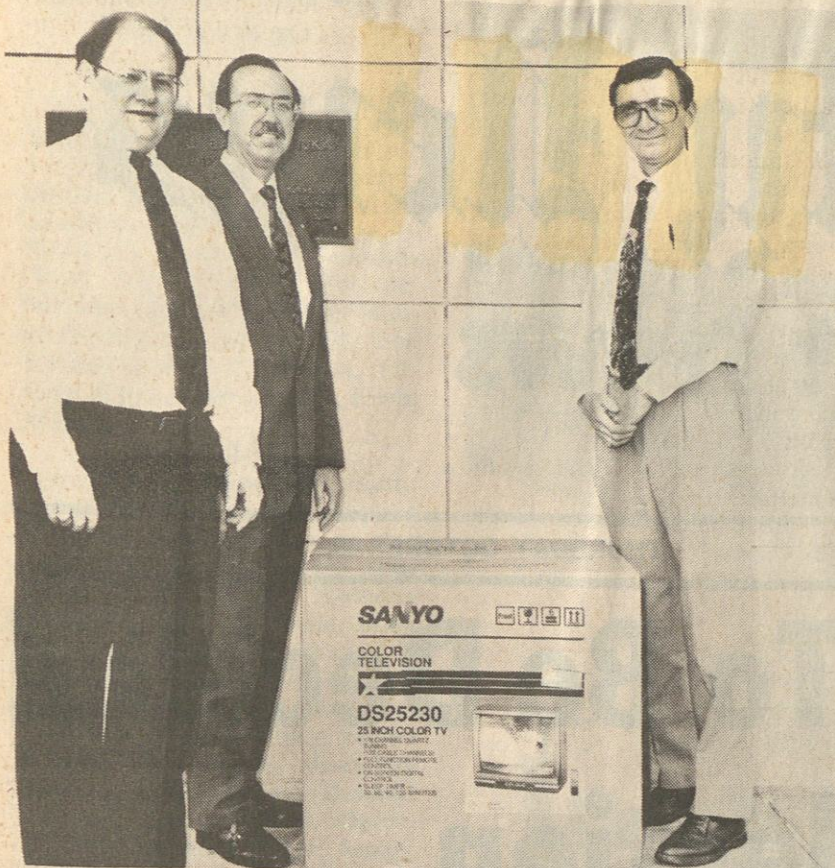
A Golden man was arrested on drug charges at a Belmont residence early Sunday morning, October 25, where a party was in progress.

Fifteen other individuals were also arrested for misdemeanor charges of disturbing the peace during the 12:30 a.m. raid of the party, located at the residence of Mike Holcomb, County Road 16, Belmont.

Approximately four ounces of marijuana were confiscated along with a saddle and saddle bags containing the illegal substance. Nunley said that \$426 in cash was also seized in connection with the drug arrest.

CREATE YOUR FAMILY'S HALLOWEEN

Halloween is celebrated throughout the United States. However, the traditions that surround Halloween are unique to various cities and cultures and have evolved over the years.

In one period in Mississippi's history, the celebration centered around pranks and street dances that occasionally got out of hand. At other times, the fall harvest has been the preferred emphasis.

In the 1940s, each elementary school had its own party on Halloween night. Cake walks, country stores and contests for the best costumes were traditional. Trick-or-treat has faded in and out of popularity

over the years.

Many families now heighten the expectation for Halloween fun by taking their children to local farms where they can select a pumpkin, take it home and make a family treat of carving the jack-o-lantern.

Consider safety, cultural and religious beliefs when deciding how a family celebrates Halloween. Each family can decide what is right for them.

Make this Halloween one of the highlights of the fall season by making a "big deal" out of your family's choice of activities centering around Oct. 31. If witches, goblins, black cats and bats are not for you, then consider a neighborhood party or "reverse trick or treating."

Select a few homes where elderly or needy families live and take them a treat. Make sure that your children help in preparing and presenting the treats and that they understand that you give to

others because you care about them.

Do not lecture on the subject, but display your job in giving. Most important is the enjoyment and togetherness that having fun brings.

HORTICULTURE QUESTIONS

Why are azaleas and other landscape shrubs wilting and losing leaves? Although it is now fall and water requirements are not as high as in summer, the shrubs still need water and we have not had much rain lately.

Can centipedegrass seed be planted now? No, the only grass seed which should be planted now are the ryegrasses and fescues or possibly bluegrass.

Which tall fescue can be used to overseed lawns? Any of the improved, turf-type tall fescues will do for home lawns. Make sure the tag says turf-type, as Kentucky 31 does not make as attractive a lawn.

What can be used to control nutsedge in the lawn? Basagran, Pennant and Image can be used on yellow nutsedge. Image will also control purple nutsedge and wild garlic (onions).

October offers some of the best gardening weather of the year. Dry, warm, sunny days with nights temperatures in the 50's and 60's are ideal for plants.

Be prepared to water the gar-

den every few days for vegetables already established. Newly seeded vegetables and new transplant may require daily watering until established.

Watch for foliar-feeding worms of moths and butterflies on fall greens. Use an appropriate insecticide until cold weather slows down the insects. Other insects to watch for on greens and tender, growing plants are aphids and cucumber beetles.

Harvest sweetpotatoes when they reach the desired size. Dig a few hills to check on the potato size. Remember, as long as the soil is warm and there is adequate moisture, sweetpotatoes will continue to get larger.

If you've ever wondered when to plant onion seeds, now is the time. Prepare a good seedbed (the seeds are small and the seedlings lack vigor) and keep the soil moist until the seedlings are established. For best success, plant in a seedbed where the plants can be cared for until they are large enough to transplant to the garden. A cold frame that can be covered to provide protection in cold weather is the ideal location. Onion seeds sown in October provide transplants for setting in the garden in January, February, and March, depending on where you live. Select varieties like Granex 33 (Vidalia), 10-15 Y, and Crystal Wax.

October is also the month for planting garlic. Plant the individual cloves about 3 inches deep and 6 inches apart in the row. Multiple rows on a raised bed make better use of space. The garlic cloves will sprout before winter sets in.

Harvest Halloween pumpkins when they are completely orange. Patches of green on orange pumpkins indicate virus infection. Cut the pumpkins from the plants to avoid breaking from the plants to avoid breaking off the jack-o-lantern handles. Until used, keep harvest pumpkins in a cool (not cold) dry area. Try not to stack them if space permits.

LAWN CARE

Winterizing the lawn now is one of the best ways to insure that it will be strong and healthy next spring. As the days get shorter and cooler, warm-season turfgrasses begin to slow their growth and store carbohydrates to help them through the winter. The amount they store, to some

degree, determines how well they "green up" during their spring transition.

Winterizing includes regular mowing up to the first frost, keeping tree leaves from matting over the lawn, controlling winter weeds, watering during bright, windy weeks when there is no rainfall, and applying fertilizers high in potash but low in nitrogen.

Broadcast winterizer-type fertilizers now, so the turfgrass can use and store the nutrients and store the nutrients and still have

time to slow down before frost.

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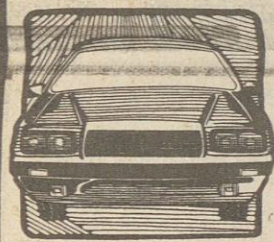

Iuka Headstart Center Celebrates Awareness Day

Friday, October 23, 1992, the Iuka Headstart Center celebrated Headstart Awareness Day. This center is located on Ronnie King Drive near the Iuka Elementary School. MAP Headstart centers throughout the area recognized this day in a special way for their children.

Some of the activities included balloon launching, and special posters prepared by each unit. A special thanks is extended to the Iuka Guaranty Bank for the balloons and to the Balloon Gallery for helium filling each balloon.

The Iuka Center serves 55 three and four year old children. This program first came into existence through the office of Economic Opportunity in 1964. There was a great deal of evidence from various studies showing that environmental factors in the early childhood years, are particularly powerful in shaping children's future growth and development. Project Headstart was launched in the summer of 1965 as an eight weeks pilot program with a goal of helping reduce the negative effects of poverty.

Congress has continued to fund this worth while program year after year due to the tremendous success of the quality of

care for children and the positive impact of the program on children and their parents.

Some of the services provided children are: a nutritious breakfast, lunch and snack, high quality preschool education, dental and vision screenings, physical examination plus follow up referrals and treatment as needed, speech and hearing screenings, parenting classes and other social services to strengthen the families.

The Head Start philosophy is that of parental involvement - as parents are recognized as the first and primary educators of their children. Headstart believes in the parent and encourages the parents to become involved in all the activities of the center.

volunteer.

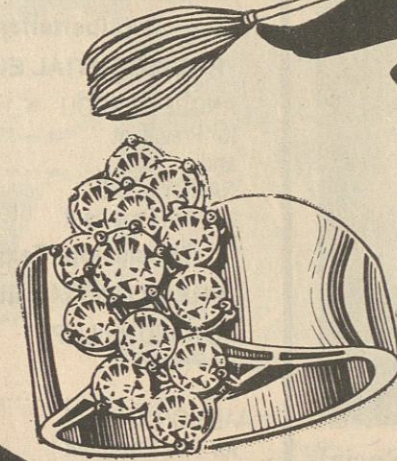

Have A Safe & Fun Halloween

Are you brewing up some "spooktacular" events for Halloween? Make sure your activities are planned with safety and good judgment in mind. To ensure that all ages enjoy "friendly" Halloween experiences, University of Mississippi Assistant Professor of Home Economics Anne Bomba, who directs the Willie Price University Nursery School, offers the following advice:

•Take the occasion to talk to pre-schoolers about Halloween as a time that people play "dress up" and just pretend to be someone else. Assure the children that even if these "pretend" characters look scary, the characters won't hurt them.

•Remember to be sensitive to others. When planning outside decorations and costumes, adults and older children should consider that younger children are likely to come in contact with decorations and costumes either just driving by or when trick-or-treating. Witches, goblins, black cats and other decorations with "evil" expressions can frighten the pre-school gang. Mild, innocuous Halloween decorations are available, or families can make their own. Being sensitive to others also means refraining from wearing costumes that make fun of specific groups or that might be offensive to others. If you are hosting a Halloween party and prefer that guests wear "friendly" costumes, you should make that designation on invitations, giving guests ample

time to plan such a costume.

•Buy or design costumes with safety in mind. While one of the quickest ways of costuming your tyke is by purchasing one of the popular Halloween masks, these can slide around on a child's face, obstructing his or her sight. Be creative with face paint instead. To test for allergies before covering the child's entire face,

test the paint on a very small area of skin. Try to incorporate reflective tape or cloth on children's costumes, and provide flashlights for trick-or-treating. In addition, your children should always be accompanied by adults during night-time excursions.

•When planning costumes, take added steps to ensure children still can be mobile.

Don't expect children to be able to manage long, trailing or bulky costumes that increase the risk of tripping and falling. The same goes for costumes' being too tight. Resist any temptation, for example, to wrap your child up like a mummy. The costume may look realistic, but the child may not even be able to climb up and down stairs.

•Examine any treats before eating them. Children often are overcome with excitement and may suggest eating candy in between houses when trick-or-treating. Since candy and other treats should be thoroughly checked by an adult before being consumed, children should be told firmly that they must wait until they get back home to eat

their stash. Dr. Bomba says isn't necessary for parents stop for a lengthy or frightening explanation of the threat strangers. When they arrive home, the children can do

their favorites from the inspection treats and save the rest another day.

We invite all artists to come out and join us and your friends and family to come and view the art work. This is the biggest art show in this area.

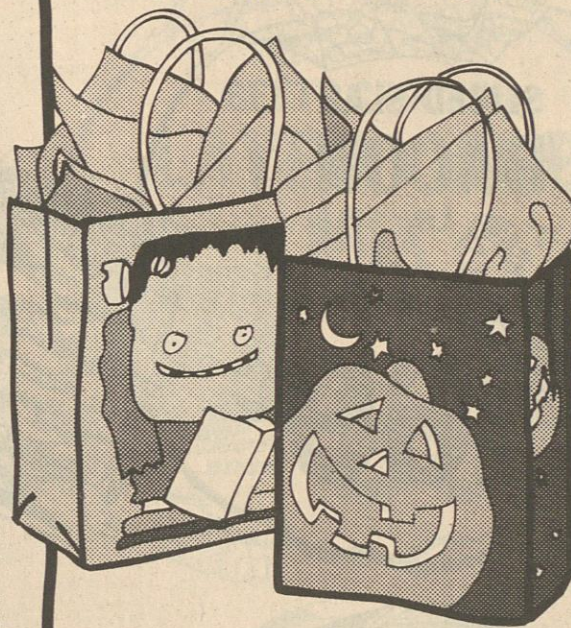

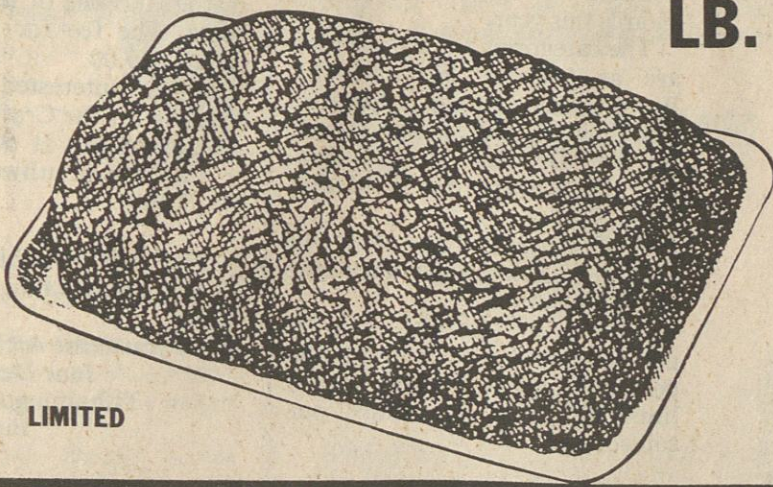

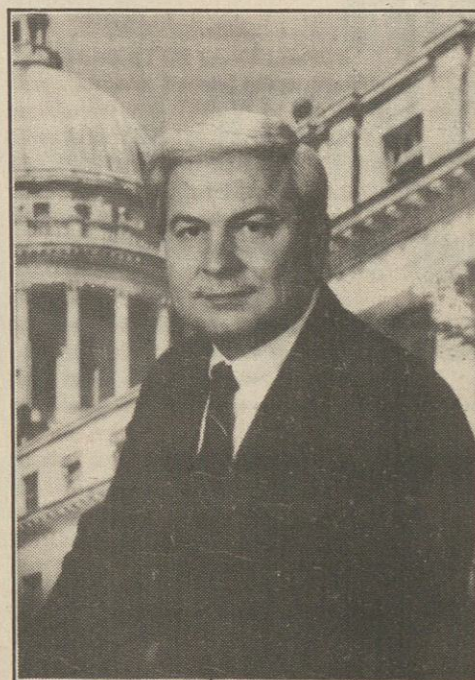

New Real Estate Brokers & Salespersons

Real estate license examinations were held October 12, 1992, in Jackson, Mississippi for those persons desiring to enter the field of real estate sales, rentals and other related real estate activities. There are approximately 4684 salespersons, 4047 brokers and 1300 real estate companies and corporation licensed by the Mississippi Real Estate Commission.

Eastern Mole

EASTERN MOLE

Moles are small mammals that spend most of their lives in underground burrows. Between six and eight inches from tip of nose to tip of tail, they are somewhat similar in appearance to shrews and mice and may occupy the same habitat. Moles are seldom seen by humans, but when seen are frequently mistaken for mice or shrews.

The mole's most notable feature is the greatly enlarged "paddle-like" forefeet and prominent toenails which enable the mole to literally swim through the soil. The legs are strong, the neck short and the head elongated. Ears and eyes are so small that at first glance they appear to be missing.

Moles breed in late winter and have a gestation period of four to six weeks. Single annual litters of two to seven young (usually four) are born in March to June. (Most eastern moles are born in March.) Young moles are born in underground chambers lined with grass or leaves. They are naked and helpless at birth, but growth and development are rapid. About four weeks after birth they leave the nest and are on their own.

Moles prefer moist, loose, sandy loam soils which are easy to dig. They generally avoid heavy, dry, clay soils. They make extensive runway systems in a surprisingly short time (as much as 225 feet of tunnel in one day in suitable soil).

The mole plays an important role in the management of soil and control of lawn-destroying grubs. One of the most abundant small mammals, the mole has for ages been working the soil and subsoil. Only part of his work is visible at the surface. Tunneling and shifting of soil particles permits better aeration of the soil and subsoil. This carries humus farther down and brings the subsoil nearer the surface, where nutrients may be more available to plant roots.

About the only problem moles ever cause is the nuisance of soil disturbance in a well-kept lawn or garden. If this is a problem to you then proceed with control.

An individual mole can be an asset to your land. If a particular mole or moles are where you

don't want them, remove them. However, if good habitat is present, and nearby mole populations are high, control will not be easy. Often other moles will move into areas recently vacated.

The best time to trap is early spring, when the first surface ridges appear. Traps are generally more effective if set about 4:00 p.m. If you need to move and reset them, wait until mid-morning. Handle mole traps carefully and put them away when not in use to avoid endangering some inquisitive child or pet.

Beware Of Scam!

Area residents have expressed concern over the recent phone calls from an agency that claims to be taking donations for local volunteer fire departments. At this time none of the fire departments have a fundraiser of this nature going on, according to Jerry Bonds, Tishomingo County Fire Coordinator. Should someone call or come to your home asking for donations and you are in doubt you can call the Tishomingo County Fire Coordinator on any member of your area volunteer unit.

Are You A Safe Hunter?

Hunting season has finally arrived. It's time to gather up your hunting gear and hit the outdoors. But before you do, don't forget to take time out to think about what you will be doing for the next few months. You are going to be carrying (and hopefully shooting) guns and bows, climbing trees, walking through the woods and across fields while passing close to other hunters, and maybe even operating a boat in an isolated area when the water's temperature is conducive to hypothermia. A hunter encounters potentially dangerous situations every time he goes afield. Hunting is definitely a hazardous sport, and if pursued in a careless manner, could result in a serious injury or even death. It's your responsibility as a sportsman to take every precaution available to ensure your personal safety and the safety of others.

There are numerous things a

sportsman can do to become safer and more responsible while hunting. One of them would be to check frequently the working order of your weapons. Make sure your gun is clean and that all its components are attached properly. Look over your bow, too. Check the limbs for hairline cracks, the strings and cables for wear, and be sure all its components are attached securely. Locating potential problems beforehand is the key to preventing serious injury. If you are going to be walking to or from a stand before daylight or after dark, carry a flashlight. Another thing a lot of people fail to do to wear a safety belt when using a tree climber. Tree climbers may offer a hunter an advantage over the deer, but they place the hunter at a disadvantage if a fall occurs. So wear a safety belt. Most stands come with one. If not, a safety strap of some type can be purchased separately. Another good idea is to hunt with a partner. This is especially important when hunting from a boat or in a remote area. If forced to hunt alone, let someone know where you are going and when to expect you back. It is comforting to know that if something happens while you are out help is not far away. Hunting safely requires a great deal of common sense. Always remember to think carefully before you act. If you ever have doubt about whether or not something is safe, it's probably not. Above all else, adhere to the hunting laws of your State: they were created with your safety as a concern. Also be aware of any special regulations governing the area which you are hunting. Most State and Federal lands have these.

The ideas mentioned here are just a few of the many ways we, as sportsmen, can become safer and more responsible. Mississippi Department of Wildlife, Fisheries and Parks offers a course in hunter education. Mississippi state law requires all persons, whether residents or nonresidents, born on or after January 1, 1972, to complete a hunter education course before purchasing a hunting license. For information concerning when and where a course is being taught in your area you can call the Mississippi Department of Wildlife Fisheries and Parks, Hunter Education Division, at (601)364-2190, or write to them at P.O. Box 451, Jackson, Mississippi 39205. They can refer you to your Hunter Education District Supervisor for specifics about the course.

Good luck, and have an accident-free hunting season.

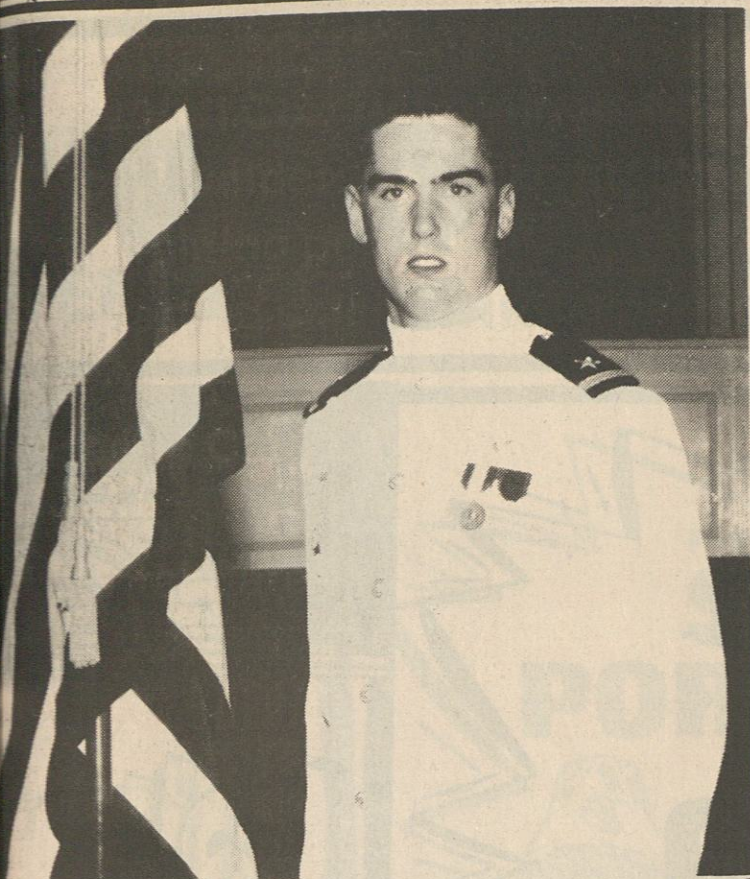

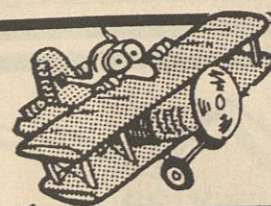
Task Force, trained with each of the eight South American navies or air forces while traveling clockwise around the southern continent. The exercise involved more than 15,000 service members from the nine countries.

SELECTING SAFE HALLOWEEN COSTUMES

ASCS Farm News

The Tishomingo County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service issued cash payments totaling more than \$220,000 to 193 producers participating in the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP).

The annual rental payments are for cropland accepted into the program in crop years 1986-1992. This payment is for fiscal year 1993.

Under the CRP, farmers sign a 10-15 year contract with USDA in which they agree to take eligible cropland that is highly-erodible, or that is causing serious water quality problems, out of annual crop production and put it into perennial grass, wildlife plantings, windbreaks or trees. In return, USDA agrees to provide annual rental payments based on a bid, and shares with farmers the cost of establishing an approved permanent cover on the land.

When USDA accepts the bid, the land cannot be used for crop production, hayed or grazed, and it must be planted to trees, grass

or an approved vegetative cover. About 3,000 acres of CRP cropland in the county are planted to trees.

Nationally, ASCS disbursed over \$1.7 billion in CRP payments to approximately 386,000 producers for enrolling 36.5 million acres in the CRP. DEADLINE EXTENDED FOR DISASTER CLAIMS

Farmers have until February 12, 1993 to file disaster claims for fall-seeded program crops planted in 1991 and harvested in 1992, according to Phillip Horn, CED of the Tishomingo County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. The original deadline was October 2.

"This extension will give producers adequate time to file their claims," Horn said. Horn said a 50.04 percent payment rate will be used to determine disaster payments for crop losses approved under the emergency agricultural disaster program announced recently by President Bush. "This is the same rate that was used under the 1990-1991 disaster program."

The ASCS official said disaster claims will be processed and checks mailed to eligible producers as soon as possible.

Dr. Carmack, Ed. Vidette was in our town last week looking after the interests of the paper.

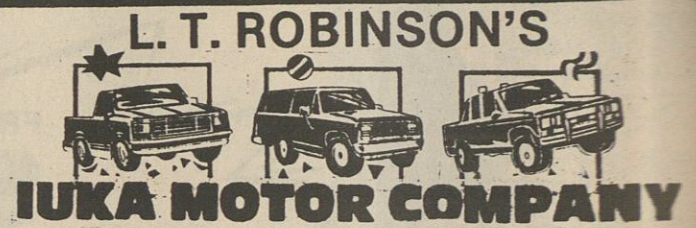

Crow's Neck Director Receives Award

Matt Miller, on-site director of the Crow's Neck Environmental Education Center in Tishomingo County has been named the Environmental Educator of the Year by the Tennessee Environmental Education Association.

Miller, 33, received the award, which honors an individual making outstanding contributions to environmental education in Tennessee, for the innovative teaching and administrative abilities he displayed as assistant director of the Great Smoky Mountains Institute at Tremont.

Miller says the award is a great honor to receive, and it is good reinforcement to redirect his efforts to the people of Mississippi.

"It (the award) means a lot because one is nominated and selected by his peers," Miller said. "It also lets me know that I'm on the right track because people are interested in my work."

As on-site director of Crow's Neck, Miller is responsible for the promotion of the center, program developing, and scheduling, as well as teaching. Getting the word out about Crow's Neck takes up most of his time now, but Miller has lofty goals for the future.

"I want to develop a broad base of user groups," Miller said, "such as elementary schools, secondary schools, educators, and special interest groups. I want to establish Crow's Neck as a learning facility on a region-wide basis."

Crow's Neck will be under the supervision of the North Mississippi Environmental Education Consortium. Established in 1979, the consortium is made up of the Tombigbee River Valley Water Management District, Northeast Mississippi Community College, Itawamba Community College, Mississippi State University, and the University of Mississippi.

Federal budget cuts in the early 1980s delayed the project, and nearly caused the break-up of the consortium. However, it was revived, and with Matt Miller's help, it will maintain and direct the endeavors of the center.

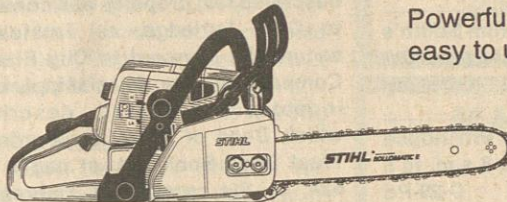

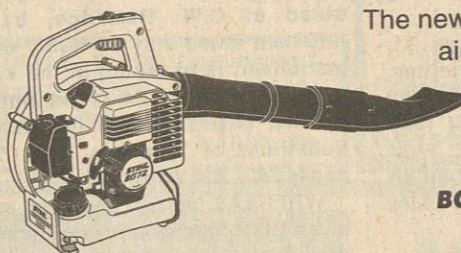

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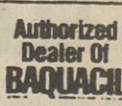

SELECTING SAFE

HALLOWEEN COSTUMES

Even though Halloween is still more than a week away, it's not too early to be thinking about safety when deciding on a costume to wear.

Halloween is the perfect time to let your creativity run wild. When designing your "One of a Kind" Halloween fantasy, keep in mind these safety tips from the Fashion Sewing Council.

-After you've sewn your Halloween masterpiece, check your costume for safety. Make sure your costume is comfortable as well as spooky; you may be wearing it for several hours.

-Costumes that are oversized and pant legs that are too long pose a danger of tripping. Hems can be taped in place for the evening and some costume fullness can be pleated out under the arms to avoid too much fullness.

-Most fabrics are not treated with flame retardants, so be wary of burning candles in jack-o-lanterns.

-Read instructions carefully when using over-the-counter make-up kits or paints.

-If you will be wearing Halloween make-up, test your sensitivity to the cosmetics beforehand by dabbing it on the inside of their arm and leaving it on for at least 1 hour. Children and adults who are sensitive will react during this test.

-Always use a cold cream base under Halloween make-up for easier removal and less sensitivity.

Here are some helpful tips for sewing your Halloween costume.

-Sewing your own Halloween costume is fun and easy, because you are the designer. Get started by selecting costume ideas from your favorite television show, movie or comic strip. Next turn to your local fabric store for ready made patterns and lots of costume ideas.

-Fabric retailers offer supplies for just about every costume need. When selecting your Halloween costume, look for easy-to-sew patterns and follow fabric guidelines.

-To prevent confusion when cutting similarly shaped pattern pieces or pieces with similar names, leave the tissue pieces pinned to the fabric until you are ready to stitch.

-For slippery fabrics, lame and satin, keep a glue stick hand. Swipe the stick along the seam allowances instead of using pins. This slip-proof method holds the two layers of fabric together for smooth seams without pins.

-A regular serged edge or narrow rolled serger hem will save time when hemming sheers. If you are using knits or net fabric, hem finishing may not be necessary.

-There are lots of products available to make Halloween sewing easier. Look for notions like water soluble basting thread, adhesive web or bonding appliques and fabric glue to add beads, sequin, and trims to costumes.

-Always allow extra room for outer wear to fit under your costume.

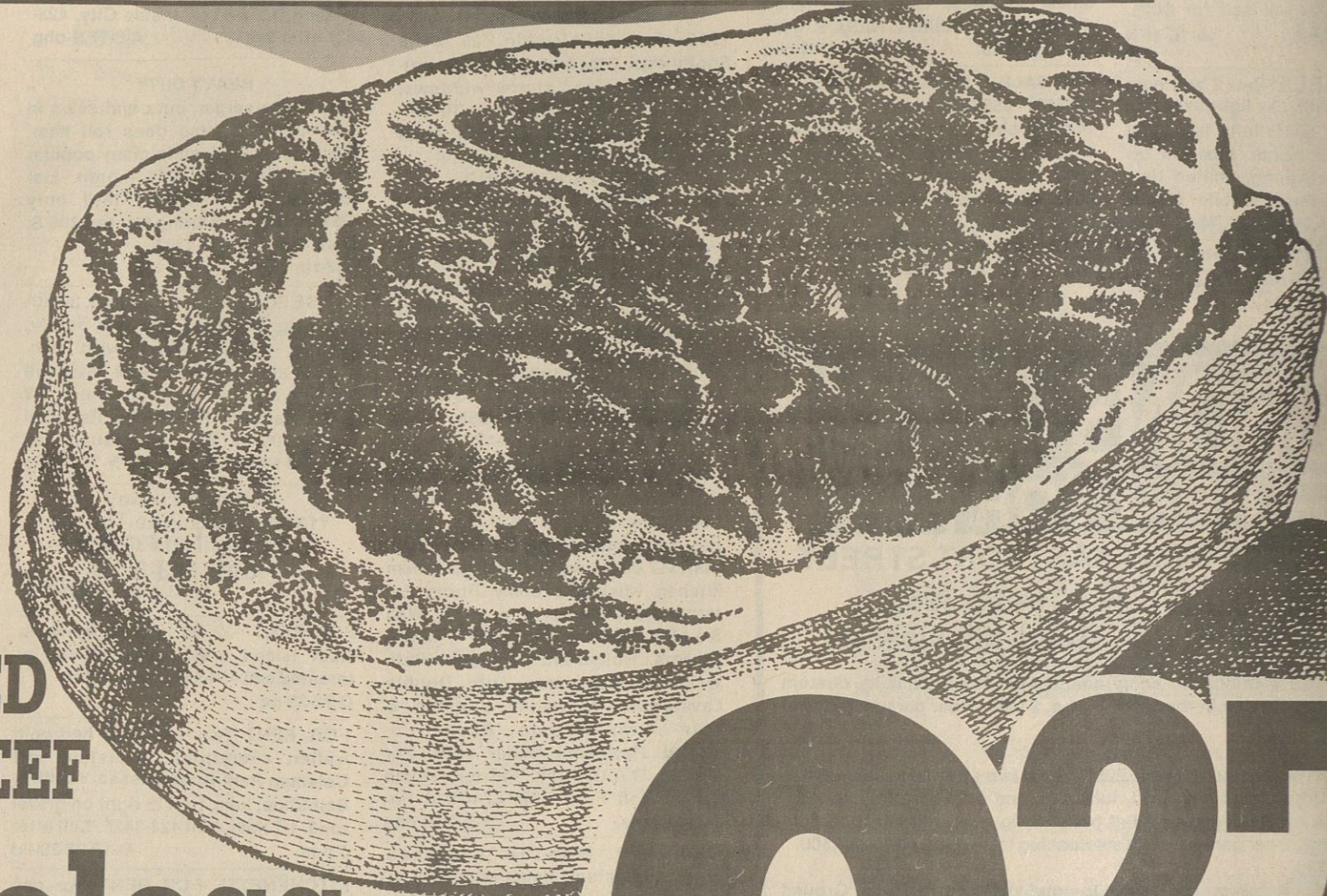
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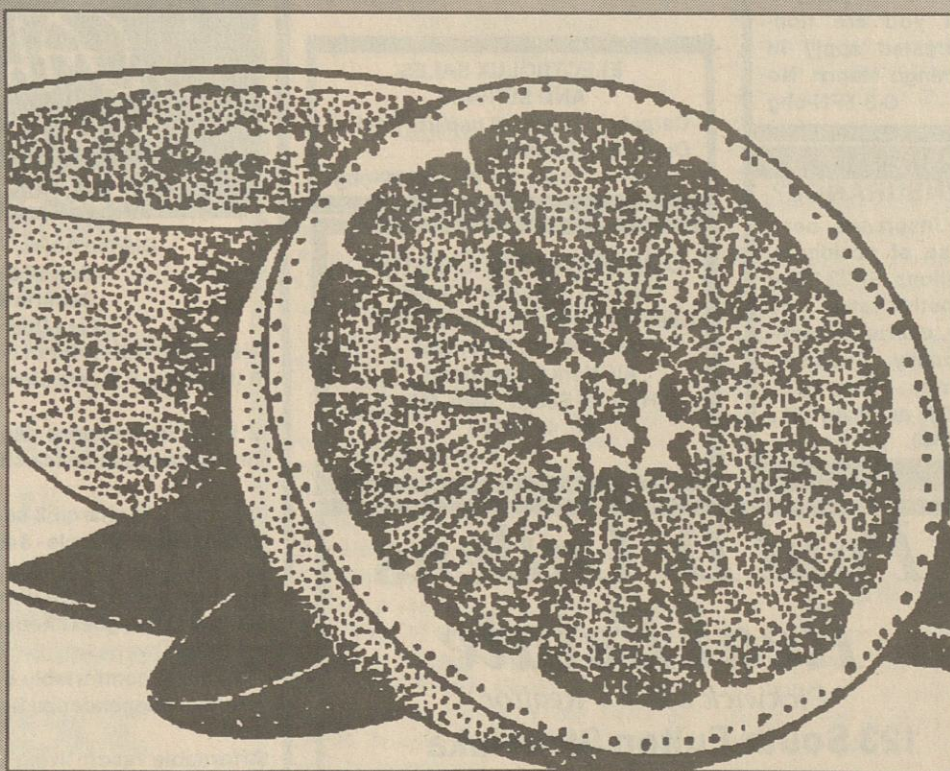
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
