

TWRA Warns Hunters To Be Careful With Tree Stands

Hunters should be careful with whatever equipment they take afield, even equipment that may consider harmless.

In 1992-93 we actually had more reported tree-stand accidents than reported firearms accidents," according to Norman Bates, the statewide hunter education coordinator for the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency.

There were 10 tree-stand accidents reported to the TWRA and nine firearms accidents.

"We had one hunter break his back, another break his ribs and another break his hip, Bates noted. "There were also numerous cuts and contusions caused by tree stand mishaps.'

Accidents occurred in various forms. One hunter fell asleep while atop his stand, which led to a rude awakening. Several had ladders or parts of their tree stands break. One hunter had a ladder blown out from underneath him. Another lost his balance.

"If there is one single safety rule when it comes to tree-stand safety it is that you always need to wear a safety belt," Bates said. Bates also advised against the

use of "so called permanent tree stands," which are often made of scrap lumber.

"I don't advise ever using a permanent tree stand because nothing in this world is permanent," Bates said.

Home Economist Notes

By: Barbara Guinn **Extension Home Economist** YOUR PERSONAL **FURNISHING PLAN**

If you are ready to make changes in your home's interior, you are probably considering adding some few furnishings. The cost of completely refurnishing is often too great for the budget, and few people can afford to discard sound, useable furniture. This may be a good time to evaluate each of your pieces individually. Be as objective as you can. Answer these questions:

*Does it have sentimental value? Perhaps it is a hand-medown from your own family home or a family heirloom.

*Does it have beauty and is it appealing to you?

*If it has no appeal, can you afford to replace it?

Mixing old and new furniture or furniture of different styles challenges the creative process.

It takes visual sensitivity to mix furnishing, yet avoid a hodgepodge. To be successful at eclectic design, apply the same principles you would when using

furnishing of all one type. The task of mixing old and new furniture of different styles is made simpler by first deciding on the mood you wish to create. Is it one of formality, of casual informality, or something in between? Furnishings will blend well if they express similar ideas or a common feeling. Achieve a harmonious look by using similar elements, but some variation of interest.

Lines have emotional quality. Vertical lines in furnishings tend to give a feeling of formality and dignity. Horizontal lines tend to give a feeling of informality and relaxation. Curved lines can give a feeling informality and movement.

Look for repetition of similar lines to help old and new pieces blend together. Let one type dominate, then add small amounts of a contrasting line. For in-

stance, the flowing lines of one or two victorian pieces would add interest to a modern room with dominant straight lines.

Look for similarity of shape in both old and new pieces. Again, one idea should dominate, but a few contrasting shapes will add interest if you use a consistent approach.

COLOR

Color is probably the most useful tool you can use to tie everything together. If a room tends to look cluttered or uncoordinated, the solution often lies in how color is used within the room.

A room will look unified if you repeat a color family. There will be plenty of variety if you use the same color in dark and light values, print and plain fabrics and in different textures. Most rooms can accommodate more than one color family, but you will need to emphasize one color.

Furnishings are softened by time and use. Light, wear and cleaning alter textile colors. Wood surfaces mellow and show scarring with age. Select furnishings with care, or new pieces will make older ones appear shabby and worn.

When repainting walls or choosing new fabric, it is important to choose colors that are soft and grayed enough to blend with older pieces. Clear or clean colors will make older furnishings appear faded or dirty. A warm white or cream is kinder to old







OVERWORKED EYES

If your eyes are overworked, is there anything you can do about it? This is a common question from people who have to do a lot of close work in their jobs, such as working with figures or inspecting or repairing intricately made machinery.

Constantly using your eyes in close work can cause eye fatigue. If the work is done under ususually bright lights. sometimes tinted glasses or contact lenses will reduce some of the fatigue. Or if the light is not bright enough, it may help to increase the amount of illumination Placement of light is also a factor in eye fatigue. If you're working at a desk, for example, you should avoid glaring light. Try to arrange things so that the light source comes from the side and not directly in front of you.

Something else that can help is to rest your eyes when you get home. Don't use your eyes for many more hours of close work, such as reading or sewing, especially if they feel tired. But if the fatigue continues, no matter what you do, you probably need an eye examination to make sure your glasses are giving you all the help you need.

or barbecue sauce. You may prefer to sprinkle a mixture of three parts sugar, three parts seasoning salt and two parts black pepper and then Liquid Smoke on the venison strips.

Line the bottom of your oven with tinfoil, and remove all but one oven rack, placing that rack on the highest level. Stick a toothpick through one end of each strip of meat, and hang each strip from the oven rack by placing the toothpicks across the grates. Turn the oven on its lowest setting, and bake for 24 hours. Store in airtight container. A-#1 VENISON ROAST





deeper and wider than the ball of earth and roots. Then, build up the tree's new home with rich fibrous, loamy soil that contains a goodly amount of decayed organic matter. Fill hole to the point where the ball of the plant will rest at the same level as it was growing before transplanting. Usually, this means that you must allow for settling of the soil. Once the plant is set, fill in around the ball with a mixture of good topsoil such as decayed organic matter and woods soil. The top 2 or 3 inches beneath oak trees in the deep woods is excellent. You cannot overemphasize the importance of moisture for newly set trees. When trees are grown unpruned their graceful limbs sweep to the ground. As leaves fall, they can be raked to the area between the trunk and branches. This gives an ideal "natural" mulch. In some landscape themes grass may be grown beneath the trees. When grass cannot be grown, you'll need to substitute organic mulch. The failure to mulch and water has resulted in the loss of hundreds of Magnolia trees planted in community improvement projects. Seed of Magnolia grandiflora can be germinated if treated properly; but cuttings are difficult to root. Gather seed as soon as they are ripe, before the coating hardens. Gather as soon as the seeds in the cone have begun to turn red. Soak them in water to which one tablespoon of baking soda has been added for each gallon. This prevents fermentation while the seeds soak for 2 to 3 days. Remove and clean off the pulp. Wrap some moist material such as peat moss, or even damp paper towels, in a plastic bag with the seeds to prevent them from drying during storage. Store the seeds in a constant temperature of about 45° F. The hydrator of a kitchen refrigeration is excellent for this purpose. Leave them in moist storage for 3 months at least.

using the HARN. Knowing precisely the location or locations of specific points in the state can provide help in many different ways, the most immediate of which is land surveying.

The standard method of surveying land is time consuming and, at times, not very precise. Today's needs require that land being surveyed be done as accurately and as quickly as possible.

A couple of months ago, a 1,600-square-foot home in the Greenwich Village area of New York City sold for \$425,000. In the Big Apple, as in other areas of the nation, accuracy is crucial in surveying land. Because of the price of land in New York City, a

survey that is off by just several feet can be quite expensive in lost money and property.

Using precision GPS receivers, the High Accuracy Reference Network provides accuracy to within one foot. With the onset of a HARN in Mississippi, surveys will be done quicker, more efficiently and at less cost than current methods.

Information derived using a HARN can provide more accurate tax assessments. It can also be helpful in settling land disputes.

Local government planners can use the data provided by a HARN for flood zoning. The network can help establish with greater precision which areas will

flood and take the necessary precautions to protect lives and property.

Boaters and pilots would find the HARN useful as well. Boaters lost in the open water could use a Global Positioning System receiver to determine their location and find the way back to port. Boaters could also use the HARN to help in navigating Mississippi's shallow waters. Through the HARN, pilots would receive more accurate information for aircraft landings. BRINGING THIS SYSTEM TO MISSISSIPPI

The High Accuracy Reference Network is a program sponsored by the National Geodetic Survey. Currently, 30 of the 50 states

Mississippi will complete the region-wide network for all Gulf Coast states, since HARNs have already been set up in Texas, Louisiana, Alabama and Florida.

Stennis Space Center's Science and Technology Laboratory is bringing national, state and local government officials and private businesses together so the existing reference network can be upgraded and a High Accuracy Reference Network can be established statewide. The Mississippi HARN should be fully implemented by late spring of 1993.

This technology transfer effort

is sponsored by NASA's Office of Commercial Programs in Washington, D.C., and marks the first time a federal agency led a venture to design and support HARN development in a state.

suggestions to cut your chances of contracting colon cancer:

•CUT THE FAT. Although not carcinogens themselves, fats set up a chain reaction in the digestive system that produces cancer-causing substances. They also slow BTT (bowel transport time), increasing the time the colon is in contact with potential carcinogens. "Fats are a double whammy, and that's why it's important to reduce fat intake to less than 30 percent of calories, as the National Cancer Institute suggests," Frate said.

•RAISE THE FIBER. Eating more fiber is the second most important thing to do to reduce colon cancer risk. "This is not just another way of saying 'reduce fat,' "Frate said. "It means eating a lot of wholegrain, high-fiber foods." Wheat bran and rye bran are most effective, but fiber should also come from high-fiber cereals, wholegrain breads, and fresh fruit and vegetables. •LOSE WEIGHT. Although it may be related to specific foods, research suggests obesity raises colon cancer risk by itself, especially among women. Since breast and endometrial cancers have also been linked to obesity, Frate said, shedding excess pounds has additional benefits. •EAT BROCCOLI. Although not conclusive, vegetables like caulflower, broccoli, cabbage, brussels sprouts, turnips and rutabagas contain cancer-fighting compounds. That, and the fact that they add fiber to the diet, is a good reason to eat more of them, Frate said. •GET MORE CALCIUM. Although very preliminary, there is evidence higher calcium levels lower colon cancer risk. To get more calcium, Frate suggests eating more lettuce, beans (kidney, navy or soy), peas, and low-fat, calcium-enriched dairy products. •EXERCISE. The risk of colon cancer is much higher for inactive people than active people. "Exercise speeds up BTT and weight loss, so physical ac-tivity is important," Frate said. •HAVE REGULAR COLON EXAMS. Colon cancer kills more people annually that any other form of cancer, except lung cancer. But it's also easily treated, and survival rates are good if the disease is caught at an early stage.

Grants Available For Tree Planting On Public Lands

Applications are currently being accepted by the Mississippi Forestry Commission for tree planting grants under the U.S. Small Business Administration's National Tree Planting Program.

This will be the third year of the program's availability. It is anticipated that by the end of this year's planting season, over 4,500 trees will have been planted in Mississippi's urban areas under the program. Over 400,000 will have been planted nationwide. The grants available now are for planting projects to be carried

The grant program is designed for contracting with small businesses to plant trees on land owned or controlled by state or local government.

Grant recipients must utilize small business contractors to plant the trees and are encouraged to allow more than one small business to perform the work. In addition, all tree purchases must be from small businesses.

Mississippi is eligible to receive \$159,152 for the program this year. Funds are allocated to states based on population. Local grant recipients are required to match the federal dollars with 45 percent of the total project cost. Proposals for tree planting are

Helping Your Child Cope With Peer Pressure

When your child begs you to purchase a pair of trendy \$100 sneakers because "everybody who is anybody has some" or tells you she doesn't want to take a sack lunch to school anymore because it's "not cool," brace yourself. Peer pressure is moving 1n.

With today's children being bombarded with "what's in/what's out" messages from the media, classmates or playmates, chances are that they may experience peer pressure before reaching puberty, long Dr. Phillip Cooker, says professor of counseling and educational psychology at The University of Mississippi. He offers these suggestions to help children cope with the challenges of peer pressure:

•Find ways to encourage a sense of self-confidence by giving love and encouragement in the

home. Children who fall prey to peer pressure are those who don't believe in themselves. "If a child will do anything to be accepted, that child is vulnerable to giving in to doing anything the crowd wants.'

•Create a balance between freedom and responsibility, which "ought to go hand-inhand," Dr. Cooker said. Let your child know she will have to show more responsibility if she wants more freedom.

•Don't be afraid to say "no" or to go against the norm. "You do have to be the bearer of unpopular news sometimes," Dr. Cooker said. "It takes a lot of courage to be a good parent.'

•Listen, particularly when children come home with a tale of rejection or feel they have failed. However, Cooker cautions against attempting to eliminate the agony of growing pains. "Allow kids to suffer; allow them to make mistakes and to not succeed at something. That's not failure; it's good information. Ask them, 'What did you learn from this?' ''

•Remember, there's a certain amount of healthy behavior you're not going to eliminate. Adolescents, for instance, tend to gravitate toward peer groups as they search for their own identities and begin to spend more time outside the home.

•"Teach them that the choices they make are theirs -- choices they're going to have to live

with," Dr. Cooker said courage independence they're making consistent choices, you'll have to i more.'





3.2 Billion Of Them! Those Holiday Cards & Letters Are Coming

By the end of the holiday season, the Postal Service expects to deliver more than 3.2 billion cards and letters, says Postmaster General Marvin T. Runyon.

Runyon urges everyone to 'mail early' to avoid a last minute crush for better service. "But whenever you mail, we still plan to have those cards and letters delivered on time," added Runvon.

The Postal Service predicts the heaviest mailing day of the year to be December 14 (the Monday of the last full week prior to Christmas) when an anicipated 240 million cancellations will be applied. Last year, 417 million cards and letters were handled the last five days before Christmas.

On a normal day the Postal Service cancels postage on 45 million of the 540 million pieces of mail it receives, with the remaining 495 million business mailings an parcels not requiring cancellation. During the holiday season an average 80 million cancellations will be applied to cards and letters per day. Nearly doubling the normal average.

In addition, a combined total of 16.5 billion letters, business mailings and packages were handled and delivered by the Postal

Fortunately for the Postal Service, many Americans have found sending cards and letters still the best and least expensive way to show their love and remembrance during this special time of the year, Runyon said.






