## Assistance For Low Income Energy Costs

Northeast Mississippi Community Services, Inc. through the Mississippi Department of Human Services, Division of Community Services is announcing the beginning of the 1993 Interim Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP). The purpose of LIHEAP is to provide appropriate and timely assistance to eligible low-income households to offset the rising cost of home energy which is excessive in relation to household size and income. This program will provide financial assistance once annually to eligible low-income households. The assistance will be in the form of payments made directly to energy vendors on behalf of eligible households or in the form of co-payee checks payable to the eligible household and the energy vendor. The amount of assistance will depend on household size, total household income, and type of fuel used by the household. Fuel types may be electricity, natural gas, propane/butane, wood, kerosene, and coal/coke.

At the beginning of the program, a closed application period will be conducted in the following manner:

1. Elderly and handicapped households who have never been served in this program will be served in the first four (4) weeks.
2. Elderly and handicapped households who have been previously served in the next four (4) weeks.
3. All new non-elderly and non-handicapped low-income households who have never been served before will be served within four (4) weeks after items 1 and 2 have been met.
4. After twelve (12) weeks, the program will be opened to all low-income households.

Applications are taken by appointment from a year-around waiting list. Applications are also taken on a first-come, first-served basis. If you have previously had your name added to the waiting list during the 1991-92 program year and you were not served, then your name is still on the waiting list and you need not add your name again this year. If you have never been served before, since the program began in 1981, or if you were served last year, then you need to have your name added to the waiting list

very soon.

Due to limited funds, everyone requesting this program may not be served. Our goal is to serve the elderly and handicapped low-income persons who have never been served since this program began, and to serve the most needy families who are willing to help themselves.

## Santa To Visit Children At Library

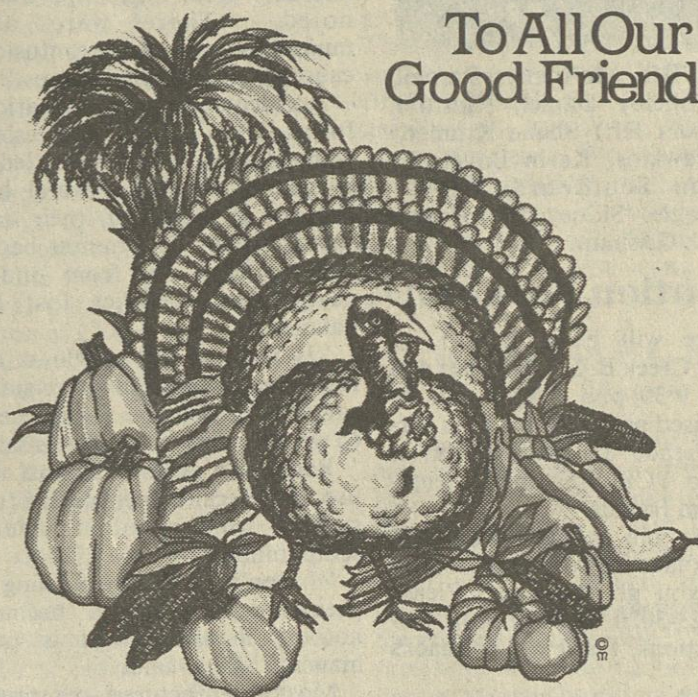

## State Ok's Water Line Extension

Randy Comfort, with the Mississippi State Board of Health, announced Monday, November 23, that a water line extension has been approved for Woodall Mountain Estates.

The 4-inch line extension will be a part of the Midway-Pleasant Hill Water Association. It was needed to accommodate the increased population in the area and also due to the development

of the rocket plant, according to Comfort. The original request for approval of the extension was in October of 1991.

"We would like to thank George Craddock for his help in getting the extension approved," Comfort said. He also said that the Department of Health would like to urge all area water systems to get all extensions approved through the state Board of Health.

The first presentation of the newly formed Tishomingo County Arts Council will be December 6, 1992 in the auditorium of the new Tishomingo County Magnet High School. Ballet Arts of Jackson, TN will present "The Nutcracker" ballet at 2:00 p.m. on Sunday afternoon.

The "Nutcracker" is a two act ballet by Peter Iyich Tchaikovsky based on an original fairy tale by E.T.A. Hoffman. The cast will include approximately 50 children and guest principles. Ballet Arts, is considered one of the finest ballet companies in our area and has grown from humble beginning to a full scale performing company in 20 short years.

#### TWRA Warns Hunters To Be Careful With Tree Stands

Hunters should be careful with whatever equipment they take afield, even equipment that may consider harmless.

In 1992-93 we actually had more reported tree-stand accidents than reported firearms accidents," according to Norman Bates, the statewide hunter education coordinator for the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency.

There were 10 tree-stand accidents reported to the TWRA and nine firearms accidents.

"We had one hunter break his back, another break his ribs and another break his hip, Bates noted. "There were also numerous cuts and contusions caused by tree stand mishaps."

Accidents occurred in various forms. One hunter fell asleep while atop his stand, which led to a rude awakening. Several had ladders or parts of their tree stands break. One hunter had a ladder blown out from underneath him. Another lost his balance.

"If there is one single safety rule when it comes to tree-stand safety it is that you always need to wear a safety belt," Bates said.

Bates also advised against the use of "so called permanent tree stands," which are often made of scrap lumber.

"I don't advise ever using a permanent tree stand because nothing in this world is permanent," Bates said.

Most manufactured tree stands

come with safety belts, which can help keep even the sleepiest hunter free from injuries.

#### UM Outstanding Teacher Nominations

University of Mississippi students, faculty and alumni are being asked to nominate their favorite Ole Miss professor for the 1992 Elsie M. Hood Award for Outstanding Teacher of the Year.

Since 1966, the program has recognized superior classroom teaching with this campuswide award. #### Miss. Game & Fish Awarded Over \$3.4 Million From Interior

The Mississippi Game and Fish Commission has been awarded \$3,433,278 in funding from the U.S. Department of the Interior, according to the state's U.S. Senators.

U.S. Senators Trent Lott and Thad Cochran, both R-Miss., said the money is part of more than \$242 million raised through federal excise taxes paid by America's hunters and anglers. The money will be used by state fish and wildlife programs for land acquisition, habitat improvement, research and education.

"These funds will help the Mississippi Game & Fish Com-

mission to continue wildlife and habitat conservation programs," Lott said. "We are fortunate to have such an abundance of game, fish and forest, and it is vital that our efforts are directed toward maintaining and protecting our wildlife."

A fiscal year 1993 preliminary apportionment of \$1,519,241 will be used for wildlife restoration and hunter education. The Department of Interior awarded \$1,217,006 for wildlife restoration and \$302,235 for hunter education.

A fiscal year 1993 preliminary apportionment of \$1,914,037 is earmarked for sport fish restoration programs.

The funds will be administered by the Interior's U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

## Home Economist Notes

YOUR PERSONAL  
FURNISHING PLAN

If you are ready to make changes in your home's interior, you are probably considering adding some few furnishings. The cost of completely refurnishing is often too great for the budget, and few people can afford to discard sound, useable furniture. This may be a good time to evaluate each of your pieces individually. Be as objective as you can. Answer these questions:

\*Does it have sentimental value? Perhaps it is a hand-me-down from your own family home or a family heirloom.

\*Does it have beauty and is it appealing to you?

\*If it has no appeal, can you afford to replace it?

Mixing old and new furniture or furniture of different styles challenges the creative process.

It takes visual sensitivity to mix furnishing, yet avoid a hodgepodge. To be successful at eclectic design, apply the same principles you would when using furnishing of all one type.

The task of mixing old and new furniture of different styles is made simpler by first deciding on the mood you wish to create. Is it one of formality, of casual informality, or something in between? Furnishings will blend well if they express similar ideas or a common feeling. Achieve a harmonious look by using similar elements, but some variation of interest.

Lines have emotional quality. Vertical lines in furnishings tend to give a feeling of formality and dignity. Horizontal lines tend to give a feeling of informality and relaxation. Curved lines can give a feeling informality and movement.

Look for repetition of similar lines to help old and new pieces blend together. Let one type dominate, then add small amounts of a contrasting line. For instance, the flowing lines of one or two Victorian pieces would add interest to a modern room with dominant straight lines.

Look for similarity of shape in both old and new pieces. Again, one idea should dominate, but a few contrasting shapes will add interest if you use a consistent approach.

**COLOR**  
Color is probably the most useful tool you can use to tie everything together. If a room tends to look cluttered or uncoordinated, the solution often lies in how color is used within the room.

A room will look unified if you repeat a color family. There will be plenty of variety if you use the same color in dark and light values, print and plain fabrics and in different textures. Most rooms can accommodate more than one color family, but you will need to emphasize one color. Furnishings are softened by time and use. Light, wear and cleaning alter textile colors. Wood surfaces mellow and show scarring with age. Select furnishings with care, or new pieces will make older ones appear shabby and worn.

When repainting walls or choosing new fabric, it is important to choose colors that are soft and grayed enough to blend with older pieces. Clear or clean colors will make older furnishings appear faded or dirty. A warm white or cream is kinder to old pieces than a stark white. New wood furniture with a satin or low luster finish is preferable to a high gloss.

### OVERWORKED EYES

If your eyes are overworked, is there anything you can do about it? This is a common question from people who have to do a lot of close work in their jobs, such as working with figures or inspecting or repairing intricately made machinery.

Constantly using your eyes in close work can cause eye fatigue. If the work is done under unusually bright lights, sometimes tinted glasses or contact lenses will reduce some of the fatigue. Or if the light is not bright enough, it may help to increase the amount of illumination. Placement of light is also a factor in eye fatigue. If you're working at a desk, for example, you should avoid glaring light. Try to arrange things so that the light source comes from the side and not directly in front of you.

Something else that can help is to rest your eyes when you get home. Don't use your eyes for many more hours of close work, such as reading or sewing, especially if they feel tired. But if the fatigue continues, no matter what you do, you probably need an eye examination to make sure your glasses are giving you all the help you need.

### DAVID'S JERKY

Venison Jerky is a recipe our ancestors once ate that is fun to prepare. A delicious snack food, jerky can be put in your backpack to take camping and hiking or carried to school or work.

Trim all fat and muscle from the venison, and cut meat into 1/2 to one inch wide strips. According to your personal preference, you can simply add salt and pepper to the meat before curing. Or, you can layer the strips in a glass dish and marinate them overnight in the refrigerator in either a steak sauce with a soybean, ginger and garlic base, Worcestershire Sauce or barbecue sauce. You may prefer to sprinkle a mixture of three parts sugar, three parts seasoning salt and two parts black pepper and then Liquid Smoke on the venison strips.

Line the bottom of your oven with tinfoil, and remove all but one oven rack, placing that rack on the highest level. Stick a toothpick through one end of each strip of meat, and hang each strip from the oven rack by placing the toothpicks across the grates. Turn the oven on its lowest setting, and bake for 24 hours. Store in airtight container.

### A-#1 VENISON ROAST

This recipe often has been voted the A-#1 choice of delicious food in hunting camps. Pour a bottle of A-1 Steak Sauce over the entire roast that has had the outside fat and muscle removed from it. Wrap the roast with several bacon strips, securing with toothpicks. Mix 1 package dry onion soup mix with 1 can cream of mushroom soup and 1 cup of water. Pour over and around roast. Wrap roast in foil, and bake for three hours at 300 degrees, checking for doneness. Or, cook eight hours in a crock-pot.

### Soil Conservation News

The Southern Magnolia has the ability to adapt itself to a wide range of soil conditions. Plants found growing naturally in low bogland can be grown easily on drier upland soil. Small trees (2 feet to 4 feet) will transplant with more ease than will larger ones. To transplant, dig a large ball of earth with the roots, and take care to protect roots from drying

in sun and wind. It is important to give plants partial shade and to give close attention to watering during dry summer months. Watering must be continued until plants have become thoroughly established, usually in 3 to 5 years. Artificial shade may be no more than a simple frame of wood stakes that supports burlap in a canopy over the young trees.

In planting a Magnolia tree, it is important to prepare the hole for the root system. The hole should be dug several times

deeper and wider than the ball of earth and roots. Then, build up the tree's new home with rich fibrous, loamy soil that contains a goodly amount of decayed organic matter. Fill hole to the point where the ball of the plant will rest at the same level as it was growing before transplanting. Usually, this means that you must allow for settling of the soil. Once the plant is set, fill in around the ball with a mixture of good topsoil such as decayed organic matter and woods soil. The top 2 or 3 inches beneath oak trees in the deep woods is excellent. You cannot overemphasize the importance of moisture for newly set trees.

When trees are grown unpruned their graceful limbs sweep to the ground. As leaves fall, they can be raked to the area between the trunk and branches. This gives an ideal "natural" mulch. In some landscape themes grass may be grown beneath the trees. When grass cannot be grown, you'll need to substitute organic mulch. The failure to mulch and water has resulted in the loss of hundreds of Magnolia trees planted in community improvement projects.

Seed of Magnolia grandiflora can be germinated if treated properly; but cuttings are difficult to root. Gather seed as soon as they are ripe, before the coating hardens.

Gather as soon as the seeds in the cone have begun to turn red. Soak them in water to which one tablespoon of baking soda has been added for each gallon. This prevents fermentation while the seeds soak for 2 to 3 days. Remove and clean off the pulp. Wrap some moist material such as peat moss, or even damp paper towels, in a plastic bag with the seeds to prevent them from drying during storage.

Store the seeds in a constant temperature of about 45° F. The hydrator of a kitchen refrigerator is excellent for this purpose. Leave them in moist storage for 3 months at least.

Following storage, they can be planted while still moist in good soil. Protect from birds and rodents until germination which should occur in 2 weeks in warm temperatures.

# Need To Know Where You Are? "Harn" Can Tell You

A new "eye-in-the-sky" way to pinpoint exact locations, that can save Mississippians time, money, property and lives, is coming to the state for the first time through the efforts of NASA and John C. Stennis Space Center.

A High Accuracy Reference Network, or HARN, is being established throughout Mississippi. The HARN uses data received from a system of satellites in orbit 12,500 miles (20,000 kilometers) above Earth in conjunction with specific sites located on the ground to provide consistent location--latitude, longitude and altitude--coordinates.

NASA and Stennis Space Center are excited about bringing this technology to the residents of Mississippi. The space agency is committed to a vigorous technology transfer program," said NASA's Chuck Hill, acting chief of the Science and Technology Laboratory's Technology Utilization and Applications Division at Stennis Space Center.

"Once the system is in place, the Mississippi HARN will provide NASA, the state and private industry with the basic reference sites and controls necessary to support a host of research and operational applications benefiting all parties concerned," Hill explained.

Upon implementation, the state's High Accuracy Reference Network will help provide additional information of greater precision to state and local governments, surveyors, businesses and even pilots and boaters. It could also be used to prevent flooding and to help ships navigate narrow channels.

**HOW A HARN WORKS**  
A system of satellites, called the Global Positioning System (GPS), works hand-in-hand with predetermined sites on the ground located around the state to provide the information required to establish a High Accuracy Reference Network.

Specific sites, 20 to 75 miles (32 to 120 kilometers) apart, will be located throughout Mississippi in the coming months. A certain site is selected because its location is easily accessible and has no obstructions--such as trees and buildings, that would interfere with the satellites' signals.

When at least four satellites make up the 21-satellite Global Positioning System are in view of the ground site, the receiver at that site will collect the signals transmitted from the satellites. The receiver then stores the data and converts it to determine the exact location of the

The Global Positioning System is a powerful tool in calculating locations with incredible accuracy, anywhere on Earth, 24 hours a day.

During Desert Storm, the United States Forces relied on the accuracy of the smart bombs in attempting to accomplish their mission. They were successful because they were able to pinpoint targets with amazing precision. The Global Positioning System assisted in these efforts by providing our military forces with the technology needed to deliver their payloads and to deploy their troops.

With today's integrated circuit technology, GPS receivers are becoming small enough and affordable that, within a few years, they could be carried by just about anyone.

Potential users include farmers, police officers, pilots, delivery drivers, dispatchers and surveyors. Car manufacturers are presently making prototypes of electronic maps that will instantly show the way to any destination, eliminating the need to stop and ask for directions. Within the next decade, the service that the GPS provides could become as common as today's telephone.

**HOW A HARN WILL BE USED**  
Once the latitude and longitude of a particular site is determined by the GPS receiver, all other points can be accurately determined relative to that one site by

using the HARN. Knowing precisely the location or locations of specific points in the state can provide help in many different ways, the most immediate of which is land surveying.

The standard method of surveying land is time consuming and, at times, not very precise. Today's needs require that land being surveyed be done as accurately and as quickly as possible.

A couple of months ago, a 1,600-square-foot home in the Greenwich Village area of New York City sold for \$425,000. In the Big Apple, as in other areas of the nation, accuracy is crucial in surveying land. Because of the price of land in New York City, a

survey that is off by just several feet can be quite expensive in lost money and property.

Using precision GPS receivers, the High Accuracy Reference Network provides accuracy to within one foot. With the onset of a HARN in Mississippi, surveys will be done quicker, more efficiently and at less cost than current methods.

Information derived using a HARN can provide more accurate tax assessments. It can also be helpful in settling land disputes.

Local government planners can use the data provided by a HARN for flood zoning. The network can help establish with greater precision which areas will

flood and take the necessary precautions to protect lives and property.

Boaters and pilots would find the HARN useful as well. Boaters lost in the open water could use a Global Positioning System receiver to determine their location and find the way back to port. Boaters could also use the HARN to help in navigating Mississippi's shallow waters. Through the HARN, pilots would receive more accurate information for aircraft landings. **BRINGING THIS SYSTEM TO MISSISSIPPI**

The High Accuracy Reference Network is a program sponsored by the National Geodetic Survey. Currently, 30 of the 50 states

have established or are in the process of establishing HARNs.

The inclusion of a HARN in Mississippi will complete the region-wide network for all Gulf Coast states, since HARNs have already been set up in Texas, Louisiana, Alabama and Florida.

Stennis Space Center's Science and Technology Laboratory is bringing national, state and local government officials and private businesses together so the existing reference network can be upgraded and a High Accuracy Reference Network can be established statewide. The Mississippi HARN should be fully implemented by late spring of 1993.

This technology transfer effort

is sponsored by NASA's Office of Commercial Programs in Washington, D.C., and marks the first time a federal agency led a venture to design and support HARN development in a state.

suggestions to cut your chances of contracting colon cancer:

•**CUT THE FAT.** Although not carcinogens themselves, fats set up a chain reaction in the digestive system that produces cancer-causing substances. They also slow BTT (bowel transport time), increasing the time the colon is in contact with potential carcinogens. "Fats are a double whammy, and that's why it's important to reduce fat intake to less than 30 percent of calories, as the National Cancer Institute suggests," Frate said.

•**RAISE THE FIBER.** Eating more fiber is the second most important thing to do to reduce colon cancer risk. "This is not just another way of saying 'reduce fat,'" Frate said. "It means eating a lot of whole-grain, high-fiber foods." Wheat bran and rye bran are most effective, but fiber should also come from high-fiber cereals, whole-grain breads, and fresh fruit and vegetables.

•**LOSE WEIGHT.** Although it may be related to specific foods, research suggests obesity raises colon cancer risk by itself, especially among women. Since breast and endometrial cancers have also been linked to obesity, Frate said, shedding excess pounds has additional benefits.

•**EAT BROCCOLI.** Although not conclusive, vegetables like cauliflower, broccoli, cabbage, brussels sprouts, turnips and rutabagas contain cancer-fighting compounds. That, and the fact that they add fiber to the diet, is a good reason to eat more of them, Frate said.

•**GET MORE CALCIUM.** Although very preliminary, there is evidence higher calcium levels lower colon cancer risk. To get more calcium, Frate suggests eating more lettuce, beans (kidney, navy or soy), peas, and low-fat, calcium-enriched dairy products.

•**EXERCISE.** The risk of colon cancer is much higher for inactive people than active people. "Exercise speeds up BTT and weight loss, so physical activity is important," Frate said.

•**HAVE REGULAR COLON EXAMS.** Colon cancer kills more people annually than any other form of cancer, except lung cancer. But it's also easily treated, and survival rates are good if the disease is caught at an early stage.

### Grants Available For Tree Planting On Public Lands

Applications are currently being accepted by the Mississippi Forestry Commission for tree planting grants under the U.S. Small Business Administration's National Tree Planting Program.

This will be the third year of the program's availability. It is anticipated that by the end of this year's planting season, over 4,500 trees will have been planted in Mississippi's urban areas under the program. Over 400,000 will have been planted nationwide. The grants available now are for planting projects to be carried

out during the fall through spring of 1993-94.

The grant program is designed for contracting with small businesses to plant trees on land owned or controlled by state or local government.

Grant recipients must utilize small business contractors to plant the trees and are encouraged to allow more than one small business to perform the work. In addition, all tree purchases must be from small businesses.

Mississippi is eligible to receive \$159,152 for the program this year. Funds are allocated to states based on population. Local grant recipients are required to match the federal dollars with 45 percent of the total project cost.

Proposals for tree planting are due February 8, 1993.

### Seven Tips Can Cut Your Colon Cancer Risk

Research suggests a few simple lifestyle changes are the keys to preventing colon cancer. "This disease is usually the result of a decades-long process that culminates in a cancer diagnosis, so anything people do to interrupt the process reduces risk,"

said Dr. Dennis Frate, director of the Rural Health Research Program in The University of Mississippi's Research Institute of Pharmaceutical Sciences.

Frate -- who headed a three-year, \$840,000 National Cancer Institute-funded study exploring the reduction of cancer risk factors through dietary behavior modification -- offers these

### State's Pine Trees Are Safe From The "Bah Humbug"

The pine shoot beetle, referred to as the "Bah Humbug," is cutting into the profits of Christmas tree growers in Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, New York, Ohio and Pennsylvania.

But a recent quarantine ordered by Jim Buck Ross, commissioner for the Mississippi Department of Agriculture and Commerce, should keep the insect out of Mississippi.

The November 13 order prohibits Christmas tree growers from the above states from shipping infested trees to or selling these trees in Mississippi.

The favorite host of the pine shoot beetle is the Scotch pine, but it will attack other species including most conifer timber and ornamental species -- pine, spruce and fir.

"We pushed for the quarantine to protect our pine forests," said Dr. Stephen Dicke, area forest resource specialist with the

Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service.

"Also, with our timber industry valued at more than \$1.8 billion, we just can't take a chance with this beetle. It might attack our loblolly, longleaf, shortleaf and slash pines, which are closely related to the Scotch pines," he said.

The quarantine will not result in a shortage of Christmas trees in Mississippi.

"We already have a national oversupply of 10 million to 15 million trees," Dicke said. "This quarantine, which is already in effect in at least 20 other states, will probably keep about 5 million trees off the 1992 market."

"It won't spoil Christmas in Mississippi. We should have plenty of trees for everybody, but those that really like Scotch pines had better decide on a different type of tree," Dicke said.

Mississippi's Christmas tree industry was valued at \$4.2 million in 1991. Christmas tree growers can be found in 50 counties throughout the state.

After several years of

depressed prices, the quarantine could be the incentive Mississippi's Christmas tree market needs to boost prices.

"Even though we don't expect a shortage of trees, and we won't see any price gouging, this could help boost prices above the levels of the last few years," Dicke said.

### ACT Dates Set At NEMCC

Residual ACT's will be given on several dates on the Northeast Mississippi Community College campus prior to the beginning of the spring semester.

An application for admission to Northeast must be on file in the school's admissions office prior to testing. To be eligible to take the residual ACT, one cannot be currently enrolled in high school.

A picture identification, such as a valid driver's license, or a letter of identification is required. Students may not repeat residual testing until 60 days have passed since their previous testing.

Tests are scheduled for

December 1, 8, and 15 in the Waller Hall Lecture Room on the Booneville campus. Testing will begin at 8:00 a.m. A \$16 fee is required at the time of the test.

### Helping Your Child Cope With Peer Pressure

When your child begs you to purchase a pair of trendy \$100 sneakers because "everybody who is anybody has some" or tells you she doesn't want to take a sack lunch to school anymore because it's "not cool," brace yourself. Peer pressure is moving in.

With today's children being bombarded with "what's in/what's out" messages from the media, classmates or playmates, chances are that they may experience peer pressure long before reaching puberty, says Dr. Phillip Cooker, professor of counseling and educational psychology at The University of Mississippi. He offers these suggestions to help children cope with the challenges of peer pressure:

• Find ways to encourage a sense of self-confidence by giving love and encouragement in the

home. Children who fall prey to peer pressure are those who don't believe in themselves. "If a child will do anything to be accepted, that child is vulnerable to giving in to doing anything the crowd wants."

• Create a balance between freedom and responsibility, which "ought to go hand-in-hand," Dr. Cooker said. Let your child know she will have to show more responsibility if she wants more freedom.

• Don't be afraid to say "no" or to go against the norm. "You do have to be the bearer of unpopular news sometimes," Dr. Cooker said. "It takes a lot of courage to be a good parent."

• Listen, particularly when children come home with a tale of rejection or feel they have failed. However, Cooker cautions against attempting to eliminate the agony of growing pains. "Allow kids to suffer; allow them to make mistakes and to not succeed at something. That's not failure; it's good information. Ask them, 'What did you learn from this?'"

• Remember, there's a certain amount of healthy behavior you're not going to eliminate. Adolescents, for instance, tend to gravitate toward peer groups as they search for their own identities and begin to spend more time outside the home.

• "Teach them that the choices they make are theirs -- choices they're going to have to live

with," Dr. Cooker said. "With courage, independence, and choices, you'll have to live more."

In 1792 an advertisement appeared in newspapers in United States announcing a gold medal of \$500 or a gold medal of the same value for the best design of a President's House. Chief Tishomingo Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, draws attention to the oldest federal structure in the nation's capital - the White House.

On September 4, 1774 representatives from 12 colonies gathered in Philadelphia for the First Continental Congress. The meeting was not held in the House, but in the smaller Senate Chamber. Choosing a building was significant because it contained no vestiges of British influence and was conceived and built by master craftsmen. In building all delegates were aware of those who worked their hands, as well as of those who owned estates or business interests. The Tishomingo Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, suggests that all Americans Reg this site in Independence National Historical Park.

### 3.2 Billion Of Them! Those Holiday Cards & Letters Are Coming

By the end of the holiday season, the Postal Service expects to deliver more than 3.2 billion cards and letters, says Postmaster General Marvin T. Runyon.

Runyon urges everyone to 'mail early' to avoid a last minute crush for better service. "But whenever you mail, we still plan to have those cards and letters delivered on time," added Runyon.

The Postal Service predicts the heaviest mailing day of the year to be December 14 (the Monday of the last full week prior to Christmas) when an anticipated 240 million cancellations will be applied. Last year, 417 million cards and letters were handled the last five days before Christmas.

On a normal day the Postal Service cancels postage on 45 million of the 540 million pieces of mail it receives, with the remaining 495 million business mailings on parcels not requiring cancellation. During the holiday season an average 80 million cancellations will be applied to cards and letters per day. Nearly doubling the normal average.

In addition, a combined total of 16.5 billion letters, business mailings and packages were handled and delivered by the Postal

Service last year during the holiday season which generally runs through December 31. Cards and letters were up 1.2 percent and parcels increased 3.2 percent over 1990, Runyon noted.

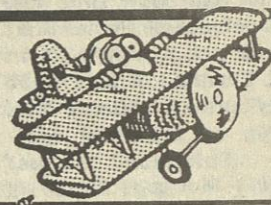
Fortunately for the Postal Service, many Americans have found sending cards and letters still the best and least expensive way to show their love and remembrance during this special time of the year, Runyon said.

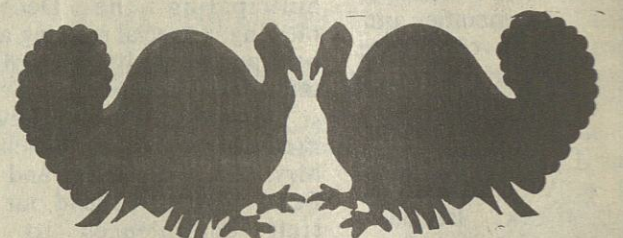
