Belmont Woman Dies In Home Fire

A Belmont woman was found dead after a fire Sunday, January 10, at her home.

The fire was reported at approximately 7:16 p.m., Nunley stated, and its cause is currently under investigation by State Deputy Fire Marshall Mike Ivy of Tupelo, Tishomingo County Fire Investigator Benny Parrish, M.C.I.D., and the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department.

The body of Sparks was taken to the state crime lab in Jackson where an autopsy was performed. The death has been ruled accidental due to smoke inhalation, Nunley confirmed.

An Eudora man has been arrested in Tennessee in connection with the murder of three members of a Eudora Community family.

According to reports, Sherwood Dewayne Brown, 24, of Eudora was arrested Monday, January 11, at a home in south Memphis. The arrest came after a warrant was issued by DeSoto County officials.

Home Economics Tips

By: Barbara F. Guinn, **Extension Home Economist** INDIVIDUAL RETIREMENT ACCOUNTS

An Individual Retirement Account is a personal savings plan that lets you set aside money for your retirement. If you qualify, you can use all or part of your contributions to the plan as a tax deduction in the tax year for which you make the contribution. Also, the earnings (such as dividends and interest) that accumulate in an IRA are not taxed until you begin withdrawing the money. This is true whether all or part of your contributions were taxable when you put them into the IRA.

Before 1987, IRAs were popular because any wageearner, regardless of other pension coverage, could open and fully deduct an IRA. The Tax Reform Act of 1986 reduced the

tax advantages of IRA's for some

Now IRA's are most beneficial for people with low to moderate incomes and people who do not have pension plans at work. While the income tax advantage of contributing to an IRA has been diminished for some, many more people qualify for this deduction than actually take advantage of it.

The Tax Reform Act of 1986 did not change the rules about who can open an IRA, how much can be contributed, or what happens to money already placed in an IRA. The income earned on allowable IRA contributions still accumulates tax-free until withdrawn, and many people still receive an income tax deduction for at least some of the money they contribute to an IRA.

If you are a wage earner under the age of 70½, you can open an IRA with a government designated IRA custodian. Into this account you can deposit your taxable compensation for the

year or \$2,000, whichever is less. All income earned in the IRA

will compound tax-deferred until the money is withdrawn. When the funds are taken out at the allowable age of 591/2 or later, the earnings and any previously untaxed contributions will be taxed as ordinary income.

IRA contributions are 100 percent tax deductible for many people. If neither you or your spouse is covered for any part of the year by a retirement plan, you can take a full deduction for your allowable IRA contribution no matter how much you earn. If you are covered by a pension plan at work. Then the phaseout begins, and partial deductions are allowed for single wage-earners with earned income or between \$25,000 and \$35,000 per year.

If you are one of a dualemployed married couple filing jointly with an adjusted gross income of less than \$40,000 per year, you and your spouse will each be allowed to deduct your \$2,000 IRA contributions. This will give you a combined contribution of \$4,000 a year. This is true even if you or your spouse participates in a pension plan at

Partial deductions are allowed for married couples filing jointly who earn between \$40,000 and \$50,000 a year. Deductible contributions are fully phased out out for dual-employed couples who together earn \$50,000 per

Many other rules apply to IRAs. For example, IRAs are held by individuals only; they cannot be joint accounts. Also, a married person may not deduct IRA contributions if he or she files separately, has a pension plan at work, and has an adjusted gross income in excess of

A slightly higher limit applies to single-earner couples than to a separate individual worker. If one spouse is essentially unemployed (makes less than \$250 a year), the couple can contribute a maximum of \$2,250 a year to their IRAs as long as no more than \$2,000 is put into either person's IRA.

You can put a maximum \$2,000 into your IRA only if your earned income for the year is at least \$2,000, the most you can contribute to an IRA is the amount of your earned income. Except for the non-working spouse described above, a person who has no earned income is prohibited from opening an IRA.

Earned income includes wages, salaries, fees, commissions, bonuses, tips and selfemployment income. Passive income, such as interest, dividends and profits from the sale of your house, does not count as earned income. Once you retire, your company pension and Social Security checks are treated as passive income.

County **Agents** Notes

By: Danny Owen County Agent **GRAZING SMALL GRAINS**

When the weather has been mild with plenty of rain, be watchful of nitrogent deficiencies in your winter grass fields. If growth slows down or if plants show a yellow color then you may need more nitrogen. Excess nitrogen may promote winter injury, but seldom does the equivalent of 200 lbs. of ammonium nitrate per acre hurt plants that need nitrogen.

RADON FACTS

The Environmental Protection Agency recommends that homeowners take action to reduce radon levels in the home if readings are 4 picocuries per liter of air (4pCi/L). The good news is that all regions of Mississippi average below 4pCi/L with 98% registering below 4pCi/L and only 0.1% above 20pCi/L. In some other states, readings have been much higher (152pCi/L in Washington State). Radon is the second leading cause of lung cancer behind smoking. A reliable home test kit is inexpensive and if the levels are too high, steps can be taken to reduce them.



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

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4-H Communicates

TEXTILES When we say textiles, it sounds like a big strange word. It really is not. The words textiles, fabric and cloth mean the same thing.

4-H members enrolled in the clothing project learn about fabrics and textile products and what they need to know before purchasing such products.

Textiles are made from fibers that are spun into yarns. Fibers come from two sources, natural and manmade. Common natural

fibers found in clothing are cotton, wool, silk and linen. Common manmade fibers found in clothing are rayon, acetate, nylon, polyester, acrylic and spandex.

Yarns are made into fabric by weaving, knitting or felting.

Woven fabrics are made when the yarns cross over and under each other on a loom.

Knitted fabrics are made by interlocking loops of yarn. This process may be done by hand or machine. Knit fabrics do not wrinkle easily. Most knits return to shape after wearing or stret-

ching.

Felted fabrics are made by fusing fabrics together by heat, moisture and pressure. Felt is made from wool fabrics. When manmade fibers are used, a bonding or glue-like agent is added to help hole the fibers together. The fabric is then called a nonwoven.

Finishes added to textiles will make fabrics act in different ways. Many chemical finishes have been developed to give special features to fabrics. A finish may make a fabric wrinklefree, stain-resistant or water repellant.

It is important not to confuse a

fabric fiber with the way the fabric was made. For example, polyester means the fiber content. It does not mean a knitted

Three important things to know when selecting a fabric are: fabric content, fabric construction and fabric finishes. Each one will make the fabric handle differently when you are sewing, wearing, or caring for it.

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
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

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

November Unemployment Rate Hits 14-Year Low

Unemployment in Mississippi dropped to the lowest level in three years in November. At 6.1 percent, the unemployment rate is the lowest recorded since May 1990, and the lowest for a November since 1978.

The rate is lower by a full percentage point than October's 7.1 percent. This marks the fifth straight month of decreasing unemployment in the state. November's rate is also lower by eight-tenths of a percentage point than November 1991's 6.9 percent rate.

"This decrease represents a drop of 11,900 workers in the ranks of the unemployed since October. Clearly it's much more than just seasonal improvement," said Raiford Crews, Chief of Labor Market Information for the Mississippi Employment Security Commission.

"There were 17,300 more establishment based jobs and 35,200 more people employed this year than one year ago. This is a robust 3.5 percent growth rate since November 1991, which is outstanding in any labor market."

Growth in jobs from October was 2,600, more than expected in this season when many outdoor industries begin down-sizing, Crews said. Accounting for most of the gains from the previous month were the increase of 2,000 jobs in the service producing sector and an additional 2,000 in wholesale and retail trade.

Since November one year ago, service producing jobs have grown by 18,400. Some 14,600 new jobs were in the entertainment industry, which includes casino employment.

Manufacturing employment was a 248,400 in November, 700 more jobs than one month ago,

but still 3,100 below the record level of 1991; Crews said. Durable goods produced 3,000 fewer jobs than last year. Four sectors--furniture and fixtures (-600), metals (-800), electronic equipment (-1,200) and transportation equipment (-1,100)--accounted for more losses than other manufacturers could over-

Nondurable goods only lost 100 jobs even through lost 2,400 from one year ago. Other industries, led by food processing (+1,000), almost overcame the downsizing by apparel.

As the economy moves further into recovery there should be continued improvement with only seasonal fluctuations.



County Unemployment Drops To 6.7 Percent

According to Charles Smith, Manager of the Mississippi State Employment Service, unemployment in Tishomingo County dropped to 6.7 percent in mid-November, the county's lowest rate of 1992. This compares to 7.8 percent in October and 8.3 percent in November, 1991

The civilian labor force for the county numbered 8,370, 70 more than October, and 320 more than November, 1991. Approximately 7,810 Tishomingo County residents held jobs at mid-November while 560 were unemployed.

Manufacturing jobs in the county numbered 3,340, 70 more than October and 130 more than November one year ago. Nonmanufacturing jobs numbered 3,610, approximately the same as October, but 110 more than November, 1991.

Private Landowners Need To Speak Up

Have you heard about the Tennessee valley Authority chip mill environmental impact study, the coast zone management act or the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's recommendation's for red cockaded woodpecker habitat management on private lands? More importantly have you studied them and their impact on your timberland and its management?

The one common factor in all of the above proposed regulations or recommendations, is the requirement that the landowner request and receive permission before harvesting timber or implementing a forest management practice on his land.

California, often touted as the model for the rest of the country, has a stringent Forest Practices Act. It requires a forest management plan and has strict regulations on timber harvesting. It requires a written harvest plan, developed by a registered forester. The plan must then be reviewed by a number of state agencies and an opportunity for public comment (public hearing) before approval and harvesting can take place.

If any problems are found or local opposition is vocal about your plans, you can be denied permission to cut. Your recourse is to go to court. It's estimated that it. costs a landowner \$50 per thousand board feet of timber sold to pay for these regulations.

In many programs I have told landowners about this and been assured, "It will never happen in Mississippi!" Well, it's here!

A key centerpiece of each of the previously mentioned programs is prior approval and review by a government agency or agencies before management or harvesting can start.

That's the bad news; the good news is that as yet none of the programs have been finalized and are still open to public comment. The public often has left forestry's outcry against such issues to the "professionals" -forest industries, agencies and organizations. The public has got to become more involved and vocal!

Our decision makers know these people, see and talk with them frequently about issues, and use their input. Yet they really want to hear from the voters, the public. It's time now for Mississippi's non-industrial private forest landowners to stand up and be heard on issues that affect forest management and the right an individual has to manage his land as he desires.

The 150,000 to 175,000 private landowners in Mississippi could be a huge voice for the landowner's right to manage his property as he desires. However, landowners must speak up and be heard, not be a silent majority.

The best way to be heard is to join and get involved with a county forestry association. It's the best way to find out about and get information on issues like these. If you don't have a county forestry association call your county agent or county forester to see about organizing one.



As we move forward into 1993, lets take time to look back at some of the headlines of 1992 that affected county residents.

January A grant for \$2.6 million was awarded for construction of a new Iuka hospital. The Tishomingo County Hospital Plan was approved by the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors.

Newly elected county officials were sworn into office.

Twenty individuals were arrested by Tishomingo County Sheriff Johnny S. Nunley and deputies following the raid of an illegal "honky tonk" west of Tishomingo.

Richy Harrelson and Anna Bonds were named as Mr. and Mrs. Tishomingo County Magnet High School.

February

The body of 30-year-old Calvin "Buckwheat" Davis was found dead in the Piney Flat area. He had apparently been murdered, however no suspects were

The Tishomingo County Electric Power Association received a \$1,365,000 loan to make improvements and additions that would provide increased system capacity and reliability. The loan was with the Rural Electrification Administration.

Twenty-year-old Chris Lindley of Belmont spent 11/2 hours stuck between two large rocks in Tishomingo State Park before being rescued.

An illegal 1,000 gal. whisky making operation including a 7foot deep cooking vat filled with sour mash was destroyed by Tishomingo County Sheriff Johnny Nunley and his department. The still was one of the largest ever found in Northeast Mississippi in recent years.

Northeast Mississippi Community College's Board of Trustees awarded Vanderheyden Construction Co. a \$3,698.036 contract for construction of a 50,000 sq. ft. mathmatics/science

Corder Drum Co. located in Burnsville was purchased by Darwin Percussion Manufacturing, Inc.

March U.S. Rep. Jamie Whitten,

Chairman for the House Committee on Appropriations called on the chairman of the House Committee on space, science and technology, George Brown, to recommend an authorization level for the ASRM program that would be adequate to meet a February 1997 first launch date.

Seven-year-old David Jourdan was critically injured when he road his bicycle into the side of a moving pickup truck.

Mississippi Voters went to the polls on "Super Tuesday" backing President George Bush as the Republican nominee for President and Bill Clinton as the Democratic nominee.

Tishomingo County Sheriff Johnny S. Nunley and the sheriff's department recovered approximately \$12,000 worth of tools and equipment which had been removed from a job site and pawned.

Miss Danielle McDeavitt was crowned as Miss Tishomingo County for 1992 and was on her way to competing in the Miss Mississippi Pageant in Vicksburg in July.

April

Richy Harrelson broke the state pitching record as he recorded his 62nd career victory. The record breaking game was played on the Tishomingo County High School Braves home field.

A new boat ramp located at Eastport Beach was dedicated.

Daniel Goldin, the new NASA administrator toured the Yellow Creek ASRM facility.

NEMCC Board of Trustees voted to eliminate the school's bus transportation.

The Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department recovered two safes from the Tenn-Tom Waterway that had been stolen from a Guntown business.

May The Tishomingo County Southern Railroad between

Magnet High School Braves baseball team entered the first round of the state playoffs.

Belmont Homes, Inc. announced the expansion of their manufactured homes plant.

A spending authorization bill for NASA's ASRM plant at Yellow Creek passed the U.S. House with a voice vote.

The Mississippi Arts Commission through a special grant from the National Endowment for the Arts awarded eleven grants totaling \$99,724 to development on-going arts programs in underserved communities.

The Tishomingo County Fine Arts Guild opened the county's first Art Gallery upstairs in the Iuka Family Clinic.

A Memorial Day raid by the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department at the "Waterfalls" near J.P. Coleman State Park led to several arrests.

June

Eleven acres of property located at the intersection of 25 S. and Curtis Drive was purchased by Tishomingo Health Services to build the Iuka Hospital.

Construction got underway for the new Tishomingo County Magnet High School Football Stadium.

Storms that swept through the area downed trees, damaged homes and caused power outages throughout the county with the most damage being concentrated in the Burnsville area.

U.S. Congressman Jamie Whitten announced that \$480 million for the ASRM was approved by the appropriations subcommittee.

Undercover investigations by the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department at a roadside park near the Mississippi/Tennessee State line led to the arrest of 15 men with, among others, charges of solicitation and loitering.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture Rural Development Administration awarded a \$204,500 industrial development grant to the Yellow Creek State Inland Port Authority for the installation of a wastewater treatment system at the Northeast Mississippi Waterway Industrial Park in Burnsville.

Gov. Kirk Fordice announced the appointment of Mack L. wadkins to the Tombigbee River Valley Water management District Board of Directors.

The U.S. House of Appropriations Committee approved \$480 million dollars for NASA's ASRM Plan at Yellow

Local Physician and businessman Kelly S. Segars, Sr. was honored at a ceremony were the Aerospace Business Center in Iuka was dedicated to him.

August The ASRM plant failed to receive funding from the U.S. House of Representatives but was included in a Senate bill which recommended a portion of the initial funding.

Kaydee Metals, a furniture manufacturing plant located in Belmont was purchased by Falcon Products, Inc.

North Mississippi Health Services announce the members for the newly created Iuka Hospital Advisory Board as Gerald Parsons, Harold Oswalt, Donnie Brown, Chuck Levinsky, Margaret June Riley, Gene Jourdan, and Cathi Day.

Dr. Jerry Turner joined the Doctors and staff of the Segars

The Belmont Elementary School was named in memory of Mrs. Irene Harris.

September James Danny McGee of Belmont was arrested in connection with the murder of Thomas Alan Byram of Iuka. The murder occurred at the Pharr Mounds reststop located at the Natchez Trace Parkway.

The Appalachian Regional Commission approved a \$550,000 grant to assist in the purchase of a 41-mile railroad branch line of the Norfolk Corinth and Red Bay, Ala.

First American National Bank announced the purchased of Southbank, located at 627 Highway 25 S. in Iuka.

A second suspect, Greg Leon Dingler, was arrested in connection with the murder of Thomas Alan Byram.

A total of \$360 million was agreed upon by a House of Representatives/Senate appropriations Conference Committee for the NASA ASRM project.

Tishomingo County constable Joe Moyers and his bonding company were sued for \$2.25 million in federal court by Anthony R. Webb of Marietta for injuries sustained during an arrest at the "steel bridge" camp site near Iuka.

October

A bill allocating \$360 million for NASA's ASRM plant was passed by both the U.S. House and Senate, lacking only the signature into law by President George Bush.

An Iuka man, Jerry "Butch" Hatcher, was saved from injury by his waterbed when an explosive device went off under the bedroom of his mobile home.

President George Bush signed the FY93 VA-HUD Appropriations bill giving the ASRM Program \$360 million for the new budget year.

A ground breaking ceremony at the site of the new Iuka Hospital was held after almost three years of planning.

The Tishomingo County Magnet High School football stadium was completed just prior to homecoming.

New federal regulations were proposed for the Northeast Mississippi regional landfill to ensure that the proposed facility is a model of environmentally sensitive design.

Make Sound Decisions To Restore Finances In 1993....

Did you get carried away with your credit cards during the holidays, or have you had an unexpected emergency that simply overextended you financially? The new year is the time to plan a realistic, yet workable, plan to decrease your debt load, says Dr. Mary Ann Boose, assistant professor of economics and finance at The University of Mississippi.

Cut up your credit cards, or put them where they won't tempt you. "Go to a cash-only basis. When you are having trouble making ends meet, don't rely on credit cards to get you out of the crunch. Paying cash makes you constantly measure the necessity of a purchase," Dr. Boose said.

Do not ignore any creditor. Every creditor needs to hear from you each month or it will be assumed that you are avoiding the creditor or defaulting on the debt. Try to negotiate lower monthly payments. If successful, keep up your end of the agreement by seeing that payments are made.

Decrease your cash outflow. Consider selling your car, truck or motorcycle to eliminate one of your monthly payments. Remember the price you can get for the vehicle should be as much or more than the money you owe on it. Find living arrangements that cost less. Give up anything you can live without - dining out, smoking, etc.

■ Increase your income. Many people get a second job on a parttime basis to supplement the family income. If you don't want to ask someone for this extra employment, come up with your own part-time business -- babysitting, lawn work, house cleaning, car washing, etc.

Write down every dollar and cent you spend for two months. Discipline will come from recording all expenditures, and you can recognize spending problems. Some families do this -- not because of financial difficulties but just as a means of identifying any extra money that could be added to retirement, vacation funds, etc.

Determine the reasons you spend as you do. In addition to knowing how you spend your money, know why you spend your money. If you spend money excessively to enhance your selfimage, for instance, find another activity to make you feel good about yourself -- exercise or a lowcost hobby.





A Report From.... Senator John White

A renewed energy and much optimism established an environment for creative accomplishment as the 108th Regular Session of the Mississippi State Senate convened at the Capitol on Tuesday, January 5, 1993.

The Congressional District caucuses for the election of members to the Rules Committee selected Senator Roger Wicker, District 1; Senator Doug Anderson, District 2; Senator Rob Smith, District 3; Senator Dick Hall, District 4; and Senator Clyde Woodfield, District 5, to handle any questions concerning the internal rules for members of

Lieutenant Governor Eddie Briggs released committee assignments, hoping to meet a crucial need to enhance the chances for success by the Legislative body. There is good reason to expect that the Senate will gain the commitment of the people to meet its present challenges. The chairman and members of each of the twenty-eight committees hope to bring into perspective what our state has achieved in the past and what roles need to be pursued in the future. Leadership is the catalyst needed to transform the Senate's vision into viable results.

There are a number of legislative irons in the fire. Over two hundred bills have already been introduced and the Lieutenant Governor has referred them to the appropriate committees for committee action. Senators have until Monday, January 18th, to have all general

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

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

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo, Mississippi as follows:

Section 1. Title and Purposes of Ordinance

1.1 Title

This Ordinance shall be known as the Tishomingo, Mississippi Cable Television Franchise Ordinance.

1.2 Purposes

The purposes of this Ordinance are: a) to establish the terms and conditions under which a cable television system within the Town must operate; b) to provide for the payment of a franchise fee to the Town for the use of Town streets and other public rights of way and to compensate the Town for costs associated with administering and regulating the system; and; c) to grant a cable television franchise to Falcon First Southeast (hereafter referred to as either "Falcon" or "Franchisee").

Section 2. Definition

For the purposes of this Ordinance the following terms, phrases, words and their derivations shall have the meaning defined herein, unless the context clearly indicates that another meaning is intended. Words used in the present tense include the future, words in the plural number include the singular number, and words in the singular number include the plural number.

2.1 "Cable Act" means The Cable Communications Policy Act of 1984, 47
U.S.C., section 521 et seq. and such future legislation as may amend or supersede it.

2.2 "Cable Television System" or "Cable TV System" means any non-broadcast facility consisting of a set of transmission paths and associated signal reception, transmission and control equipment, that is designed to distribute to subscribers audio, video and other forms of electronic or electrical signals.

2.3 "Channel" is a band of frequencies, in the electromagnetic spectrum, capable of carrying one audio-visual television signal.

2.4 "Town" means Tishomingo, Mississippi in its present form or in any later reorganized, consolidated, enlarged or reincorporated form.

2.5 "Board of Supervisors" means the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo,

2.6 "Falcon" means Falcon First Southeast, which may also be referred to as "Franchisee"

2.7 "FCC" means the Federal Communications Commission.

2.8 "Franchise" means the rights granted pursuant to this Ordinance to construct, own and operate a cable television system along the public ways in the Town, or within specified areas in the Town.

2.9 "Franchise Area" means that portion of the Town for which a franchise is granted under the authority of this Ordinance. If not otherwise stated in an exhibit to this Ordinance, the Franchise Area shall be the legal and geographic limits of the Town, including all territory which may be hereafter annexed to the Town.

2.10 "Franchisee" means a person or business entity or its lawful successor or Assignee which has been granted a franchise by the Board of Supervisors pursuant

to this Ordinance

2.11 "Gross Subscriber Receipts", as the term is used in calculating franchise fees, shall mean the revenues actually received, rather than merely billed, by the Franchisee from its cable television subscribers within the Town after deducting the following: a) any fees or assessments levied on subscribers or users of the system which are collected by the Franchisee for payment to a governmental entity; b) franchise fees paid by the Franchisee to the Town; c) state or local sales or property taxes imposed on the Franchisee and paid to a governmental entity; and d) federal copyright fees paid by the Franchisee to the Copyright Tribunal in Washington, DC.

2.12 "Public Way" or "Right-of-Way" means the surface, the air space above the surface and the area below the surface of any public street, highway, lane, path, alley, sidewalk, boulevard, drive, bridge, tunnel, park, parkways, waterways, or other public right-of-way including public utility easements or rights-of-way and any temporary or permanent fixtures or improvements located thereon now or hereafter held by the Town which shall entitle the Town and the Franchisee to the use thereof for the purpose of installing and maintaining the Franchisee's cable television system.

2.13 "School" means any public educational institution, including elementary and secondary schools, junior colleges, colleges and universities.

2.14 "Subscriber" means any person who receives monthly cable television service provided by the Franchisee's cable television system.

Section 3. Franchises: Applications and Criteria for Grant

3.1 Franchise to Operate Required

It shall be unlawful to operate a cable television system within the Town unless a valid franchise has first been obtained from the Town pursuant to the terms of this ordinance. A franchise granted pursuant to this Ordinance shall authorize the Franchisee to provide cable television services within the Town and to charge subscribers for such services. It shall also authorize and permit the Franchisee to traverse any portion of the Town in order to provide service outside the Town. Unless otherwise specified, the Franchise Area shall be the legal boundaries of the

3.2 Application Procedures and Criteria

An application for a new cable television franchise shall be submitted to the Town in a form specified by or acceptable to the Town, and in accordance with procedures and schedules established by the Town. The Town may request such facts and information as it deems appropriate.

3.2(a) Any applicant shall furnish to the Town a map of suitable scale, showing all roads and public buildings, which indicates the areas to be served and the proposed dates of commencement of service for each area. The proposed service area shall be subject to approval by the Town. If approved, the service area shall be incorporated into any franchise granted pursuant to this Ordinance. If no service area is specifically delineated in a franchise, it shall be considered to be coterminous with the boundaries of the Town.

3.2(b) After receiving an application for a franchise, the Town shall examine the legal, financial, technical and character qualifications of the applicant. The Town may grant one or more non-exclusive franchises creating a right to construct and operate a cable television system within the public ways of the Town, subject to the provisions of this Section.

3.2(c) In the event an application is filed proposing to serve a franchise area which overlaps, in whole or in part, an existing Franchisee's franchise area, a copy of such application shall be served by the applicant, by registered or certified mail, upon the existing Franchisee. Such notice shall be considered a condition precedent to consideration of the application by the Town.

3.3 Competing or Overlapping Franchises

Any franchise granted by the Town shall be non-exclusive. However, while the Town may grant more than one franchise, nothing in this ordinance shall be construed to require it to grant more than one franchise.

3.3(a) If one or more competing or overlapping franchises are granted, the Town shall not grant such a franchise on terms or conditions which are either more favorable or less burdensome than those granted under any existing franchise or ordinance. Any franchise which may be granted shall require the new Franchisee to provide cable service to the entire franchise area then served by the existing Franchisee. Moreover, an existing Franchisee may, at its discretion, comply with the most favorable terms contained in any subsequent franchise granted by the Town.

3.3(b) Since competing or overlapping franchises may have an adverse impact on the public rights-of-way, on the quality and availability of communications services to the public and may adversely affect the existing operator's ability to continue to provide the services and facilities it is presently providing under this Ordinance, the Town may issue a franchise in an area where another franchisee is operating only following a public hearing to consider the potential impact which the grant of an additional franchise may have on the community. In considering whether to grant one or more additional franchises, the Town shall specifically consider, and address in a written report, the following issues:

3.3(b)(1) The positive and/or negative impact of an additional franchise on the community.

3.3(b)(2) The ability and willingness of an applicant to provide cable television service to the entire franchise area which is served by the existing cable operator. The purpose of this subsection is to ensure that any competition which may occur among Franchisees will be on equal terms and conditions so as not to give a competitive advantage to one Franchisee over another.

3.3(b)(3) The amount of time it will take the applicant to complete construction of the proposed system and activate service in the entire franchise area; and, whether the applicant can complete construction and activation of its system in a timely manner.

3.3(b)(4) The financial capabilities of the applicant and its guaranteed commitment to make the necessary investment to erect, maintain and operate the proposed cable TV system for the duration of the franchise term. In order to ensure that any prospective Franchisee does have the requisite current financial capabilities, the Town may request equity and debt financing commitment letters, current financial statements, bonds, letters of credit or other documentation to demonstrate to the Town's satisfaction that the requisite funds to construct and operate the proposed system are available.

3.3(b)(5) The quality and technical reliability of the proposed system, based upon the applicant's plan of construction and the method of distribution of signals, and the applicant's technical qualifications to construct and operate such

3.3(b)(6) The experience of the applicant in the erection, maintenance and operation of a cable television system.

3.3(b)(7) The capacity of the public rights-of-way to accommodate more additional cable systems and the potential disruption of those public rights ways and private property that may occur if one or more additional franchises as

3.4 Permits for Non-Franchised Entitles

The Town may issue a license, easement or other permit to a person other the Franchisee to permit that person to traverse any portion of the Franchisee's franchise area within the Town in order to provide service outside, but not with the Town. Such license or easement, absent a grant of a franchise in accordance.

Section 4. Grant of Franchise to Falcon

Pursuant to the terms of this Ordinance, a franchise is hereby granted to Fig.

Section 5. Renewal of Franchise

Section 6. Franchise Fee

6.1 Payment of Annual Fee

6.2 Reporting and Auditing of Fee Payments

At the Town's request, the Franchisee shall file a report showing Franchise Gross Subscriber Receipts for the calendar year and the amount of franchise due to the Town. Such reports may be requested once per calendar year. In Franchisee shall have an obligation to maintain tinancial records of its Gross Subscriber Receipts and franchisee fee payments for audit purposes for a per three years, and the Town shall have the right to audit the Franchisee's book offices where such books are maintained.

Section 7. Subscriber Rates

7.1 All charges to subscribers shall be consistent with a schedule of feet services offered and established by the Franchisee. Rates shall be nondisc in nature and uniform to persons of like classes, under similar circumstance conditions, except where necessary to meet competition.

7.1(a) Franchisee may offer different or discounted rates at its discounted rates at its discounted rates at its discounted rates for different classes of subscribers where appropriate, such a discounted rates to low income individuals or groups.

7.1(b) Franchisee shall inform each new subscriber of all applicable in charges for providing cable television service.

7.1(c) Franchisee may, at its own discretion and in a non-discriminate manner, waive, reduce or suspend connection fees, monthly service fees or a charges on a one time or monthly basis for promotional purposes.

7.1(d) This section shall not prevent a Franchisee from refusing service any person because the Franchisee's prior accounts with that person remain owing.

7.1(e) A Franchisee may offer service which requires advance payment.

7.1(e) A Franchisee may offer service which requires advance payments periodic service charges. A customer shall have the right, at any time, to be service disconnected with a refund of any pre-paid but unused service charges sixty (60) days from the date service is disconnected.

7.1(f) The Franchisee will provide the Town with thirty (30) days are written notice of any change in rates and charges whenever possible. However, the prior consent of the Town.

7.1(g) The Franchisee shall provide refunds to subscribers in the followers

7.1(g)(1) If the Franchisee fails within a reasonable time to comme service requested by a subscriber, it will refund all deposits or advance charge the subscriber has paid in connection with the request for such service at the of the subscriber.

7.1(g)(2) If a subscriber terminates any service at any time and imcredit balance, the Franchisee will, upon notice from the subscriber and upon of all of Franchisee's equipment, refund the appropriate credit balance to the subscriber. The subscriber will be responsible for furnishing the Franchisee a address to which to mail the refund.

7.1(g)(3) If any subscriber's services is out of order for more than consecutive hours during the month due to technical failure, damage, or circumstances within the control of the Franchisee, the Franchisee will credit account of that subscriber on a pro rata basis upon the subscriber's written. 8.1 Franchisee's Office Location and Telephone Service

If a service call is received 3 p.m. on Friday, every attempt shall be made to reproduce the same and service call is received.

8.2(b) In establishing response time to service or repair calls, the France

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may differentiate between service problems unique to a single household as compared to problems caused by a service outage which affects a large number of subscribers ("area outage"). An "area outage" is defined as an outage of all cable channels in four (4) or more residences in the same neighborhood or area which is caused by a problem with the cable system, rather than being caused by the subscriber or by a cause beyond the Franchisee's control, such as a loss of power from the local electric company.

8.2(c) All area outages shall be responded to as soon as possible after notification on a 24 hours a day, 7 day a week basis. Designated technicians shall be entings to me call 24 hours a day to respond when notified by phone or paged by Franchisee or an answering service employee. Technicians are expected to repair the problem found and have the system operational as soon as possible. Except for circumstances beyond the Franchisee's control such as acts of God, weather, wars, riots and civil disturbances; the Franchisee shall be capable of locating and correcting system malfunctions promptly.

The Franchisee shall not, without good cause, fail to make available cable service

to prospective subscribers nor shall the Franchisee terminate service without good cause. Service shall be provided to all interested customers where economically feasible and consistent with the line extension provisions contained in this

8.3(a) Unless a written contract exists between the Franchisee and a subscriber, service shall be on a month-to-month basis.

8.4 Protection of Privacy

The Franchisee and the Town will constantly guard against possible abuses of the right of privacy or other rights of any subscriber or person. In particular, the Franchisee shall comply with the privacy provisions of the Cable Communications Policy Act of 1984, 47 U.S.C. 551.

8.4(a) Franchisee shall not permit the transmission of any signal, aural, visual or digital from any subscriber's premises without first obtaining the informed consent of the subscriber, which shall not have been obtained from the subscriber as a condition of any service for which transmission is not an essential element. The request for such consent shall be contained in a separate document which enumerates and describes the transmissions being authorized and includes a prominent statement that the subscriber is authorizing the permission in full inowledge of its provision, and shall be revocable at any time by the subscriber without penalty of any kind whatsoever. This provision is not intended to prohibit the use or transmission of signals useful only for the control or measurement of system performance or used only for billing subscribers or providing basic or n's rights of montional services.

In any event, one (1) year after the completion of a project, subscribers who have paid a share of line extension costs are no longer eligible for refunds, and the amounts paid in construction costs will be credited to the plant account of Franchisee.

9.2 Free Basic Cable Service to Public Buildings

Franchisee shall provide, without charge, one service outlet activated for basic subscriber service to each police station, fire station, public school, public library and

the Town office. If it is necessary to extend Franchisee's trunk or feeder lines more than two hundred (200) feet solely to provide service to any such school or public building, the Town or the building owner or occupants shall have the option of either paying Franchisee's direct costs for line extensions in excess of two hundred (200) feet or releasing the Franchisee from the obligation to provide service to such building. Furthermore, Franchisee shall be permitted to recover the direct cost of installing cable service, when requested to do so, in order to provide: a) more than one outlet, b) inside wiring, or c) a service outlet requiring more than two hundred to the same (200) feet of drop cable.

Section 10. Insurance and Indemnification

Within ninety (90) days following the grant of a franchise the Franchisee shall alls, the Francisco obtain, pay all premiums for and make available to the Town at its request copies of the following insurance policies:

10.1(a) A general comprehensive liability policy indemnifying, defending and saving harmless the Town, its officers, boards, commissions, agents or employees from any and all claims by any person whatsoever on account of injury to or death of a person or persons occasioned by the operations of the Franchisee under the franchise herein granted, or alleged to have been so caused or occurred, with a minimum liability of Five Hundred thousand Dollars (\$500,000) per personal injury or death of any one person, and One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) for personal injury or death of any two or more persons in any one occurrence.

10.1(b) Property damage insurance for property damage occasioned by the operation of Franchisee under the franchise herein granted, or alleged to have been so caused or occurred, with a minimum liability of Five Hundred thousand Dollars (\$500,000) for property damage to the property of any one person and One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) for property damage to the property of two or more persons in any one occurrence.

10.1(c) All insurance policies called for herein shall be in a form satisfactory to the Town and shall require thirty (30) days written notice of any cancellation to both the Town and the Franchisee. The Franchisee shall, in the event of any such cancellation notice, obtain, pay all premiums for, and file with the Town, written evidence of the issuance of replacement policies within thirty (30) days following receipt by the Town or the Franchisee of any notice of cancellation.

10.2 Indemnisication

The Franchisee, by its acceptance of a franchise granted pursuant to this Ordinance, shall indemnify and hold harmless the Town, its officials, boards, commissions and employees against any and all claims, suits, causes of action, proceedings, and judgments for damage arising out of the award of a franchise to the Franchisee and its operation of the cable television system under the franchise. These damages shall include, but not be limited to, penalties arising out of copyright infringements and damages arising out of any failure by Franchisee to secure consents from the owners, authorized distributors or licensees of programs to be delivered by the Franchisee's cable television system whether or not any act or omission complained of is authorized, allowed, or prohibited by the franchise.

Section 11. Franchise Violations: Procedures, Notice and Cure

11.1 Procedures in the Event of Alleged Violations

if any, have been or are being taken to cure such breach.

A Franchisee may be penalized by the Town only in the event of a substantial violation or breach of a material provision of this Ordinance. If the Town believes that such a breach has occurred and that there may be sufficient cause to penalize the Franchisee, the following procedures shall be followed:

11.2 Notice, Response and Opportunity to Cure Alleged Violations

11.2(a) The Town shall notify the Franchisee in writing of any alleged violation or failure to meet any of the terms or provisions of this Ordinance. The Franchisee shall be given thirty (30) days from the date of receipt of such notice to respond in writing, stating its explanation for the alleged violations and what actions,

11.2(b) Upon receipt of the Franchisee's response, the Town may accept the Franchisee's explanation and/or remedy proposed. Alternatively, if the Town does not accept the Franchisee's explanation or believes that the breach will not be properly cured within a one hundred twenty day (120) period from the date of the original notice of violation, the Town may send to the Franchisee a notice of its intent to penalize the Franchisee.

11.3 Public Hearing Required

Prior to issuing a notice of intent to penalize the Franchisee, the Town shall hold a public hearing providing due process at which testimony and evidence shall be heard concerning the alleged violation. Representatives of the Town and the Franchisee shall be permitted to address the subject of the alleged violation(s) and related issues at the public hearing. The Franchisee may submit evidence to the Town that it is diligently pursuing reasonable actions to cure the alleged violation or that there are circumstances beyond its control (force majeure) which prevent the Franchisee from curing the alleged breach until some future date. Such showings shall be sufficient to relieve the Franchisee from an alleged breach of this Ordinance or its franchise. In such cases the Town may require the Franchisee to provide periodic reports updating the Town on progress being made to cure any unresolved

11.4 Notice and Cure of Franchise Violation

If, following a public hearing, the Town believes that the Franchisee remains in breach, the Town may issue a notice of intent to penalize the Franchisee or revoke

11.4(a) The Franchisee shall be given a period of sixty (60) days from the date of the issuance of the notice to cure any alleged violation of this Ordinance. If the alleged violation is not cured within the specified sixty (60) day period, the Town may take the appropriate steps necessary to penalize the Franchisee or revoke the franchise. Provided, however, that nothing in this section shall be construed to limit or restrict the Franchisee's rights to appeal the Town's actions in any appropriate state or federal judicial or administrative forum.

11.5 Franchise Termination and Continuity of Service

11.5(a) In the event that the Town denies renewal or revokes the franchise, which denial or revocation is upheld by a final judicial determination, the Franchisee shall be afforded a period of one (1) year from the effective date of the final order denying renewal or revoking the franchise, including any appeal, within which to transfer or convey the assets of the cable system. Approval of such a transfer shall not be unreasonably withheld

11.5(b) In the event the franchise is terminated, whether by revocation, expiration, or otherwise, the Franchisee may continue to operate the cable system pursuant to the terms and conditions of the terminated franchise, until the happening of one of the following:

11.5(b)(1) A new franchise or an extension of an expired franchise is granted:

11.5(b)(2) In the case of a revocation or a denial of renewal, a final judicial adjudication has been made, including any appeal, which has resulted in a finding or order that Franchisee is not entitled to a reinstatement, renewal or extension of the franchise and is not otherwise entitled by law to continue operation of the cable system.

11.5(b)(3) The passage of six months with no appeal to an appellate court.

Section 12. Assignment of Franchise 12.1 Pledge For Security Purposes or Assignment to A Related Entity

The Franchisee may secure financing or an indebtedness by trust, mortgage, or other instrument of hypothecation of the franchise, in whole or in part, without requiring the consent of the Town. Consent shall not be required to assign a franchise from one business entity to another which is operated or managed by the present Franchisee or manager of the system. In addition, so long as the manager and or general partner of the Franchisee remains the same, consent shall not be required to transfer interests of any limited partners of the Franchisee, who have no day to day operational control of the Franchisee or the Town system.

12.2 Assignment to an Unrelated Entity

A Franchisee may assign its franchise to another entity (the "Assignee") upon thirty (30) days notice to the Town. The consent of the Town shall not be required for such an assignment, provided that; a) the Town is provided with a reasonable showing that the proposed Assignee possesses the technical and financial qualifications to operate the cable TV system and, b) that the Assignee agrees to comply with the material terms of this Ordinance. In no event shall the Town unreasonably delay or deny the assignment or transfer of a franchise. The reasonableness of the Town's actions shall be subject to judicial review by a court of appropriate jurisdiction.

12.3 Procedures

12.3(a) If no action is taken by the Town within thirty (30) days following receipt of the notice of a proposed assignment by the Franchisee, the assignment of the franchise shall be deemed approved.

12.3(b) If, following a review of the information provided to it, the Town determines that the proposed Assignee may not be technically and financially qualified to operate the cable system, the procedures below shall be followed:

12.3(b)(1) Within thirty (30) days following receipt of the notice of proposed assignment from the Franchisee, the Town shall inform the Franchisee in writing by certified mail of its intent to hold a hearing, providing due process to the Franchisee and the Assignee, for the purpose of receiving evidence as to the Assignee's technical and financial qualifications. Such hearing shall be held by the Town within forty-five (45) days following receipt of the notice of assignment.

12.3(b)(2) Within fourteen (14) days following the date of the hearing, the Town shall make a formal determination regarding the proposed assignment and

if it determines that the proposed Assignee is not qualified to operate the cable system or it determines for any other reason not to assign the franchise, it shall send a written explanation of its decision to the Franchisee by certified mail no later than fourteen (14) days after the public hearing has been held.

Section 13. General Provisions

13.1 Compliance With State and Federal Law

The Franchisee and the Town shall at all times comply with all applicable State and Federal laws and the applicable rules and regulations of administrative agencies. If the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) or any other federal or state governmental body or agency enacts any law or regulation or exercises any paramount jurisdiction over the subject matter of this Ordinance or any franchise granted hereunder, the jurisdiction of the Town shall cease and no longer exist to the extent such superseding jurisdiction shall preempt or preclude the exercise of like jurisdiction by the Town.

13.2 Notice to the Franchisee

Except as otherwise provided in this Ordinance, the Town shall not meet to take any action involving the Franchisee's franchise unless the Town has notified the Franchisee by certified mail at least thirty (30) days prior to such meeting, as to its time, place and purpose. The notice provided for in this section shall be in addition to, and not in lieu of, any other notice to the Franchisee provided for in this Ordinance. All notices, requests, demands and other communications required or permitted hereunder shall be in writing and shall be deemed to have been duly given if mailed by certified mail return receipt requested, addressed to:

13.3 Street Occupancy Franchisee shall utilize existing poles, conduits and other facilities whenever possible, but may construct or install new, different, or additional poles, conduits, or other facilities whether on the public way or on privately-owned property with the written approval of the appropriate government authority, and, if necessary the property owner. Such approval shall not be unreasonably withheld by the governmental agency.

13.3(a) All transmission lines, equipment and structures shall be so installed and located as to cause minimum interference with the rights and appearance and reasonable convenience of property owners who adjoin on any public way and at all times shall be kept and maintained in a safe condition and in good order and repair. The Franchisee shall at all times employ reasonable care and shall use commonly accepted methods and devices for preventing failures and accidents which are likely to cause damage, injuries or nuisances to the public.

13.3(b) Franchisee shall have the authority to trim trees on public property at its own expense as may be necessary to protect its wires and facilities, subject to the direction of the Town or other appropriate governmental authority.

13.4 Access to Public and Private Property

13.4(a) Franchisee shall have the right to enter and have access to the property and premises of the Town or that of any subscriber for purposes of installing cable TV service or recovering and removing Franchisee's property and equipment when a subscriber's service is terminated and a subscriber refuses to return such equipment to the Franchisee.

13.4(b) The Town shall not permit any person who owns or controls a residential multiple unit dwelling, trailer park, condominium, apartment complex, subdivision or other property to interfere with the right of any tenant, resident or lawful occupant thereof to receive cable installation, service or maintenance from Franchisee, except as federal or state law shall otherwise require.

13.4(c) Upon request by Franchisee, the Town shall promptly exercise any rights it may have to permit or enable Franchisee to obtain or utilize easements with respect to any residential multiple unit dwelling, trailer park, condominium, apartment complex, subdivision or other property as required to facilitate Franchisee's use thereof for purposes of providing system service to the tenants, residents or lawful occupants thereof. In any such proceeding, the restitution to the Owner for the amount of space utilized by the system, considering the enhanced value to the premises resulting from the installation of cable television facilities, shall be a one-time charge of \$1.00 per dwelling unit.

13.5 Nondiscrimination in Employment

The Franchisee shall neither refuse to hire nor discharge from employment nor discriminate against any person in compensation, terms, conditions, or privileges of employment because of age, sex, race, color, creed, or national origin. The Franchisee shall insure that employees are treated without regard to their age, sex, race, color, creed or national origin.

13.6 Franchisee May Issue Rules

The Franchisee shall have the authority to issue such rules, regulations, terms and conditions of its business as shall be reasonably necessary to enable it to exercise its rights and perform its services under this Ordinance and the Rules of the FCC, and to assure uninterrupted service to each and all of its subscribers. Such rules and regulations shall not be deemed to have the force of law

13.7 Severability of Ordinance Provisions

If any section of this Ordinance or the franchise, or any portion thereof, is held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction or administrative agency, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of the Ordinance or franchise.

Section 14. Effective Date of Ordinance

This ordinance shall become effective upon the date of its adoption by the Town. Any failure by the Town to follow proper procedures under state or local law in adopting this Ordinance or granting a franchise shall not abrogate the rights or obligations of either the Franchisee or the City under this Ordinance. If, following adoption of this Ordinance it is subsequently determined that proper legal procedures have not been followed by the Town, it shall be the responsibility of the Town to rectify any procedural defects and ratify the terms of this Ordinance.

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Educated Guesses--The Clinton Outlook

disappointed in turn, when he permanent basis. moves into the Oval Office, a Memphis State University professor says.

'The one difficulty he's going to have from the very beginning is that he's made contradictory promises," said Dr. Kenneth Holland, chairman of MSU's Department of Political Science.

The president-elect has promised to stimulate the economy with, among other things, a massive public works program that will increase government spending, Holland said.

"He's promised to create jobs, reform the health care system, provide national service as a way of repaying college loans and, on top of all this, he's promised to reduce the deficit," Holland said. "My own view of this is that he's going to have tremendous difficulty accomplishing these goals."

Holland said the traditional honeymoon for new presidents may be cut short for Clinton when his campaign promises but up against Washington reality.

Lyndon Johnson was the last president to achieve a budget surplus, Holland said. Johnson accomplished that feat, despite the expense of the Vietnam War and the Great Society programs, during a period of rapid economic growth, he said.

"If Clinton's lucky, he'll be able to increase spending and reduce the deficit," Holland said. "But if he doesn't succeed in stimulating the economy or the economy doesn't grow in the way it did for Lyndon Johnson, then we'll be seeing high rates of inflation and high interest rates and an increase in the deficit which altogether will require a ax increase.

"So he's really going to take a gamble...we may have a bigger budget deficit than we did before," Holland said.

The new president is going to find the problems of dealing with Congress will be far more complex than those he faced as Arkansas' governor, Holland predicted.

"He's going to encounter what we in political science call the "Iron Triangle" -- the close link between powerful economic interests with committees in Congress and departments of the executive branch of government," he said.

"He didn't have to deal with these interests during the campaign. Now, as president, he will," Holland said. Senior congressmen who control powerful Congressional subcommittees, career bureaucrats and economic interests represented by lobbyists can quickly shred a president's program, he said.

It is this Iron Triangle that Clinton will have to deal with if he is to keep his promises to reform the health care system, block oil industry exploration on public lands, cut defense spending, lift the ban on military service for homosexuals and tighten environmental laws.

Perhaps the biggest battle will be over health care reform, Holland predicted.

"President Eisenhower warned Americans about the militaryindustrial complex," he said. "But actually, more potent now is the medical-industrial complex."

The health care industry, he said, is likely to block major reforms.

"The health care lobby will not oppose universal health insurance coverage," Holland said. "They want that, because that means they get paid. What they oppose is the cost-containment features of Clinton's program -- capping doctors' income, paying hospitals a single lump-sum each year.'

Pharmaceutical companies will try to block legislation to cap payments for drugs and the insurance lobby will fight a proposed government takeover of health care insurance.

"Actually, that's one of the areas where we could make the greatest savings," he said. "We spend \$130 billion a year processing health insurance claims."

Holland predicts that Clinton may have some success in cutting defense spending because his proposals are already close to those of the outgoing Bush administration.

"The major problem Clinton will have is in his promise to lift the restriction on service of gays in the military. He's already backed off a little bit. The Pentagon has decided to make a stand here."

Clinton may also succeed in passing a Family Leave Bill over the objections of the business lobby, Holland said. A sc-called "rich man's tax" is also likely to

pass. But Holland said Clinton will find the business lobby too potent to overcome in battles over limits on executive pay and President-elect Bill Clinton is labor law amendments blocking likely to disappoint, and be the hiring of strike breakers on a

> Clinton will have to deal with 12 years of pent-up demands from liberal interest groups, Holland said.

> "Jimmy Carter had this problem, and he found himself trying to meet these demands, and he got sidetracked from his legislative and foreign policy programs," Holland said. "Organized labor, for example, is demanding revisions to the North American Free Trade Agreement...The National

Education Association is opposing any school choice program. They also oppose a national service as a way for college students to repay federal student loans because NEA feels that this will take jobs away from teachers.2

NEA will also demand billions of dollars for Head Start and inner-city school construction, he

"He's going to have a tough time turning down those demands," Holland said.

Clinton will also have a tough time dealing with environmental groups, he said.

"On the one hand, he wants to stimulate employment, but on the other hand, he has this commitment to the environmental organizations," Holland said. "I think probably we'll see a compromise. The net result will be a loss of employment, at least in the Pacific Northwest.

Women's organizations want Clinton's support for a freedom of choice law making abortion freely available.

"That's not likely to pass because there's so much opposition in Congress," Holland said. "Clinton's not likely to make a major issue of it because he can alienate a lot of Southern congressmen and he needs Southern Democrats to get his economic program and they won't support him on abortion.

White To Push For **Lobbying Reform**

Senator John White of Senate District 5 has announced he will co-author a proposal to reform Mississippi's lobbying laws.

"I want my constituents to know that I have nothing to fear from full disclosure of spending by lobbyists," said White, who supported a similar bill last year. "I believe that a more effective lobbying law will help to restore public confidence in state government.

White said he is joining with Meridian Senator Joe Clay Hamilton to present a bill to require lobbyists:

-To report all expenses inc while lobbying state govern

-To list the names of legal and executive branch of who benefitted from that

The proposal, which clearly define who a lobb and what lobbying is, also ported by Secretary of State Molpus. "I am delighted Secretary Molpus' support lobbying reform, and I hope our joint efforts will be success so that we can bring the back into decision-make Jackson," said White.

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
