\$1.1 Million Grant For New Industrial Park In Iuka

U.S. Rep. Jamie Whitten (D-Miss.) and U.S. Senators Thad Cochran and Trent Lott (R-Miss.) announced Wednesday, Jan. 13, that the Economic Development Administration has awarded a \$1.1 million grant for the city of Iuka.

According to the Congressmen, the funds are to be used for the development of a 140-acre industrial park. The new industrial park is located west of

the new Hwy. 25 bypass, near the Paul Edmondson Industrial Park.

The grant will be used to provide a basic framework for the park including an access road, water lines, a water tank and sewer improvements.

Tishomingo County Supervisors voted to put-up the initial \$200,000 that the 80-percent matching grant required, according to Tishomingo County Board of

Supervisors President Ricky Cummings.

Grants and local investments have been put to good use and are showing up in the form of jobs and lower unemployment, said Mack Loyd Wadkins, executive director of the Tishomingo County Development Foundation.

"The industrial park will be a great asset in working with industrial prospects because the

better infrastructure you have in place, the better opportunity you have in attracting people to the area," Watkins said.

Former Iuka Principal Awarded \$32,000 In Suit

A Former Iuka principal has been awarded \$32,000 by a federal jury in Aberdeen who ruled that the school official was passed over for a job promotion due to retaliation by the school district.

Aubrey Ray, who is currently an assistant principal in the Starkville School System, filed a complaint in 1991 with the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission after he was not promoted to a job he was qualified for in the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District. An eight-person jury ruled in Ray's favor at the close of the three-day trial.

The EEOC complaint was filed after Ray stated that earlier in 1991 the school district, during a period of reorganization, hired a younger man, instead of him, as principal. He claimed age discrimination. He was 47 at the time. The claim of age discrimination was thrown out, according to court reports.

The jury ruled that Ray was fired in retaliation for filing with the EEOC. A total of \$16,000 in back pay was awarded. By law that amount had to be doubled to \$32,000.

Mike Cooke, attorney for the Tishomingo County School District, stated that Ray originally filed six claims in the lawsuit, all of which were thrown out except one. "Six claims were filed by Ray. The jury was only allowed to hear testimony on the charge of retaliation against him under the Age Discrimination and Employment Act (ADEA)," Cooke said. "However, no proof or testimony was brought, in our opinion, that justified the ruling in Ray's favor."

According to Cooke, the school district plans to bring a motion to amend the judgment or set it aside for a new trial.

According to Ray's attorney, another suit from the same time period has been filed by James Burns, a high school science teacher in the school district. His suit, the attorney said, is scheduled to go to federal court on similar grounds. The date for that trial has been set for April 12, 1993.

Tishomingo County Unemployment Drops

The unemployment rate for Tishomingo County dropped to its lowest level in 13 years. The last time the unemployment was lower was 1980, during construction of the Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant and the Tenn-Tom Waterway. At the same time unemployment rates are dropping in northeast Mississippi, the national unemployment rate is going up.

Tishomingo County Development Foundation executive director, Mack L. Wadkins, said there are several reasons for the decline in the unemployment rate in Tishomingo County. Over the past few years, existing industries have made expansions allowing them to hire more local people. These industries include Consolidated Aluminum Corp., Ripley Screen, K.D. Contex, Belmont Homes, H.I.S., The Heil Co., and National Apparel.

The county has also been successful in attracting new industries. Another major contributor has been NASA. A combination of all the factors have resulted in a decline in the unemployment rate of 28.1% a few years ago to the latest available rate of 6.7%.

Distribution Of Newman's Own, Inc. Gift Announced By Supt. of Education

The Superintendent of Education, Dr. Bob Ferguson, announced last Thursday, January 14th, that an agreement has been made between the Tishomingo County Special Municipal Separate School District and the Newman's Own Inc., as to the dispersion of the \$25,000 contributed by Paul Newman and Joanne Woodward toward theatre arts in education.

Part of the \$25,000 will be used to purchase and install curtains and lights for the Tishomingo County Magnet High School Theatre/auditorium. The TC-SMSD School Board has agreed

to furnish the labor for the curtains and lighting so that monies will be left over in which to establish a perpetual trust fund to serve Tishomingo County arts in education. Along with the establishing of this perpetual fund, donations will be sought by all (Businesses, PTAs, individuals, alike) for continued education in the arts for the students of Tishomingo County.

The Tishomingo County Arts Council (TCAC) has been designated administrator of the fund by the Newman Foundation. The TCAC has already started an educational campaign

as to the purpose of the trust fund and will be contacting the PTAs, private foundations, city and county leaders, as well as private citizens, to encourage participation in this exciting opportunity for our students in Tishomingo County.

The TCAC will also start the raising of funds for the Newman/Woodward Trust Fund at the next performance for the Tishomingo County Arts Council, Campus Country. Elderly Burnsville Man Killed In Accident

An elderly Burnsville man was killed Thursday, January 14, when he was hit by a vehicle while crossing the roadway in front of his home on Hwy. 365, two miles south of Burnsville.

According to reports by Mississippi Highway Patrolman Ricky Marlar, the accident occurred at approximately 5:35 p.m. Thursday and involved victim Melton L. Studdard, 89, Route 1, Box 366 Burnsville.

Apparently Studdard was retrieving his mail from his mailbox which was located on the opposite side of the roadway from his home and stepped into the pathway of a 1981 Buick, driven by Deborah Bullock, 40, of Corinth.

Studdard was pronounced dead at the scene. The accident was ruled unavoidable and no citations or charges were issued, according to reports.

Milton L. Studdard, 89, died Thursday, January 14, 1993 at his residence. He was a retired farmer.

Development Foundation Competes For ECHO Award

A project submitted to The Economic and Cultural Honors (ECHO) Awards by the Tishomingo County Development Foundation has been selected as a finalist, according to D.H. Swearingen, Marketing Director with The Commercial Appeal.

The ECHO Awards program is sponsored by The Commercial Appeal and the Mid-South Common Market annually and honors innovative ideas leading to community development and improvement in the region which otherwise might go unrecognized. Projects are chosen as finalist because they transform communities and improve the quality of life for its residents.

The TCDF project submitted was the Tri-State Celebration and Groundbreaking, April 10, 1990. As a finalist, the TCDF was given the opportunity to make a 30 minute presentation in Memphis to a panel of judges. Judging in the competition will be by an impartial jury of six economic and community developers working outside of the Mid-South Common Market region of Arkansas, Mississippi and Tennessee. Projects are classified by population to ensure a fair competitive balance. Individual organizations within the Mid-South Common Market region of 87 counties may submit one entry.

The winners of the second annual ECHO Awards will be announced during a banquet at The Peabody Hotel, Memphis, on February 12, 1993. All of the finalist will be honored at the banquet.

The Mid-South Common Market, created in 1987, works to foster economic growth in the Memphis Primary Trade Area, a 105-county territory surrounding Memphis. The organization has the support of the governors and state economic development agencies of Arkansas, Mississippi and Tennessee, as well as many chambers of commerce and industrial development authorities at the local level.

TRUE ENVIRONMENTALISM

Dr. Bruce Ames, Division of Biochemistry and Molecular Biology of the University of California, is well known for promoting environmentalism based on scientific fact rather than on hypothetical risk. Dr. Ames believes there are six misconceptions in environmentalism which have no scientific basis: 1(That pollution is a significant contributor to cancer and cancer rates are soaring 2(That high dose animal cancer tests identify the significant cancer risks for humans 3(That almost all human exposures to carcinogens and other toxins are to synthetic chemicals 4(That synthetic toxins pose greater carcinogenic hazards than natural toxins 5(That the toxicology of manmade chemicals is different from that of natural chemicals, and 6(That correlation implies causation. Dr. Ames predicts that the elimination of essential pesticides would likely increase cancer rates because fruits and vegetables grown without man-made pesticides would be less

available to consumers because of increased cost. Eating fruits and vegetables is critical in lowering the risk of cancer because the vitamins, antioxidants and fiber in plants are important anticarcinogens.

TEENS AND TAXES

Since this is the time of year we all start to think about taxes, some families may need to develop strategies for helping finance a college education.

As college costs have increased dramatically over the last decade, paying for a college education has become one of the greatest financial challenges for many families.

Between 1977 and 1987, private four-year colleges raised tuition by an average of 141 percent and public schools by 114 percent. Thus, the cost of a four-year education at many private colleges is approaching the median price of a single-family house in the United States.

College costs are expected to continue to rise. Recent studies suggest that tuition at public colleges will continue to increase about 7 percent a year and tuition at private colleges will rise as much as 9 percent annually.

The Tax Reform Act of 1986 created an even larger challenge for families saving for a college education. With the passage of that law, many of the legitimate tax breaks that parents were using to save for a college education were either eliminated or reduced.

In addition, the 1986 Higher Education Amendments reduced assistance available in the form of grants and placed restrictions on financial aid, requiring students to pay a larger portion of the total college bill.

One method for saving for a college education which can provide tax advantages is through the use of a custodial account. The Uniform Gifts to Minors Act (UGMA) provides that a parent or adult may transfer securities, money, life insurance or annuities to a minor.

This is done by registering the custodial account in the child's name and social security number. In such an arrangement, an adult -- usually a parent -- serves as custodian for the benefit of the minor.

UGMAs are used to save for college educations for several

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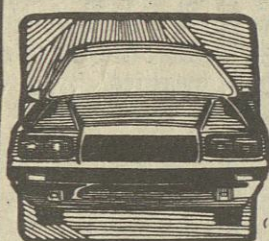

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INSIGHT INTO EYESIGHT

DROPS IN YOUR EYES

Sometimes when you go for an eye examination, the eye doctor may put dilating drops in your eyes. The effect of the drops is harmless, and although they may cause temporary discomfort the effect gradually wears off.

What the drops do is dilate or open the pupil of the eye and restrict the near-focusing muscles so the eye will be at rest. This is important in checking for astigmatism and far-sightedness as well as other eye problems. In astigmatism, the eye's ability to focus is distorted by abnormalities in the curvature of the eyeball. A person with far-sightedness can see objects in the distance more easily than those close at hand, especially as he or she gets older and near-focusing muscles become weaker.

These and other vision problems can be corrected with the proper prescription for glasses or contact lenses. When you have an eye exam, whether or not you will be given dilating drops will depend on your medical history and the kind of vision problem you have.

Cable Television Franchise Ordinance

An Ordinance Setting Forth Regulations, Terms and Conditions Under Which Cable Television Systems Shall Operate in Tishomingo, Mississippi; and Granting to Falcon First Southeast, Its Successors and Assigns, A Franchise to Construct, Operate and Maintain a Cable Television System.

Ordinance No. _____

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Tishomingo, Mississippi

Cable Television Franchise Ordinance

An Ordinance Setting Forth the Regulations, Terms and Conditions Under Which Cable Television Systems Shall Operate in Tishomingo, Mississippi and Granting A Franchise to Falcon First Southeast, Its Successors and Assigns to Construct, Operate and Maintain a Cable Television System in the Town.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo, Mississippi as follows:

Section 1. Title and Purposes of Ordinance

1.1 Title

This Ordinance shall be known as the Tishomingo, Mississippi Cable Television Franchise Ordinance.

1.2 Purposes

The purposes of this Ordinance are: a) to establish the terms and conditions under which a cable television system within the Town must operate; b) to provide for the payment of a franchise fee to the Town for the use of Town streets and other public rights of way and to compensate the Town for costs associated with administering and regulating the system; and; c) to grant a cable television franchise to Falcon First Southeast (hereafter referred to as either "Falcon" or "Franchisee").

Section 2. Definitions

For the purposes of this Ordinance the following terms, phrases, words and their derivations shall have the meaning defined herein, unless the context clearly indicates that another meaning is intended. Words used in the present tense include the future, words in the plural number include the singular number, and words in the singular number include the plural number.

2.1 "Cable Act" means The Cable Communications Policy Act of 1984, 47 U.S.C., section 521 *et seq.* and such future legislation as may amend or supersede it.

2.2 "Cable Television System" or "Cable TV System" means any non-broadcast facility consisting of a set of transmission paths and associated signal reception, transmission and control equipment, that is designed to distribute to subscribers audio, video and other forms of electronic or electrical signals.

2.3 "Channel" is a band of frequencies, in the electromagnetic spectrum, capable of carrying one audio-visual television signal.

2.4 "Town" means Tishomingo, Mississippi in its present form or in any later reorganized, consolidated, enlarged or reincorporated form.

2.5 "Board of Supervisors" means the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo, Mississippi.

2.6 "Falcon" means Falcon First Southeast, which may also be referred to as "Franchisee".

2.7 "FCC" means the Federal Communications Commission.

2.8 "Franchise" means the rights granted pursuant to this Ordinance to construct, own and operate a cable television system along the public ways in the Town, or within specified areas in the Town.

2.9 "Franchise Area" means that portion of the Town for which a franchise is granted under the authority of this Ordinance. If not otherwise stated in an exhibit to this Ordinance, the Franchise Area shall be the legal and geographic limits of the Town, including all territory which may be hereafter annexed to the Town.

2.10 "Franchisee" means a person or business entity or its lawful successor or Assignee which has been granted a franchise by the Board of Supervisors pursuant

to this Ordinance.

2.11 "Gross Subscriber Receipts", as the term is used in calculating franchise fees, shall mean the revenues actually received, rather than merely billed, by the Franchisee from its cable television subscribers within the Town after deducting the following: a) any fees or assessments levied on subscribers or users of the system which are collected by the Franchisee for payment to a governmental entity; b) franchise fees paid by the Franchisee to the Town; c) state or local sales or property taxes imposed on the Franchisee and paid to a governmental entity; and d) federal copyright fees paid by the Franchisee to the Copyright Tribunal in Washington, DC.

2.12 "Public Way" or "Right-of-Way" means the surface, the air space above the surface and the area below the surface of any public street, highway, lane, path, alley, sidewalk, boulevard, drive, bridge, tunnel, park, parkways, waterways, or other public right-of-way including public utility easements or rights-of-way and any temporary or permanent fixtures or improvements located thereon now or hereafter held by the Town which shall entitle the Town and the Franchisee to the use thereof for the purpose of installing and maintaining the Franchisee's cable television system.

2.13 "School" means any public educational institution, including elementary and secondary schools, junior colleges, colleges and universities.

2.14 "Subscriber" means any person who receives monthly cable television service provided by the Franchisee's cable television system.

Section 3. Franchises: Applications and Criteria for Grant

3.1 Franchise to Operate Required

It shall be unlawful to operate a cable television system within the Town unless a valid franchise has first been obtained from the Town pursuant to the terms of this ordinance. A franchise granted pursuant to this Ordinance shall authorize the Franchisee to provide cable television services within the Town and to charge subscribers for such services. It shall also authorize and permit the Franchisee to traverse any portion of the Town in order to provide service outside the Town. Unless otherwise specified, the Franchise Area shall be the legal boundaries of the Town.

3.2 Application Procedures and Criteria

An application for a new cable television franchise shall be submitted to the Town in a form specified by or acceptable to the Town, and in accordance with procedures and schedules established by the Town. The Town may request such facts and information as it deems appropriate.

3.2(a) Any applicant shall furnish to the Town a map of suitable scale, showing all roads and public buildings, which indicates the areas to be served and the proposed dates of commencement of service for each area. The proposed service area shall be subject to approval by the Town. If approved, the service area shall be incorporated into any franchise granted pursuant to this Ordinance. If no service area is specifically delineated in a franchise, it shall be considered to be coterminous with the boundaries of the Town.

3.2(b) After receiving an application for a franchise, the Town shall examine the legal, financial, technical and character qualifications of the applicant. The Town may grant one or more non-exclusive franchises creating a right to construct and operate a cable television system within the public ways of the Town, subject to the provisions of this Section.

3.2(c) In the event an application is filed proposing to serve a franchise area which overlaps, in whole or in part, an existing Franchisee's franchise area, a copy of such application shall be served by the applicant, by registered or certified mail, upon the existing Franchisee. Such notice shall be considered a condition precedent to consideration of the application by the Town.

3.3 Competing or Overlapping Franchises

Any franchise granted by the Town shall be non-exclusive. However, while the Town may grant more than one franchise, nothing in this ordinance shall be construed to require it to grant more than one franchise.

3.3(a) If one or more competing or overlapping franchises are granted, the Town shall not grant such a franchise on terms or conditions which are either more favorable or less burdensome than those granted under any existing franchise or ordinance. Any franchise which may be granted shall require the new Franchisee to provide cable service to the entire franchise area then served by the existing Franchisee. Moreover, an existing Franchisee may, at its discretion, comply with the most favorable terms contained in any subsequent franchise granted by the Town.

3.3(b) Since competing or overlapping franchises may have an adverse impact on the public rights-of-way, on the quality and availability of communications services to the public and may adversely affect the existing operator's ability to continue to provide the services and facilities it is presently providing under this Ordinance, the Town may issue a franchise in an area where another franchisee is operating only following a public hearing to consider the potential impact which the grant of an additional franchise may have on the community. In considering whether to grant one or more additional franchises, the Town shall specifically consider, and address in a written report, the following issues:

3.3(b)(1) The positive and/or negative impact of an additional franchise on the community.

3.3(b)(2) The ability and willingness of an applicant to provide cable television service to the entire franchise area which is served by the existing cable operator. The purpose of this subsection is to ensure that any competition which may occur among Franchisees will be on equal terms and conditions so as not to give a competitive advantage to one Franchisee over another.

3.3(b)(3) The amount of time it will take the applicant to complete construction of the proposed system and activate service in the entire franchise area; and, whether the applicant can complete construction and activation of its system in a timely manner.

3.3(b)(4) The financial capabilities of the applicant and its guaranteed commitment to make the necessary investment to erect, maintain and operate the proposed cable TV system for the duration of the franchise term. In order to ensure that any prospective Franchisee does have the requisite current financial capabilities, the Town may request equity and debt financing commitment letters, current financial statements, bonds, letters of credit or other documentation to demonstrate to the Town's satisfaction that the requisite funds to construct and operate the proposed system are available.

3.3(b)(5) The quality and technical reliability of the proposed system, based upon the applicant's plan of construction and the method of distribution of signals, and the applicant's technical qualifications to construct and operate such

system.

3.3(b)(6) The experience of the applicant in the erection, maintenance and operation of a cable television system.

3.3(b)(7) The capacity of the public rights-of-way to accommodate more additional cable systems and the potential disruption of those public rights-of-way and private property that may occur if one or more additional franchises are granted.

3.3(b)(8) The disruption of existing cable television service and the potential that the proposed franchise would adversely affect the residents of the Town.

3.3(b)(9) The likelihood and ability of an applicant to continue to provide competing cable television service to subscribers within the entire franchise area for the duration of the franchise.

3.3(b)(10) Such other information as the Town may deem appropriate to be considered prior to granting any competing or overlapping franchise.

3.4 Permits for Non-Franchised Entities

The Town may issue a license, easement or other permit to a person other than the Franchisee to permit that person to traverse any portion of the Franchisee's franchise area within the Town in order to provide service outside, but not within, the Town. Such license or easement, absent a grant of a franchise in accordance

with this Ordinance, shall not authorize nor permit said person to provide cable television service of any type to any home or place of business within the Town, nor render any other service within the Town.

Section 4. Grant of Franchise to Falcon

Pursuant to the terms of this Ordinance, a franchise is hereby granted to Falcon First Southeast (which may be referred to herein as "Falcon" or "Franchisee") to operate and maintain a cable television system in the Town for a period of fifteen (15) years commencing on the date of adoption of this ordinance.

Section 5. Renewal of Franchise

At the expiration of the initial or renewal term of this franchise, the Franchisee shall have the right to renew the franchise for an additional term of ten (10) years provided that the Franchisee shall then be in substantial compliance with the material terms of this ordinance and with applicable law. The Franchisee shall provide the Town with notice of its intent to renew the franchise at least thirty (30) days prior to the expiration date of the then current term.

Section 6. Franchise Fee

6.1 Payment of Annual Fee

The Franchisee shall pay a franchise fee for the use the Town's rights of way to compensate the Town for all costs associated with administering and regulating the cable system. The amount of the franchise fee shall be three (3%) percent of the Franchisee's annual Gross Subscriber Receipts, as defined herein, and shall be paid on an annual basis within ninety (90) days following the close of each calendar year. The Franchisee shall be entitled to list the franchise fee as a separate line item on monthly bills.

6.2 Reporting and Auditing of Fee Payments

At the Town's request, the Franchisee shall file a report showing Franchisee's Gross Subscriber Receipts for the calendar year and the amount of franchise fee due to the Town. Such reports may be requested once per calendar year. The Franchisee shall have an obligation to maintain financial records of its Gross Subscriber Receipts and franchise fee payments for audit purposes for a period of three years, and the Town shall have the right to audit the Franchisee's books and records at its offices where such books are maintained.

Section 7. Subscriber Rates

7.1 All charges to subscribers shall be consistent with a schedule of fees for services offered and established by the Franchisee. Rates shall be nondiscriminatory in nature and uniform to persons of like classes, under similar circumstances, conditions, except where necessary to meet competition.

7.1(a) Franchisee may offer different or discounted rates at its discretion in order to meet competition or for promotional purposes. Franchisee may establish different rates for different classes of subscribers where appropriate, such as discounted rates to low income individuals or groups.

7.1(b) Franchisee shall inform each new subscriber of all applicable fees and charges for providing cable television service.

7.1(c) Franchisee may, at its own discretion and in a non-discriminatory manner, waive, reduce or suspend connection fees, monthly service fees or other charges on a one time or monthly basis for promotional purposes.

7.1(d) This section shall not prevent a Franchisee from refusing service to any person because the Franchisee's prior accounts with that person remain delinquent.

7.1(e) A Franchisee may offer service which requires advance payment of periodic service charges. A customer shall have the right, at any time, to have service disconnected with a refund of any pre-paid but unused service charges within sixty (60) days from the date service is disconnected.

7.1(f) The Franchisee will provide the Town with thirty (30) days advance written notice of any change in rates and charges whenever possible. However, the Franchisee is entitled to set its rates and charges as it sees fit without obtaining prior consent of the Town.

7.1(g) The Franchisee shall provide refunds to subscribers in the following cases:

7.1(g)(1) If the Franchisee fails within a reasonable time to commence service requested by a subscriber, it will refund all deposits or advance charges the subscriber has paid in connection with the request for such service at the request of the subscriber.

7.1(g)(2) If a subscriber terminates any service at any time and has a credit balance, the Franchisee will, upon notice from the subscriber and upon payment of all of Franchisee's equipment, refund the appropriate credit balance to the subscriber. The subscriber will be responsible for furnishing the Franchisee a proper address to which to mail the refund.

7.1(g)(3) If any subscriber's services is out of order for more than 48 consecutive hours during the month due to technical failure, damage, or circumstances within the control of the Franchisee, the Franchisee will credit the account of that subscriber on a pro rata basis upon the subscriber's written request. The credit will be calculated using the number of twenty-four (24) hour periods that service is impaired and the number of channels on which service is impaired as a fraction of the total number of days in the month that the service impairment occurred and the total number of channels provided by the system in the absence of an impairment.

Section 8. Customer Service and Consumer Protection

8.1 Franchisee's Office Location and Telephone Service

Franchisee shall maintain an office in sufficient proximity to the Town to provide Franchisee's customer service and technical personnel to promptly respond to all customer service requests or technical problems which may arise, as further described below. Franchisee shall maintain telephone answering service or an answering machine to receive service calls twenty-four (24) hours per day. A local telephone number or toll free (800) number shall be made available to subscribers for service calls. Corrective action shall be completed as promptly as practicable.

8.2 Customer Service Response Time

8.2(a) Calls requesting repair service shall be responded to the same day they are received, whenever it is physically possible to do so. In the event this is not possible, repair calls notifying the Franchisee of a service outage shall be responded to no later than forty-eight (48) hours after receipt. If a service call is received after 3 p.m. on Friday, every attempt shall be made to respond within 48 hours.

8.2(b) In establishing response time to service or repair calls, the Franchisee

differentiate between service problems unique to a single household as compared to problems caused by a service outage which affects a large number of subscribers ("area outage"). An "area outage" is defined as an outage of all cable services in four (4) or more residences in the same neighborhood or area which is caused by a problem with the cable system, rather than being caused by the subscriber or by a cause beyond the Franchisee's control, such as a loss of power to the local electric company.

8.2(c) All area outages shall be responded to as soon as possible after notification on a 24 hours a day, 7 day a week basis. Designated technicians shall be available 24 hours a day to respond when notified by phone or paged by Franchisee or answering service employee. Technicians are expected to repair the problem and have the system operational as soon as possible. Except for circumstances beyond the Franchisee's control such as acts of God, weather, wars, riots and civil disturbances, the Franchisee shall be capable of locating and correcting system malfunctions promptly.

8.3 Consumer Protection

The Franchisee shall not, without good cause, fail to make available cable service

to prospective subscribers nor shall the Franchisee terminate service without good cause. Service shall be provided to all interested customers where economically feasible and consistent with the line extension provisions contained in this Ordinance.

8.3(a) Unless a written contract exists between the Franchisee and a subscriber, service shall be on a month-to-month basis.

8.4 Protection of Privacy

The Franchisee and the Town will constantly guard against possible abuses of the right of privacy or other rights of any subscriber or person. In particular, the Franchisee shall comply with the privacy provisions of the Cable Communications Policy Act of 1984, 47 U.S.C. 551.

8.4(a) Franchisee shall not permit the transmission of any signal, aural, visual or digital from any subscriber's premises without first obtaining the informed consent of the subscriber, which shall not have been obtained from the subscriber as a condition of any service for which transmission is not an essential element. The request for such consent shall be contained in a separate document which enumerates and describes the transmissions being authorized and includes a prominent statement that the subscriber is authorizing the permission in full knowledge of its provision, and shall be revocable at any time by the subscriber without penalty of any kind whatsoever. This provision is not intended to prohibit the use or transmission of signals useful only for the control or measurement of system performance or used only for billing subscribers or providing basic or optional services.

8.4(b) Franchisee shall not permit the use of any special terminal equipment on any subscriber's premises that shall permit transmission from the subscriber's premises of two-way services utilizing aural, visual or digital signals without first obtaining written permission of the subscriber as provided in Paragraph A of this section.

8.4(c) Franchisee, or any of its agents or employees, shall not, without the specific written authorization of the subscriber involved, sell or otherwise make available to any party any list which identifies the viewing habits or responses of individual subscribers.

Section 9. Extension of Cable Service

9.1 Extension of Service

9.1(a) A Franchisee which is not already serving the entire franchise area shall provide service to all portions of the franchise area reaching a minimum density of thirty (30) dwelling units per linear street mile as measured from the nearest trunk line within one (1) year after the grant of a franchise.

9.1(b) Franchisee shall provide aerial or buried drop lines to new subdivisions within the franchise area at the request of the developer provided that the developer contracts and agrees with the Franchisee to pay the cost of the extension of the service.

9.1(c) Franchisee shall extend and make cable television service available to any resident within the franchise area who requests connection at the standard connection charge if the connection to the resident would require no more than a standard one hundred and fifty (150) foot aerial or seventy-five (75) foot buried drop line. With respect to requests for connection requiring an aerial or buried drop line in excess of one hundred and fifty (150) and seventy-five (75) feet respectively, Franchisee shall extend and make available cable television service to such residents at connection charge not to exceed the actual cost incurred by the Franchisee for the distance exceeding that distance.

9.1(d) In areas with less than thirty (30) residential units per proposed cable bearing strand mile, Franchisee shall offer a cost-sharing arrangement with residents. A dwelling unit will be counted for this purpose if its lot fronts a street. The cost-sharing arrangement shall consist of the following:

9.1(d)(1) At the request of a resident desiring service, Franchisee shall determine the cost of the plant extension required to provide service to the potential subscriber from the closest point on the cable system where it is technically feasible. The cost of construction shall be allocated based on the following formula:

9.1(d)(2) If a request for extension of service into a residential area requires the construction of cable plant which does not pass at least twenty (30) potential subscribers per proposed cable bearing strand mile, Franchisee and residents who agree to subscribe to cable service will each bear their proportionate share of construction costs. For example, if there are five (5) dwelling units per proposed cable bearing strand mile, Franchisee's share will equal 5/30ths or one sixth (1/6) of the construction cost. The remaining cost will be shared equally by each subscriber.

9.1(d)(3) Should additional residents actually subscribe to cable television service in areas where subscribers have already paid a proportionate share under the extension cost sharing formula, subscribers who have previously paid a proportionate share under the extension formula shall be reimbursed *pro rata* for their contribution to a proportional share thereof. In such case, the *pro rata* shares shall be recalculated and each new subscriber shall pay the new *pro rata* share, and all subscribers who previously paid a proportionate share shall receive *pro rata* refunds. In the event such subscribers (or prior subscribers) have been disconnected or has moved and owes the Franchisee money which has not been recovered, Franchisee shall have the right to first apply the refund to amounts owed the Franchisee and give the balance, if any to the subscriber. At such time as there are thirty (30) potential subscribers per cable bearing strand mile, the subscribers shall receive their *pro rata* share of construction costs. In any event, one (1) year after the completion of a project, subscribers who have paid a share of line extension costs are no longer eligible for refunds, and the amounts paid in construction costs will be credited to the plant account of Franchisee.

9.2 Free Basic Cable Service to Public Buildings

Franchisee shall provide, without charge, one service outlet activated for basic subscriber service to each police station, fire station, public school, public library and the Town office. If it is necessary to extend Franchisee's trunk or feeder lines more than two hundred (200) feet solely to provide service to any such school or public building, the Town or the building owner or occupants shall have the option of either paying Franchisee's direct costs for line extensions in excess of two hundred (200) feet or releasing the Franchisee from the obligation to provide service to such building. Furthermore, Franchisee shall be permitted to recover the direct cost of installing cable service, when requested to do so, in order to provide: a) more than one outlet, b) inside wiring, or c) a service outlet requiring more than two hundred (200) feet of drop cable.

Section 10. Insurance and Indemnification

10.1 Insurance

Within ninety (90) days following the grant of a franchise the Franchisee shall obtain, pay all premiums for and make available to the Town at its request copies of

the following insurance policies:

10.1(a) A general comprehensive liability policy indemnifying, defending and saving harmless the Town, its officers, boards, commissions, agents or employees from any and all claims by any person whatsoever on account of injury to or death of a person or persons occasioned by the operations of the Franchisee under the franchise herein granted, or alleged to have been so caused or occurred, with a minimum liability of Five Hundred thousand Dollars (\$500,000) per personal injury or death of any one person, and One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) for personal injury or death of any two or more persons in any one occurrence.

10.1(b) Property damage insurance for property damage occasioned by the operation of Franchisee under the franchise herein granted, or alleged to have been so caused or occurred, with a minimum liability of Five Hundred thousand Dollars (\$500,000) for property damage to the property of any one person and One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) for property damage to the property of two or more persons in any one occurrence.

10.1(c) All insurance policies called for herein shall be in a form satisfactory to the Town and shall require thirty (30) days written notice of any cancellation to both the Town and the Franchisee. The Franchisee shall, in the event of any such cancellation notice, obtain, pay all premiums for, and file with the Town, written evidence of the issuance of replacement policies within thirty (30) days following receipt by the Town or the Franchisee of any notice of cancellation.

10.2 Indemnification

The Franchisee, by its acceptance of a franchise granted pursuant to this Ordinance, shall indemnify and hold harmless the Town, its officials, boards, commissions and employees against any and all claims, suits, causes of action, proceedings, and judgments for damage arising out of the award of a franchise to the Franchisee and its operation of the cable television system under the franchise. These damages shall include, but not be limited to, penalties arising out of copyright infringements and damages arising out of any failure by Franchisee to secure consents from the owners, authorized distributors or licensees of programs to be delivered by the Franchisee's cable television system whether or not any act or omission complained of is authorized, allowed, or prohibited by the franchise.

Section 11. Franchise Violations: Procedures, Notice and Cure

11.1 Procedures In the Event of Alleged Violations

A Franchisee may be penalized by the Town only in the event of a substantial violation or breach of a material provision of this Ordinance. If the Town believes that such a breach has occurred and that there may be sufficient cause to penalize the Franchisee, the following procedures shall be followed:

11.2 Notice, Response and Opportunity to Cure Alleged Violations

11.2(a) The Town shall notify the Franchisee in writing of any alleged violation or failure to meet any of the terms or provisions of this Ordinance. The Franchisee shall be given thirty (30) days from the date of receipt of such notice to respond in writing, stating its explanation for the alleged violations and what actions, if any, have been or are being taken to cure such breach.

11.2(b) Upon receipt of the Franchisee's response, the Town may accept the Franchisee's explanation and/or remedy proposed. Alternatively, if the Town does not accept the Franchisee's explanation or believes that the breach will not be properly cured within a one hundred twenty day (120) period from the date of the original notice of violation, the Town may send to the Franchisee a notice of its intent to penalize the Franchisee.

11.3 Public Hearing Required

Prior to issuing a notice of intent to penalize the Franchisee, the Town shall hold a public hearing providing due process at which testimony and evidence shall be heard concerning the alleged violation. Representatives of the Town and the Franchisee shall be permitted to address the subject of the alleged violation(s) and related issues at the public hearing. The Franchisee may submit evidence to the Town that it is diligently pursuing reasonable actions to cure the alleged violation or that there are circumstances beyond its control (*force majeure*) which prevent the Franchisee from curing the alleged breach until some future date. Such showings shall be sufficient to relieve the Franchisee from an alleged breach of this Ordinance or its franchise. In such cases the Town may require the Franchisee to provide periodic reports updating the Town on progress being made to cure any unresolved problem.

11.4 Notice and Cure of Franchise Violations

If, following a public hearing, the Town believes that the Franchisee remains in breach, the Town may issue a notice of intent to penalize the Franchisee or revoke its franchise.

11.4(a) The Franchisee shall be given a period of sixty (60) days from the date of the issuance of the notice to cure any alleged violation of this Ordinance. If the alleged violation is not cured within the specified sixty (60) day period, the Town may take the appropriate steps necessary to penalize the Franchisee or revoke the franchise. Provided, however, that nothing in this section shall be construed to limit or restrict the Franchisee's rights to appeal the Town's actions in any appropriate state or federal judicial or administrative forum.

11.5 Franchise Termination and Continuity of Service

11.5(a) In the event that the Town denies renewal or revokes the franchise, which denial or revocation is upheld by a final judicial determination, the Franchisee shall be afforded a period of one (1) year from the effective date of the final order denying renewal or revoking the franchise, including any appeal, within which to transfer or convey the assets of the cable system. Approval of such a transfer shall not be unreasonably withheld.

11.5(b) In the event the franchise is terminated, whether by revocation, expiration, or otherwise, the Franchisee may continue to operate the cable system pursuant to the terms and conditions of the terminated franchise, until the happening of one of the following:

11.5(b)(1) A new franchise or an extension of an expired franchise is granted;

11.5(b)(2) In the case of a revocation or a denial of renewal, a final judicial adjudication has been made, including any appeal, which has resulted in a finding or order that Franchisee is not entitled to a reinstatement, renewal or extension of the franchise and is not otherwise entitled by law to continue operation of the cable system.

11.5(b)(3) The passage of six months with no appeal to an appellate court.

Section 12. Assignment of Franchise

12.1 Pledge For Security Purposes or Assignment to A Related Entity

The Franchisee may secure financing or an indebtedness by trust, mortgage, or other instrument of hypothecation of the franchise, in whole or in part, without requiring the consent of the Town. Consent shall not be required to assign a franchise from one business entity to another which is operated or managed by the present Franchisee or manager of the system. In addition, so long as the manager and/or general partner of the Franchisee remains the same, consent shall not be required to transfer interests of any limited partners of the Franchisee, who have no day to day operational control of the Franchisee or the Town system.

12.2 Assignment to an Unrelated Entity

A Franchisee may assign its franchise to another entity (the "Assignee") upon thirty (30) days notice to the Town. The consent of the Town shall not be required for such an assignment, provided that: a) the Town is provided with a reasonable showing that the proposed Assignee possesses the technical and financial qualifications to operate the cable TV system and, b) that the Assignee agrees to comply with the material terms of this Ordinance. In no event shall the Town unreasonably delay or deny the assignment or transfer of a franchise. The reasonableness of the Town's actions shall be subject to judicial review by a court of appropriate jurisdiction.

12.3 Procedures

12.3(a) If no action is taken by the Town within thirty (30) days following receipt of the notice of a proposed assignment by the Franchisee, the assignment of the franchise shall be deemed approved.

12.3(b) If, following a review of the information provided to it, the Town determines that the proposed Assignee may not be technically and financially qualified to operate the cable system, the procedures below shall be followed:

12.3(b)(1) Within thirty (30) days following receipt of the notice of proposed assignment from the Franchisee, the Town shall inform the Franchisee in writing by certified mail of its intent to hold a hearing, providing due process to the Franchisee and the Assignee, for the purpose of receiving evidence as to the Assignee's technical and financial qualifications. Such hearing shall be held by the Town within forty-five (45) days following receipt of the notice of assignment.

12.3(b)(2) Within fourteen (14) days following the date of the hearing, the Town shall make a formal determination regarding the proposed assignment and

if it determines that the proposed Assignee is not qualified to operate the cable system or it determines for any other reason not to assign the franchise, it shall send a written explanation of its decision to the Franchisee by certified mail no later than fourteen (14) days after the public hearing has been held.

Section 13. General Provisions

13.1 Compliance With State and Federal Law

The Franchisee and the Town shall at all times comply with all applicable State and Federal laws and the applicable rules and regulations of administrative agencies. If the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) or any other federal or state governmental body or agency enacts any law or regulation or exercises any paramount jurisdiction over the subject matter of this Ordinance or any franchise granted hereunder, the jurisdiction of the Town shall cease and no longer exist to the extent such superseding jurisdiction shall preempt or preclude the exercise of like jurisdiction by the Town.

13.2 Notice to the Franchisee

Except as otherwise provided in this Ordinance, the Town shall not meet to take any action involving the Franchisee's franchise unless the Town has notified the Franchisee by certified mail at least thirty (30) days prior to such meeting, as to its time, place and purpose. The notice provided for in this section shall be in addition to, and not in lieu of, any other notice to the Franchisee provided for in this Ordinance. All notices, requests, demands and other communications required or permitted hereunder shall be in writing and shall be deemed to have been duly given if mailed by certified mail return receipt requested, addressed to:

13.3 Street Occupancy

Franchisee shall utilize existing poles, conduits and other facilities whenever possible, but may construct or install new, different, or additional poles, conduits, or other facilities whether on the public way or on privately-owned property with the written approval of the appropriate government authority, and, if necessary the property owner. Such approval shall not be unreasonably withheld by the governmental agency.

13.3(a) All transmission lines, equipment and structures shall be so installed and located as to cause minimum interference with the rights and appearance and reasonable convenience of property owners who adjoin on any public way and at all times shall be kept and maintained in a safe condition and in good order and repair. The Franchisee shall at all times employ reasonable care and shall use commonly accepted methods and devices for preventing failures and accidents which are likely to cause damage, injuries or nuisances to the public.

13.3(b) Franchisee shall have the authority to trim trees on public property at its own expense as may be necessary to protect its wires and facilities, subject to the direction of the Town or other appropriate governmental authority.

13.4 Access to Public and Private Property

13.4(a) Franchisee shall have the right to enter and have access to the property and premises of the Town or that of any subscriber for purposes of installing cable TV service or recovering and removing Franchisee's property and equipment when a subscriber's service is terminated and a subscriber refuses to return such equipment to the Franchisee.

13.4(b) The Town shall not permit any person who owns or controls a residential multiple unit dwelling, trailer park, condominium, apartment complex, subdivision or other property to interfere with the right of any tenant, resident or lawful occupant thereof to receive cable installation, service or maintenance from Franchisee, except as federal or state law shall otherwise require.

13.4(c) Upon request by Franchisee, the Town shall promptly exercise any rights it may have to permit or enable Franchisee to obtain or utilize easements with respect to any residential multiple unit dwelling, trailer park, condominium, apartment complex, subdivision or other property as required to facilitate Franchisee's use thereof for purposes of providing system service to the tenants, residents or lawful occupants thereof. In any such proceeding, the restitution to the Owner for the amount of space utilized by the system, considering the enhanced value to the premises resulting from the installation of cable television facilities, shall be a one-time charge of \$1.00 per dwelling unit.

13.5 Nondiscrimination In Employment

The Franchisee shall neither refuse to hire nor discharge from employment nor discriminate against any person in compensation, terms, conditions, or privileges of employment because of age, sex, race, color, creed, or national origin. The Franchisee shall insure that employees are treated without regard to their age, sex, race, color, creed or national origin.

13.6 Franchisee May Issue Rules

The Franchisee shall have the authority to issue such rules, regulations, terms and conditions of its business as shall be reasonably necessary to enable it to exercise its rights and perform its services under this Ordinance and the Rules of the FCC, and to assure uninterrupted service to each and all of its subscribers. Such rules and regulations shall not be deemed to have the force of law.

13.7 Severability of Ordinance Provisions

If any section of this Ordinance or the franchise, or any portion thereof, is held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction or administrative agency, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of the Ordinance or franchise.

Section 14. Effective Date of Ordinance

This ordinance shall become effective upon the date of its adoption by the Town. Any failure by the Town to follow proper procedures under state or local law in adopting this Ordinance or granting a franchise shall not abrogate the rights or obligations of either the Franchisee or the City under this Ordinance. If, following adoption of this Ordinance it is subsequently determined that proper legal procedures have not been followed by the Town, it shall be the responsibility of the Town to rectify any procedural defects and ratify the terms of this Ordinance.

Tri-State Learning Center Participates In ERIM Study

The Tri-State Learning Center, Iuka, Miss., is one of 27 sites selected nationwide to participate in a unique research study to improve education.

According to Dr. David Powe, NASA program manager for the Tri-State Education Initiative, the Environmental Research Institute of Michigan (ERIM) will use the Tri-State Learning Center as a site to conduct research into the use of real-time weather images as a motivational tool for improving science, math and technology skills in students grades seven through 12. The study began January 11.

The Tri-State Learning Center is home to the Tri-State Education Initiative (TSEI), a cooperative effort between NASA and state, local and other federal agencies to work toward the National Educational Goals. TSEI encompasses an area within a 50-mile (80 kilometers) radius of Iuka, Miss., including parts of Alabama, Mississippi and Tennessee.

ERIM will provide the hardware, software and teacher training necessary for the Tri-State Learning Center to conduct the study. ERIM will also evaluate the center's success in effectively using this technology to help students. This type technology has been found to appeal to a broad range of students, from gifted to those students considered to be "at risk." One of ERIM's objectives is to identify students most motivated by this type technology.

The environmental (weather) satellite images can be applied to a wide variety of activities, including math, physical science, geography, social sciences and technical education, at all grade levels. Receiving images as they occur heightens students' interests, stimulating them to desire to learn more about scientific processes, such as radiation, climate and environmental change.

Another benefit of the program is that personal computer-based stations in the schools can be used to motivate

students to conduct original science and environment research.

Implementation of the program will be done by the staff of ERIM's Space Technology Education Program. A NASA-sponsored program, the Space Technology Education Program is in its fourth year. Its goal is to improve the quality of education through applications of direct readout technologies in the classroom.

Compliance Deadline Nears For Mississippi Farmers

Farmers who participate in United States Department of Agriculture farm program benefits are fast moving up on the Jan. 1, 1995, deadline for complying with conservation provisions of the 1985 and 1990 farm bills. It may seem like a long way off but for many, especially for those who must apply structural measures (like terraces) to their land, the clock is ticking. As the deadline grows nearer, the work backlog of contractors building these structures gets bigger.

William Brown, who builds terraces for landowners in northeast Mississippi, believes there will be a work backlog.

"There has been a lot of holding back on it (the scheduling)," he said. "There is just so much that we can do about it the last year. People have been putting it off."

Tennessee is not in much better shape, according to Shelby County farmer John Charles Wilson. Wilson raises soybeans, wheat, corn and cattle along with his 950-acre cotton operation. He is not optimistic about meeting the 1995 deadline.

"Here in west Tennessee we have an awful lot of terraces that must be built to put us in compliance," he said. "I don't think that we are going to be able to meet that date with all of the terraces that we have to build."

USDA's Soil Conservation Service is charged with providing technical assistance to landowners and landusers to help meet their plan's deadline. Vic Simpson, SCS area conservationist in New Albany, Miss., believes the outlook for compliance completion is not so bleak.

"In reviewing the compliance plans that have been applied," he said, "and in doing spot checks, we are finding that less than five percent of the landowners are not actively applying their conservation plans."

Although Simpson is optimistic about the work progress thus far, he warned there may be a possibility of two kinds of backlogs.

"One backlog will be for having enough time for SCS personnel to provide the technical assistance farmers need to apply their conservation plans. And the second backlog, I think, will be having enough contractors available to build the terraces and put them on the ground," he said.

Simpson said a big concern is for absentee landowners, that is, those landowners who live in another state. If a renter makes the decision not to apply conservation practices, he said, it will make the land ineligible for some 25 available federal benefit programs. In that case, it would be hard for the landowner to find a farmer willing to rent the land.

In Benton County, Miss., terraces are a given in the way farmers operate. Terraces are raised mounds of earth with sloping sides that break the flow of running water in order to slow down or stop erosion during rainy periods. There are 28,000 acres of highly erodible land in the county, and the county has the largest number of terraces in the state.

"Most of our farmers have accepted terraces over the years and they do a good job maintaining them," said Danny Braddock, SCS district conservationist in Ashland, Miss. "They realize that terraces are a little more aggravating than a lot of other practices that you put on the ground. They require maintenance. And it's not a practice that you can just put out there and leave. But they (the terraces) do a good job of controlling erosion and our farmers are willing to accept them."

Braddock said an alternative to installing terraces is to plant grass strips because they are less expensive. With the looming deadline, he noted, it might make sense to install grass strips and be in compliance or be left out in the cold. He said that about 85 percent of the conservation compliance plans in

Benton County include either terraces or grass strips, and many include a combination of the two.

Cost is a big issue for many farmers in implementing their compliance plans. Larry Robertson, Benton County director for the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said farmers he deals with are concerned with the deadline as well as with the costs of implementation.

"Our farmers are concerned about the deadline and are doing all that they can to make sure that these farms are in compliance by the time expiration and they are fully aware that time is running out on them," Robertson said. He pointed out that terraces are a high priority with the farmers

who deal with ASCS. "We spend the majority of our funds on the installation of terrace systems," he said.

Terry Osborne, whose farm in Madison County, Miss., is all highly erodible, is a commissioner with the Madison County Soil and Water Conservation District. When he signed his conservation plan, he implemented it then. Because of last spring's rains, he said, many farmers in Madison County are installing their practices now to head off any bad weather delays that might occur and hold up their scheduled application.

"In a county with 73,000 acres of highly erodible land," he said, "we can't afford to wait until

1994 to implement conservation practices. I encourage all farmers to go ahead and complete their planned practices as soon as possible."

In Mississippi, SCS and producers have prepared more than 22,000 conservation compliance plans that are now in various stages of implementation. Nationwide the Soil Conservation Service estimated that 135 million acres of highly erodible land will be protected from erosion, according to Bill Richards, SCS chief.

Whether in Benton or Madison counties, the message is clear—the clock is ticking. Joe Jordon, who farms in Mississippi near the Tennessee border, af-

ferred fellow farmers some helpful advice. "I think that the clock is ticking on several operators who are falling behind on their schedule. And it could be difficult to catch up and get the job done. It could be financially disastrous if they don't get the job done."

In Tishomingo County, Don Jones, SCS district conser-

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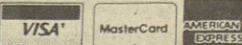
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
