Local Group Awarded Economic and Cultural Honors In Memphis

The Tishomingo County Development Foundation's Tri-State NASA Celebration received the 1993 Economic and Cultural Honors (ECHO) Award for community development during a banquet for almost 200 people held at the Peabody Friday, February 12.

On hand to accept the award were ten community leaders including Mack Wadkins, executive director of the Tishomingo County Development Foundation.

The Tri-State Celebration was among 15 projects from eastern Arkansas, northern Mississippi, and western Tennessee to receive the regional award co-sponsored by the Mid-South Common Market and The Commercial Appeal.

"I find it heartening to see what the celebration's organizers have done to foster better understanding and progress in their community," said Angus McEachran, editor of The Commercial Appeal. "Everyone involved is to be commended."

Louis Polatty, executive vice president of the Mid-South Common Market, noted "I am always amazed at the effort and accomplishments exhibited by all of the ECHO Awards participants. Their achievements and community pride should be a source of inspiration to communities everywhere."

Designed to identify and applaud outstanding community activities, the annual ECHO Awards program recognizes individual projects, filling a niche left by state programs which offer community awards for overall economic preparedness and development achievements. The program also stimulates information exchanges between communities facing similar situations.

"By sharing experiences and solutions, communities can help

one another succeed, thereby strengthening the economic base of the Mid-South," said Bill Boyd, vice chairman the Mid-South Common Market.

Groups submitted written project summaries last fall for screening by economic developers. Finalists made oral presentations to a panel of three national economic and community development professionals in January.

The judges made the following comments in regard to the Tishomingo County Tri-State Celebration:

--Tishomingo County faced a major problem. How to stage a groundbreaking for NASA's solid rocket motor facility at Yellow Creek that would draw a gathering four times larger than a local population. It was a truly remarkable logistical accomplishment. The eye to detail, and strong volunteerism that was channeled properly, pulled off a task that seems virtually impossible from the outside.

--NASA's landing in the Tishomingo County area is reason to celebrate. Job creation and business growth are only part of what NASA can do for the local economy. The rest must come from local citizens that want to preserve and protect this important asset. The Tri-State Celebration is one way for Tishomingo to say "thanks" and build on its important relationship with NASA. Congratulations on getting NASA, managing a major event on your own and returning part of the local donations back to local donors. That certainly deserves a big round of applause.

--The celebration was by all accounts a great success, despite bad weather. Strong community support--both financial and in-kind, and hard work to organize the event attracted more than 12,000 people.

Break-in Foiled By Local Lawmen

A timely call Monday night to local law enforcement officers led to the capture and arrest of three Alabama males who were attempting to break in to the home of an Iuka woman.

Elijah Rufus Armastead, Jr., 26, Lamont Armastead, 19, both of Barton, Ala., and Rodney Wadkins, 19, Rt. 4, Box 150, Cherokee, Ala. were apprehended by members of the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department while attempting to break in to the home of Mrs. Hula Strange on Highway 25 N., just outside the Iuka City Limits, according to Tishomingo County Sheriff Johnny S. Nunley. Assisting the Sheriff's Department were members of the Iuka Police Department.

Nunley said that his department received a call at approximately 11 p.m. Monday stating that intruders were attempting to enter the residence occupied by Mrs. Strange and her sister Mrs. Maxine Kirk. When the officers arrived at the scene, they caught the suspects and transported them to the county jail where they were charged with attempted burglary of an occupied dwelling and trespassing.

The three suspects were all wanted in other cities for similar crimes, Nunley stated. Wadkins signed extradition papers for Tennessee where he is wanted. Authorities in Rosedale and Greenville, Miss. also have a hold on the suspects for past charges in their jurisdictions.

Thanks to the efforts of the Tishomingo County officers and the Iuka Police Department, a crime was prevented.

Home Economics Tips

HELP CHILDREN GAIN SELF CONFIDENCE

Self-confidence becomes a part of your child's pattern of thinking and acting. It easily can be stunted or shattered by some unfortunate or persistent negative circumstance. A self-confident child is happy in

relationships with people and can enjoy being with others or being alone. To build a healthy form of self-confidence in your child, here are some suggestions.

Give responsibilities suitable to your child's level of development and interests. The word responsibility means respond to one's own ability.

Suggest a substitute activity within your child's capacity when he wants to do something you know he cannot do.

Show children the best and most efficient ways of doing things so they have a reasonable chance for success. If they hit a

snag, be ready to advise or help until they can proceed alone.

Respect individual interests and abilities. Let your children know of these contributions, though different, are valuable.

Encourage your children to be enough like the other children of their age in dress, speech, play and other surface qualities that they will not be thought odd, but maintain their values and individuality.

Encourage children to take part in family conversations. Listen to them.

Encourage your children to make suggestions that can be put into practice. The child whose suggestions can be accepted has reason to feel confident.

Praise your children for what they do, especially when it is evident they have tried hard and done their best. Taking things for granted is not good with an adult, and worse with a child.

Do not protect children from all failure. Some failures are needed to protect children from overconfidence, to enable them to assess their abilities and learn to accept defeat as well as success.

PECAN PHYLLOXERA

Did your pecan trees have knots or galls all over the leaves last year? This was caused by an insect called the pecan phylloxera. This is an insect that can seriously damage trees. Growers should begin a spray program in orchards where these insects have been found. Some pecan varieties are more susceptible to these pests than others. Timing is critical in controlling these pests. A spray schedule should be based on development of the trees rather than the calendar. Application should be made at bud break and no later than one inch of growth. Young crawlers need to be killed after they hatch and before they enclose themselves within a gall. Any treatment applied after phylloxera are enclosed will not be effective.

Several pesticides are available for control. Regardless of material used, adequate coverage is essential. Two applications may be necessary in some cases. Read labels before application.

WHEAT
Producing wheat yields above 50 bushels an acre is essential for profitable farming. However, in Mississippi, it is not unusual for wheat that is pushed hard with early fertilizer applications to become succulent and susceptible to freeze injury. Producers must walk the tight rope between using maximum fertilizer rates and keeping cold injury at a minimum. Splitting spring applications of nitrogen has seldom resulted in yield increases in research plots but this can reduce the potential for cold injury. If your land has a potential for 60 bushels use about 100 lbs. of nitrogen. If it is on

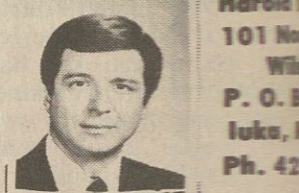
Iuka Congregation To Have Assembly

extension to serve 18 additional users.

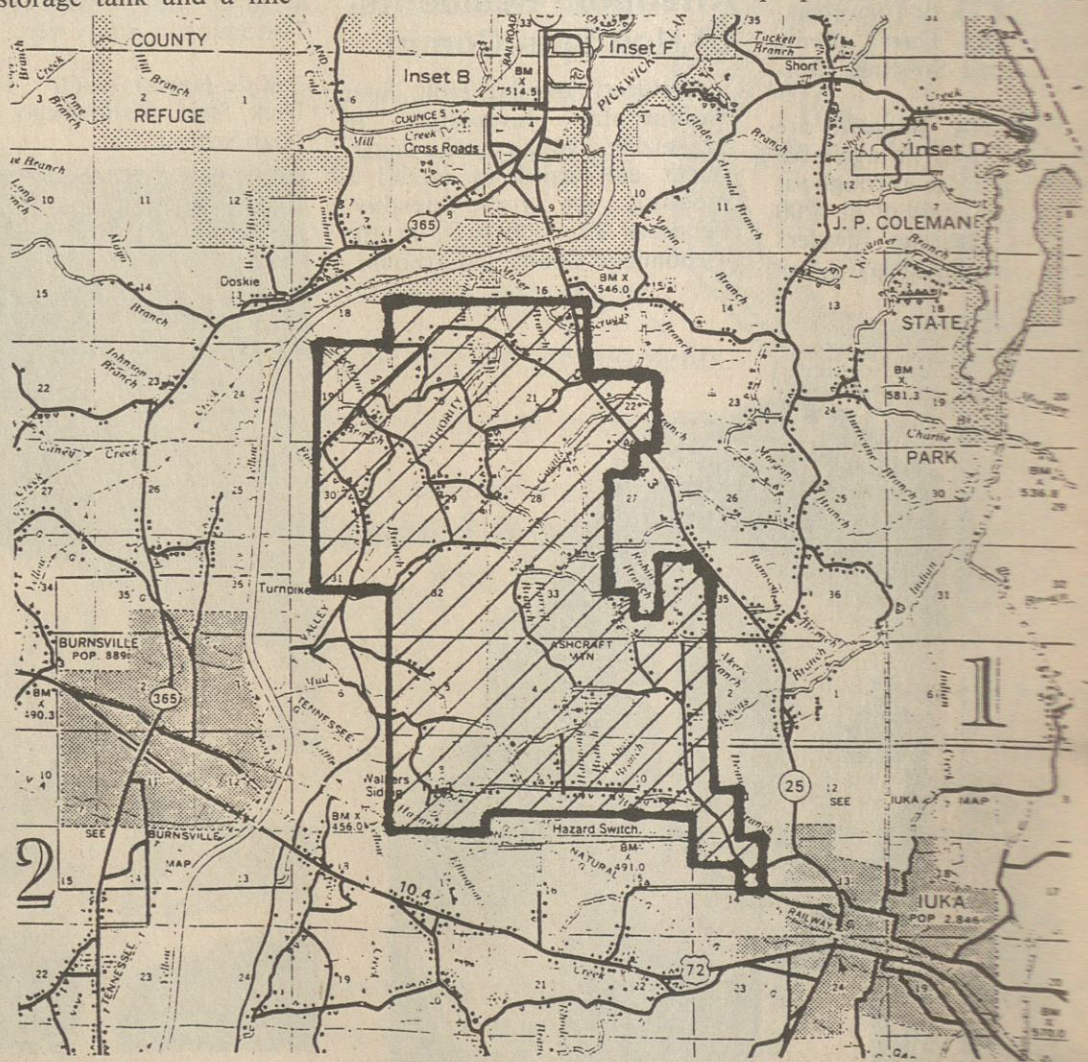

A general location map of the proposed action is shown below.

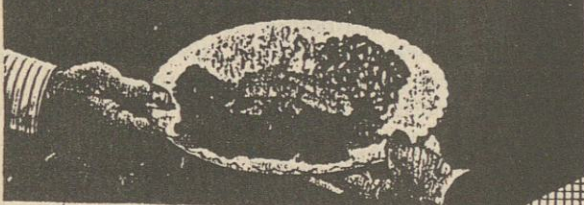

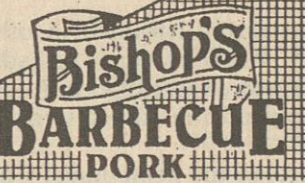

INSIGHT INTO EYESIGHT

WHAT YOUR EYES REVEAL

When you have your eyes examined to find out how your vision problems should be corrected, your eye doctor will be checking for other things as well. For instance, he or she may use an ophthalmoscope to check the back of your eyes, including the retina and its blood vessels. This is a hand-held instrument, something like a flashlight with lenses.

With this device, your eye doctor can determine the health of your retina and the eye's circulatory system. Not only can retinal diseases be detected but visible signs of high blood pressure, diabetes, hardening of the arteries and other diseases as well. Sometimes it is not possible to see a patient's retina with an ophthalmoscope because the lens of the eye is clouded, indicating the patient has a cataract.

A variation of this device, called a binocular indirect ophthalmoscope, however, has a stronger light that is able to penetrate all but the densest cataracts.

Do you like to hunt and fish? Are you interested in improving wildlife habitat in Tishomingo County? Do you think young people should learn responsible resource management methods? If you answered yes to any of these questions, then the new 4-H Field and Stream Program is for you.

The 4-H Field and Stream program is a natural resources educational program for educating youth and volunteer leaders about environmental stewardship. The primary focus of the program is to teach young people and their leaders essential life skills using shooting sports and wildlife and fisheries resource skills.

The world we live in is unique. All living things depend on the earth's natural processes for survival. Over the earth's history, self-regulating processes have maintained a productive balance of natural resources. The earth's

destiny, however, is largely in human hands. Where once man was surrounded by wilderness, the wilderness is now surrounded by man. Only if man begins to understand and cooperate with the earth's self-regulating processes will he and future generations be able to continue to enjoy its natural wonders.

The earth's future lies in the hands of our youth. It is the youth who will make significant future environmental decisions. Today's world, however, lies in the hands of adults, many of whom are youth educators such as parents, classroom teachers, 4-H agents, and 4-H volunteers, etc. Youth educators influence tomorrow's world through the information they choose to convey to youth. It is extremely important to educate youth about the earth's ecology.

The goals for the 4-H Field and Stream program include using shooting sports, and wildlife and fisheries resource skills: 1) to enhance a youth's development by strengthening their self-concept, character, and personal growth, and 2) to encourage youth to participate in natural resources-related issues by exposing them to fun and environmentally beneficial educational

activities.

This program is open to youth between the ages of 8 and 18, parents and 4-H volunteer leaders. Program objectives include teaching youth and adults about: 1) basic ecological principles, 2) proper wildlife and fisheries management techniques and practices, 3) proper and ethical use of firearms, and 4) hunting safety, ethics, and techniques.

Tishomingo County 4-H is now in the process of organizing a Field and Stream program. If you are over 21 and are interested in working with young people in the areas described above, we need your help. The Tishomingo County 4-H Field and Stream program is open to everyone regardless of race, color, religion, national origin, sex, age, handicap, or veteran's status.

Adults are needed in a variety of roles, from program coordinator to instructor.

A Field and Stream Volunteer leader training is planned for March 5-7 at Camp McCain, near Grenada. If you are interested in working with young people in the areas of wildlife management, rifle, shotgun, archery or muzzle

Noel B. Cummings Honored By The State Of Illinois
