Regional Landfill Location To Be West Of Walnut

Northeast Mississippi's solid waste authority on Wednesday announced its plans to locate an environmentally sound, public landfill in Tishomingo County to meet the region's long-term disposal needs.

The site consists of approximately 290 acres and is located approximately 2 miles west of Walnut.

"This announcement means the cities and counties of the Northeast Mississippi Region will be able to dispose of their waste in a reliable and environmentally sound manner, and control the cost of doing so over the long term," said Lex Mitchell, chair-

man of the Northeast Mississippi Solid Waste Management Authority.

The Authority is made up of Alcorn, Benton, Marshall, Prentiss, Tishomingo and Tipton Counties and the cities of Booneville, Corinth, Iuka, Ripley, Ashland and Holly Springs.

Preliminary studies indicate that the site will meet the strict requirements of the federal government's new Subtitle D solid waste regulations, which take effect in October, said Nelson Lucius, project manager for Neel-Schaffer, Inc., the Tupelo engineering firm charged

with developing long term disposal plans for the Northeast Authority.

The new regulations will be enforced by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and are expected to lead to the closing of all existing public landfills in the Northeast region. The regulations require impermeable clay subsoils and synthetic liners to prevent groundwater contamination, daily coverage of waste with 6 inches of soil to eliminate odors and health hazards and continued environmental monitoring for the life of the facility and for 30 years after it closes.

The site selection criteria were very specific, Lucius said. In addition to the necessary soils, the facility must have a large buffer zone, be located outside the 100-year floodplain and provide access to adequate transportation links, he said. Lucius said the regulations will not allow the landfill to accept commercial hazardous wastes.

The announcement culminates almost two years of intensive study by the Authority. The Authority chose to site a regional public facility because it is the best way to control disposal costs and to prevent the importation of out-of-state waste.

House Appropriates \$2.65 Million For Local State Parks

A bill with appropriations totaling \$2.65 million for two State parks located in Tishomingo County has been passed in the Mississippi House of Representatives and is on its way to the Senate.

Appropriations of \$2,150,000.00 have been included in a bill co-authored by Mississippi Rep. Harvey Benderman for J.P. Coleman Park. Within the same bill are funds of \$500,000.00 for Tishomingo State Park.

According to the bill, the monies will be used for the renovation, construction and repair of the parks' infrastructure including electrical, water, sewer, parking facilities and roads.

The J.P. Coleman State Park

appropriations will also be used to make improvements and additions to the marina and also work to the campgrounds, according to Benderman. "Hopefully, with this money the restaurant also can be repaired and reopened so that visitors and local patrons will have a place to go and eat while enjoying the natural beauty of the park," Benderman said. "There are over 100 people on a waiting list for marina slips. These funds will also be used to help remedy this lack of spaces."

Benderman said that there is no opposition to the bill within the Senate that he is aware of, so it should pass without problems.

Another bill also making its way to the Senate after passing

the House appropriates \$150,000.00 for improvements and upkeep to the Old Jacinto Courthouse.

County Headstarts Plan Registration For Next Year

MISSISSIPPI ACTION FOR PROGRESS, WILL REGISTER CHILDREN AT YOUR LOCAL HEADSTART CENTER:

February 15 - March 12, 1993 and March 22 - April 2, from 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.

Children registered at this time will be screened for recommendation of enrollment when centers re-open in September, 1991.

The eligibility criteria for enrollment are children ages 3 and 4 years with family income below poverty and/or on welfare. Parents with children in this age group, who are Medicaid/EP-SDT recipients and/or who have a handicapping condition, are strongly encouraged to register their children. Handicapped children are defined as those who are mentally retarded, hard of hearing, deaf, speech impaired, visually handicapped, seriously emotionally disturbed, crippled, or other health impaired children who by reason thereof require special education and related services.

Parents desiring to pre-register their children are asking to go to the closest center within their community for registration. Parents are asked to carry a certified copy of their child's birth certificate, Medicaid card (if on welfare), immunization card and proof of income, such as W-2 form, or income tax return.

New Fire Engine For Burnsville---

The acceptance of a new commercial fire engine pumper by the town of Burnsville marks several firsts for the fire department and their fire fighting vehicles.

The truck, manufactured by Emergency One and acquired through Sunbelt Fire Apparatus, Inc. is the newest truck to be added to the department at a cost of approx. \$105,000.00. The unit is a state-of-the-art vehicle.

The Apparatus body is made from aluminum, which will eliminate damage from rust and extends usage life. The truck is a 1250 G.P.M. triple combination pumper, 1000 gallon polypropylene large capacity tank, which also eliminates tank corrosion, and has side mounted pump controls.

This IHC 4900 is powered with a heavy duty 250 horsepower diesel engine and Allison automatic transmission.

The unit is equipped with the latest and most modern fire fighting features available for use today, such as large hose bed capacity and left hand side upper high side air mask compartments for maximum storage space.

The commercial pumper shall be a welcomed addition to our community. Chief Donnel Timbes and the fire department are very pleased with their new equipment and are dedicated to providing the highest quality of service to a very deserving community.

Burnsville Mayor Bobby H. Johnson, instrumental in helping the Burnsville Volunteer Fire Department acquire the new vehicle, said that this is just a way of showing appreciation to the volunteers who risk their lives for their fellow citizens in need. "We really appreciate the firefighters

and all that they do in our town and surrounding communities and we want them to have the equipment they need to do their jobs."

Home Economics Tips

MAKING A SPENDING PLAN WORK FOR YOU

A spending plan, or budget, is a plan for spending and saving. It requires you to estimate available income for a particular period of time and decide how to allocate this income toward your expenses. A well-planned spending plan does several things for you and your family. It can help you:
-prevent impulse spending
-decide what you can or cannot afford
-know where your money goes
-increase savings
-decide how to protect against the financial consequences of unemployment, accidents, sickness, aging and death.

A workable spending plan need not be complicated or rigid. However, preparing one takes planning, and following one takes determination. You must do several things to budget successfully.

First, communicate about financial matters with other members of the family, including older children. Consider each person's needs and wants so that all family members feel they are a part of the plan. Everyone may work harder to make the spending plan a success and be less inclined to overspend if they realize the consequences. When families fail to communicate about money matters, it is unlikely a budget

will reflect a workable plan.
Second, be prepared to compromise. This is often difficult, particularly for newlyweds. A spending plan cannot succeed unless there is a financial partnership.

Third, exercise willpower. Try not to indulge in unnecessary spending. Once your spending plan is made, opportunities to overspend will occur daily. Each family member needs to encourage the others to stick to the plan.

Fourth, develop a good record-keeping system. At first, all members of the family may need to keep records of what they spend. This will show how well they are following the plan and will allow intermediate adjustments in the level of spending.

Record keeping is especially important during the first year of a spending plan when you are trying to find a budget that works best for you. Remember, a good spending plan is flexible, requires little clerical time, and most importantly, works for you.

RECYCLING LEAVES

In a forest, Nature's way of leaf disposal is recycling through a slow but essential decomposition process on the forest floor. The result is a rich, spongy topsoil. It is home for worms and other organisms that help in the process, and it serves the future forest by soaking up water and providing nutrients and a good growing medium for new seedlings.

Composting is the same process speeded up. It is simply the biological decomposition of organic waste under controlled conditions. With a little work and in any space your yard allows,

large quantities of leaves, garden refuse, twigs and grass can be reduced to compost in as short a time as one to three months. You know the compost is ready when your pile becomes a dark, granular mass that resembles peat moss and the individual ingredients are no longer recognizable.

Although the end product is not a fertilizer, compost is an inexpensive way to dispose of leaves without using landfills or polluting the air, and when added to the garden or tree planting site, compost improves the physical properties of the soil for better root growth by:

-lightening up clays or enhancing soil aggregation in sands.
-decreasing soil crusting and cracking.
-improving water infiltration and retention.

Making and using a compost pile is an excellent activity for 4-H members in the gardening, soils or related projects.

Make a compost pile by following these steps:

- 1) Place your compost pile on a soil of good drainage characteristics, or a layer of limbs. Boards, chicken wire, or other side frames can help hold the pile together if space is limited.
- 2) Build successive layers of leaves, (except walnuts) and other green matter. For more rapid decomposition, chop and mix

components together.
3) Cover each layer with one to two inches of soil (adding manure makes it even better).

4) Sprinkle each layer with a balanced fertilizer (without weed killer) at a rate of 1/2 pound per 10 square feet. (For garden use, add 1/2 to 1 pound of lime per 10 square feet.)

5) During dry weather, keep the pile moist. In winter, cover top with black plastic to insulate and shed excess water.

6) For aeration, place a vertical drain pipe, or a post to wiggle occasionally.

7) After the pile is built, turn it with a pitch fork after about six weeks. This will aerate and mist the pile, and keep the bacterial processes from overheating.



PRODUCING ENOUGH TEARS

When you think of tears, you probably associate them with crying, but producing enough tears is vital to the health of your eye. Tears are also important if you wear contact lenses or are thinking of changing from glasses to contacts. One test your eye doctor may use to see if your eyes produce enough tears is Schirmer's tearing test.

In this test, special strips of filter paper are inserted under your eyelids, resulting in reflex tearing. Your eye doctor will wait about five minutes and then remove the paper strips. He will evaluate the test results by measuring the amount of moisture absorbed by the paper.

Your eye doctor has another device that he or she can use in testing for a person's ability to wear contact lenses. This is the keratometer, which measures the exact curvature of your cornea. With this device your eye doctor can determine whether you can wear hard or soft contact lenses to correct your vision problems.

Letter To The Editor

To The Editor:

This letter is prompted by the frenzy of recent suicide deaths in which the so-called Suicide Doctor, Jack Kevorkian, "assisted". As I write this, Kevorkian has been involved in additional deaths and each one was accompanied by widespread coverage in all the media.

The greatest danger in this saturation of media attention is that it may give terminally ill people the impression that Kevorkian's way is the only alternative to futile, expensive and often painful medical care. That is absolutely wrong.

For terminally ill patients and their families, there is another choice, and it is called hospice care. It is a form of care for the terminally ill that enables them to live fully and as pain-free as possible before they die, allowing them to spend their last days in dignity, making peace with themselves and their loved ones.

Hospice treats all the needs of such patients through a team that

includes physicians, nurses, counselors, therapists, clergy, aides and volunteers. In most cases, the patient can be cared for in the home, with a relative or close friend serving as the "primary caregiver." Hospice also tends to the needs of the patient's family, advising them how to best to handle the many practical and emotional problems involved.

Hospice is becoming increasingly known and more widely used. Last year, for example, about forty terminally ill persons received hospice care in our community, and nationwide the total was well over 210,000 patients. Hospice has become so accepted that it is now covered by Medicare, Medicaid and most private insurers.

Unlike Dr. Kevorkian, hospice operates openly. Ours is a community-based organization that opens its arms to all eligible patients. Further information about our services can be obtained by calling or writing to us at 601-423-2258, Superior Home Health & Hospice, 104 E. Eastport Street, Iuka, Mississippi 38852.

Although hospice service is

only provided to terminally ill patients, experience has taught us that the earlier hospice enters a case, the more effective our help can be. For this reason, and because it is also good planning, we invite all inquiries—even those where there may be no immediate need for hospice.

It is not our place or our intention to pass judgement on Dr. Kevorkian or on the people whose desperation drove them to

seek his services. But those who think his way is the only way should be advised they are wrong.

This proposed action includes the construction of a new 750 GPM water well and the construction of a 10" water transmission line within the city limits of Iuka.

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) will administer the project for RDA. FmHA has assessed the potential environmental impacts of this proposed action and determined that this project could have an indirect impact on the identified 100-year floodplain within the city's service area by allowing future development of these areas.

To mitigate any adverse impacts, the City of Iuka shall adopt legally enforceable tap-in restrictions which

The identified 100-year floodplain will be those areas identified by the Federal Emergency Management Agency on the latest edition of the Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) for the service area.



County Agents Notes

FIRE ANT CONTROL

When soil temperatures warm, fire ants increase in number and activity. Don't let them. Fire ant bait can be placed around mounds to control ants that seek refuge in lawns. For the home garden, label rates of an approved insecticide can provide good control. If a mound drench is used then it is important NOT to disturb the mound any more than necessary. Some type of sprinkler watering can will work well. In either case, don't destroy mounds before or during treatment. After a couple of weeks, don't be surprised if you see other mounds. Don't give up!

Keep a bait convenient to get to and treat when you see new mounds.
SPRING LIME


Some producers in the county have recently received soil test results that call for applications of lime to correct soil pH. They have asked if they could apply lime this close to planting.

Once applied, lime requires several months to react with the soil. Some of the finely-ground lime particles will quickly neutralize soil acidity when lime is applied. The treatment will immediately help; the full benefits won't be apparent until the next growing season. Lime is more effective in neutralizing soil pH when applied in the fall, but it can and should be applied as soon as possible if pH needs correcting.

ASCS Farm News

ASCS PROVIDES
PRE-MEASUREMENT
SERVICE

Pre-measurement and other land measurement services are available to assure producers that they are in compliance with the 1993 farm program requirements and eligible for program benefits.

At the request of producers, ASCS will measure, stake and reference any type of acreage, or portions thereof, prior to planting. We can also advise producers of fields which already have an official acreage. Only those acres pre-measured by ASCS will be guaranteed for the 1993 program year. Fees vary, based on the type of service rendered.

To be certain that program requirements are met, producers must plant within the stakes that are placed when the land is pre-measured, and also report their crop acreage to ASCS after planting.

The 1993 farm program sign-up begins March 1. To qualify for target price protection and price support loans, producers must reduce their acreage bases by at least 10 percent for corn, 5 percent for grain sorghum, 7.5 percent for upland cotton and 20 percent for extra long staple cotton. There is zero acreage reduction for wheat, oats, barley and rice.

Pre-measurement is important in helping farmers plan the mount of land to devote to the acreage conservation reserve (ACR) and planted acreages of program crops.

Farmers interested in using pre-measurement service, or in obtaining information on other producer services, should contact the local ASCS office.

NASA's Tri-State Education Initiative Completes Phase One Of Communications Project

NASA's Tri-State Education Initiative (TSEI) has completed phase one of a critical communications project. This bold, five-phase effort will eventually link all the schools, teachers and students in the tri-state area together via computers.

PHASE ONE COMPLETED

Dr. David Powe, NASA program manager for TSEI, announced the completion of phase one in January 1993. Phase one consisted of the installation of computers and modems in the offices of the 30 TSEI schools districts. These 30 systems helped establish the electronic bulletin board system so that the school districts could communicate with each other.

Powe states that this is a very exciting time for the initiative in that it has completed a strategy which was developed by the customer group, the 30 school districts within the consortium.

TOLL-FREE BULLETIN BOARD SYSTEM ESTABLISHED

Also accomplished in phase one was the installation of toll-free telephone numbers at the Tri-State Learning Center for easy access to the bulletin board which is currently on line. The bulletin board has been expanded to include an extensive menu from which the user may choose. Among these choices are the Tri-State Bulletin Board System (BBS), South Eastern Regional Vision for Education (SERVE), NASA Spacelink, Association for Supervision and Curriculum Development (ASCD), Daily Report Card and the Federal Information Exchange (FEDIX).

Tri-State BBS - This system allows the school districts to

communicate with each other or with the systems operations center in Iuka. The BBS provides access to continually updated information about educational issues concerning the TSEI. Users can leave messages asking questions or can make announcements or discuss concerns with other users. They have on-line access to bulletins concerning upcoming events and news flashes. They can join special conferences, upload and download files for general reference, and can access and query a data base of information on educational data bases and reference documents concerning TSEI issues.

SERVE - This is a computer network which allows users to access and request information and current publications; communicate with other users through a message system; and share opinions, questions and announcements with other users throughout the Southeast.

NASA Spacelink - Spacelink is an electronic information system which allows individuals to connect with a NASA computer to receive news about NASA programs and other space-related information. Information available includes news releases, NASA project status reports, astronaut data, lesson plans, classroom activities and even computer programs.

ASCD - ASCD is an electronic conferencing system promoting leadership for quality in education for all students. It is comprised of various conferences which relate to specific topic areas.

Daily Report Card - This is an electronic information system which allows individuals to con-

nect with a U.S. Department of Education computer and receive news about current education programs and other information pertaining to education.

FEDIX - An on-line information service, FEDIX links the higher education community and the federal government to facilitate research, education and services. The system provides accurate and timely federal agency information to colleges, universities, and other research and educational organizations.

INTERNET SYSTEM CONNECTED

NASA is currently making available an internet to the tri-state region through the Advanced Solid Rocket Motor plant, Iuka, Miss., and the Marshall Space Flight Center, Huntsville, Ala. This internet system will provide a global gateway through a supercomputing network which will make thousands of interfaces available for the schools. This will connect them to colleges, universities, businesses, industries, governmental agencies, research facilities, etc.

PHASE TWO BEGUN

Phase two of the communications strategy has now begun. Phase two consists of placing systems like those in the 30 school districts in each of the 232 schools throughout the tri-state region. Phase two also involves technology analysis, interface designation and training for each site. All of these elements are presently being developed.

FUTURE PHASES PLANNED

In keeping with NASA's ongoing commitment to provide technology awareness and skills training to the schools, NASA personnel will continue to support the equipment and its users.

Future phases will include providing each of the 5,600 teachers whose schools are participating in the TSEI with compatible systems. Also planned is one computer for every four students of the 102,000 student population in schools participating in the TSEI.

Unemployment Rate Brings More Good News

For the second straight month Mississippi's unemployment rate was lower than the national average, a rare occurrence in recent years. The December rate was also the lowest rate for a December recorded since 1978.

Information released by the Mississippi Employment Security Commission shows a December unemployment rate of 6.2 percent, up only slightly from November's 6.1 percent. The national unemployment rate was 7.0 percent for the month. Compared to one year ago in Mississippi, the rate dropped one and four-tenths percentage points from 7.6 percent in 1991.

"The increase of 400 persons unemployed between November and December is minuscule when compared to average changes in the number of unemployed through the years," said Raiford Crews, MESC's chief of labor market information. "The impressive statistic in today's announcement is the increase of 40,000 in the number of persons employed compared to one year ago. This represents a growth rate of 3.8 percent."

Establishment based jobs grew by 2,900 from November and were up 20,900 from December 1991. "This is very good when you consider that most years there are fewer jobs in December than in November," Crews said.

New manufacturing jobs continue to lag, with only a 200-job increase from one month ago. Non-manufacturing jobs, on the other hand, increased by 2,600. The trend is even more pronounced when we note manufacturing jobs declined by 1,900 from last December, but the non-manufacturing sector grew by 22,800 jobs over the year, Crews said.

Although manufacturing jobs have declined for the month, the average number of jobs furnished by the sector in 1992 was 247,600 compared to 246,400 in 1991, an increase of 1,200. This is a good record when we consider that manufacturing has decreased in the nation.

Even though much of the added 22,800 jobs in non-manufacturing were in the services sector (14,200 jobs) this 8.5 percent growth rate is outstanding, Crews said. Non-manufacturing industries provided an annual average growth of 11,000 between 1991 and 1992.

Mississippi's unemployment rate has significantly undercut the national rate for both November and December. The national rate in November was 7.0 percent compared to the state's 6.1 percent. "This is a vast over-the-year improvement when we consider that one year ago Mississippi had a rate of 7.6 percent compared to 6.8 for the U.S.," Crews said. "We expect continued improvement in the economy over the next year with only seasonal variations," he said.

A Question Of Health

In another controversial, non-economic proposal, President Clinton and his HHS Secretary Donna Shalala, have announced to lift the ban on immigration by people infected with the HIV and AIDS.

I strongly oppose lifting this ban. President Clinton likes to say that he was elected to bring change, but this is definitely the kind of change to make and it's not in the best interest of the people.

Lifting this ban could lead to the further spread of a communicable disease and would add to the already tremendous burden that AIDS places on the U.S. health care system.

Therefore, I have cosponsored an amendment with Senator Nickles, of Oklahoma, that would codify the existing policy which excludes immigration of people who are HIV positive. The amendment defines HIV as a "communicable disease of public health significance."

Our amendment passed in the Senate by a 76-23 vote and is part of NIH Reauthorization. Its approval clearly shows that Congress is taking this ban and making it law has strong bi-partisan support. I believe the Senate's vote for this amendment shows good common sense and the president should listen to it.

The very idea of trying to let immigrants with AIDS enter the country should make us ask ourselves common sense questions. Would lifting the ban be a public health benefit? Would it help contain the spread of a tragic and incurable disease? Would it help the U.S. health care system? And repeatedly the answer is "no."

The American Medical Association, the body most knowledgeable and experienced on the subject of AIDS, supports the current policy reflected in the Nickles Amendment. That alone is good enough for me but there are many other reasons.

Those reasons are clear. It is sound and it protects the public health, contains the spread of a tragic disease and prevents a further burdening of the U.S. health care system.

The current policy, which was instituted by President Bush in 1990, does allow exceptions for special and unusual circumstances. The Immigration and Naturalization Service has waived the immigration ban in 76 hardship cases, such as when one member of a large family is infected. INS has denied 48 other requests and has about 120 requests pending from last fall.

Banning immigration by people with AIDS and other communicable diseases is not a question of discrimination, it is a question of health and what is best for America. (2/22/93)
