Land Purchased For Location Of Burnsville Chamber of Commerce

Just over an acre of land, adjacent to the Burnsville Post Office, has been acquired for the construction of a Burnsville Area Chamber of Commerce building.

The deed to the land was transferred to Chamber representatives by Eugene Bishop, director of the Yellow Creek State Inland Port Authority during a luncheon meeting of the Chamber Board of Directors and officers on Thursday, Feb. 25 at the Pour House Restaurant.

The property, located on Hwy. 72 in Burnsville was purchased from the state. Groundbreaking for the construction of the Chamber building is planned for the Spring.

The building planned for the Chamber will have 2,100 sq. ft. and will house offices and a large meeting room. It will be patterned after the Corinth-Alcorn Area Chamber of Commerce building, according to reports.

After completion, Chamber volunteers will staff the office which will serve as a host location for representatives of potential industries looking to locate in the Northeast Mississippi Waterway Industrial Park and other locations in the Burnsville area. The Industrial Park has approximately 900 acres of state owned land available for industries.

The Chamber plans to pay for the building through donations and fundraisers. They are presently planning a wrestling match for March 27 to help raise funds.

Bomb Threat Vacates ASRM Facilities

Advanced Solid Rocket Motor Plant employees were unnerved Tuesday morning, March 2, when they arrived at work to discover that a bomb threat message had been left on a staff member's answering machine.

According to a spokesman at the facility, the voice of a male threatened that at 12 o'clock Wednesday, Building 1016, the largest building on the ASRM site, would be blown up. The individual, who has not yet been identified, stated that he had been wronged by the company, the spokesperson said.

Employees were sent home Wednesday morning after having their vehicles searched by investigators, sources at the site reported.

An investigation into the threat by the Federal Bureau of Investigations was ongoing at press time.

Students From The Tri-States Chosen To Contact Space Shuttle Discovery

The Students from the tri-states of Mississippi, Alabama, and Tennessee will be gathering at the Tishomingo County High School gymnasium during the April 1993 flight of space shuttle Discovery (STS-56). They have been chosen by the American Radio Relay League (ARRL) and astronauts on that mission to try to communicate with the astronauts via ham radio while in space on a student experiment called SAREX, which stands for Shuttle Amateur Radio Experiment. SAREX is sponsored as an educational program by the ARRL, the Radio Amateur

Satellite Corporation (AMSAT), and the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA).

This is a once in a lifetime opportunity for students, especially from a rural area, to talk directly to astronauts in space. Students will be given lesson plans specifically geared toward the mission as well as information about Discovery and the astronauts aboard. They will learn real-life lessons in geography and mathematics. When they make contact the lessons learned will be in electronics and communications as

well. This is an experiment designed to motivate students to "reach for the stars".

Local volunteer Ham Radio operators, Jim McCullough, Daniel Price, Bill Stahl, and Donnie Stegall, Jr. will build the radio station in the gymnasium of the new Tishomingo County Magnet High School where the day's events will take place.

Approximately 2,000 Students (from the tri-states) will be able to participate in this field day which will include a tour of NASA's Tri-State Education Initiative (TSEI) facility, lunch and a tour NASA's Advanced Solid Rocket Motor facility.

Oxford Piano Trio To Perform March 11th

The Tishomingo County Arts Council will present the Oxford Piano Trio in a program of light classical music, on March 11 at 8:00 p.m. in the auditorium of the Tishomingo County Magnet High School. The Oxford Piano Trio has been performing great works of the piano trio literature since the group's inception in 1988.

The three original members, Robert Riggs, violin; Tian-sheng Li, Cello; and Stacy Rodgers, piano -- bring diverse educational and professional backgrounds to the interpretation of this repertoire. Unity of conception and enthusiasm are hallmarks of their

concerts.

In addition to the presentation Thursday night, the Trio will conduct a music workshop for the band students of the school with band director, Bob Bruce. Students will be given an ideal opportunity to interact with the performing artists, to ask questions in an informal setting, and to immerse themselves in the music chosen for study.

Members of the Trio hold various positions at the University of Mississippi in Oxford. Robert Riggs is Assistant Professor of Violin and Music History, his experience includes 15 years as a professional or-

chestral and chamber musician in Boston and Germany. He has served as a member of the music history faculty at the New England Conservatory, has presented papers on Mozart and Beethoven at National Meetings of the American Musicological Society, and has edited a book on the string quartets of Haydn, Mozart, and Beethoven for Harvard University Press.

Tian-Sheng Le is Acting Assistant Professor of Cello at the University and Assistant Principal Cellist of the Mississippi Symphony in Jackson. His experience includes performances with the Memphis, Little Rock, North Carolina and South Dakota Symphony Orchestras, and a solo appearance at the First World Cello Congress in Washington, D.C. Two solo recordings have been released commercially by Hong Kong Productions.

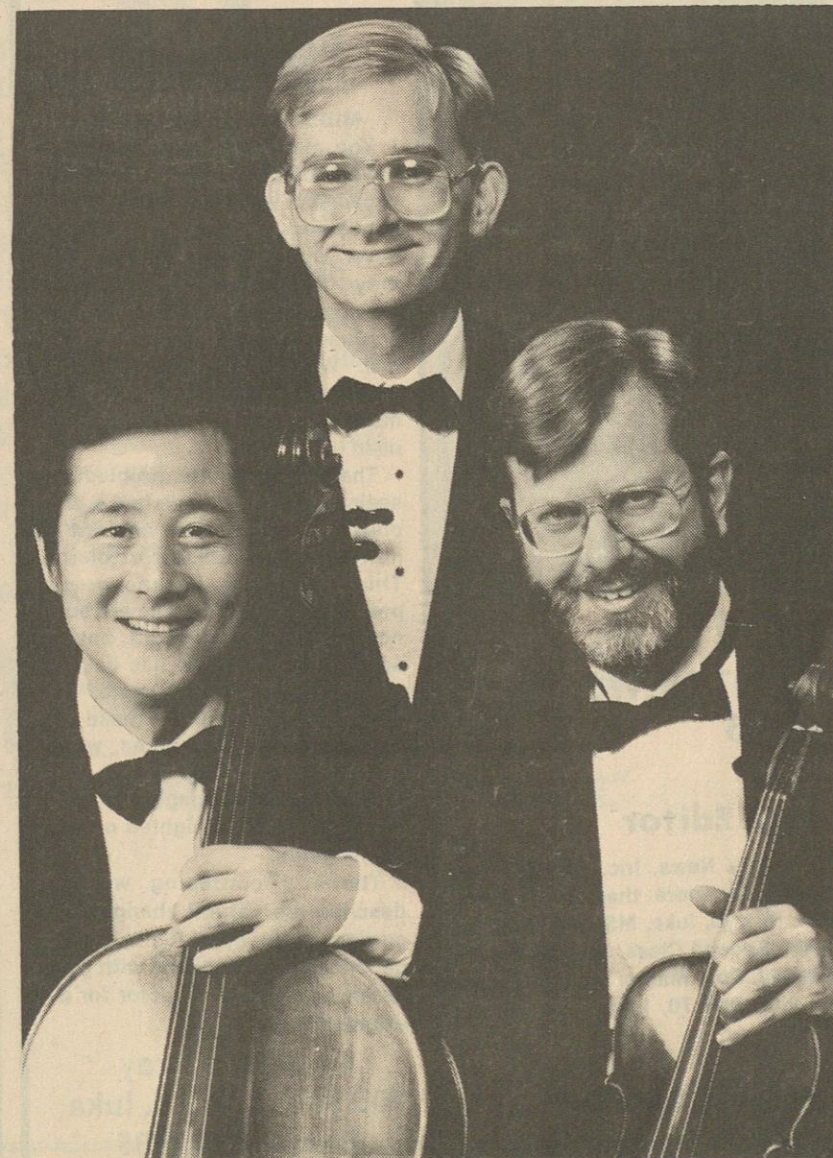

Home Economics Tips

Extension Home Economist HANDLE POULTRY SAFELY

For many people poultry is not only the meat of choice, it is a staple in their diet. Because of reports in the news about the risk of foodborne illness from poultry, some people are concerned about the safety of feeding poultry to their families.

Poultry is an excellent choice to include in a healthy diet. It not only is a very versatile food, if prepared properly it is a low-fat, low-calorie, heart-healthy selection consumers can feel good about serving. However, like all potentially hazardous foods if it is not handled correctly, it can be a potential risk for foodborne illness.

When handling poultry or any other potentially hazardous food

remember:

Always cook poultry thoroughly. Juices should run clear, not pink. White meat should register 170 degrees F on a meat thermometer, dark meat 180 degrees.

Thaw frozen poultry in the refrigerator, never at room temperature. Use a microwave for thawing only if you plan to cook it right away or re-refrigerate it until cooking time.

When trimming or preparing raw poultry, avoid cross contamination by not letting it touch other foods, especially salad greens or any other food that will be served raw or cooked only briefly.

After washing and preparing raw poultry, wash the cutting board, kitchen counter, knives, other utensils and your hands thoroughly with soap and hot water.

Make sure the raw poultry and fluids from the packaging don't

come in contact with other foods in the grocery bag, cart or in the refrigerator.

Always refrigerate raw poultry immediately in a loose wrapping and place in a secure container to prevent dripping on other foods in the refrigerator. Don't keep it refrigerated for more than two or three days. Cooked poultry can be safely refrigerated for up to four days.

Marinate chicken pieces in the refrigerator. Chicken can spoil if it sits out for even three hours on a warm day. If you plan to serve the marinade as a sauce, either boil it thoroughly or prepare a second recipe of the marinade for the sauce (do not marinate the chicken in the second recipe).

When grilling chicken, always use a clean platter for placing the cooked chicken on for serving.

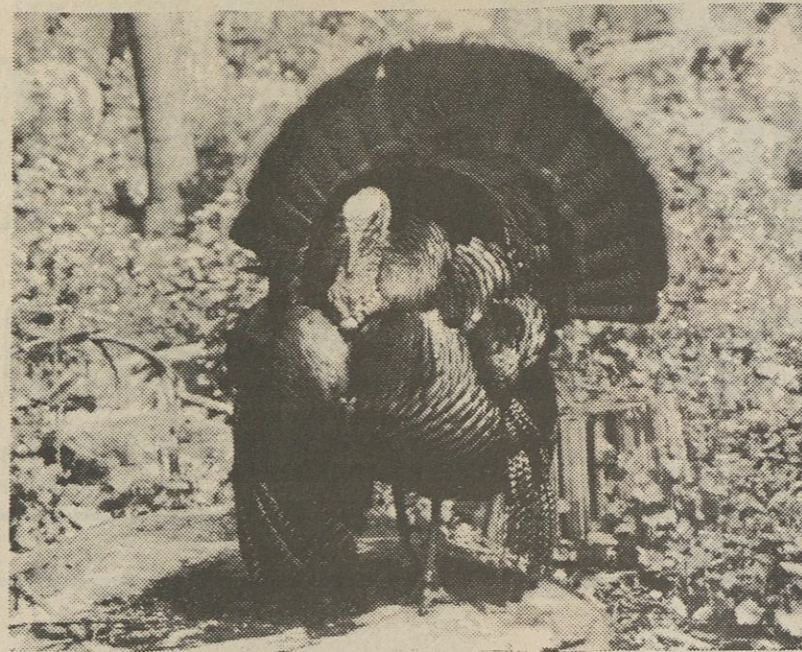
MIDDLE-AGE CONFUSION

You may have heard that middle-age can be a confusing time, especially where your vision is concerned. By age 40, if you've never worn glasses before, you may discover a difficulty in reading. This is nothing to get confused about, because it's normal. When most people reach middle-age their near-focusing muscles are not as strong as they used to be.

There may be no problem in seeing objects at a distance, but objects close up, such as print in newspaper, are unclear or blurry. This condition is known as presbyopia. Some people are born nearsighted or farsighted, but by age 21 this condition has usually stabilized. For most people, the change in vision or the need for vision correction comes when they develop presbyopia in middle-age. It has nothing to do with becoming more farsighted or less near-sighted.

That's a confusing way to describe the natural changes occurring in your eyes. If you are experiencing any problems with your vision, see your eye doctor for an examination.

SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

The eastern wild turkey is native to Mississippi and is found in extensive woodlands throughout most of the state. As an adult, our largest game bird stands three feet high. Hens normally weigh from eight to 12 pounds and gobblers usually average from 12 to 20 pounds.

Originally the wild turkey was extremely abundant in Mississippi. Due to indiscriminate logging, relentless hunting and lack of regulations during the early 1900's, it was estimated that only about 1500 birds were left in a few isolated areas of the state. Today, from the results of restocking by the Game and Fish Commission, reforestation and timber management programs, along with proper protection and management, the wild turkey is present throughout the state.

Life History. During the late summer and fall, wild turkeys are normally seen in flocks. These flocks begin breaking up in late winter and mature gobblers establish poorly defined breeding territories where they strut and gobble. Breeding season extends from late winter until about mid-May, with a peak of breeding activity in March and April. Mature toms normally mate with a number of hens. After mating, hens form a nest and start laying. The average number in a clutch is 12 eggs. The incubation period is 28 days. The slightest disturbance by people or other animals during this period may cause the hen to abandon her nest. Normally she will not attempt to re-nest. Soon after hatching, the pouls leave the nest with their mother and begin the endless search for food. The brood rests or sleeps by crouching under the mother's wings or body as she hovers over them. For the first four or five weeks they roost on the ground with their mother. After this they begin to roost on the lower branches of trees. They are soon able to move to higher perches where adults normally roost. Young turkeys usually remain in a flock with the hen throughout the summer. Family groups may join into larger flocks in the fall. They disperse again in late winter. Gobblers of similar age may flock together during the breeding season.

Habitat Requirements. Wild turkeys prefer extensive

woodland areas where stands of oak and pine dominate. Good habitat includes woodland areas where the majority of the timber is at least 6 inches in diameter or more. They like an open understory where they can move easily and see for considerable distances. Areas of heavy undergrowth are avoided. At least 10 percent of the range should be in well distributed grassy openings; openings of pasture and cropland may constitute from 30 to 50 percent of the range provided there is a minimum of human disturbance.

Adult turkeys require drinking water everyday and hens usually nest near a permanent supply which they visit daily. If well distributed over the range, ponds, springs and streams provide an adequate water supply. If such sources are not available, water holes should be constructed. In a natural woodland habitat, a flock of wild turkeys will usually range over a tract of 5,000 or more acres. Flocks can be maintained on smaller units provided proper food, water, cover and protection are provided.

Foods. During the late fall, winter and spring, a large part of the turkey food comes from trees and shrubs which produce fruits and nuts such as: acorns, beechnuts, chinquapins, pine

seeds, flowering dogwood, choice foods of this period are corn, chuffa, wild grapes, forage of green plants, barley, clover, oats, wheat, ryegrass. In summer and fall, due to availability of foods, they turn to blackberries, huckleberries, brownberries, mulberries, cowpeas, grain sorghum, soybeans, wheat. Seeds of bahia, bullgrass, carpetgrass, croton are choice foods. They are eaten all year but a larger portion of the diet is during the period. They eat many of insects but cicadas, grasshoppers are the common species taken. Turkeys depend heavily on insects during the early development.

Management. Wood management should favor producing trees. Part of the range should always be in old growth with a clean understory. Controlled burning, where feasible, is a good management tool. Sufficient openings in timber areas should be provided. These and adjacent fields should be planted to grains and clover. An adequate water supply already present, water should be constructed. Pressure must be carefully justified to the annual increase in protection from nest disturbance, poaching and free ranging is important.

Free Class In Machine Shop

The Northeast Extension Center is offering the residents of Tishomingo County free classes in Production Machine Operation (Machine Shop). Students have the opportunity to learn basic blueprint reading, precision measuring, operation of lathes, vertical milling machines, and grinding. The students also have the opportunity to learn Computer Numerical Control. The classes are free and while the students are in class they receive a allowance of \$120.00 each month and a child care allowance available. This program qualifies for the Pell Grant. 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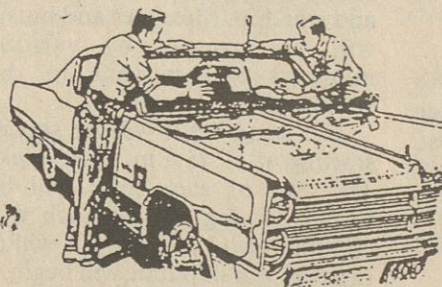

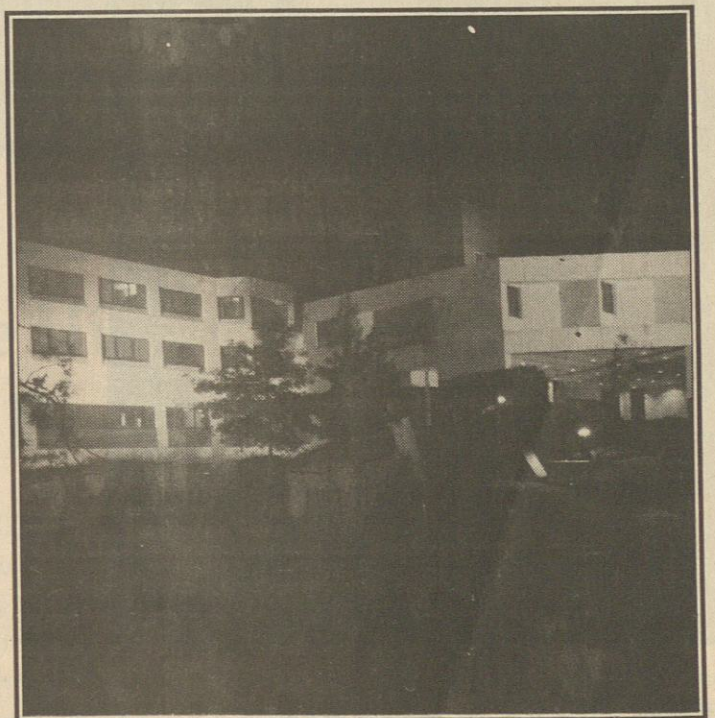

Mental health, economic development, and institutions of higher education would all get a significant boost in funding under a towering stack of budget bills approved recently by the House of Representatives.

Last Thursday, February 25, was the cutoff for original floor action on both appropriations and revenue bills. In addition to the appropriation measures, several important revenue bills also won House approval including a proposal to help finance construction of three new nursing homes for veterans, with one each to be located in Northern, Central and Southern Mississippi.

The bill authorizes the sale of \$7.5 million bonds to cover the state's share of the veteran's homes. Plans call for the state to put up 35 percent of the cost with the remaining 65 percent to come from federal funds. The bill cleared the House with no dissenting votes.

Other House-passed measures would update and expand various economic development laws;

boost the bonding authority of the Mississippi Development Bank to assist regional solid waste authorities; increase the amount of bonds that may be issued under the state's Home Corporation loan program from \$150 million to \$190 million; authorize \$2 million in bonds for repairing tornado-damaged facilities at Mississippi University for Women; and allow a local-option exemption from ad valorem taxes on a large furniture mart in Northeast Mississippi.

A strong but unsuccessful effort was made to pass a hotly debated bill aimed at helping to lower the cost of car tags by raising the sales tax on motor vehicles from 3 percent 7 percent. The proceeds would be used to partially repay cities and counties for the loss of local ad valorem taxes on vehicles. It's the ad valorem tax that has caused the cost of tags to increase dramatically over recent years as the value of cars has risen and local millage rates increased in many areas.

All together, the House approved more than \$747 million from the state's General Fund for agencies and institutions in the fiscal year starting July 1. The total General Fund budget for FY 1993-1994 is expected to run around \$2.1 billion.

The House approved \$105.8 million from the General Fund

for mental health programs, an increase of \$16.6 million over this year.

Other major General Fund allocations included \$187 million for general support of the institutions of higher learning, an increase of \$5 million over the current year; \$69.9 million for community colleges, up \$5 million; \$65 million for the University Medical Center, up \$4.2 million; \$91.3 million for the Department of Corrections, up \$8.6 million; \$34.6 million for the Department of Public Safety, up \$3.1 million; and \$44.7 million for payment on the state's bonded debt, up \$13.1 million.

The House approved \$19.1 million for the Department of Economic and Community Development, an increase of \$8.3 million over this year. The proposal includes a new \$5 million for tourism promotion.

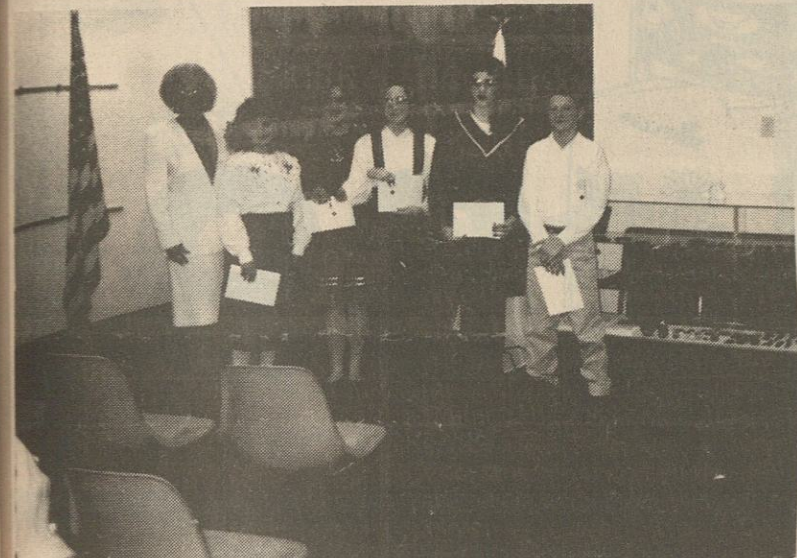
The general support budgets

for public schools originated in the Senate, but the House Appropriations Committee has agreed to recommend increases to provide pay raises for teachers and additional funds for health insurance. Most appropriations passed by the House include salary increases of \$2.1 for state employees as a result of the House in an earlier session. In addition, money was included in the budgets for university community colleges salary hikes of around \$1.8 million was included to help defray costs of health insurance for professional-instruction in the community colleges.

Regional Landfill Designed For Environmental Safety

Northeast Mississippi's first public, regional solid waste landfill will be a model of environmentally sensitive design due to strict state and federal guidelines that take effect in October, said an engineer helping plan the facility.

Nelson Lucius, project manager for Neel-Schaffer, Inc., of Tupelo, said the proposed Tishomingo County landfill will enable the Northeast Region to manage its household waste economically and safely.

"The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency has issued guidelines for solid waste landfills that will end the days of the old, open dumps that most people are familiar with," Lucius said. "I understand why people who have seen those old, open dumps would not be thrilled to hear that a landfill is coming to their community, but I encourage them to learn everything they can about the new regulations and I think that will put their fears to rest."

The Northeast Mississippi Regional Solid Waste Management Authority is at the forefront of regional efforts to site environmentally sound solid waste disposal facilities, Lucius said. The Authority came together to share the cost of building a state-of-the-art disposal facility to meet the new environmental guidelines; members include Alcorn, Benton, Marshall, Prentiss, Tishomingo and Tishomingo Counties and the cities of Booneville, Corinth, Iuka, Ripley, Ashland and Holly Springs.

"The Northeast Authority has looked at numerous alternatives for cost effective, environmentally sound solid waste disposal, and selected a publicly-owned regional landfill as the best option," Lucius said. "Of the sites suitable for a landfill, the one in Tishomingo County near the town of Walnut was preferred." The authority's plan also includes composting of yard waste and a

25 percent reduction, primarily through recycling, to limit the volume of waste taken to the landfill. The authority voted unanimously to retain public ownership of the facility to control long term disposal costs and sources of waste.

Lucius said the criteria for selecting a site were strict due to the new environmental constraints. The guidelines of EPA and the Mississippi Department of Environmental Quality require the facility to have deep, clay subsoils, an acceptable synthetic liner, an adequate buffer zone and elevations above the floodplain and outside of wetland areas. There were other considerations as well, including central location and access to adequate transportation routes, said Authority Chairman Lex Mitchell.

Lucius said preliminary studies indicate that the preferred site can meet the new guidelines in a cost-effective manner. He said residents need not be concerned about groundwater contamination because the regulations were designed specifically to eliminate that problem, and require regular groundwater monitoring for the life of the facility and for 30 years after it closes.

"It is important to understand is that environmental concerns are the very reason this facility is being built," Lucius said. In addition to groundwater protection measures, the regulations require daily coverage of waste to eliminate odors and health hazards and control of runoff water, he said. Waste disposed of at the site will be screened to prevent the disposal of commercial hazardous waste, Lucius said.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's new solid waste regulations are causing 90 percent of the existing landfills in Mississippi and around the country to close," said Bill Barnett, chief of the solid waste division of the Mississippi Department of

Environmental Quality. The reason for the closings, Barnett said, is that most existing landfills either cannot be upgraded or would cost too much to upgrade to meet new EPA regulations passed "specifically to put groundwater protection measures in place."

A RESOLUTION DECLARING THE INTENTION OF THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE TISHOMINGO COUNTY WATER DISTRICT, INC. TO ISSUE WATER SYSTEM REVENUE BONDS OF SAID DISTRICT IN THE MAXIMUM PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF SIX HUNDRED SEVENTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$675,000) TO RAISE MONEY FOR THE PURPOSE OF ACQUIRING, CONSTRUCTING, IMPROVING, BETTERING AND EXTENDING THE WATER SUPPLY SYSTEM.

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of the Tishomingo County Water District, Inc., Tishomingo County, Mississippi (the "Governing Body" of the "District"), acting for and on behalf of the District, hereby finds, determines, adjudicates and declares as follows:

1. The waterworks and water supply facilities of the District are operated as a system known as the water system of the District (the "System").

2. It is necessary and advisable and in the best interest of the District and its inhabitants to issue water system revenue bonds of the District in the maximum principal amount of Six Hundred Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars (\$675,000) to raise money for the purpose of acquiring, constructing, improving, bettering and extending the System for which purpose there are no other available funds on

hand.

3. The Governing Body has employed Cook Coggin Engineers, Tupelo, Mississippi, a consulting engineering firm, to study the System, determine the nature and extent of the improvements, repairs and extensions necessary thereto, make an estimate of the cost thereof.

4. Said engineers have determined the nature and extent of necessary improvements, repairs and extensions to the System and made an estimate of the cost thereof which estimate is the aggregate amount of One Million Seven Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,700,000).

5. Said improvements, repairs and extensions are necessary, economically feasible and warranted in the public interest and of benefit to the District, and the findings of the engineers are hereby adopted, including the estimate of the cost of said improvements, repairs and extensions.

6. Under the provisions of Sections 19-5-151 through 19-5-207, Mississippi Code of 1972 (the "Act"), the District is authorized to make improvements, repairs and extensions and to provide for the payment of the costs thereof, or any portion thereof, by and through the issuance of bonds, the principal interest of and on which shall be payable from the revenues of the System.

7. The District reasonably expects that it will incur expenditures for the issuance of said bonds, which it intends to reimburse with the proceeds of said bonds and the issuance thereof. This declaration of official intent to reimburse said expenditures made prior to the issuance of said bonds in anticipation of issuance of said bonds is made pursuant to Department of Transportation regulations section 1.103-1 reimbursement regulations, project for which such expenditures are made is the same as declared hereinafter in Section 1 of this resolution. The maximum principal amount of debt expected to be incurred for the project is the amount hereinafter set forth in Section 1.

8. A sum not exceeding Sixty-seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$67,500) must be provided for the issuance of said obligation bonds in said amount payable both as to principal and interest from the revenues of the System, as authorized by the Act.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE

RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. The Governing Body does hereby declare its intention to issue water system revenue bonds of the District in the maximum principal amount of Six Hundred Seventy-five Thousand Dollars (\$675,000) to raise money for the purpose of acquiring, constructing, improving, bettering and extending the System.

SECTION 2. Said bonds shall be in the amount, for the purpose and as aforesaid, will be authorized to be issued at a meeting of the Governing Body to be held at the Tishomingo County Courthouse in the City of Iuka, Mississippi, on March 25, 1993, at 10:00 o'clock a.m. If a petition signed by not less than twenty percent (20%) or one hundred fifty (150) qualified electors of the District filed objecting to and protesting the issuance of such revenue bonds on or before the aforesaid date, then an election on the question of the issuance of said bonds shall be called and held provided by law. If no such protest is filed, then such bonds may be issued without an election on the question of the issuance thereof, and may be sold under the regular procedure for selling such bonds.

SECTION 3. This resolution shall be published once a week for three (3) consecutive weeks in the Tishomingo County News, a newspaper published in the City of Iuka, Mississippi, no newspaper being published in the District, having a general circulation in the District, and being a qualified newspaper under the provisions of Section 13-3-31, Mississippi Code of 1972, the first publication of this resolution shall be made not less than twenty-one (21) days prior to the date fixed herein for issuance of said bonds, and the last such publication shall be made not more than fourteen (14) days prior to such date.

SECTION 4. The Secretary of the District shall be and is hereby directed to procure from the publisher of the aforesaid newspaper a customary proof of publication of this resolution and to have the same before the Governing Body on the date and hour specified in Section 1 hereof.

Commissioner Kirby McRae seconded the motion to adopt the foregoing resolution, and the foregoing being put in a roll call vote the result was as follows: Commissioner David Jourdan voted yes; Commissioner Beverly Jourdan voted yes; and Commissioner Kirby McRae voted yes.

Commissioners Robert Crane and Charles Wilson were not in attendance.

The motion having received the affirmative vote of a majority of the members present, the Chairman declared the motion carried, and the resolution adopted on the 24th day of February, 1993.

Tenn-Tom Today

The Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway is a 234-mile passageway that connects the Ohio River, the upper Mississippi, the Tennessee River systems, and 10 other navigable rivers to the Gulf of Mexico. The waterway flows through the states of Alabama and Mississippi and connects with the states of Tennessee and Kentucky.

Construction on the Tenn-Tom began in 1972 and was completed 13 years later at a cost of \$1.8 billion. During construction, the

Tenn-Tom faced opposition from interest groups concerned with the cost-effectiveness of its completion. Today, we reap the benefits provided by the construction of the waterway and the development of its surrounding natural resources.

Growth in business, industry, employment, and recreation has escalated since the waterway was opened in 1985. Marinas, sporting goods stores, convenience stores, and restaurants are among a few of the businesses that have been stimulated by the Tenn-Tom.

Because of the low cost of shipping goods by barge, new industries have chosen to locate along the Tenn-Tom corridor. Forest products, including wood chips, logs and lumber, make up a large percentage of the products being transported on the waterway. Other major items that are

shipped via barge include rock products, petroleum fuels, chemicals, coal, salt, and grain.

Recreation is thriving on the Tenn-Tom. Visitors flock to the 39 public use areas scattered along the banks of the Waterway. Hunting and fishing are among the favorite sports bringing unprecedented numbers into the area each year. This year's visitation reached 6.1 million and is expected to increase each year as recreational development is completed along the Tenn-Tom.

Economic impact from water-related opportunities such as fishing and fishing tournaments, holiday events, and special events has played a large part in the economic success of the Tenn-Tom region. Untold dollars are spent each year on fishing and hunting supplies, food, beach toys, boating equipment and gas. The latest government estimates on the economic value of each visitor to a day-use area is nearly four dollars per person per hour. This is four dollars in consumptive use directly spent in the area where the visit occurs.

The waterway region has far surpassed the predictions and expectations for economic development and recreational growth.

Many Veterans Are Unaware They Can Get Benefits

Although over \$32 Billion were paid out in veterans benefits last year, billions more went unclaimed in the past few years. Every year eligibility for benefits and the array of available benefits are changed and very few veterans or their survivors keep up with the latest rules. Because of this, and changes in their circumstances, many veterans, their families and survivors are now entitled to money and other benefits from the government even though they were not eligible in the past.

A study group of the Consumer Education Research Center, a 20-year-old national non-profit consumer group found that over one-fourth of the money paid in veterans benefits goes to persons who never served in the armed forces of the United States. Most of these were related by blood or marriage to veterans but many were not. Others were members of the armed forces of countries who fought with us against our enemies.

Each year the Center compiles a book describing the latest rules on available benefits and how to qualify for those benefits. The 240 large-page COMPLETE GUIDE TO FEDERAL AND STATE BENEFITS FOR VETERANS, THEIR FAMILIES, AND SURVIVORS with a foreword by Sen. Robert Dole is \$9.95 (plus \$3 p&h) from CONSUMER CENTER, 350 Scotland Road, Orange, NJ 07050 or by calling 1-800-872-0121 with credit card.

Mr. Robert L. Berko, executive director of the consumer group, says that many survivors of veterans are unaware

that they might be eligible to receive money, medical care, educational assistance, help in buying a home or other benefits. In fact, eligibility and benefits change constantly and some people ineligible in previous years are now able to start receiving money.

The study found that many people are unaware that they are considered dependents or survivors of veterans. These include those involved in illegal marriages, those who remarried after the death or disability of a veteran, children born out of wedlock to a veteran, parents of a veteran and even dependent grandchildren. Any of these may be eligible for benefits.

Mr. Berko says that the study questioned veterans about benefits and found that the majority were unfamiliar with most of the benefits now being granted under Federal and state laws. Even veterans now collecting were unaware of other benefits for which they were eligible and could be collecting.

For instance, disabled veterans can receive apparel allowances if they use wheel chairs, artificial limbs or any prosthetic device that can wear or damage clothing and, if they have a spouse in need of care, they can receive an allowance to pay someone to provide that care.

Few knew that the Bureau of Veterans Affairs is required to send veterans any requests for bids on supplies or labor that are mailed to any other suppliers.

Other benefits the consumer found that were little known are:

A veteran (or dependent) can receive up to \$837 (40% in advance) if he or she will assist the VA in a work-study program while in an educational program.

Federal agencies are required to establish affirmative action plans to facilitate employment and advancement of veterans with any degree of disability. In fact some job classifications must be filled by eligible vets.

Families of veterans buried or mentioned on commemorated on Tablets of the Missing overseas are eligible for free passports to visit these sites.

Disabled veterans can obtain extra compensation of hundreds

of dollars per month in addition to their 100% disability if they have certain specified disabilities.

In addition the book includes a complete list of VA facilities and help to secure the information needed with VA applications.

"Even though the Congress and the various state legislatures have provided for money and services to be given to veterans and their dependents," "Mr. Berko states, "unless the people know they are eligible and apply they will not collect anything."

As Sen. Bob Dole, a decorated veteran and one familiar with the bureaucracy, says in his foreword, "Mr. Berko's book goes a long way in helping America's veterans cut through the red tape so they can receive the benefits they earned and deserve."

An application for admission to Northeast must be on file in the school's admissions office prior to testing. To be eligible to take the residual ACT, one cannot be currently enrolled in high school (excluding 1993 graduates who plan to attend Northeast in the summer).

A picture identification, such as a valid driver's license, or a letter of identification is required. Students may not repeat residual testing until 60 days have passed since their previous testing.

Tests are scheduled for March

9, April 20 and 27, May 18 and May 25 in the Waller Hall Lecture Room on the Booneville Campus. Testing will begin at 8:00 a.m. A \$16 fee is required at the time of the test. Pre-registration is not required.

Don't Mess With Social Security

The most unfair idea to come out of the new administration so far is to place the burden of reducing the federal budget deficit on the backs of Social Security recipients.

The Clinton administration, in only week two, said it was considering three changes in Social Security as part of its deficit reduction plan: reducing cost-of-living adjustments, or COLAs; raising the retirement age from 65 to 67; and taxing Social Security benefits.

Social Security is not the problem. It did not cause the deficit. It is not adding to the deficit. There is a surplus in the Social Security trust fund. It must be left alone.

The new administration is starting off with a myriad of ideas for tax increases, but barely a murmur about cutting federal spending. The first priority should be to control spending.

It is particularly distressing that the new administration's very first suggestion for reducing the deficit was to tax Social Security. Throughout the presidential campaign numerous ideas were offered for reducing the deficit but taxing Social Security was never mentioned.

Whatever happened to the pledge to tighten government spending and provide tax cuts to groups such as the middle class? Raising taxes on hard working and retired Americans means belt tightening for taxpayers, not government.

Instead of taxing Social Security recipients, we should be passing legislation to help them -- things such as the Older Americans Right To Work Act, which I introduced in January. It would assist the elderly by removing the exorbitant taxes that working, older Americans who receive Social Security have to pay on extra income.

The new administration needs to refocus on the things causing the deficit and come up with a new plan. To get the deficit under control, we must focus on cutting every area except trust funds. We shouldn't touch Social Security because, again, it is not the problem.

Social Security is a trust between the government and the American people. It is a pledge that the money they entrust to the government will be there when they retire. If we allow Social Security to be used for any other purpose than what it was intended, then it will become yet another broken promise.

It would be an unnecessary catastrophe to older Americans to reduce COLAs and tax benefits. And, it would be a mistake that the American taxpayer would pay. I will fight to defeat any efforts to use Social Security for anything other than its intended purpose -- financial self-security. (2/15/93)

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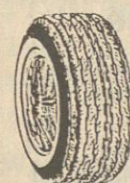

The U.S. Department of Agriculture, Rural Development Administration (RDA) has received an application for financial assistance from the City of Iuka. This proposed action includes the construction of a new 750 GPM water well and the construction of a 10" water transmission line within the city limits of Iuka.

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) will administer the project for RDA. FmHA has assessed the potential environmental impacts of this proposed action and determined that this project could have an indirect impact on the identified 100-year floodplain within the city's service area by allowing future development of these areas.

To mitigate any adverse impacts, the City of Iuka shall adopt legally enforceable tap-in restrictions which

shall prohibit service to any structure built, placed or erected in the identified 100-year floodplain after the approval of the loan for this project. This shall not apply to replacement structures, additions to existing structures or existing developed sites.

The identified 100-year floodplain will be those areas identified by the Federal Emergency Management Agency on the latest edition of the Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) for the service area.

WINTER WHEAT ACREAGE UP

Seedings for the 1993 winter wheat crop are estimated at 51.5 million acres, 1 percent more

than in 1992, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture's January crop production report.

USDA officials say seeding of the 1993 winter wheat crop began last fall in handful of States. From then on, seeding progressed by varying degrees throughout the fall, reaching 97 percent completion as of December 1, 1992.

The USDA report showed that Mississippi farmers seeded approximately 300,000 acres of winter wheat, a decline from the 1992 plantings.

To be eligible for price support loans and target price protection on this year's wheat crop, Phillip Horn, County Executive Director of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said farmers may want to consider the zero-percent acreage reduction program for wheat. "This means that there is no requirement to place eligible cropland into an Acreage Conservation Reserve," Horn said.

He said producers who participate in the wheat program will be eligible for target price protection at \$4.00 per bushel, price support loans at a national

average price of \$2.45 per bushel, and 50 percent of their estimated deficiency payments during sign-up.

The sign-up period for the 1993 wheat program is March 1 through April 30.

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County Agents Notes

PLAN BETTER FORAGES

This is a good time for cattle producers to get the most from their cool-season grazing crops such as ryegrass, small grains and fescue. Don't let these crops get off to a poor start. Since the main production time for forages is approaching, producers need to pay special attention.

If a good stand of forage has established, they should be attuned to grazing management, nitrogen fertilization and weed control.

1. Grazing management: make sure livestock don't overgraze forages. At least 2 to 3 inches of growth with some green leaves should remain below the grazing height. Overgrazing in cold weather can damage your grasses, thus stunting growth.

2. Nitrogen fertilization: February through early March is an appropriate time to apply nitrogen to cool-season forages. If a good stand of clover is grown with the grasses, nitrogen can be reduced. (This depends on how much nitrogen the clovers supply.)

3. Weed control: Late winter is also a good time for weed problems to arise. Weeds such as buttercup, dock and wild mustard can be easily controlled with specific herbicides. If not controlled, they often will reduce forage growth.

COUNTY SOYBEANS
The 1993 soybean variety trials information is available at the Extension Office. This annual bulletin contains yield information, maturity dates, plant description and disease and pest resistance.

In recent years, the introduction of soybean varieties has complicated the decision making process of many county farmers. Selecting the best variety requires careful study and knowledge of soil type, disease pressure and nematode presence.

Farmers should stay on top of varietal selection; it is one of the most important decisions you will make. You need to consider consistency of performance and incidence of stem canker. Proper selection is a low cost/no cost option farmers can use.
