Rate Increase For T.C.E.P.A. Consumers

Tishomingo County Electric Power Association has received notice from the Tennessee Valley Authority of changes in the wholesale rate schedules to become effective for June, 1993, billings. The changes are the result of reallocation of cost benefits from hydro generation from the residential consumers class to general consumers class based on updated customer statistics.

According to TCEPA Manager Robert Grisham, the impact of these changes will mean an increase of 2.5% in the average residential consumer's electric bill and a decrease of 1.6% for consumers in the general power class. TVA determined values for hydro generation during the 1986 rate review process and allocated the benefits to create a credit of

\$4 per month per residential consumer and a reduced Kwh charge for energy used by residential consumers. Since that time, the number of customers and Kwh consumed by this customer rate class has changed without adjustment to the rates. Due to these credits Tishomingo County Electric Power Association has been able to maintain residential rates that are significantly lower than the rates charged by almost all utilities in the southeastern United States.

"This change in wholesale power costs as implemented by TVA will result in the monthly residential customer charge increasing from \$6.29 to \$7.81. Kilowatt hour charges for residential consumers will remain at 5.421 cents per Kwh," Grisham said. Commercial and

industrial customers will receive a rate reduction in the demand and energy charges resulting in an average bill decrease of 1.6%.

While TVA has begun its fifth year without an increase in its wholesale power rates, many retail customers have experienced changes in their power costs due to TVA's changes in rate structure and the resulting effects on wholesale power distributors. TVA is presently involved in cost of service studies with preliminary indications of additional rate changes during late 1993 or in the first half of 1994.

Manager Grisham stated, "TCEPA will continue its efforts to provide electrical energy to all customer classes at the least possible cost while maintaining and improving the distribution system."

This weekend (April 23-25, 1993), the W.P. Rogers Camp #321 of the Mississippi Division of the Sons of Confederate Veterans will celebrate confederate Memorial Day in Iuka.

Activities on Friday night and Saturday will be held in the Mineral Springs Park (or in the old courthouse in the event of rain) on Business Highway 72.

The Memorial Day gravesite ceremony will be held on Sunday afternoon at 2:00 p.m. at the Shady Grove Cemetery on Indian Creek Road, following a parade up Indian Creek Road from Mineral Springs Park. The gravesite ceremony will feature the placing of a wreath on the burial trench of 263 confederate soldiers killed in the Bat-

tle of Iuka and Talks By Dr. Ben Kitchens (local battle of Iuka Historian) and Mr. James C. Wilson (Miss. State Commander of the Sons of Confederate Veterans).

A living history camp will be open for the public's viewing throughout the weekend. There will be no admission fees or charges for the public but donations will be graciously accepted by the W.P. Rogers Camp for its ongoing local projects.

Home Economics Tips

BLENDING FAMILIES
Remarriage is a common occurrence in this country. One in every four marriages involves someone who has been married before. About 60 percent of remarried couples bring children with them to their new marriages. These new families are referred to as reconstituted, step or blended families.

The quality of life is enhanced when a blending of members' expectations, beliefs and values occur; therefore, the term "blended families" is a positive one. Family members need to understand the rules in the new family

as well as the complex array of feelings that may be present.

Stepfamilies must work toward balancing respect for individual needs and creating new common family goals. It is usually destructive (at least degrading) for one adult to require that his or her former lifestyle be adopted as the "order of the day." This ignores the needs and belittles the feelings of others. A major task of stepfamilies is to develop a feeling of wholeness within the family.

Most blended families confront a staggering variety of feelings and situations. However, these should be met with the expectation that this new family is able to cope with problems and nurture each family member. In all areas of life, we find that per-

formance almost never outstrips expectations.

Parents may be confused by the new roles. Adults may feel caught between loyalties to children and a desire to please the new partner. Given flexibility and patience, a stepparent's role may change over time.

Establish a good relationship before taking responsibility for discipline. It takes families about three to four years before both parents are seen as authority figures by children.

The stepparent must be sensitive to his or her own needs as well as those of the child. Finding a stepparent role which works is a difficult chore, particularly since the stepchild is seldom able to provide sensitive, positive feedback.

Stepparents, like all parents, often feel unappreciated and used. It is important that the parent consistently try to support the stepparent in this new role. This may mean squelching the urge to take charge.

Families today tend to have less support from family and friends, less time to devote to nurturing children and fewer resources, to provide for their children. This situation creates a great deal of stress.

Here are 10 tips for reducing stress in your family:

1. Show affection! Let all family members know that you love them. Hug them often.

2. Build each person's self esteem. Listen to their needs and help them develop their own problem solving skills. Encourage interests and abilities. Respect each family member for their own special qualities.

3. Give each person a little undivided attention every day.

4. Have weekly or regular family meetings to discuss family activities, routines and problems. Work at problem solving rather than confrontation.

5. Talk about any changes or problems that are affecting the family, such as illness, moving, divorce, unemployment or a drug or alcohol problem. Explain how you feel about the situation, and find out how they feel too.

6. Use humor and empathy, not orders, anger or sarcasm when asking others to help you.

7. Examine situations which cause your family members stress, and try to change or avoid these situations. For instance, if your morning routine is stressful, start your preparations the night before.

8. Provide a feeling of security for your children by establishing some daily routines, such as a relaxing evening meal together or a bedtime story.

9. Exercise regularly or participate in sports. Find activities that can be done as a family.

10. Remember that what is a small problem to you may be a very big problem to someone else in the family.

NEMATODES IN THE HOME GARDEN

Nematodes are slender, worm-like animals that live in soil, water and plant tissues. Too small to see with the naked eye, they spread in infested soil on cultivation equipment, in soil moved by water and on roots of transplants. What parasitic nematodes lack in size, they make up for in numbers and ability to damage garden plants.

Nematodes damage plants by puncturing roots with a hollow, needle-shaped mouthpart. The contents of root cells can then be withdrawn and used as a food source by the nematode. When nematode populations reach high numbers, plants are not only deprived of food materials, but the wounds created on roots serve as entrance points for root-rotting fungi and bacteria.

Symptoms of infected plants include yellowing, loss of vigor, and general stunting and decline. During periods of dry weather, infected plants frequently wilt and may die because damaged roots cannot absorb an adequate supply of moisture.

Although several kinds of nematodes infect garden plants, the most common is the root-knot nematode, which causes galls on roots. Other damaging nematodes do not always produce characteristic symptoms on roots and are harder to detect.

The best way to detect root-knot nematodes in your garden soil is to collect a sample for analysis. Soil sample bags and information are available at the Tishomingo County Extension Office and there is no charge for a nematode sample at this time.

HERD HEALTH

crease considerably after calving. If you're using a meal/salt mix with a ratio of 2 to 1 to feed your cows, go to a 3 to 1 mix after calving.

Identify newborn calves as soon as possible and see that they nurse. Calves exposed to wind, rain and cold temperatures may need your help. Provide them with shelter and other assistance if necessary. The period following calving is a good time to vaccinate cows before they are bred again. Check with one of our county veterinarians about putting your cow herd on a vaccination program.

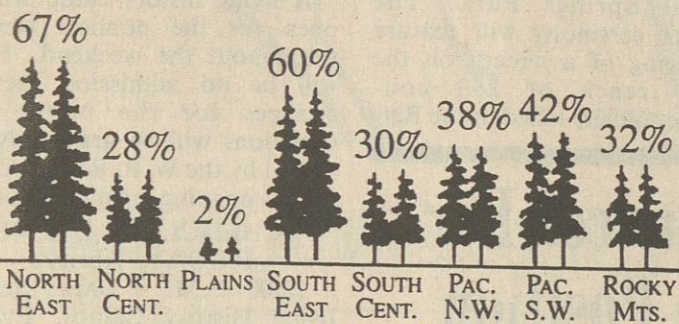

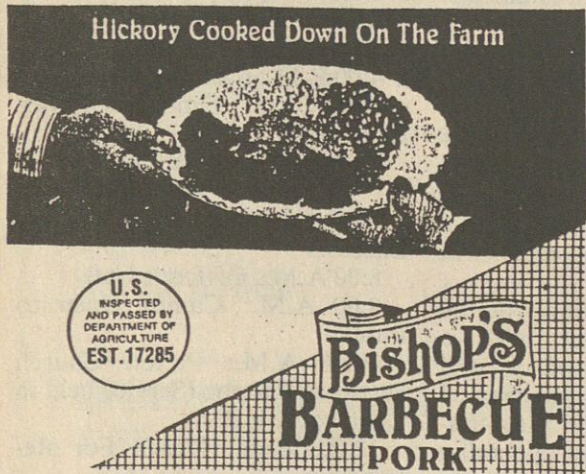
Forestland Growing Throughout America

Like dirt on a windowpane, any scratches on the lenses of your glasses will make a difference in how well you are able to see with them. Even with the best of care, it is not unusual for scratches to appear on your eyeglasses lenses over a period of time. However, good eyeglass care will help keep scratches to a minimum. When you clean them, wash them with mild soap and water and dry them gently with a soft cloth or tissue. Never dry them completely because you may be rubbing grit and dust into them. This can cause tiny scratches to form.

For this reason, when not wearing your glasses you should put them in their protective case. The same care should be given to the frames when cleaning or handling them. Frames that are cracked or out of shape can interfere with good vision, too.

Today, plastic lenses can be prescribed with a scratch resistant coating. This will put you one jump ahead of the game.

Habitat Housing Not Handout Program

Just another giveaway program for people we're already supporting with our tax dollars. Is that what you think about Habitat for Humanity? It isn't true.

Those who qualify for Habitat Housing are required to invest "sweat equity" hours into the construction of their home and the homes of other Habitat families. In addition to reducing the monetary cost of the house, this policy increases the personal involvement of family members in their home, and fosters the development of positive relationship with others.

Habitat families receive a no-interest loan which they are required to repay. In fact, ability to repay the loan is one of the factors, along with housing need and willingness to participate as a partner in Habitat's ministry, involved in family selection. Those families which are not interested in putting their finances, time and energy into their home will not be chosen to receive a Habitat home.

Maybe you believe Habitat is a worthwhile ministry, but that it's not needed in Tishomingo Coun-

ty. While most substandard housing is not visible as we travel the main roads, teachers, social workers, and police officers would verify that the need does exist. Just consider these statistics found in CACI's Sourcebook of County Demographics: in 1990, 26.9% of county residents earned less than \$10,000 and 12% earned between \$10,000 and \$15,000 (that's over one-third of county residents living in poverty). In 1980, 40.7% of the homes in Tishomingo County were built before 1960. While many new homes have been built since 1980, it is unlikely that they are owned by those living in poverty.

The bottom line is this: if only one family among the working poor is helped to have a decent home, it's worth our time and money to make it available to them, isn't it? If you think so, please call Rick Grisham at 423-9156 for more information and the date of the next meeting.

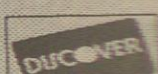

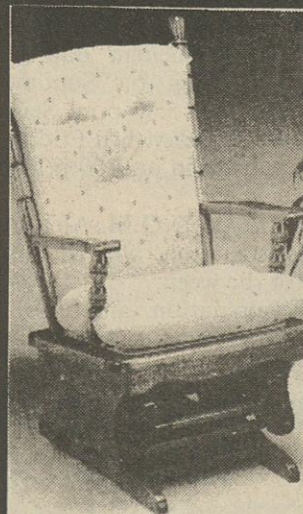

Harrelson Making Quick Adjustment

Last season at Tishomingo County High, Richy Harrelson batted .522 for the Braves. Nobody expected him to do that his freshman season at Ole Miss. This was to be a year of learning, a season of making the huge step up from Mississippi high school star to Southeastern Conference, Division I player. Harrelson isn't averaging that

this season, but he is for the last six games. Starting with last week's Ole Miss-Middle Tennessee State game, Harrelson is batting a remarkable .542, with 13 hits in his last 24 at bats.

For the season, he's batting .360, second best among Rebel regulars behind Kary Bridges, who's averaging .376. Harrelson is the team leader in triples with five, has had seven doubles, and has hit three home runs.

OLE MISS HEAD coach Don Kessinger knew Harrelson had some work to do before becoming a consistent player in the SEC. Based on his hitting stats and some other things he's done the last few games, the 6-foot-1, 210 pound right-hander's work has paid off nicely.

"Tonight, he got a three-run homer, beat out a key hit, played first base, and pitched two innings," Kessinger said following the Rebels' 8-7 win over Southern Mississippi Wednesday night. "I don't know what else you could ask for. He has worked really hard, and it's beginning to pay off."

Kessinger said, however, that Harrelson playing well this early in his career is really no surprise

to him and the Rebel coaching staff.

"I did anticipate that he had an awfully good chance to play this year," Kessinger said. "I thought he would play one of the corners, either first or third. But we knew he had some work to do in some areas, and whatever we have told him to do, he has worked on it."

HARRELSON, WHO had pitched in one earlier game this season at Florida, said he, too, is pleased to have come this far so early in his college career.

"I had a good fall season, and it was a learning experience for me," Harrelson said. "After fall practice, they told me that third base was probably mine if I'd work. But in January (when spring drills began), I wasn't playing like I knew I could at third base. Then a week before the season, I thought I might get a chance at first. I wasn't sure, though, until I saw my name up there before the first game."

And he's seen it up there before 29 of the Rebels' 31 games to date.

"I just didn't think I'd be doing this well this early," said Harrelson, who was the MVP in last year's Mississippi High

School All-Star game. "There are plenty of other guys who could have stepped in and done the job. I was just here at the right time."

Harrelson, who grew up a Mississippi State fan and admits his parents have made a fairly smooth transition from MSU graduates to Ole Miss boosters, said the highlight of his college career so far is obvious.

"THE MAYOR'S Trophy game," said Harrelson, who got the game winning RBI in the bottom of the ninth to score two runs in a 6-5 Reb win over then-No. 1 Mississippi State on March 31 in Jackson before more than 6,200 fans. "There were twice as many people at that game than live in my hometown (of Iuka). I still think about it every once in a while. It was a great moment, just awesome, and it gave me a lot of confidence."

A joint report of the U.S. Department of Labor and the
