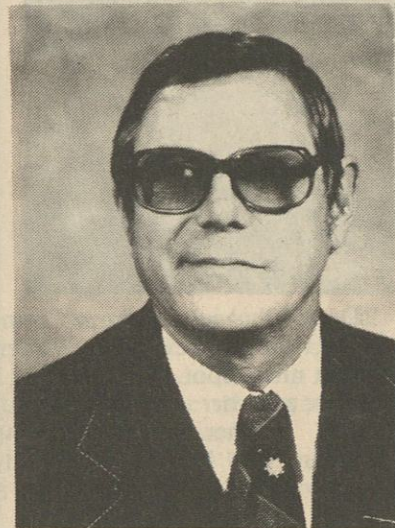
I do not make you a promise of doing this or that. I only promise that I will work to the best of my abilities for the people of Iuka. I will be available and devoted to this position if elected.

## First City Primary Tuesday For Burnsville and Iuka

Two municipalities in the county will have primary elections Tuesday, May 4, 1993.

The town of Burnsville will have a primary between its two Republican Mayoral candidates, Barbara T. McNeil and Kenneth Hutson.

The winner in this primary election will advance to the June 8th general election ballot to face-off against the town's Independent candidates for Mayor.

In the city of Iuka, a primary

for Democratic candidates vying for chief of police and for aldermen will be held. A second Democratic primary, if needed, will be held May 18.

Candidates who win in the primary elections will be placed on the general election ballot, June 8, along with Republican and Independent candidates.

Democratic Chief of Police candidates appearing on the Iuka ballot are James "Amos" Bates, John Lyles and Robert Leon Till.

Iuka's Democratic candidates for Aldermen are Marvin Lester Baker, James E. Bates, Herbert D. Booker, Jackie Bryant, Willie J. Carter, Ray Curtis, Leroy Dean, Curtis Long, Mildred L. Martin, Doris R. Mitchell, Cecil Phifer, Steve Rye, Scotty W. Skinner, Steve Ward and Bessie M. "Bess" Young.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. Tuesday, May 4, in both Burnsville and Iuka.

## For Municipal Elections, Absentee Voting, Registration Deadlines

Municipal voters who will be out-of-town on election day May 4 may qualify to vote absentee, said Secretary of State Dick Mopus.

Deadlines to do so are just days away - noon Saturday, May 1, in the municipal clerk's office or 5 p.m. May 3 if you are voting by mail.

Applying to vote absentee can be done two ways:

- In person in the clerk's office; or
- By mail, through the clerk's office.

If you go to the municipal clerk's office, you can apply and vote at the same time, said Constance Slaughter-Harvey, assistant secretary of state for elections.

If you apply by mail, call your clerk to ask for a ballot application, Mrs. Harvey said. After the application is approved, a

ballot will be sent to the voter, who must return it by 5 p.m. May 3 for it to be counted.

May 18 is the second primary runoff, with the general election June 8 pitting party primary winners and independents.

### REGISTERING FOR GENERAL ELECTION

Deadline to register to vote in the June 8 general election is also just ahead - Saturday, May 8, said Mopus.

Eligible municipal residents may register in the circuit clerk on municipal clerk's office. Deadlines for registration are:

- Friday, May 7 - in the circuit clerk's office
- Saturday, May 8 - by noon, in the municipal clerk's office

To be eligible to register to vote in the municipal election, a person must be a citizen of that municipality at least 30 days and 18 years of age on or before the

general election day.

Not all Mississippi's villages, towns, and cities will be holding elections, though. In the case of special-charter cities, municipal elections are scheduled for other years, with several being in 1994, Mrs. Harvey said.

These local elections are not affected by a law passed by the 1993 Legislature to change some voting regulations because the measure must receive U.S. Justice Department approval, she noted.

### WHO CAN VOTE ABSENTEE?

Who is eligible to vote absentee?

### BUSINESS AND EDUCATION:

- Persons engaged in interstate transportation
- Students, teachers, and administrators and their spouses and dependents
- Offshore or marine workers
- Anyone whose job will take them more than 50 miles away from their home county on election day; their spouses and dependents

### MILITARY AND OVERSEAS:

- Members of the Armed Forces, Merchant Marine, or Red Cross; their spouses and dependents; civilians, their spouses and dependents attached to these services outside the U.S.

### HEALTH OR AGE:

- Persons 65 or older
- Persons temporarily or permanently physically disabled; their parents, spouses and dependents who must be with them in the hospital or 50 miles away from their homes on election day

Mississippi's U.S. representatives and senators, as well as their spouses and dependents, also are eligible to vote absentee.

### Notice To Political Candidates

Candidates for Political Office are reminded that the City of Iuka has an ordinance prohibiting political advertising on city property and rights of way. This ordinance was adopted in the interest of beautification and litter control. Political advertising on private property is unaffected by this ordinance.

## A Paden Landmark

History of the house as told to me. It was built in 1907 by Mr. Charlie Robinson for Mr. Kenny Whitfield. The first occupants were George and Lula Mosely. They had 3 children, Willard, Adele and Reed Mosely.

In 1910 the house was sold to Jim and Bessie Walker. They lived there until 1916 when it was sold to Mr. and Mrs. Will Davenport and became the "Davenport Hotel" run by Mrs. Essie Davenport. It changed owners again around 1921 when Mr. and Mrs. Jim Shackelford bought it and continued to run a Hotel.

The next occupants were Mr. and Mrs. Cap Whitaker. Mr. Whitaker was the section foreman for the I.C. Railroad. At that time passenger trains stopped everyday. One was the "Seminole" and one was the

"Dude" that jut ran from Corinth to Haleyville everyday. Paden had a nice depot, post office, 11 stores, a barber shop, blacksmith shop, lumber yard, planeing Mill and Saw Mill, a thriving little town and could well support a Hotel.

The house was passed on to Mr. Whitaker's daughter and son in-law. Mrs. Myrtle and Mr. Ramsey Hart. Mrs. Myrtle Hart was Post Master for several years.

Mr. James Glasgow purchased the house from Mr. Hart and lived there from 1960 until 1990. James and Maxine Glasgow have one son, Brendix Glasgow, that grew up in this house.

In 1992, Mrs. Bobette Turnipseed of Tampa, Florida bought the house from Mr. Glasgow. It is now being renovated. Bobette is the former Bobette Nixon, daughter of Bob and Lila Nixon. She plans to make this her home when she and her husband retire.

A FAMILY FIRE ESCAPE PLAN

Prevention of home fires is your responsibility since no house can be made completely fireproof. It's best to try to keep fires from starting in your home, but being prepared or knowing what to do in case fire breaks out can mean the difference between life and death.

The time to prepare for fire survival is before a fire, not after one. It is one thing to know about fire survival practices; it is another to perform them under the stress of an actual fire.

Prepare yourself and your family for the possibility of a fire by understanding and practicing some of the basic steps in planning a fire escape plan.

### A GOOD FIT

You wouldn't wear a pair of shoes that didn't fit properly, because you know what kinds of problems that can create. For the same reason you should not be satisfied with glasses that do not fit properly. If your present glasses seem loose around the ears or keep sliding down your nose, you know they don't fit your face properly. Perhaps they can be adjusted, or you may want new frames that will give you a comfortable fit.

The purpose of wearing glasses is to help you see as efficiently as possible no matter what activity you may be involved in, at home or at work. Improving your vision with glasses also means having glasses that fit close to your eyes. Over a period of time with frequent use it is not unusual for glasses to become loose. However, when looseness does occur that's the signal that you should have the fit checked and corrected.

Don't put up with the annoyance of loose-fitting glasses any longer. Make an appointment to have the fit corrected and the frames replaced.

room, stay near a slightly opened window. Place towels or cloths in the space under the door.

To reach the other side of a smoke-filled room, crawl with your head about 18 inches above the floor.

Decide on a meeting place outside the house where everyone will assemble as soon as they are outside. Then call the fire department as soon as everyone is out of the house.

Once you have made your family escape plan, be sure to hold practice drills, so that every member of the family knows what to do and can do it automatically in a real situation.

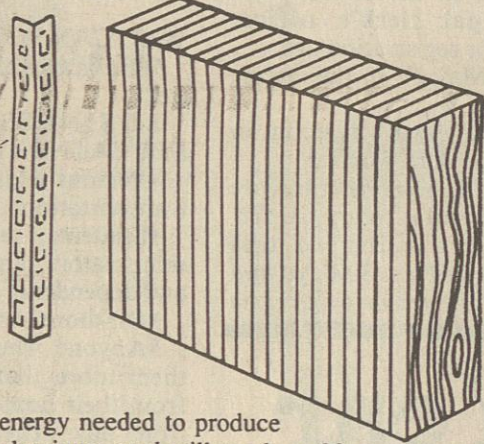

First, make sure everyone sleeps with their bedroom door closed at night. A closed door can delay the spread of fire and keep out deadly gases and smoke for a few extra minutes to escape.

Make an escape route from each room in your home, paying special attention to the bedroom since nighttime fires are usually the most serious. Have an alternate route available, such as a window, from each room because you cannot always count on using a hallway or a stairway.

Very young children, invalids and elderly people should receive careful consideration when mapping out family escape plans. These groups will need special assistance in escaping from home fires. Appoint appropriate family members to aid those needing help.

Agree on a way in which any member of the family can sound an alarm. Fire may block hallways and prevent you from reaching other bedrooms. Pound on a wall, yell, use a whistle or any other method that will awaken family members. Install smoke alarms in the hallway in the bedroom area to sound the alarm.

Instruct family members not to waste time getting dressed or collecting prized possessions. Speed is essential.

Make sure every family member knows how to test a door. If the panels or knob are warm, keep the door closed and use an alternate escape route. If the door is not hot, then brace your foot and hip against the door and open cautiously to prevent superheated air from blowing it open. If no hot air or smoke greets you, it is probably safe to pass through.

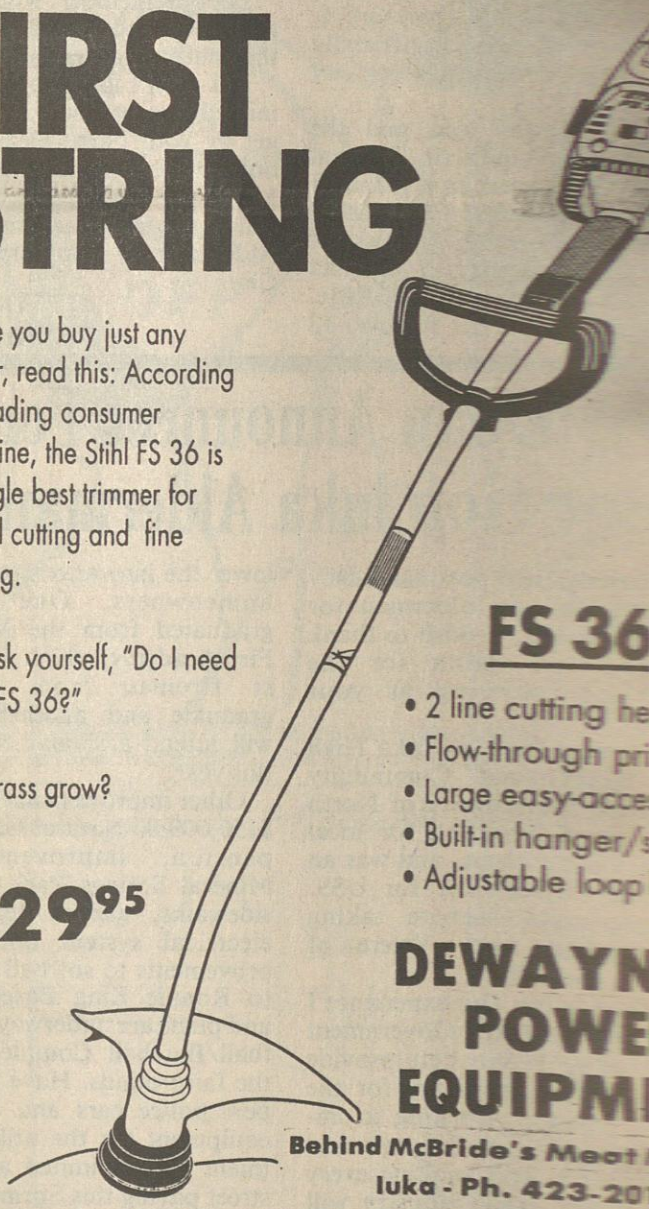

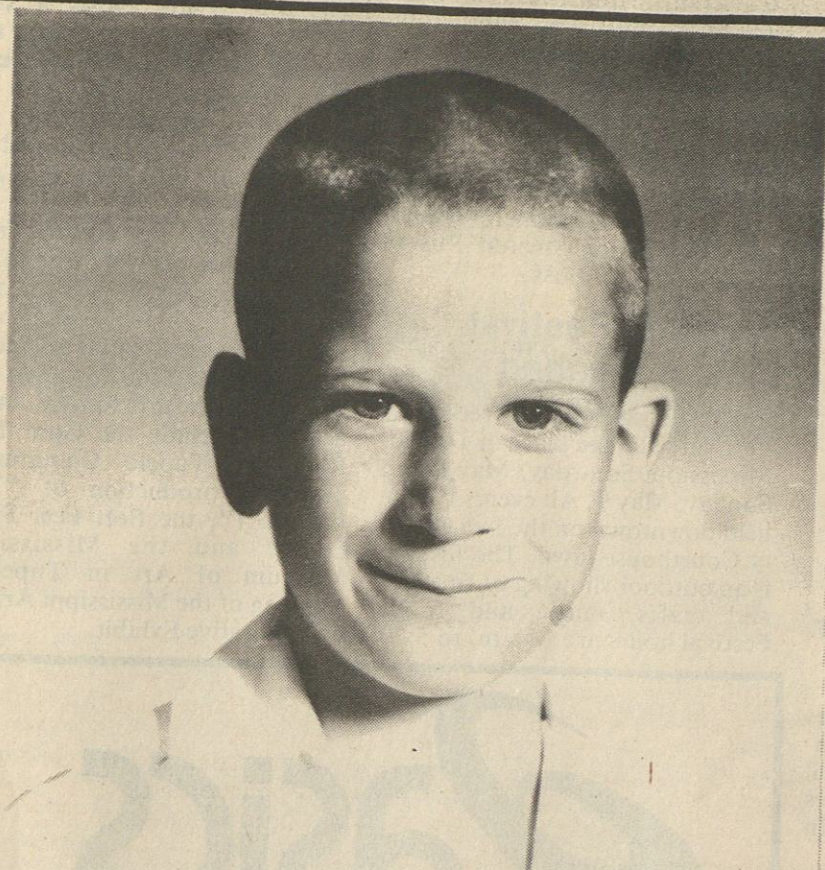

## County Agents Notes

### SWEET POTATOES

What is the best sweet potato variety for Mississippi production? Beauregard is the highest yielding but it has a different taste and texture than previous varieties and this causes many people to dislike it. Beauregard and Jewell have higher disease resistance than Centennial. Older varieties such as Puerto Rico and Nancy Hall have no disease resistance, but are still grown due to perceived higher eating qualities.

When should sweetpotato roots be bedded for plant production? Wait until after the last frost if no cold protection will be provided. The next few weeks should be okay.

### CUTTING THE BIG TREES

Suppose you had a herd of dairy cows. Each year you sold the cows that produced the most milk and kept the ones that produced the least. How long would you be in the dairy business? Not Long! When you harvest timber by cutting everything larger than a specified

diameter, you are doing the same thing to your timber that was done to the dairy herd. This technique is called "diameter-limit cutting" and is, unfortunately, one of the most common ways timber is harvested and sold in Mississippi. You end up with, what is called a "high-graded" stand. This is a stand of mostly undesirable trees.

Don't believe that the best way to harvest timber is to cut the big trees and let the little ones grow. Larger trees are not necessarily older than the small trees. The larger ones simply grew faster.

The rate at which a tree grows depends on species, soil fertility, competition and the environment. It's a mistake to cut only the bigger trees because you may be leaving the poorer ones.

What do you do when this happens? The Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service has as excellent publication entitled Evaluating High-Graded Hardwood Stands. This will give some background information. The next thing to do is to contact our County Forester at 423-9070 or myself at 423-7016.

Our meetings are always educational and we enjoy the fellowship of getting together each month. We invite anyone who might be interested to join us. We meet the second Tuesday of each month.

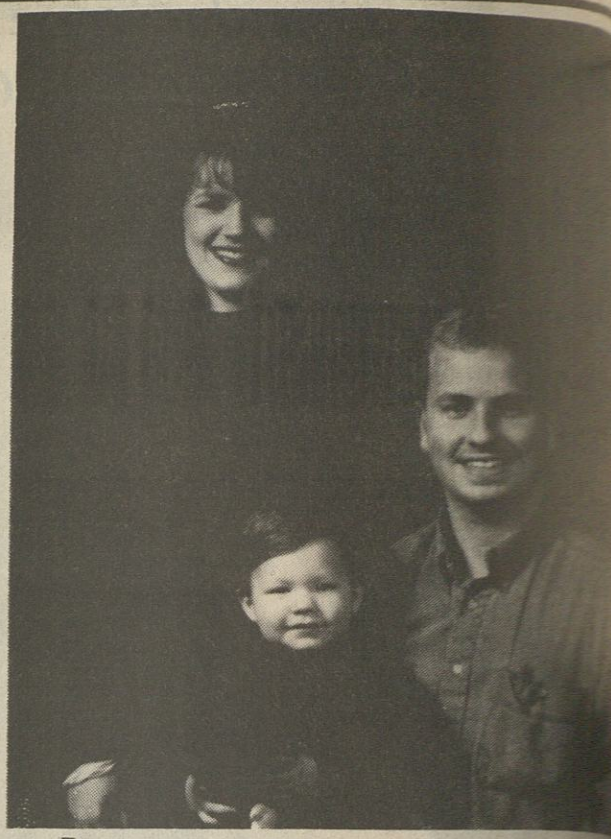

According to the Bylaws of the TCDF: There shall be nineteen (10) members of the Board of Directors, eleven of which shall be elected. The elected directors shall consist of two (2) from each Supervisors District and one At-Large member. The elected members will be chosen by a Nominations Committee appointed by the Chairman of the Board, and then voted on by the existing Board Members. There shall be seven ex-officio members including the Mayor, or his designee, from each municipality, and the President of the Board of Supervisors. Also, the Chairman of the Tishomingo County Economic Development Authority serves as a member of the Board of the TCDF.

There has been some confusion concerning the TCDF and TCEDA in the past, since the names of the organizations are so similar.

The TCEDA (Tishomingo County Economic Development Authority) is a public body created by a local-private bill, and these Directors are all appointed by the Supervisor in each of the five Supervisor Districts.

Your Current Officers & Directors of the TCDF are: Alvina Blakney, Chairman - 2nd District; Harold Lomenick, Vice-Chairman - 3rd District; David Bonds, Sec.-Treas - 1st District; Robert Allen, Past Chairman - 5th District; Charles Emmons - 1st District; Charlotte Orick - 2nd District; Berlon Durham - 3rd District; John Savoy - 4th District; David Rushing - 4th District; Terrell Pearson - 5th District; Larry Bonds - At Large; Ted Day - Chairman of the TCEDA; Bob Yarber - Mayor of Belmont; Bobby Johnson - Mayor of Burnsville; David Ginn - Mayor of Golden; David Nichols - Mayor of Iuka; Hughie Bates - Mayor of Paden; Quthel McNatt - Mayor of Tishomingo; Ricky Cummings - President of the Board of Supervisors.

The Board of Directors of the TCEDA are: Ted Day, Chairman - 4th District; Charles Emmons, Vice-Chairman - 1st District;

Martha Segars, Secretary/Treasurer - 3rd District; Gene Jourdan, Past-Chairman - 3rd District; David Graham - 5th District; Charlotte Orick - 2nd District; Robert Allen - 4th District; Harold Sparks - 5th District; Jim Ramsey - 1st District and Alvina Blakney - 2nd District.

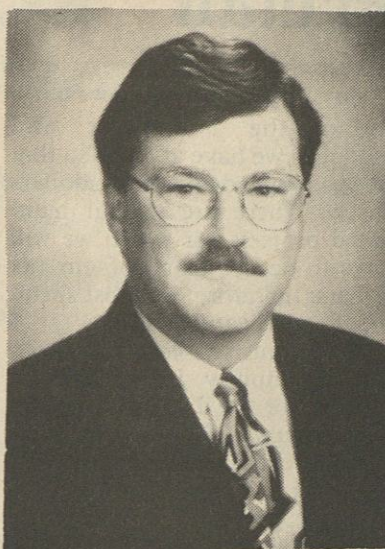

### Molpus Aide To Help Hungarians With Public Lands

Leaders in the newly democratic Eastern European country of Hungary will have a chance this summer to learn from the Mississippi Secretary of State's Office's success with public lands management.

Jim Nelson of Madison, assistant secretary of state for public lands, will spend three months in Budapest advising Hungarian officials on land reform, a major issue there since democratic government has been re-established.

"Many of Hungary's former private land owners want their property returned after it was seized by the communist government during the 1940s," Nelson noted. "The land reform issue is a complicated one that will play a major role in Hungary's national elections in 1994."

Nelson, 37, was selected from a nationwide search to participate in the Eisenhower Exchange Fellowships program, which seeks to promote international understanding through the exchange of information, ideas, and perspectives among leaders throughout the world. Since 1989, EEF has sent Americans abroad to help emerging European democracies forge a better understanding of the democratic process.

#### TO TEACH 'GOOD GOVERNMENT'

In addition to advising about public lands management, Nelson will be working with officials on ideas and methods for effective, efficient government.

"Since 1984, the Secretary of State's Office has made extensive changes and improvements in the way services are provided," Nelson said. "I will share that experience and other ideas with Hungarian government officials, who are new to providing democratic services."

The Mississippi Secretary of State's Office has been recognized nationally for its efficiency and effectiveness. Since the Legislature granted the agency authority to operate without tax support, the Secretary of State's Office has made a profit and returned more than \$6 million to the state treasury.

"Jim Nelson's selection by the Eisenhower program is a honor he very much deserves," said Secretary of State Dick Molpus. "Also, I am pleased that he will be able to share some valuable Mississippi experiences with public and private leaders throughout Hungary."

Nelson, an assistant secretary of state since 1984, is a summa cum laude graduate of the University of Mississippi where he received his law degree. He is a M.B.A. candidate at Millsaps College and a nationally-recognized author and lecturer on public lands management issues.

A native of Iuka, he will be on leave from his state job while in Hungary.

Nelson is the son of Col. (Ret.)

and Mrs. O.C. Nelson of Iuka. He has worked in private and public legal practice, and is a member of the state and Hinds County bar associations. A member of Christ United Methodist Church, he has been president and treasurer of the board for Operation Shoestring Inc., a Jackson-based charitable group dedicated to breaking the cycle of poverty and illiteracy in Jackson's urban center.

## Vaccinate Before It's Too Late

Special incentives to get all preschool children fully protected against contagious childhood diseases will be offered to parents in Northeast Public Health District II during National Preschool Immunization Week, April 26-30.

The health department clinics in every county will offer "fast lane" service for immunizations Friday, April 30 at 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. "Fast lane" means babies and children can walk in and get their shots with minimal waiting.

These special immunization services are available to all preschoolers, whether they are beginning their series of shots or are coming for boosters.

The Mississippi State Department of Health, prime mover in the statewide observance, has a message for parents: "Vaccinate before it's too late." MSDH doctors recommend that babies get their first immunizations at the age of two months, "before it's too late."

Most babies have immunity from childhood illness for up to three months after birth. If they start getting their immunization protection at two months, they won't ever have to be sick.

Boosters must follow at four months, six months, and 15 months to assure continued protection for babies. Children get the final booster before they start school, between four and six years of age.

"Some parents start the shots and then forget to follow up," according to Mary Currier, M.D., state epidemiology consultant. "The first shot provides good temporary protection. Boosters are vital to keep babies safe permanently."

If parents forgot and the baby didn't get a booster when the shot was due, bring that baby in now, Currier said. Clinic nurses will set up a new booster schedule.

The special week reminds parents who might have forgotten about boosters, as well as those whose children are not protected at all. Clinic schedules during the special week make it quick and easy to protect children.

The theme, "Before it's too late," carries many meanings:

- Before the child gets sick with any one of the eight contagious diseases that immunization can absolutely prevent.

- Before the age of two.

- Before the summer rush - Mississippi law requires children to carry proof that they have had the final booster before they start school. Waiting until summer means longer waits in the clinic.

The special week reminds parents that they can prevent the heartache of childhood illness, not to mention the expense of doctor and hospital bills nobody can afford.

Children who are vaccinated won't get measles, mumps,

rebellia, diphtheria, whooping cough, polio, tetanus (lock jaw), or Hib disease (bacterial meningitis).

The side effects of those childhood illness can be agonizing and expensive, Currier said. Lifelong after-effects can run health care costs into six figures.

Vaccination provides protection that is just as effective as the immunity that comes from having the disease, Currier said. Vaccination causes the body to produce the same disease-fighting antibodies. These antibodies stay in the system and kill the disease-causing germs whenever the child is exposed.

"Vaccines are among our safest and most effective medicines," Currier said. "Side effects usually are no more than a slight fever, a sore arm, a mild rash for a day or two."

Starting the shots early, at two months while the baby still has natural immunity, also helps prevent reaction from the shots, Currier said.

Health department clinics in every county will give any baby or child immunization protection. Fees are on a sliding scale according to family income; those who cannot afford to pay can get the shots free.

All clinics offer vaccination services routinely, but the extra hours and fast service during National Preschool Immunization Week make getting the service quick and easy.

For more information, parents should call the local health department clinic.

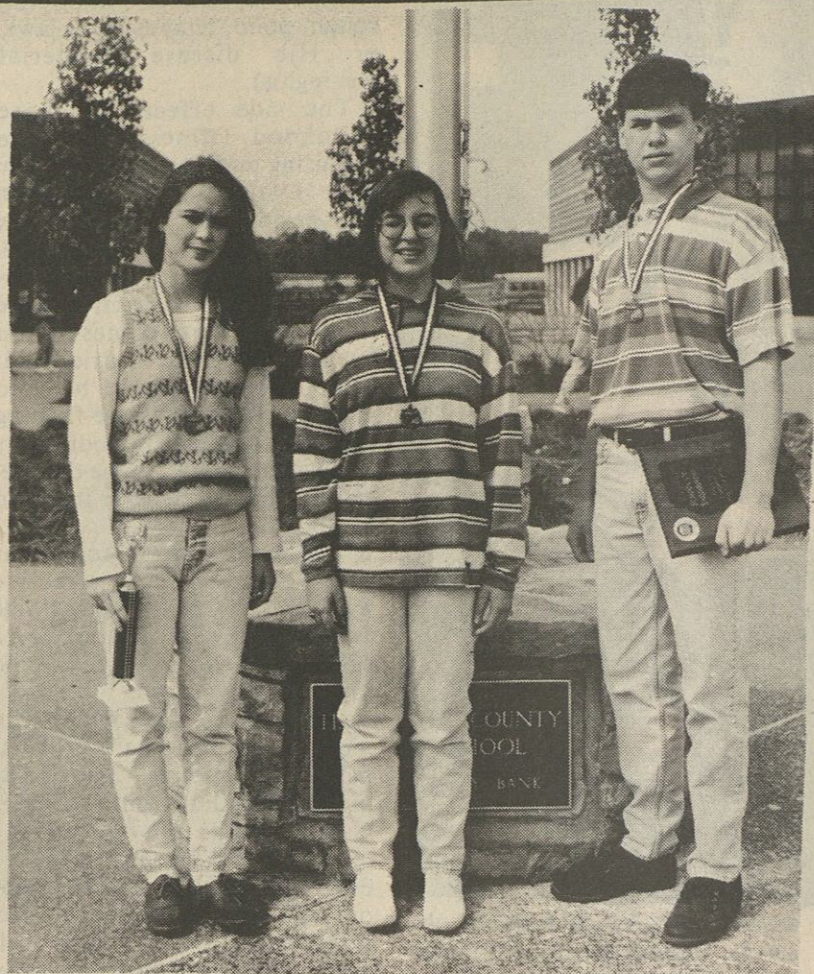
### TCMHS Students Dominate Regional Science Fair
