# First City Primary Tuesday For Burnsville and Iuka

Two municipalities in the county will have primary elections Tuesday, May 4, 1993.

The town of Burnsville will have a primary between its two Republican Mayoral candidates, Barbara T. McNeil and Kenneth

The winner in this primary election will advance to the June 8th general election ballot to face-off against the town's Independent candidates for Mayor.

## For Municipal Elections, Absentee Voting, Registration Deadlines

out-of-town on election day May 4 may qualify to vote absentee, said Secretary of State Dick

Deadlines to do so are just days away - noon Saturday, May 1, in the municipal clerk's office or 5 p.m. May 3 if you are voting by

Applying to vote absentee can be done two ways: •In person in the clerk's office;

•By mail, through the clerk's

If you go to the municipal clerk's office, you can apply and vote at the same time, said Constance Slaughter-Harvey, assistant secretary of state for

If you apply by mail, call your clerk to ask for a ballot application, Mrs. Harvey said. After the application is approved, a

Municipal voters who will be ballot will be sent to the voter, who must return it by 5 p.m. May 3 for it to be counted.

> May 18 is the second primary runoff, with the general election June 8 pitting party primary winners and independents.

REGISTERING FOR **GENERAL ELECTION** 

Deadline to register to vote in the June 8 general election is also just ahead - Saturday, May 8, said Molpus.

Eligible municipal residents may register in the circuit clerk on municipal clerk's office.

Deadlines for registration are:
•Friday, May 7 - in the circuit clerk's office

•Saturday, May 8 - by noon, in the municipal clerk's office

To be eligible to register to vote in the municipal election, a person must be a citizen of that municipality at least 30 days and 18 years of age on or before the

general election day.

Not all Mississippi's villages, towns, and cities will be holding elections, though. In the case of special-charter cities, municipal elections are scheduled for other years, with several being in 1994, Mrs. Harvey said.

These local elections are not affected by a law passed by the 1993 Legislature to change some voting regulations because the measure must receive U.S. Justice Department approval, she

Mississippi's U.S. representatives and senators, as well as their spouses and dependents, also are eligible to vote absentee.

First, make sure everyone sleeps with their bedroom door closed at night. A closed door can delay the spread of fire and keep out deadly gases and smoke for a few extra minutes to escape.

Make an escape route from each room in your home, paying special attention to the bedroom since nighttime fires are usually the most serious. Have an alternate route available, such as a window, from each room because you cannot always count on using a hallway or a stairway.

Very young children, invalids and elderly people should receive careful consideration when mapping out family escape plans. These groups will need assistance in escaping from home fires. Appoint appropriate family members to aid those needing

Agree on a way in which any member of the family can sound an alarm. Fire may block hallways and prevent you from reaching other bedrooms. Pound on a wall, yell, use a whistle or any other method that will awaken family members. Install smoke alarms in the hallway in the bedroom area to sound the alarm.

Instruct family members not to waste time getting dressed or collecting prized possessions. Speed is essential.

Make sure every family member knows how to test a door. If the panels or knob are warm, keep the door closed and use an alternate escape route. If the door is not hot, then brace your foot and hip against the door and open cautiously to prevent superheated air from blowing it open. If no hot air or smoke greets you, it is probably safe to pass

If you are forced to remain in a

room, stay near a slightly opened window. Place towels or cloths in the space under the door.

To reach the other side of a smoke-filled room, crawl with your head about 18 inches above the floor.

Decide on a meeting place outside the house where everyone will assemble as soon as they are outside. Then call the fire department as soon as everyone is out of the house.

Once you have made your family escape plan, be sure to hold practice drills, so that every member of the family knows what to do and can do it automatically in a real situation.

You wouldn't wear a pair of shoes that didn't fit properly, because you know what kinds of problems that can create. 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
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
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

## County Agents Notes

By: Danny Owen County Agent **SWEET POTATOES** 

What is the best sweet potato variety for Mississippi production? Beauregard is the highest yielding but it has a different taste and texture than previous varieties and this causes many people to dislike it. Beauregard and Jewell have higher disease resistance than Centennial. Older varieties such as Puerto Rico and Nancy Hall have no disease resistance, but are still grown due to perceived higher eating qualities.

When should sweetpotato roots be bedded for plant production? Wait until after the last frost if no cold protection will be provided. The next few weeks should be okay.

**CUTTING THE BIG TREES** Suppose you had a herd of dairy cows. Each year you sold the cows that produced the most milk and kept the ones that produced the least. How long would you be in the dairy business? Not Long! When you harvest timber by cutting everything larger than a specified

diameter, you are doing the same thing to your timber that was done to the dairy herd. This technique is called "diameter-limit cutting" and is, unfor-tunately, one of the most common ways timber is harvested and sold in Mississippi. You end up with, what is called a "highgraded' stand. This is a stand of mostly undesirable trees.

Don't believe that the best way to harvest timber is to cut the big trees and let the little ones grow. Larger trees are not necessarily older than the small trees. The larger ones simply grew faster.

The rate at which a tree grows depends on species, soil fertility, competition and the environment. It's a mistake to cut only the bigger trees because you may be leaving the poorer ones.

What do you do when this happens? The Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service has as excellent publication entitled Evaluating High-Graded Hardwood Stands". 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
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
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## **Attention Voters:** Steve Rye Responds



I think you should go to city mall and check out the facts and figures on the issues that your Board of Aldermen voted on. Some of the incumbents need to e-write their articles or at least get a little closer to the truth.

Mr. Phifer thinks that he and the board have done a wonderful ob for the city. Other than building a water treatment plant, which I understand was ordered built by the State Health Deparment and will likely take 25 years to pay for and getting two backhoes for the water deparment; why did they wait until six months before election until they decide to do all of the things that Mr. Phifer and Mr. Bryant men-

Mr. Bryant and Mr. Phifer both stated that they supported the Indian Creek Project around Mineral Springs Park. The flooding problem has been there for years and existed when they took office. Why didn't the board take care of it then? Where was this project two years ago when I and approximately 19 other families lost nearly everything we had due to a flood. They just began the digging stage on this project a little more than three weeks ago.

Mr. Bryant and Mr. Phifer also stated that the city had purchased land for a new industrial park. The fact is, that the city was supposed to put up \$200,000 of their (our) money and didn't have it. The county supervisors put up this money for them. The county also leased the city the land to build the new ballfields on.

As for the new fire truck that oz. the board voted on; where is it? Word has it that the truck is still sitting in another city because it's too big to fit into the building at city hall. The Board of Aldermen were advised by the State ratings bureau to get a truck with at least 3 oz a 1,000 gallon water capacity. They chose instead to get one with a 750 gallon capacity. This will not improve the city's

> Our aldermen also did not purchase the new police cars as was stated. These cars were leased to the Iuka Police Department for two years at a cost of over \$400 a

A new well has been dug and lines are to be laid down along Snowdown and Eastport roads. These are going to be funded by general obligation bonds. The city of luka has to stand good for this money. The board has put us millions of dollars in debt for no good reason. They are not obligated to provide water for these areas. Lake property is extremely high priced and no one is buying it. Therefore, how does the city get a return on its invest-

It has also come to my attention that certain jobs being done for the city, such as minor construction, are being held costwise to under \$2,500. This way no bids have to be let and a lot of people are being left out in the cold, so to speak.

It seems to me that with all the money that the Board has spent or borrowed, that they should be taking care of their own (city employees). A seven percent raise across the board in twelve years hardly seems fair. The cost of living has equalled that in the last two years. These people need an incentive to work just like anyone else. Think about them the next time that you have a six inch water main to break at midnight or you have to call a fire dispatcher or a police officer. They have families and bills to pay just like the rest of us.

The time has come for a change in our city government. I'm not speaking as a Democrat, Republican or an Independent. It's time to forget party affiliations. The only platform in city government should be the same for the Mayor and all five Aldermen. And that people, should be for all of us to band together and work for whats best for the city and people of Iuka.

#### Molpus Aide To Help **Hungarians With** Public Lands

Leaders in the newly democratic Eastern European country of Hungary will have a chance this summer to learn from the Mississippi Secretary of State's Office's success with public lands management.

Jim Nelson of Madison, assistant secretary of state for public lands, will spend three months in Budapest advising Hungarian officials on land reform, a major issue there since democratic government has been re-established.

"Many of Hungary's former private land owners want their property returned after it was seized by the communist government during the 1940s," Nelson noted. "The land reform issue is a complicated one that will play a major role in Hungary's national elections in 1994.'

Nelson, 37, was selected from a nationwide search to participate in the Eisenhower Exchange Fellowships program, which seeks to promote international understanding through the exchange of information, ideas, and perspectives among leaders throughout the world. Since 1989, EEF has sent Americans abroad to help emerging European democracies forge a better understanding of the democratic process.

#### TO TEACH 'GOOD **GOVERNMENT'**

In addition to advising about public lands management, Nelson will be working with officials on ideas and methods for effective, efficient government.

"Since 1984, the Secretary of State's Office has made extensive changes and improvements in the way services are provided," Nelson said. "I will share that experience and other ideas with Hungarian government officials, who are new to providing democratic services.' The Mississippi Secretary of

State's Office has been recognized nationally for its efficiency and effectiveness. Since the Legislature granted the agency authority to operate without tax support, the Secretary of State's Office has made a profit and returned more than \$6 million to the state treasury.

'Jim Nelson's selection by the Eisenhower program is a honor he very much deserves," said Secretary of State Dick Molpus. "Also, I am pleased that he will be able to share some valuable Mississippi experiences with public and private leaders throughout Hungary."

Nelson, an assistant secretary of state since 1984, is a summa cum laude graduate of the University of Mississippi where he received his law degree. He is a M.B.A. candidate at Millsaps College and a nationallyrecognized author and lecturer on public lands management issues.

A native of Iuka, he will be on leave from his state job while in

## Vaccinate Before It's Too Late

Special incentives to get all preschool children fully protected against contagious childhood diseases will be offered to parents in Northeast Public Health District II during National Preschool Immunization Week,

The health department clinics in every county will offer "fast lane" service for immunizations Friday, April 30 at 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. "Fast lane" means babies and children can walk in and get their shots with minimal

These special immunization services are available to all preschoolers, whether they are beginning their series of shots or are coming for boosters.

The Mississippi State Department of Health, prime mover in the statewide observance, has a message for parents: "Vaccinate before it's too late." MSDH doctors recommend that babies get their first immunizations at the age of two months, "before it's too late."

Most babies have immunity from childhood illness for up to three months after birth. If they start getting their immunization protection at two months, they won't ever have to be sick.

Boosters must follow at four Grammonths, six months, and 15 months to assure continued protection for babies. Children get the final booster before they start school, between four and six years of age.

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"Some parents start the shots and then forget to follow up,' according to Mary Currier, M.D., state epidemiology consultant. "The first shot provides good temporary protection. Boosters are vital to keep babies safe permanently."

If parents forgot and the baby didn't get a booster when the shot was due, bring that baby in now, Currier said. Clinic nurses will set up a new booster schedule.

The special week reminds parents who might have forgotten about boosters, as well as those whose children are not protected at all. Clinic schedules during the special week make it quick and easy to protect children.

The theme, "Before it's too late," carries many meanings:

■Before the child gets sick with any one of the eight contagious diseases that immunization can absolutely prevent.

■ Before the age of two. Before the summer rush -Mississippi law requires children to carry proof that they have had the final booster before they start school. Waiting until summer

means longer waits in the clinic. The special week reminds parents that they can prevent the heartache of childhood illness, not to mention the expense of doctor and hospital bills nobody can afford.

Children who are vaccinated won't get measles, mumps,

rebella, diphtheria, whooping cough, polio, tetanus (lock jaw), or Hib disease (bacterial meningitis).

The side effects of those childhood illness can be agonizing and expensive, Currier said. Lifelong after-effects can run health care costs into six figures.

Vaccination provides protection that is just as effective as the immunity that comes from having the disease, Currier said. Vaccination causes the body to produce the same disease-fighting antibodies. These antibodies stay in the system and kill the diseasecausing germs whenever the child

is exposed.
"Vaccines are among our safest and most effective medicines," Currier said. "Side effects usually are no more than a slight fever, a sore arm, a mild rash for a day or two.'

Starting the shots early, at two months while the baby still has natural immunity, also helps prevent reaction from the shots, Currier said.

Health department clinics in every county will give any baby or child immunization protection. Fees are on a sliding scale according to family income; those who cannot affort to pay can get the shots free.
