Quthel McNatt Seeks Re-election As Town of Tishomingo Mayor

I would like to ask the voters of the Town of Tishomingo for their support as a candidate for the office of Mayor in the June 8 election.

Tishomingo is my home and for the past four years I have sincerely tried to identify and do what is best for the community. The job has not always been easy. We do not all always agree on what is best. I have sought to make decisions based on what seems the best for the greatest number of citizens.

During my administration I have worked with the Board of Aldermen to make what I feel are several improvements that benefit all of us. We have extended the gas line 5 1/2 miles to make services available to additional homes and to provide revenue for the town. We have refurbished the water tank and improved water system services. We have extended the buffer area around the sewage lagoon and are cooperating with county and state officials to manage new federal waste standards at the lowest possible cost to the citizens. The town has improved the library facilities by joining with the regional library board to remodel the library. We are currently working with the 911 coordinator to help implement that system.

The progress that I feel will most benefit the town and its citizens is the purchase of 54 acres for an Industrial Park on the east side of town. One in-

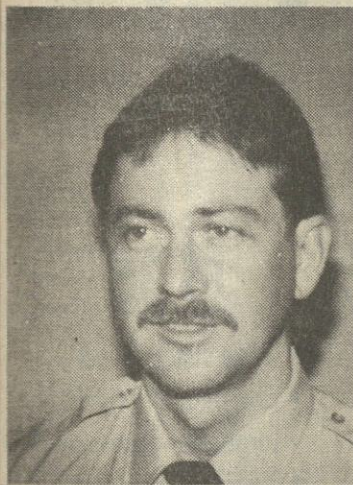
dustrial has committed to that location in the future and the Tishomingo County Development Association has money obligated to building on the site. In addition, we have worked to obtain a \$250,000 grant to provide water to Heil Company. This is necessary for Heil to expand its operation. It has plans to add an additional 133 jobs when the expansion is complete. More jobs in the area will benefit all of the citizens by putting more money into our economy.

Four years ago I rather quickly discovered that given the regulations of state laws and auditors that the management of even a town the size of Tishomingo is no longer simple. I have discovered that communication is often the key to obtaining grants and other funds to help complete the projects we seek. I have learned much about the extent and volume of forms and paperwork necessary to deal with state and federal guidelines. In doing so, I have tried to represent to the best of my ability the town in meetings with county, state, and federal officials making it a point to know those I dealt with. I hope that you will give me the opportunity to strengthen my existing communication network so that I can complete the projects we have begun and move on to new projects still in the planning stages.

Your vote and support will be appreciated.

Eight candidates will face-off Tuesday, May 18, in Iuka's second Democratic Primary Election for the offices of aldermen.

Candidate James E. Bates won in the first primary election with a majority vote and will automatically go to the June 8 General Election.

Four other candidates must be chosen from the remaining eight to complete the Democratic nominees on the June 8 ballot. These five will then face the one Independent and five Republican candidates.

Milton M. Price Announces Candidacy For Iuka Alderman

I, Milton M. Price, wish to announce my candidacy for alderman. I have been a resident of Iuka since March of 1978. After my retirement from TVA in 1982, we made a choice to remain in this area. We have many friends and share a vital concern for the welfare of this community. I not only have a desire but feel an obligation to contribute as best I can to the betterment of our city.

While I am a republican and share a conservative view of politics, I do not believe my views differ greatly from the majority of Mississippians. The issue is not partisan politics, but integrity and responsibility in government.

I served four and one-half years in the U.S. Army during World War II. I received my basic training in the Signal Corps at Fort Monmouth, N.J. and served in the United States as well as overseas in New Guinea, the Philippines, and Japan. In the Philippines I was assigned to a Civil Affairs Unit responsible for establishing and aiding municipal governments as they were liberated from the Japanese.

I began my career with TVA at Pickwick Dam in 1951 after receiving a degree in mechanical engineering from the University

of Alabama. I was involved in several major construction projects throughout the Tennessee Valley serving in an engineering capacity with supervisory responsibilities.

While at Browns Ferry Nuclear Plant, I was elevated to Project Manager after having served as Construction Engineer responsible for all engineering activity. Later, I was assigned the task of planning and organizing the Yellow Creek project. In 1978, we moved a construction organization on site and began an all-out effort to build one of the world's most powerful generating plants.

At my retirement in 1982, we had assembled a force of more than four thousand engineers, technicians, craftsmen, administrative and service personnel. These workers represented some of the most capable and experienced individuals in the construction industry.

There are many commonalities between the administration of a large construction project and municipal government. With my experience and training I believe I am qualified to serve as your alderman should you elect me on June the eighth.

Home Economics Tips

BABY'S PEACEFUL SLEEP
Like adults, babies tend to differ in the amount of sleep they need. One recent study found that, on the average, healthy newborn babies spent 16½ hours per day sleeping. Some babies needed more and some needed less sleep.

Like you, your baby needs a

peaceful sleep. Here are some suggestions for helping your baby get his or her ZZZ's.

Activity. Make sure that your baby gets enough play activity and stimulation during the day. Avoid over-stimulating your baby. Look for over-stimulation signs like arching of the back and turning away from the head or body.

Bedtime rituals. Help your baby settle-down for bedtime by giving a bath, playing soft music, cuddling or reading.

Finding the right position. Like adults, babies need to find their own sleep position. Most babies prefer to sleep on their stomach. Whatever position your child chooses, do not use a pillow to support your baby's head. This could cause suffocation.

Bed buddies. If your baby is more than 6 months of age, a soft doll or favorite stuffed animal can help make the crib a more comfortable place for rest and sleep. Check with your county home economist regarding the safety of your child's bedtime buddy. For example, the toy should not have detachable parts or be made of toxic materials.

Night-lights. A soft night-light can help ease the transition from day to night.

Volunteers Needed For Habitat For Humanity

The initial Board of Directors for the Tishomingo County Habitat for Humanity is pleased to announce that the local chapter has incorporated and is well on its way to becoming an affiliate of the international organization. In addition to raising more funds, the group must recruit volunteers to staff several committees. Once the required funds are in the bank and the committees have the minimum number of members, the Application for Affiliation will be sent to the regional office in Tupelo. After the application has been approved, the Family Selection Committee and the board will choose the first Habitat family in Tishomingo County, and construction will begin.

The committees and a brief description of their duties follows. The Board of Directors is responsible for making decisions for the affiliate as a whole. It's responsibilities include program development, fund raising, staff supervision and public relations. It must also set financial goals and priorities, deal with legal matters, and communicate with the regional and international Habitat offices.

The Fund Raising and Public Relations Committees are responsible for fund-raising and

consciousness-raising tasks, including public speaking, grant proposal writing, researching, telephoning, and letter writing. While monetary donations are an absolute necessity, Habitat affiliates can also use donations of property and materials.

The responsibilities of the Family Selection Committee are to draft the selection criteria and application, screen applications, interview prospective families, and recommend families to the board for approval for homeownership. The integrity of the Habitat project depends upon a fair, objective, non-discriminatory family selection policy.

The Family Nurture Committee is the primary liaison between the affiliate and the homeowner family. The families will be dealing with various problems including, of course, living on a low income. However, this leads to other problems such as lack of education, improper nutrition and health care, debts, low self

esteem, and frustration. A important part of the Family Nurture Committee is recognizing these problems and helping family to overcome them.

The Site Selection Committee's initial responsibility is in the areas of the community which the ministry of Habitat develop. Once an area is targeted it is the committee's responsibility to recommend plans for acquisition to the board.

The Building Committee is responsible for both the construction planning and the implementation of the plan. It recommends policy to the board and builds house. The committee establishes contacts in the professional community and provides organization to the construction process.

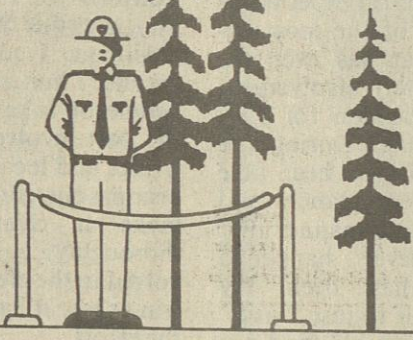

Government Helps Protect Old-Growth Forests

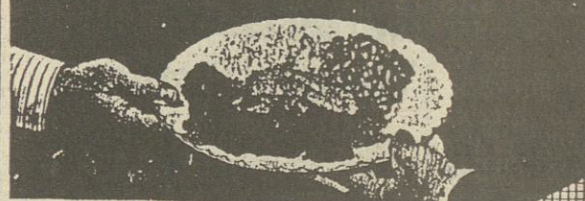
Two out of every three wooded acres are set aside.

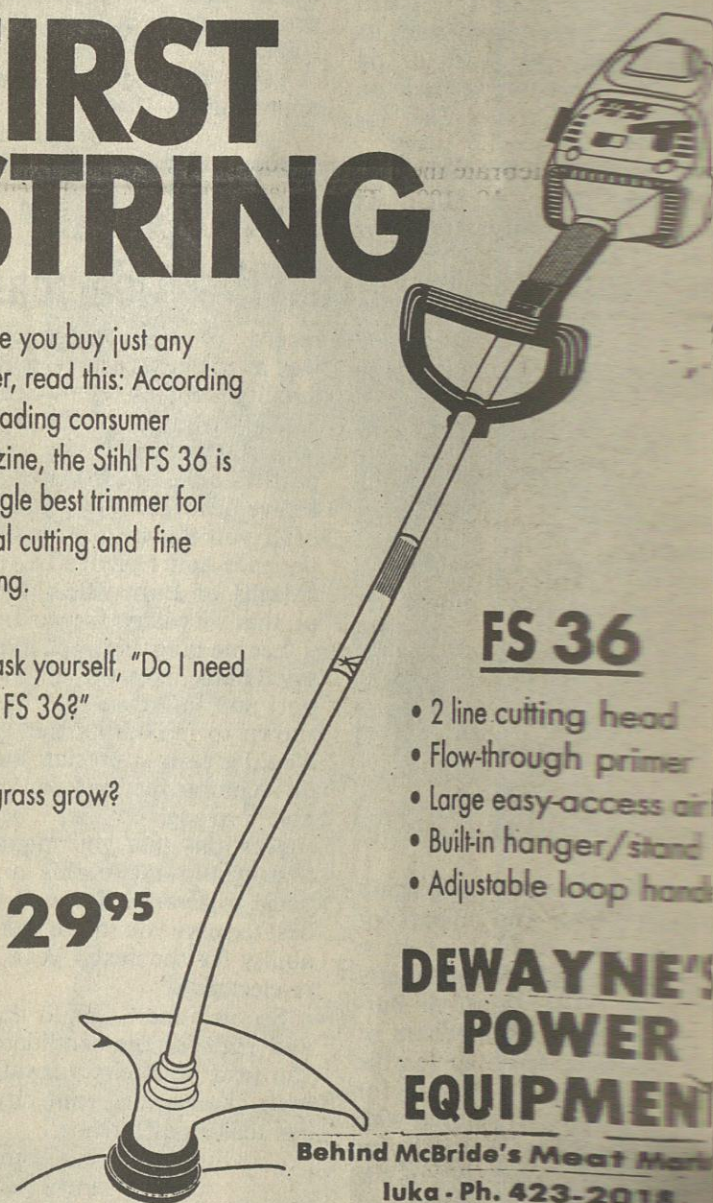

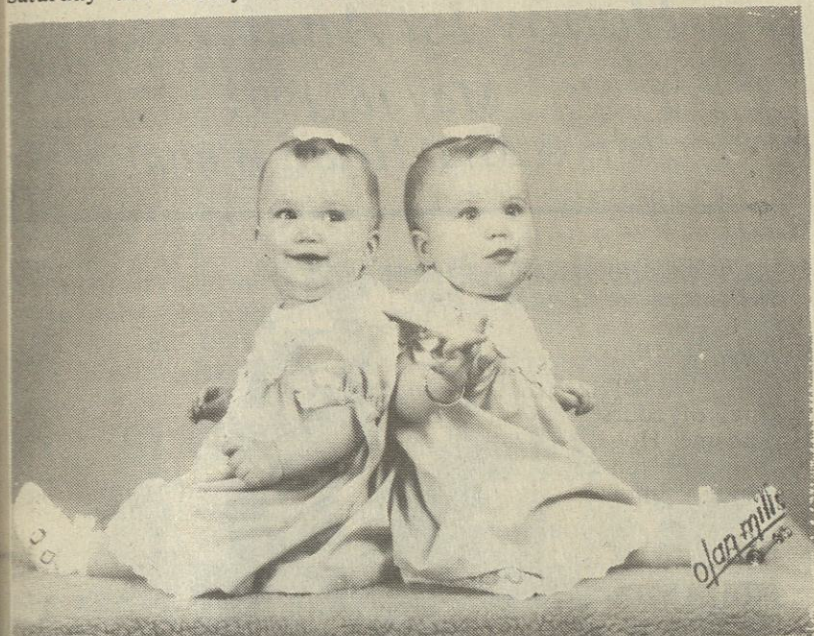

The prospective groom is a '88 graduate of Belmont High School. He is a '90 graduate of Northeast MS. Community

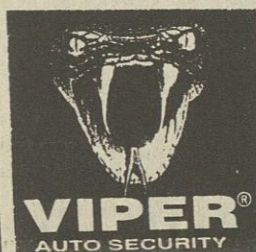

ASCS Farm News

New Conservation Practices Available

There are two relatively new conservation practices that are available for cost-share assistance under the Agriculture Conservation Program administered by the ASCS. These are two real good conservation practices, and we encourage landowners to take advantage of them. The following is a brief description of

the practices.
SP-25 Chiseling and Subsoiling - This practice can be applied to existing pastureland in poor to fair condition or land to be sown to such cover in the next growing season. There must be a presence of a restrictive soil layer. Shattering this layer by chiseling will retard runoff and improve water penetration, thus improving the pastureland. Cost-sharing is limited to once on the same acreage, must be performed as nearly as possible on the contour. The practice is recommended to shatter the artificial plow pans

formed as a result of compaction from heavy equipment, disking or livestock trampling.

SL-6 Grazing Land Protection - This practice is applied to locations that provide water where its installation will achieve erosion control through better distribution of grazing and will also result in water quality improvement.

Requirements are: 1) must own 40 acres or more 2) can not exceed 1500 cubic yards of earth moving, 3) must already have livestock, 4) must have an existing water supply on the tract.

This practice could be widely used by cattle farmers and other livestock owners to install ponds to improve grazing and water quality.

The levels of recognition are recorded on the students' diplomas and permanent records, as well as in the graduation program.

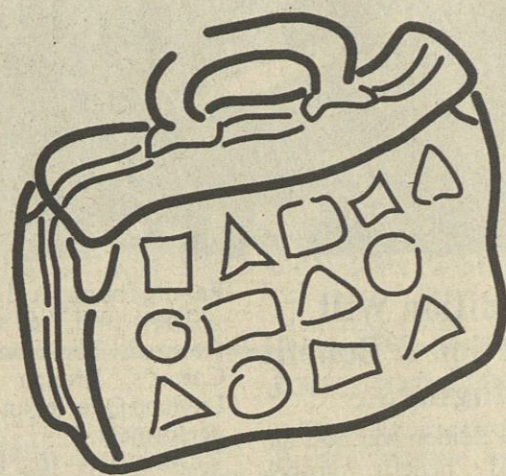

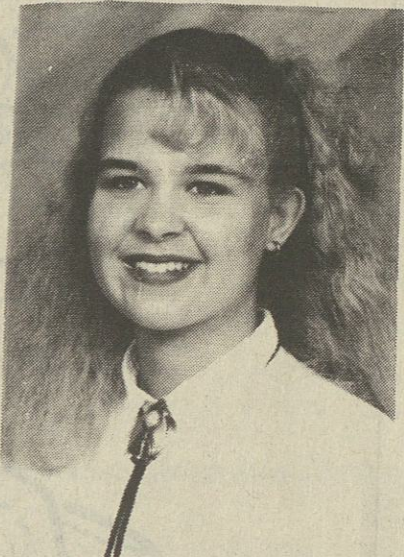
Heritage Day To Feature Ms. Young

Corinth Man Drowns In Tenn-Tom Waterway

A Corinth man drowned Saturday afternoon, May 8, when he and a friend made an unplanned stop on the banks of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway in Burnsville.

According to Tishomingo County Sheriff Johnny S. Nunley, the victim, James Phillip Thrasher, 22, and his friend Larry Butler, 22, both of Corinth, had been working on cars Saturday and had gone to get a part. They impulsively decided to make a stop at the Tenn-Tom Waterway, he said. The two men, who apparently could not swim, slid down the spillway on the west side of the waterway.

Butler was pulled from the water by a witness who was fishing nearby, but Thrasher was not seen alive again, according to reports.

Rescue workers began dragging the waterway and recovered Thrasher's body after

about 30-40 minutes.

Nunley and his department, along with the Tishomingo County Rescue Squad, Burnsville Fire Department and Jim Barnes of the Fish and Wildlife Department assisted at the scene.

JAMES THRASHER

James Phillip Thrasher, 22, died Saturday, May 8, 1993, in Iuka as a result of an accidental drowning. He was self-employed.

Services were at 11 a.m. Tuesday at the Memorial Funeral Home Chapel in Corinth. Burial was in the Valley of the Dogwood Cemetery in Corinth.

Survivors include his parents, James E. and Inez Thrasher of Corinth; five sisters, Marie Howell of Booneville, Sharon Powell of Sardis, Jamie Thrasher and Crystal Thrasher, both of Ripley, and Tina Newcomb of Corinth; and two brothers, Jim Edward Thrasher and Tommy Joe Thrasher, both of Athens, Ala.

Letter To The Editor:

The great turn-out on May the 4th clearly shows that the City of Iuka is ready for a change in its city government. Some of those people have held these seats for way too long. One even stated that he wanted to be an alderman for the \$300.00 a monthly salary.

I think it should be required that a person have at least some education to hold a seat on the city council. I also think that anyone serving as an alderman should do so with the best interest of Iuka in his heart. I don't feel that this has been the case.

A good city Board wouldn't let a city supervisor use city laborers and city equipment to build (2) buildings on his own personal property. One, being a shed for a personal car and the other a garage structure to house a city vehicle. Even if someone paid for the materials and use of the city equipment, this is still not legal. The city workers were paid time and a half and it was on their city checks.

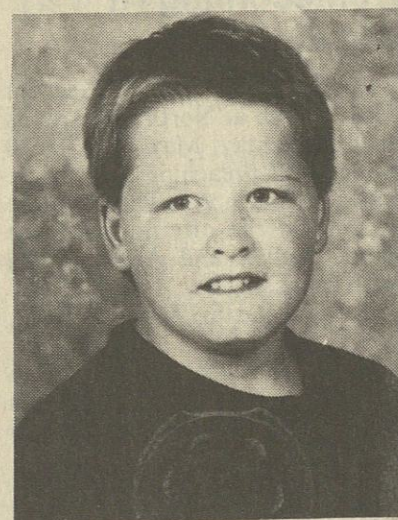

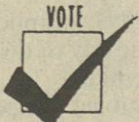

Unemployment In County Stands At 7.9 Percent

According to Charles Smith, Manager of the Mississippi State Employment Service, unemployment in Tishomingo County stood at 7.9 percent in mid-March, approximately the same as February, 3.3 percent less than March of 1992 when the county rate as 11.2 percent.

The civilian labor force for the county numbered 8,130, 120 more than February, and 10 more than March of 1992. Approximately 7,490 Tishomingo County residents held jobs at mid-March while 640 were out of work.

Manufacturing jobs in the county numbered 3,140, 90 more than February but 50 less than March, 1992. Nonmanufacturing jobs in the county number 3,650, approximately the same as February, but 160 more than March of last year.

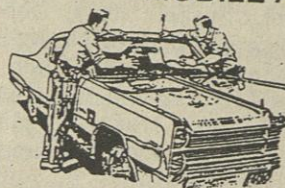

estimate of the cost thereof, which estimate is the aggregate amount of Two Hundred Eighty Thousand Dollars (\$280,000).

5. Said improvements, repairs and extensions are necessary, economically feasible and would be in the public interest and of benefit to the Municipality, and the findings of said engineers are hereby adopted, including the estimate of the costs of said improvements, repairs and extensions.

6. Under the provisions of Sections 21-27-11 through 21-27-65, Mississippi Code of 1972 (the "Act"), the Municipality is authorized to make improvements, repairs and extensions and to provide for the payment of the costs thereof, or any portion of such costs, by and through the issue of bonds, the principal and interest of and on which shall be payable the revenues of the System.

SAREX Adds Up To A Total Success

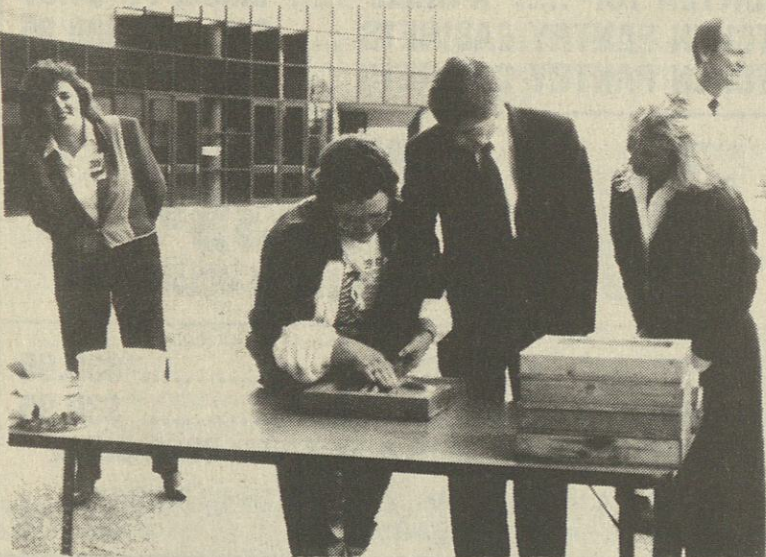

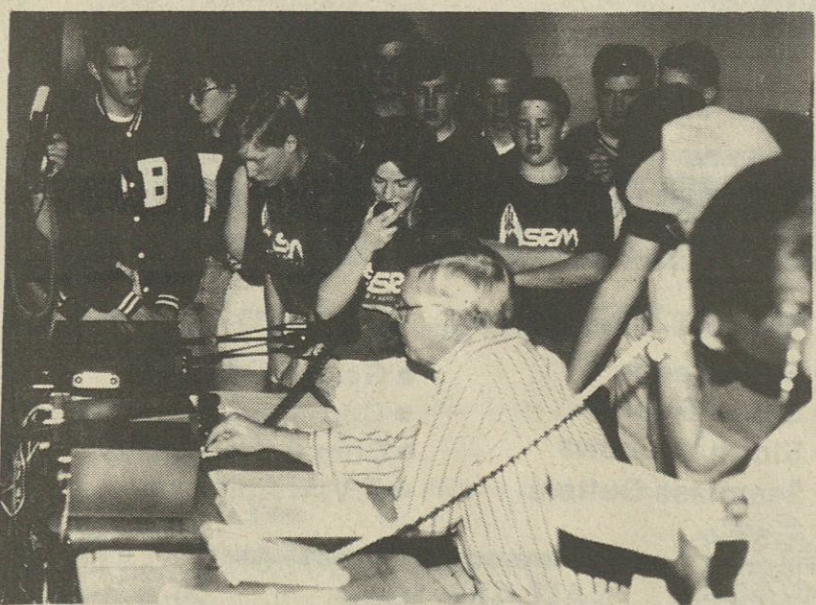

If you were exposed to mustard gas during field and chamber tests of protective equipment while in military service, you may be eligible for VA benefits for certain health problems related to that exposure. You are no longer bound by pledges of secrecy about your participation in these tests.

Did You Know?

Blanche Kelso Bruce
First Black to Serve A Full Term
In U.S. Senate

Blanche K. Bruce, the first of his race to serve a full six-year term in the U.S. Senate, to preside over that "exclusive club," and to sign his name on the nation's currency, was born a slave in Farmville, Prince Edward County, Old Virginia, on March 1, 1841. His mother, Polly, house slave of a wealthy widowed planter named Pettus Perkinson, had eleven children. As a mulatto Bruce's lot was difficult, and the mantle of slavery so enveloped him that most times he could not see beyond its limits. But he and his brothers were given more freedom than many other slaves. And Bruce had the good fortune to receive a limited early education from his young master's tutor, contrary to the state's ban against educating slaves, which was one of the results of the insurrection led by Nat Turner. Tradition affirms

that Blanche was more adept learning than his young master William Perkinson.

While a slave, Bruce was taken to Brunswick, Missouri, where learned the printer's trade as a printer's devil. Shortly after beginning of the Civil War a young master joined the Confederate forces. "Branch" as two of his brothers went to Ennibal expecting to join the Union forces, but blacks were not accepted. He later wrote that emancipated himself after the attack on Fort Sumter. To emphasize the change in status changed his first name from "Branch" to "Blanche."
