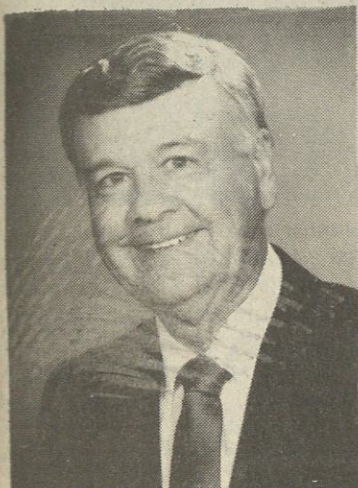

J. R. Long Seeks Election As Mayor of Iuka June 8th



J. R. Long officially announces his candidacy for Mayor of Iuka, subject to the General Election June 8, 1993.

He submits the following information; personal, civic, and academic, for those who may not be familiar with his background.

"My wife, Yvonne and I, have three children, Londee Kent, Jon, and Ladye Love Long. My academic education consists of a Bachelor of Science degree, and Master of Education degree at Mississippi State University, as well as advanced graduate work at the University of Mississippi.

I am a former teacher, coach, principal and county superintendent of education, in Tishomingo, Monroe, DeSoto counties and Memphis City Schools. I am a Navy Veteran, a retired banker. My civic, and community service, involved many community and county drives and benefits, as well as past president of the Iuka Chamber of Commerce; past president, Iuka Lions Club; past president W.O.W.; Commander, V.F.W.; past president, Iuka Separate School District Board of

Trustees; and the Northeast Mississippi Community College Board of Trustees for eleven years.

I also taught extension Business Management courses for N.E.M.C.C. at Burnsville and Iuka Schools.

As a banker, I processed and serviced Federally Insured student loans, thereby helping many young people attend college. I also initiated and serviced most all Small Business Loans.

While County Superintendent of Education, we were able to initiate 10 new, never before, programs in Tishomingo County Schools. We were able to secure federal grants for some of these programs such as the first bands and the first educable handicapped class in Tishomingo County Schools. I have experience in budget making, planning and money management.

My campaign has been, and will continue to be, positive. I will cooperate with the Board and all City personnel, as well as the citizens of Iuka, to initiate progressive programs which will add to the growth of our City. The old fashioned "Town Hall" meetings can be utilized so that the ideas and concerns of the people can be heard. We can work together. Democrats Selected To Face Republicans & Independents In June 8th Election

Offices Of Iuka Mayor and Board of Aldermen To Be Decided

In Tuesday's run-off Democratic primary in Iuka, only one incumbent received enough votes to advance to the June 8th General Election, along with four new candidates.

Voters, in a light turn out Tuesday, chose Democratic candidates Marvin Lester Baker, Herbert D. Booker, Bessie M. (Bess) Young and incumbent Leroy Dean. Democratic candidate James E. Bates was confirmed in the May 4th primary and will advance, with the four chosen Tuesday, to the General Election. There the five Democratic candidates will face Republican candidates Milt Burton, Jerry Clark, Frank Jordan, Milton Price and Betty Swimmer and Independent candidate Ricky

Smith.

Iuka voters could elect an entirely new Municipal Board in the June 8 election from the field of candidates. There will definitely be a four member change since only one incumbent progressed after this election.

Also appearing on Iuka's June 8th ballot will be Mayoral candidates David Nichols (i)(D) and J.R. Long (R).

Chief of Police candidate James (Amos) Bates was re-elected by a majority during the first primary and will not have an opponent in the General Election.

Two Vehicle Accident Injures 5-Month-Old Texas Infant

A two-vehicle wreck Sunday, May 16, in Iuka resulted in the injury of a 5-month-old infant.

According to Mississippi Highway Patrolman Alan Lyles, 5-month-old Christopher Jimenez sustained a fractured skull after the vehicle he and his parents, Bryan and Christy Jimenez of Quinlan, TX, were traveling in was struck in the side by a vehicle driven by Jack C. Murphy, 75, of Iuka.

Apparently Murphy was pulling across U.S. Highway 72 at the intersection of County Road 995 (Airport Road) and failed to yield to the Jimenez's vehicle, which was traveling west, Lyles said.

Murphy was charged with driving without a license and failure to yield.

The Jimenez infant was transported to LeBonheur. No report on his condition was available at presstime.

five days per week that was funded through the council on aging.

m) We extended approximately 2½ miles of water lines to residence of North Burnsville because their wells went dry due to the digging of the Tennessee Tombigbee Waterway.

If you will elect me your next Mayor I will continue to work hard to secure grants for our City.

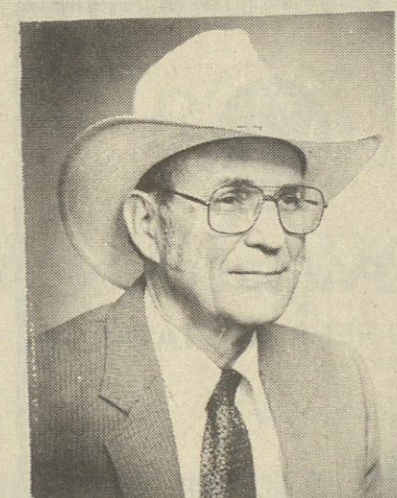

Frank Wade Jordan Seeks Office of Iuka Alderman



My name is Frank Wade Jordan, I am a candidate for Alderman in the upcoming June 8th election. I want a chance to help preserve the good things of Iuka and improve those things that need improvement. I have lived in Iuka three years, and I have found the people of Iuka to be warm and friendly. It takes someone who has lived in the places I have lived to appreciate the need to protect the good things Iuka has to offer.

I would like to tell you a little bit about my background. As a teenager I quit high school to go into the U.S. Air Force. Upon release, after serving four years, I enrolled and completed the courses necessary to receive a Bachelors of Science degree in Aeronautical Engineering from Texas A & M University. I helped the McGregor Saddle Club build a rodeo arena (written up in the Western Horseman Magazine). I helped the Shenandoah Paint Horse Club build a five state organization for showing and registering American Paint Horses. Also, it was my honor to win "Volunteer of The Year" from the Tishomingo Development Foundation for 1992.

I am a Christian and attend worship services at the Iuka Church of Christ. In past years, when no one else was available, I preached, led singing and taught Sunday school. I face problems head-on and do the things I have to do when I have to do them.

I am not a native son of Iuka but I have found a home here among people who are "the salt of the earth". I have arrived at a time when Iuka in its inevitable growth, is at a fork in the road to the future. Will it become a hodge-podge or will it become a beautiful city that retains the present beauty and heritage of all its people. Near future leaders will set the course.

I believe that property taxes should not be increased for those on fixed incomes. I believe city employees deserve adequate training and proper equipment to do their jobs. Murder Trial Begins For Belmont Man

The trial of one of the men charged in the September murder of a Tishomingo Countian began Monday, May 17.

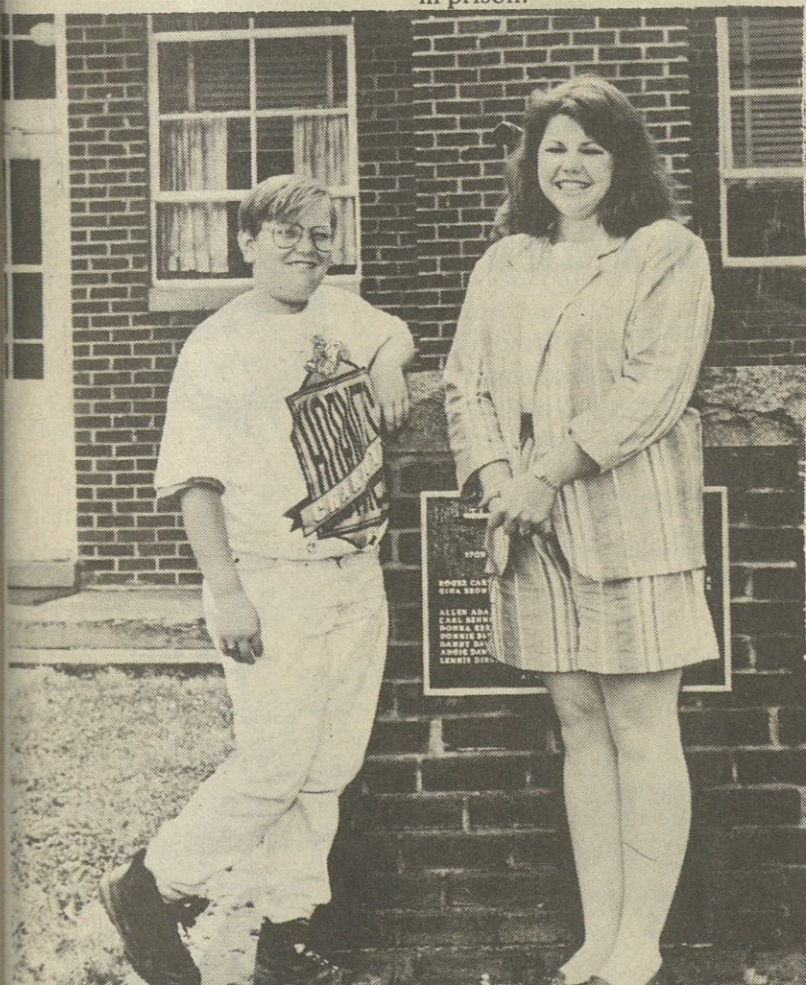
The trial of James Danny McGee, 23, of Belmont, began Monday in Oxford in U.S. District Court.

McGee was arrested and charged in the murder of Thomas Alan Byram, 30, of Iuka. Byram was found beaten to death on

September 3, 1992 at the Pharr Indian Mounds on the Natchez Trace Parkway in Prentiss County.

Also charged in the murder was Greg Leon Dingler, 23, Belmont. He will be tried separately from McGee.

U.S. District Judge Neal Biggers is hearing the case. A maximum sentence for the crime, if the suspect is convicted, is life in prison.

County Agents Notes

PESTICIDE RECORD KEEPING

The final regulations to implement the pesticide record-keeping requirements were published in the Federal Register on April 9, 1993 and became effective on May 10, 1993. This means that it is now the LAW. This only applies to RESTRICTED USE PESTICIDES. The information certified private applicators will be required to maintain on a restricted use pesticide (RUP) includes:

1. The brand or product name and the EPA registration number of the RUP that was applied;
2. The total amount of the RUP applied;
3. The location of the application, the size of area treated and the crop, commodity, stored product, or site to which a RUP was applied;
4. The month, day and year when the RUP application occurred; and
5. The name and certification number (if applicable) of the certified applicator who applied or who supervised the application of the RUP.

Records of restricted use pesticide applications must be maintained for 2 years from the date of application. There will not be a standardized form for maintaining these records but we have forms in the Extension Office that will cover all of the information.

HORTICULTURE QUESTIONS
When should azaleas be

pruned? Azaleas should be pruned after they have completed blooming. If you are interested in obtaining cuttings from your plant, you can do so until the first of July without removing next year's flower buds.

Are the wildflower seed mixtures at the stores suited for this area? While all of the seeds in the mixture may not be native to our area, most should grow here. Some are formulated for particular uses such as cool season, shade, wet areas, etc. Read the label closely and choose one that suits your needs.

Should shrub beds be mulched for the summer? Mulch has many benefits during the summer months. The covering of the soil helps keep moisture in and aids in weed control. Make sure the old mulch hasn't compacted. Remove it if necessary and add about 3 inches of new mulch.

DIETS SHOULD CHANGE LIFETIME HABITS

By this time of year, most New Year's resolutions to lose weight have been broken and left some people with a "what's-the-use" attitude. But instead of quick-loss plans, try changing eating habits for a healthier diet that will last a lifetime.

People who want to lose weight need to remember they didn't gain it overnight, so they won't lose it overnight either. Drastic weight-loss plans are unhealthy, and research indicates people are more likely to regain the weight faster.

The most lasting method of losing weight is to adopt healthier eating habits. Reducing fat and increasing fruits and vegetables in the diet are the best places to start. In addition to healthier diets, increased exercise will help dieters drop extra pounds at a faster, safer rate.

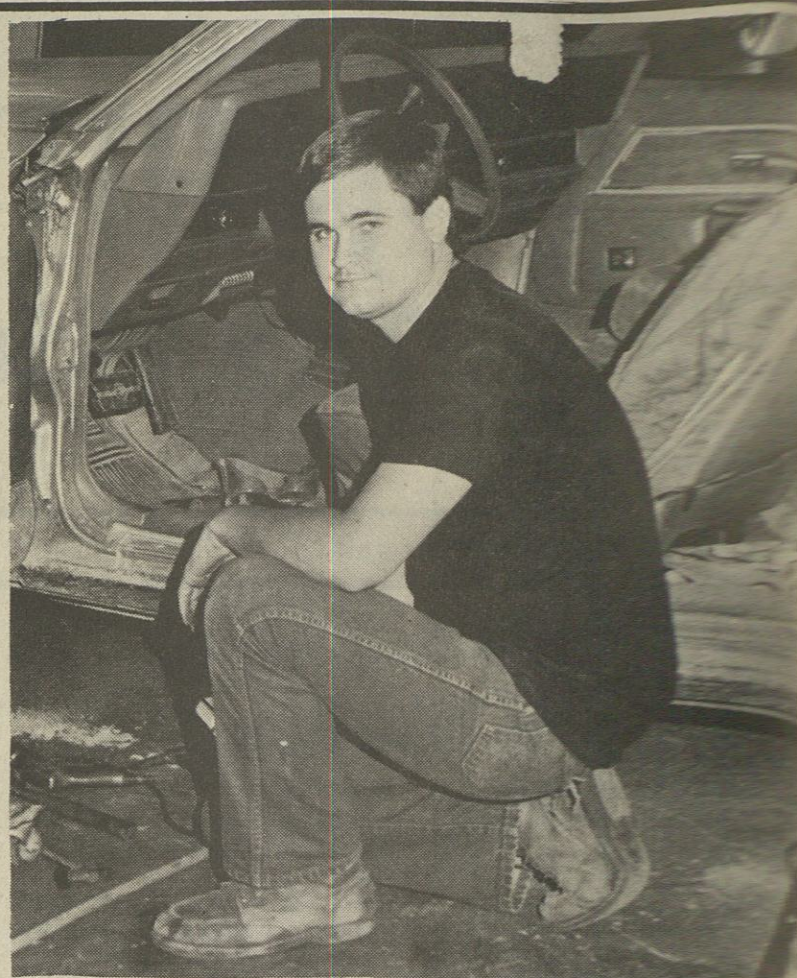
Brisk walking is one of the best forms of exercise to incorporate into a daily routine. Dieters should not eliminate any major food group, such as bread, starches or dairy products, as part of a weight-loss plan.

A person can lose weight and still eat three meals a day with one or two snacks between meals. If the meals are skipped, the person is hungrier at meal time, and as a result is more likely to overeat.

When food is eaten in smaller quantities evenly spaced throughout the day, the body is able to more efficiently convert the food to energy rather than storing it as fat.

One of the hazards of choosing some fad or quick-loss diets is lifetime eating habits are not changed. When a dieter returns to eating normally, extra pounds return rapidly.

Dieting should not set one family member apart from the others. Healthy eating is good for everyone. Preparing two meals -- one for a dieter and one for non-dieters -- makes the diet harder to

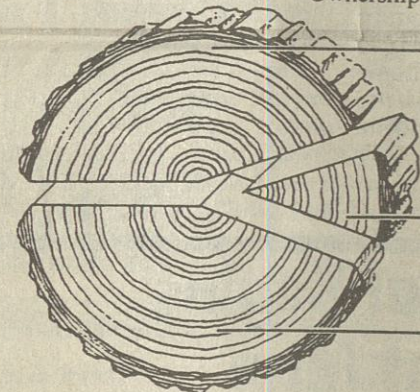

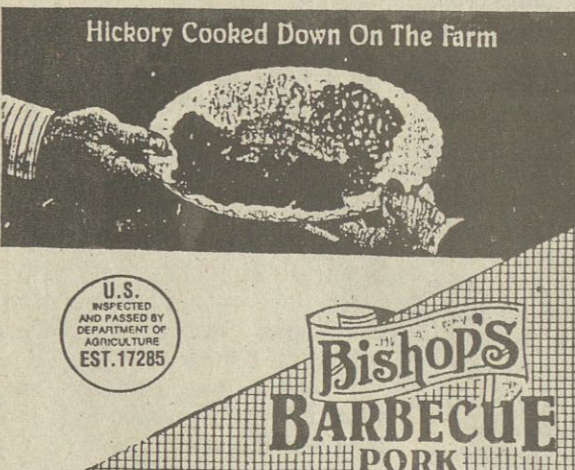

EYES INSIDE AND OUT

When you go for an eye exam to find out if you need new glasses or contact lenses, your eye doctor will check your eyes inside and out. In examining your external eye, he or she may use a small flashlight for a series of tests. For instance, your eye doctor may shine the light into your pupils to see if they react properly. In bright light they will close, but in dimmer light they will open.

Your eye doctor will also inspect your eyebrows, eyelids, eyelashes, and eyeballs for any signs of growths, scars, excessive tearing and other problems. It's also important to check the balance of your eye-muscles to see if they are properly coordinated.

In one test, your eye doctor will ask you to follow an object up and down and left and right to find out if your eyes are working together to help you see things clearly. If you are having any problems with your vision, even though they may seem slight now, see your eye doctor for an examination before the problem gets worse.

Did You Know?

William Grant Still
"America's Greatest
Black Composer"

That summer evening in 1936 when a Black man stood before the Los Angeles Philharmonic Orchestra and conducted two of his own compositions in the Hollywood Bowl marked the first time an American Negro had ever led a major symphony orchestra in the performance of serious music. Again, that same man made history when he became the first to conduct a white radio orchestra in New York City. In 1949 when the New York City Center Opera company, celebrating its fifth anniversary, presented his opera, *Troubled Island* (1937), it was the first time an opera composed by a black was performed by a major American opera company. The man, the composer was William Grant Still, a native of Woodville, Mississippi.

William was born on May 11, 1895 the only child of William Grant and Carrie (Frambo) Still, both of whom were brilliant musicians and talented and versatile school teachers. His ancestry includes Scotch-Irish,

Spanish, Cherokee and African. Before moving to Mississippi his parents taught at Alabama A & M College, Huntsville, Alabama. Besides Mathematics, his father taught music, played a coronet, led a Woodville brass band.

In 1916 at age twenty-one, he received a small legacy from his father and promptly put it to good use by enrolling at Oberline College's conservatory of music, taking private lessons.

He served in World War I, afterwards he joined W.C. Handy, "Father of the Blues". In 1921 Still played the Oboe in Eubie Blake's Orchestra for successful black musical shuffle along, featuring Florence Mills. At age thirty he had played every kind of instrument in every kind of band, in theaters, night clubs, and touring troupes.

Still's works include a symphonic poem, *Darker America* (1914), the lively *From the Black Belt* (1926), and a ballet with West Indian setting, *La Guianesse* (1927), Howard Hanson; *Africa* (1930), *Afro-American Symphony* (1930). He regarded as his greatest work. The list continues of his many compositions.

"Still is a religious man and at the end of every new composition, when the last note is

down on the manuscript, writes, "with humble thanks God, the source of inspiration."

Sheriff Johnny Nunley Named Buford Pusser Law Enforcement Officer of the Year

Tishomingo County, Mississippi Sheriff Johnny S. Nunley has been named Buford Pusser Law Enforcement Officer of the Year.

Sheriff Nunley, 34, and one of the youngest sheriffs Tishomingo County has ever had, took office January 6, 1992. Since that time, Sheriff Nunley and his six deputies have made several major crackdowns, one being the destruction of one of the largest whiskey stills ever found in the area. The still had a 1,850 gallon pot.

Sheriff Nunley has been successful in raiding several dope hatches and shutting down an illegal honky tonk in the county. Another drug related arrest resulted in the confiscation of a kilo of cocaine, \$7,000 in cash, a vehicle and firearms. Nunley has spent the majority of his life saw milling and logging in the small community of Pleasant Hill, located between Midway and Tuka.

His career in law enforcement began in 1977 when he joined the Tishomingo Police Department. In 1982, he went to work with the Tuka City Police Department.

Sheriff Nunley's plans for the future include cleaning up the county's drug problem and getting the county's 911 service installed and operating. "I want to grow within the department and to continue to serve and protect the people of Tishomingo County," Nunley said.

Nunley considers it a privilege to be able to help people and his first concern is helping the people.

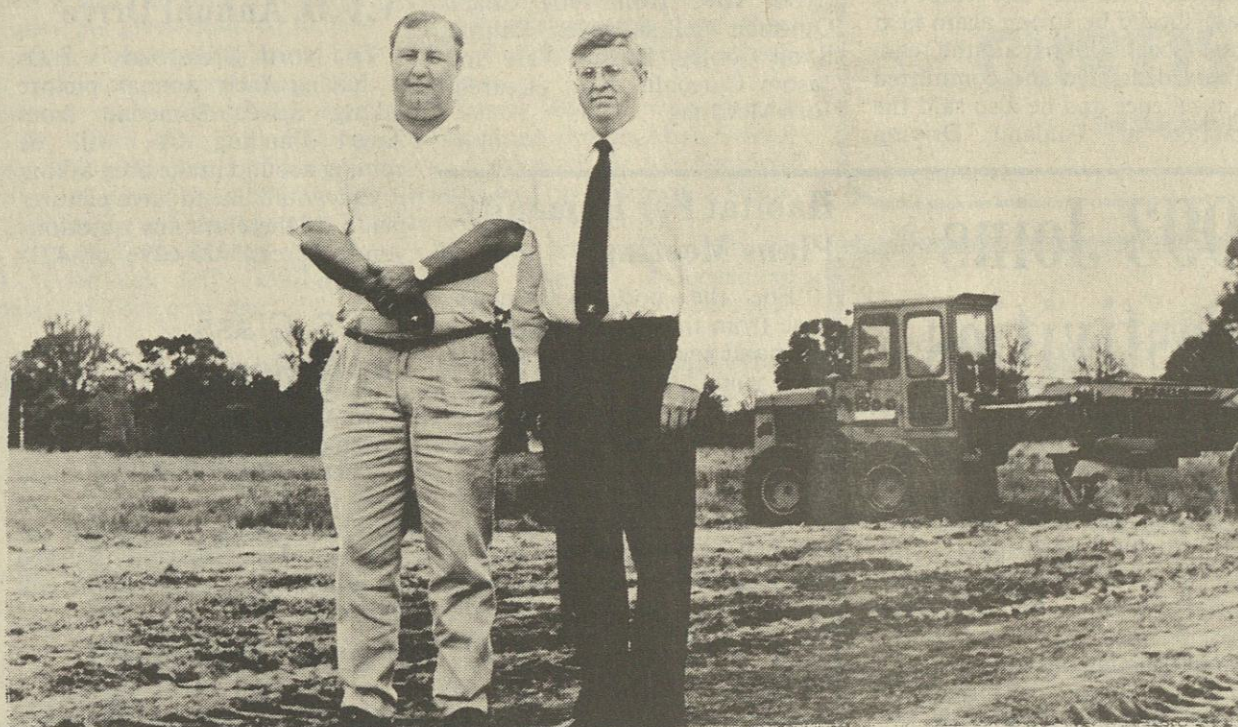

GRANTS RECEIVED -- Burnsville Mayor Bobby H. Johnson and Yellow Creek Authority Director Eugene Bishop are getting plans underway to use grant money to make improvements to the town of Burnsville that will attract new industry and make the town better for current residents.

Town of Burnsville Receives \$240,000.00 Block Grant

The town of Burnsville has recently received a \$240,000 Community Development Block Grant to be used for the installation of a new well, fire hydrants and water improvements.

According to Burnsville Mayor Bobby H. Johnson, the town will begin taking bids within the month for the 350-gallon well. The well will update the towns present water system and provide the added capacity needed for fire hydrants to be installed throughout the town. "This, along with the new fire truck that was recently purchased by the town, will make the town safer from fires and also help lower insurance rates," Johnson explained.

As a part of the improvements that the grant will be used for, new 6 inch lines will be installed in the town and also improvements will be made to the town's water system. Johnson explained that bids for this will be let later this summer.

In the way of improvements to the Burnsville area, grants from the Appalachian Regional Commission and from the Farmers Home Administration totalling close to \$1 million have been awarded recently to the Yellow Creek Port Authority for use in the Northeast Mississippi Waterway Industrial Park in Burnsville.

nsville.

Eugene Bishop, director of the Yellow Creek Port Authority said that the monies will be used to build new roads into the 900-acre industrial park and also to run water and sewage lines into it. Bids will be taken this summer for these projects also, according to Bishop.

Johnson, Bishop, the Tishomingo County Development Foundation and the Burnsville Area Chamber of Commerce have been working hard to

recruit new industry into the industrial park. Trips to Canada and Chicago have been made in order to bring industry into the area. "With these improvements that we are going to make, with the help of the grant money to the town of Burnsville and for the industrial park, we'll be a more attractive site for industries that are looking for a place to locate," Johnson stated. "It will also make improvements that are needed for those already living in the town."

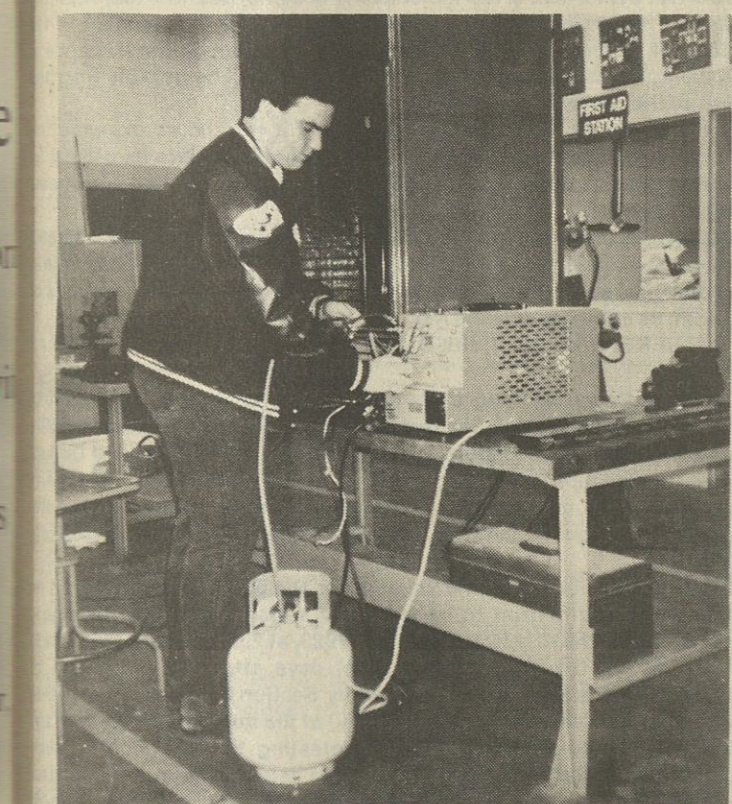

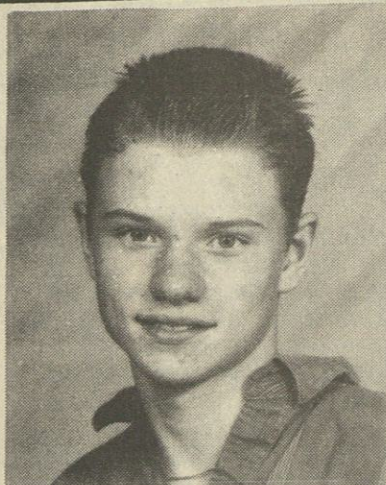

A RESOLUTION DECLARING THE INTENTION OF THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF IUKA, MISSISSIPPI, TO ISSUE COMBINED WATER AND SEWER SYSTEM REVENUE BONDS OF THE MUNICIPALITY IN THE MAXIMUM PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF TWO HUNDRED EIGHTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$280,000) TO RAISE MONEY FOR THE PURPOSE OF MAKING IMPROVEMENTS, REPAIRS AND EXTENSIONS TO THE COMBINED WATER AND SEWER SYSTEM OF THE MUNICIPALITY, CONSISTING PRIMARILY OF IMPROVEMENTS, REPAIRS AND EXTENSIONS TO THE WATERWORKS AND WATER SUPPLY FACILITIES OF SAID SYSTEM.

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Iuka, Mississippi (the "Governing Body" of the "Municipality"), acting on behalf of the Municipality, hereby finds, determines, adjudicates and declares as follows:

1. The waterworks, water supply, sewerage, and sewage disposal facilities of the Municipality have heretofore been combined and operated as a combined system known as the combined water and sewer system of the Municipality (the "System").

2. It is necessary and advisable and in the best interest of the Municipality and its inhabitants to issue combined water and sewer revenue bonds of the Municipality in the maximum principal amount of Two Hundred Eighty Thousand Dollars (\$280,000) to raise money for the purpose of making improvements, repairs and extensions to the System, consisting primarily of improvements, repairs and extensions to the waterworks, water supply facilities of the System for which purpose there are not available funds on hand.

3. The Governing Body has employed Cook-Coggin Engineering, Inc., Tupelo, Mississippi, a competent engineering firm, to study the System, determine the nature and extent of the improvements, repairs and extensions necessary thereto, and make an estimate of the cost thereof.

4. Said engineers have determined the nature and extent of the needed improvements, repairs and extensions to the System and have made an estimate of the cost thereof, which estimate is the aggregate amount of Two Hundred Eighty Thousand Dollars (\$280,000).

5. Said improvements, repairs and extensions are necessary and economically feasible and would be in the public interest and of benefit to the Municipality, and the findings of said engineers are hereby adopted, including the estimate of the costs of said improvements, repairs and extensions.

6. Under the provisions of Sections 21-27-11 through 21-27-69, Mississippi Code of 1972 (the "Act"), the Municipality is authorized to make such improvements, repairs and extensions and to provide for the payment of the costs thereof, or any portion of such costs, by and through the issuance of bonds, the principal and interest of and on which shall be payable the revenues of the System.

7. The Municipality reasonably expects that it will incur expenditures prior to the issuance of said bonds and that it should declare its intention to reimburse expenditures made in anticipation of the issuance of bonds.

8. A sum not exceeding Two Hundred Eighty Thousand Dollars (\$280,000) must be provided and raised by the issuance of special obligation bonds, said amount, payable both as to principal and interest from the revenues of the System, as authorized by the Act.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE MUNICIPALITY AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. The Governing Body does hereby declare its intention to issue combined water and sewer system revenue bonds of the Municipality in the maximum principal amount of Two Hundred Eighty Thousand Dollars (\$280,000) to raise money for the purpose of making improvements, repairs and extensions to the System, consisting primarily of improvements, repairs and extensions to the waterworks and water supply facilities of the System.

SECTION 2. Said bonds in the amount, for the purpose and secured by the revenues of the System, shall be authorized to be issued at a meeting of the Governing Body to be held at the City Hall on June 1, 1993, at 7:00 o'clock P.M. on or before the date so fixed will be more than ten (10) days after the third publication of this resolution, as directed by Section 3 hereof. If a petition signed by not less than twenty percent (20%) of the qualified electors of the Municipality be filed objecting to and protesting the issuance of revenue bond issue on or before the aforesaid date and hour, then and in the event of the issuance of such bonds shall be called and provided by law. If no such protest be filed, then such bonds may be issued without an election on the question of the issuance thereof, and be sold under the regular procedure for selling such bonds.

SECTION 3. The Municipality reasonably expects that it will incur expenditures prior to the issuance of said Bonds, which it intends to reimburse with the proceeds of said bonds upon the issuance thereof. A declaration of official intent to reimburse expenditures made prior to the issuance of said bonds in anticipation of the issuance of the bonds is hereby made pursuant to Department of Treasury regulations section 1.103-18 (the "Treasury Regulations"). The project for which such expenditures are made is the same as described in Section 1 of this resolution. The maximum principal amount of debt expected to be issued for the project is the amount set forth in Section 1 of this resolution.

SECTION 4. This resolution shall be published once a week for three (3) consecutive weeks in Tishomingo County News, a newspaper published in and having a general circulation in the Municipality, and in a qualified newspaper under the provisions of Section 13-3-31, Mississippi Code of 1972, the first publication of this resolution shall be made not less than twenty-one (21) days prior to the date fixed herein for issuance of the bonds, and the last such publication to be more than ten (10) days prior to the date specified in Section 2 hereof.

SECTION 5. The Clerk of the Municipality shall be and is hereby directed to procure from the publisher of the aforesaid newspaper the cost of publication of this resolution and to have the same before the Governing Body on the date and hour specified in Section 2 hereof.

ASCS Farm News

GRAZING PERIOD CLOSED MAY 1st

The official grazing and haying period closed May 1 for acreage conservation reserve (ACR) and conservation use (CU) acreage for payment (including the required 8%).

Farm program participants are not authorized to hay or graze these acres between May 1 through September 30. The wheat, feed grains, cotton and rice programs prohibit haying and grazing of designated acreage during the principal growing months. Farmers who fail to comply with these restrictions could lose program benefits.

Cropland designated as ACR or CU for payment must have been devoted to a row crop, small grain, or another annually planned crop in one of the last five years, and must meet certain size and width requirements.

ACR and CU for payment must be maintained in accordance with the program contract, and must be protected from wind and water erosion through approved cover crops and conservation practices. Farmers will be out of compliance if they do not carry out proper conservation measures, or fail to comply with grazing, haying, or harvesting restrictions.

INSECTS IN CORN

We may not get much corn planted this year but we must be aware of a problem that some people experienced last year. Chinch bugs and rootworms may be a concern, especially if we plant late and experience some hot dry weather in late May and June. The wet weather that we are currently having is actually good for control of early emerging chinch bugs. Look for these insects at the base of the corn stalk. There are chemicals available that offer moderate control. Let me know if you have a problem.

FUNGUS-FREE FESCUE

You may have heard many things concerning fungus-free fescue. Fungus-free fescue will not take the abuse as will the old fungus infected fescue. However, cattle will not abuse the old fescue as they will the fungus-free. They will over-graze the fungus-free rapidly so make sure to leave 3 to 4 inches of growing leaf material and don't let them graze it to the ground. Try to grow the fungus-free fescue in separate pastures and put cattle on warm-season pasture during the hot, dry periods of summer and keep in mind that fescue is a cool season grass.

WHY APPLY SEALANTS?

Q. What is the purpose of applying sealants to the back teeth?

A. Sealants are a good defense against cavity formation in the vulnerable biting surfaces of the molars and pre-molars. These surfaces normally have grooves and pits in which food and plaque collect. Sealants fill in these depressions and provide a clear, protective coating.

Application of the sealant is a painless procedure. The teeth are cleaned first, and then roughened with a mild acidic solution for proper bonding of the sealant. The dentist "paints" the sealant onto the teeth, and it hardens quickly.

Ideally, sealants should be applied to first molars at age 6 or 7 and to second molars when they appear at about age 12 or 13. Is the sealant treatment worthwhile? According to a study reported in the Journal of the American Dental Association, six-year molars that are not treated with sealants are 10 times more likely to develop decay.

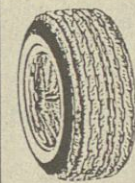

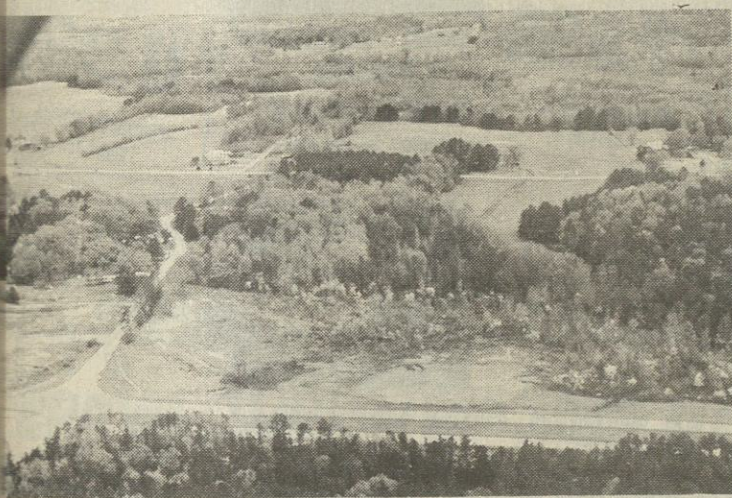

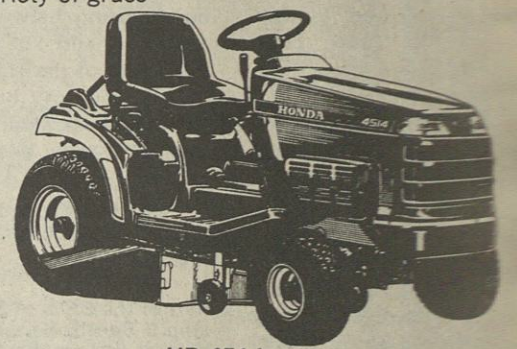
