# **State & Local Officials Tour Yellow Creek Port**

st the A recent visit by some state and cal officials to the Yellow Creek Port gave them a birdseye our view of the capacity and trannortation services that the cility has to offer.

The port authority, which has een operating since 1974, is ocated in the northeast corner of the county on the Tennessee River and Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway. It provides a barge, rail, and truck terminal. Among ts services, the port authority rovides cargo loading and loading with storage including umidity controlled buildings nd also markets industrial

operties. One special guest on the tour, immy Heidel, Executive Direcor of the Mississippi Department Economic and Community pevelopment, stated that he was pressed with this area and was ad to tour the port facility, as ort authority, a State Agency, ves this area with not only orage requirements, but offers best cost effective means of ansportation--water, rail and uck. The port is one of the best the state with equipment, exlent storage buildings and with od leadership.

Arranging and also parating in the tour was ssissippi's District 1 Representive Harvey Benderman. "We re glad that Jimmy Heidel and s wife, JoAnna, visited this VERY area. We kept them very busy for wo days and Jimmy was excited RMS bout this area's potential, NEEDS pecially the tourism aspect with abundance of water, ecreation and other important ojects," Benderman said. He so stated that Heidel indicated hat the Governor would parcipate in a visit to the area as

projects that are a long distance from their facility.'

According to Robert Stringer, Operation Superintendent, "the handling of cargo thru the port is what we have done for sometime. The new cargo, however, like the concrete bridge beams, requires special attention because it requires a two crane operation. Placement of a load into a floating barge takes good coordination of the operation because the barge moves with each load. We primarily handle the loading & the unloading of rolled coiled steel sheets used to make pipes, furniture, lawn mowers, bicycles, refrigerators, air conditioners, electrical conduit boxes, etc. on barges. Also, we handle billets and steel I-Beams and we are the distribution center for the mobile home industry for the southeast area. We handle other products like hardwood timber length logs, sand, gravel, barge lids and coal." He continued "We have some more big lifts coming up because Monotech continues to fabricate some big components and bring them to the port on a special railcar for barge shipments. Because of the port's potential to attract customers with large heavy lifts, a new larger capacity crane would help up with our operation." "The traffic flow through the

port has been very good recently," said port crane operators Jerry Thacker and Bobby Walden. "We have worked some overtime recently to keep our customer's loading requirements on schedule. We like handling new cargo like the 138 feet long concrete bridge beams."

# **Absentee Ballots Questioned In Iuka Municipal Election**

David Nichols may have been declared the winner in luka's mayoral race after Tuesday's election, but Republican candidate J.R. Long could be turning to the courts for a final ruling.

The Juka Municipal Election Commission declared the incumbent Mayor as the official winner with a tally of 503 votes to Long's 498. According to Richard Bowen, attorney for Long, the discrepancy over the final count lies in the absentee ballots.

"I asked that the absentee ballots not be allowed as a part of the total count due to the fact that they have not been initialed by poll workers. It is required that all ballots have the initial of a poll worker otherwise they could have come from anywhere," Bowen explained. "The absentee ballots (which are yellow, while the regular ballots are white) totaled 15 for Long and 31 for Nichols. None of the poll workers would say that they initialed the ballots.'

Totals minus the absentee ballots give Long a total of 483 while Nichols would come up short with a total of 472, according to Bowen.

The next step Long will be taking is the official examination of the ballot box, absentee ballots and other procedures, Bowen said. "I have signed a letter to be served to the luka Municipal Election Commission asking for the opportunity for this examination Friday at 3 p.m. at City Hall. With this major irregularity with the absentee ballots, I fully expect that we will be filing for an election contest with the Circuit Court," the attorney stated. He went on to explain that the election contest would provide that a Circuit Court Judge from outside the district by brought in and a jury would be appointed to hear the case. Then it would be up to them as to whether or not to allow the absentee votes to count in the election.

#### Home Economics Tips

By: Barbara F. Guinn, Extension Home Economist SHAKE THE SALE LIGHTLY, USE HERBS INSTEAD

As we become more health conscious in food choices, one culprit seems to be sodium or salt. Replace that salt shaker with the flavor of herbs.

Herbs are available in several forms -- dried leaves, ground or fresh in most larger supermarkets. But if you have a green thumb, you might like to grow your own.

Herbs can be grown in a window box or in a large garden. Wherever you plant them, be sure they are convenient to the kitchen so you can easily snip the succulent leaves to add to the many foods your prepare this summer. Here are some of the more common herbs and kinds of foods they frequently enhance.

Basil: A member of the mint family, basil adds a pleasant pungent flavor to a vareity of dishes. It is commonly combined with oregano in Italian cooking, but is milder flavored than oregano and is wonderful by itself or combined with other herbs. Use just about anything with pasta, fish, chicken and vegetables.

Chervil: Use like parsley, but

expect much more flavor -similar to tarragon. Use the subtle flavor of chervil to enhance vegetables, sauces, fish, poultry, rice and soups.

Cilantro: Also called Mexican parsley, cilantro is actually the tender leafy sprig of coriander. This piquant herb provides a unique lemony flavor to salsa and other Mexican dishes. Fresh cilantro is also used in oriental cooking. For lively flavor and bright color, add it to salads and dressings, marinated vegetables and chilled pasta dishes.

Chives: One of the easiest herbs to grow, it is a member of the onion family and adds a mild onion flavor to foods. The bright green color of snipped chives makes an attractive garnish for many foods. Most popular in potatoes and omelets, it can be added anywhere a mild onion flavor is needed.

Marjoram: Adds a fragrant, sweet and spicy flavor to vegetables and meats. It is commonly used in many processed meats. For optimum flavor, add toward the end of cooking.

Mint: Once you start a mint plant, it is hard to contain. Adds a delightful refreshing flavor to desserts, beverages and lamb. The delicate leaves make a pretty garnish.

Oregano: This pungent, peppery herb is a common flavoring

Parsley: the All-American herb. Frequently used as a garnish either as a sprig or snipped atop foods. Relatively mild flavor. Can be used in most meat, sauce, soup, stew and vegetable dishes.

Rosemary: This herb has a very distinctive flavor when used alone. Adds a nice balance when combined with other herbs. Try with vegetables, soups, stews and meats.

Sage: A seasoning we most often associate with stuffings. Also good to season meat and poultry dishes as well as vegetables, salads and salad dressings.

Savory: Another member of the mint family, this herb adds a subtle flavor to vegetables and sauces.

Tarragon: This unique aniseflavored herb works wonders in many foods, such as dips, vegetables, poultry dishes and sauces. Popular addition to vinegars and oils as well as salad dressings.

Thyme: a minty, citrus-like flavor characterizes this herb used frequently in addition to vegetables, meats and sauces.

#### 4-H Communicates

"MYTH-INFORMATION" Some foods, milk in particular, have been the target of many modern-day myths. These myths and old wives tales persist partly because of a lack of education, and partly because of our need for simple, easy answers in a complex world. Take the following quiz to find out if you are "myth-informed" about milk:

1. Does warm milk induce sleep? While much remains to be learned about the influence of milk and food in general on sleep, cow's milk is alleged to induce sleep. It is the tryptophan in milk, an essential amino acid, that is thought to be responsible for this effect. Tryptophan is a precursor of the brain transmitter, serotonin, which scientific evidence suggests has sedative properties. However, there's really a very small amount of tryptophan in a glass of milk so it may by psychological - milk as a "comfort food" that helps people relax.

2. Is buttermilk high in fat? The name "buttermilk" is a misnomer; it is actually low in fat and calories. Its thickness does not come from butter, but from the lactic acid that is added to either low-fat or skim milk to produce a "culture". This bacterial growth coagulates some of the milk protein, resulting in a pleasantly tart milk with a characteristic buttery flavor and smooth, thick body.

3. Should I avoid milk when I have a cold? Some people believe that eliminating milk from their diet when they have a cold will alleviate stuffiness. Although it is commonly thought that milk and dairy products produce mucus, findings to date have failed to support this effect. There is no reason, therefore, for cold sufferers to eliminate milk and other dairy foods from their diets.

4. Should athletes avoid milk before competition? Some coaches and athletes still believe that milk consumed before a competition causes "cottonmouth," loss of endurance, stomach upset and constipation. However, cottonmouth is usually caused by emotional stress and fluid loss. Insufficient oxygen, not milk intake, is responsible for the muscle fatigue. The stomach upset sometimes associated with milk may occur because of emotional stress prior to competition. Finally there is no evidence that milk is constipating when consumed in normal amounts. Emotional stress, drugs such as antacids, and the misuse

Vision Affects Personality When the response to stress is inappropriate and we do not adapt easily, we may get ourselves into all kinds of trouble; high blood pressure, ulcers, and even emotional disturbances. As long as we can handle the stress and return to normal, we are healthy. However, if we are unable to shift back to relaxation, the stress will ultimately overtax us and result in illness.


The eyes in particular have a critical stake in our psychological/physiological make-up. The brain receives more sensory stimulation from the eyes than it does from any of our other senses. Eyes are the outposts of the brain.

Numerous studies have documented that people with similar visual problems often share similar personality characteristics. One survey was able to detect more than 3/4 of the nearsighted children who participated. Such a finding indicates that it might be possible to determine those who might become myopic (nearsighted) and suggest ways to avoid it, such as through vision therapy.

5. Does milk promote acne? There is no medical proof that any specific food causes acne. In fact, most dermatologists believe that diet has little effect on this skin disorder. Acne also can be aggravated by excessive heat, friction and stress.

6. Isn't milk just for kids? Your body goes through many stages during life, but it always needs calcium. Ninety-nine percent of the calcium in your body is in your bones and teeth. the other one percent is used for your heart to beat, for your muscles to contract and relax, for your blood to clot, and for your nerves to transmit messages. Since your body can't make its own calcium, it's up to you to supply it. Two to three servings of milk or other dairy foods are recommended daily for adults over 25. Pregnant and nursing women should consume four servings daily. When

#### **TVA Issues New RiverPulse Report**

The Tennessee River remains in good overall health, is safe to swim in at most locations tested and has fish that are safe to eat from most lakes, according to TVA's "report card" to the public on the river's health.

TVA today released the second annual RiverPulse report, which is part of a strategy to make the Tennessee River the cleanest, most productive commercial river system in the nation by the Year 2000.

Eighteen of 23 lakes in the Tennessee River system

monitored by TVA received good or fair health ratings in the report. Poor ratings on five lakes resulted primarily from low dissolved oxygen and nonpoint sources of pollution.

Nonpoint pollution, such as water runoff from farms and cities, is the single largest problem on the system, according to the report.

"We've come a long way since the first RiverPulse report last year," said TVA Chairman John Waters, who originally directed the report to the public because of his commitment to the river. "Public response has been overwhelmingly positive and clearly indicative of interest in water

quality information." Waters said TVA has implemented many of the public's suggestions in this year's report.

RiverPulse condenses results of about 8,000 tests each year to answer the three questions most often asked: Is it safe to swim? Is it safe to eat the fish? and What is the overall health of my lake?

While the Tennessee River is in good shape overall, Waters said, it has problems that need attention, such as nonpoint source pollution.

"TVA is committed to helping address these problems, but it will take a cooperative effort from government at all levels, industry and the public," said







HOUSE BILL NO. 1656 AN ACT TO AUTHORIZE A TWO PERCENT TOURIST TAX, SUBJECT TO REFERENDUM. TO BE LEVIED ON THE GROSS INCOME OF HOTEL AND MOTEL ROOM RENTALS IN TISHOMINGO COUNTY FOR THE PURPOSE OF PROVIDING FUNDS FOR THE PROMOTION OF TOURISM AND RETIREMENT IN THE COUNTY; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF **MISSISSIPPI:** 

SECTION 1. As used in this act, the term "hotel" or "motel" means any establishment engaged in the business of furnishing or providing rooms intended or designed for lodging or sleeping purposes for transient guests, which establishment consists of five (5) or more guests rooms and does not encompass any hospital, convalescent or nursing home, or sanitarium, or any hotel-like facility operated by or in connection with a hospital or medical clinic providing rooms exclusively for patients and their families.

SECTION 2. (1) For the purpose of providing funds for the promotion of tourism and retirement, the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, in its descretion, may levy, assess and collect from every person, firm and corporation operating a hotel or motel in Tishomingo County a tax that may be cited as a "tourist tax," which shall be in addition to all other taxes and assessments imposed by the county, as provided in this act.

(2) Such tax shall be an amount not to exceed two percent (2%) of the gross proceeds from room rentals of hotels and motels in the county, excluding charges for telephone, laundry and similar services. The tax shall not be levied upon or collected from





#### **ASCS FARM NEWS**

FARMERS RESPONSIBLE FOR STORED GRAIN

"Tishomingo County producers are totally responsible for maintaining the quality and quantity of more than 10,000 bushels of grain stored on their farms," Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) official Horn said.

Whether the grain is under regular price support loan, or in the grain reserve, Horn said it must be inspected regularly for insects, mold growth and other infestations year round.

In determining a producer's eligibility for price support loans or the reserve program ASCS considers the condition of both the storage structure and the grain stored within the structure. "Although the grain is approved for loan, any deterioration caused by insects or moisture is fully the farmer's responsibility," Horn said.

The market value of infested grain may be substantially reduced if the number of insectdamage kernels is sufficient to lower the grade of the grain. Discounts against the price paid per bushel are often assessed by the buyer if live insects are present in the grain.

Farm-stored grain should be inspected and probed at least once a month, and more often if problems arise, Horn said. "We encourage producers to be particularly alert to moisture and insect problems, and to take corrective measures when necessary.'

The ASCS official said producers who are in doubt as to the quality of farm-stored grain should contact the county ASCS office as soon as possible.
