Solid Waste Management Plans Approved For Area

On August 26, 1993, the Mississippi Commission on Environmental Quality approved the solid waste management plans for the Northeast Mississippi Regional Solid Waste Management Authority, the Three Rivers Regional Solid Waste Management Authority, and the Golden Triangle Regional Solid Waste Management Authority. All the plans were submitted to the Commission in 1992 and had been partially approved, but with the condition that they be revised to correct some deficiencies and to more clearly describe some aspects of the plans.

All three plans propose the construction of a single regional landfill to manage the residential, commercial, and much of the industrial solid wastes generated within each planning area. Each plan also recommends a system of transfer stations to haul the waste from individual cities and counties to the landfill. Additionally, yard waste and sewage

sludge composting facilities are proposed at the existing Tupelo, Columbus, and Starkville wastewater treatment plants. The portions of the plans that were approved in 1992 were related to the regional landfills, transfer stations, and composting facilities. The latest action of the Commission comes after other aspects of the plans were revised, including a management system for small quantities of waste tires and a strategy for reducing the amount of solid waste generated in each planning area by 25% by January 1, 1996.

Approval of these plans do not automatically clear the way for any proposed facilities to be constructed, as most still require that state permits be obtained from the Mississippi Environmental Quality Permit Board. The transfer stations do not require a state permit, but landfills and compost facilities will each require permits. The only permit application currently submitted to the Permit Board is for the regional landfill

proposed by the Three Rivers Regional Solid Waste Management Authority.

The Three Rivers planning area includes the counties of Calhoun, Itawamba, Lafayette, Lee, Monroe, Pontotoc, and Union. The Northeast Mississippi planning area includes Alcorn, Benton, Marshall, Prentiss, Tippah, and Tishomingo Counties. The Golden Triangle planning area includes Choctaw, Clay, Lowndes, Noxubee, Oktibbeha, Webster, and Winston Counties.

Any person aggrieved by the action of the Commission approving a solid waste plan may request that a hearing be conducted regarding the issuance of the approval order. Such a request must be made by submitting a sworn petition setting forth the grounds and reasons for the complaint to Mr. J.I. Palmer, Jr., Executive Director, Mississippi Department of Environmental Quality, P.O. Box 10385, Jackson, MS 39289-0385, no later than September 25, 1993.

Upcoming Activities At Teacher Resource Center

The Teacher Resource Center at NASA's Tri-State Education Initiative (TSEI) will offer 80 workshops and activities for area teachers of all grade levels and school administrators during the 1993-94 school year.

Several days are designated "Space Day" at the Teacher Resource Center. This school year, 20 third-grade teachers will have the opportunity to bring their students to the NASA/TSEI Teacher Resource Center for a field trip on Space Day, which will consist of learning activities in math and science and language

areas and will include time for each student in one of the TSEI computer learning centers. Scheduling for these activities is on a first-come, first-serve basis.

Other workshops scheduled for the upcoming school year are science workshops featuring easy science experiments, a workshop honoring women in space, a workshop on how to use technology to teach English, a thematic space make-and-take workshop and a workshop which discusses Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder for teachers of kindergarten through

sixth grade.

Cooperative Learning in the Classroom will provide teachers of grades five through eight with activities that allow students to work cooperatively in small groups. Preventing School Failure, another helpful workshop, will be offered for teachers of grades five through eight.

The Teacher Resource Center is also offering several computer workshops, such as Introduction to PCs, Internet Basics, Macintosh Basics, DOS Fundamentals, Using your Macintosh as a Teaching Tool, Apple Workshop, Print your Own Newspaper, Computer Applications for School Administrators and other informative workshops.

The Tri-State Education Initiative's Teacher Resource Center can custom tailor workshops to suit specific educational needs. In addition to the workshops offered each school year, the Teacher Resource Center offers a wide variety of free instructional materials, including slides, videotapes, printed materials and lesson plans. Subjects range from geography and meteorology to astronomy and environmental science.

The one-day workshops featuring scientists, engineers and educators are free of charge; however reservations are required due to limited seating. They are scheduled from 8:30 a.m. until 3 p.m.

Arrests Made In School Break-in

Three suspects were arrested Friday night, September 3, and charged with breaking and entering and grand larceny in connection with an August break-in at Burnsville School.

Shane Burkeens, 20, of Burnsville and two juveniles were arrested and charged with the burglary which occurred about a month ago, according to Tishomingo County Sheriff Johnny S. Nunley.

Approximately \$8,000 worth of property was stolen during the break-in. Items taken included computers and food items. Some of the items have been recovered, Sheriff Nunley stated.

The juveniles, ages 16 and 17,

were released into the custody of their parents, while Burkeens remained in the Tishomingo County Jail at press time on \$10,000 bond. While executing the warrant, law officials found satanic cult materials in the suspect's possession, Nunley said.

*** In an unrelated case, Sheriff Nunley reported that a Burnsville man was arrested Wednesday, September 1, on charges of possession of marijuana, over an ounce, at his Leedy community home. The department's new drug dog was used in finding the illegal substance. The suspect is out on bond, Nunley said.

Booneville Man Arrested In Area Burglaries

A Booneville man was arrested Friday, September 3, in connection with two residential burglaries while another suspect is being sought in the case.

According to Tishomingo County Sheriff Johnny S. Nunley, Rodney Leslie, 18, 108 Lake St., Booneville, was arrested Friday and charged with two counts of burglary and two counts of grand larceny in connection with break-ins Thursday, September 2, at a residence in the midway community and another

in the Mingo community.

A warrant has been issued for a second suspect also wanted in the break-ins.

Among the items stolen were televisions, VCR's, telephones, tapes and other household items, Nunley stated. Some of the items have been recovered and efforts are being made by the law enforcement officials to find the other stolen property, Nunley said.

At press time, Leslie was being held at the Tishomingo County Jail on \$25,000 bond.

Tennessee Man Dies In Diving Accident

A Tennessee man was pronounced dead at the scene Sunday evening, September 5, after he dove into Pickwick Lake, in Tishomingo County, and suffered a broken neck.

Tishomingo County Sheriff Johnny S. Nunley said that Joseph L. King, 27, 6219 Lochlevin Cove, Memphis,

Tenn., and a companion, Cindy Whitehead, 3074 Atmore, Memphis, Tenn., were boating near Goat Island when King dove in to the shallow water and apparently broke his neck.

The couple were unaware of the shallowness of the water, the Sheriff explained. The accident occurred around 5:30 p.m. Sunday, reports indicated.

Unemployment In County Drops To 6.2 Percent

According to Charles Smith, Manager of the Mississippi State Employment Service, unemployment in Tishomingo County dropped to its lowest point this year in mid-July, 6.2 percent. This compares to 8.2 percent in June and 11.4 percent in July, 1992.

The civilian labor force for the county number 8,450, 10 less

than June, and 330 less than July one year ago. Approximately 7,930 Tishomingo County residents held jobs in mid-July and 520 were unemployed.

Manufacturing jobs in the county numbered 3,190, 30 more than June and 80 less than July one year ago. Nonmanufacturing jobs numbered 3,730, 20 more than June and 150 more than July of last year.

CARPENTER ANTS

Have you ever noticed a pile of material appearing on your window sill...What is it? where is it coming from? what is causing it?...is it hurting your wall?

Based on several samples that have been submitted to Mississippi State, this material is composed of insect parts (wings, heads, legs, etc.), fecal droppings, chewed wood, silk covered objects, in some cases chewed insulation board and general debris.

The insect parts represent a number of insects, however, a number of these parts can be recognized as ants. These will be heads, wings or in some cases whole ants. I have not been able to confirm this but the silk covered objects may be pupae which died and were carried from

the colony. Based on this you are probably dealing with a carpenter ant colony.

The black carpenter (*Camponotus pennsylvanicus*) ant is probably the most familiar ant in the group, however, there are at least four other species which are common to the State. These are *Camponotus*, *caryae* discolor, *Camponotus rasilis*, *Camponotus castaneus* and the red carpenter ant, *Camponotus ferrugineus*.

These ants range in size from 3 to 13 millimeters (1/8 to 1/2 inch). The red and black vary from the middle to the upper end of the range while the other species vary in size from the middle to the lower end of the range.

These ants excavate wood for the purposes of nest building and do not consume wood as do termites. Their diet varies from sweets, such as honeydew, to other insects and small critters which they catch. These insects have a complete metamorphosis (egg, larva, pupa and adult). Based on biology studies with the black carpenter ant it takes 66 days for the cycle to go from egg

to adult.

Carpenter ants can gain access to homes through a variety of openings in the walls. Some of these might include openings around wires or pipes, weep holes in brick, cracks at wall joints, the junction of brick and wooden components, attic louvers, soffit vents, decayed areas or similar openings. The opening may be some distance (10 to 20 feet or more) from the actual colony area. The ants prefer wood which has been softened from decay, or damaged by other insect activity, however, once they become established they may move into sound wood.

Colony location is the primary concern in a control program. It's much like fire ant control: if you don't kill the queen, colony development will continue. The first clue would be the nest debris mentioned above. The next step would be to determine access to the house. Under some conditions carpenter ants will forage at night and it may take several trips around the house by the homeowner after dark to determine the opening(s) that are being used.

Another area to investigate is the attic directly above where the nest debris is deposited. You might be able to follow ants into the colony by checking this along electrical wiring or rafters. A final point is to listen for the sound produced by workers as they gnaw at the wood to expand the nest area. Again, this would probably be more noticeable at night.

Once the nest is located a crack and crevice application is going to be the application technique of choice and this is a weakness in the homeowner market. Most sprays available to the homeowner are in aerosols or in ready-to-use products and neither formulation nor packing system is conducive to making a crack and crevice application. Some choices are Ortho Home Pest Control RTU (chlorpyrifos 0.5%), aerosols containing cyfluthrin (Rain and other manufacturers), or Bengal Roach Spray (phenothrin). This latter spray may not be real good on ants, however, it does have a wand which can be attached to the discharge port and when attached it can be used as a crack and crevice spray. Remember next location is the number on objective.

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COLORBLINDNESS EXPLAINED

The term color blindness is really a misnomer, since true color blindness is a rarity, occurring in about one of every 40,000 people. Color deficiency, on the other hand, is much more prevalent. This deficiency can be caused either by certain types of color cones being absent from the retina, or else the information they gather is not sent properly to the brain.

The most common type of defect is red-green color blindness. If red cones are absent, light stimulates only the green cones, creating a strong green sensation. If green cones are absent, the reverse occurs.

Color blindness is inherited. It is much more likely to affect males than females. While many persons so affected are able to cope with problems such as traffic lights, by remembering which color is highest, others are denied jobs which call for acute color discrimination. Recently, a special type of contact lens has been developed to aid the most common form of color blindness.

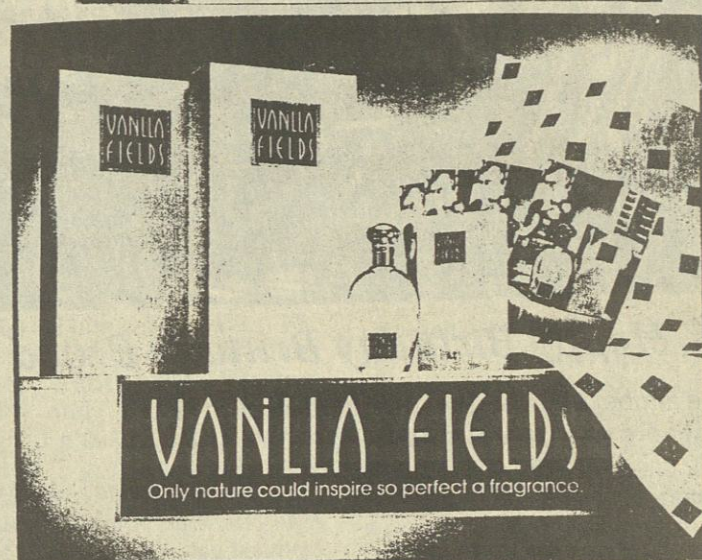
presence in the Adriatic Sea off the coast of the former Republic of Yugoslavia in support of Operation Provide Promise and Operation Deny Flight.

NMMC To Hold Basic CISD Training Workshop

NMMC is concerned about the health of people trained to handle emergency situations and is implementing Critical Incident Stress Debriefing (CISD) to lessen the overall impact of a traumatic event and accelerate recovery in normal people who are having normal reactions to abnormal events.

Northeast Mississippi and Nor-

thwest Alabama resident will learn more about CISD when NMMC offers workshop September 9-10 featuring Jeffrey Mitchell, Ph.D., an emergency health services clinical associate professor at the University of Maryland. Mitchell developed the CISD process which is utilized by more than 300 communities throughout the U.S.

CISD involves people who respond to emergencies and critical care situations. These per-

sonnel encounter highly stressful events almost everyday, and sometimes an event is so traumatic or overwhelming that emergency responders may experience significant stress reactions. These are known as "critical incidents".

The basic CISD training is open to anyone wishing to know more about crisis intervention strategies for emergency personnel. Emergency services workers, mental health professionals, policemen and firemen are typical participants in the training.

"We will develop crisis services for distressed emergency and critical care personnel through pre-incident stress education and a volunteer network of mental

health and peer support professionals specifically training in CISD techniques and procedures," said Rev. Ron Richardson, NMMC CISD committee chairman.

The two-day workshop will be held in the NMMC Wellness Center Auditorium and is \$30 per participant. For more information or to preregister, call Richardson at 841-3439.

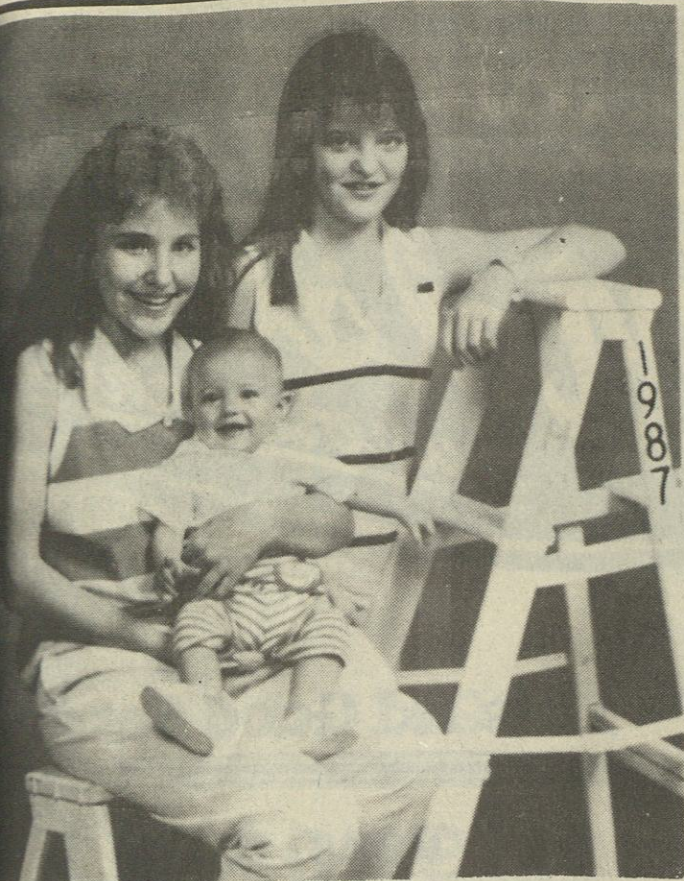

Local Teachers Participating In Program....

Six teachers from the Tri-State Education Initiative region were selected to participate in a NASA-funded education program involving high performance supercomputing. The teachers involved in the High Performance Supercomputing Program for High School Teachers and Students are Allen Bruce, Adamsville High School, Adamsville, Tenn.; Steve Cain, Belmont High School, Belmont, MS; Maxine Henson, Alcorn Central High School, Corinth, MS; Anice Jones, Kossuth High School, Corinth; Bobby Lowery, Tishomingo Co. High School, Iuka, Miss.; and Ed Settle, Biggersville High School, Corinth. These six teachers have been attending classes at the University of Alabama in Huntsville to learn more about supercomputers and how they can be used in their classrooms.

The High Performance Supercomputing program for High School Teachers and Students is designed to promote excellence in America's education system by enhancing and expanding the interest and competency of teachers and students in science and mathematics through hands-on experience in high performance computing and communications.

The program teams a math/computer teacher with a science teacher so the teachers can design a science course which relies on math skills for computing data relevant to that subject matter. This program is the first of many steps expected to be taken by American schools toward preparing students for the move from an industrial to an informational and technologically innovative society.

Classrooms using the supercomputing program will have access to Internet, a global network, which will allow students to access the entire world without leaving their classrooms. Local students will use the supercomputing network and digital communication in their day-to-day lessons.

Following the training sessions, a regional training center will be established within the teachers' school systems. Teachers like Bruce, Cain, Henson, Jones, Lowery and Settle will then train other teachers to employ supercomputers in the development of their subject areas.

Educators Participate In NASA Programs

As part of NASA's ongoing commitment to enhance education nationwide, 14 educators from the Tri-State Education Initiative area have been participating in two educational programs at the Marshall Space Flight Center (MSFC), Huntsville, Ala. The two programs are the Summer Teacher Enrichment Program (STEP) and the Community College Enhancement Program (CCEP).

STEP provides an opportunity for middle, junior high and high school math and science teachers to gain experience in the scientific work place by working with a NASA mentor in a laboratory. They also have the chance to develop educational activities and products that they can take back to their classrooms.

The eight teachers from the tri-state region who participated in STEP this summer were Roger Cowan, Ripley High School, Ripley, Miss.; Jerry Hughes, Belmont High School, Belmont, Miss.; Patsy Johnson, Booneville High School, Booneville, Miss.; James MacArthur, McNairy Central High School, Selmer, Tenn.; Chris McWilliams,

Cherokee Middle School, Cherokee, Ala.; Royce Neidert, Loretto High School, Loretto, Tenn.; Larry Russell, Adamsville Junior/Senior High School, Adamsville, Tenn.; and Pam Thompson, East Lawrence High School, Trinity, Ala.

The objectives of the CCEP are to develop knowledge of math and science utilization in NASA labs to contribute to the research and analysis objectives at NASA's Marshall Space Flight Center, and to develop a course in aerospace technology to be taught at community colleges. The participants spent eight weeks at MSFC this summer working with other community college faculty members to achieve these objectives.

Some of the participants from the tri-state region in this summer's CCEP were James Bonner and Thomas Howard, Shoals Community College, Muscle Shoals, Ala.; and Joni Brooks and Fred Kirk, Columbia State Community College, Columbia, Tenn.

Child Find Publicity Campaign

The Tishomingo County Special Municipal Separate School District is participating in an ongoing statewide effort to identify, locate, and evaluate children through the age of twenty-one who have a physical, mental, communicative and/or emotional disability. Early identification of children in need of special educational experiences is most important to each child. Furthermore, this informative information gathered from contacts with parents and other agencies will be used to help determine present and future appropriate public education to all children with a disability.

Information which could identify an individual child will be maintained by this agency and will be provided to other agencies in accordance with the Family Rights and Privacy Act and 20 U.S.C. 12301. As a parent, you are guaranteed the right to inspect and to challenge the accuracy of such information about your child and to challenge its accuracy. Access to this information is forbidden to an unauthorized person without informed consent. If you have

questions regarding the collection, maintenance and use of the data about your child, please contact Betty Barnes, Child Find Director for the Tishomingo County Special Municipal Separate School District by calling 438-7471 or writing to her at the following address: The Education Center, P.O. Box 98, Tishomingo, MS 38873.

The Child Find Director implements child identification, location and evaluation of children birth through twenty-one who have disabilities, regardless of the severity of their disability, and who are in need of special education and/or related services. The Child Find Director works with the local Headstart, Welfare, Health and Mental Health agencies, as well as local education agencies, physicians and other individuals to identify and locate children out of school and in school who may be in need of special education services.

Once a referral is made, it is the responsibility of the Child Find Director to insure that the Referral-to-Placement procedures are followed. The director works with Local Survey

Committees at each school to implement this procedure. The following activities briefly describe the procedures.

Prior to evaluation, a copy of the Parent Information Pamphlet and Procedural Safeguards are given to parents. District Personnel explain the Parent Information Pamphlet to parents and insure that they understand the Procedural Safeguards.

After parental consent for testing is obtained, a non-discriminatory evaluation is conducted. Students are evaluated in all areas related to the suspected disability by personnel.

Parents are notified when a student is ruled eligible for a special education program. An Individual Educational Plan is developed for the student before the student is placed. Parents must sign permission for placement. Parents, teachers, and students participate in this process. All students receiving special education services are reassessed at least once a year and reevaluated at least once every three years.

We now have twenty-five special education classes in our district which serve students who have physical, mental, communicative and/or emotional disabilities. It is the goal of the Tishomingo County School District to provide free appropriate education to all children with disabilities through age twenty-one by the year 2000.

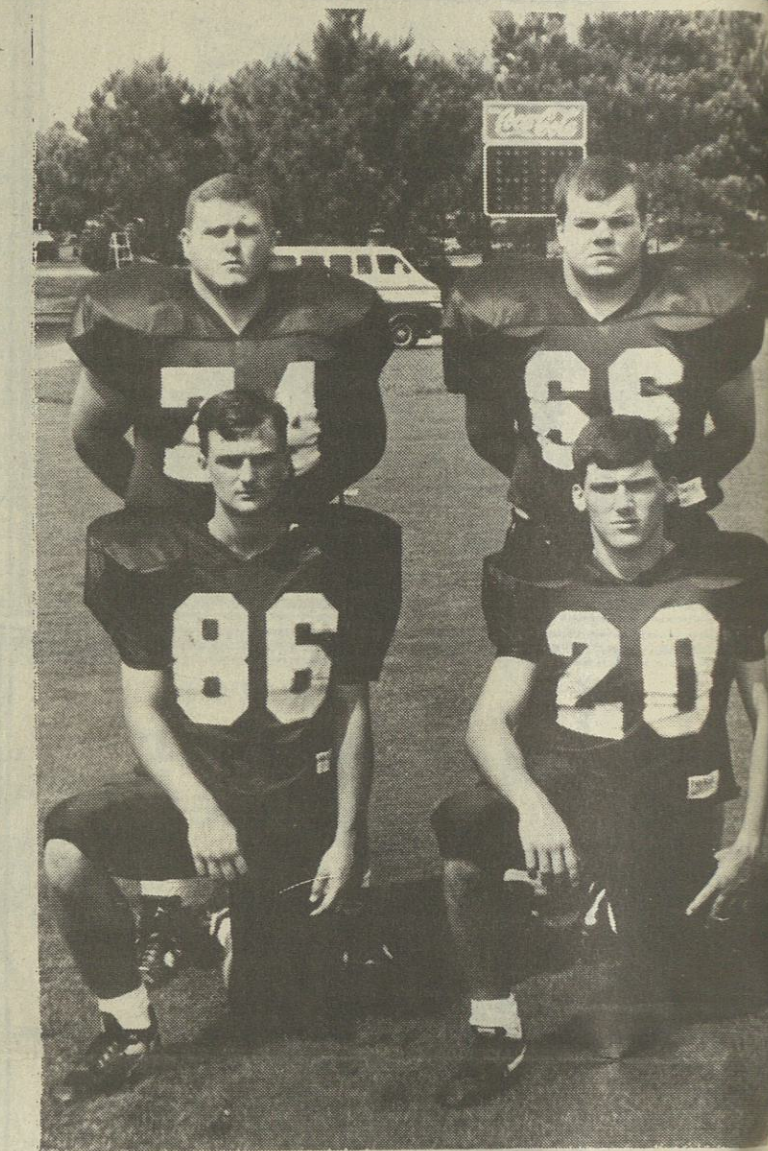

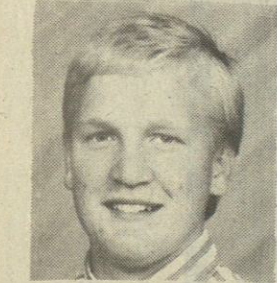
Coach Hurley enjoys weight lifting motorcycle riding, and anything to do with church. Coach Hurley's wife's name is Suzanne.

State & Local Prenatal & Infant Care Stats Released

Mississippi produces one of the highest percentages of low-birthweight babies in the nation. Birthrates to Mississippi teenagers are the highest in the country, and no state records a more excessive rate of infant mortality.

Birth statistics for Tishomingo County, as recorded in the latest edition of the Mississippi Healthy Futures County Data Book, indicated that babies in Tishomingo County have no better chance for survival than they did nine years ago. The statistics showed that more babies in Tishomingo County are likely to die in their first month of life than in the state as a whole. This

is not good considering the state, as a whole, has the worst infant death rates in the nation.

On a more positive note, 84 percent of mothers in the county do begin prenatal care early in their pregnancy (within the first three months). This early care lowers the number of babies born at low birthweights (under 5 1/2 lbs.)

In order to improve the infant death statistics in Tishomingo County, better health care for infants during their first year of life is needed.

According to the 1990 census, Tishomingo County had a total population of 17,683 with an average per capita income of \$8,735, ranking it 37th in the state (out of 82). The county's average births per year were 220. Children below the age of 5 made up 30.6 percent of the county's population.

ASCS Farm News

1990, 1991, and 1992 Crop Quality Adjustments

On August 12, 1993, President Clinton signed Public Law 103-75 which provides disaster assistance for crop quality losses which occurred as a result of damaging weather conditions during 1990, 1991, 1992. Crops eligible for quality loss adjustments were recently announced and include wheat, oats, barley, corn, grain sorghum, upland cotton, ELS cotton, rice, peanuts, soybeans, sunflowers, sugar beets, and tobacco. Funds used to make 1990-1992 crop quality adjustments will be the remaining funds from Phase I, II and III disaster program appropriations. If requested benefits for 1990-1992 quality adjustments exceed the funds available, a national factor will be determined and applied to each crop's calculated payment.

The deadline for filing a request for a 1990-1992 crop quality adjustment is September 17, 1993. There are not provisions for a late-filed application; therefore, it is critical for the farm operator and/or producer sharing in the crop to the County ASCS Office and file an application for a 1990, 1991, and/or a 1992 crop quality adjustment before the September 17 deadline.

To be eligible for a quality loss adjustment, production evidence must be submitted to determine the grade of the commodity

which will determine the percentage of adjustment allowed. If production evidence does not show a grade but grading factors are shown, then ASCS will use the grading factors to determine the grade. If production evidence does not show the grade or grading factors and there is evidence of a sale, load summary or assembly sheet, then it will be the responsibility of the producer to contact the buyer, warehouse, or delivery point to provide documentation of the grade delivered. If the producer has no production evidence or the production was appraised and the commodity cannot be sampled, then a grade will be assigned based on the average grades of similar farms. Acceptable production evidence for 1990-92 quality adjustments must be submitted by October 8, 1993.

Producers who had quality problems during any of the crop years 1990, 1991, or 1992 should contact their County ASCS Office for additional information on quality adjustments and potential additional disaster program benefits.

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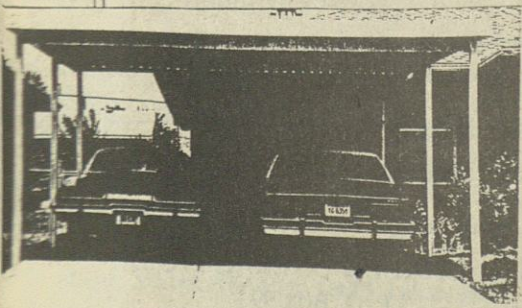

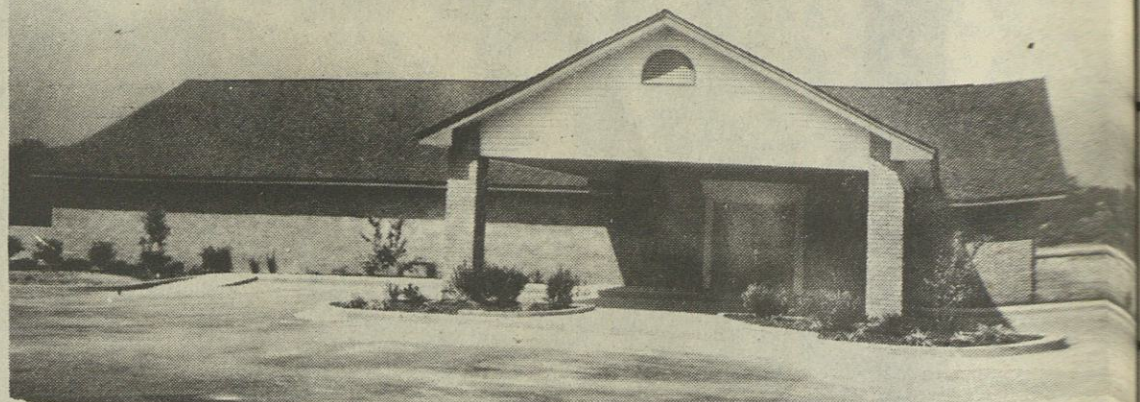

Many of the same workers who traveled to Iuka and the other 50 Quick Builds will travel to Amory next month in order to assist fellow witnesses in the completion of their building project. Members of the Iuka congregation are also among the workers who freely give of their time and resources in order to build new Kingdom Halls in other parts of Mississippi and Louisiana. Due to the fact that 8 new congregations of Jehovah's Witnesses are formed every week worldwide, new Kingdom Halls such as this one are required in order to accommodate the new ones.

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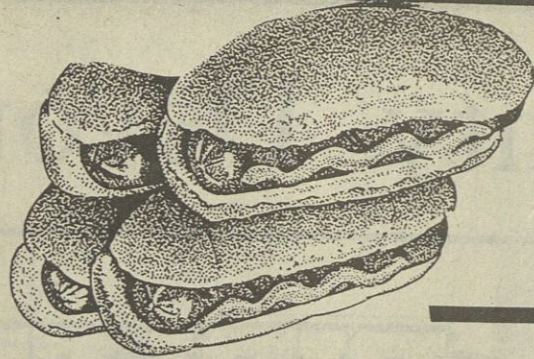
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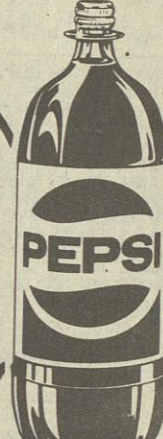
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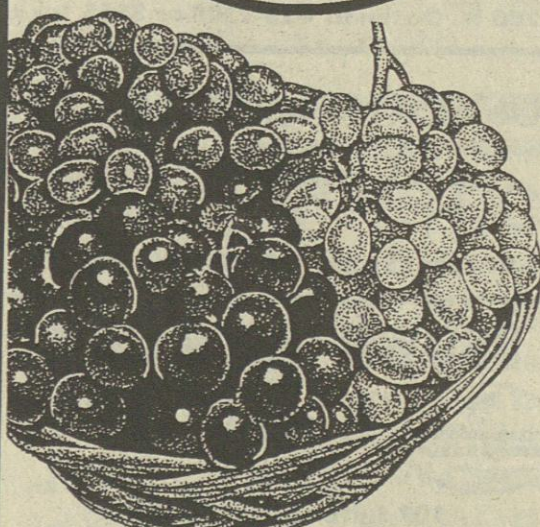
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Iuka Rotary Club Purchases Historic Marker For Church

The Iuka Rotary Club recently provided the funds for the purchase of a historic marker sign to be placed in front of the Episcopal Church of Our Savior, located on Eastport Street in Iuka. The new sign commemorates the placing of the church on the National Register of Historic Places and the receiving of an award of merit for restoration by the Mississippi Historic Society.

The church was purchased in 1985 from the Episcopal Diocese of Mississippi by Iuka Heritage, a non-profit corporation formed by a group of local citizens concerned about the preservation of the edifice. 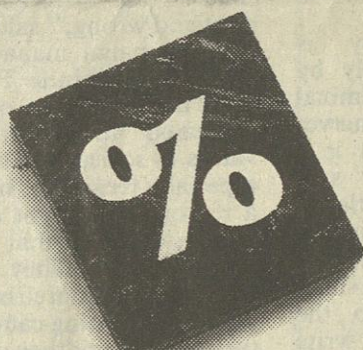

Shaping Children's Values

Where Do We Start?

Kids and violence, gangs, drugs in schools, confusions that school children have about sex, children giving birth to children--these all add up to a terrifying social reality. We are faced with a generation spinning wildly out of control.

The majority of youngsters are now affected. According to a survey by the Joseph & Edna Josephson Institute of Ethics, 61% of all high school students say they have cheated on an exam once or more during the last year. As well, 33% admit to having stolen from relatives at least once in the last year.

Whether it is kids owning guns to threaten and, on occasion, kill their classmates, whether it is high school students joining in "Spur Posse" games that keep track of how many different sexual conquests the players can rack up, or whether it is simply lying and cheating, these are all the symptoms of one fundamental disease--the moral decay in society.

Or perhaps moral decay is the wrong way to describe it. More factually, at least where our children are concerned, the biggest problem since the 1970s has been the utter lack of instruction in morals and values in our schools. The idea back then was that children should grow on their own and should be encouraged simply to decide for themselves what they should believe.

"(This was) based on a materialistic idea that the development of the child parallels the evolutionary history of the race; that in some magical way, unexplained, the 'nerves' of the child will 'ripen' as he or she grows older and the result will be a moral, well-behaving adult," author and humanitarian L. Ron Hubbard pointed out in the widely distributed booklet "The Way To Happiness."

"Although the theory is disproven with ease--simply by noticing the large criminal population whose nerves somehow did not ripen--it is a lazy way to raise children," said Hubbard. "A child is a little bit like a blank slate. If you write the wrong things on it, it will say the wrong things. But, unlike a slate, a child can begin to do the writing: the child tends to write what has been written already."

Today, the good news is that schools are beginning to get back into the character development business in a big way. In this, they have the overwhelming support of parents. A 1992 study showed 86% of Americans favored schools teaching moral values while only 12% were against the idea.

However, working out the best

way to build character and to instill important values in our children still lies ahead. We have learned in recent decades that recognizing problems in our school system does not mean that these problems are easily fixed.

There are a number of ideas about the best way to teach moral values to children in the classroom. Some schools have started to use videos that show the terrible consequences of dishonesty, intolerance and crime. One, for instance, starts out with the vivid, highly dramatic street arrest of a teenager.

In another approach, Kevin Ryan of Boston University has developed a school curriculum that makes character education part of everyday teaching. This relies on different works of literature to impart ethical values.

Many school systems are developing their own curriculums that focus on such things as civic responsibility, respect for oneself and for others and respect for the natural environment.

However, whether any of these approaches will work is still open to question. "Effective moral teaching, or character education as it is sometimes called, involves more than simply teaching children the difference between right and wrong," said Glen Horton, campaign manager of The Way To Happiness Foundation, a non-profit organization dedicated to restoring moral values in society. "Children, and especially teenagers, need to have a reason to do right and not do wrong, a reason that makes real sense to them. They have to be motivated by more than the simple fear of getting caught because they never think they will."

For almost a decade, The Way To Happiness Foundation has distributed "The Way To Happiness" booklet to a growing number of schools, civic groups, parents and children across the country. Horton said that because the booklet outlines moral values completely based on common sense, children respond to the publication in an en-

thusiastic and dramatic way. They learn that right conduct is the only road to building happy and successful lives for themselves, both now and in the future.

"The Way To Happiness" is the vital educational tool that has been missing in the large majority of our schools," said Horton. "For several years now, the booklet has been working to instill moral values and build real character in the few schools where it has been included as part of the curriculum. In the classroom setting, it has a track record of resounding success. So why not simply include the booklet in more of our school curriculums?"

"It would be a tragedy if another generation was lost while school systems experimented with various approaches to character education. We need something our children will respond to now, not in 10 or 20 years time. From all the evidence I have seen, that something already exists--'The Way To Happiness.'"

Justice Department Ok's Election Law Changes....

Portions of a new state law affecting absentee voting in Mississippi have been approved by the U.S. Justice Department.

Specifically, the approval puts into effect a provision to greater safeguard against fraud, a recurring problem statewide. The provision would ban hand-delivery of absentee ballots, thus requiring absentee ballots either to be voted in the courthouse or delivered by mail to the person who requests the ballot.

Other changes now law are: -Permitting absentee voting by people who are working during

polling hours (7 a.m. to 7 p.m.) or who will be out of their county on election day for any reason, such as vacationers and college students.

-Voting absentee in the courthouse 45 days prior to any election, or as soon as the ballots are printed. (Previously, the earliest an eligible person could vote absentee in the courthouse was 15 days prior to an election.)

-Authorizing voter registrars to accept absentee ballot requests by telephone. (Previously, only mail or in-person applications were authorized.)

-Faxing absentee ballot applications to the registrar by military voters out of the country.

Secretary of State Dick Molpus, whose Election Reform Task Force proposed these changes stated, "This is a good first-step to preventing fraud and abuse, two very serious concerns. Also, this law will finally give all eligible citizens a way to vote, even though they will be away from home on election day."

REUSE ITEMS TO REDUCE THE WASTE STREAM

We all make choices that impact the amount of waste we produce. Reusing various items often will reduce the amount of waste to be disposed. Reuse also will help conserve energy and raw materials which were used in their production. The following is a list of suggestions which relate to reuse of items.

Make a "waste-reduction kit" of twist ties, paper bags and plastic bags. Take this kit along when you go shopping.

Save plastic tubs from prepared foods. Use as containers for storing leftovers.

Make a compost. Reuse your food and garden wastes in a compost pile.

Use and reuse plastic dinnerware for picnics and parties. Reuse scrap paper that's printed on one side. Use the blank side for phone messages or notes.

After you have read a magazine, give it to someone else to read, such as friends, nursing homes, hospitals, schools, doctor's waiting rooms or the library.

Save used gift wrap, and use it again on a smaller package.

Cut old bedding, draperies and clothes into pieces for rags, or use them in braided rugs or patchwork designs.

Remove nails and hardware from used lumber so it can be reused in smaller projects. Lumber that is not painted or treated can be safely used for firewood.

Broken concrete and bricks can be used for rough retaining walls and for walkways and patios.

Have a yard sale or donate unwanted household items, clothes and appliances that are still usable to friends and charitable organizations. You can sell them through classified ads, community bulletin boards, consignment shops or garage sales. Low prices sell faster.

Buy used products and goods when they will do the job as well as a new item. They cost less, and reusing them helps reduce the wastes created and conserves energy and raw materials.

Be creative and think of ways of reuse and recycle. Search out people who can use items or materials you no longer need.

There are two basic ways of behaving which determine to a large extent whether or not you have friends. They can be called "inclusion" or "exclusion" behaviors. To have friends, you must include others in the things which are going on in your life. When you exclude people, you leave them out of your life and don't give them the opportunity to be a friend.

If you are a people watcher, you can observe at least five different ways people are excluded by others:

-By withdrawing - walking away, turning away, refusing to sit by someone.

-By criticizing - expressing displeasure with a person's ideas, actions, looks or anything else about the person.

-By ignoring - acting as if you don't see someone, don't hear them speak to you, don't acknowledge their requests, don't listen.

By rejecting - rejecting their ideas, beliefs or values by

frowning, glaring or looking disgusted.

-By withholding - keeping to ourselves information, expressions of love or praise.

These are losing behaviors. Winning behaviors, on the other hand, cause people to include each other. The five major ways which you can include others are:

-By identifying - looking for things you have in common with another person. You may have had common experiences or common problems. You may also have some common needs.

-By accepting - respect the right of others to their own ideas, preferences and behaviors even if they are different from yours. Walking with, talking with and touching someone are accepting behaviors.

-By listening - active listening is

a winning behavior. By leaning toward the person talking, nodding and looking at the speaker, you let the other person know you are interested.

By approving - in giving approval, we look for ways to give sincere praise to other people, to let them know that we like them or like what they are doing.

By sharing - sharing brings people closer together. We can share our ideas, our hopes and dreams and our fears. We can also share our possessions with someone.

Practice these winning behaviors with your friends or with someone you would like to be your friend. With practice, these things will become automatic and will help you become a better friend to those who care about you.
