

Funeral Services Today For Charles A. Daugherty, 79



Charles A. Daugherty, the longtime owner of Main Street, died Tuesday morning, September 21, following five decades of barbering and a 2 year illness. He was 79.

Mr. Daugherty's retirement in 1991, Daugherty's Barber Shop was a town fixture, where you could get a shave, a haircut or two-bits' worth of critical wisdom. In days long past, a hot shower also was available on Saturdays.

"Charlie" wore white and a tie to oversee the four-chair operation begun by his father, C. Daugherty, in 1912. When he passed two years ago, Daugherty's Barber Shop was the oldest continuous business in Iuka and had survived three locations. Charlie cut his first hair in 1928 as a teenager, and he eventually bought the business from his father in 1967.

Mr. Daugherty was enterprising all his life, harvesting a load of pine knots to buy his high school class ring and commuting to Florence State Teachers College for two years and receiving a teaching certificate.

At various times during his youth, he taught school at Snowdown, fired a freight train for Southern Railroad, ran a taxi company, worked for Reynolds Metals and the Tennessee Valley Authority.

At age 18, an adventurous Charlie set out for Oklahoma and bookkeeping job, but a greyhound bus hit his car enroute and Charlie's neck was broken. There was a long and painful recovery.

But Charles Daugherty's true love was barbering, and he took pride in smooth shaves and low prices. His little shop on East Main became a gathering place, the best source for a new joke, a sports score or a shrewd political analysis.

Mr. Daugherty taught a men's Sunday School class at Iuka United Methodist Church for 20 years. He enjoyed fishing, talking and swore by the health benefits of the water from Mineral Springs Park.

Services will be at 11 a.m. Thursday at Cutshall Funeral Home Chapel with the Rev. W.T.

Dexter officiating. Burial will be in the Oak Grove Cemetery.

Survivors include his wife, Ruth Daugherty of Iuka; two daughters, Kathy Gurley of Huntsville, Ala., and Jo Ann Jones of Birmingham, Ala.; one son, Turner Gene Williams of Corinth; one sister, Daisy Biggs of Iuka; two brothers, L.D. Daugherty and Earl Daugherty, both of Iuka; six grandchildren, two great-grandchildren.

Pallbearers will be Sammy Parsons, Harold Lomenick, Jason Gurley, John Dennis Daugherty, Butch Daugherty and Jimmy McVay.

Special Board Meeting Results

The Iuka Municipal 1994 Budget passed during a special meeting of the city board Wednesday, September 15.

According to City Clerk Benny Gray, the city board met at approximately 3 p.m. Wednesday to consider the city's 1994 budget. James Bates was acting-Mayor and presided over the meeting in the absence of Mayor David Nichols. Nichols was out of town during the time of the meeting, Gray confirmed. The budget passed unanimously, Gray said. A copy of the 1994 budget is scheduled to appear in next week's edition of the News.

He also said that the board voted to keep the city's millage rate at 12.75, the same as it is presently. Aldermen Baker, Dean and Booker voted to keep the millage rate the same, without an increase, while Alderwoman Young voted against letting it remain as-is.

Dennis Man Sentenced After Pleading Guilty To Bribing Local Official

Other Guilty Pleas Accepted In Circuit Court

Tishomingo County Circuit Court was productive last week seeing guilty pleas and sentencing on charges of bribery, grand larceny, armed robbery and burglary.

Court action taken during the regular September term of Circuit Court included the following:

*Earl Wayne Robinson, 51, Route 1, Dennis pleaded guilty to two counts of bribing a public official. Robinson was originally charged with nine counts of bribing Tishomingo County Sheriff Johnny S. Nunley. He was arrested during an undercover drug investigation by Nunley on Feb. 7, 1993. The investigation was aided by the Mississippi Bureau of Narcotics. Nunley went undercover and accepted the bribes from Robinson during the drug investigation. Robinson pleaded guilty as a habitual offender to additional charges of possession of more than an ounce of marijuana. On this charge he was sentenced to serve three years in prison without parole or probation. On the bribery charges, he was sentenced to 10 years to run consecutively to the three year sentence. Ten additional years sentenced for the second count of bribery was suspended pending future good behavior. Robinson must serve at least six years before being eligible for parole, according to Assistant District Attorney Jim Pounds.

*James Robert Childers, 23, 1013 East St., Tuscumbia, Ala., pleaded guilty to the armed robbery of Casabella Trailer Park

Convenience Store. Childers robbed the store, located on Coleman Park Road about one mile south of NASA's ASRM plant, using a shotgun. He left the establishment with \$178.05, but was caught about four hours later by Tishomingo County authorities. Childers was sentenced to serve three years in prison without parole or probation.

*Jason Rhear, 20, of Iuka, pleaded guilty to grand larceny in connection with the theft of jet skis from Bennett Yacht Sales on Highway 25 N. near the Mississippi/Tennessee State line. He was sentenced to two years of supervised probation under the expungement act and was fined \$500 and ordered to pay \$900 restitution, jointly or separately, with three other defendants. The expungement act allows all criminal records to be erased if Rhear successfully completes the conditions of his probation period.

*Tommy Hargett, 36, Route 3, Blue Springs, pleaded guilty as a habitual offender to grand larceny in connection with the theft of a vehicle owned by Jimmy Lindsey. He was sentenced to serve five years in prison without probation or parole. He also pleaded guilty to two more counts of grand larceny, burglary and larceny of a dwelling in Lee County. On these charges Hargett was sentenced to five years to run concurrently with the Tishomingo County sentence and 10 consecutive years on the Lee County charges, however it was suspended pending future good behavior.

Expansion Underway At Belmont Homes

Belmont Homes, a homeowned and operated manufactured home builder, is in the process of expanding its facility by about 80,000 sq. ft.

According to Gerald Kennedy, Belmont Homes President, they hope to build their first home in the new addition before Christmas.

Initially the expansion will call for an increase of about 80 to 100 new employees, Kennedy stated. The business presently employs between 425 to 430 workers.

Belmont Homes started in 1988 with approximately 75 workers. It is fast becoming one of the county's largest employers.

"We are proud of the progress we have made," Kennedy said. "We have been fortunate to have had the cooperation of the city officials, the Mayor and Supervisors from this part of the county. Their help has been instrumental."

Tishomingo County Development Foundation Director Mack Wadkins said that Belmont Homes has been good not only for their community, but also for the entire county. "They offer a good product, provide jobs with good pay and benefits. We wish them continued success," Wadkins said.

Home Economics Tips

**INGREDIENT LABELS:
WHAT THE NEW ONES WILL
TELL YOU**

New federal labeling regulations are changing food labels. Some of the changes affects ingredient labels on food packages.

Ingredients specified on labels are required to be listed in descending order of predominance by weight. The first ingredient on the label is the major ingredient, the second major component, and so on.

For example, a canned beef stew that lists "Water, tomatoes, beef..." on the ingredient list would contain more water (by weight) than any other ingredient. If the label stated "Beef, water, tomatoes...", then beef would be the predominant ingredient in the can.

Previously, the ingredient label was required on all food package labels except those that had a "standard of identity." Under the new law, that exemption has been eliminated.

Foods with a "standard of identity" were familiar foods, once commonly prepared in the home. Manufacturers had to follow prescribed "recipes" if they were to call their products by certain common names.

Some of the foods with "standard of identity" were dairy products, mayonnaise, ketchup, salad dressing and orange juice. This change will allow you to determine almost all the ingredients in foods.

Besides eliminating the "standard of identity," FDA-certified color additives (artificial colors that must be approved by the Food and Drug Administration

for use in foods) must be listed by name on ingredient labels (except for on butter, cheese and ice cream).

Formerly, these additives were simply called "colorings" on labels. Color additives that do not have to be certified by FDA (such as caramel, paprika and beet juice) do not have to be listed by name, but "artificial color added" or another equally informative term must be used to show there is a color additive in the food.

Another label change will clear up a common misconception about one type of foods. Many people believe that foods with the words "non-dairy" on the label do not contain milk ingredients. However, caseinate, a milk derivative, may be in the food. This information is especially important for people with milk allergies. Foods with "non-dairy" on the label, will indicate on the ingredient label that caseinate, found in many "non-dairy" products, is derived from milk.

Protein hydrolysates will be listed in more detail on ingredient labels. These are proteins broken down by acid or enzymes and added to foods for various purposes, such as to thicken, to flavor or to improve texture. Under the new regulations, the source of the hydrolysates must be identified on the label.

Previously, "hydrolyzed protein," "hydrolyzed animal protein" or "hydrolyzed vegetable protein" were allowed. The new regulations require that the source also must be listed, such as "hydrolyzed corn protein." This will help people with special dietary requirements who need to know the food source of the hydrolysate.

The final major change on ingredient labels involves the

labeling of fruit and vegetable juice and juice beverages. Labels must list the percentage of juice present in the beverage. For multi-juice blends, the percentage of each juice (in a 5 percent range) or a statement that the beverage is flavored by the named juice (for example, "strawberry flavored juice drink") also must be indicated.

Food labels with the changes are already appearing in grocery stores, although manufacturers have until May, 1994, to make most of the changes.

Labels printed after that time must contain the new information.

HIGH FLYING CONTACTS
If you are a contact lens wearer, and if you are planning a cross-country trip aboard an airplane, you might be interested in this tidbit.

Researchers at one of the largest manufacturers of contact lenses, caution us to advise patients that their contacts may be very uncomfortable because the dry air of pressurized aircraft robs the eyes of moisture needed for comfort.

In order to circumvent this discomfort, your contacts should be thoroughly cleaned before takeoff. Secondly, avoid reading for long stretches at a time because eyelids don't blink often enough while reading.

Next, remove your contacts if you're about to doze off, no matter how short a nap you intend to take. Finally, be sure to use your lubricating eye drops as often as you feel the need since they will re-wet your contacts and allow them to glide easily on the cornea without friction.

Our planing dates in Tishomingo County are "Wheat for Forage - Sept. 1 through October 31" and "Wheat for Grain - Oct. 1 through Nov. 15".


LAWN CARE

Sunny, windy weather causes grasses to dry out quickly. Make sure that you water your lawn deeply when it is needed and mow at the recommended height for your type of grass until frost. Now is a good time to apply potash fertilizer to help "winterize" your lawn. Do not apply anything with nitrogen in it. This will only promote quick growth that will be killed by frost.

1993 CROP LOSS ASSISTANCE
Funds have been appropriated for payments to eligible producers for 1993 crop production and quality losses due to damaging weather and related

conditions. Payments must be made no later than June 1994.

Disaster payments will be made for production and quality losses of commercially-grown crops under the categories of participating program crops, non-participating program crops, sugar, tobacco, peanuts, soybeans, sunflowers, non-program crops and ornamental crops. Aquaculture is not eligible for 1993 disaster benefits.

For production losses, two levels of loss: (1) Producers with crop insurance, for losses greater than 35 percent of expected production; and (2) producers without crop insurance, for losses greater than 40 percent of expected production.

ted production.

The application period for 1993 disaster-related production and quality began July 22, 1993 and March 4, 1994.

Payments are calculated determining the eligible amount of loss and multiplying it by the applicable payment rate.

Disaster aid applications be made at the producers' Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service county offices.







RESOLUTION OF THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF IUKA, MISSISSIPPI

WHEREAS, the Mayor of the City of Iuka called a Special Meeting of the Board of Aldermen at 3:00 P.M. on September 15, 1993 at the City Hall, Iuka, Mississippi; and

WHEREAS, the purpose of the called meeting by the Mayor of the City of Iuka was to levy the ad valorem taxes for the next fiscal year, to establish a complete budget of the revenues, expenses and working cash balance for the City of Iuka for the next fiscal year, and to negotiate an interest rate with lending institutions for certain FHA monies for the new water treatment facility; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor of the City of Iuka has reviewed the tax levies and the financial status of the City of Iuka and has recommended to the Board of Aldermen of the City of Iuka that no tax increase be levied for the fiscal year; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Aldermen met on the aforesaid date, with the Vice Mayor presiding in the absence of the Mayor, and considered all of the above items and determined that the Mayor's recommendation as to the ad valorem tax levy for the next fiscal year should be approved.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Iuka, Mississippi as follows:

1. The Board of Aldermen of the City of Iuka hereby resolves that the ad valorem tax levy for the next fiscal year shall not be increased and shall remain the same as for the preceding fiscal year, and hereby establishes the millage rate for the City of Iuka at 12.75 mills for the fiscal year beginning on October 1, 1993 and ending on September 30, 1994.



Speaker Ford Addresses Meeting At New Chamber Building

The willingness of the members of the Burnsville Area Chamber of Commerce to roll up their sleeves and work is remarkable," Tim Ford Speaker of the Mississippi House of Representatives said to a capacity crowd Monday night, September 13, at the newly completed Chamber

building. He said this to commend the Chamber on the speedy construction of the facility and overall progress made in the projects that are being undertaken. It took only four months to complete the building. Monday night was the first regular monthly meeting to be held in the new building.

At the meeting, guests enjoyed a reception in the new facility which will be used not only by the Burnsville Area Chamber of Commerce, but also by the Tishomingo County Development Foundation and the Burnsville Creek Board as a place to hold various projects for the future. The new building, located at the edge of the 900-acre North Mississippi Waterway Park in Burnsville.

BACC President Alvina Blakney and Vice-President Charlotte Orick took turns recognizing the many individuals and businesses who contributed to the Chamber's misc. projects including the building of the new facility. Several special contributors were mentioned including former Burnsvillian, Dr. L. Qualls, president and CEO of Baldor Electric Motor Co. of Smith, Ark., who among other monetary donations, gave the chamber some of his company's stock. When the stock was sold, it yielded more than \$500.

Rep. Ford used the opportunity to speak about the proposed budget reform. According to Ford, this reform is essential for the state's economic future.

While the state cannot operate strictly as a business, we must implement some of the sound business practices that you use in business to keep things under control. Just as you set aside a certain amount of money for insurance, for retirement and for other emergencies, the state needs to set aside a backup system to keep us at an even budget level when a national recession or other unforeseen circumstances dip into our revenues...Last year we passed a comprehensive budget reform act that is designed to provide us with that insurance or cushion," Ford said.

Ford went on to explain that the reform requires that 2 percent

of the Burnsville Area Chamber of Commerce in their newly completed facility, located next to the post office in Burnsville.

of the state's predicted revenues are to be held back each year. This should provide an approximately \$45 million cushion to "allow revenues to come in that much under the estimates without having to slash programs in the middle of the year."

Ford also addressed the MAP (Mississippi Action Plan) that he and Lt. Governor Eddie Briggs have been working on.

Blakney concluded the program by discussing the Burnsville boat ramp to be located on the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway. According to Blakney, problems in getting the metal pilings and then difficulty in finding equipment to drive the piling have been the reason for the delay in the project. He said that as soon as these problems can be remedied, the project can move forward as planned.

Robinson were appointed as Co-
Conservators of the person of Ruby
Smith, and Richard O. Clark was ap-
pointed as Conservator of the Estate.

III.
Richard O. Clark, as Conservator of

the Estate of Ruby Smith, took no
property into his possession
belonging to the conservatorship
estate and has not entered upon the
execution of his duties, and has filed
no inventory or accounting concern-
ing the estate.

IV.
Based upon all of the testimony
and other evidence introduced at the
trial of this cause, the Court finds
that Ruby Smith is now competent to
manage her own affairs, and that this
Court should now enter its Order
restoring her competency and
dissolving the conservatorship. In
making this finding, the Court is
relying particularly upon the
testimony through deposition of Dr.
Jeffrey Lee, and this Court's ob-
servation of Ruby Smith, her demeanor
and her responses to questions
propounded to her on both on direct
and cross-examination.

IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED, AD-
JUDGED AND DECREED that Ruby
Smith is restored to her competency
to manage herself and any of her af-
fairs, and that she is now legally
capable of performing any act or deed
or undertaking any obligation which
she could have done prior to Septem-
ber 21, 1990. The Conservatorship
thus established by that Order of this
Court dated September 21, 1990, is
hereby dissolved and terminated, and
the Conservators appointed thereun-
der are hereby discharged.
