An early morning, one-vehicle wreck near NASA's ASRM facility Friday, October 1, claimed the life of an Iuka woman and left two others injured.

Frankie R. Tigner, 25, Route 2, Box 663, Iuka, was a passenger in a 1993 Chevrolet pickup truck driven by Timothy M. Bonds, 24, Route 4, Box 178, Iuka, according to Tishomingo County Sheriff Johnny S. Nunley. One other passenger, Randy E. Tigner, 29, Frankie Tigner's husband, was also injured in the accident

All three were thrown from the vehicle at the time of the wreck, which happened at approximately 1:00 a.m. Friday. Apparently Bonds, who was driving east on county road 321, lost control of the pickup and it left the road, Nunley stated.

Frankie Tigner was pronounced dead at the scene by Tishomingo County Coroner Dale White.

Bonds was airlifted and Randy Tigner was transported by ambulance to the North Mississippi Medical Center in Tupelo where, at press-time, both were listed in stable condition.

Frankie Leann Tigner, 25, died Friday, October 1, 1993, in Iuka as the result of an automobile accident.

Services were at 2 p.m. at the North Crossroads Community Church with the Rev. Danny Lovelace and the Rev. Allen Osborn officiating. Burial was in the North Crossroads Cemetery. Ludlam Funeral Home was in charge of the arrangements.

Survivors include two sons, Casey Wayne Tigner and Cody Dillon Tigner, both of Iuka; one daughter, Courtney Lynn Tigner of Iuka; her husband, Randy Tigner of Iuka; one sister, Tonya Haynes of Counce, Tenn.; and her mother, Bonita Alder of Chattanooga, Tenn.

Pallbearers were David Lambert, Jimmy Adkins, Bobby Flint, Ronald Lambert, Billy Alton Lambert and Stevie Johnson.

It will be up to NASA to decide what the fate of the Advanced Solid Rocket Motor Project will be after a joint House/Senate conference committee approved some scaled back funding Friday, October 1st.

Fate Of ASRM Hinges

On NASA's Decision

The committee left a provision in the bill that requires NASA to come up with \$150 million from its own budget to go with the \$124.9 million the government contributes if it wishes to continue the project. However, if NASA does not decide to continue the ASRM, it can terminate the project and put the

Yellow Creek site to other use. More that \$2 billion has been spent on the ASRM project, to date and approximately 1,000 people are currently working at the facility. If NASA decides to cancel the ASRM project, it is likely that the site would be used in some phase of production of the redesigned solid rockets currently being built by Thiokol Corp. from Utah.

NASA has until November 15 to make its decision about the facility. The bill still must gain passage from the full House and Senate, as well as President Clinton. No opposition is expected at this point, reports indicated.

Belmont Man Sentenced In Murder Of Young Iuka Man

The second Belmont man convicted in the murder of Thomas Alan Byram, the Iuka man killed on the Natchez Trace Parkway in September of 1992, was sentenced Monday, October 4, in U.S. District Court.

Greg Dingler, 24, was sentenced to 17 years and six months in prison for his role in the beating death of Byram at the Pharr Mounds rest stop on the Natchez Trace. The sentence was handed down by U.S. District Court

Judge Neal Biggers.

The other man convicted in the case, Danny McGee, also of Belmont, was sentenced to 17 years and six months in July of this year. Both men were convicted of second degree murder.

Statements by Judge Biggers indicated that he was somewhat distressed that Dingler had shown no remorse for his part in the crime and the fact that he had shown no sympathy for the victim's family.

Indian Creek Golf Course & Recreation **Facilities**

Gaylon and Connie Jones of Iuka are offering a business park (approximately 44 acres); a recreation park to consist of six baseball and/or softball fields, six tennis courts and/or soccerfield (approx. 40 acres) and 244 acres of golf course land to the city of Iuka, free and clear, if the city will build and own the golf course, put in all utilities and construct roads for the projects.

The design and construction of the golf course would be performed by the Kevin Tucker Group of Nashville, a comprehensive consulting firm.

The design effort would also include the services of PGA, William Master Professional "Goose" Mungia who would manage the golf course. The proposed golf course will capitalize upon the natural beauty of the site while incorporating the vegetation and water of the area, according to a proposal for development by the Tucker group. According to Gaylon Jones, the Iuka City Board has been considering the proposal. Action is expected in the near future. "We believe that this is something that is needed in the Iuka area and we have been working on it for quite some time now. We hope to hear something from the Board soon," Jones said. More details on the proposal and the city's action will be in a future edition of the News.



Letter To The Editor

In Monday's Daily Journal there was an article concerning T.C.I. Cable Company. It was. stated that T.C.I. had publicly announced that they would not pay any major network affiliate to carry their transmissions.

As most of you know already, people in Iuka and parts of Tishomingo County are on the TCI-Heritage Cable hook-up. It is, in my opinion, one of the worst systems in our area. I have spoken with a lot of people and it seems we have all noticed a few problems. WHNT-TV, (channel 19), out of Huntsville, Ala. always gives us lead reception at night. Some people have said that they can't even see the picture clearly. One week-end I called to complain about this channel being off the air and was told that it probably would stay off until Monday because no one wanted to come and climb the tower to fix it. WBBJ-TV out of Jackson, TN, which is channel 7, is another station which seems to go off the air or experience technical difficulty at the most inopportune times. W.T.V.A.-TV, (channel 9), in Tupelo is a great channel but as was stated the cable company doesn't want to pay them for carrying their programming. Something isn't right.

What would be the difference between a cable company picking up another stations signals and re-transmitting them without having to pay or me going out and buying a satellite with a decoder and picking up the same signals, (which I will add that I haven't done).

The main thing is that every cable system should carry at least two affiliates for each and every network in case one should fail.

And the one think that irks me the most is when I was told by John Vaught Jr., who works for T.C.I. Heritage Cable in Booneville, that the "market" in Iuka wasn't big enough to warrant us receiving pay-per-view events, such as sports.

I wonder if our "little ole market" all dropped cable at the same time if it would put a dent in T.C.I.'s pocket. Call the cable company and let them know how you feel. This is not meant to be a slap in the face to the installators and repairmen of TCI-Heritage Cable. Tishomingo County and Iuka belongs to the people

Home Economics Tips

By: Barbara F. Guinn, **Extension Home Economist** "Three R"s Of Brown-Bag Lunches

As parents are sending students off to school this year, many are packing lunches using a '90s version of the three R's: reuse, recycle and reduce.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Meal and Poultry Hotline has been getting many calls from people looking for advice on how to keep food safe and at the same time pay attention to environmental issues, like recycling.

For parents and students who want to "think green" when packing lunches, USDA has these three R Tips:

While brown bag lunches are classic, you might try an alternative: reusable insulated totes or lunch boxes. Be sure to include a small cold source like a freezable gel-pack because food poisoning bacteria multiply rapidly at room temperature. You can keep cold food safe in an insulated tote for a short time by simply including a cold drink or cold piece of fruit.

Another lunch time classic, the thermos, is already reusable. To help keep hot food safe, rinse the thermos with boiling water to warm the thermos just before filling. Be sure to bring the food to a rolling boil just before filling Southeast who attended Scholars Recognition Day at Mississippi State University. napkins. Just keep them clean, and they're ready to go.

Try salt-free pretzels or crackers for crunchy snacks and serve desserts that include low-fat pudding or yogurt with fruit.

the container is "microwave safe." Small plastic containers also can be used and reused for lunchsized portions of crunchy snacks or desserts like gelatin and pudding.

You can reuse most heavy-duty plastic storage bags for dry products, like pretzels, chips or wrapped food. Never reuse them if they previously held meat, poultry or fish because bacteria from these foods can cause serious illness. Likewise, don't reuse plastic bags that hold produce, such as fruits and vegetables.

Reusable plastic drink boxes for fruit juice are available. A thorough cleaning at night and they are ready for school the next day. Or, try fruit juice in recyclable aluminum cans.

FEMAP allows landowners and hunting clubs controlling relatively small acreages to harvest antlerless deer by purchasing \$10 permits.

Permits allow taking antlerless deer anytime during regular open gun seasons. Completing and returning harvest reports are mandatory for participation in the program.

Anyone wishing to join the FEMAP program must: 1) Have a tax receipt, a hunting rights lease or a notarized letter from the landowner authorizing exclusive hunting privileges; 2) Bring personal identification and a social security number to county sign up locations.

Permits will be issued at the rate of one permit for the first 25 acres and one permit for each additional 50 acres.



NASA's Tri-State Education Initiative Consortium Begins In-Depth Geography Studies

NASA's Tri-State Education Initiative Consortium began a year-long series of in-depth studies, a. Geography Institute, on September 19.

Twenty-four teachers from parts of Alabama, Mississippi and Tennessee, the three states which comprise the Tri-State Education Initiative region, met at the Crow's Neck Environmental Center in Paden, Miss., to learn more about geography and its relationship to our own communities through global studies.

Dr. Tom Sever, NASA's only archaeologist, was the keynote speaker. Sever discussed NASA's role in using satellite imagery to make archaeological discoveries worldwide and to change conceptions of world history. Examples of satellite imagery and other state-of-the art technologies were shared with the group for future curriculum development for teachers and students.

Also speaking that day were Dr. Julie Elbert of the University of Southern Mississippi's geography department in Hattiesburg and Dr. James Binko with the education department at Towson University of Baltimore, Md.

The group will meet monthly at the Tri-State Learning Center in Iuka throughout the 1993-94 school year to network information and ideas. They will also be able to attend presentations from noted speaker which include Dr. Howard Johnson of Jacksonville State University, Fla.; Dr. William Strong of the University of North Alabama, Florence; Dr. Jess McKee of the University Southern Mississippi; Dr. Sidney Jumper of the University of Tennessee, Knoxville; and J. Joe Ferguson of the National Geographic Society, Washington D.C.

A geography competition and awards day featuring Gil Grosvenor, president and chairman of National Geographic, will highlight Geography Awareness Week set for Nov. 15-19. Private landowners' slice of the timber revenue pie was valued at \$516 million, while the logging and transportation segment of the industry earned some \$294 million.

Both the amount of products harvested and their value surged upward in 1992. The strongest volume increases were in hardwood sawlogs, up 27 percent, and pine poles, up 35 percent over previous highs.

The pine sawlog harvest increased seven percent and the value was up 8 percent. But the value of hardwood sawlogs increased by 47 percent, reflecting dramatic price increases for this product.

The volume of pine pulpwood harvested increased by 3 percent, hardwood pulpwood while showed a 12 percent increase. The value of both commodities was up, indicating a sellers market for pulpwood throughout the state.

Stumpage prices, the amount paid to landowners for their forest products, were up significantly in most areas of the state. Pine sawtimber prices soared upward by as many as 23 percent. while hardwood sawtimber prices ranged from 10 to 19 percent higher.

Pine pulpwood prices increased by a whopping 48 percent, while hardwood prices jumped by as much as 79 percent.

The greatest competition among buyers for pulpwood was in central and north Mississippi.

According to forestry officials, the dramatic price increases for forest products can be attributed to several factors. One, the competition among buyers, is increasing due to market demands. This was especially true in central and north Mississippi. Opening of the Tenn-Tom Waterway has accelerated this trend, strongly influencing pulpwood prices.

Wet weather in the state for much of 1992 also drove up timber prices, as did the rebuilding boom that resulted from Hurricane Andrew. Also, in late 1992, uncertainty about the lumber supply from the Northwest

due to the Spotted Owl controversy, spurred lumber prices. Severance tax collection on the state's timber harvest was 9.2 percent higher than the previous year, at \$3.9 million.

Twenty (20) percent of the tax revenue is returned to the counties where the timber was harvested. The remaining 80 percent is used to fund the state's Forest Resource Development Fund which provides incentive money for landowers to plant and improve timber stands.
