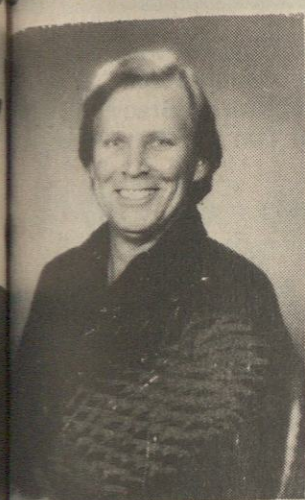

House Votes To Kill NASA's ASRM Project

Whitten Fights To Salvage Appropriated Funding For Alternative Project At Yellow Creek Site

On Wednesday morning, October 13, Rep. Jamie Whitten (D-Miss) notified the Tishomingo County News that no decision has been reached concerning the Advanced Solid Rocket Motor Plant Site; however, he is working diligently to salvage appropriated funding for the Tishomingo County location.

The House voted Wednesday, October 6, to kill the ASRM project at Yellow Creek, however a delegation of lawmakers from Mississippi and Alabama are meeting with members of a conference committee this week to find another option for the site.

The House sent the bill concerning the project back to conference committee to remove its funding. Two billion dollars has already been spent on the facility that is between 65 to 70 percent complete.

The Mississippi and Alabama delegation hopes to send the bill back to the Appropriations Committee so that another use for the \$124 million included in the bill can be found.

A spokesman in Whitten's office said Tuesday that Rep. Whitten had been working hard to save the facility. One possible use for the site would be to refurbish motor casings and nozzles that are presently in use on the redesigned motor being manufactured in Utah, according to the spokesman. It is estimated that this would create approximately the same number of jobs as the ASRM project.

Florida Man Charged In Throat Cutting

A Florida man was arrested on charges of aggravated assault after cutting the throat of a Corinth man from ear-to-ear Saturday in Sharp's bottom in Tishomingo County.

Billy Joe Cornelius, 23, of P.O. Box 27, Chiefland, Fla. was taken to Tishomingo County jail after he was arrested for cutting Ronnie L. Spencer, 40, of 303 E. 4th St., Corinth, from ear-to-ear, twice, with a pocket knife. The attack happened at approximately 2 a.m. Saturday while the two were on County Road 375 near the Alcorn County line, according to Tishomingo County Sheriff Johnny S. Nunley. The two had apparently been riding around with a female subject. A dispute concerning the

female allegedly erupted between the two men, leading to the assault, Nunley reported.

Spencer was reported in good condition at Magnolia hospital, according to a spokesman for the hospital. In addition to the cuts to the throat, he sustained cuts to his left hand, reports stated.

Nunley and his Department were assisted in the arrest of Cornelius near Reinzi by Alcorn County Sheriff Jimmy Taylor and the Alcorn County Sheriff's Department.

Board Votes To Refuse Golf Course Proposal

During a special meeting Thursday, October 7, Iuka Board members voted unanimously not to accept the proposal submitted by local businessmen/developers Gaylon and Connie Jones to give the city approximately 250 acres in exchange for the city building and keeping up a golf course.

The main reason cited by the Board for refusing the offer included the cost, which was estimated at \$3 million dollars for the golf course's construction. This cost would put undue strain on the taxpayers, according to the Board.

Another reason for the refusal was that there are other projects, such as utilities, that would be endangered if the golf course project were undertaken.

Finally, the long-term impact that would result with loss of funding for the ASRM project had to be considered before a major financial commitment could be considered.

The Board did agree to provide utility services to the property if the Jones' decided to develop the property through private funds.

Iuka Middle School PTA

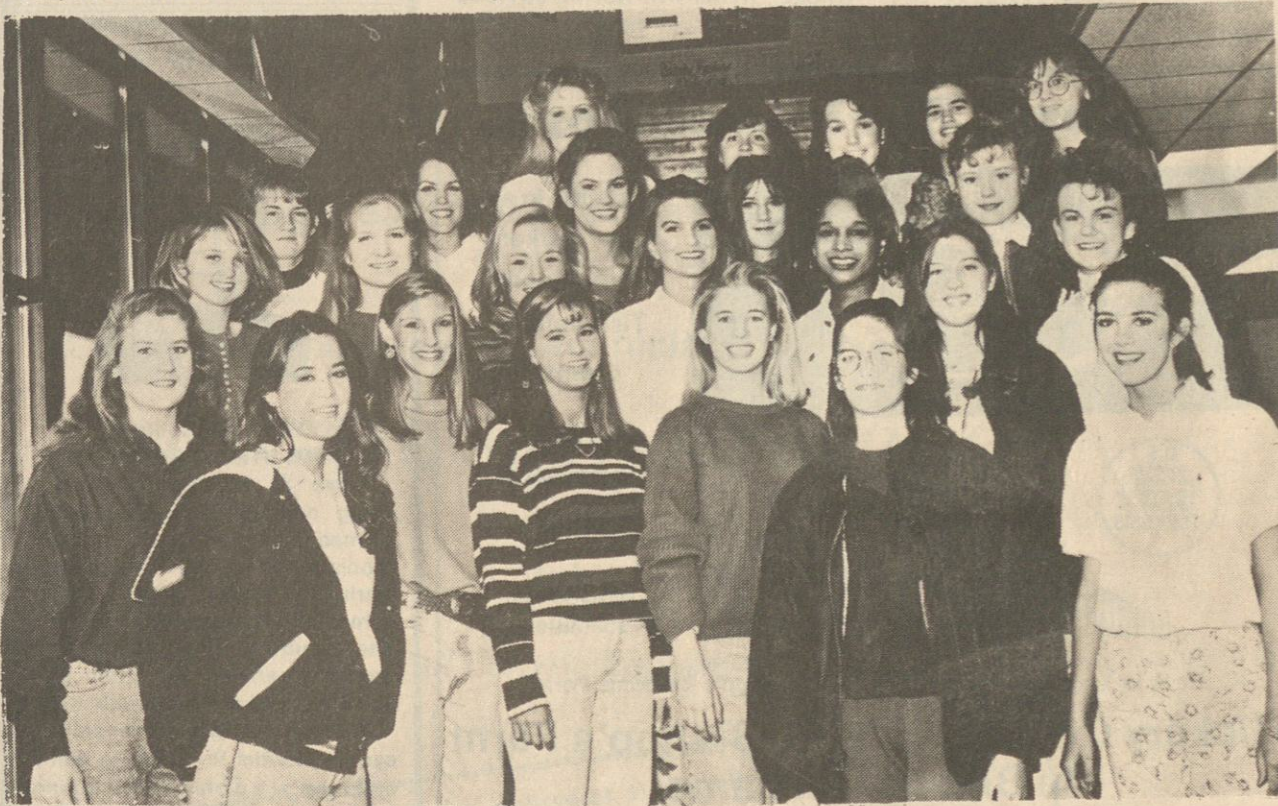

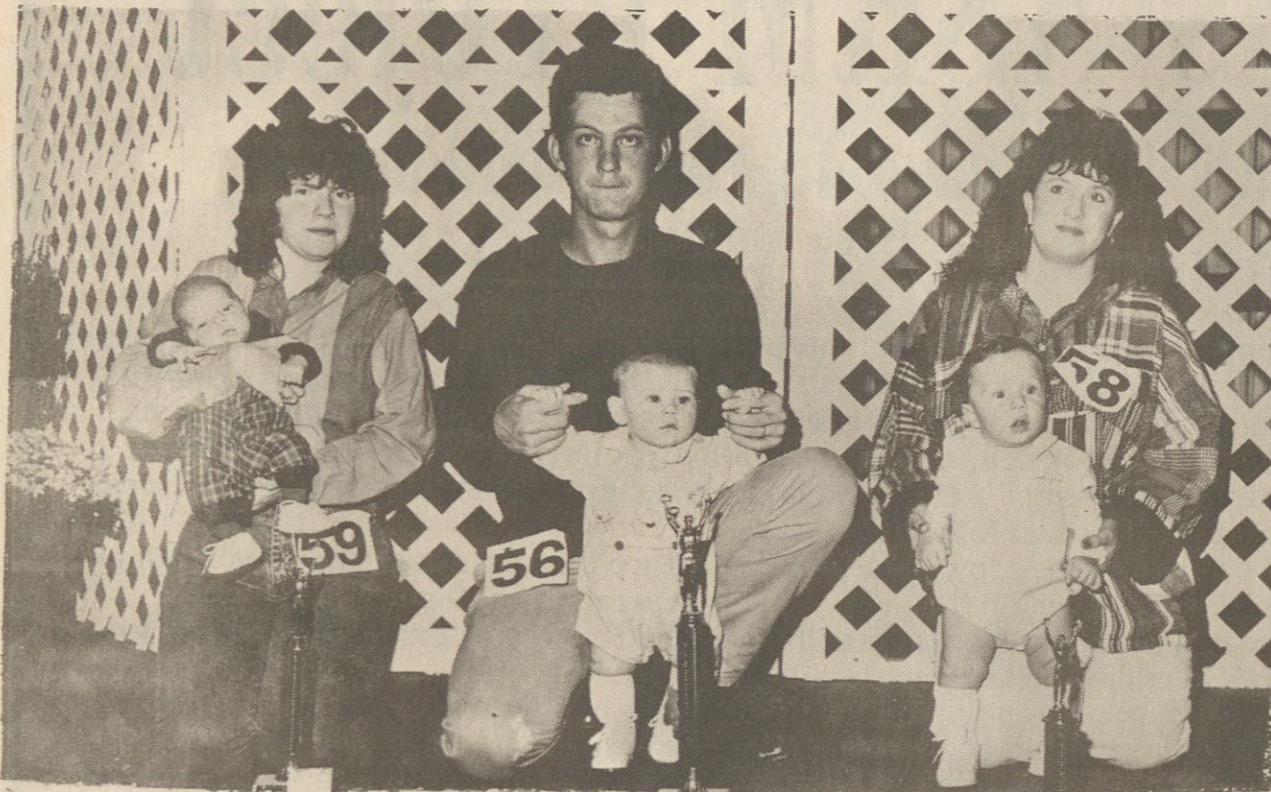

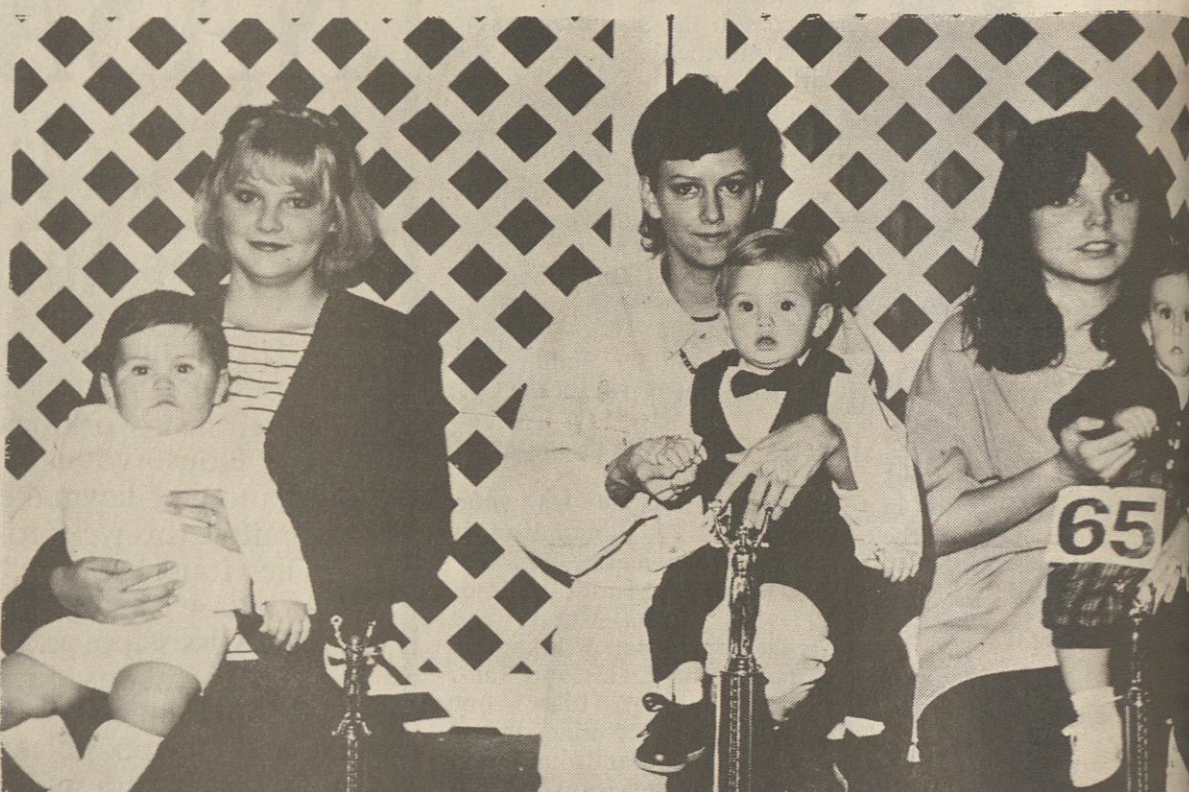

Home Economics Tips

**CARE & HANDLING LABELS
FOR MEAT & POULTRY**

As a result of the tragic outbreak of foodborne illness in January 1993 in several western states by the bacteria E. coli 0157:H7, many consumers are asking if our meat supply is safe and what can they do to further protect themselves from foodborne illness.

The answer is that our meat supply is safe, but with many potentially hazardous food there are risks associated with eating the food. Consumers can play a vital role in ensuring the safety of the foods by practicing safe handling, preparation and storage of hazardous foods.

Realizing the importance the consumer plays in maintaining

the safety of the food supply, U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Mike Espy has initiated a comprehensive Pathogen Reduction Program which has as its main focus to reduce the risk of foodborne illness.

The first step is to initiate mandatory safe handling statements for raw meat and poultry products. The proposed regulation will cover raw meat and poultry products (fresh and frozen) packaged and labeled in federally inspected plants and retail establishments and sold to consumers and institutions.

Products covered will be raw ground beef and partially-cooked ground meat products such as hamburgers and pork sausage patties, uncooked poultry products such as chicken parts, whole chicken and turkey, and frozen chicken nuggets. "Ready-to-eat" items will not be covered under this new labeling

regulation.

If the proposed regulation becomes final, we should begin seeing labels on raw meat and poultry products by midfall. The safe handling instructions targeting the consumer will address four key areas critical to food safety; safe storage of raw products, prevention of cross-contamination, safe cooking procedures and handling of leftovers.

Safe handling instructions also will target institutions by including information on appropriate holding temperatures for prepared food.

Under the new rule, the care and handling instructions must accompany each product and

must appear either on the principal display panel or the information panel of the product label. Instructions may be incorporated onto existing labels or added to packages in the form of pressure-sensitive labels.

The following is a sample of the wording for both labels.

Safe Handling Instructions For Consumers

This product was inspected for your safety. Some animal products may contain bacteria that could cause illness if the product is mishandled or cooked improperly. For your protection, follow these safe handling instructions.

Keep refrigerated or frozen. Thaw in refrigerator or microwave.

Keep raw (meat or poultry) separate from other foods. Wash working surfaces (including cutting boards), utensils and hands after touching raw (meat or poultry).

Cook thoroughly. Refrigerate leftovers within two hours.

Safe Handling Instructions For Institutions

This product was inspected for your safety. Some animal products may contain bacteria that could cause illness if the product is mishandled or cooked improperly. For your protection, follow these safe handling instructions.

Keep refrigerated or frozen. Thaw in refrigerator or microwave.

Keep raw (meat or poultry) separate from other foods. Wash

working surfaces (including cutting boards), utensils, and hands after touching raw (meat or poultry).

Cook thoroughly. Keep foods hot at 140 degrees or higher. Immediately after service, refrigerate leftovers.

EYESTRESS FROM COMPUTER TERMINALS

Some 35 million people are using computers. Lately, we've learned a lot about vision problems that can occur from staring at those bright, green screens from long periods of time. The resulting visual stress can generate serious, and often permanent visual and eye problems.

We humans have hunter-soldier eyes, essential for spotting game or danger at a distance. But during the past century, nearly all our work and much of our recreation has shifted to seeing within arm's length.

The resulting nearpoint visual stress -- despite 20/20 distance visual acuity -- often produces adverse changes, including nearsightedness, suppressed vision in one eye, poor eye teaming, general body fatigue and reduced efficiency.

The good news is that we've learned how to make close encounters with a computer screen more efficient, healthier and less stressful. If you're being "stressed out" by your computer, call for an appointment.

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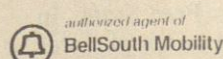

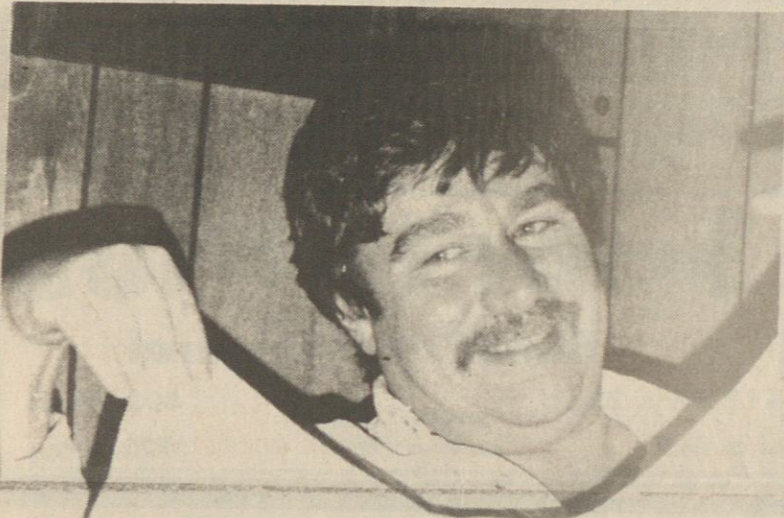

Today's teens like to express their independence and their creativity. One way that parents can allow for some creativity is to let the teen create their own space in the bedroom. This can be using sheets. Today's sheets come in a variety of styles and can be used almost anywhere.

Some of the advantages of using sheets include:

-Sheets are economical when you consider the yardage included, especially when purchased during white sales.

-Less seaming is required because sheets offer wide widths of fabric, and the ready-made hems can often be used as a finish.

-Sheet fabric is usually easy-care, requiring little or no ironing.

-The sizing finish on sheets helps protect against soiling.

-The wider than normal widths of fabric found in sheets make them appropriate for many projects.

There are also some disadvantages to using sheets. These include:

-Sheets with designs are often printed off-grain.

-Pattern repeats are not always at the same intervals, making matching patterns difficult, if not impossible.

-Sometimes laundering is required to remove wrinkles caused from packaging.

-Sheets, as well as all fabrics on walls, will soil more easily than wood, paper, or vinyl.

The following pointers on working with sheets should make your project go smoother.

-Handle sheets carefully and press to remove package wrinkles.

-Check to be sure the design follows the fabric grain. If not, follow the pattern line rather than the grainline.

-Sheets are not manufactured for interior design projects; therefore, some patterns may be difficult to match. Random print designs are easy to use because matching may not be necessary.

-Always cut the fabric, never tear it.

-As a time saver, use the ready made hem for edges of projects. Trim away selvages to avoid pulling and puckering.

-When choosing sheets for an interior design project, select the size most suitable for your pur-

pose. When shopping, carry yardage estimates and sheet dimensions with you.

Four-H members in the Home Environment project learn about interior design as well as furniture arrangement and using accessories to accent their space, whether it be a bedroom or the whole house. LAWN WEED CONTROL

Winter weeds will be emerging soon. Annual bluegrass is the primary winter grass weed problem for most homeowners. Several preemergence herbicides provide excellent control of annual bluegrass. Atrazine or simazine will control annual bluegrass and many of the winter broadleaf weeds. Use caution using these chemicals around ornamentals that could be injured. Broadleaf weed that escape preemergence treatment can be controlled with an early 2, 4-D, Banvel, or Image applications. Image does not volatilize (vaporize) like 2, 4-D or Banvel and can, therefore be used with less fear of harming other shrubs and trees in the lawn.

PURCHASE OF OUT-OF-STATE PIGS

I just wanted to remind swine producers that transporting pigs across state lines requires an entry permit and health papers. If you purchase pigs from an out-of-state farm that is not a Pseudorabies Validated Free and Qualified Brucellosis Free Herd, then a negative blood sample within thirty days of transport is required before an entry permit and health papers can be issued. Once you get back to Mississippi, these pigs will have to be isolated and possible retested by the Board of Animal Health. These procedures were put in place to protect you as a producer and the Swine Industry from many costly diseases. We have received notice from the State Board of Animal Health that effective October 1, 1993, Mississippi was designated as a Pseudorabies Free State. In April 1992, Mississippi was designated as a Swine Brucellosis Free State. These classifications

Math Class:

What A Place To Be!

The students in the junior high mathematics department at Burnsville Elementary School are in a special place. The program has been taking the initiative in finding ways to improve students' proficiency in mathematics while insuring that the students' experiences in the classroom are positive. After two years of transition, the department is now operating solely on the cooperative learning method of instruction.

In the cooperative learning setting, students work in either pairs or small groups during all phases of the learning cycle. The philosophy of this method is that students will have multiple sources of instruction while improving their social skills in the process.

Students are also actively engaged in their own learning processes. All concepts are introduced and initial skills practiced with manipulatives in hands-on activities. Students learn through discovery, with the teacher acting as a facilitator, but not a dictator of specific facts. Besides their regular class assignments, these students participate in weekly class projects, which are actual application exercises of the skills they have practiced. Much opportunity is provided for students to extend their math reasoning skills through both the projects and various informal class competitions involving challenge activities. Students are provided routine opportunities to reflect upon their goals in mathematics, career choices, and personal gain inventories through writing activities. The program is also allowing students to chronicle their successes through the compilation of work into personal portfolios. In order to help students transfer academic experiences throughout the curriculum, the mathematics department does synchronized lessons with both the science and the social studies department.

The math program also encourages students to focus on mathematics outside the confines of the classroom. The school's Science and Math Club provides entertaining, but relevant opportunities for students to apply classroom-acquired skills both on the campus and in various parts of the community.

Parents are involved in the students' progress on a continuous basis. Students provide parents with specifically labeled work samples to enable parents to observe daily progress. Parents are also a critical part of the building of students' portfolios. Each week, parents are requested to choose a work sample, based on pre-determined criteria, which the students will submit, along with the instructor's choice and the student choices, to their personal portfolios.

The Burnsville Junior High Mathematics Program is under the supervision of Mrs. Rhonda McDuffy. Mrs. McDuffy wishes to thank her principal, Mr. Mike Haynie, and the rest of the district administrative staff for supporting and encouraging the improvements in this program.

Nena (Nena) Jones is a self-taught artist. She is a member of the Miss. Watercolor Society, Memphis-Germantown Art League, and the Mid-South Watercolor Society. Cotton was a dominant force in her early years. Her paternal grandfather, Oscar Pruitt, was part-owner of Iuka Gin Co. and her father, Perry Joe Pruitt, worked there for many years, having also raised cotton.

Iuka Gin Company 1926 - 1982

Iuka Gin Co., built in 1926, was located at 609 S. Main St. in Iuka, Miss., and was the first gin in Tishomingo County. It was owned and operated by Oscar and Clay Pruitt until Oscar's death in 1931. Two of Oscar's four sons, Dayton and Pinky Pruitt, assumed their father's role when they were old enough. Oscar's oldest son, Dayton Pruitt, worked there until his death in 1929, and his youngest son, Perry Joe Pruitt, worked there until the late '30s. Cotton, being the area's largest agricultural crop, made ginning a successful business through the first half of this century...When times had a good year, the gin ginned approximately 3500 bales. During the height of the gin's busiest years, farmers and their wagon loads of cotton would line up from the north end of town to around Mineral Springs. It was common for them to wait two to three days for their cotton to be ginned, even though the gin crew worked around the clock. They would bring food for themselves and feed their livestock. Family members might sometimes accompany them. Many of these farmers would bring items to sell to the public, such as peanuts and sorghum molasses. The senior partner retired in the late '50s and shortly thereafter Ward (Pinky) Pruitt became sole owner. With the onset of synthetic material, high costs of operation, and low cotton

prices, cotton was no longer king in Northeast Mississippi. By the late '60s, diversified farming was in and cotton was out. No more than three to four bales a day were being ginned when Pinky Pruitt ginned the last bale of cotton at Iuka Gin Co. in 1972. When he closed the doors to the gin the last time, he also closed the doors to an era that we would not know again. Gene Jourdan bought the gin in 1981 and had it dismantled in 1982.

This time of year always reminds me of the old gin. Fall always brought on the ginning season. The engines started up around the first of September and closed down sometime around the end of the year. The only times they ever "shut down" was when they rarely ran out of cotton to gin or there was a fire. And there were more fires than there was a lack of cotton to gin. So when you heard the engines shut off, it usually was only a matter of minutes until you would hear the sirens of the fire engine. To the employees of the gin, this was utter chaos, but to the children on the south end of town, this was sheer excitement.

It was very difficult to put out a fire, because the cotton smoldered and the actual fire was hard to find. For those people living within close proximity of the gin, the season always brought on a number of things to contend with. You could almost cut the dust and lint floating in the air. Dusting became constant with the housewives and the

allergy sufferers were in pure torture until the season was over. Not many people had air conditioning in those days, so there wasn't really any escape from this, because windows had to be left open. The neighbors' bathrooms became public bathrooms and telephones became public telephones. There was an "outdoor" john behind the gin, but the children and women preferred the modern day conveniences of the neighbors.

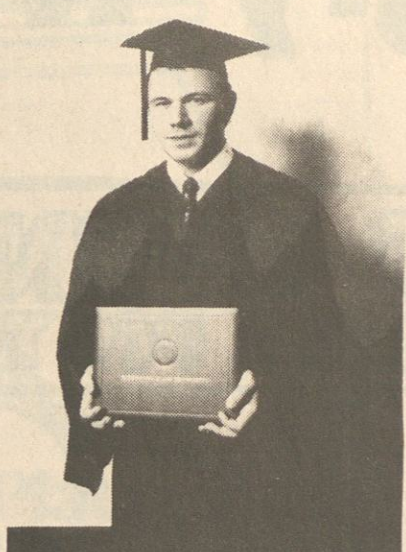
The roar the engines made while ginning were deafening. You could hear them all over town. The closer you got to the gin, the more deafening the sound became. If you were inside the gin, you actually had to "yell" to be heard and even then it was difficult to hear. I can remember standing there shaking my head "yes" and never having any idea what was being said to me. There is no doubt in my mind that this is why all of the Pruitt boys were "hard of hearing". My daddy couldn't hear well, and you have to repeat what you say a lot to Pinky and Dayton Pruitt even now.

What I remember most about the gin is the fun children had playing there. The children usually consisted of the neighborhood children and the farmer's children. The farmer's almost always had their children with them. I literally grew up there. The ginner played with us all. Most of those who were ever there as a child has a tale to tell about nearly being "sucked up" by the vacuum pipes. But the delight was "jumping" the bales of cotton out back. The maze the rows of cotton bales made was perfect for "hide and seek", "tag", and numbers of other games. When we tired of that, we just jumped from one bale to another. Then there was the excitement in just watching the ginning process, from the farmer rolling his cotton onto the scales to the bale being wrapped and tagged in the back. Then if that wasn't enough we could always go inside the office. It was a dark, musty, small office that reeked with age, and was always full of men. I never saw an adult female in that office. That office was full of excitement. There was never a time that there wasn't a checker game in full force. A serious checker game. Most of the time, on one end of the checker board sat an old black man called "Hambone". To us, the children, Hambone was total fear. He was the only thing at the gin we were afraid of. Of course, I have been told since, that he delighted in scaring all of us. He took his checker games seriously. All the business transactions took place in this office. When the farmer's bale of cotton was weighed, he usually went into the office to make a deal with the cotton buyer. The only cotton buyer I remember well was Roe Daniel. He kept gum in his drawer for all of us children, so he was well liked by us. Then there was the endless line of the farmer's cotton carts, pulled either by trucks or horses, oxen, or mules. This was the time the farmers got to visit each other and compare their crops. Usually, the length of this line was unbelievable. It ran up South Main, turned and went east on Meigg, then turned and went around Mineral Springs Park, and at times, went south on Fulton. A lot of the farmers brought items with them to sell to the public. We would go from one to another to see what they had to sell. There were peanuts, both raw or roasted in bulk or little brown bags, sorghum molasses, fresh vegetables, fried pies, and many other things. It was the equivalent of the farmer's market held in Jay Bird Park today.

They also brought a brown sack lunch with them for themselves. For a few seasons in the late '50s, by mother, Janice Pruitt, opened up a small cafe at the north end of the gin to serve the gin clientele and employees. This was a big hit with them and just more excitement for all of us children. Somebody was always giving us a nickel to be a coke. And so it is that I always think of the gin during this time of year, every year. I can close my eyes and hear the terrific noise, see the "hustle-bustle" of the activity, and smell fall in the air. It seems strange to me as an adult, that the fields are empty of cotton, the gin no longer stands, and the younger generation can't imagine taking a burlap sack to the cotton field. When I engage in a conversation about the gin with someone from my generation, I see a gleam in the eyes, that only we understand.

I decided to paint the old gin because I received so many requests to do so. I have limited edition, signed prints available and they may be purchased from Lisa's Framing and Stitching or

 Nations Security Council resolution 814, which is very different from our
 original mission to stop starvation and allow food convoys to reach the
 Somali people.

Our forces in Somalia are designed, equipped, trained and
 maintained to fight and win in combat. Given that objective they will
 accomplish it. But they are not trained to pacify unruly mobs.

Our ambassador to the U.N. has suggested that we must now raise
 Somalia from a failed state into an emerging democracy. And, my
 question to that is, "Why?" Why is it our responsibility when it does not
 affect our national security? And, why must we squander our national
 treasure of America's best men and women to create a peace in a land
 where peace is not wanted?

It is not America's duty.

Americans have no desire to see their men and women degraded,
 killed and defiled by lawless ruffians who drag the bodies of Americans
 through the streets to be kicked and spat upon. The people of this country
 will not stand for this any longer.

Remaining in Somalia will only cost more U.S. lives, squander U.S.
 power and commit this country to an unending quagmire, from which we
 cannot easily withdraw. With our mission met, now is the time for the
 United States to come home. (10/11/93)

Unemployment Rate Drops In August

Mississippi's unemployment
 rate dropped to a new low for the
 year as the labor force contracted
 and new jobs were added. The
 August rate of 6.0 percent,
 released today by the Mississippi
 Employment Security Com-
 mission, is the lowest rate for the
 month since August 1979, when
 the rate was 5.8 percent.

The August rate was down by
 more than three percentage points
 from the year-ago rate of 9.1
 percent. The rate also decreased
 modestly from the July 1993 rate
 of 6.4 percent, reflecting the
 reopening of schools.

"This drop in unemployment
 is a normal seasonal trend, but
 gains significance since the rate
 was already so low," said
 Raiford G. Crews, chief of labor
 market information. "Even more

impressive is the fact that
 Mississippi's rate is 0.5 per-
 centage points below the national
 rate of 6.5 percent."

Employment jumped by nearly
 43,000 above one year ago while
 unemployment decreased by
 37,400. The two combined to
 form a labor force of 1,204,700,
 up 5,400 since August a year ago.

Jobs increased in both goods-
 producing and service industries
 over the previous month and
 year. Goods producing jobs grew
 by 800 since one year ago and
 2,600 since July. Sectors
 showing particularly strong growth
 both periods include con-
 struction, electronic equipment
 and food and kindred products.
 The biggest losses were in textiles
 and apparel.

Service producing jobs grew by
 over 8,000 since July and by
 20,400 from one year ago. This
 includes a big jump--6,500 jobs -
 in government since a year ago.

"Most growth was in state and
 local government," Crews said.
 "Federal government has down-
 sized by 1,200 since August
 1992."

The growth by 8,100 jobs in
 government from July is caused
 by the return to work of 9,300
 education workers combined
 with small decreases in other

government agencies.

Short-term, agricultural ac-
 tivities and school related job
 surges usually bring about in-
 creased employment in Septem-
 ber, so MESC labor market
 analysts look for continued im-
 provement next month.

Longer range, they expect the
 state economy to continue its
 growth at a slightly slower pace.
 Crews advises, "Growth in
 medical services should be closely
 watched as debate on proposed
 health care reforms begin in
 Congress.

For this reason, the American Cancer Society recommends all women age 20 and over have a monthly breast self-examination. Between the ages of 39, women should have a baseline mammogram to use as a source of comparison for future mammograms. Women ages 40-49 should have mammograms every one to two years, and women over 50, every year.

Also, breast exams by a physician should be conducted every three years for women ages 40, and every year for women over 50 according to the American Cancer Society. However, if you find a lump during breast self-examination, be concerned, but don't panic. The American Cancer Society reports that nearly 80% of breast lumps are not cancer, but only your doctor can make the diagnosis to put your mind at ease.
