Whiskey Still Destroyed In Carter's Branch Area

A Tishomingo man was arrested Tuesday after Tishomingo County authorities found that he was operating a moonshine still producing illegal wildcat whiskey.

Tishomingo County Sheriff Johnny S. Nunley said that Tilmer Bennett, 65, of Route 1 Box 183, Tishomingo was arrested Tuesday evening and charged with possession of an illegal distillery.

Nunley said that the still, located off County Road 99, near the Carter's Branch Community, had a 1,000 gallon aluminum pot and had the capability of running approximately 100 to 120 gallons of moonshine per week. The illegal brew has a street value of \$25 per gallon.

Brew coming from this particular still could have been deadly, Nunley explained, since it was run through galvanized pipes, an aluminum pot and then was cooled in an old radiator. "The Whiskey made with this still had a very high lead content because of the items it was cooked in," Nunley stated.

Nunley said that he and some fellow officers had staked out the area, beginning before daylight Tuesday morning, where the still had been built. When Bennett came to the site later in the morning, Nunley and his men emerged from their cover in some cut-over timber, to make the arrest. Bennett ran, entering the thickly wooded area. He was arrested later Tuesday afternoon.

Assisting the sheriff's department in the search for Bennett were three canine units including Danny Glover of the Northwest Alabama Canine Unit, the Tishomingo County Rescue Squad and Lester Dexter. They also received assistance from the Mississippi Department of Wildlife and Fisheries and the Belmont Police Department, according to the Sheriff.

Nunley said that they destroyed the wood burning still. He said that he believed that the still was only constructed about two days before and it was probably only the second time it had been fired.

This is the second still destroyed by Sheriff Nunley and his department since he took office.

Lawsuit Filed Against Tishomingo County Officials

A lawsuit against the head of Mississippi's prison system, along with Tishomingo County Supervisors and the Tishomingo County Sheriff, has been filed in Hinds County Circuit Court by family members of an Iuka woman shot earlier this year by a Tishomingo County Jail trusty.

The lawsuit, which represents only one side of an issue, was filed by the father and sons of Sharon Williams, who was shot April 3, by Leon Powell, a trusty at Tishomingo County Jail.

Powell apparently drove a sheriff's department vehicle to the Iuka Hospital where Williams was employed to pick up meal trays for the jail. While at the hospital, Powell shot Williams, left the hospital grounds and then shot himself.

Powell, who was serving 20 years for manslaughter, was committed to the custody of the state prison system after his conviction of manslaughter. Eddie

Lucas, commissioner of the Mississippi Department of Corrections, is being sued for \$1 million by the Williams' because it was his duty to oversee the assignment of prisoners to appropriate facilities. The suit states that because of Powell's crime history, Lucas breached his duties by failing to ensure that Powell was assigned an appropriate status.

The Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors, according to allegations of the suit, were at fault because it is their job to oversee jail operations and they failed to ensure that Powell was maintained in appropriate custody. The Board is being sued for damages totaling \$1 million.

Other allegations of the suit are against Tishomingo County Sheriff Johnny Nunley. The suit alleges that Nunley allowed Powell to leave the jail, unescorted, in a sheriff's department vehicle. It also alleges that Powell

was allowed to have a firearm and ammunition in his possession; however, an earlier investigation by the district attorney's office indicated that the gun in Powell's possession did not come from the sheriff's department. The Williams' suit against Nunley is for \$5 million.

All seven defendants included in the lawsuit are being collectively sued for \$2 million for emotional distress.

The suit's plaintiff's, Walter Williams--Sharon Williams' father--and Walter James Williams, Jr. and Albert Jermaine Duckett--Sharon Williams' sons--are being represented by Aberdeen attorney Howard Gunn. Gunn is requesting a jury trial.

Lucas is being represented by the state attorney general's office and the supervisors are being represented by board attorney Nick Phillips. Nunley has not named his representation as of yet.

Use Of ASRM Site Topic Of Recent Planning Meeting

What is to happen at Yellow Creek now that the Advanced Solid Rocket Motor Project is dead and buried?

Instead of worrying about what losing the project will mean to the tri-state area--Tishomingo County in particular--officials are urging residents to concentrate on the future and what can be done to effectively market the area for other potential uses.

This was among the topics discussed Tuesday, November 2, at a regional strategic planning meeting held at the Old Tishomingo County Courthouse in Iuka. Over 50 people, including community leaders, Aerojet and Lockheed employees and other concerned citizens from the Tri-State area, attended the brainstorming session.

According to Mack Wadkins, director of the Tishomingo County Development Foundation, about 54 percent of the employees working at the NASA facility were from Mississippi, 35 percent from Alabama and 11 percent from Tennessee. "Obviously it (the closing of the ASRM plant) has a regional effect on all of us because of its close proximity to Alabama and Tennessee. We hope the other states would join us and do a regional marketing strategy and

labor survey to see what industry we could get to come in," Wadkins said.

Approximately 1,200 acres, first abandoned by the TVA nuclear power project and now by the NASA project, will again be vacant except for a handful of employees kept on as the termination team, according to ASRM project manager John Thomas. This termination team will oversee the shutdown of the project and will work for about two years, Thomas explained. "Lockheed and Aerojet will be turning the facility over to NASA on December 21, 1994," Thomas said.

Total money spent at the Yellow Creek site, thus far, by Governmental projects totals nearly \$3 billion.

Jay Moon, director of special initiatives with the Mississippi Department of Economic & Community Development said that officials are trying to get lawmakers to amend a bill that provides funds for areas that are hurt economically by military base closures to include other facilities operated by the U.S. Government such as the ASRM plant. According to Moon, if the amendment is added, the area could be eligible for up to \$25 million in assistance; if a plan

could be developed to map out how the funds would be used.

Wadkins said that at some point a professional consulting firm would probably have to be hired to assist in the marketing effort. Many engineers, scientists, & other employees have expressed that they would like to stay in the area, according to Wadkins. "I had about 25 ASRM employees that came to me and expressed interest in maybe starting their own business here so that they would be able to stay in the area," Wadkins said. Billy Bolding, industrial services coordinator with Northeast Mississippi Community College, said at Tuesday's meeting that a small business development center has been established at NEM-CC to help anyone in the area wanting to start their own business. There were also representatives from the Mississippi Job Training Partnership Program and business incubator program at the meeting.

Wadkins said that he has been keeping contact with our legislators in Washington and that they are working hard to find an alternative use for the ASRM site. "There haven't been any announcements made yet, however I believe there may be some word before Thanksgiving," Wadkins said.

Wadkins and Moon urged those attending the meeting to submit any ideas or suggestions at concern jobs for the displaced workers or for utilizing the ASRM site to the Development Foundation.

Moon also stated that the purchase of land in the buffer zone surrounding the Yellow Creek facility had ceased. He said that plans for an alternative use of the approximately 2,000 acres, ready purchased by the state for its purpose, must also be found.

The meeting was sponsored by the Tishomingo County Development Foundation.

Police Search For Suspects In Iuka Business Shooting

Windows at an Iuka business were shot out Wednesday night, November 3, while an anonymous caller distracted local police by falsely reporting that an accident had occurred on the other side of the city.

According to Iuka Police Chief James Bates, windows at Handy Grocery, located on U.S. Highway 172 E. in Iuka, were shot out around 11:30 p.m. At about the same time, someone called to report an accident near the Key West Inn; however, there was no such accident, Bates said.

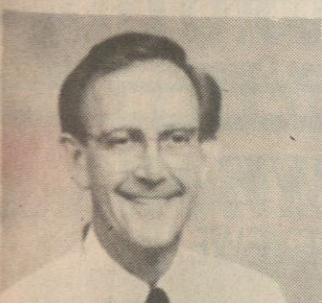
The shots fired into the grocery store shattered glass windows and the front doors, as well as damaging the side of the

building, police reports stated. The store was closed at the time of the incident and no one was injured. The owner of the store is Carrol Ed Sanders.

Bates said that there were no witnesses to the shooting. No shells were found at the scene, leading police to believe that the perpetrator or perpetrators were in a vehicle while shooting into the establishment. Officers believe a shotgun and a 9mm handgun were the weapons used.

The shooting is presently under investigation and no suspects have been arrested. Anyone having any information that might aid in the investigation are asked to contact the IPD at 423-6340.

Home Economics Tips

**CONTROLLING
HOUSEHOLD NOISE**

Noise is any unwanted sound. Noise distracts, disturbs and invades our privacy. It also affects our performance, behavior, hearing and increases stress levels. Kitchen appliances, audio and video equipment, computers, power tools and similar motor-driven devices add to the home's noise level. Many of today's homes are smaller, making noise control even more critical.

Sounds are either airborne or structureborne. Airborne sounds radiate outward in all directions from their point of origin. When these sounds strike a hard smooth surface, they are reflected back and continue bouncing until their energy is lost. When these sounds strike a soft or absorbent surface, the noise is diminished.

Structureborne sounds are transmitted through a structure by vibration from the source.

The first step in controlling noise levels is to determine the source and control the sound at that point. The best sound absorbers are thick and porous. Vibration-absorbing pads can sometimes be installed around machines or appliances to absorb part of the sound. Thick draperies and carpet with a foam pad will do much to reduce airborne noises in a room.

Kitchen cabinets and drawers may be lined with rubber mats or quilted plastic. Rubber pads on cabinet doors reduce the noise when they are closed. Rubber mats in the sink reduces the clatter of dishes.

Acoustical ceiling tiles in a room will not do much to keep out noises that are generated outside the room. The most effective means of keeping noises out of a room must be done during construction or a major remodeling, such as strategic planning in the location of rooms and hallways or in special wall construction.

Closets filled with clothes placed between rooms help to reduce sound transmission between them. Placing shelves filled with books along the adjoining wall will absorb much of the noise. They must cover the entire wall to be effective.

It is helpful to plug all openings that could serve to reflect sound. Plug cracks around doors, windows, electrical outlets and water pipes to reduce noises from outside. Use caulking or stuff the gaps with fiberglass insulation.

Caulking and weather stripping around all doors and windows will help reduce outside noise and make the house more energy efficient as well. Storm windows or double glazed glass, also good energy conservation measures, have the added benefit of helping to reduce street noises.

WHAT IS HYPEROPIA?

Hyperopia, or far-sightedness, is that condition where parallel rays of light entering the eye through the pupil would focus behind the retina (the back part of the eye). If you are far-sighted, you can see better far off than you can close up. Do not confuse this condition with presbyopia, where you also usually see better far off than close up. You can be near-sighted and still have presbyopia.

About 60 percent of school children are far-sighted to some extent. They usually can make out okay, since they can focus distant light rays pretty well. However, when they have to read, or do close work for any period of time, this puts a strain on their focusing mechanism, resulting in symptoms such as headaches, tired or aching eyes, an other signs of eye strain.

This can be relieved to some extent by looking off into the distance every now and then. This relaxes the focusing mechanism, giving the eyes a rest. However, if you find that your child consistently hates to read, or shuns any kind of close work, he may be far-sighted. A professional examination by your optometrist would be in order.

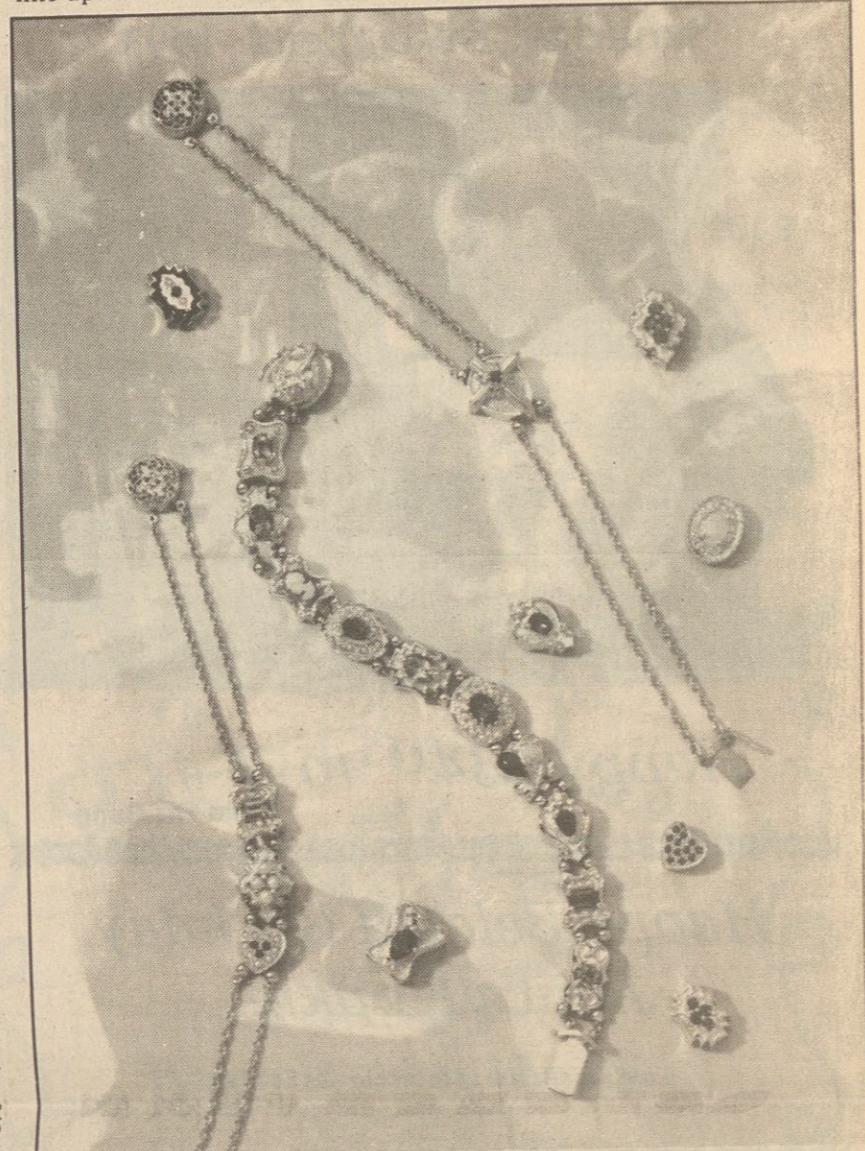

...on Cutting At Crow's Neck—Members of the North Mississippi Education Consortium, which oversees and manages the Crow's Neck Environmental Education Center, are on hand during the recent dedication. Benjamin, former

president of Itawamba Community College; Joe Childers, president of Northeast Mississippi Community College; Sonny Weir, director of the Tombigbee River Valley Water Management District and Gerald Turner, Chancellor of the University of Mississippi.

Wednesday, October 27, 1993. The facility, since its opening in April of this year, has seen close to 3,000 participants. Crow's Neck EEC Director Matthew Miller estimates that about that many more should be coming through by year's end.

Crow's Neck, located on a 530-acre peninsula of Bay Spring's Lake near Paden, is a non-profit education institute managed and overseen by the North Mississippi Environmental Education Consortium. The Consortium includes Mississippi State University, the University of Mississippi, Northeast Mississippi Community College, Itawamba Community College and the Tombigbee River Valley Water Management District.

Although the idea for Crow's Neck EEC originated more than 20 years ago with Hilda Hill, Dr. W.O. Benjamin, former president of Itawamba Community College, was credited with pulling the project out of the moth balls. The facility was constructed under the supervision of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers as a part of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway recreational development.

Future funding of the center will depend upon user fees, contributions, grants, etc. Also Miller said he is hopeful that endowment funds can be acquired for future operation of the facility. Miller explained that Phillips Petroleum provided \$2,500 for the construction of marked trails and the Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC) provided a grant to purchase 16 computers for the center.

Individuals and groups of all ages are able to participate in a variety of activities at Crow's Neck. A staff of seven, three of which are naturalists, are on site full-time. According to Miller, there have been a lot of school groups—elementary through university level—including workshops for teachers) utilizing the center. Many other organizations and clubs have also taken advantage of the facility since its opening. "We have had groups from all over the tri-state area. The farthest we have had a group from is probably Nashville," Miller said.

Some of the offerings available to those coming to Crow's Neck include courses in living history, cultural history, water sampling, energy conservation, trees, plants, mammals, birds, night hikes, etc. The diversity of species that inhabit the area makes the unique and such a great place to learn

about the environment.

The center, located off Hwy. 30, east of the waterway, is open to the public daily from 7 a.m. until 9 p.m. There are approximately seven miles of wooded trails for hiking that the general public is welcome to use. Four residential cabins, each able to accommodate up to 28 people, are available for group use. Each cabin features central heating/air, meeting room, separate teacher/chaperone quarters, loft, stone fireplace, shower, and restroom facilities.

The multi-purpose building houses a kitchen, dining hall, classrooms, meeting rooms, library, laboratory, theater, display and interpretive exhibits and open-air observation decks.

There are also two covered outdoor classrooms and an outdoor amphitheater, boat ramp and a canoe/boat house.

For day-use, or three- or five-day program fee information; or for information concerning other aspects of Crow's Neck, contact them at 601-438-6751.

In spite of low turnout meetings are still being held on the second and fourth Thursdays of each month at 7:00 at the Iuka Methodist Church.

Funds have been raised and much of the groundwork has been laid, but no organization can function without members. Habitat needs volunteers from all over the county. The group will begin with building wheelchair ramps and/or handrails for elderly or disadvantaged handicapped residents. These small projects will be Habitat's focus until there are enough volunteers to complete the requirements for the application for affiliation.

Did You Know?

Onesimus, 1700s

Onesimus was on the plantation of Cotton Mather. In 1721 Onesimus developed a cure for the smallpox virus - a highly contagious, often fatal disease that causes high fever, and skin eruptions - which was rampant throughout New England.

Onesimus never received credit for his discovery, which he told Mather was a common remedy in Africa. Mather sent the serum to a Dr. Boylston, who tried it out on his son and two slaves. Claiming the drug as his own. With his dishonesty, Boylston was honored with a fellowship by the Royal Society of London.

Near the end of the eighteenth century Edward Jenner found that the cowpox virus was an effective vaccine against smallpox. It is not known whether Jenner knew of Onesimus. Today the disease is virtually non-existent.

Falconry Exhibit On Display At Iuka Library-- Once restricted to the aristocrats of Europe and Asia, Falconry is now the obsession and devotion of almost three thousand Americans from all walks of life. This ancient sport of hunting with birds of prey can be traced back as long as 1700 B.C. Today falconers are by far the most regulated hunters in the country. After the decision is made to engage in the sport the prospective falconer must first find a sponsor from within the ranks of licensed falconers. There are only 35-40 registered falconers in Mississippi. He/she must then prepare for a stringent written examination which requires a score of 80 to pass. In addition the falconer's (hawk house) or "mews" must conform to federal specifications and will be available for inspection at anytime. After receiving the apprentice class license he/she must go out and trap and train his/her first bird of prey. After serving two years at the apprentice level the falconer will progress to the General class. At this level he/she is licensed to maintain and fly two birds of the endangered species. The falconer will stay at the General class for a period of five years before advancing to the highest level, that being Master falconer. It takes seven years to hit the peak in this great sport but more than that it takes total dedication, more energy than one may imagine and a tremendous love for Raptors. Billy and Judy Copeland of Iuka have been in the sport of falconry for almost three years.

Friends Of Iuka Library Membership Goal Of 350 Set For 1994

The Friends of the Iuka Public Library membership drive which began September 21 will conclude at the Lunch Break on November 16th. The program for the lunch break could not be more timely. It will feature Captain Mark Dunston Director of the Northeast Mississippi Law Enforcement Training Center at Tupelo. Captain Dunston has made a study of gangs, how they start, where they come from and how they can be controlled. His subject will be "Gangs in Smaller Cities."

At the luncheon there will be a drawing for the three savings bonds furnished by First American National Bank, Iuka Guaranty Bank and Peoples Bank and Trust.

With construction scheduled for 1994 it will have additional space for research materials and a meeting room large enough to hold such meetings as the Lunch Break audiences.

ASCS Farm News

FORESTRY INCENTIVE PROGRAM SIGNUP (FIP) The Tishomingo County ASCS Office began taking applications for the Forestry Incentive Program (FIP) November 8th and will continue until November 19th, 1993. The purpose of the practice is to establish a stand of trees for soil protection, ensure an adequate supply of timber for future years and preserve and improve the environment. The program is designed for cut-over timberland, marginal cropland and improving existing stands of timber. The State ASC Committee has established a maximum

limit of 80 acres per applicant due to limited funding. Cost-sharing of 65 percent is available to approved applicants for planting (\$36 per acre) including seedlings. Cost-sharing for site preparation in the form of mechanical or chemical is \$16 per acre for light, \$33 per acre for medium, and \$52 per acre for heavy site preparation. A flat rate of \$30 per acre is available for improving an existing stand of trees or releasing desirable seedlings an young trees. Applicants should not begin site preparation, tree planting, or burning until their application is approved.

Policies for this program are as follows: Cost-sharing is authorized for the establishment of trees that will provide both forest products and improved protection from wind and water erosion, clearing land occupied largely by scrubby bushes of no economic value, only where essential to permit planting desirable tree species, planting must be protected from destruction by fire and grazing. This practice will be required to be maintained for a minimum of 10 years following the calendar year of installation or establishment.

Tishomingo County farmers and landowners may contact the ASCS Office or their county forester for program details.
