## Accidental Shooting Claims Life Of Local Teenager

An Iuka teen died Friday, November 12, after being shot accidentally Wednesday while a friend was playing around with a handgun.

According to Tishomingo County Sheriff Johnny S. Nunley, Marcus Daniel Brown, 18, of Iuka, died at North Mississippi Medical Center from

complications related to the gunshot wound he suffered when a friend, Thomas Bradley Hamm, 19, also of Iuka, was playing around with a .22-caliber pistol at Brown's home, located on County road 246 in the Snowdown Community.

Reports stated that Brown was shot in the forehead when the firearm accidentally went off. Brown was taken to Iuka Hospital and then transferred to Tupelo's NMMC where he later died.

The accident happened around 1:00 p.m.; however, temporary administrator at Iuka Hospital, Glendon Spigner, refused to give the exact time to the News.

Daniel was a special person who always had compassion for those around him. He had a great love for his family and a special place in his heart for children. He was loved by his family very much and he will be missed greatly.

Daniel finished school at Tishomingo County High School. He was a member of the Short Creek Baptist Church and a construction worker at the NASA Facility.

Services were at 2 p.m. Sunday at the Cutshall Funeral Home Chapel with the Rev. Leonard Casabella and the Rev. Dennis Wingo officiating. Burial was in the Snowdown Cemetery.

Survivors include his parents, Jimmy L. and Lynda Brown of Iuka; two sisters, Teresa Stricklen of Tupelo and Sherry Norman of Nashville, Tenn.; one brother, James Richard (Dickie) Brown of Iuka; two nieces and four nephews and one special Aunt Willard Burrow of Iuka.

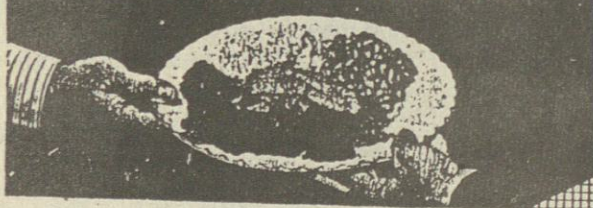

### Home Economics Tips

**PESTICIDES IN THE DIETS**  
**OF CHILDREN**

Feeding children a nutritionally balanced diet is often a challenge. Children are very opinionated in their food likes and dislikes. For many children, fresh fruits and vegetables are well accepted. They are colorful, tasty and a good way to get vitamin C, vitamin A and fiber into their diets.

However, recent reports in the media indicate that these two food groups might be dangerous to feed to our children by containing pesticide residues in unsafe limits. "To feed or not to feed" -- What should a parent, guardian or caregiver do?

Pesticides are used to prevent pest damage and loss of crops. The Environmental Protection Agency sets limits on the amount of a pesticide that can be used on crops. These limits are not only considered safe themselves, but they also have a safety factor built into them.

Children eat more food relative to their body weight than adults. A child's body may handle the pesticides differently from an adult. This may result in health risks that are lower or higher than for adults.

Most fruits and vegetables consumed by children have no pesticide residues or have residues hundreds of times below the allowed level. This concern over feeding children fruits and vegetables has resulted in some parents questioning their nutritional benefits.

The American Academy of Pediatrics, the American Dietetic Association, and the National Cancer Institute all recommend that children increase the number of fruits and vegetables in their diets. The potential health benefits of lowering heart disease and cancer are far greater than the risks.

There are some things caregivers can do to reduce the risk of pesticide residues on foods as well as enhance the overall food safety and nutritional quality of the diet: Choose a variety of foods. This will ensure a balanced diet, and lower the chance of problems from any one type of food.

Choose produce that is free from mold, bruises and decay.

Wash produce in water and peel skin or outer leaves. Do not use kitchen detergents to wash produce. Detergents may leave residues that are unsafe.

Grow your own fruits and vegetables. This gives you more control over your food, as well as being a great activity you can do with your children.

When growing your own food, take extreme caution to follow label directions when applying chemicals or pesticides.

Know your grower. Purchasing

produce from the back of a traveling truck could be risky. The grower may or may not have applied pesticides correctly. Since the seller is not permanent, they are not threatened by having their business shut down. By the time authorities realize their produce is in violation of EPA regulations they have more than likely moved on to the next town.

**YEAST BREADS, QUICK AND EASY**

This week I want to share a few yeast bread basics with you. Making yeast breads was a full day's activity in years past. However, with the introduction of quick rise yeasts, the time it takes to bake bread has been considerably reduced. Before we begin baking yeast bread, let's look at the purpose of the ingredients we will need to use.

Ingredients - Flour is the main ingredient in bread making. The flour helps to determine quality of the finished product. Flour made from hard wheat is higher in protein and better for making bread than is soft wheat. Flour having a high protein content absorbs more liquid than does one containing a smaller amount. Because all-purpose flours vary in their protein content most yeast bread recipes call for an approximate measure of flour in place of an exact amount.

Liquid used in making yeast may be milk, water, a combination of milk and water or potato water. The type of liquid used determines the texture of the crust.

Fat may be either butter, margarine, lard or vegetable shortening. Fat helps to give bread a soft, tender crumb. Generally, solid fats make a better crumb than do oils.

Yeast is a living plant that feeds on sugar and produces carbon dioxide, causing the bread to rise. Yeast is available in dry form or in the compressed yeast cakes.

Sugar furnishes food for the yeast. If sugar is not added, the yeasts can get food by breaking down the carbohydrate in the flour to provide sugar, but this takes a longer time. Sugar speeds up the rising process, adds flavor and tenderness and helps to brown the crust of the bread.

Salt adds flavor and helps to control the action of the yeast.

Eggs are not a basic ingredient to bread but are often used to add

color, flavor, and food value.

Bread Baking Hints:  
Kneading Dough - begin with a small amount of flour on kneading surface and add flour in small amounts as necessary to prevent sticking.

Shaping Loaf - For easy shaping, roll dough into an oblong shape about 1/4 to 1/2 inch thick. Begin at one end and roll tightly. Place lengthwise in a greased loaf pan, pushing dough against sides and bottom of pan.

Oven rising - Bread dough rises best in a warm, humid area. Such an area is easily created by placing a pan of very hot water on the floor of an unheated oven. Put bread pans or rack above the water and close the oven door. Allow bread to rise until double in size. Carefully remove bread and remove the pan of water.

Texture - To develop small holes in bread, knead thoroughly and press air out of dough before shaping.

Making yeast bread is an excellent activity for involving

young children in making. The kneading allows the child to actively participate in the recipe and gives the baker the opportunity to be creative when shaping dough for baking.

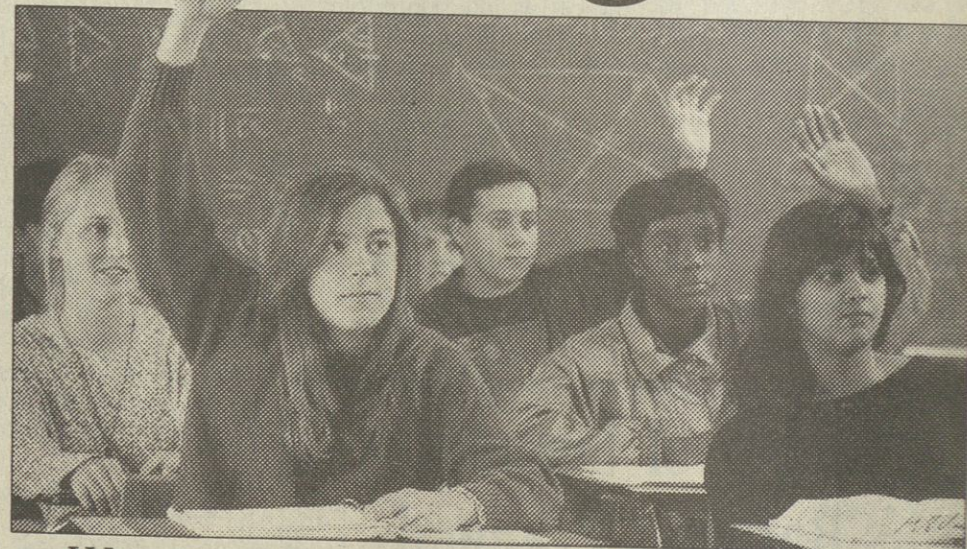

### INSIGHT INTO EYESIGHT

#### RODS, CONES EXPLAINED

Bet you didn't know you had rods and cones in your eyes, but you do -- millions of them. These are elongated, tube-shaped cells called photoreceptors which line the retina (back part of the eye).

Cones occupy the center of the retina directly in line with the path of light through the pupil. While rods are at the outer edges on each side of the cones. Cones are a thousand times less sensitive than rods, but they detect color and fine detail, yielding daylight vision.

Rods can react to the smallest unit of light, but can detect only gray haze images, yielding night vision. That's why you can detect movement out of the corner of your eye without actually identifying it. Or why you can see a distant star better by looking to the side of it.

Rods and cones are given to animals according to their needs. The hawk, for example, has millions of cones so that he can spot his prey from the air. The chicken has only cones; it can easily spot small insects on the ground, but since it has no rods is blind and helpless at night. The owl, due to more numerous rods, can see his prey 10 times better than man in the dark.

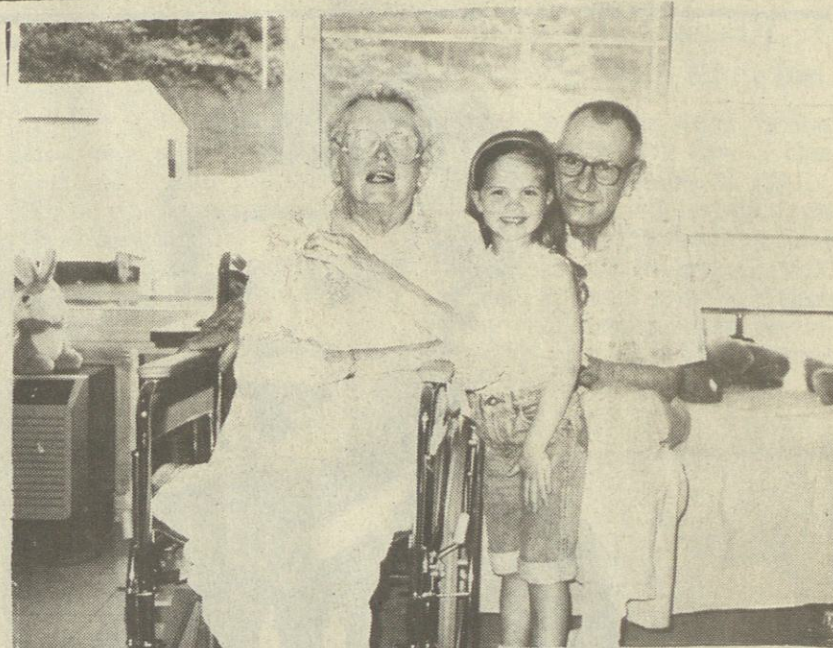

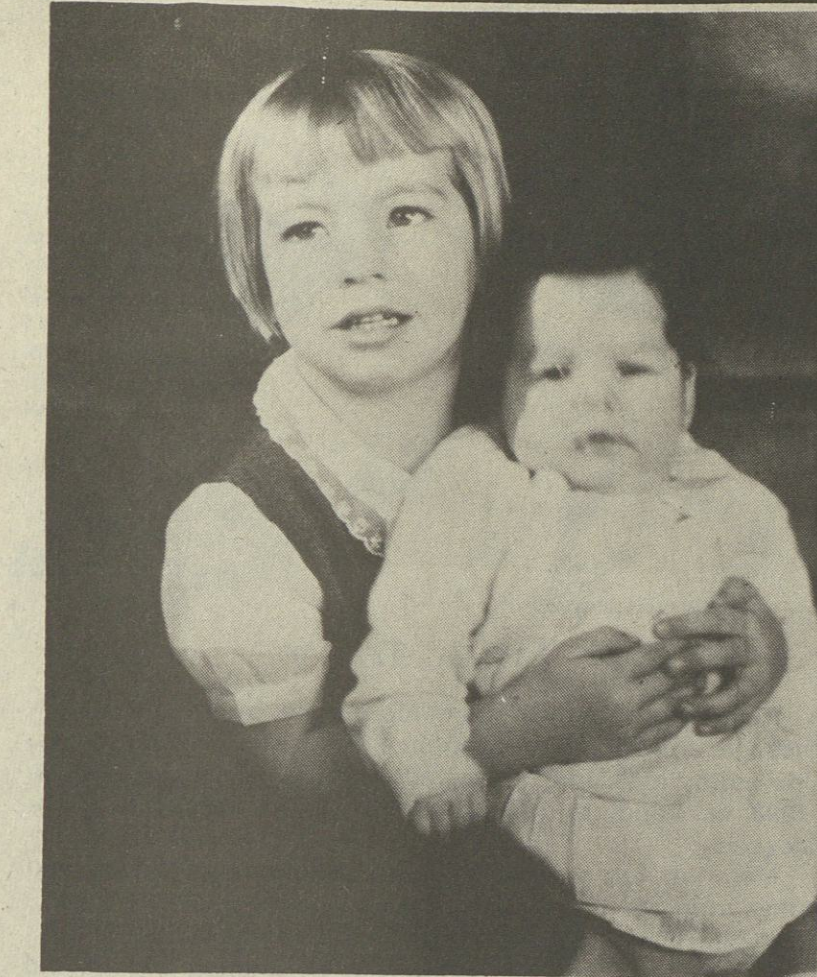

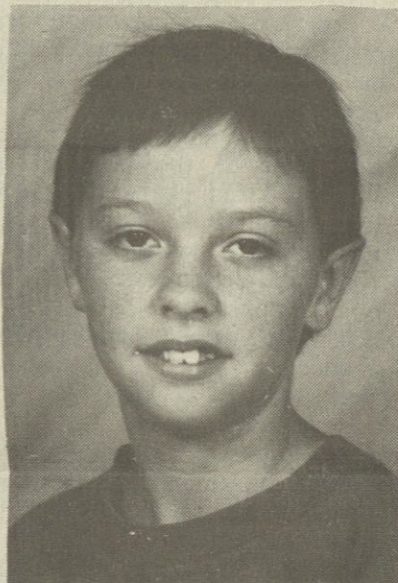

### Finally, the Makings of a Solid Crime Bill

The Senate had just begun making real progress on its bill when on November 8, *The Washington Post* in predictable took to its editorial pages to lecture lawmakers.

The *Post* tagged the legislation as "the feel-good crime bill" of several amendments offered to it on the Senate floor, including which more than doubled the President's request for grants to the for prisons, police and other crime-fighting programs.

As usual, the liberal *Post* missed the point. In moving to stop the crime bill, the Senate is doing more than reacting to an public that is fed up with the prevailing attitude of a criminal system more concerned with protecting the rights of criminals than of their victims and society as a whole. The Senate at long responding to a dysfunctional criminal justice system that continues release extremely dangerous career criminals into the community they should still be in prison.

There is no doubt that exit polls following many state and elections held across the country on November 2 were on the Senators as they debated the crime bill. A Gallup poll taken elections gave President Clinton a 63 percent disapproval rating handling of the crime issue.

On November 11 the President in a rare action reprimanded Attorney General whose narrow interpretation of the law recently a child pornographer win a round before the Supreme Court. President ordered the Attorney General to submit new legislation toughen federal protections against child pornography and exploitation. His unusual directive came in response to a Senate-passed response to the crime bill. If the Senate gets it, and the President gets it, just maybe, we can enact a solid anti-crime bill this year.

The original bill introduced in the Senate was weak and compromised the mark by not targeting the root cause of the wave of crime -- the career criminals who are not kept off the street. Americans are totally frustrated by the number of senseless crimes like drug shootings and murders which are being committed without mercy. They also have lost patience with a totally inadequate prison system where space limitations, rather than the severity of the crime, have to do with the length of a convicted felon's sentence.

That's why I offered a tough amendment which in the past has very controversial and encountered overwhelming opposition in the Senate. Known as the LIFER Amendment, it imposes a mandatory sentence on anyone convicted of a federal violent felony if that person has two previous violent felonies -- federal or state -- punishable maximum terms of five years or more.

Just six percent of all violent offenders commit a full 70 percent of all violent crimes, and there is a 76 percent recidivism rate among with three or more incarcerations. For too long, federal and state legislation, by focusing on the rights of these repeat criminals, has more to allow them back on the streets than to punish them for breaking the law over and over again.

On November 8 the Senate heard the voices of the people and overwhelmingly passed the LIFER Amendment by a vote of 91-8. At the same time we doubled the budget to put more police officers on the streets and expand prison space in which to hold career criminals.

Measures to remove violent criminals from America's streets are the "feel-good" actions of a reactionary legislature. They are overdue rights owed the law-abiding citizens of this country. (11/18/93)

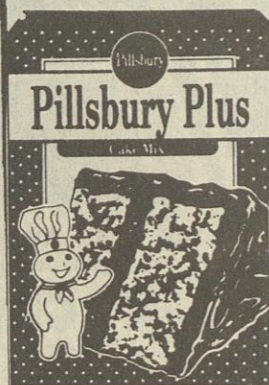

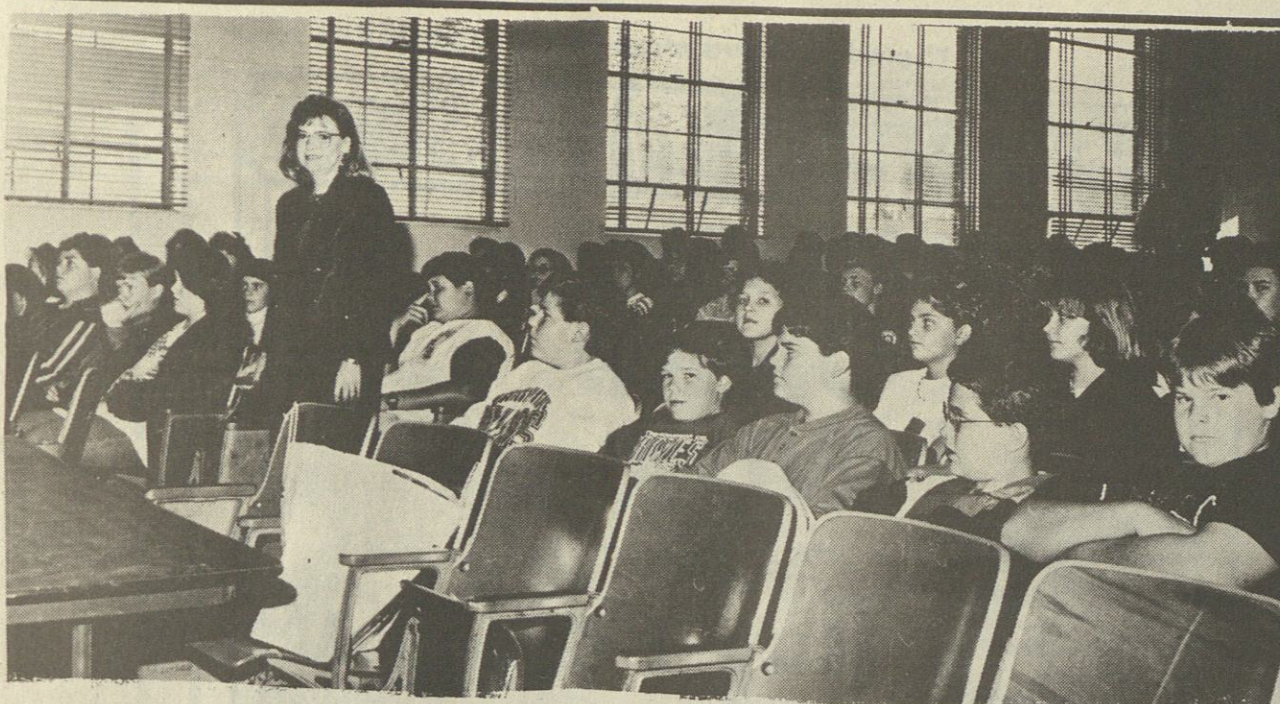

Mary Elizabeth Harwell, born February 1, 1897 in Tishomingo County, Mississippi, died Saturday, November 13, 1993 at the Magnolia Hospital in Corinth, MS. She was 96 years old and a member of the Church of Christ, worshipping at Iuka, New York Avenue in Oakridge, TN, and Foote Street Church of Christ in Corinth.

Funeral services for Miss Harwell were Monday, November 15th, at Ludlum's Funeral Home Chapel in Iuka. Her nephew, Charles Hellums officiated as relatives and friends gathered to honor and remember her. Burial was in the Harwell family plot at Oak Grove Cemetery in Iuka.

Survivors include her sister, Damaris Hellums of Corinth, nieces and nephews.

Mary, one of seven children born to Dewitt Clinton Harwell and Minnie Jane Flynt Harwell, was preceded in death by her brothers, Will Harwell, Ernest Harwell, and Edwin Harwell; her sisters, Nell Harwell Brooks and Ina Harwell Dexter. Her sister, Damaris Harwell Hellums of Corinth, is the sole survivor of the immediate family.

Mary graduated high school in Iuka after attending several one-room schools close to the home place North-west of Iuka at Harwell mountain. She attended school to her own sister Nell, along with her sister Damaris, or Hassie, and Edwin. She attended Freede-Hardeman College in Henderson, TN in 1917-1918 after which she gained her license to teach. She taught elementary school during the time at Freede-Hardeman and then taught in several schools in TN, AL, and MS. She taught at a number of schools in Tishomingo County, pre-dominately one-room schools. Her last teaching was in the school year 1943-44 in Belmont. She left Belmont and moved to Oakridge, TN. Not

long after she moved to Oakridge, the atomic bomb was dropped; however, she was unaware at the time of the bombing, that it was taking place where she was working.

Mary had moved to Oakridge as a matron to a women's dormitory and within a couple of years, she obtained a license as a licensed practical nurse and continued to work at the Oakridge Hospital, retiring in 1973. Her retirement from hospital work was the result of a severe stroke which required a long-term recuperating period. Regaining health, she returned to nursing doing private duty until 1977 at which time she moved back to Iuka for about three years, then moving to Corinth.

Miss Harwell loved children, having compassion to all she taught, and showing compassion and love to her family and friends wherever she might be. During her lifetime of professional work, she gained the respect of school trustees, students, doctors and nurses.

Many experiences from her lifetime were recalled as she shared them during the later years of her life. She remembered many things from back when she was in school and lived at the homeplace and her life in Oakridge. She had traveled extensively taking vacations and traveling to every state in the United States, going to Mexico City and Vancouver, Canada. She told stories of riding thru the giant redwoods and in fact thru a standing redwood tree in an open-top bus; she had ridden up a glacier in a tarmacobile.

Mary's religion was private to her and she studied the Bible well. She read the scriptures right up until the last couple of years of her life and studied diligently. Her faith was in God.

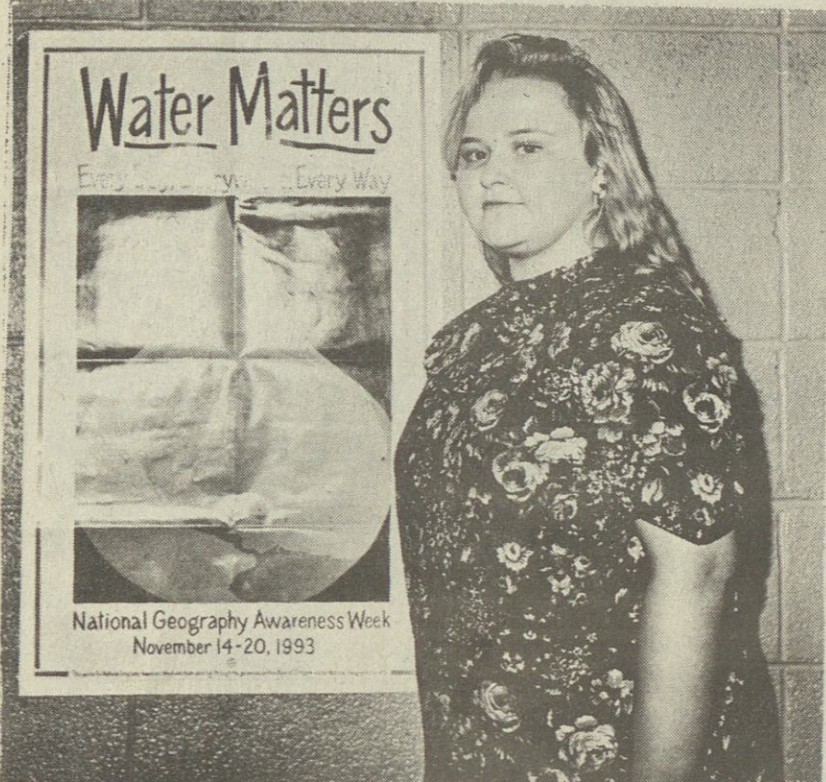

### Tenn-Tom Today

#### What Is The Tenn-Tom?

Very few man-made structures can be viewed from outer space while orbiting the earth's surface. One of these structures stands today as the single largest building project in the history of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. It is over five times longer than the Panama Canal and required the moving of one-third more earth. Although this work was done in our own back yard, there are still many of us who don't know what the project is, or how it was built.

The Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway is a 234-mile-long short cut from many of our eastern waterways to the Gulf of Mexico. It is a "chain of lakes" system consisting of ten lakes separated by as many locks and dams. The dams hold the water back to provide the water depth needed for navigation, while the locks serve as water "elevators," raising and lowering water traffic from one lake to the next. The Waterway was built chiefly for navigation, with wildlife and recreation management as important secondary concerns. Although the construction of the navigation channel certainly allows flood waters to escape more quickly, the waterway was not designed for flood control.

The construction of the Tenn-Tom resulted in three separate sections: a river section, a canal section, and a divide section. The river section is the southern-most portion of the project. It stretches from Demopolis, Alabama, to near Amory, Mississippi. Construction of this portion followed the path of the Tombigbee River. Here the river was widened to a minimum of 300 feet. Short canals shortened and straightened some of the riverbends that would have made navigation difficult. Although many of the old riverbends are relatively deep, the navigation channel is maintained at a depth of nine feet. Gainesville, Aliceville, Columbus, and Aberdeen Lakes make up the river section of the Tenn-Tom. Beginning in Amory, Mississippi, and continuing to the hills of northeast Mississippi, the Tombigbee River was not navigable. Instead of widening and deepening its meandering path, the Corps of Engineers constructed a straight canal to serve as the middle portion of the Waterway. Much of the excavated earth was used to construct a large dam on the west side of the canal, physically separating the Tenn-Tom from the old river and its flood plain. The canal is a minimum of 300 feet wide and is maintained at a depth of twelve feet. There are five lakes forming the canal section, Pools A through E.

The northernmost portion of the Tenn-Tom proved to be the most difficult to construct. There were still a lot of hills separating the Tennessee River and Tombigbee River drainage basins. Cutting the divide section through those hills required the removal of over 150 million cubic yards of material. At its deepest point the excavation was 175 feet deep with as much as 1500 feet separating the top of the cut. Bay Springs Lake and the Divide channel complete the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway.

Although the navigation channel was completed and opened to the public in January, 1985, recreation development and wildlife habitat improvement continue today. Over six million people visit the Tenn-Tom each year to recreate, hunt, and fish on the 44,000 acres of public

water and 72,000 acres of public land.

# Unit Earns Regional Award

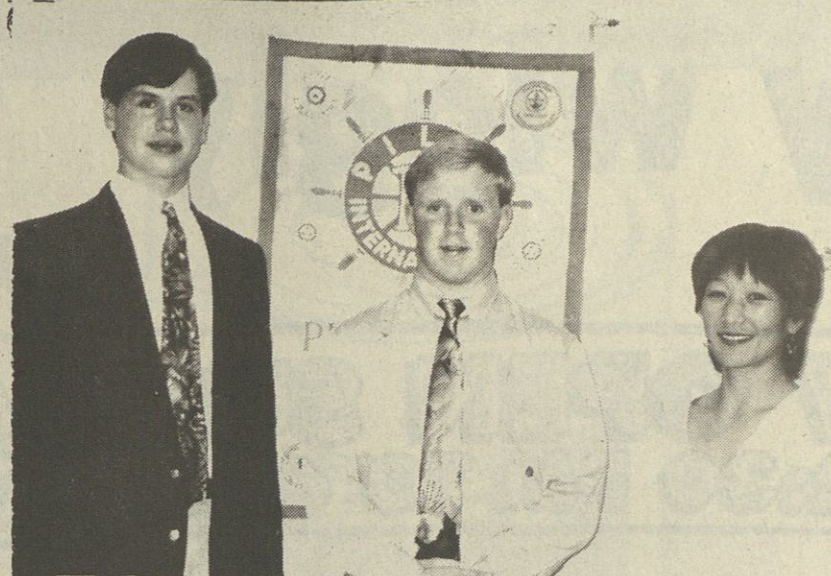

## Home Economics Tips

VENT WELL-SEALED  
HOMES -- OR ELSE

If you use storm windows, weather stripping and sealers to keep your home cozy and reduce fuel bills in winter, give special thought to indoor air quality. One possible pollutant of indoor air is carbon monoxide, produced by incomplete combustion of a solid, liquid or gaseous fuel. Gas ranges, furnaces and automobiles are all possible sources.

While breathing small amounts won't kill you, it can make you sick. Some symptoms of chronic exposure include constant headaches, fatigue and sleepiness. If you always feel headachy and worn out after a weekend at home and then recover at work on Monday morning, check your winter ventilation system.

Other potential pollutants of indoor air are formaldehyde (from insulation and treated wood), radon (from the ground) and nitrogen oxides. Ventilation will alleviate many home pollution problems, but it is still worth taking these precautions:

Have a reputable heating company inspect your furnace, the flue and the vent connector pipe. Replace any rusted or damaged parts. If you are converting from one type of fuel to another, get a qualified technician to do the work.

Make sure your gas range has an exhaust fan vented to the outside. Use the fan every time you cook.

Vent all fuel-burning heaters to the outside.  
Never use a gas range or oven to heat a room, even during a power outage.

Don't leave a spot of water boiling on a gas flame all day to boost humidity. Set a pan of water on the radiator, or use a humidifier.
