

County Agents Notes

By: Danny Owen, County Agent WINTER CARE OF FRUIT

Insect control on fruit trees is primarily restricted to the control of scale. Using a recommended dormant oil spray twice about seven to ten days apart will work fine. Make sure you get complete covereage on all limbs and trunk. This can be applied anytime after leaves have fallen and before buds begin to swell in the Spring. Always read label precautions. I prefer to wait until February to prune, but if you have broken or dead limbs, it is okay to remove

and burn them now. PESTICIDE SAFETY

Keep pesticides in an area inaccessible to children, adults who are unfamiliar with pesticides, and animals. All pesticides should be stored under lock and key away from food, seed, clothing, or other articles. Storage areas should be well lighted and well ventilated and temperatures should not be allowed to go below freezing. Keep pesticides in their original container and keep an up-to-date inventory. Read the label and be

By: Phillip A. Horn County Executive Director USDA CONDUCTS SOYBEAN REFERENDUM, FEB. 9

To determine whether soybean producers favor the continuation a nationally-legislated Soybean Promotion, Research and Consumer Information Program, USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service (AMS) will conduct a referendum, in cooperation with the Extension Service (ES) and the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS).

The referendum will be held on February 9, 1994 in all States.

The registration and voting will take place at cooperative ES county offices. "Our offices will eligibility determine challenged voters, count ballots, and report referendum results, "Phillip A. Horn, Director of the Tishomingo County ASCS of-

All producers who certify that they produced soybeans between September 1, 1991, and December 1, 1993, will be eligible to vote in the referendum. USDA officials say a simple majority vote will determine if the soybean promotion program will stay in

In the referendum, producers will decide if they want to continue to pay the current assessment of 0.5 of one percent of the net market price of the soybeans they sell. The assessment are used to fund the program, according to AMS of-

This guideline requires an exer-The next area feeder pig sale cise routine, and few actually accomplish this goal. Therefore, scientific experts were brought REMEMBER! In order for pigs together to review and formulate a new recommendation for the amount of activity needed to prevent disease.

The new recommendation is for every adult to accumulate 30 minutes or more of moderateintensity physical activity over the course of most days of the week. Because most Americans do not presently meet the standard described above, almost all should strive to increase their participation in moderate and/or vigorous physical activity.

Take part in activities of daily living such as using stairs instead of elevators, yard work and walking as much as possible during the day. The recommended 30 minutes of activity also may take the form of planned activities such as walking, jogging, playing tennis, swimming and

People who do not currently engage in regular physical activity, should begin by incorporating a few minutes of increased activity into their day, and build up gradually to 30 minutes of additional physical ac-

Even though the benefits of following this guideline are relative to the intensity of the activity, scientific evidence shows that even moderate activity can provide health benefits. For those who are extremely sedentary, a little physical activity can be as beneficial as stopping the use of tobacco.

Daniels said prices went up significantly early in 1993 due to demand and uncertainty about log supplies in the Northwest, but they normally come down in the summer when weather permits easier access to timber stands and log supplies improve. However, summer prices in 1993 did not drop as much as they had increased during the winter and

Daniels, said several factors 1993? served to keep demand high in 1993. The effects of Hurricane Andrew, which hit Florida in 1992, could continue to influence the need for lumber for another five years. This year's Midwest flood caused enough damage to structures to impact demand for building materials. Housing starts were also higher in 1993.

"Decisions made this year will result in less timber available in the future from national forests in the Northwest," Daniels said. "The industry will be looking more and more to the South for timber, and prices have moved up accordingly.'

North Mississippi has become a more important timber region than in past years. The North Mississippi forest industry development around Grenada and the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway, which continues to

aid in timber transportation, has

made the region more important

in forestry. "We've been saying for 10 years or more that the South was becoming the wood basket of the nation, and we have been encouraging landowners and farmers to plant trees," Daniels said. "The growing trend is definitely here and will continue for at least another two decades or more."

Sylvia Napper, executive vice president of the Mississippi Manufacturers Association in Jackson, said lumber mills have done extremely well with the higher prices in

"We've seen an increased demand for treated lumber for outside uses and foundations," Napper said. "It would be good for the state to increase demand for treated wood in projects such as modern timber bridges. Treated wood also can supplement in bridge construction materials."

Napper said use of treated timber in bridges would be less costly for Mississippi and at the same time support a major industry in the state.



Timber Takes Top Billing With State's Agriculture

Another year of strong demand and high prices combined to thrust forest products to the top of Mississippi's agricultural commodity list in

Forest economists Mississippi State University estimate a 21 percent increase in the value of timber production to achieve the \$972 million level -up \$162 million from last year.

Dr. Bob Daniels, extension forestry specialist at MSU, said the estimate is based on the slightly higher timber volume and substantially higher prices.

"We measure volume by reports on timber severance tax collections which are slightly higher than last year, which also was a high-volume year,"
Daniels said. "Prices for pine sawtimber were 19 to 22 percent





Tenn-Tom Today

Mysterious Sightings Investigated On The Tenn-Tom

Winter mornings are fairly quiet along the banks of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway. The moments just before and after the sunrise are met with a distinct chill as the breeze begins to churn the dense fog hanging over the water. It is times like these that outdoorsmen come to love, despite the cold. For some, it is encountered on a hike to a favorite pre-dawn hunting spot. For others it is on a brisk boat trip to a fishing hole or secluded

In these early morning hours the only sounds are the distant whining of an occasional outboard motor, and the sound of your own footsteps. The fog and the water have a habit of intensifying any sound. They also tend to accentuate the pre-dawn silence. The fog can be so thick at times that the beam from a flashlight scarcely reaches the ground. The motion of the breeze in the approaching dawn allows for only brief glimpses of surrounding features, momentary silhouettes set to motion by the movement of the fog. On mornings like this, even the most familiar of areas take on a strange and mystical air. The morning of December 31, 1992, was just such a morning for two fishermen on the "Tenn-Tom."

Although daylight brings with it the realization that the the Tenn-Tom is now a modern waterway, the blanket of fog and silence that hangs heavily over the old river in the early morning hours is the same one that has

greeted winter mornings for thousands of years. The banks of the old Tombigbee River have seen a million sunrises. The river traces history with its path, cutting through layers of soil, rock, and chalk back to the time when the area was covered by a shallow sea. Evidence of earlier times can be found along the banks in the form of ancient shark's teeth and mollusks. Times like these make it easy to imagine what life would have been like in time prehistoric, but on this particular morning the use of imagination would not be necessary.

It is probably safe to assume that many sightings of unemplained phenomena occur during inclement weather and/or poor visibility conditions. A boater navigating the fog on the Loch Ness could easily mistake a dead snag for something out of the ordinary. Someone hiking the mountains in a heavy snowstorm might be convinced that a brief apparition belonged to a sasquatch. Likewise, the old riverbanks of the Tombigbee lend themselves to strange encounters as they give way to time. The last years of many giant hardwoods are spent in a slow descent into the dark waters below. There can be no doubt that many an unwary boater has been startled by the sudden emergence of a towering giant looming overhead. Add to this the area folklore with its tales of the unemplained and the northward movement in recent years of the American alligator, and you get a wealth of strange sightings. No combination of personal experience and scientific knowledge, however, could have prepared the fishermen and investigating officials for what happened on this particular morning...

Although there is uncertainty as to the identity of the fishermen, the remaining details of the story have been well documented. The report received by park rangers and lock personnel was that a giant lizard-like creature had been spotted on the banks of the old river. Initial estimates put the monster at over 30 feet long, with sharp teeth and massive jaws. It had been spotted on a bank of selma chalk which had emerged from the receding flood waters. It reportedly had a long tail and some sort of fins running the entire length of its body. The fishermen wasted no time in concluding their own investigation and quickly alerted the proper authorities. The following is a

compilation of the reports of investigating officials.

Park rangers had little trouble in locating the area in which the creature was spotted. The bank was still wet from the waning flood, and evidence remained of some large creature all along the chalk embankment. The rangers quickly concluded that resolving this mystery would require specialized assistance. Paleontologists from the University of Alabama's Museum of Natural History were contacted.

In an investigation of this type, time would be of the essence. The forecast was calling for additional rainfall. If the bank became inundated by flood waters before the scientists could perform an investigation, the incident might remain a myster forever. The agencies would have to work together quickly to gather the evidence.

After an initial investigation, it was clear that a great deal of equipment would be required at the site. One of the chief curators at the Museum was assigned to lead the efforts. Fortunately, the flood waters remained low enough for the team to conduct a thorough investigation. Although studies of this nature often provide evidence for the scientific community, they can take a great deal of time to complete. Even when completed, many of the answers simply lead to further questions. At this point in the ongoing study, however, a number of conclusions have been reached.

The creature spotted on the banks of the river has been identified as a "mosasaur". Also known as the "giant swimming lizard," mosasaurs occupied the shallow seas of the area during the later Cretaceous period. These creatures are characterized by a pointed snout, sharplytoothed jaws, paddle-like appendages, and a long tail. Although the appendages resembled the feet of modern sea-turtles and the long tail was not unlike that of today's alligator, analysis of the vertebrae of the mosasaur leads most scientists to conclude that it swam more like a fish than modern reptiles. This was undoubtedly an aid in its carnivorous activities.

Excavation in the area thus far has yielded the remains of not one, but four of these mosasaurs. Other skeletal remains have included a duckbill dinosaur, two flying reptiles (pterosaurs), an asyet unidentified dinosaur with the tooth of a carnivore imbedded in its leg-bone, three turtles. numerous fish, and other assorted fossils.

Only further study and investigation will show the total wealth of information that will be found in what the paleontologists are considering a very significant find. The search for the answer to the mystery on the Tenn-Tom, then, is just part of an ongoing investigation into a much larger mystery. For now, however, word has it that on foggy mornings on the Tenn-Tom Waterway, you'd better keep your eyes wide open.



4-H Communicates

Winter is a wonderful season to get to know your family better. Because of the cold temperatures and shorter daylight hours, families spend a great deal of time inside. Why not spend this time involved in family projects and activities that will improve life skills for the children (and perhaps fathers) and bring the family closer together.

This would be especially good for children who are enrolled in the 4-H food and nutrition projects. They could take the leadership in planning these projects for the family.

Regardless of what activities a family is interested in or their talents, a good place to start these family activities is in the kitchen. We all have to eat, so this will

about these ideas for winter cooking experiences that can involve the whole family.

*Make a pot of soup or stew that reflects your family heritage, i.e., an Irish Stew if you are Irish or Minestone if your family originated in Italy. Let each member of the family prepare an ingredient for the soup pot and put it all together to cook. While the soup is cooking, prepare an appropriate bread and perhaps a dessert to accompany the soup or

*Go to a foreign land in your own home through food. Decide on the country you want to visit. Plan a menu and let each person be responsible for a dish. Try simple foods or use convenience foods. Try the grocery store for a good selection of Mexican and Oriental foods that are easy to make. Add an extra touch by dressing in costume for the meal.

*Make cookies or bread. This is especially good for the younger children. Choose a simple recipe and let each family member do something in the recipe. For an added touch, when the cookies or bread are cooked, package them for gifts to a lonely neighbor or sick friend. Then have the family make a visit to give them to the recipient.

*If someone in your family hunts, use the game as the focal point of a meal. After the kill and the game is dressed, have the family participate in cooking the venison, the rabbit or whatever it happens to be.

*Of course, all of this doesn't

achieve two purposes. Think just happen, even in the closest of families it will take some planning and lots of patience and under standing from everyone.

The 4-H food project materials have some excellent ideas. If the kids are not enrolled in 4-H, this would be a good introduction to project work.
