School Board Approves Lighting System For New Baseball Field

Tishomingo County High School Baseball Coach Jerry Long said after the County School Board meeting Monday, January 10, that the Board has given the go-ahead for the completion of the Braves baseball field, including the approval of \$58,950 for a lighting system.

The lighting system will be installed by DeSoto Electrical Contractor of Memphis, TN, the only bidder for the contract. Before accepting the bid from the company, Robert Grisham, General Manager of the Tishomingo County Electric Power Assoc. was consulted by the Board to ensure that the price was competitive and that the bid complied with bid specifications, according to Long. After Grisham's approval, the Board accepted the company's bid and said that work should begin as soon as possible.

The Braves Baseball team is scheduled to host their first home game in March.

Long said that a lot of the other work done at the field was financed by school activity funds or donations of labor and time. The Board also approved the construction of the dugouts by volunteers and supportive patrons after dugout dimensions are clarified.

Job Search Service Available In County

Mississippi Employment Security Commission's popular touch-screen computers have moved into additional Employment Service offices throughout the state including the County Job Service office located at Yellow Creek.

Last April the free-standing kiosk units were placed in 26 offices. The machines are called ALEX, an acronym for Automated Labor Exchange. By January 1, 1994, 20 more units had been placed in service.

"With these additions, virtually every full-time Employment Service office will have an ALEX," said Jim Bunch, director of the Employment Service for MESC. "Larger offices such as those in Jackson, Gulfport and Meridian will receive their second machine," he added.

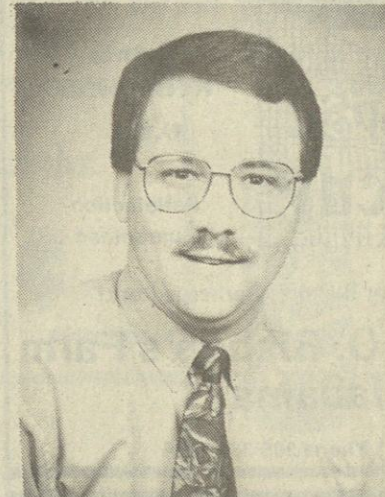
ALEX kiosks look and operate much like automated teller machines at banks. They provide

more information in a far more user-friendly manner than the microfiche viewers which have been the only means of self-directed job search available.

"You simply touch labels on the screen and follow directions to get information on as many as 20,000 job openings nationwide," Bunch said. "You can also request jobs by state or region. Job descriptions are updated daily, listing education and experience requirements, location and salary. If you find a job that interests you, you can request a printed summary to take to an interviewer for help in applying."

We are elated that a second federal automation grant allowed us to purchase additional machines. Applicant job search allows our limited interviewing staff more time for intensive assessment and job matching," Bunch said.

Soil Conservation Service News

Conservation tillage reduces erosion on highly erodible field in an effective as well as an economically acceptable manner. Conservation tillage is effective in reducing erosion because large amounts of plant residue are left laying on the soil surface.

Crop residue management is a year-round system that maintains an adequate amount of cover on the soil surface during critical erosion periods. Because of our warm, humid climate, cropland fields in the South benefit from an abundance of native winter cover. Residue management in-

volves maintaining these plans along with plant residue on the soil surface to prevent erosion.

Tillage operations like disking or plowing reduce the amount of plant residue left on the soil surface and greatly increase the potential for erosion. Mixing crop residue with the soil can increase the decomposition rate and contribute to the soil having lower organic matter levels.

Managing crop residue through a conservation tillage system may be your key to compliance. Conservation tillage includes any tillage or planting system that maintains a minimum of 30 percent residue on the soil surface after planting.

Home Economics Tips

GET THE SKINNY ON LEAN FOOD CHOICES

A diet lower in fat doesn't need to leave you feeling deprived. Today, a number of foods are available in reduced fat versions, making it relatively easy to lower your daily intake of fat, says Barbara Guinn, Extension Home Economist. In addition, there are many basic food alternatives that can help you cut back on fat.

Guinn suggests these choices:

*Drink skim or 1 percent milk instead of whole milk and select reduced fat salad dressings instead of regular.

*Use plain nonfat yogurt to top a baked potato instead of sour cream, butter or margarine. *Buy leaner, lower fat cuts of meat. Select beef round and loin instead of chuck or rib cuts.

*Select lower grades of meat. For example, choice or good grades have less fat than U.S. Department of Agriculture prime grades.

*Try lower fat foods, such as skinless chicken instead of beef, fruit instead of premium ice cream, and cereals, instead of sausage and eggs.

*Choose tuna packed in water versus tuna in oil. You'll cut the fat in a single evening by 6 grams. *Instead of adding cream, use pureed potato or rice to chicken soups.

*When making omelets or scrambled eggs, use two to three

egg whites in place of each whole egg.

*Salsa, jam, mustard and barbecue sauce have no fat. Use them instead of gravy, hollandaise sauce, butter, margarine and mayonnaise.

*Use herbs and spices versus high fat flavor enhancers.

When selecting foods, be sure to consider all of your alternatives. You'll be surprised at the number of lower fat options available to you.

Vets Encouraged To Refinance

The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) encourages veterans to refinance high interest rate VA home loans. In Mississippi, 20,344 veterans have VA home loans at an 8.5% or higher interest rate.

VA is contacting veterans who have high-interest rate loans to inform them of VA's streamlined program for converting VA-guaranteed loans to new ones at lower interest rates at little or no cost, even if the veteran does not live in the house.

VA's Interest Rate Reduction Refinancing Loan (IRRRL) program allows a veteran with an outstanding VA-guaranteed loan to obtain a new loan at a lower interest rate by using the same entitlement the veteran previously used to buy the home. An IRRRL is used strictly to reduce the interest rate and generally requires no property appraisal or credit underwriting. While some lenders may require both, all costs in connection with an IRRRL can be included in the amount refinanced.

An example of the effect of reducing a current loan with a 10% interest rate to 7% is to reduce by \$191.00 the monthly payment on a \$90,000.00 loan balance.

Veterans interested in refinancing their loan should contact a lender. Veteran homeowners who have difficulty locating a lender who offers VA-guaranteed loans should call VA at 1-800-827-1000 for additional information, including a list of lenders who offer IRRRLs and those who do not require an appraisal or credit check for those loans.

Pending Matters

The first week of the 1994 Legislative Session is complete and the Senate is working at a rapid pace to deal with the numerous issues facing our state. More than 400 bills and resolutions have been introduced since the session began on Tuesday, January 4.

Lawmakers returned to Jackson to find the state's

economy improving and collections above estimates. The budget session's proposed legislation. The Legislative Budget Committee revised its estimates and believes it will end the year on June 30 with nearly \$250 million in General Fund.

The Senate took action on bills vetoed by the Governor, referring them back to respective committees for decision on future action. The committee "hate crimes" legislation returned to the Senate floor to a vote by the Judiciary Committee. The bill would impose stronger penalties for hate involving racial, religious, ethnic prejudice. A two-thirds majority of those present was required to override the veto despite the Governor's suggestion. The vetoed bill was debated by several members of the Senate. Twenty-five members voted in favor of the override. Twenty members voted against the veto. The hate crime bill needed thirty votes to be enacted.

The State of the State was heard by a joint session of the House and Senate on Tuesday at noon. The Governor's remarks. Governor Felt set the tone for the session. He pointed out that the state is currently ranked #1 in the nation for its economic recovery and the unemployment rate is the lowest in 14 years. legislative agenda for 1994 includes: cutting state taxes, local option public choice, and more prison space.

Other activities of the session during the initial week include: new committee assignment of bills to committees, and a briefing on the financial condition.

Some bills already introduced would require the use of headlights when driving at night; allow legal prayer at non-compulsory events; reduce costs for county government; and fine for violating the seat belt law.

The first deadline session is only a week away. General bills and constitutional amendments must be reported by January 14 and introduced by January 17.

INJECTIBLE LENSES

When a patient has a cataract which renders his vision practically useless, it usually indicates surgery. The surgeon will remove the cloudy lens and usually replace it with an "implant", a clear plastic lens close to the patient's distance prescription.

The good news is that the patient usually sees much better since incoming light is no longer impeded by the cloudy lens. On the flip side, as you know, no surgery is without risk. Even if the surgery is eminently successful, the patient still cannot focus as before since the implant cannot change shape as the original crystalline lens could.

There is a new development which, when perfected, could eliminate most drawbacks. After the lens has been removed, a liquid plastic is injected into the lens capsule. The plastic is flexible, and can change shape like a healthy crystalline lens. This process would also minimize many other operative risks.

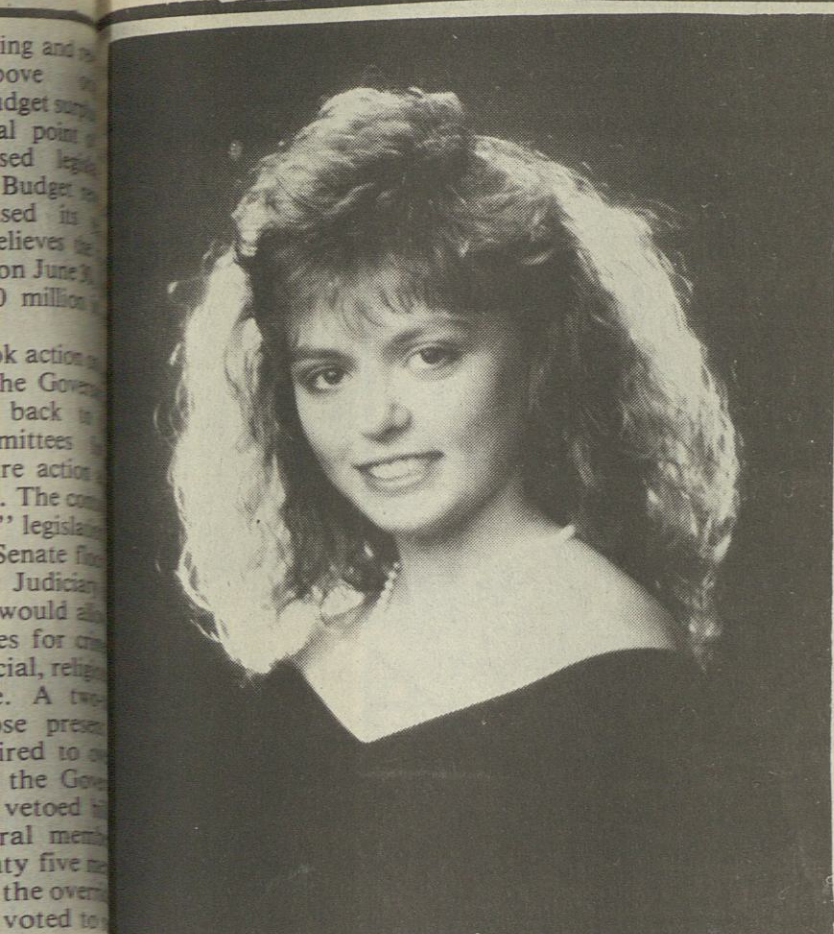

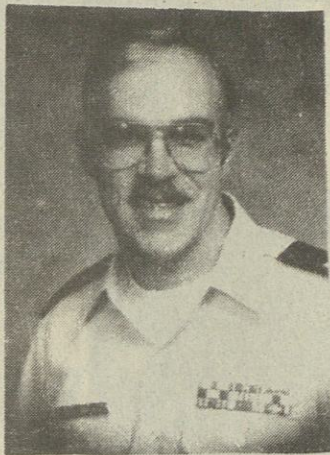

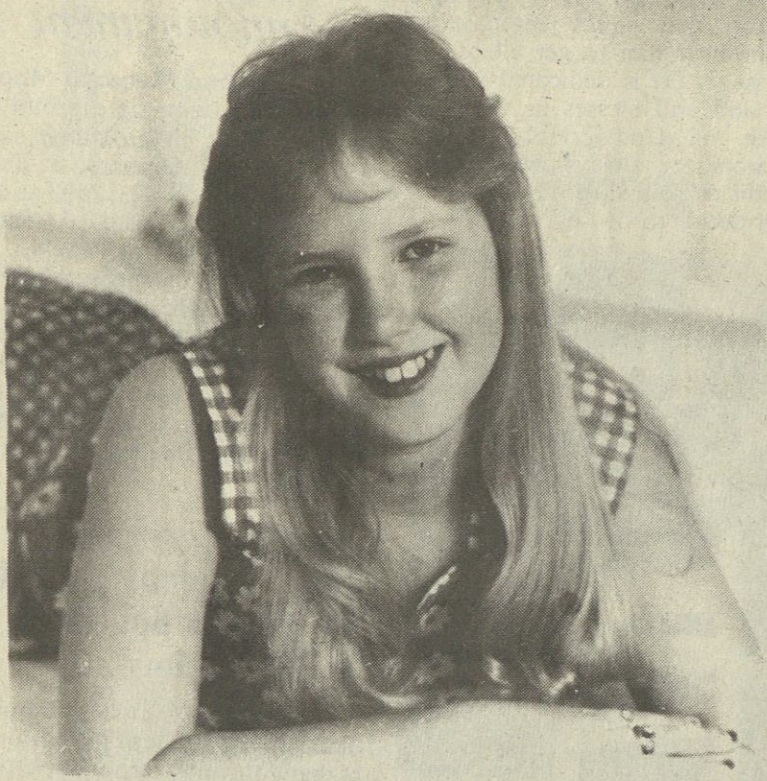

To expedite the registration process, students are asked to bring with them transcripts from high schools and colleges previously attended as well as ACT scores when required.

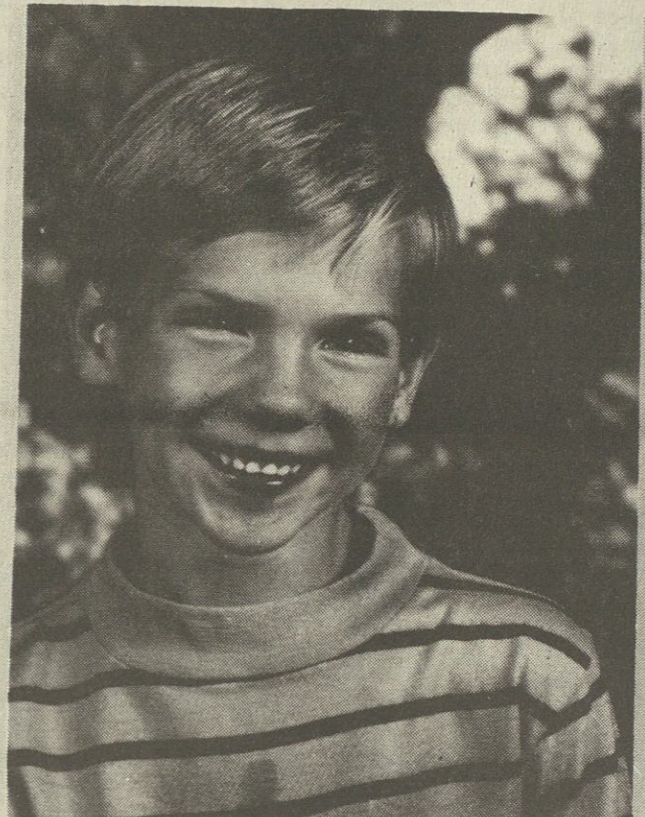

Housekeeping

Youth crime, classroom violence, and money matters were among the big issues as members of the Mississippi House of Representatives gathered at the State Capitol for the start of the 1994 legislative session during the past week.

The 90-day session officially began at noon on Tuesday, January 4, with the traditional opening ceremonies, introduction of hundreds of bills and resolutions, and announcement of several committee meetings. This is the third regular session of the 1992-1996 legislative term, and the second regular session since the special court-ordered legislative elections held in 1992.

The closely linked issues of juvenile crime and school-related violence are expected to receive high priority in the House of Representatives this year.

Speaker Tim Ford noted that national and state polls indicate crime has replaced education as the No. 1 concern of citizens. He said the increase in crimes involving juveniles has been especially alarming.

Other top issues facing the state's 174 legislators over coming weeks include education, economic development, health care, state highways, and repair or replacement of local bridges. Legislation also will be introduced dealing with such emotional issues as tax cuts, reducing the cost of car tags, school prayer, boosting the minimum age for getting a driver's license from 15 to 16, revising state gaming laws, and reducing the size of the House and Senate.

The Penitentiary Committee is looking at various proposals to deal with the steadily rising prison population. The Insurance Committee has begun work on a bill to strengthen the state's

Motor Vehicle Financial Responsibility Law in an effort to help reduce the number of uninsured motorists on the highways.

State Superintendent of Education Tom Burnham met with the House Education Committee to discuss the state's educational system and review the State Board of Education's recommendations for the 1994 session, including additional funding for the Tech-Prep initiatives, a pay hike for teachers, and funding for new professional development programs.

Based on latest figures, collections for the state's General Fund are now slightly more than \$150 million over the budget estimate for the current fiscal year, and \$146.6 million or almost 14.7 percent over the same time a year ago.

The Legislative Budget Committee had revised its yearly revenue estimates in November, projecting the state would wind up the year on June 30, 1994, with an ending \$236 million balance in the General Fund. Under state law, one-half of the ending balance, or \$118 million, would be carried over in the General Fund to start the 1994-95 fiscal year while the remaining \$118 million goes to the Education Enhancement fund created in 1992 to help boost Mississippi's overall educational system.

Governor Kirk Fordice has called for a reduction in the state income tax by raising personal exemptions by \$3,500, making a total cut of approximately \$70 million. The Governor stressed the tax proposal in his annual State-of-the-State speech to a joint meeting of the House and Senate. He also outlined his proposals for local-option school choice, economic development, and expansion of prison facilities. The Governor commended legislators for their efforts in recent years to combat

She was preceded in death by her husband Tom Reece and a daughter, Shirley Reece Proctor.

Ole Miss Gives \$1 Million For Engineering Scholarships

John Gabor Adler, who studied at The University of Mississippi after fleeing penniless from Hungary in 1956 because of Communist tyranny, has established a \$1 million scholarship at his alma mater.

Chairman and chief executive officer of Adaptec Inc. in California, Adler has donated 35,000 shares of his personal Adaptec stock to the University. The stock, which translates to more than \$1 million after commissions, will establish the John G. Adler Engineering Scholarship Endowment Fund.

"At a time when tuition costs have gone up and it is harder for families to meet the expenditures of college, it is encouraging to have alumni come forward to help others excel and progress by giving donations for scholarships," Chancellor Gerald Turner said.

Adler, who could not speak English when he left Hungary, traveled to many countries before arriving in the United States. He first found shelter in U.S. Army barracks at Camp Kilmer, N.J.

The World University Service, which helps immigrants receive collegiate scholarships, directed Adler and Charles Tilly, another Hungarian refugee, to Ole Miss. They were selected by a group of students and faculty to receive full four-year scholarships, and only a few weeks later, the Ole Miss community has raised

enough money to pay for their other college and clothing expenses. The two arrived in Oxford in February 1957.

Bob Travis, the 1956-57 student body president, said the two men were greeted with honor. "Great efforts were made to make them feel at home. They both had come through an excruciating experience. They adapted very quickly and were well received and well liked," he recalled.

Adler graduated from Ole Miss in 1960 with a bachelor's degree in electrical engineering.

After college, he was hired by IBM for \$115 a week. Realizing he had executive potential, IBM sent Adler to Stanford University as a Sloan Executive Fellow, and he graduated in 1971.

In 1985, Adler was recruited by Larry Boucher, a former IBM colleague who had started his own company -- Adaptec, Inc. Adler has been associated with the company ever since.

Founded in May 1981 in Milpitas, Calif., Adaptec makes products that improve the input/output capabilities of personal computer systems and offers the widest array of input/output solutions available for microcomputers.

Adler holds fond memories of his time at Ole Miss. "In this world, everything depends on education. Education has always been important, but it is now so more than ever. I am ever so grateful to The University of Mississippi and everyone there. Without that help, I wouldn't be where I am today."

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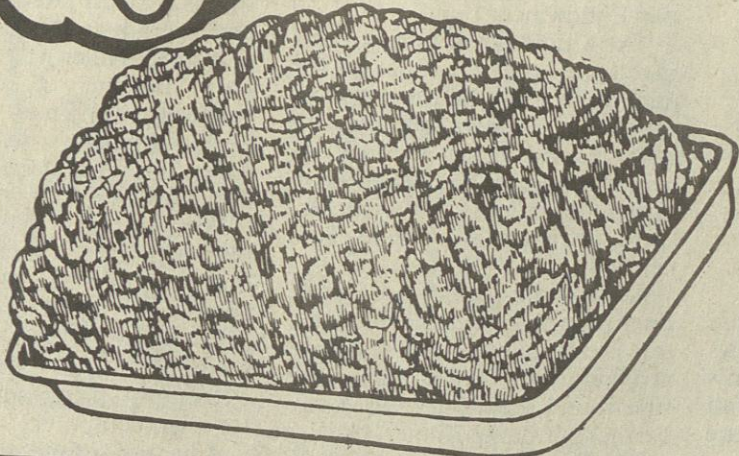
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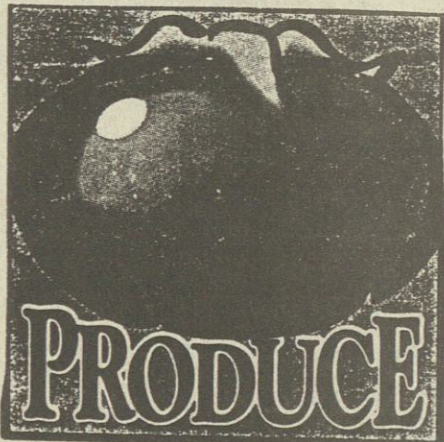

Letter To The Editor

At the request and insistence of several close friends, we have decided to comment on a recent series of events concerning an oil painting of "The Rapture" which was given to a local church in Tishomingo, Mississippi last October by my family as a gift in good faith. Unfortunately the obvious message portrayed by this painting was overshadowed by a fanciful search for an alternate meaning.

If I may quote from excerpts of a work by the late Rev. Clarence Larkin, 1918, it shall hopefully bring more light upon the intended meaning of this work of art. One only need look at the painting for what it really conveys, but all are free to derive any meaning which pleases them, depending upon what they wish to see. In any event, all must face the music, and wake up to the inevitable.

As to the second coming of Christ, THE RAPTURE WILL BE A "SURPRISE". "Watch therefore; for ye know not what hour your Lord doth come. But know this, that if the Goodman of the house had known in what watch the thief would come, he would have watched, and would not have suffered his house to be broken up. Therefore be ye also ready; for in such an hour as ye think not the Son of Man cometh." Matt. 24:42-44 "Behold, I come as a thief. Blessed is he that watcheth, and keepeth his garments, lest he walk naked, and they see his shame." Rev. 16:15. "But of the 'times' and the 'seasons', brethren, ye have no need that I write unto you. For yourselves know perfectly that the 'Day of the Lord' (the day of His Return), so cometh as a thief in the night. For when they shall say, 'Peace and Safety;' then sudden destruction cometh upon them as travail upon a woman with child, and they shall not escape." This refers to the Second Stage of Christ's Coming, the "Revelation," when He shall take vengeance upon His enemies. 2 Thess. 1:7-10. But Paul adds: "But ye, brethren, are not in darkness, that that day (the day of His Return) should overtake you as a thief." 1 Thess. 5:1-4. So Jesus at the Rapture will come and take away the saints only and leave the wicked and the great mass of the heathen behind, for those who will be taken will be comparatively few.

THE RAPTURE WILL BE "ELECTIVE". It will not only separate the saints from unbelievers, but it will separate husbands from wives, brothers from sisters, friends from friends. "I tell you, in that night shall be two men in one bed; the one shall be taken, and the other shall be left. Two women shall be grinding together; the one shall be taken, and the other left. Two men shall be in the field; the one shall be taken, and the other left. Luke 17:34-36. The words "men" and "women" in this passage are in italics. That means that they are not in the original, and so the passage should read there shall be "two in one bed, husband and wife, or two brothers, or two sisters, or two friends. Two in "bed" indicates night; two grinding at the mill, morning or evening; two in the field mid-noon. This shows that the Rapture will happen all over the earth at the same time or as the Apostle describes it in a "moment", or the "twinkling of an eye." "As the lightning cometh out of the east, and shineth even unto the west; so shall also the coming of the Son of Man Be" (Matt. 24:27) is the way Jesus puts it.

The "Rapture" will be the most startling "event" of this Age and Dispensation. As it is to occur in the "Twinkling of an eye" and all over the earth at the same time, that part of the world that is not asleep will witness the event. As to the "Shout of the Lord," the "Voice of the Archangel," and the "Trump of God" we do not know whether their sound will be heard and distinguished by others than the "dead in Christ" and the "living saints." We know that one day the Father spoke to Christ in a voice that He understood, but the people who stood by mistook it for "thunder." John 12:28-29. When the Lord appeared to Saul of Tarsus on the road to Damascus and spoke to him, the men that journeyed with him stood speechless, "hearing a voice," but seeing no man, and not understanding what was said. Acts 9:3-7. We know however that the "dead in Christ" will hear the sound, for it will be "intensely penetrating." There will be no graves so deep, no catacombs so rock covered, no pyramids or mausoleums so thick, but what the sound shall reach their depths and the "dead in Christ" shall hear the cry--"awake ye sleeping saints and arise from the dead, it is MORNING, the morning of the FIRST RESURRECTION." The First Resurrection will be secret and

probably unknown to the world, but it will not be so with the "Living Saints" who are translated. If it is night on our side of the globe when the Rapture occurs the community will wake up in the morning to find all the real Christians gone, disappeared in the night. Many may hear the sound of the "Midnight cry" -- "BEHOLD THE BRIDEGROOM COMETH," but thinking it only thunder, will turn over for another nap, but in the morning they will find the bedroom door locked, with the key on the inside, just as they locked it before retiring, and the clothes of the loved one who occupied the room with them lying where they were placed when taken off the night before, but that loved one, who was a Christian missing. Husbands will wake up to find Christian wives gone. Brothers and sisters will be missed, and dear children absent, and not an infant will be left behind. Many faithful servants and employees will not report for duty, and the world will awake to the fact that the Bible is true, and the much despised doctrine of the Pre-Millennial Coming of the Lord to gather out His saints is no fanciful interpretation of Scripture.

If it be day with us when the Rapture occurs, the "EVENT" will be startling. As it was in the days of Noah (Matt. 24:36-39), the people will be eating and drinking, marrying and giving in marriage, buying and selling, planting and building.

If it be a pleasant time of the year, the boats, and cars, & parks will be filled with pleasure seekers. If it be in the midst of the week, and during the business hours of the day, the shops and stores will be filled with shoppers and the mills with toilers, and the streets of the cities lined with men and women and children on pleasure and business bent. Suddenly a noise from heaven will be heard like a great peal of thunder. The people will rush to doors and windows, and those on the streets and in the fields will look up to see what has happened. To the vast majority it will be but a startling and alarming sound, but to many it will be the "VOICE OF THE LORD."

But when the people recover from their surprised and affrighted condition they will discover that a great many people are missing, and that the missing were the best people in the community. The large Department Stores, Banking Institutions, Manufacturing Plants, and other places of business will find their working force depleted by the loss of faithful employees. People walking on the streets will find their companions gone, and the street car lines will be blocked because of absent motormen, conductors and teamsters. Railroad and steamboat lines (freeways, roads, and thoroughfares) will be crippled, and confusion will reign everywhere. In many homes the servants will be missing and members of the family will come home to find loved ones gone.

At first the whole thing will be a Mystery, until some one who had heard or read about the "Rapture of the Saints," realizing what has happened, will explain the situation.

But one of the surprises of that day will be that so many professing Christians, and among them many ministers and Christian workers, will be left behind, while some who were not known to be Christians will be missing. The next day's papers will be full of what happened the day before, and many of them will be swelled to twice their ordinary size by the pressure on their advertising columns for information as to missing ones, and for help to fill important vacancies and positions of trust. For a few days the excitement will be

intense. Then the people will settle down to the inevitable. With the exception of a few who will REPENT AND TURN TO GOD, the mass of the people will become more hardened and wicked than before, and some who lost loved ones will be embittered. As the Holy Spirit will have gone back with the "Raptured Ones," and the "saints," the SALT of the earth, been taken out, there will be nothing to prevent the rapid degeneration and "Moral Putrefaction" of those who are "left," and sin and iniquity and all manner of crime and worldliness will increase and pave the way for the manifestation of Antichrist, under whose administration the world will rapidly ripen for judgment.

NO, we shall not sue for slander or libel as all know we could. We shall not forsake the LORD OUR GOD or our own salvation in the name of hate or vengeance. Instead we shall pray for all lost souls, that they may see light and reach for love and better understanding. We will continue to pray for the individuals who originated and perpetrated the untruths with deliberate intent of malice against our family, and for those who simply found entertainment in passing them along to others. "Judge not, that ye not be judged. For what judgement ye judge, ye shall be judged: and with what measure ye mete, it shall be measured to you again." Matt 7:1-2.

With the most profound wishes for love, peace, and happiness to all of mankind, God be with you all the days of your being. Heaven awaits those who believe. AMEN
