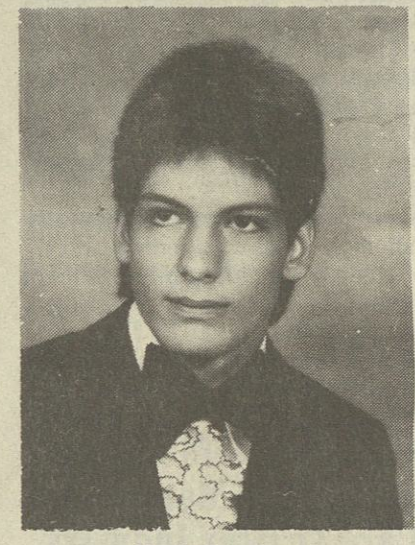

Iuka Man Killed In Tragic Accident

On January 14, 1967 there was a life brought into this world. He was a beautiful baby boy named Charles Porter Broadway III. Those who knew and loved him soon came to call him Chuck. Chuck lived life to the fullest. Everyone who met him felt the happiness and energy that radiated from him.

On the anniversary of his birth, January 14, 1994 Chuck, who was 27, was tragically taken from us all in a telecommunications tower accident, on site in Spartanburg, South Carolina. He was an employee of Minerich, Inc.

Chuck graduated from Tishomingo High School in 1985. He excelled in every area in which he was involved; no matter if it were clubs or sports. He was a member of basketball, football and baseball teams. He was a class officer, member of the Beta Club, Homecoming court, and many others.

Services were at 2 p.m. Monday at the Cutshall Funeral

Home Chapel with the Rev. Herman Clark officiating. Burial was in the Hubbard-Salem Cemetery in Iuka.

Survivors include his parents, Charles and Phyllis Broadway, Jr. of Iuka; one daughter, McKagan Nichole Broadway of Corinth; one sister, Marcia Browning of Iuka; one brother, Keith Broadway of Atlanta, Ga.; his paternal grandparents, Charles and Ruth Broadway, Sr. of Iuka; and his maternal grandmother, Erlene Dillard of Corinth.

One Sentenced In Local Break-ins

A Savannah man was charged with two counts of burglary & larceny and one count of larceny and has been sentenced in Circuit Court.

Judge Frank Russell sentenced Brett Tucker, of Savannah, Tenn., formerly of Iuka, to 21 years with seven of it suspended for burglary and larceny and burglary of the Tishomingo Elementary School, Middle School and gym. Tucker was arrested for the crimes in March of 1993, according to the Tishomingo County Sheriff

Sheriff Nunley said that Tucker will face three more burglary charges during the next term of Circuit Court.

(1) Be friendly and helpful to everyone - especially visitors. This is particularly important in places of public service such as restaurants, service stations, motels, real estate offices, etc.

(2) Please don't litter; the first impression that visitors get when traveling through the county, may be a look at the roadsides or banks of Pickwick and Bay Springs Lake.

NEMCC To Offer Computer Classes

Introduction to DBASE III, Word Processing/Word Perfect, Computer Literacy & Usage, and Introduction to Lotus 1-2-3 will be offered by the Northeast Mississippi Community College Office of Continuing Education at the Booneville campus.

Introduction to DBASE III is a six-session course designed to develop a basic understanding of database management software. This is one of the most widely used database management systems for personal computers. The class begins on Thursday, February 17 and meets each Thursday through March 31 from 6 to 9 p.m. in room 217 of Gordon Hall. The fee is \$75 per person.

Word Processing/Word Perfect is also a six session course using the package for personal computers. Participants will work on document entry, editing, formatting, and other basic functions. Classes begin on Tuesday, Feb. 15 and meet each Tuesday through March 29 from 6 to 9 p.m. in room 212 of Gordon Hall. The fee is \$75 per person and familiarity with a keyboard is required.

Computer Literacy and Usage is a five-session course designed to build a basic understanding of computers and to instill confidence in the participant's ability to perform simple programming to communicate with the computer effectively.

Emphasis will be placed on hands-on instruction. The class begins on Tuesday, February 15 and meets each Tuesday through March 22 from 6 to 9 p.m. in Gordon Hall, room 217. The fee is \$65.

Introduction to Lotus 1-2-3 is a six-session course designed to build a basic understanding of electronic spreadsheets and their applications. It is one of the most popular software packages on the market for microcomputers. Classes begin on Thursday, February 7 and meet each Thursday through March 31 from 6 to 9 p.m. in Gordon Hall, room 212. The fee is \$75.

Classes will not meet during Spring Holidays March 14-18. For more information about the classes call the NEMCC office of Continuing Education at 728-7751, extension 296.

Home Economics Tips

AT THE HEART OF CHOLESTEROL

It's 1994. Do you know what your blood cholesterol level is? While experts continue to study the significance of blood cholesterol, they do agree that most Americans could help control or even lower their blood cholesterol by reducing the intake of fat, especially saturated fat, and dietary cholesterol, says Barbara Guinn, Extension Home Economist.

Awareness is key when it comes to cholesterol. To determine the amount of cholesterol circulating in your blood, you need to have your blood cholesterol level checked.

The National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute suggests that as a general rule, total blood

cholesterol should be 200 milligrams (mg) or less. As blood cholesterol levels climb above 200 mg, the relative risk of heart attack increases. Studies indicate that there is a 2 to 4 percent reduction in the risk of heart attack for every 1 percent reduction in blood cholesterol.

Cholesterol in the foods you eat, known as dietary cholesterol, can influence blood cholesterol levels. However, the total amount of fat, particularly the amount of saturated fat in the diet, has an even greater influence on cholesterol in the blood.

There are two important dietary guidelines to help control blood cholesterol levels:

*The American heart Association suggests that daily dietary cholesterol should be 300 mg or less.

*Total fat should be no higher than 30 percent of daily calories with only 10 percent coming from saturated fat.

Prevent Frozen Pipes

With Arctic air once again sweeping this way, homeowners in Northern Mississippi face a threat that can prove costly and inconvenient -- frozen water pipes.

When frozen pipes burst, thousands of gallons of water can spew on to furniture, floors, walls and appliances, warns State Farm Insurance, largest insurer of homes in the state and nation.

"While the deep freeze isn't supposed to last too long, it just makes good sense to be prepared," said Paul Homan, Public Affairs Manager. "It's a personal tragedy for anyone to have their home or belongings damaged. But this, generally can be prevented."

Here are a few tips:

*Leave the heat on and set no lower than 55 degrees. If no one will be home for several days, have someone check the home daily to make sure the heat is on.

*Open cabinet doors under sinks on outside walls to let in warm air.

*Insulate pipes most susceptible to freezing. Typically, these are near outer walls, in crawl spaces and in the attic.

*Disconnect all garden hoses. If there is an indoor valve, shut off and drain the water supply to outdoor faucets.

*If pipes do freeze, don't try to thaw a pipe with an open flame or torch. That can set your house on fire. Be careful of electric

shock in areas of standing water.

*Make sure all family members know the location of the home's water shut-off valve. If a pipe bursts, shutting off the water promptly can help minimize damage.

Hospitals Join Forces To Provide Managed Care To Area Industry

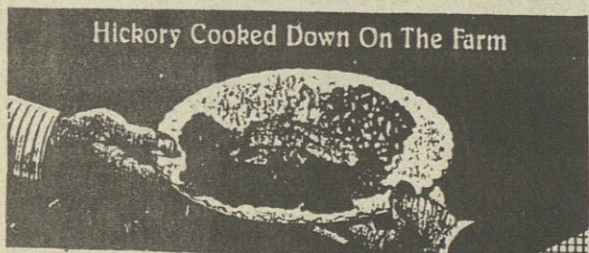

Burnett Bryant Recognized As Leader

Girl Scouts have a long standing reputation in most Southern communities. That is certainly the case in Iuka, Burnsville and many other areas of Tishomingo County. Girl Scouts are one of the few all girl organizations in the United States. Its program is designed to help girls become aware of themselves as a unique person of worth; to relate to others with increasing skill, maturity and satisfaction; to develop values that give meaning and direction to her life; and to contribute to the betterment of her society. This program has a tremendous impact in the growth of young girls into dynamic young women.

Programs like this are, however, only as good as the adults who administer them. One such person is Burnett Bryant - an Iuka native, a wife, mother and grandmother she found time in her busy schedule to work with Girl Scouts and make a permanent impression on the lives of twelve girls who in the late '70s and early '80s were a part of Girl Scout troop #199. Burnett managed to keep these girls interested in scouting all the way through their senior year in High School. This was accomplished by setting what seemed to be an unreachable goal early in their scouting experience. When she first started talking about taking all the girls on a cruise to

the Bahamas no one was really sure that such a high goal could be accomplished. For nine years the girls didn't spend any of the profits from their calendar, cookie or any other fund raising sales. With the help of community people and businesses they took one year at a time and their funds continued to grow.

In the mean time the girls were growing, learning and serving their community with ever growing enthusiasm. They each adopted a senior citizen and were always doing something special with them - not just during the Christmas Holidays but year round. Sharing their youthful energy and enthusiasm - helping to make others feel special too.

In 1982 the girls reached their goal. Nine of the twelve girls who started the troop had stayed together. For nine years they had worked in their community, learning to appreciate and help protect the world around them, learning what made each of them special. The girls went on the cruise to the Bahamas. Burnett summed up her years with this Girl Scout troop by saying "Knowing that you have helped to teach girls to set their goals high and then work to accomplish them was the greatest of rewards". Today many of those girls have young children of their own. One recently told Burnett that she couldn't wait until her daughter was old enough to be a Girl Scout. The tradition continues! Thank you Burnett and all the others out there who have had similar influences on the lives of our young people.

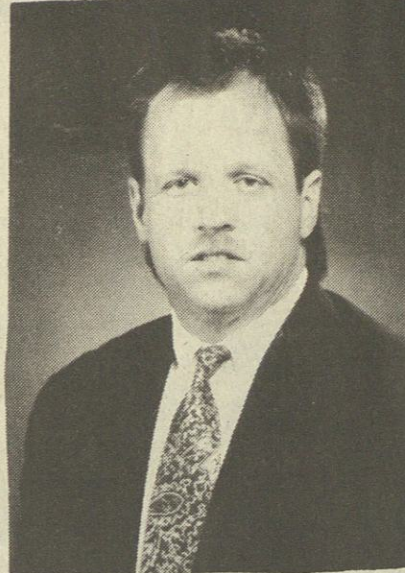

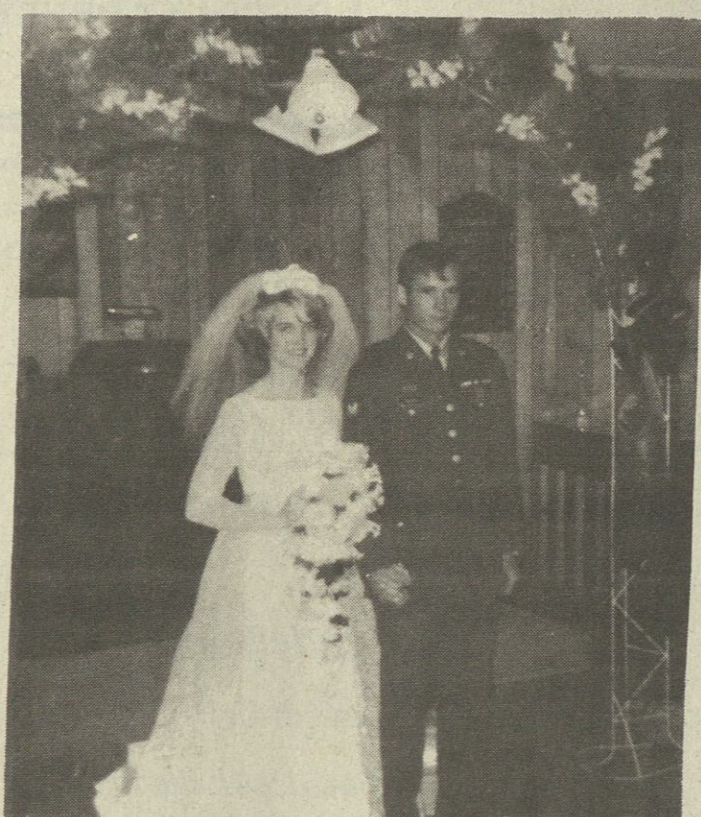

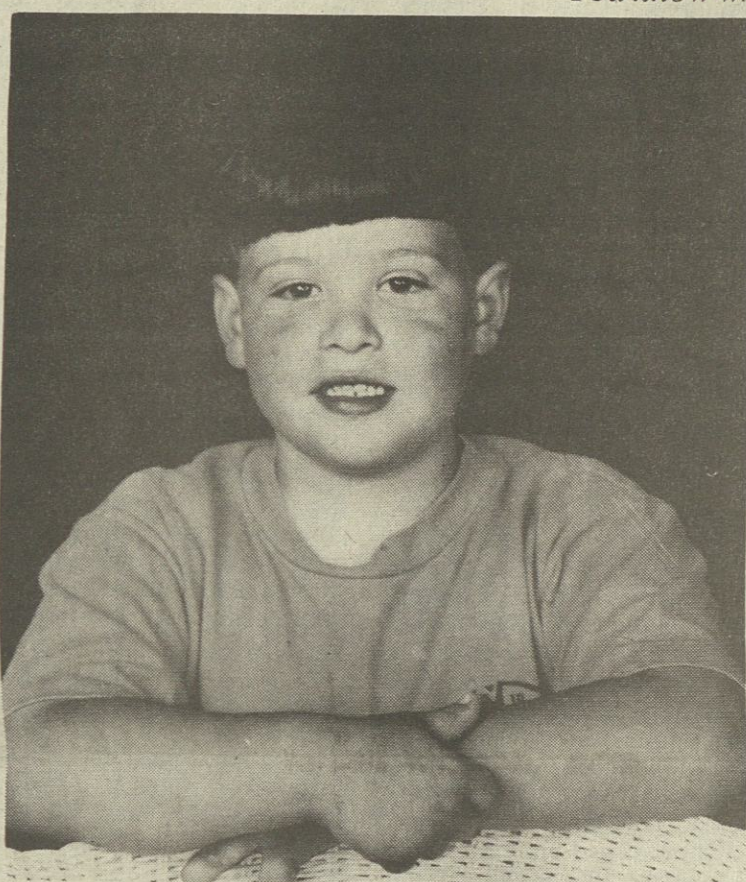

"Hypothermia--what is it? Could I get it?" These are some commonly asked questions when I mention hypothermia during Water Safety Programs. When exposure to cold causes a person's body to lose heat faster than it can replace it, the resulting condition, called hypothermia, leads to a decline in one's internal body temperature.

The myth about hypothermia is that it occurs only in cold weather. The truth however, is that hypothermia can occur even indoors at temperatures as high as 60-70 degrees Fahrenheit.

Since elderly people are especially vulnerable to hypothermia, be aware of the risks. Such factors as being physically inactive because of illness or disability, eating cold meals low in nutritional value, loss of ability to shiver when cold, or taking medications that reduce the body's natural ability

to protect itself from the cold could result in hypothermia.

Life threatening conditions may occur if hypothermia symptoms are left undetected. For this reason alone, it is important to recognize the warning signs. Shivering is the first symptom in more people. Others include difficulty in performing simple tasks, slurred speech, drowsiness, shallow breathing, weak pulse, fatigue, confusion, and stumbling.

Early recognition is the key. Get medical help quickly, even if the hypothermia victim insists s/he is comfortable. If medical help is not available remove wet clothing, keep the victim warm, wrap the head to protect it from wind, do not rub the victim's skin, and avoid moving her/him as much as possible.

To shield yourself from the risks of hypothermia: dress warmly (wool clothing, rain suit, etc.), eat nutritional foods, drink plenty of liquids, and avoid alcohol. If you're going to be near the water, wear layers of clothing and a P.F.D. If you are thrown into cold water, do not remove your clothes. Even wet clothing provides insulation against the cold water.

In case of a boating accident stay with the boat and know the H.E.L.P. and Huddle positions, H.E.L.P. (Heat Escape Lessening Posture) requires the victim to bring the knees up close to the body and keep the head out of the water as much as possible. The Huddle positions allows two or more people to retain as much heat as possible by linking their arms together and forming a tight circle (children should be put inside the circle).

To prevent hypothermia from happening to you or someone you love, think ahead and protect yourself and others for a future of special days spent together.



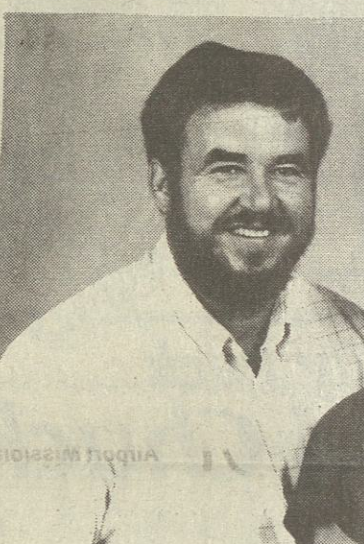

CARE TIPS FOR CLOTHES

Taking good care of your clothes is important if you want them to last longer. When you were younger, someone at home kept your clothes clean, neat and pressed for you. Now that you are older, you can do much of this yourself.

Here are just a few simple care tips for your clothes:

- *If clothes are still clean after wearing, hang them up on a hanger in your closet or fold them and place on a shelf or in a drawer.

- *Replace missing buttons and repair loose hem or rips as soon as needed. Waiting to do this may make matters worse.

- *Clean and polish shoes regularly.

- *Launder socks and underclothes after each wearing.

- *Arrange clean, neatly folded socks, underclothes, accessories, and any other clothing items in drawers.

- *Fold sweaters and other knit garments rather than place them on hangers so they won't stretch out of shape.

- *See that spots and stains are removed quickly. The longer a stain sits, the more it sets.

- *Clean soiled clothes according to the method recommended on the garment care label.

Housekeeping

The emotional issues of school prayer and crime moved to the forefront in the House of Representatives in the past week, along with other bills.

The House gave overwhelming approval to a bill to provide that voluntary student-initiated prayers shall be allowed on public school property during compulsory or non-compulsory student assemblies, sporting events, and other school-related functions. The measure is restricted to non-sectarian prayers and prayers that are not intended to cause a person to convert to another's faith. It also provides it shall be lawful for any teacher or school administrator in public schools to permit voluntary participation by students in prayer, but not to prescribe the form or content of the prayer.

Passage of the bill follows a controversy over the reading of a student prayer over a public address system at Jackson's Wingfield High School, but the request for drafting of the measure had been turned in to the House staff last fall long before the Wingfield controversy arose. Sponsors said the bill, which still faces Senate action, is patterned after an Alabama law adopted last year, and spells out that exercising the rights of prayer on public property should not be construed as promoting any religion or religious belief.

The House also gave speedy approval to a bill to give the jury a third sentencing option in a capital murder case, providing for the defendant to be sent to prison for a life term without parole. At present, in cases involving a capital offense the jury can sentence the defendant to death or life imprisonment in which case he would be eligible for parole in 10 years. The House-passed bill would require anyone sentenced to life imprisonment for a capital crime to serve at least 20 years before being eligible for parole. Or, the jury still could impose the death penalty or exercise its new option of life with no parole eligibility.

Other bills gaining House passage would establish attempted murder as separate offense under the state's criminal laws, carrying a maximum fine of

\$5,000 or a sentence of not less than 30 years of life imprisonment; broaden the pool from which people may be summoned for jury duty to include anyone over age 21 who has a valid Mississippi driver's license, rather than being restricted to only registered voters; allow health spa contracts to have a duration of up to 36 months instead of the present two years; and remove an automatic repealer on the law providing for certain assessments on rice grown in the state. The rice proposal also would let the Rice Promotion Board use some of the funds from the assessment for the purpose of influencing national and international policy affecting the marketing of Mississippi rice.

Public schools and institutions of higher education also were topics of discussion in the House

of Representatives Dr. Cleere, the state's Commissioner of Higher Education, appeared before the Universities Colleges Committee to present a three-year action plan aimed at improving higher education in the state. Increasing the number of baccalaureate graduates in the state's eight universities established as the highest priority in the plan. The report indicated only 40 percent of the students who enter a four-year university in Mississippi graduate within six years, compared to a national average of 50 percent.

The House Education Committee received a briefing from State Treasurer Marshall Bell and Department of Education officials regarding the Education Trust Fund created several years ago to provide long-term source of financial support for education purposes.

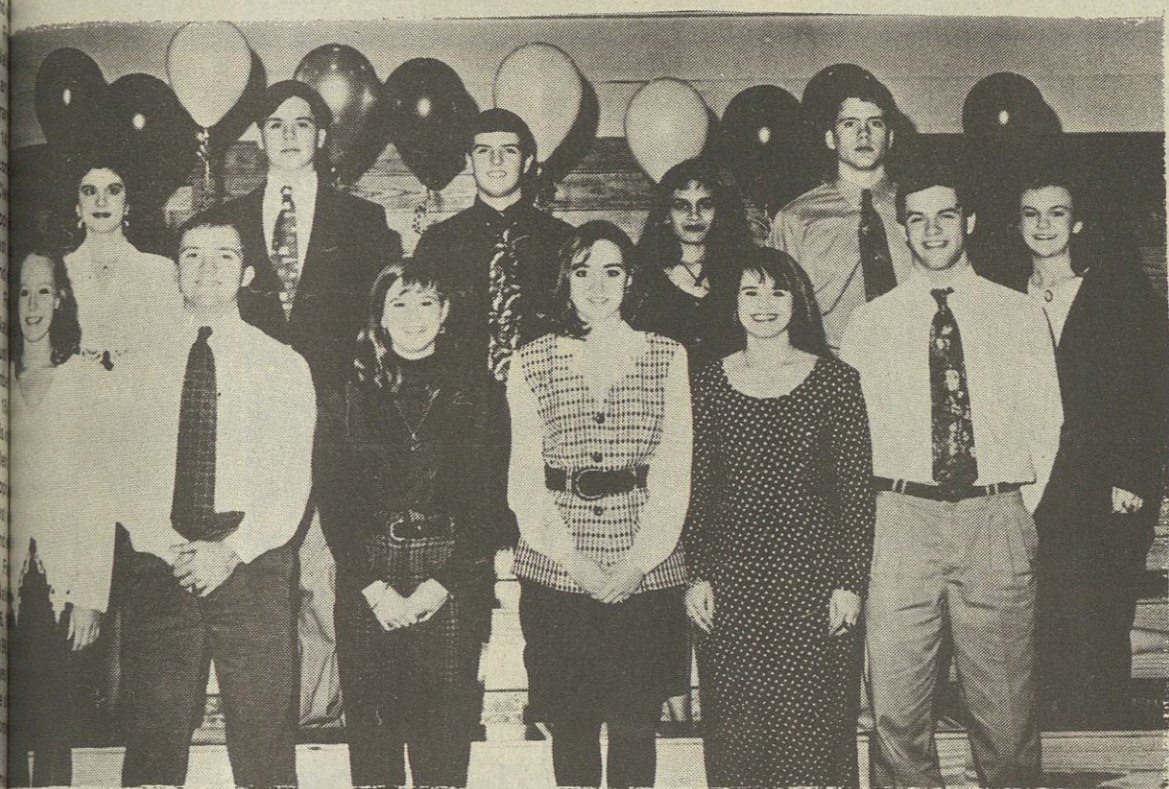
