Bentons To Appear At Iuka Methodist Church

The Bentons, using sacred music and the spoken word, will be appearing at Iuka, First Methodist Church on Saturday 6 at 7:00 p.m.

1994 is the Benton's thirty-fourth year of full time ministry. They have recorded seventeen albums, appeared in over 3000 churches in 41 states. They are now in Iowa.

Dean Benton, ordained in 1960, has been fourteen years. He is a member of Garrett-Evangelical Theological seminary open bible study, and upper Iowa University. Over fifty of his magazine articles have been published. His thirteenth published book, "Kingbirds at Dawn," was published January, 1992.

Home Garbage Pick-up Planned In County

A new system of garbage removal within Tishomingo County will begin in April due to new federal and state regulations concerning landfills.

According to Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors' President Ricky Cummings, beginning in April, all residents,

county-wide, will have garbage pick-up at their homes. All dumpsters located throughout the county will be removed at the time when this new system goes into effect.

The reason for the change is the new federal regulations that require all household garbage to be placed in Subtitle D Landfills. Cummings explained that these Subtitle D Landfills have plastic linings with pipes installed to drain off any liquids; the liquids would then be treated so that groundwater would not be contaminated.

In order to build a Subtitle D Landfill, it would cost the County approximately \$100,000 per acre. Since this amount is so staggering, several counties will be transporting their waste to a regional Subtitle D Landfill located in Houston, Miss. Cost of transporting the trash to this landfill will be \$21 per ton plus about \$11.50 per ton transportation cost to and from the landfill.

This landfill will be for household items only, so this will be all that will be picked up by the county. Other larger & non-

household items will have to be transported by residents to a rubbish landfill, to be established at a centralized location within the county, according to Cummings.

"The Board is looking for sites within the county for a rubbish landfill," Cummings said. "We hope to have an option within the week. At that point, we will let the public know and begin holding hearings concerning the site. We hope that everyone will work with us to find a suitable site. We have got to move quickly. We have to have this new system underway by April 9, 1994, or it will cost the county literally thousands of dollars in fines."

This rubbish landfill will also be used as a transfer station where garbage will be brought from both the rural and city garbage collection before being taken to the Chickasaw County site.

Three garbage trucks purchased by the county are presently having dump beds installed on them at the Heil Company in Tishomingo and are expected to be delivered to the county on Feb. 22, 1994 for use in county wide garbage collection, Cummings said. These trucks will serve residents who do not live within any city limits within the county. Cities who do not already have house-to-house pick-up will now have to purchase trucks to do so. Those who already pick up garbage, will continue business as usual under the new system.

"The Board (of Supervisors)

had a good system which was economical and efficient with the dumpsters; however, the new federal regulations require that household garbage be separated from other larger & non-household items. If these other items are transported to the Subtitle D landfill, a fine of up to \$25,000 a day could be imposed on the county. That is why we are asking for the cooperation of the folks in the county in finding a place to locate the rubbish landfill," Cummings stated. The cost of constructing this landfill will be approximately \$300,000, he estimated. The in-county rubbish landfill will only be used for non-household waste such as limbs, brush, discarded lumber, etc. and will not contain anything that would be of any danger to ground water or soil as it decomposes. The site would be inspected regularly by representatives from the Environmental Protection Agency.

At present, eight routes are being established for the garbage collection. Collection is planned to be once per week. The cost of the waste removal to the residents can't be determined until it is known if the State 1994 legislative session will repeal a law passed in the 1993 session calling for every county to pay for the program with a fee system. Cummings said that under that system, the residents would have to, by law, pay for the garbage pick-up by Oct. 9, 1995. However, he anticipates that the law will be changed by April of this year by the legislature. He stressed that there will be updates in the Tishomingo County News as to the funding of the new system as they happen.

Also, the Board of Supervisors will publish notifications of other particulars of the garbage collection itself as they have them available.

"I'd just like to stress that this is a new system that has to be implemented so there will probably have to be changes made in it from time to time until we get everything working as it should. We want to work with the public to find what will work best for everyone involved. Once again, these changes were not initiated by the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors, but by the

Federal Government and we have to abide by them in the best way possible. The Board asks that you support them in making this system work," Cummings expressed.

The Friends book sale will be held on Friday and Saturday, February 11 and 12 at the library.

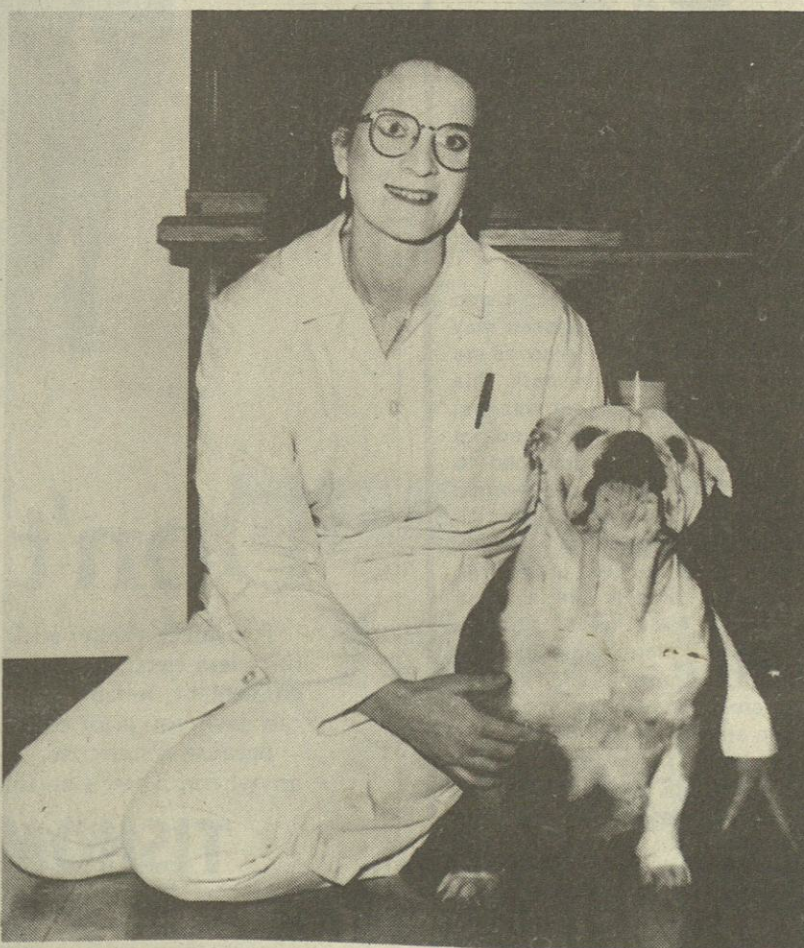

vance for all services are recommended; however, walk-ins are taken. The Center also offers a boarding service for owners who need to leave their pets while they are out of town.

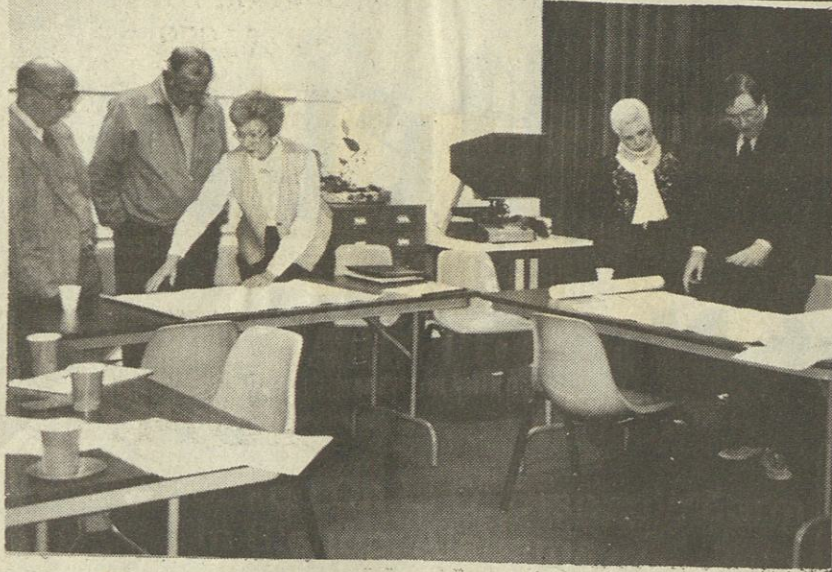

*Help your child think of the study area as his or her "office," with office supplies, reference books (dictionaries are often more helpful than encyclopedias for your children) and, if possible, a typewriter at hand.

*Help your child set up a notebook for assignments, and a chart to check them off as they're done, in order to give him or her a sense of accomplishment.

*Be sure to save some free time for your child. You might promise a family game or a brisk walk together if homework is completed on time.

*Don't get angry about homework. If your child is really having a problem, talk to the teacher about possible solutions.

*Don't push your child for early achievement and don't compare one child's progress or test grades with another's. Children progress at different rates, and learning plateaus are common in the elementary school years.

Counce Mill announces Plans For 1994 Scholarship Program

Counce Mill has announced plans for its 1994 Scholarship Program. Two \$600 grants will be presented to spring graduates from area senior high schools; one from the three schools in Hardin and McNairy Counties in Tennessee, and one from among Corinth, Alcorn Central, and Tishomingo County high schools in Mississippi. The scholarships will be renewable on an annual basis up to a maximum of four years. Included with the awards will be an opportunity to work for the Company during the summers while attending college. The awards are made to encourage and financially assist outstanding high school seniors in furthering their education.

Application forms and instructional material have been provided by guidance counselors at the above schools. The counselors will assist eligible students with the applications which are to be returned to the Company by April 1.

Selection of the scholarship winners will be made on the basis of high school academic records, national test scores, character, leadership, extracurricular activities and financial need. The winners will be selected from a screening and interview process by the Company Scholarship Committee. The awarding of these scholarships will bring to 45 the number of scholarships awarded by the company through its student aid program.

Last year's scholarship winners were Heather Moffett from Adamsville High School and Jennifer Hussey from Corinth High School.

Home Economics Tips

THE TRUTH ABOUT "POWER" FOODS

Can eating spinach give you remarkable strength? Probably not, says Barbara Guinn, Extension Home Economist. Specific foods sometimes gain reputations as "power" foods that far outweigh fact. While not as powerful as they're touted, these foods nonetheless can be helpful additions to the diet.

Here are some facts about familiar foods often believed to supply special "power."

*Oat bran has been praised for its role in helping to lower blood cholesterol. It is true a lowfat diet that includes foods rich in soluble fiber may help lower elevated blood cholesterol. Oat bran is a source of soluble fiber. You also can get the same type of fiber from fruits, vegetables, lentils and beans.

*Spinach, popularized in cartoons for its magic strength-building qualities, does indeed supply a wide variety of vitamins and minerals. Like most other dark, leafy greens, it is a source of vitamin C, beta carotene, iron and other nutrients.

*Carrots won't cure bad eyesight, but they do contribute to normal vision. Beta carotene in carrots helps with the functioning of the retina.

*Carob has been promoted as a more healthful alternative to chocolate. Actually, the two are quite similar nutritionally. Chocolate does contain some caffeine, while carob has none. However, products made with carob may contain more sugar and fat than do chocolate products. Carob may be a good choice for people allergic to chocolate or those wanting to avoid caffeine.

No single food has the power to dramatically improve your

health, cautions Guinn. To keep your diet as its best, select a variety of fruits and vegetables, lean meats, fish and poultry, whole grains and low-fat dairy products.

HOMEWORK HINTS

Homework assigned by teachers is a regular part of the evening routine for many families. For some families, however, homework is a nightly struggle. Here are some ideas to help make homework a positive learning experience.

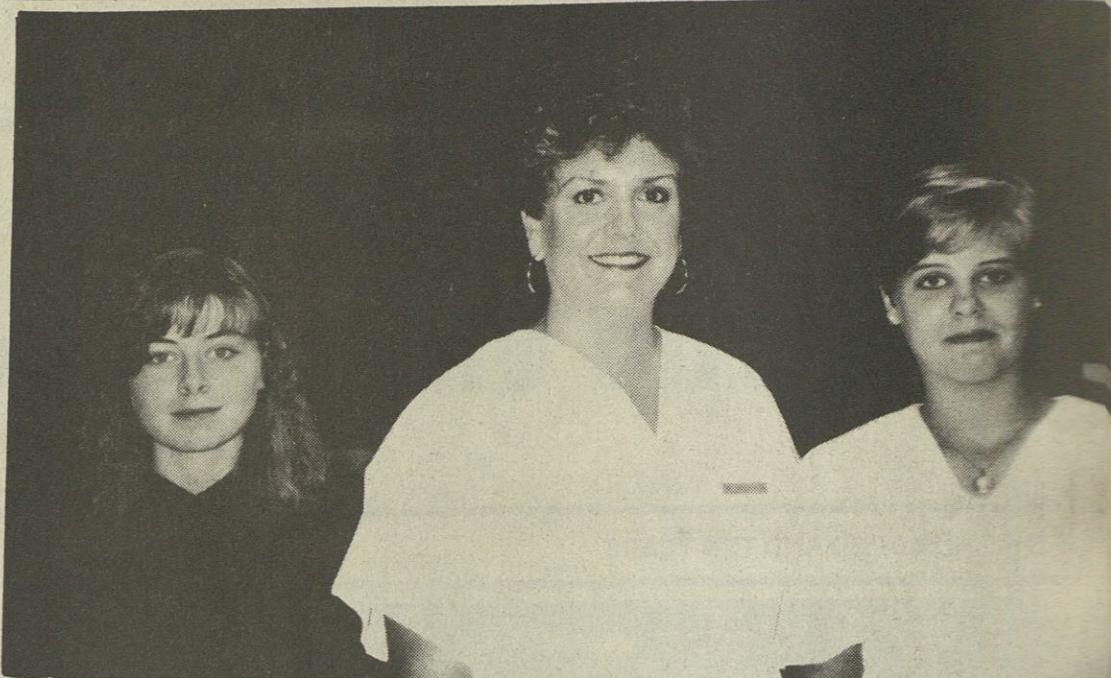
*Decide in your child's school career whether you will help with homework. Let the teacher's wishes figure in your decision; some like having parents involved; others don't.

*Let the teacher know if you decide to make the homework entirely the child's responsibility, so the consequences of not completing expected work will fall on the child.

*Remember, whatever you decide, that homework is your child's problem, not yours.

Treat homework seriously and matter-of-factly, as a regular job for which your child is responsible. Decide with your child which time of day is best for it and stick to your schedule as closely as you can.

*Provide a quiet, well-lighted place for study where other family members won't be

Mrs. Cooke describes a new program as "exciting" and believes it will accomplish two major objectives: First, it will allow students to explore the health care field to see if it is really for them. Mrs. Cooke

states: "After two years program, students should have a keener understanding of the nature of the Health Professional and his/her environment. This should eliminate costly career change college. Second, it will give students who decide to enter health care field a good foundation in medical terminology, anatomy and physiology, and development, and such skills as bedmaking; taking perature, pulse, respiration, blood pressure; sterile technique and patient hygiene."

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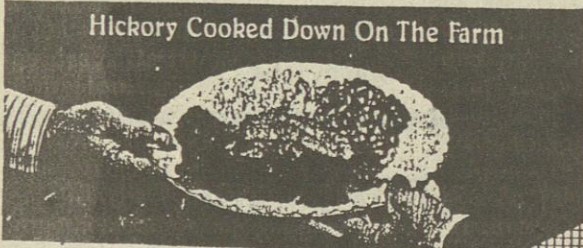

COMPUTER SCREEN PROBLEMS

People with minor vision defects often see well enough in their day-to-day lives, but add the stress of staring at a computer screen and they begin to have trouble. Most can find relief with a mild lens prescription worn only on the job.

On the other hand, people who are already wearing glasses may find that their present glasses are not geared to computer work. This is common with bifocal wearers. The near distant (or reading) segment is usually designed to give a sharp focus at the normal reading distance of 16 inches. Computer terminals are regularly viewed at 21 inches. Innovative, wide-band trifocals are a good solution. They have a wide segment for intermediate distance viewing that provides a full view of the screen, and smaller segments at top and bottom for distant and near vision. There are also anti-reflective tints to make VDT work easier on the eyes. Just as important as proper glasses are the right "ergonomics," such as proper lighting and height of the screen.

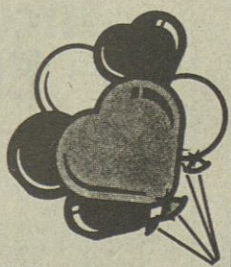

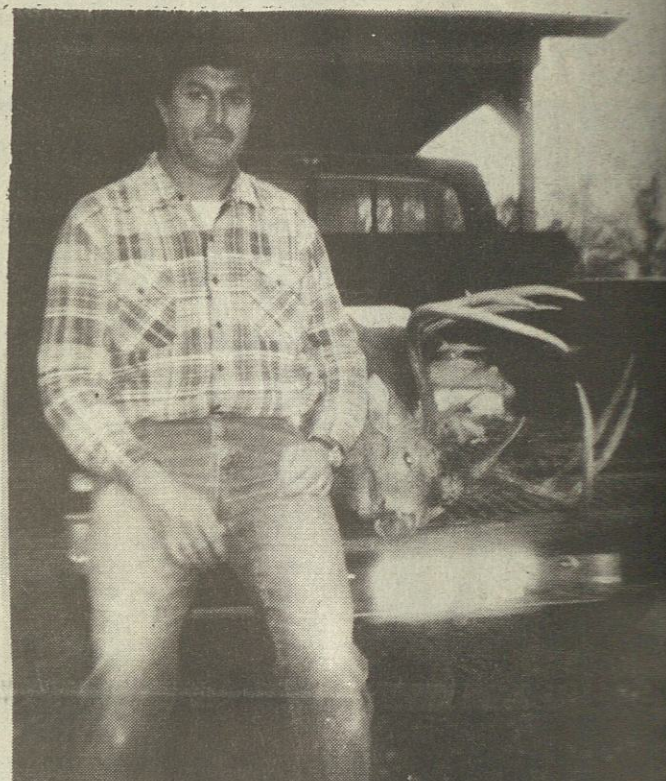

The kick-off for this year's Bee was the week of Dec. 13, with thousands of schools around the United States, the District of Columbia, and five U.S. territories participating. The school winners, including Jarod, will now take a written test; up to 100 of the top scorers in each state and territory will be eligible to compete in their state Bee April 8.

The National Geographic Society with its co-sponsors will provide an all-expenses-paid trip to Washington, D.C., for state champions and their teacher-escorts to participate in the National Geography Bee national championship on May 24 and 25. The first-place national winner will receive a \$25,000 college scholarship; the second-place winner, a \$15,000 scholarship; and the third-place winner, a \$10,000 scholarship.

Alex Trebek, host of "Jeopardy!", will moderate the national finals, which will be presented by Maryland Public Television as a prime-time special on most Public Broadcasting Service stations May 25. Check local listings.

The National Geographic Society developed the National Geography Bee in response to a growing concern about the lack of geographic knowledge among young people in the United States. A 10-country Gallup Survey conducted for the Society in 1988 and 1989 found that people in the U.S. ages 18 to 24--the youngest group surveyed--knew less about geography than young people in any of the other countries in the survey.

The National Geographic Society, with 9.6 million members, has as its mission the "increase and diffusion of geographic knowledge." In addition to the National Geography Bee, the Society sponsors a number of other geography education initiatives, including summer geography institutes for teachers, the National Geographic Society Education Foundation, and the Geographic

Alliance Network, which is currently working in every state, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico.

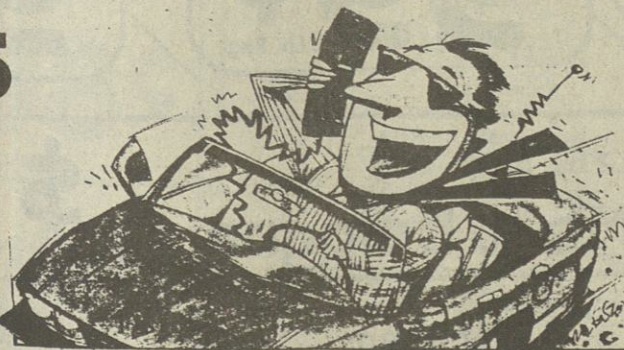

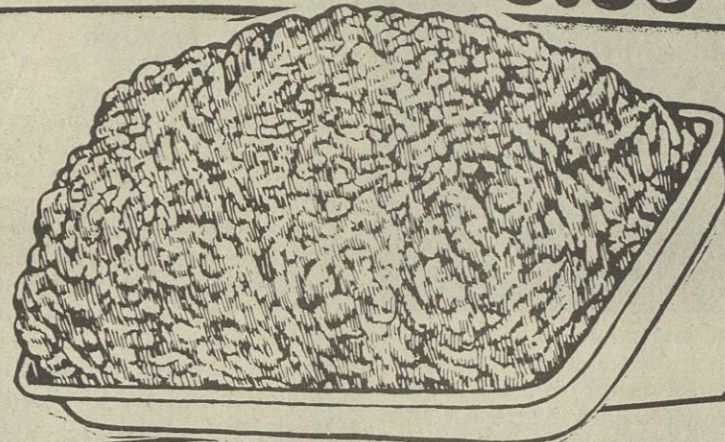

An emergency bill aimed at helping state correctional officials cope with the pressing issue of prison crowding gained overwhelming approval in the House of Representatives as the legislative pace increased sharply following the first big deadline of the 1994 session.

The corrections bill was recommended by the House Penitentiary Committee as part of a plan to attack overcrowding in prison facilities and local jails and hopefully enable the state to avoid being slapped with heavy fines by a federal court judge. A court hearing is set for January 28 for the state to show what is being done to reduce the prison population and afford improved medical care for inmates. The bill would permit the medical parole of certain offenders and let the Department of Correc-

tions assign inmates to an electronically monitored "house arrest" program if necessary to satisfy federal court requirements. Officials estimated about 600 prisoners could be released under the bill. There were no dissenting votes.

Another bill winning House passage would empower Corrections Commissioner Eddie Lucas to contact with a private firm to furnish medical treatment to offenders.

Other floor action during the week included passage of a measure to impose restrictions on rate increases to insurance companies that offer health coverage to employees of a small business. Sponsors said the bill is designed to curb abusive rating and renewal practices used by some insurers in the past. It applies to employers with 35 or fewer employees and, among other things, would require insurers to make a reasonable disclosure of how premium rates are established, and how health status and claims experience affect the rates.

The House voted to establish extortion as a separate offense under state criminal laws with a prison sentence of one to 15 years; increase jurisdiction of the justice courts from 1,000 to 2,000 dollars; and revise reporting requirements regarding neglected or abused children to include private as well as public school personnel. Another bill would allow Desert Storm veterans to be eligible to serve on the Veterans' Home Purchase Board. The Board is now limited to veterans of World War II, Korea, and Vietnam. A proposal to require the Health Department to develop model workplace guidelines in regard to persons with AIDS and HIV drew stiff opposition and was sent back to a House committee.

A proposal that would let county supervisors gravel private driveways to provide access by emergency medical vehicles and home health care providers was three votes short of the 2/3rds needed for passage, but kept alive by a motion to reconsider.

The House Education Committee voted to recommend a pay raise for school teachers that would boost the base starting salaries and tack another year on to the current schedule of increment payments for teaching experience. Overall, the measure would mean an increase of 1,500 dollars in the coming year for all

certificated teachers who have been teaching at least a year.

Other bills approved by various committees in the past week included proposals to raise the minimum age for obtaining a driver's license from 15 to 16; authorize a 25 dollar fine for violating the state's seat belt law; and establish an alcohol boating safety law. A Ways and Means subcommittee held a hearing on proposals to expand gaming laws to permit casinos in the Aberdeen and Greenwood areas.

Space Technology Helps MS Patients

Space age technology has brought temporary relief to those suffering from multiple sclerosis (MS), according to a recent report from NASA's Spinoff Magazine.

The report states that micro-climate cooling, developed by NASA to cool astronauts during moon explorations, is now being used to treat symptoms of MS, the leading neurological disorder of young adults. Clinical research funded by the Multiple Sclerosis Association of America indicates that patients wearing this lightweight garment known as a "cool suit" experience improvements

with their speech, fatigue, other symptoms associated with the disease. The NASA does stress, however, that the cooling system is not a cure, does it help every MS patient.

According to the article, Mark VII cooling system, manufactured by Life Support Systems, Inc., uses a pump to circulate water-based through "veins" or tubes in vest and cap. This heat transfer system can lower a patient's body temperature by one to two degrees Fahrenheit in 30 to 40 minutes with sometimes dramatic improvements lasting up to hours past a cooling session.

In addition to funding research, the report states the MS Association has placed cool suits on more than 50 MS research centers in the U.S. It's estimated through the MSA program, more than 100,000 patients will be able to micro-climate treatment, more information on the treatment, contact the Association of America at 833-4MSA.

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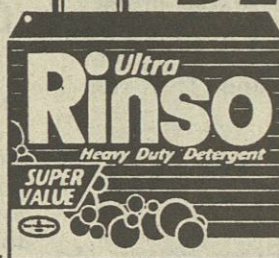

Old Age Doesn't Mean Having To Say 'I Forgot'

For older folks who worry that their memory isn't what it used to be, there are some words of encouragement from a Mississippi State University psychology professor.

Dr. Carolyn Adams-Price, who does research in memory, creativity and aging, says that some memory loss as you age is normal. "Forgetting a name, for instance, is not generally a sign of senility," she says. "Older people usually have a harder time remembering names; but they also can put a name with a face."

Having difficulty with names as you grow older may be a result of acquiring so many names over the years, she suggests. "To remember new names, older people may have to drop old names out of their memories."

To put your mind at rest about your memory, Adams-Price suggests that there are some memory facts helpful to know. The good news is that older people actually tend to be less absent-minded than their younger

counterparts. "Older people are less likely to forget to do things," she said. "They remember appointments; they remember medications."

Older folks may also be happy to know there are ways to improve memory. "Practice helps. People should remember that memory takes effort. The more effort you exert, the more likely you are to remember." Some memory tips Adams-Price suggests:

*To remember names, make associations. "As an example, my name is Price. You can visualize a price tag over my head."

*To remember long lists such as grocery lists, visualize the items on your list dancing in your living room.

You may want to choose recreations that improve memory. Playing bridge, for instance, is more beneficial than playing bingo. Some computer games are helpful for memory because they give practice and feedback.

*At times, artificial memory aids may be useful. When you leave your car in a parking garage, you may want to write down the exact location. You may want to consider using lists and calendars. Many older people find using a pill organizer is helpful.

*Know when to worry. The people who tend to worry about their memories don't usually have an organically caused problem, she points out. "They're more often depressed. These folks can benefit from taking obvious steps to improve memory and from seeking counseling for depression." Family members should be concerned, however, if a loved one suddenly cannot remember how to perform routine tasks, such as brewing a pot of tea.

*Recognize that some memory problems may have physical causes. "If someone is fine one day and can remember nothing the next, it may signal a physical illness," Adams-Price explained. "Fever often can cause this kind of behavior."

Radar Detector Ban Cited As Major Highway Safety Step

A Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) ban on radar detectors in commercial motor vehicles is a major step in making Mississippi highways safer, according to the Department of Public Safety's Division of Public Safety Planning.

The ban, which becomes effective January 20, affects vehicles involved in interstate commerce with a gross vehicle weight rating or gross combination weight of 10,001 or more pounds or those designed to transport hazardous materials in quantities that require placarding. FHWA

defines radar detector as a device that detects microwave laser beams or any future measurement technology law enforcement agencies highway's for enforcement poses.

"Radar detectors in many years encouraged commercial vehicle operators to forcement of speed and drive at speeds dangerous to them as others on the highway. Donald O'Cain, Public Planning's executive director, the governor's highway representative. "When a vehicle exceeds the chances of a crash death or serious dramatically increase particularly true with vehicles because they more time to stop, potentially can cause more than automobiles," O'Cain ded.

"This ban; however, reflection on all commercial drivers," said Jim Ingram, commissioner of public. "Many truckers and commercial drivers obey speed they are both safety and courteous. I feel these professional drivers welcome the radar detectors because they, like those the Department of Public want Mississippi highways as safe as possible."

The National Association of Governors' Highway Representatives had joined other organizations in the FHWA to issue the proposal. In asking for the organizations cited studies that vehicles with the detectors posted limit and by greater excess vehicles without them.

"State and local law enforcement officers have often seen the deadly results excess speeds," Ingram said. "They will be taking the radar detectors very seriously."

Easement May Help FmHA Farm Borrowers Restructure Debts

"Farmers with loans from the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) may be able to put flood-damaged land under conservation easements in exchange for a reduction in their debt," George E. Irvin, FmHA State Director, said today.

Use of the easements is not limited to flood areas, but it may be particularly helpful in such areas.

"Eligible lands may include wetlands, marginal farmland, highly erodible land, woodland, wildlife areas and several others," Irvin said. "In certain

areas, there may be instances where farmland was damaged severely by the recent flood that restoring it may cost more than its agricultural value."

"In those cases, a conservation easement may be a solution. Under this program, a voluntary easement can be placed on a portion of the land in return for a reduction in the amount owed FmHA."

State Director Irvin said easements are for 50 years or more and can help rebuild conditions as well as encourage development of wildlife habitat.

Farmers who think they eligible should contact the FmHA County Office for information.

Soil Conservation News

What Is The Tishomingo County Soil & Water Conservation District?

The Tishomingo County Soil and Water Conservation District is a legal subdivision of state government and is responsible under state law for the conservation work that goes on here in Tishomingo County. The purpose of the Tishomingo County Soil and Water District is the same as all others across the state-to focus attention of soil, water, and all related natural resource problems, to develop programs to solve these problems, and to seek help from all public and private sources that can contribute to accomplishing the District's goals.

Since they are a sub-division of state government, the district receives financial assistance to carry out their programs. The

only source of revenue the district has, comes from membership drives, donations from businesses or other sources and allowances from the county's Board of Supervisors.

The main responsibility that commissioners have in carrying out District's programs is of course to direct the District's Conservation program. To do this we must obtain assistance and coordinate the help of governmental agencies in carrying out the program's of the district. We must also assign priorities and set goals each year to make certain that conservation measures our county needs.

This is where the Soil Conservation Service fits into the picture. It's the service's job to assist the District in carrying out the program that your commissioners set up. They are the only agency that receives federal funds earmarked by Congress for direct technical assistance to conservation districts.

Not only do we receive assistance from the SCS, but also from other agencies such as ASCS, the Mississippi Forestry Commission, and the Extension Service. To obtain district assistance, a landowner, organization, or agency simply requests it. Application forms are available at the SCS office or can be obtained from one of the commissioners. This form is called a cooperative agreement and once signed, the landowner becomes known as a district cooperator and is eligible for any assistance that the district can provide. At the present time we have over 1000 cooperators in Tishomingo County. The cooperator is then eligible for a conservation plan. In this plan the cooperators entire farm is planned so that he may meet the requirements of 1985 farm bill. All highly erodible farms in Tishomingo County must have a conservation plan and have it implemented prior to December 31, 1994.

Another main objective of the Tishomingo County SWCD is to promote conservation in all schools within Tishomingo County. We feel that the future lies with our youth, and unless they are informed on conservation values, there is little hope for future generations.

Your commissioners are striving to promote conservation in Tishomingo County any and all assistance from you, the general public, is greatly appreciated.

Mississippi Employment Reaches 20-Year High

In December 1993, Mississippi's employment reached a 20-year high with 38,000 more Mississippians were working than in December 1992, recent figures show. According to the Mississippi Employment Security Commission's (MESC) "Civilian Labor Force and Employment" statistics, the number of residence-based persons employed in December 1992 stood at 1,101,800 and in December 1993 the number increased to 1,139,800.

"The State of Mississippi continues to out-pace the U.S. in creating jobs for its citizens," said Governor Kirk Fordice. "The state's employment picture demonstrates that our growth has been consistent over the past three years and in line with our economic development strategy that focuses on job creation."

The December 1993 employment figures are a 3.5 percent increase from the prior year. This correlates with Mississippi's December unemployment rate of 5.5 percent, a slight -0.7 percentage point decrease from December 1992's unemployment rate of 6.2 percent but the lowest rate for the month of December in 20 years.

Residence-based employment is computed by place of residence within a specified geographic area.

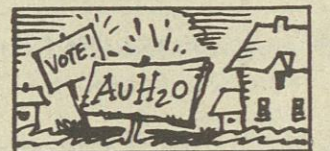
"We are pleased that our economic development strategy is working and is evidenced by the

positive employment figures on the state in recent years," said Jimmy Heidel, MDECD executive director. "Mississippi's employment statistics figure prominently in recruiting new industry to the state."

Employment sectors showing the strongest growth since December 1992 are construction, services, retail trade, and manufacturing. In construction, employment grew from 35,900 to 39,100, a an increase of 3,200 persons. Under the services sector, health services employment grew by 2,400 persons, from 58,800 to 61,200 while employment in the government sector increased by 5,300 persons. Retail trade also increased significantly, employment grew by 2,700 persons, from 164,600 to 167,300. Under the manufacturing sector, the strongest growth occurred in electronic equipment which increased by 2,000 persons, from 21,300 to 23,300 and in food products which increased by 2,100 persons, from 17,200 to 19,300.

The individual sector figures are establishment-based which is employment computed by place of work within a specified geographic area.

MESC is an independent state agency required by a law to administer unemployment compensation contributions and payment of benefits. About 95% of all industries in Mississippi are covered by unemployment compensation insurance and must report to this agency. As a result of this reporting, MESC is able to make accurate projections about Mississippi's labor market.

Plant A Tree For The Earth And "Mr. Moon"

Mississippi's twentieth (20th) annual "Celebration of Trees" is scheduled for February 11-17, according to Harold Prather of Meadville, 1994, Tree Planting Week chairman.

Mississippi's first statewide Tree Planting Week was held in February, 1975 with the event's enthusiastic founder, businessman - tree farmer L.L. ("Moon") Mullins of Starkville, serving as Chairman. Mr. Mullins passed away in 1993, and this year the special week of tree planting ceremonies on school grounds, county courthouse lawns, city streets and private homesites will honor his memory. Tree Planting Week - 1994 is being proclaimed as: Plant A Tree for the Earth - and "Mr. Moon" Week by Governor Kirk Fordice.

"Since its beginning, Tree Planting Week in Mississippi has seen statewide participation grow from 49 counties in that first year (1975) to annual tree planting activities being held in virtually all 82 counties over the last decade," said Prather.

Prather added that an average of 450 schools have been participating each year involving nearly 70,000 children. Since 1975 nearly 17 million tree seedlings have been given away by County Tree Planting Week committees, led by the local Soil and Water Conservation Districts and cooperating volunteers from local forestry and civic organizations.

"We especially would like to see a record number of trees planted this year during Tree Planting Week, because it's being dedicated to Mr. Mullins," Prather noted. He said all Mississippians are invited to "Plant A Tree for the Earth - and 'Mr. Moon'."

"Free and/or inexpensive seedlings should be available in each county during the week. Watch for details in your local paper and listen for information on local radio or T.V.," Prather advised. Local Soil Conservation Service, County Forester and County Agent offices should also have information.

Unemployment Remains Low For State

Mississippi's Dec. jobless rate was the lowest rate for the month in 20 years, according to Mississippi Employment Security Commission statisticians. The December rate was 5.5 percent up from 5.0 percent in November but down from 6.2 percent in December 1992. December also marked the tenth month in 1993 that the state rate bested the U.S. RATE.

"Joblessness was up seasonally in December, as layoffs in agriculture, construction and other weather related industries occurred," said Raiford Crews, MESC's chief of labor market information. "Still, the economy

continued to function better than the nation as a whole. The national unemployment rate was 6.0 percent."

"The drop of seven-tenths of a percentage point from a year ago is even more significant than it first appears," Crews said. "This is a vast improvement when you consider the number of persons employed increased 38,000 (3.5 percent) and the number of unemployed decreased 5,700 (7.9 percent)."

Mississippi's non-farm industries furnished 998,600 jobs during December, 1,500 below last month but 1,800 above the 987,800 reported for December 1992. Goods producing industries provided a seasonally lower 298,100 jobs compared to 299,800 for November and 294,600 for December 1992.

Durable goods manufacturers provided 3,500 more jobs than one year ago. These, combined with large decreases in textiles (900) jobs and apparel (2,500), plus small gains and losses in other sectors produced a net gain of 600 manufacturing jobs.

Service producing industries reported 700,500 jobs during December, compared to 700,300 for November and 693,200 for December one year ago. Government reported the largest gain, up 5,600 from one year ago. Casinos continued to add jobs during December. These gains should increase during 1994 as still more casinos open.

"With all the positive signs in the nation's economy and the strength of Mississippi's there should be continued good growth during 1994," Crews said.

TOWN OF TISHOMINGO CUSTOMERS

At a special Emergency meeting January 25, 1994, the Board voted to increase the gas, water and sewer rates to enable the town to pay delinquent bond payments due on long-term previous commitments, line of credit payments due, to provide a reserve for emergency repairs, to pay operating expenses, and to upgrade the quality of service to customers.

New legislation under rule 636 deregulating gas costs which became effective September 1, 1993, and new regulations from gas industries imposing higher costs prompted the increase for natural gas.

The board very reluctantly arrived at the decision to increase rates. The action was based upon recommendations from several consultants and financial advisors who deemed the increase necessary to keep the town's utility services operational.

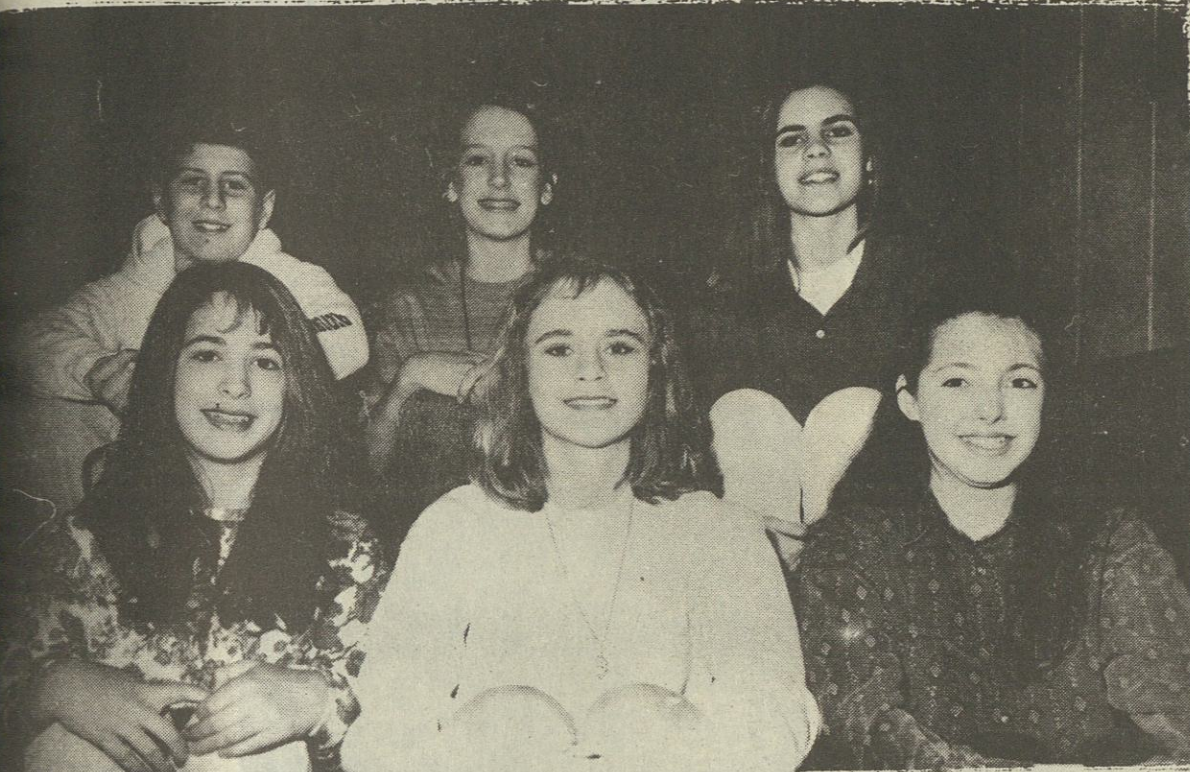

"Earthquake Proof" Bridges Approved

The Mississippi Department of Transportation (MDOT) has announced that funding for preliminary engineering and construction to "seismic retrofit" (or "earthquake proof") 13 Mississippi bridges has been approved by the Mississippi Transportation Commission.

According to Robert L. Robinson, executive director for MDOT, plans for the bridges, located in DeSoto, Tate and Marshall counties, are being developed by consultants. The consultants will make recommendations for reinforcements to keep the bridges standing and passable in the event of an earthquake.

The estimated cost for the work is \$450,000 in Federal Construction Funds appropriated to Mississippi through the Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act of 1991.

Robinson said these particular bridges were chosen for retrofitting by MDOT upon completion of a screening process in which over 200 bridges within the area were evaluated.

The minimum age for getting a driver's license would be raised from 15 to 16 and motorists who fail to buckle up could be fined \$25 under a pair of bills winning back-to-back approval in the House of Representative during the past week.

Traffic safety officials report Mississippi is the only state that currently allows 15-year-olds to get an unrestricted driver's license. The House-passed bill would prohibit granting a license to anyone under 16 starting in January, 1995, with certain exceptions. Fifteen-year-olds who need to drive because of a job still could qualify for a restricted license in hardship cases if affidavits are signed by their parents and employers. But the license would only be valid from 6 a.m. to 10 p.m. Another exception would be allowed if the 15-year-old lives with a parent who is unable to drive because of a physical impairment.

The measure also includes new restrictions aimed at cutting back on school drop-outs. It would prohibit issuing a driver's license, with some exceptions as specified in the bill, to any unmarried person under the age of 18 who is not in school or does not have a high school diploma or equivalent. A similar proposal was approved in the 1990 legislative session as part of a sweeping education reform act but never implemented because of funding problems.

Mississippi has had a mandatory seat belt law since 1990 that applies to the driver and front-seat occupants of passenger vehicles, but it contains no penalty provisions. The House voted to authorize a \$25 fine for ignoring the seat belt law but

only when the offender also has been charged and convicted of speeding, reckless driving, or some other primary violation. In addition, the House agreed to give a \$25 credit off any fines that may be imposed in misdemeanor cases for a moving traffic violation if the offender was wearing a safety belt when the infraction occurred. The amendment does not include DUI violations.

Other floor action in the House included passage of bills that would establish a new advance-payment tuition program to help parents of prospective college students meet the rising costs of higher education; prohibit the Department of Human Services from contracting with a private firm to handle collection of child support from delinquent parents without prior legislative approval; require the State College Board to submit proposed tuition increases in the Legislature before the increases go into effect; restrict College Board employees from being given tenure for teaching positions in the public universities; validate marriages that may have been performed by mayors in past years; enable a landlord to evict tenants engaged in illegal activity on the leased premises; and revise a law on licensing of social workers to exempt persons employed as social workers prior to July 1994 by Head Start agencies and Community Action agencies.

House members voted to revise the fines for nonresident hunting or fishing without a license; allow nonresidents who are under age 16 to hunt or fish without a license; permit out-of-state insurance agents to solicit policies in Mississippi when accompanied by a Mississippi agent serving as countersigning agent of the policy; revise an airport zoning

law to include airport facilities operated by the federal government for military aircraft; increase the membership of the advisory board to the state Bureau of Plant Industry; adjust certain filing fees for corporations; allow two justice court clerks to be named in counties having two judicial districts; and remove an old prohibition against use of theft alarm devices on privately owned cars and trucks.

County supervisors would be authorized to gravel private driveways to provide access by emergency medical vehicles and home health care providers under another House-passed bill. The measure had narrowly failed earlier but was called up again on a motion to reconsider, and a local-option amendment was inserted to give county residents the opportunity to vote on the

question. The revised bill was then approved 77-43.

Another bill passed by the House would establish a separate offense of vehicular assault to help crack down on motorists who injure or disable a person while operating a vehicle in a manner that indicates intentional or wanton disregard for safety or others. The measure, one in a series of anti-crime bills passed by the House since the session began, carries a maximum fine of \$1,000 and/or up to 20 years imprisonment.
