

Of course these questions are the direct result of the circumstances created by the massive ice storm that roared through the county last Thursday. The storm passed through several southern states leaving a trail of broken and uprooted trees, and downed power lines, which have led to untold destruction and hardships to those in its path.

About 26 counties with a total of approximately 160,000 people in north Mississippi were affected by Thursday's storm. In Tishomingo County, many residents were left not only without electricity, but without water and heat. At press-time, it was estimated that approximately 3,000 of the county's residents were still without power service. Originally about 9,000 were without service. However, according to area officials, all water service had been restored.

In Iuka, approximately 350 citizens are still without power, according to Tishomingo County Electric Power Association estimates. Of all the cities located in the county, the town of Burnsville seemed to be less affected by the storm than the others, as far as power was concerned, a spokesman with TCEPA said.

Robert Grisham, general manager of the TCEPA issued the following statement Tuesday regarding the restoration of power services:

As of 7:00 a.m. 2/15/94, almost 6,000 TCEPA customers have had service returned to normal. The number of additional services restored each day will probably slow now that the less difficult work has been accomplished. Some distribution circuits must be rebuilt with no use of the former line as the existing poles and wires are found on the ground. Almost 75% of circuits in the middle of Tishomingo County have been found in this shape. Several sections will require the use of heavy equipment to pull line trucks in and out of the job site. This slows work completion. considerably. Four service crews arriving from Jackson EMC, Jefferson, GA, will begin reattaching individual services early 2/16. These service attachments will have been made possible by work completed earlier by Tishomingo County Electric Power crews and crews from Sand Mountain Coop, Rainesville, AL; Lenior City, TN; Shelbyville, TN; P & E Electric, Nashville, TN; Pearl River Valley Electric Power Association, Columbia, MS. A total of 28 electric construction workers from these systems have been assisted by 16 right-of-way workers from Southern Tree Experts, Birmingham, AL. New construction is to begin today in localities served by each of the seven substations in the system. We appreciate the patience and understanding of our customers during this very difficult time for all of us. Volunteers have made a big difference during this natural disaster. Members of the National Guard, Salvation Army, Volunteer Fire Departments Rescue Squad, churches & countless other individuals and organizations have carried meals, heaters, generators, water, etc. to those in need and have been checking on the elderly and sick. Also public servants such as the police & sheriff's department have been working overtime to keep the county safe. If no other good thing comes from the ice storm of 1994, maybe its made us all appreciate the things we usually take for granted.

Officials From FEMA & MEMA **Visit County**

Officials with the Federal Emergency Management Agency, Mississippi Emergency Management Agency and other federal organizations made a stop in Tishomingo County Tuesday to discuss the emergency needs of the county with area leaders.

Representatives with FEMA, MEMA, The American Red Cross, Army Corps of Engineers, the Department of Health and Human Services and the Department of Energy met with area mayors, Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors, National Guard representatives, Tishomingo County Sheriff and others to determine the exact areas of need within the county following Thursday's ice storm.

"We have been visiting, and will continue to visit, the counties in North Mississippi hit by the recent ice storm. We will determine the immediate emergency needs and try and help get assistance into the area," said FEMA representatives Mary Jo Leppert.

Power restoration, generators for use by those with special medical needs and to save food in deep freezers prepared meals and lodging, communication system restoration, clearing of debris and general cleanup were the main areas of concern mentioned by area officials. There was also mention that volunteers have been lost because of their return to work, etc. leaving many agencies shorthanded. Robby Grisham, Mgr. of the Tishomingo County Power Association also voiced concern for the problem of stress his workers and their families have been put under during the last week Mike Walker with the Department of Energy out of Atlanta, Ga. was available to talk with Grisham about the power association's needs. Dealing with the removal of debris, broken timber, etc. was Robert Johnson with the Memphis office of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. He met with the members of the Board of Supervisors and several

area mayors to discuss their needs in this area.

Heath Hall, out of the Jackson office of the American Red Cross discussed the need of emergency food, supplies, water contamination and other volunteer services with Major Jerry Boyd of the National Guard, Sheriff Nunley and others.

Those concerned with health service needs within the county were directed to Wade Kerstein of the Department of Health and Human Services, Atlanta Office. Several services were covered by MEMA rep. Bob Howle of Jackson.

FEMA & MEMA were contacted by the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors last Thursday in hopes of receiving the assistance from these agencies for the county's residents.

Sheriff Nunley asks that everyone please observe this curfew.



CECIL BROWN OF IUKA may have retired as manager of the Tishomingo County Power Assoc. eight years ago, but you would never know it to see him hard at work at the office these days. Cecil volunteered to, among other things, man the busy phone lines at the TCEPA office. Cecil began his career with the power company in 1951. During that year, a major ice storm struck the Tishomingo County area. "I'll have to say that as bad as that ice storm was, this one is much worse. In all my years with the power company, I've never seen any thing as bad as this ice storm," Brown expressed. The TCEPA is utilizing many volunteers as efforts continue to try and restore power to the remainder of its customers who lost service as a result of last Thursday's ice storm.

Out-Of-State Telephone Crews Join Disaster Effort

Approximately 200 BellSouth employees from Alabama, Louisiana, Georgia and Florida soon will be arriving in northern Mississippi to aid local South Central Bell crews in restoring service to the areas devastated by last week's ice storm.

Nearly 100 workers already had been mobilized from Jackson, Meridian, Hattiesburg and the Gulf Coast to the damaged areas by Sunday -- 51 to the northeastern part of the state and 48 to the northwest.

A rapid-response system for transporting mobile generators from Jackson -- one of three SCB generator storage facilities in Bell South's nine states -- kept local telephone service going for the great majority of telephone customers in north Mississippi, said Jerry Hollingsworth, district manager. In addition, most of the company's central switching offices had stationary generators to fall back on when commercial power failed due to downed electrical lines. "We were as well-prepared as a telephone network can be for a disaster of this type," said Hollingsworth. "Underground cable, generators and diversity of cable routes made a huge difference in the amount of damage our network sustained."

switching offices was out of service today, although 30 were on emergency power. Across northern Mississippi, about 10,000 customers had reported telephone service outages, most of them due to downed "dropwires" to individual homes or poles and cables brought down by the ice storm.

Emergency 911 systems statewide were reported working, with Bolivar and Tishomingo Counties' systems operating again after brief outages.

Downed power lines are still hampering restoral efforts by SCB crews, since the crews are not allowed into areas where live power lines create dangerous working conditions. As soon as these are cleared, crews are entering those areas, Hollingsworth said. "Our people are working from 'can' until 'can't'', said Hollingsworth. "They've been working around the clock, doing whatever it takes to get our customers' service restored." "Our employees are like everyone else who lives and works in the affected communities; their homes are without power and sometimes water, but they're here on the job, because our customers come first."

announced today that he is sending four teams of investigators to North Mississippi to crack down on violators. "At a time when we should all be lending a helping hand, some unscrupulous businesses are taking advantage of those in need. It will not be tolerated," warned Moore.

The Attorney General's Office of Consumer Protection has received complaints from Cleveland, Indianola, Batesville, Grenada, and Clarksdale. "We have had allegations of increased prices on bottled water, gasoline, kerosene, candles, batteries, and generators," said Moore.

Moore further warned businesses that price gouging during a State of Emergency is illegal and violators could face a fine of up to \$1,000 and six months in jail upon conviction. Passed in 1986, the price gouging law states that when a State of Emergency is declared, prices for goods and services can not exceed the prices ordinarily charged for the same goods and services before the Emergency was declared. The law was passed after Coast residents experienced excessively high prices for gas and water after Hurricane Elena in 1985.

A State of Emergency was issued by the governor at 8:30 a.m. on Thursday, February 10, retroactive to 3:00 p.m. on February 9. Business should not be charging prices higher than they were on Wednesday, February 9 at 3:00 p.m.

Anyone suspecting a violation of this law should immediately contact the Attorney General's Office (354-6018) or local law enforcement.

Did You Know?

Black American Heritage -Religion-

Black religion in America produced a gospel of future hope and a theology of the suffering servant. Black religion is unique to Negro folk and it ties them to each other in times of stress by a racial bond which cuts across all other variables.

A chronology of black religion link it with the coming of Christianity to Egypt, 354-543 A.D., thus to the West Coast of Africa and on to America via of slave ships. Early colonial law decreed only non-christians as slaves. When slaves were found to be Christians, the law was changed.

The First Baptist Church was founded in Silver Bluff, S.C., in 1773. Between 1776-1786. Baptist Churches were organized in VA at Petersburg, Richmond and Williamburg. In Savannah, Ga., George Liele founded a Baptist congregation for blacks in 1779. Under the pastorship of Andrew Bryan, a slave, the First Baptist Church was built for black worshippers in 1794.

Richard Allen and Absalom Jones founded the Free African Society - forerunner of the present institution of black insurance companies. Allen founded the African Methodist Episcopal Church (1787) and made the black church into an institution in 1816. Jones organized the first Episcopal congregation among black in 1794 James Varick helped lay the foundation for the African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church, and became its first Bishop in 1822

John Chavis educated at Princeton was made a Missionary by a Presbyterian church in 1801.

Lemuel Haynes was licensed to preach in the congregational church in 1780.

In 1782 (Rev. Harry Hosier) became an assistant to the first Bishop (White) of the Methodist Episcopal Church in the U.S.

Black Ministers worked with the various abolitionist groups in the undergrond railroad movement, and were active workers in the convention movement. Influential in Negro leadership from the pulpit were such men as Alexander Crummel, Henry Highland Garnet, Daniel Payne, Henry McNeal Turner, J.W. Pennington and Benjamin Tanner.

Many prominent black ministers were educators: John Chavis organized a prep school and taught white pupils in his native South Carolina, Benjamin Mays (b 1895) President of Morehouse College from 1940-1967; Bishop Isaac Lane founded Lane College (TN) and Daniel Payne was the first Negro President of Wiberforce. Public Health Workers Assist County....

Public health workers began calling on north Mississippi eateries this week to eliminate the risks of food spoiled by a fierce ice storm.

Mississippi State Department of Health county environmentalists spent Monday assessing damages and deciding whether to call in extra help from central and southern Mississippi.

Environmentalists were dispatched early this week to inventory food in northern eating establishments. They will condemn and destroy spoiled food, said Lydia Strayer, director of the MSDH sanitation division.

"Our priority is the schools and day care centers," Strayer said. "After that, we'll visit grocery stores and restaurants."

Standards the State Department of Health places on eating establishments usually apply to food in the home, Strayer said. Most food stored in a closed

freezer can keep for 48 to 72 hours, Strayer said. Food kept in a refrigerator without power usually goes bad after 24 hours.

"If high-protein foods - such as meat, milk, eggs, and gravy have warmed to more than 45 degrees Fahrenheit for four hours or more, don't eat them,' Strayer warned. "And don't



Housekeeping

The House of Representatives, pressing to meet a critical deadline, shifted its attention during the past week to such high-profile issues as juvenile crime, roads and bridges, welfare reform, construction of new prison facilities, local garbage fees, and lobbying laws.

The youth crime series included proposals to prohibit possession of handguns by anyone under age 18, with limited exceptions; make it illegal for parents or guardians to knowingly allow a child to have a concealed weapon in violation of state laws; lower the legal age for minors to be tried as adults from 18 to 17 in felony cases and expand a law that allows 13-yearolds to be treated as adults in certain cases to include felonies involving a deadly weapon or acts of violence; require school officials to immediately report any criminal activity occurring on school property to law enforcement authorities or face suspension or revocation of their licenses; establish stiff penalties for anyone who carries a gun or other deadly weapons on school property or school buses, with certain exceptions; make public all records regarding illegal possession of handguns by persons under 18; specify parents are responsible for criminal fines against school-age children for criminal behavior on school property; make it a felony for persons over 18 to cause minors to commit a felony; and allow automatic expulsion of a student who commits a violent act or has possession of illegal drugs or weapons on school property.

A major highway bill was approved that would expand the 1987 four-lane road program, authorize a new program to help cities and counties in reconstruction of deficient bridges in rural areas, and prescribe a new formula for distribution of state aid road funds to the various counties. Several counties would get an increase in state aid money under the plan while no counties would get less than they currently receive. The bill also would allow the issuance of up to \$300 million in bonds for road improvements and related projects in areas where casinos have been authorized. The bonds would be funded from any money that may be made available by the Legislature, but the bill was amended to remove a mandatory \$25 million appropriation for the next eight years for the gaming area road.

teenagers to attend school to receive AFDC benefits except in case of illness, family emergencies, or other circumstances beyond their control.

*Authorize construction of a new 1,000-bed medium security prison in Lauderdale County, with county residents have an opportunity to petition for an election on the facility; a 500-bed medium security facility at the South Mississippi Correctional Institution in Greene County; and a 75-bed community work center in Noxubee County. The House also voted to allow the Department of Corrections contract with a private firm to build and operate a 500-bed medical unit in Rankin County to help meet medical needs of state inmates. Another bill was passed earlier in the session to authorize a new 1,000-bed prison in DeSoto County

*Clarify the authority of ocunties and municipalities to levy up to four mills in taxes, fees or other charges to pay for collecting garbage and rubbish. The bill, requested by the county supervisors' and municipal officials' associations, would allow withholding of motor vehicle tags if the owner is delinquent in garbage fees or charges.

*Overhaul state lobbying laws and require people engaged in lobbying activities, as spelled out in the bill, to file detailed reports on anything of value given to public officials or employees at both state and local levels of government. The bill would do away with an existing provision that says lobbyists do not have to report expenditures of less than \$25 per person, per occasion. It would not require reporting of food and beverages for immediate consumption with an aggregate value of up to \$10 per year.

*Establish a Work Force and Education Act providing for creation of state and regional councils including educators, business and industry leaders, and others to identify work force needs in Mississippi and better coordinate training programs to meet those needs.

The House also voted to extend a law passed last year to help attract a new Defense Department facility to the state and provide special assistance to areas threatened by the loss of military bases. In addition, the bill would boost the amount of bonds that may be issued under the Major Economic Impact Act from \$10 million to \$50 million for projects related to military installations, and include a proposed spacerelated industry in Tishomingo County among the projects igible for assistan Another House measure calls for a new law against dumping solid waste on public lands and welfare reform provisions highways, waters of the state, originally adopted in 1993 but drainage ditches, and private property without the owner's written consent. A violation involving smaller amounts of waste, not exceeding 15 pounds or 27 cubic feet in volume, would carry a fine of \$50 to \$250 under state anti-littering laws, while larger amounts of waste would mean stiffer fines and/or prison sentences upon conviction. House members voted to expand an existing law to make it a felony offense to maliciously kill or main livestock or dogs as part of any rituals. As amended, the bill also requires any person or firm selling or transferring dogs for use in research work to obtain a license from the state's Agricultural and Livestock Theft Bureau. Applicants would have to be bonded and furnish detailed information concerning every dog or cat involved. Backers said the restrictions were prompted by problems in some areas of the state involving the taking of animals for research use. Also, the House voted to increase penalties for nonsupport of a child; include irreconcilable differences as an additional grounds for an adversarial divorce; establish a uniform arbitration act for contractual disputes; make several technical changes in Medicaid laws, including an increase from 50 to 75 in the annual number of home health visits for which Medicaid payments will be allowed; make it illegal to place a tattoo on the body of any person under age 18; prescribe a 7 percent bidding preference of fruits, vegetables and nuts produced in Mississippi and purchased by state institutions, schools and hospitals; create a Forest and Wildlife Research Center at Mississippi State University; require the Department of Education to adopt a testing program for students for dyslexia and related disorders; reenact laws which make up the voluntary basic health insurance coverage program; make some technical revisions in bingo laws, and revise certain gaming statutes.

The procedure for acquiring permits from the U.S. Army, Corps of Engineers for special ac-tivities on the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway has been sim-plified for 1994. Many organized activities, such as fishing tour-naments and festivals, require a Special Event Permit when held on Corps-managed property or water. Permits may now be requested by phone or mail.

For Waterway activities south of Amory, Mississippi, individuals should contact the Waterway Management Center, 3606 West Plymouth Road, Columbus, Mississippi 39701, or phone 601-327-2142. Events on the Tenn-Tom from Amory northward will be permitted by the Bay Springs Resource Office, 82 Bay Springs Resource Road, Dennis, Mississippi 38838, phone 601-454-3481. Information required for the permit includes name, address, phone number, name of sponsor (if applicable), type of event, location of event, date and times of event, and the number of people expected to at-tend (number of boats, if fishing tournaments.)

Private activities such as picnics, reunions, etc. do not require Special Event Permits. Small fishing tournaments involving fewer than twelve boats are exempt, as well. The permits are issued on a first-come, first-ser-ved basis, and there is no fee for the permit. Special Event permits are available after January 1 of each year, for activities taking place that year. Failure to secure a Permit, or failure to abide by Permit conditions is a Federal violation. U.S. Army, Corps of **Engineers Special Event Permits** do not relieve the permittee of any other Federal, state, or local requirements, nor does the Permit waive Recreational User Charges for participants or observers. The U.S. Army, Corps of Engineers issues Special Event Permits without regard to sex, race, color, creed, age, nationality or place of origin. In other major action, the House approved bills seeking to:

*Implement a number of pushed back for one year pending further study and federal-waiver negotiations. The bill, which primarily involves the Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) program, is an effort to help welfare recipients find meaningful jobs through education, job training and work programs, and eventually come off welfare rolls. Among other things, it calls for a pilot program in two counties requiring AFDC recipients to register for work under the federal JOBS training program for a minimum of 25 hours a week or attend school, and allows those who complete the JOBS program to volunteer for work in community work programs for pay. Another threeyear work-related pilot program would be set in six counties to suspend normal AFDC and food stamp benefits, replacing them with guaranteed employment in wage-paying jobs. The bill ensures there would be no loss in total value of benefits to participants. Other key provisions provide for Family Resource Centers to help families receiving public assistance, and require
