County Sheriff's Department Recovers Stolen Items

The Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department recently recovered a number of stolen items and arrested the suspects involved in the burglaries.

According to Tishomingo County Sheriff Johnny S. Nunley, James Steven Gattis, 18, of Dennis, Edward Scott Murphy, 19, of Iuka and three juveniles have been arrested in connection with the burglary of a number of businesses and residences throughout the county.

Gattis has been charged with one count of burglary of a dwelling, 20 counts of larceny and 16 counts of burglary of vehicles. Murphy has been charged with one count of burglary of a dwelling, 11 counts of larceny and nine counts of burglary of vehicles. One of the juveniles will be tried as an adult because of repeated offenses, according to the Sheriff. The unnamed youth age 17, has been charged with one count of burglary of a dwelling, 19 counts of larceny and 15 counts of burglary of vehicles. The recovered items had been taken from Hellums Trucking, Cardinal Trucking, B & B Campers, Petree residence, Brumley residence, Fugitt residence, Skinner residence, plus two other trucks. The Sheriff's Department recovered some of the items at a residence in Burnsville and other items in the possession of the suspects, Nunley confirmed.

Home Economics Tips

By: Barbara F. Guinn, Extension Home Economist HOT DOGS: ARE THEY

MAKING YOU ILL? Hot dogs have long been a favorite food of children and caregivers alike. Children like them and as a result even the most finicky eaters will eat them. Caregivers like them because they are such a convenient food and most kids will eat them.

Prior to the 1980s, listeriosis, the disease caused by the bacteria Listeria monocytogenes and often referred to as Listeria, was primarily of veterinary concern. But in the '80s and on into the scientists recognized '90s. Listeria as an important foodborne pathogen.

Listeria monocytogenes is a microorganism responsible for multiple food-borne illness out breaks and product recalls in the recent years. Listeria can grow: in a wide temperature and pH range. It is salt tolerant, can survive for long lengths of time in very dry conditions, is fairly resistant to drying and lower temperatures enhance survival. It is, however, killed with proper heat treatment.

In healthy individuals, the symptoms are mild flu-like conditions. However, it can lead to meningitis, abortion, pertinatal septicemia and even death in high-risk individuals. High-risk people include the unborn infant, healthy pregnant women and immunocompromised persons. (Persons with cancer, diabetes, alcoholics, AIDS and individuals receiving steroids, chemotherapy and renal dialysis.) Many of us grew up eating raw hot dogs right out of the package. However, if that same practice is followed today, the outcome could be devastating. Raw hot dogs are a potential risk for

causing food-borne illness. In 1992, Food and Drug Administration warned of the from delicatessen dangers products, including undercooked hot dogs, and issued recomendations to high-risk individuals which included:

Avoiding soft cheeses such as Mexican style, feta, Brie, Camembert and blue cheese. There is no need to avoid hard cheese, processed sliced, cottage cheese or yogurt.

Reheating leftover foods or ready-to-eat foods such as hot dogs thoroughly until steaming hot before eating. The bacteria is killed when hot dogs are heated to 160 degrees for several minutes.

Although the risk of listeriosis associated with foods from delicatessen counters is relatively low, pregnant women and people with suppressed immunity may choose to avoid these foods or thoroughly reheat cold cuts before eating.

Listeria does not change the taste or smell of a food. Most people are at very low risk for listeriosis, however, the risk can be reduced by following these tips:

Avoid raw/unpasteurized milk.

Keep raw and cooked foods separate when shopping, preparing, cooking and storing

foods. Wash hands, knives and cutting boards after handling un-

cooked foods. Wash raw vegetables

thoroughly before eating. Thoroughly cook and reheat all food of animal origin, leftovers or ready-to-eat foods such as hot dogs.

Read and follow label instructions to "keep refrigerated" and "use by" a certain date. Keep hot foods hot (above 140

degrees F) and cold foods cold (at or below 40 degrees F). Do not keep them out for longer than two hours at room temperature before eating.

Divide leftovers into small, shallow, covered containers before refrigerating, so that the food chills rapidly and evenly.

Keep your refrigerator clean, and keep the temperature at 34 degrees F to 40 degrees F.



HOW POLARIZED LENSES WORK Polarized lenses can make your eves more comfortable by cutting down on reflected glare. Glare is caused by surfaces that reflect light, such as water, snow, metallic surfaces, etc. A normal gray lens reduces the intensity of light, but the ratio of light to glare remains the same.

Light waves vibrate up and down, sideways, and at an angle. A polarized lens is oriented so as to filter out the horizontal portion of the waves, allowing only the vertical to pass through, thus greatly reducing the intensity of the glare. If you own a pair of polarized sunglasses, you can demonstrate this effect easily. Holding the glasses at arms length, look at a shiny surface, such as a polished floor. Shut one eye, and look at the surface with the other eye. You should see no reflection. Now, rotate the glasses 90 degrees, so that one lens is above the other, and the surface will be shiny again; return the glasses to the wearing position, and the reflected glare disappears.


Nineteen people each received a master of arts degree, while 37 got a master of arts in education and 20 a master of business administration.

Female kittens may mature much faster than males. A female kitten is capable of becoming pregnant during her first heat period which may occur as early as five months of age. If you wish to mate your kitten, you should wait until she is at least one year old.

When a kitten is in heat, she becomes restless and nervous. She may roll around on the floor alot. Her voice can also change, becoming more piercing and demanding. Though her behavior can be unnerving, these changes are quite normal.

Unlike dogs that normally come into heat every six months, a sexually mature cat can go in and out of heat repeatedly over a period of weeks or months.

There is no reason to postpone having your kitten spayed unless you do plan to mate her. The best time to spay a kitten is at four to five months, before she has her first heat period. Young kittens heal very rapidly.

Once your kitten has been spayed, her disposition will not change except for the better. She may become less nervous, less noisy and more relaxed, playful and affectionate.

(Contrary to the old wive's tale, neither cats nor dogs need to "have a litter" to be well adjusted pets. Spay and neuter your pet so that you do not contribute to the millions of unwanted pets that are destroyed in this country every vear.)
