On June 7, 1994, Mississippi will vote for the first candidates to the new Mississippi Court of Appeals. One judge will be elected from each congressional district, making up a court of five judges. There are three democratic and two republican candidates for the first congressional district. Among the democrats in the race is a Tishomingo countian: Nick Phillips. Nick has the experience necessary for the new court, having litigated on both the state and the federal level. He taught in the two law schools in Mississippi for a number of years. Nick has the temperament to be a judge. His ability is recognized by other lawyers as well as judges. He is fair and he is honest. Nick Phillips is, without a doubt, the best choice for the new court.

As history is made on June 7 with the election of judges to the court of appeals, Tishomingo County can take pride in supporting Nick Phillips.

John R. Young Seeks Office Of Circuit Judge



District Attorney John R. Young makes official his candidacy for election to the office of Circuit Court Judge in the First Judicial District of Mississippi. Young is a native of Alcorn County, graduated from Corinth High School, attended Northeast Mississippi Community College, received a Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of Mississippi, and graduated from the University of Mississippi School of Law in 1968. Young has served as District Attorney since being elected in 1975.

Young is married and has one daughter, is a life long member of the First United Methodist Church of Christ, a member of the YMCA and formerly on the Board of Directors. He is a member of the Alcorn, Mississippi, and American Bar Associations, the Mississippi Prosecutors Association, and the National District Attorneys Association. Young is a past president of the Mississippi Prosecutors Association and a past vice-president of the National District

Attorneys Association and currently serves on the Board of Directors of each association.

In his announcement Young stated "Since 1975 I have had the privilege of serving the people of the First Judicial District as your District Attorney. I have successfully prosecuted all types of criminal activity including drug violations, theft, offenses against our children, and violent crimes such as armed robbery, rape, murder, and capital murder involving the death penalty.

I ask for your support in electing me to the office of Circuit Court Judge of this District. I have the experience, ability, and background to serve effectively in this important position. I will treat all parties fairly and courteously. Criminal defendants will be treated fairly.

As District Attorney I have worked with victims of crime since 1975 and have seen the trauma and anguish they suffer. Victims of crime will be treated with understanding and compassion and their thoughts, feelings, and suggestions will be considered during all proceedings, especially during the sentencing of criminal defendants.

I ask you to consider my experience and qualifications and elect me to serve you as Circuit Court Judge of the First Circuit Court District.

Russell Candidate For Circuit Judge

Frank A. Russell, 45, officially announces his candidacy for re-election as circuit judge of the First Circuit Judicial District of the State of Mississippi.

Russell is a graduate of Tupelo High School, Mississippi State University and the University of Mississippi School of Law.

A Methodist, Russell is married and the father of six children, ages 6 through 21.

He was admitted to practice law in 1970 and practiced in the general field of law for 14 years.

Before his appointment as circuit judge by Governor Bill Allain in May 1984, Russell served 14 years as attorney for the City of Fulton, was twice elected as Itawamba County's prosecuting attorney and served as the attorney for the Itawamba County Board of Supervisors.

Judge Russell issues the following statement:

"It has been indeed an honor and educational experience to have served as your circuit judge for the past six years," Russell said. "I have attempted to carry out the duties of this important position by treating all folks equally and by attempting to administer justice in a fair and equitable manner.

"Being the father of six children, I am very concerned about the problems facing our young people such as child abuse, drugs and other crimes that have a direct bearing upon them.

"Our most crucial problem facing this state and nation is the drug problem. Drugs are directly or indirectly involved in nine out of every 10 cases that comes before the court.

"We must take steps to educate people in the war against drugs, and we must look for effective methods of working with these offenders in addition to incarceration.

"Our judicial system is one of the most crucial branches of government and if it fails, society fails. Our judicial system has a direct bearing on the quality of life that each of us enjoy, and its effective administration guarantees the freedoms and liberties that we so often take for granted.

"Another major concern of mine is the rights or lack of rights for the victims of crimes.

"I am concerned that each person who is guilty be convicted; however, the trial must be conducted in a fair manner affording the accused all rights guaranteed by the constitution. I am equally concerned and will continue to insure that the victim's interest be taken into account in the course of the proceedings, especially during sentencing," Russell said.

Russell strongly supports restitution centers and the regimented inmate discipline program.

"I will continue to use the restitution centers we have in this state to place those who commit crimes where they may be employed and have the ability to make restitution to the victims," he said.

"I will also continue to utilize the regimented inmate discipline program where youthful offenders receive boot camp type training for discipline and also receive counseling for drug and alcohol abuse and other types of helpful psychological counseling."

Russell sincerely asks for your vote and support in the June 7 election.

Election Tuesday For Congress, Judges

The primary elections for both the Democratic and Republican candidates for U. S. Congress and District 1 Judge positions will be Tuesday, June 7.

Candidates will vie for offices of U.S. Senator; U.S. House of Representatives, District 1; Court of Appeals Judge, District 1; Chancery Court Judge, District 1; and Circuit Court Judge, District 1. Balloting will be at your regular polling places.

In the race for U. S. Senate on the Democratic ticket are Hiram Eastland, Ken Harper, James W. (Bootie) Hunt, Shawn O'Hara and Jorja Pound Turnipseed. Those voting on the Republican ticket will choose from Jimmy Ray Bourland, incumbent Trent Lott, and Richard O'Hara.

In the race for U.S. House of Representatives—the post left vacant by retiring Representative Jamie Whitten—are Democratic candidates Jamie Barnett, Tim Ford, Bill Wheeler and Republican candidates Bill Bowlin, Larry Cobb, Grant Fox, Clyde E. Whitaker, Bob Whitwell and Roger Wicker.

Democrats vying for the office of judge in the court of appeals are Charles R. (Charlie) Brett, Thomas A. Coleman and Nicholas B. (Nick) Phillips. Republicans Roger H. McMillin, Jr. and Rex Sanderson will be competing against one another for their party's nominee for appellate judge.

In the contest for Chancery Court Judge, Democratic candidates are Timothy E. Ervin and John C. Ross and Republican candidate Charles D. Thomas.

Circuit Court Judge candidates include Democrats Barry W. Ford; Thomas J. Gardner, III; John A. Hatcher; Frank A. Russell; Charles R. Wilbanks, Sr.; John R. Young; and Republican candidate William W. Smith.

Get to know candidates for Congress and judge during the political speaking at 5:30 p.m.

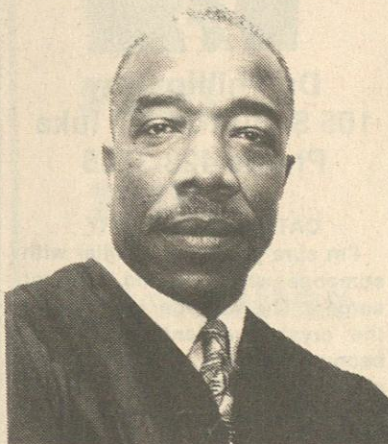
There will be, as always, special exhibits, games, music and lots of good food throughout the day.

Honored At The Awards Banquet

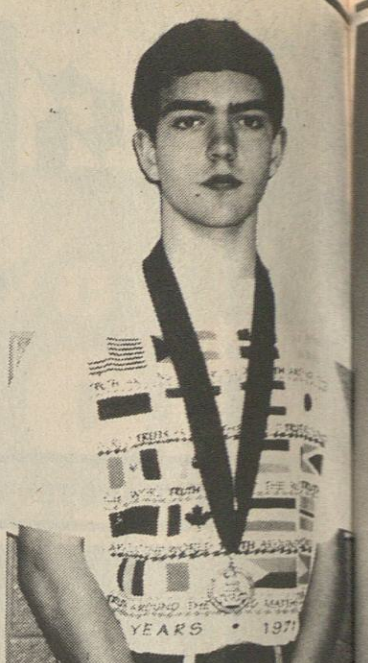
Carrie Walters and Desiree Roberts were among those recently honored at the Annual Awards Banquet at the Tishomingo County Vo-Tech Center.

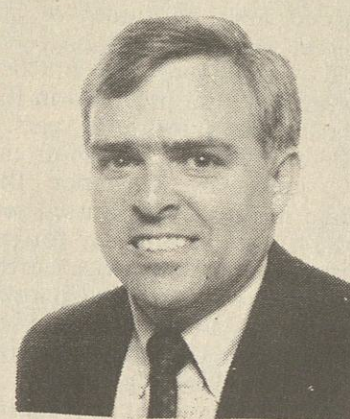

PARVO -- A VIRAL KILLER!

Since 1980, a dangerous viral killer has been stalking our dogs. It's canine parvovirus infection (CPV) -- or parvo!

There are not specific drugs to kill the virus in infected dogs. Only the symptoms can be treated in order to prevent dehydration and additional infections that frequently occur when an animal is weakened.

Left untreated, parvo is frequently fatal -- especially among puppies less than five months old. An estimated 75 percent of the young dogs succumb to CPV within 24 to 48 hours after being infected.

BUT CANINE PARVOVIRUS INFECTION CAN BE PREVENTED. Several effective vaccines have become available to veterinarians since the first vaccine was introduced in 1981.

A highly contagious disease, CPV is thought to be spread by dog-to-dog contact and has been diagnosed wherever dogs congregate. During summer months, when dogs tend to be more sociable, the disease frequently reaches near epidemic stages among those animals not vaccinated.

Parvo is readily transmitted from place-to-place on the hair or feet of infected dogs or by contaminated cages, shoes or other objects. Humans, insects and even other species of animals are thought to transport the disease.

There is no breed, age or sex predilection to the parvo virus. Young animals, however, tend to suffer the highest fatalities.

Currently, there are two forms of CPV known -- gastrointestinal, which is the most common and affects the intestinal tract, an myocarditis, which most often appears in puppies less than three months of age and affects the heart.

The first signs of gastrointestinal CPV, usually vomiting and severe diarrhea, most often appear 5 to 7 days after the dog is first exposed to the virus. Depression and loss of appetite soon follow. Younger dogs may have a rise in temperature.

Puppies affected with the myocarditis form of CPV become listless, cry, have difficulty breathing and die of heart failure within a few hours. Frequently, they are found dead without being observed as having any difficulties at all. Those puppies that recover from this form of CPV often suffer permanent heart damage.

CATARACT SURGERY

I'm sure you're all familiar with someone who has had cataract surgery. The surgeon, in removing the crystalline lens which has become cloudy, unfortunately also removes the patient's ability to see clearly. Until recently, he had to replace the lost power with thick "bull's-eye" lenses, which had their drawbacks -- visually as well as cosmetically if only one eye was involved.

Then, along came contacts, giving patients much better visual and cosmetic results. The problem here was that, in many cases, the contacts had to be inserted and removed by someone other than the patient, since he could not see well enough to manage.

At present, implants are the vogue. The surgeon removes the cloudy crystalline lens, and replaces it with an optically-clear plastic lens, close to the patient's prescription. While affording superior vision, the procedure is not without its pitfalls. YOU can trust your optometrist to give you good advice as to when, and if surgery should be contemplated.

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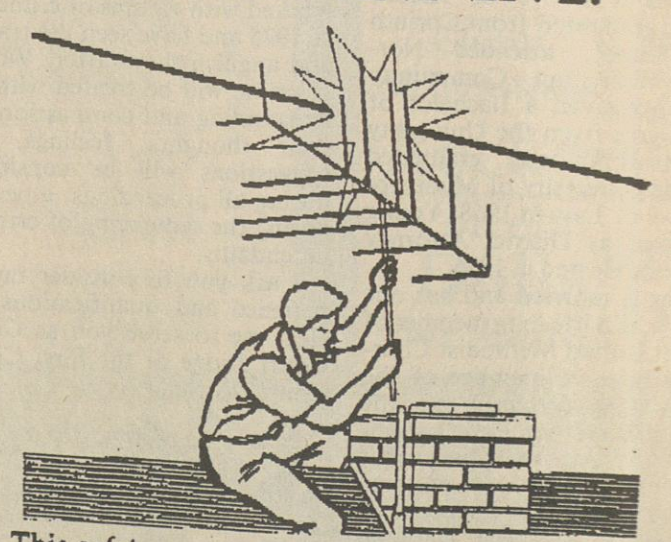
SAFETY FIRST

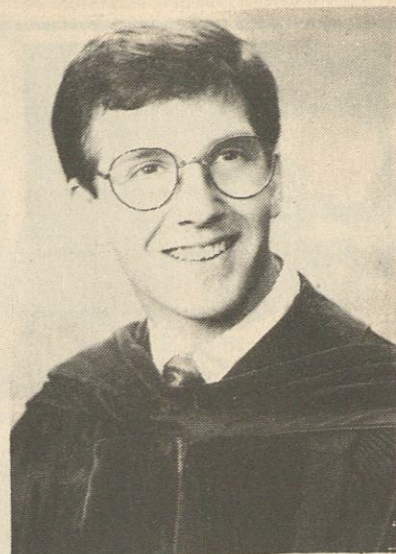
As you go about your task of cleaning-up after the storm, please observe safety. Remember, all lines should be respected and treated as if hot. Do not assume that any electrical wire is without power.

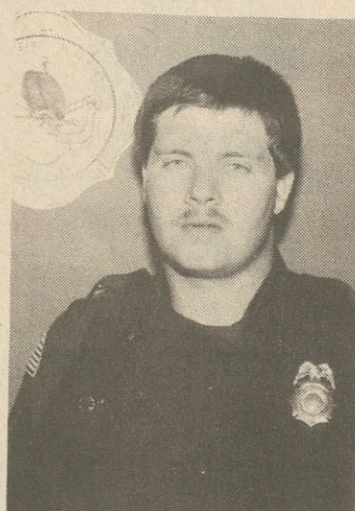

Fire Academy

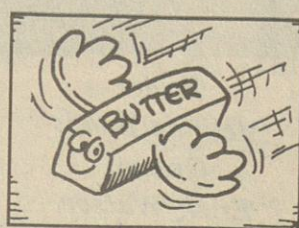
Recently, there were nineteen fire fighters that completed six weeks of intense fire fighting instruction at the State Fire Academy.

Sheriff's Department Makes Holiday Drug Arrests

The Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department made several drug-related arrests during the holiday weekend.

On Friday night, May 27, four persons were arrested. According to Tishomingo County Sheriff Johnny S. Nunley, a stake out at the Tishomingo residence of Tim Gilley, 35, netted four arrests.

Authorities, after staking out the residence, observed what they believed to be a drug buy. They followed the suspected buyers out of site of the residence and stopped the vehicle. Billy Jack Earnest, 46, and wife, Debra C. Earnest, 38, of Belmont were both arrested and charged with possession of cocaine. The couple's 1985 Plymouth Reliant was seized in the arrest.

Back at the Gilley residence, officers drove past what they thought to be surveillance cameras, according to Nunley. When they reached the house, all

suspected drugs had been flushed down the toilet, authorities said. However, the house was not hooked to a septic tank and nine bags of what appeared to be cocaine were deposited outside on the ground, according to the Sheriff. Gilley was arrested and charged with possession of cocaine with intent to sell, as was another suspect, Jennifer Wilson, 31.

Authorities seized two surveillance cameras, a surveillance monitor, a 1985 Chevrolet Corvette, a 1982 Chevrolet four-wheel-drive pickup, a 1982 Isuzu four-wheel-drive vehicle and \$5,875 in cash.

On Sunday night, May 29, Tishomingo County Authorities arrested Dolan H. Nunley, 22, of Tishomingo on charges of possession of a controlled substance, possession of marijuana with intent to sell, manufacturing marijuana and possession of drug paraphernalia.

The arrest came after the Sheriff's Department executed a search warrant at Nunley's residence, located on County Road 112 near Tishomingo, where they found eight ounces of marijuana, a small amount of cocaine and 11 marijuana plants, approximately 5 ft. tall. A 1980 Buick Regal was also seized during the arrest.

The suspect was released from the Tishomingo County Jail after posting \$10,000 bond.

Acting on a search warrant Monday, May 30, Randy D. Mock, 28, of Paden, was arrested and charged with possession of marijuana with intent to sell.

Tishomingo County Sheriff Johnny Nunley said that in addition to confiscating three bags of marijuana, a total of \$100 in cash and four firearms were seized at Mock's County Road 113 residence.

Mock remained in custody at press time.

Tishomingo County Constable Tim Bivins assisted in all the arrests.

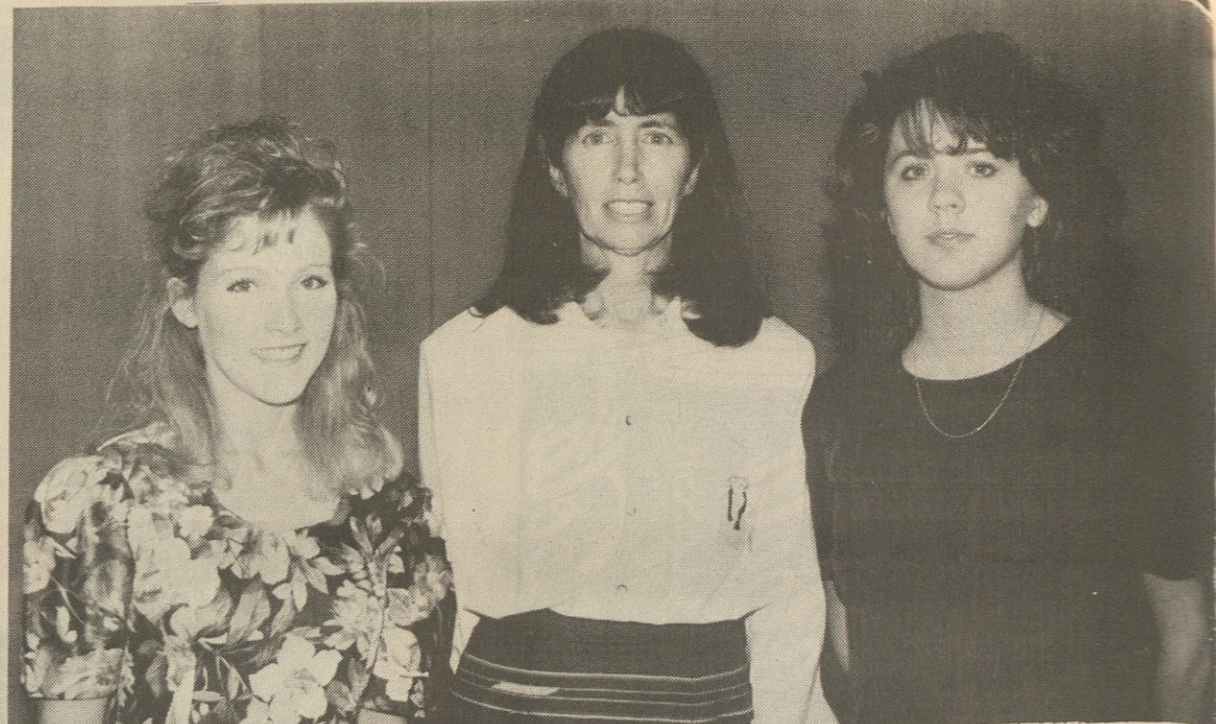

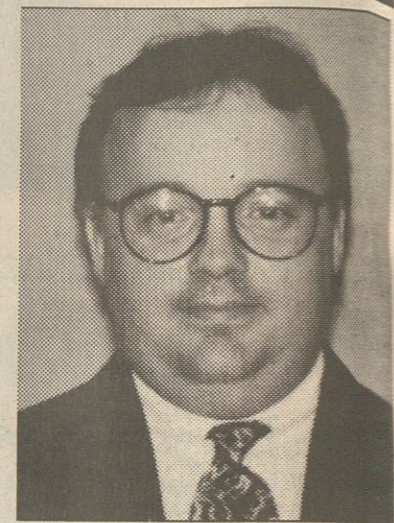

Unemployment Drops In Mid-April

According to Charles Smith, Manager of the Mississippi State Employment Service, unemployment in Tishomingo County dropped to 7.8 percent in mid-April. This compares to 8.6 percent in March and 5.3 percent in April, 1993.

The civilian labor force for the county numbered 11,010, 30 less than March but 320 more than April of last year. Approximately 10,150 Tishomingo county residents held jobs in mid-April while 860 were unemployed.

Manufacturing jobs in the county numbered 3,750, 20 more than March and 90 more than April, 1993. Nonmanufacturing jobs numbered 3,710, 10 less than March but 160 more than April 1993.

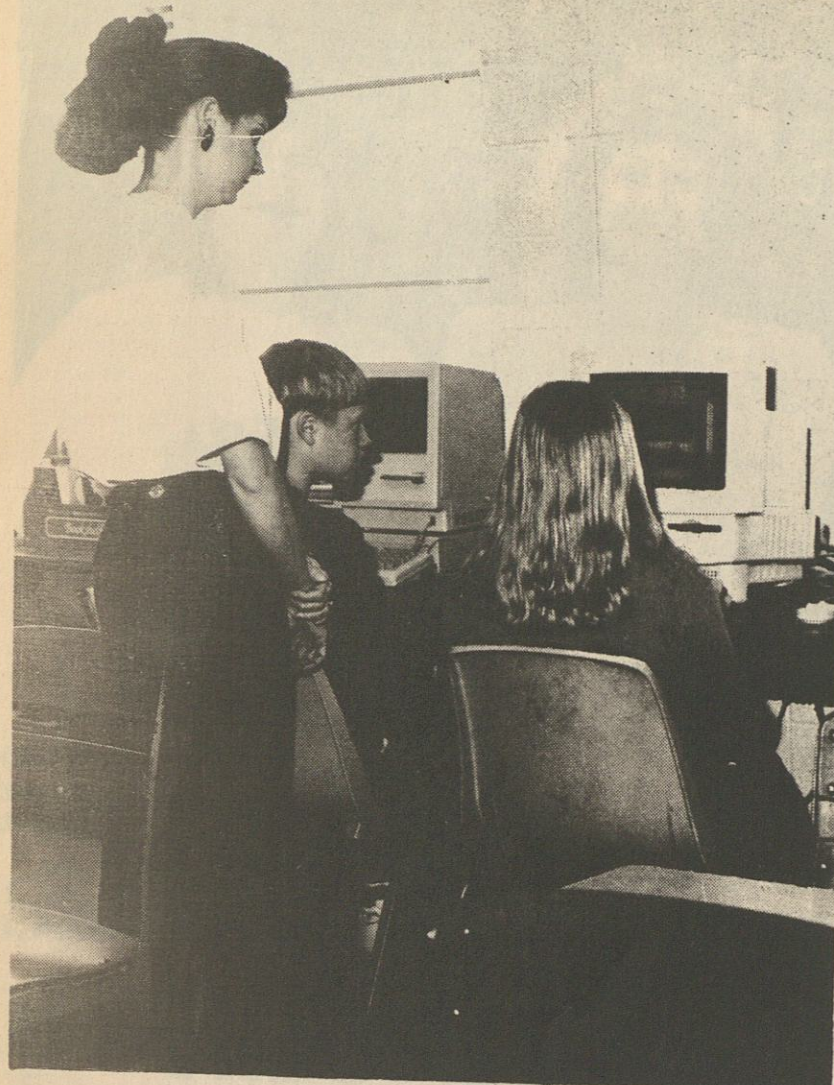

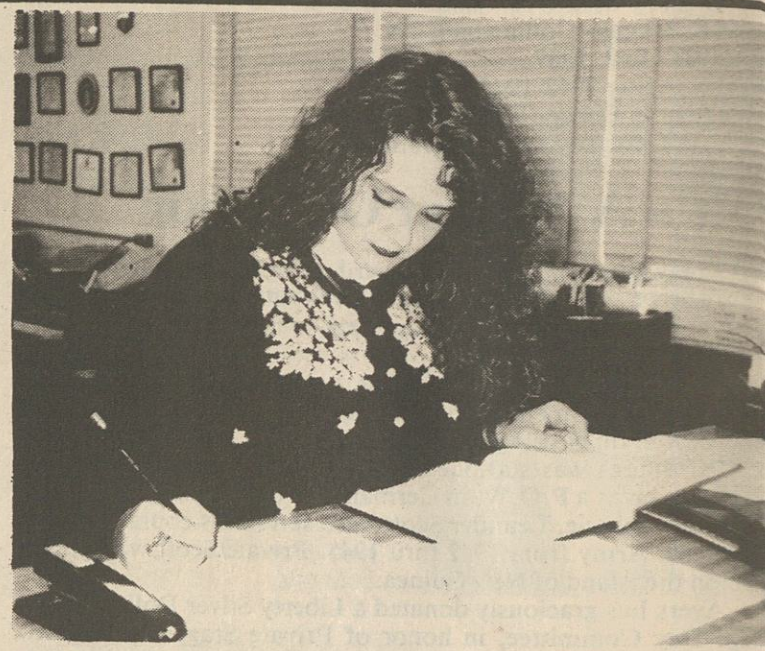

H.H. Daws Honored At NEMCC

Herbert Harold Daws of Booneville was honored on April 12 in the newly renovated science annex at Northeast Mississippi Community College.

On November 9, 1993, Northeast President Joe M. Childers recommended to Northeast's Board of Trustees that the Science annex be named Herbert H. Daws Hall and the board gave its unanimous approval. This is the first classroom facility on the Northeast campus to be named for a faculty member.

Daws was one of the original faculty members at Northeast when the doors were opened in 1948.

Born in 1916 in the Cleveland community of Kemper County, Daws decided in the sixth grade that he had been called to teach. He never changed his mind. In 1938 with a diploma from Cleveland High School, an Associate of Arts from East Mississippi Junior College and a Bachelor of Science from the University of Southern Mississippi, to which he would later add a Master of Arts from the University of Mississippi and further post-graduate work at both Ole Miss and Southern, he began a career that would find him teaching in six different decades.

By 1948, he had six years of experience teaching science and math in east central Mississippi high schools and four years heading the science department and teaching chemistry at East Mississippi Junior College. By this time Daws had a family to support and sound reasons to stay where he was, but again he felt a call--this time to leave a job he liked at a well-established

Iuka Heritage Day To Celebrate World War II 50th Anniversary



Tishomingo County War Veteran

O.C. Nelson is a native of Tishomingo County and spent 35 years in the U.S. Air Force. He is a graduate of Iuka High School, attended Mississippi State University before entering the U.S. Army Air Corps during World War II. He graduated from Cadet School as a second lieutenant with the Class of 44-G during WWII flew B-24's in Europe. In 1948 he flew C-119's in Germany during the Berlin Airlift. Upon returning to the United States, he became an aircraft commander in the C-119 aircraft and led a flight of C-119's to Ashiya, Japan during the Korean War. He participated in the Inchon invasion and the major airborne landings at Suncheon and Musan-Korea. He flew 97 combat missions and logged 568 combat hours while in Korea. Following the Korean War, he served in many capacities at several air bases and in the alternate Air Force Command Center Maryland. He was transferred to France as Squadron Operations Officer and became commander of the 40th Troop Carrier Squadron when he returned to the United States. In January 1969 he was transferred to South Viet-Nam where he served as Chief, Operations Division Tactical Airlift. After completion of duty in Viet-nam he was assigned to Headquarters, Tactical Air Command, Langley AFB, Va. as Chief, Operations Division for Tactical Airlift. He retired after completing duty at this assignment with the rank of Colonel. During his career, O.C. became a Command Pilot and accumulated some 10,000 pilot hours in B-24, B-17, B-25, C-54, C-47, C-119, C-123 and C-130 aircraft. His decorations include: Bronze Star, Meritorious Service Medal, Air Medal with 5

Oak Leaf Clusters, Air Force Commendation Medal, Presidential Unit Citation, Air Force Outstanding Unit Award, Korean Service Medal with 6 Battle Stars, Republic of Korea Presidential Unit Citation, plus many other service medals and awards. Colonel Nelson (USAF) Retired) is the son of the late James Omer and Altye Callicutt Nelson. He has three sons and lives in Iuka with his wife Bette.

With the 50th Anniversary of WWII you have been hearing many stories of the brave men and women serving their country. What you don't hear is many of those called to serve were just young fresh faces with no idea what laid ahead of them. On the heels of the great depression many people were still struggling to put food on the table. Every member of the family was needed to work to keep the family together. County Officials Attend Meeting

Tishomingo County officials recently attended the Mississippi Association of Supervisors annual planning and development district meeting in Booneville.

The meetings focused primarily on a review of legislation affecting county governments - the most far-reaching of which may likely become the Local System Bridge Rehabilitation and Reconstruction Program (LSBRP).

The program allocates \$25 million per year for the next five years to Mississippi counties for bridge replacement and rehabilitation. Each county is allocated a portion of the \$25 million for use on bridges in order, from the lowest bridge rating up to the National Bridge Standard's rating of 50. Counties that have recently passed bond issues to address local bridge problems may use their funds for bond retirement.

Of the nearly 900 pieces of legislation affecting county government that were addressed by the 1994 Legislature, some 90

bills were passed into law.

"These PDD meetings are important because it lets the Association take vital information to the counties," said MAS Executive Director Jack Gregory. "Local government in general, and county government in particular, fared well in the past session."

In addition to MAS staff, the program included reviews by State Aid Engineer Joe Clark, Local Government Specialist P.C. McLaurin, Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service; area Planning and Development District directors, and local members of the Legislature.

"The responsiveness of local supervisors at these meetings show their dedication to providing educated, well-informed leadership and more effective local government," said MAS President Jamie McGowan, who serves as Washington County Board of Supervisors president.

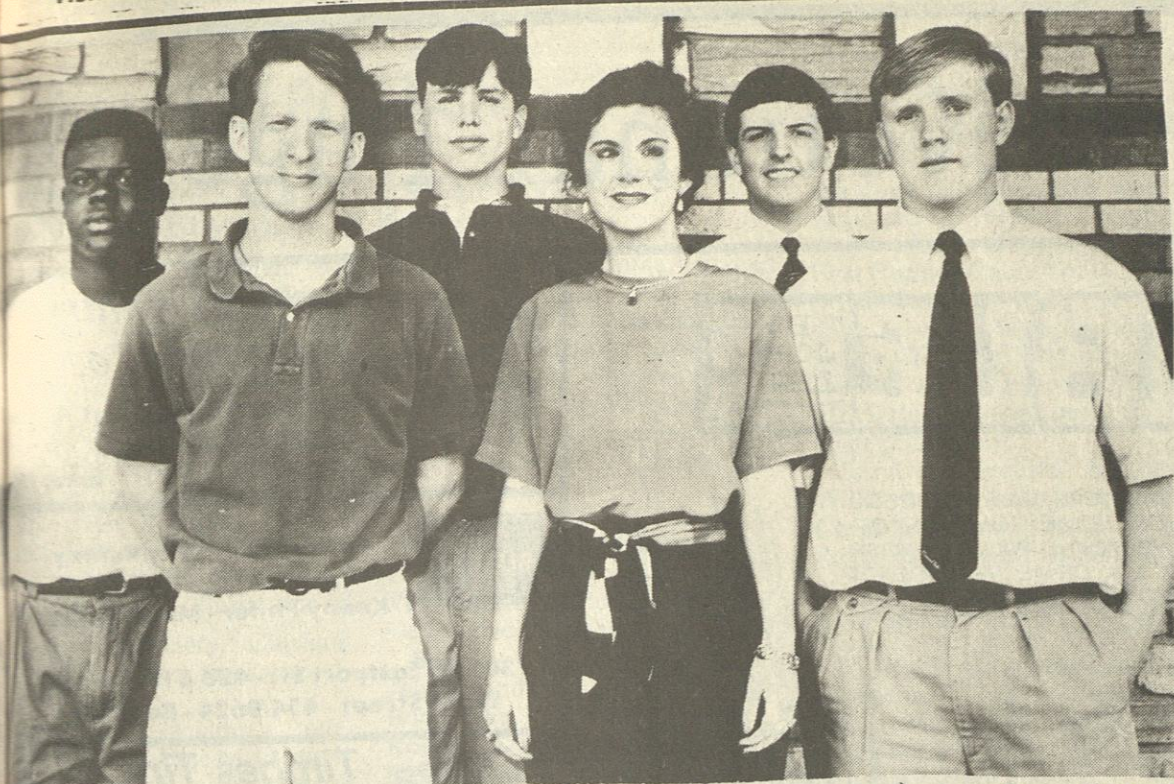

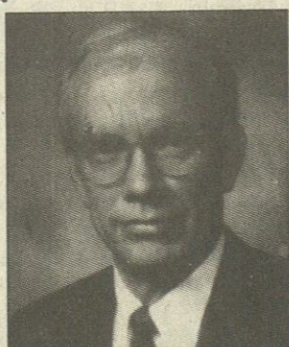

Judge Barry W. Ford, of Pontotoc, is seeking re-election as one of three Circuit Judges of the First Judicial District in the upcoming judicial elections.

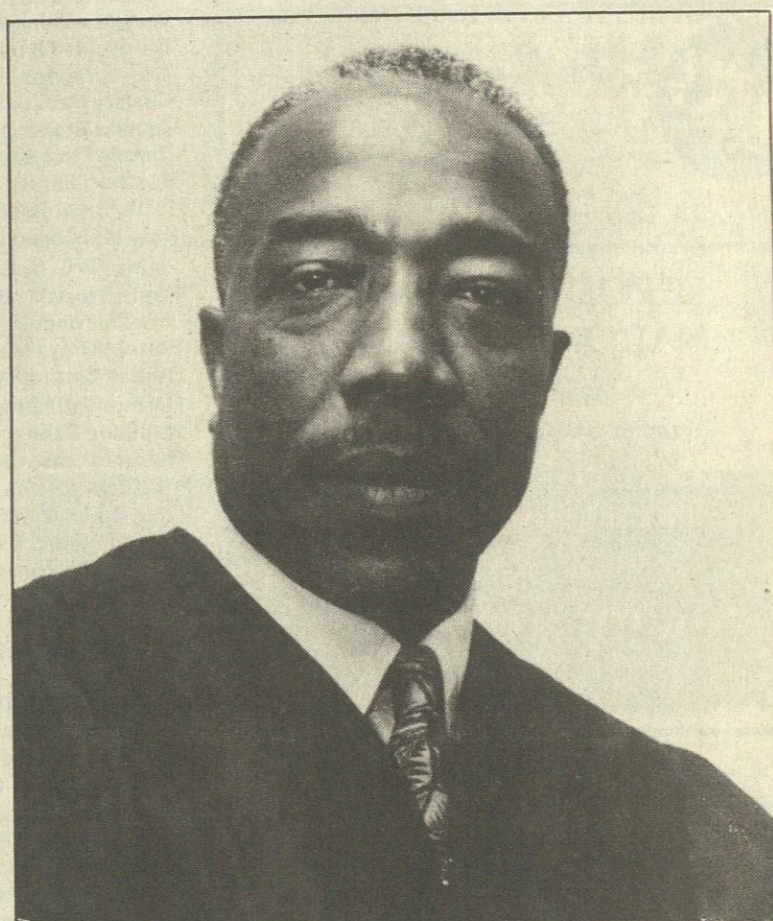
The First Judicial Circuit Court District includes Alcorn, Itawamba, Lee, Monroe, Pontotoc, Prentiss and Tishomingo Counties.

Say "Goodnight" With
Milk & Cookies

The warm milk and cookies
our mothers gave us may have
been more than an affectionate
bedtime ritual. The combination
of nutrients in these two foods
may help us go to sleep.

While milk is a "comfort
food" that can help you relax, it
also contains tryptophan, which
comes from protein. Scientific
research suggests that tryptophan
may trigger drowsiness.

The relaxing effect of tryptophan
seems to be enhanced
when it is eaten with car-
bohydrate-rich foods, such as
bread and cereal. Even the car-
bohydrates in cookies may help
transport tryptophan from the
blood stream to the brain, where
it may induce sleepiness.

Not surprisingly, beverages
and foods that contain caffeine,
including coffee, cola, tea and
chocolate, should be avoided
before bedtime. Caffeine is a
stimulant and can cause a tem-
porary state of alertness. In ad-
dition, caffeine may cause trem-
bling, headaches, nervousness,
muscle tension, irritability and
depression.

To sleep better every night,
exercise regularly. And if you
enjoy an evening snack, make it a
planned part of your balanced
diet. Finish the day with a small
bowl of cereal, or a glass of skim
milk and a few lowfat cookies,
such as gingersnaps or vanilla
wafers. This is a great, fat-free
way to satisfy a late-night
craving.

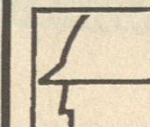
