Heavy Traffic Bypasses Iuka On New Hwy. 25 4-Lane

Local and State dignitaries gathered at the entrance of the newly completed 4.6 mile stretch of Mississippi Highway 25 in Iuka Monday to officially open it for public use.

The new four-laned section will provide a bypass around Iuka and connect U.S. 72 with J.P. Coleman State Park Road.

Mack L. Wadkins, Executive Director of the Tishomingo County Development Foundation, served as Master of ceremonies at the ribbon cutting. He told those at the ceremony how important it is to vote in election's such as Tuesdays. He explained that one vote can make a difference such as it did with the 1987 Four-lane highway bill responsible for the construction of this highway. "The bill passed by one vote and the Governor's veto was overridden with the exact number of votes needed."

Among the other speakers at the event were 1st District Miss. Rep. Harvey Benderman who said that the by-pass will be a safety factor since it will divert heavy truck traffic away from the central business district.

State Senator Travis Little and Northern District Department of Transportation Commissioner Zack Stewart both commented about the potential economic development that can be achieved in the area, with this new stretch of highway opening up many new opportunities.

The construction of the 4-lane project was done by Hubbs Contractors of Camden, Tenn. with a total

Iuka Voters To Elect Mayor Next Tuesday

Candidates J. R. Long and David Nichols will once again face-off Tuesday, June 14, in a court-ordered election for the office of mayor of the City of Iuka.

Citizens are urged to come out and vote during this special election since its outcome will determine if incumbent mayor David Nichols will remain in office or if candidate J. R. Long will take over as the city's chief executive.

The special election is being held after a jury decided recently that irregularities with absentee balloting procedures made it impossible to determine a clear winner in the June 8, 1993 general election. The jury voted to have a new election rather than, themselves, determining a winner.

Voting will begin Tuesday morning, June 14 at 7 a.m. at City Hall. Polls will close at 7 p.m. Anyone wishing to vote absentee may do so until noon Saturday, June 11 at City Hall . For more information on the election or absentee voting call 423-3781.

Runoff Election June 28th Following Tuesday's Vote Winners In Primary To Be On November Ballot

Results from Tuesday's election have led to a runoff in both the Democratic and Republican races for the District 1 House of Representatives.

Democratic candidates Bill Wheeler and Tim Ford will vie for the Democratic nomination in two weeks while Republican candidates Grant Fox and Roger Wicker will face off.

In the race for U.S. Senate, Republican incumbent Trent Lott easily defeated his opponents for his party's nomination. In the Democratic race, Ken Harper and Hiram Eastland will be in the runoff on June 28.

District 1 Court of Appeals Judge Democratic candidates Thomas Coleman and Charles "Charlie" Brett will be in the runoff. The winner will face Republican Roger McMillin in O'Hara - 7,155 and Jorja Pound Turnipseed 17,676; Republicans: Jimmy Bourland -2,021, Trent Lott - 71,046 and Richard O'Hara 1,442.

District 1 Court of Appeals -Democrats: Charles Brett - 9,024, Thomas Coleman - 11,844 and Nicholas Phillips - 3,509; Republicans: Roger McMillan, Jr. - 12,539 and Rex Sanderson -6,161.

Lawsuit To Be Filed **Against City of Iuka**

A suit against the City of Iuka, as well as against certain individual City officials is being brought by former city general maintenance superintendent Jerry McDaniel on grounds of wrongful discharge, according to McDaniel's lawyer Duncan "Bubba" Lott of Booneville.

A hearing was held April 11 to examine the evidence surrounding the firing of McDaniel. Lott, at that time, interviewed Mayor David Nichols, certain Iuka City Board members and city employees to determine if McDaniel was dismissed wrongfully. Lott, on behalf of McDaniel, asked that the Board take up the matter and based on evidence of the hearing, reverse their decision at its next board meeting. This topic was not mentioned at the regular board meeting therefore the next course of action is for McDaniel to file suit, according to Lott.

The suit will request reinstatement, back pay and compensation for mental pain and anguish.



MORE THAN A THIRST QUENCHER Water is second only to oxygen as life's most essential element. We need six to eight glasses of water daily to help ensure good health.

Water must be replaced frequently because we lose about two and a half quarts daily. In fact, it is necessary for almost every process of the human body. For example, water aids in digestion and circulation, and it helps maintain normal body tem-

perature and healthy skin.

Your body's need for water increases in hot and dry climates and with physical activitiy. In thee situations, it is a good idea to drink a few ounces of water every 15 to 30 minutes. Also, be sure to drink when you feel thirsty. Thirst is a cue that your body needs more fluid.

Food also provides water. Most fruits and vegetables are more than 80 percent water. And water makes up between 60 and 70 percent of meats and poultry. Because that contain caffeine or alcohol are not considered good sources of water because they act as diuretics and speed the loss of fluid. If you do consume them, drink an equal amount of water.



PROBLEMS WITH NIGHT **DRIVING?**

Many people have difficulty driving at night, especially eyeglass wearers with strong prescriptions. The culprit is -reflections.

The contrast of bright lights against the darkness of night makes the reflections much more noticeable. He is bombarded by reflections from the front surface of the lens, and by "ghost images" from internal reflections. These reflections reduce the amount of light transmitted through the lens, and significantly distract the driver. It's no wonder he has difficulty driving at night.

There is an anti-reflective (or AR) coating, which can be applied to the surfaces of the lenses, which will significantly reduce these unwanted reflections, and increase light transmittance. Your binoculars, camera lenses, and microscope lenses, as well as most electro-optical devices all have this coating for the same reason.

Besides improving your night driving, AR-coated lenses offer an additional plus -- by eliminating reflections, people can see your eyes without astounding clarity.

Letter To The Editor

I have a statement to make regarding statements by our congressional politicians and anyone who has criticizing remarks to make about our state prisons. On more than one occasion, I have heard candidates refer to our prisoners as lazy. I have also heard them complain about televisions, weight benches and air conditioned cells. Well, I don't know what prison was being referred to, but I can guarantee that it wasn't all of them. Maybe our county jails were being referred to, where our prisoners have televisions and are free to go out and play basketball and lift weights.

Now it's my turn to speak. I have a relative who is in prison, and I know what they go through, and it sure is not watching Days of Our Lives and lifting weights in an air conditioned building. Last summer, in a prison in South Alabama, my prisoned relative worked every day, 6 days a week, 10 hours a day, in a 3 foot deep ditch digging with a shovel. The temperature was 105-120 degrees every day. He did not so much as have a cap or hat to keep the sun off of his head, or a rag to wipe his sweat. Maybe he got a drink of water once every hour or so, just enough to wet his tongue. They were fed three meals a day, the food being almost inedible. They are restricted to visitors once a week, and they can call home once or twice a week. If they don't have supportive family, then they don't have money to buy an occasional candy bar or coke. At Christmas, they can get packages, the contents are limited. They are allowed to receive one pair of tennis shoes per year. If their shoes wear out, they can buy a new pair from the prison for \$75.00, but they are only getting a \$20.00 pair of shoes. They can buy a Bic disposable razor once a week for .75 cents, they are .97 cents for five at any store.

All of their rights were taken away from them when they were convicted of whatever crime they committed, and their suffering began the day they were put behind bars. Why do you people want to keep condemning them? They are paying for their crimes. What else do you want? Why don't we put them to work in the heat and bring them in to a building just as hot? Why don't we take their blankets in the winter, so they will be cold? Why don't we limit them to one meal a day? We sure wouldn't want to over feed them. And why do we

ORDINANCE REGULATING THE ERECTION AND OCCUPATION OF MOBILE HOMES

WHEREAS, the Board of Alderman of the Town of Tishomingo find that certain regulations should be adopted for the erection and occupation of mobile homes in order to preserve and promote the public health, safety and general welfare of the inhabitants of the Town of Tishomingo and the public generally, and to encourage and facilitate the growth and the expansion of the Town of Tishomingo.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that a mobile home should be defined as a vehicular, portable structure unit or other structure accessory to a dwelling unit by a member or members of the bonafide residence of the dwelling, which is clearly incidental of the use of the dwelling unit for residential purposes.

BE IT therefore further resolved that no mobile home shall be erected in the town limits of the Town of Tishomingo except by the home owner thereof in use of home occupation.

BE IT further resolved that this order shall take immediately upon this passage pursuant to Section 21-13-11 of the Mississippi Code of 1972.

Genesco Workers May Qualify For Benefits

Mississippi workers who were laid off from Genesco, Inc., locations in Fulton and Iuka May be able to draw extra unemployment benefits and services.

Genesco Inc. workers in Fulton and Iuka who were engaged in employment related to the production of boots and shoes may be eligible for these benefits, according to Charles Ballard, director of unemployment insurance for Mississippi Employment Security Commission. "Workers who were laid off either temporarily or permanently or had hours reduced since February 16, 1993 have been approved for Trade Act benefits," he said. These workers are covered in Trade Act Petitions approved on May 17, 1994.

If you think you might be eligible for these benefits, contact the nearest claims center office of the Mississippi Employment Security Commission.

The federal Trade Act provides additional weeks of unemployment benefits to people who have exhausted regular benefits. As much as 26 more weeks of benefits may be provided for an individual to complete an approved training course.

Companies become eligible to participate in the Trade Act program by filing a petition to the U.S. Department of Labor. They must provide evidence that an increase in foreign imports has adversely affected the demand the their products or services, causing them to lay off workers.
