

# Wheeler, Wicker **Advance To Nov. 8 General Election**

**Battle For 1st District Congressman Narrows** 

Democratic candidate Bill Wheeler of Belmont and Republican candidate Roger Wicker of Tupelo have advanced to the November 8 Election where they will vie for the position of United States Representative of District 1.

Wheeler defeated his opponent Mississippi House Speaker Tim Ford in Tuesday's run-off primary with a vote of 16,820 to 13,051, garnering his party's nomination for the House of Representatives seat left vacant by retiring Rep. Jamie Whitten. Wicker defeated candidate Grant Fox with a vote of 11,815 to 10,453 to secure his party's nomination for this position.

In the run-off for the Democratic nomination for U.S. Senate, District 1, Ken Harper received 48,325 votes, giving him the win over opponent Hiram Eastland, who received 28,044 votes. Harper will face Republican candidate Trent Lott in November.

Thomas Coleman, Democratic candidate for the newly created Court of Appeals Judge, District 1, defeated Charles "Charlie" Brett in Tuesday's run-off by a vote of 14,859 to 12,822. Coleman will go on to face Republican candidate Roger McMillian for the position in the general election.

There is a decreasing price schedule for multiple-children nilies; and there are exemptions for long-term attendance and niors and seniors of 1994-1995.

It has ordered the Tishomingo County Water District to provide the utility to Albert Shadburn. The Indian Creek resident filed a complaint after the new consolidated system left him and his neighbors out while water lines were laid to areas for new development, including property in Alabama.

The order requires the water district to provide Shadburn water within 120 days of the June 9 order.

The ruling follows a Feb. 3 recommended order from Northern Public Service Commissioner Bo Robinson that Shadburn be served. However, members of the water district board objected and asked for a hearing before all three commissioners. They lost in a unanimous ruling by the three Public Service Commission members.

Robinson's recommended order said the district had:

Represented prior to the formation of the present Tishomingo County Water District that Shadburn and other landowners in present dry areas would be served with water and have failed to do so to date.

Have begun construction with grant monies to serve areas of the certified area to the exclusion of Shadburn and other landowners.

Have begun construction to serve landowners of the State of Alabama in violation of Mississippi laws.

Have discriminated against Shadburn and other residents by refusal and failure to serve them or give any reason why they should not be served.

Have failed to properly spend funds equally to all residents of the certificated area.

Have devalued Shadburn's property and other landowners in the area by failing to serve their property with adequate water.

"The whole world is turned right back up where it should be," said Lola Shadburn whose husband filed the complaint. "About 34 landowners will have water. These are long-time residents, who have lived there for 50 years and water has never

The commission ruled that Tishomingo had the ability to serve Shadburn's area despite the utility's objections. The water district will be required to report on their progress in complying with the order every 30 days to the Public Utility Staff so it can be monitored by the commission.



Recently, a board meeting was called to hire a new police officer for the City of Iuka. The three Aldermen who were present, Herbert Booker, James Bates, and Bess Young, decided to bring up another issue, along with Police Chief Amos Bates and Mayor David Nichols. That issue was the gym equipment that was set up in the new truck-bay of the Fire Department. The two Aldermen who support the concept of physical fitness were not present at the meeting, as they had not been officially notified of the date and time of the meeting.

Alderman Booker brought up the issue by asking the Board what they were going to do with those weights in that Fire Department. The decision was made by the Board, along with Mayor Nichols, to find out who owned the equipment and have their department head, whether it be the Police Chief or the Fire Chief, to see that it be removed.

When questioned later by a firefighter, Mr. Booker stated that the reason for their decision was the "liability problem," that if someone got hurt, the city would have to pay for it. He also said that there were so many people working out down there (in the truck-bay) that you couldn't tell who was on duty and who wasn't.

Obviously, the Board of Aldermen has not thoroughly thought through the situation, or they would not have made such a hasty decision. The only people who worked out on the equipment were city employees who insurance coverage have already, and the city would not have had to pay in case of an injury. As to the statement that you couldn't tell who was on duty and who' wasn't the police and firemen know whether they're on duty or not. It shouldn't matter if Mr. Booker or anyone else can or can't tell who's on duty.

The Board of Aldermen, the Mayor and the citizens of Iuka all should be thankful that there are men in the Police and Fire Departments who care enough about themselves and their jobs to keep themselves physically fit. A person has to be in good physical condition to make it through rigorous training at both the Police Academy and the Fire Academy. Why shouldn't these men be able to maintain this condition for the jobs they do everyday?

There has also been some concern voiced about police and firemen working out while on duty. What is the harm in working out during a 12 or 16 hour shift at night when nothing is happening? The firemen have nothing to do but dispatch, and working out is far more productive than sitting around eating, smoking cigarettes, and watching TV. And is it not better for the policemen to be alert and aware, ready to roll should call come in, instead of being parked in a dark corner somewhere half asleep? Working out while on duty

shouldn't be something the Board has a problem with. There is a police phone and a fire phone in the new truck-bay, and there is easy access to radios. Working out in no way effects the response-readiness of either department.

If my house was on fire and I was trapped inside, needing a firefighter to rescue me, I'd feel a lot better if I knew that the firefighter was physically able to help me get out of the burning building. If my life was being threatened by a thief or killer, it would be good to know that the policemen responding to my call were in top condition and able to handle the situation. Apparently, most of the Board of Aldermen think it's all right to have police and firemen on duty who are unhealthy, overweight, and ineffectual, just waiting to go out and protect the citizens of Iuka from nasty criminals and raging fires.

If larger cities can provide gyms for their employers with taxpayers' money, surely the Board and the Mayor can allow these men to provide their own equipment to work out on, which has been the case until now. It seems as the city officials are trying to do everything within their power to ensure that the City of Iuka will have second-rate Police and Fire Departments now and always. As a citizen of Iuka and the wife of an Iuka Firefighter, I am very concerned by the unthoughtfulness of this decision.



SENSITIVE TO BRIGHT LIGHT? Some people squint to protect their eyes from too much light. Normal, healthy eyes can adjust to a range of brightness of well over a million to one, but just as skin color varies between individuals, so does the amount of protective pigment in the eye vary.

If you suffer from bright light that others seem comfortable with, don't suffer in silence! We often find that relief is obtained with relatively little density in what may appear to be a simple a cosmetic eyeglass tint. Glasses with a 15 or 20% gradient tint may be all that is needed. Photosensitive lenses which darken in response to the sun's ultraviolet rays are also a remedy. Indoors, under office or factory fluorescent lighting, a 10% pink tint may work very well.

Squinting, however, may also be sign of uncorrected astigmatism. We also see it among children who are becoming nearsighted. Don't let your child develop this habit if eyeglasses will cure the underlying problem.

### Governor Buys First License -1-800-ASK FISH

Anyone wishing to fish and hunt in Mississippi will now have the easiest access in the country to buying licenses.

This morning at 10:00 Gov. Kirk Fordice purchased the very first Mississippi sportsman license via a new state of the art automated license system. The system is the first, and only one of its kind in the nation.

"By implementing this system Mississippi is taking a lead the rest of the country will soon follow," Fordice said. "Sportsmen across Mississippi, and the nation, can now purchase a fishing or hunting license by simply picking up the telephone. It is an accomplishment that the folks at the Department of Wildlife, Fisheries and Parks (MDWFP) and the people of Mississippi can truly be proud of."

For the past several months officials at the MDWFP have been working feverishly to get the system on line.

"This new system will have as much impact on the sportsmen who fish and hunt in Mississippi as anything else this department has ever accomplished," said Dr. Sam Polles, MDWFP executive director. "The sporting public will find this system convenient and user friendly."

The system allows folks to call 1-800-ASK-FISH 24-hours a day, 7-days a week and purchase a fishing or hunting license by using a Visa or MasterCard. A \$3 service charge is applied to the price of the license.

By: Barbara F. Guinn, **Extension Home Economist EXERCISE AT ANY AGE** No matter what your age, it's never too late to start exercising.

Doctors at the Tufts-United States Department of Agriculture Human Nutrition Research Center on Aging agree. They found that 60-to 70-year old men were able to walk faster and perform routine tasks more easily after just 12 weeks of regular exercise.

Researchers also say that exercise may improve cardiovascular fitness, contribute to weight loss, reduce the risk of osteoporosis and help control stress. Listed are tips for adults beginning an exercise program.

1. See your doctor for a complete physical and obtain recommendations concerning any exercises to avoid.

2. Keep a weekly log of your activities to help track your progress.

3. Warm up and cool down. Stretch before and after exercising to provide more flexibility and reduce the risk of injury.

4. Breathe deeply as you exercise. Inhale from the abdomen.

5. Listen to your body. Pain usually indicates that you are performing an exercise incorrectly or putting too much strain on a joint or muscle group.

6. Begin any exercise program gradually and build up slowly to greater intensity and longer workouts.

7. Drink fluids both before and during vigorous exercise to prevent dehydration.

8. Wear the proper footwear and clothing for your activity.

9. Find an exercise partner. A partner helps keep you motivated and makes exercising more fun.

10. Select an activitiy that suits your lifestyle. Walking and swimming are good forms of exercise at almost any age.

Regular exercise can help you feel better, look better and enjoy life more fully.


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

### **New Laws Taking Effect In July**

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of

Any person bringing guns or plosives onto public or private hool grounds or school buses uld be arrested on felony arges and face up to three years prison upon conviction under he of a broad range of new state ws which take effect in July.

The law is primarily designed help curb school violence and ovide for weapon-free school nes. It allows certain exemused for educational or schoolsanctioned purposes, for example -- but also makes it a felony to encourage or assist a person under 18 years of age to carry firearms or explosives onto school property. Additional provisions include stiffer penalties against parents or guardians who knowingly allow a child to carry badiy weapons in violation of state laws, creation of a new Family Preservation program to steer children away from the paths of delinquency, and authorization for the Department ter for Prevention of School Violence.

Among the top priorities of the session, the package also contains measures to reduce the legal age for minors to be tried as adults in felony cases from 18 to 17; provide for automatic expulsion of a student who possesses illegal drugs or deadly weapons or commits violence on school property; require school principals to immediately report criminal acts at schools to law enforcement officers; and make various revisions in laws involving the alternative schools program.

Several other major bills are due to take effect on or about July 1, including laws that will:

 Authorize an expansion of the 1987 four-lane highway program, establish a new program to assist in repair and reconstruction of local bridges, revise the formula for distribution of State Aid Road funds to the counties, and provide a plan for funding of highway improvements and related infrastructure projects in casino areas.

•Initiate a reduction in costs of car tags by allowing taxpayers to receive credit for ad valorem taxes on vehicles starting January 1, 1995; the legislation calls for a temporary diversion of money from the state's General Fund to help replace the revenue loss to cities and counties, along with a 2 percent increase in the sales tax on cars and light trucks starting in January 1995.

•Allow the jury in a capital murder case to impose a sentence of life imprisonment without parole, thus providing a third sentencing option in addition to death or life imprisonment with parole eligibility; also, requires at least 20 years be served before parole if the defendant receives a life-with-parole sentence.

•Permit a jury to order enhan-ced penalties in "hate" crimes involving racial or religious prejudice.

•Authorize an annual salary increase of \$1,848 (including annual increments) for certificated teachers with one or more years' experience; provide full funding of health insurance for full-time school employees, community college personnel, and public library workers.

State finances was paramount issue throughout the 1994 session. Legislators adopted an overall General Fund budget totaling \$2.519 billion for the 1994-95 fiscal year and, in light of dramatic gains in the state's economy, were able to provide increased funding for public schools, universities, community colleges, mental health facilities, and other priority needs.

community sponsored events and leave the fireworks to the experts. If parents and caregivers do decide to allow their children to use or observe fireworks at home, they should always supervise the use of fireworks, even sparklers and small firecrackers.'

The Consumer Product Safety Commission reports that in 1992, 12,937 people were injured by fireworks. The majority of these injuries occurred because of the misuse of fireworks, especially by unsupervised children. Approximately 45 percent of those who receive emergency room treatment for firework-related injuries are children, with those ages 14 and under being the most vulnerable.

Miles Lane, a Jackson ten year old, knows first hand that fireworks can be dangerous. Lane will never forget the sky rocket which was accidently shot into his mouth while he watched older children ignite fireworks. In addition to the cuts and burns, Miles later developed pneumonia. The doctors treated the pneumonia for months not knowing that a small plastic tip from the sky rocket was lodged in his lung causing the infection. "One night when Miles was complainting of severe chest pain, he pulled the plastic tip out of his mouth," remembers Miles' mother, Amy Lane. "It just proves that anything can happen." Miles now advises other children to always have an adult present when using fireworks and to stand far away from people

who are using fireworks. Although sparklers are usually considered a safe form of fireworks, sparklers are the leading firework product involved in injuries to children under age 5. Sparklers can reach temperatures greater than 1000 degrees F at the tip and can cause serious contact burns or ignite

clothing. Burns are the most

common type of fire related injury. The hands, legs or eyes are involved percent of these injuries.

More fireworks are use America's celebration 0 dependence than for any holiday in the world. # Unemployment

**Rises In Mid-May** 

According to Charles Smith, Manager of the Mississippi State Employment Service, unemployment in Tishomingo County rose to 9.2 percent in mid-May. This compares to 7.8 percent in April and 5.1 percent in May, 1993.

The civilian labor force for the county numbered 11,250, 240 more than April and 470 more than May of last year. Approximately 10,210 Tishomingo County residents held jobs in mid-May while 1,040 were unemployed.

Manufacturing jobs in the county numbered 3,720, 40 less than April, but 30 more than May of 1993. Nonmanufacturing jobs numbered 3,730, 20 more than April and 160 more than





ding to the Department of Public Safety's Division of Public Safety Planning.

"All bicyclists are encouraged to wear helmets," said Donald O' Cain, the division's executive director," and, like motorists, it's vital that they understand the meaning of street signs and do as they direct. Wearing helmets may seem to be unecessary for bicyclists, but it should be remembered that these individuals have virtually no protection if the bicycle collides with a motor vehicle or other object. Helmets can mean the difference between life and death. Obeying stop signs, traffic lights and other traffic control devices is just as important for bicyclists as it is for motorists."

When travelling in the street, bicycle riders should be on the right side near the curb and travel the same way as motor vehicles. When more than one bicycle is involved, it is important to travel single file and never side by side.

Bicyclists never should ride at night unless their bicycles have sufficient reflectors and lights to be easily seen by oncoming motorists.

"Although bicycles are fun to ride, they are not toys," O'Cain noted. "Parents should be sure that their children understand bicycling safety measures, just as adult riders should understand them, and motorists should be particularly cautious when bicycles are on the roadway. Few tragedies can bring about the sadness that comes when a bicyclist, particularly a youthful bicyclist, is killed in a collision with a motor vehicle. Following simple safety rules can avert such tragediés."

### Examine Home Gardens For Tomato Diseases

To many people summer just wouldn't be the same without fresh, homegrown tomatoes. But many diseases can rob home gardeners of their favorite summer treat.

Unfortunately, Mississippi's summer weather often provides a perfect environment for different types of tomato diseases.

Dr. Frank Killebrew, extension plant pathologist at Mississippi State University, said recent overcast and wet weather could cause disease problems for both home and commercial gardeners.

"Home gardens are vulnerable right now since many are in the beginning stages of production," Killebrew said. "Diseases such as early blight, blossom end rot, southern stem blight and spotted wilt virus can strike tomato plants quickly."

Home gardeners have reported cases of both early blight and late blight in tomato plants this year.

Early blight strikes the lower part of the tomato plant and works its way up, defoliating and damaging the stem, and eventually killing the plant.

Late blight, which has not been a problem in Mississippi for more than 20 years, has been reported in seven counties this year. The signs of this fungus are death of foliage, and brown blotches on the fruit which quickly turn black and rot.

"Both late and early blight are most severe during wet, humid conditions," Killebrew said. "We expect late blight problems to disappear with the warmer and drier conditions expected later in the season." soil." The disease, which appears as a black spot at the blossom end of the tomato, can be prevented by watering plants during long periods of dry weather.

While growers can't control the weather, they can take steps to help prevent these fungi.

"We recommend a good fungicide application program to prevent problems," Killebrew said. "Make sure the fungicide contains either chlorothalonil or maneb -- these are available in many different brands from most garden stores."

A seven to 10 day preventative application while tomato plants are fruiting is recommended to control early blight.

Southern stem blight, another troublesome fungus, thrives when temperatures are in the low 90 and rainfall is frequent. This distinctive white fungus attacks the tomato plant at the base, and in a matter of days, the plant collapses and dies.

Although there are no sprays to control Southern stem blight, there are a few tricks to help avoid it.

"We recommend crop rotation, but that isn't always possible for a home garden," Killebrew said. "One trick to control stem blight in spring and fall gardens is to make a protective aluminum foil covering for the tomato plant's base."

To make the protective covering, wrap foil around the base of the young transplants, leaving about 2 inches of the covering above the soil and inserting about 1 inch into the soil.

In 1992, tomato spotted wilt virus plagued tomato crops throughtout Mississippi, but so far the virus has not been a problem this year.

"We thought the virus would be serious this year, but problems have been spotty," Killebrew said. "There are not a lot of control measures for this virus, which is spread by thrips."

One disease that attacks the tomato plant's fruit directly is blossom end rot, caused by a shortage of calcium in the plant's tissues.

"Blossom end rot becomes a problem after long periods of dry weather followed by wet weather," Killebrew said. "Tomato plants need moisture to get enough calcium from the
