



CONTACTS: WHICH KIND? Basically, we have three kinds of contacts with which to fit our patients: hard, soft and gaspermeable. The hard lenses were made of PMMA, a plastic developed in the 1940's. Although they provided excellent vision correction and were quite durable, they just were not comfortable. If you wore them too long, your cornea, being deprived of oxygen, became swollen and irritated.

Soft lenses are made of hydrophilic (water loving) plastic. Since 38-79 percent of their weight is water, they are very comfortable to wear, due to the fact that oxygen can pass through the lenses to nourish the cornea.

The most recent development is the gas-permeable lens. These allow clear vision, will correct astigmatism, and are much more durable than soft lenses. Since they allow as much oxygen to reach the cornea through the lenses as soft lenses do, they approach a level of comfort equal to that of soft lenses. These lenses require more expertise for fitting than do soft lenses. parked in the shade and with the windows left open as much as four inches -- can be a death trap for the family pet.

For example, if it's 85 degrees outside, it would take only 32 minutes for the temperature in a closed car to reach 120 degrees. When a dog's temperature rises just a few degrees, severe brain damage or heat stroke can result.

Be sure and provide cool shade and plenty of clean, fresh water for your pet. As the temperatures rise, your animals tend to drink more water.


Make sure your pet doesn't overexert during the hot part of the day.

If your pet exhibits signs of heat stress - panting, a staring or anxious expression, failure to respond to commands, warm dry skin, extremely high fever, rapid heart beat or collapse - the recommended first aid is to immerse the animal in cool (not cold) water immediately. Spraying the dog with cool water from the garden hose will help.

Then take the animal to your family veterinarian.

Special care and precautions can make the summer safer and more enjoyable for you and your pet. storm, please observe safety. Remember, all lines should be respected and treated as if hot. Do not assume that any electrical wire is without power.

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Bill Wheeler Biographical Sketch



NOUNCED In 1995 Wheat Program contains à zero percent acreage reduction, the same as in 1994, according to Phillip A. Horn, County Extension Director of Tishomingo County the Agricultural Stablization and Conservation Service. Producers who participate in the 1995 program will not be required to

reduce their planting to qualify for price support loans and deficiency payments.

"The means that there is no requirement to place eligible cropland into an Acreage Conservation Reserve," Horn said.

He said the zero-percent acreage reduction continues to be the best choice because it provided the highest income for producers, the greatest economic activity for rural communities, and the highest quality grain for processors. This level was chosen from the statutory range of 0 to 15 percent to allow wheat growers to produce sufficient wheat supplies for domestic and export needs.

As in 1994, the wheat program offers target price protection at \$4.00 per bushel. A paid land

diversion will not be implemented.

ASCS official Horn said other 1994 wheat program provisions will be announced later.

New Highway Safety Legislation Effective July 1st....

Although preventing death and serious injuries in motor vehicle crashes has been the overwhelming reason for using safety belts and child protective devices, July 1 will usher in two more reasons, according to the Department of Public Safety's Division of Public Safety Planning.

Beginning on this date, drivers and front-seat passengers not using safety belts and drivers of vehicles transporting children


under the age of 4, who are not secured in child protection devices, will be subject to a \$25 fine. Previously there was no penalty for not using safety belts, and the requirement for children to use protection devices applied only to children under age 2. "The goal of these legislative



PERMANENT COVER FOR ACR Phillip A. Horn, County Executive Director of the Tishomingo County Agricultural Stablization and Conservation Service, says farm program participants should seriously consider designating the same acreage each year as acreage conservation reserve (ACR). ACR is cropland that is required to be removed from production and maintained in conserving uses, in order to participate in and receive benefits under annual acreage reduction programs.

"We recommend that farmers seriously consider devoting these acres to a permanent vegetative cover, such as perennial grasses,' Horn said. This practice is especially effective on fragile, erosive soils and will help maintain the ground from year-toyear, he said.

Producers had the opportunity, when they enrolled in the 1994 farm programs, to request cost-share assistance to establish perennial cover on ACR. The Multi-Year Cost-Share Program, authorized by the Food, Agriculture, Conservation and Trade Act of 1990, provides 25 percent of the cost for establishing a perennial cover on land diverted from wheat, feed grain, upland cotton, and rice production.

"By planting a perennial vegetative cover on ACR, producers will help reduce soil erosion on the land, improve water quality, and improve
