Brashears Joins Mississippi Polymer Institute

A veteran chemist for Aerojet-General has been named polymer analytical services coordinator of the Mississippi Polymer Institute at the University of Southern Mississippi.

Dr. Harold C. Brashears -- a Memphis, Tenn., native who holds a doctorate in analytical/physical chemistry from Kansas State University -- assumed the post June 1.

The state Legislature created the institute in 1980 to serve as a direct link between laboratory research and Mississippi's 270-plus plastics-related industries; and provided a \$500,000 allocation in 1993 to make the institute a reality. The MPI received another allocation of \$570,000 earlier this year.

"In this position, Dr. Brashears's main responsibility will be to help Mississippi polymer industries gain access to the polymer analytical services, techniques or equipment they need to solve problems, improve product quality, develop new products or increase productivity," said Dr. Robert Karl Schlatter -- MPI director and a former longtime research and development manager for B.F. Goodrich Co.

"...[His goal] will be to improve upon the effectiveness with which the USM Polymer Science Research Center and the Mississippi Polymer Institute can combine forces to serve the polymer industries in Mississippi," added Schlatter.

Brashears comes to USM after working for Aerojet-General since 1980. The former Corinth resident served as chemistry technical principal in Iuka from 1991-93. Before then, he was based in Sacramento, Calif. He also has served three years in the U.S. Army.

The institute is designed to provide educational, technical and marketing assistance to harness the skills, energy and resources in a common cause of expanding Mississippi's polymer industry, while attracting new industry.

Specialty areas of the polymer industry include plastics, composites, elastomers, coatings and fibers. The use of polymers in industry range from plastic-covered wire, coated hardboard, advanced composites (materials comprising the stealth bomber, artificial organs and medical prostheses), automotive and recreational vehicle parts, and marine paints. Polymers comprise 65 percent of the entire chemical industry in America.

Waverunner Accident On Pickwick Lake

A holiday weekend accident at the mouth of Yellow Creek near the State Line Island left two Tennessee residents injured.

According to Mississippi Department of Wildlife Conservation Officer Royce Howie, a Tennessee woman and her 9-year-old son were riding on a Waverunner water vehicle Sunday, July 3, around 3:00 p.m. when they were apparently hit from behind by another Waverunner driven by an unidentified person who left the scene.

The boy did not appear to be seriously injured after the accident; however the woman was transported to the hospital with neck and back injuries, according to Howie.

"Since the accident actually occurred in Tennessee, the Tennessee Department of Natural Resources is in charge of the incident. However, we were the first ones at the scene, so we assisted the victims and helped with the investigation," Howie said.

According to witnesses at the scene, both Waverunners involved in the accident were traveling at a high rate of speed.

Howie said that the Waverunner type vehicles that have become so popular in recent years are fast becoming the number one problem on the lakes as far as accidents are concerned. Those operating these type vehicles are asked to use extreme caution.

Other than this accident [which happened technically in Tennessee waters] and a man who jumped from the waterfalls and broke a shoulder, this was a relatively quiet holiday, Howie stated.

POULTRY LITTER FOR CATTLE FEED?.....

According to our Extension Beef Specialists there has been a surge in interest in utilizing poultry litter in cattle feed. One reason for this is producers are simply looking for a cheaper, yet efficient, feed source. Another reason is the proposed expansion of the broiler industry in Mississippi. As the industry expands, the problem of disposing of litter in an environmentally responsible manner will increase. HAY AND LIVESTOCK DAY TO BE HELD AT THE AGRI-CENTER IN VERONA

On Saturday, August 6, 1994, a Hay and Livestock Day will be held at the new Lee County Agri-Center located on Hwy. 145 South of Tupelo. The event will start at 9:00 and be completed by 2:30. Featured will be hay equipment manufacturers, feed and veterinary supply representatives, seed sales, and implement dealers. Producers may exhibit hay (square or round bales) to sell. If enough is exhibited that has been quality tested, a contest recognizing the Grand Champion Hay will be held. There will also be 30 minute presentations on hay storage and quality, quality hay in dairy operations, how bad hay costs producers, factors affecting quality, and profitable management practices for producers. PUMPKINS When to plant? Larger

varieties take longer to mature so check the maturity date. On a 120 day variety you will need to plant NOW. Where to plant? Select a site that receives full sun, has rich, well-drained soil with a pH around 6.0, is close to a water source, is free of serious weed problems, and is away from squash that may be a source of insects or diseases. Give each plant plenty of space, and treat regularly with a fungicide and insecticide. At no time should the soil be allowed to become completely dry but be careful not to over-water and drown the plants. Water early in the morning and keep water off the leaves to prevent diseases. It is possible for a growing pumpkin to gain 20 pounds a day and that is mostly water. Fertilization? Using a water soluble fertilizer can prevent over-fertilization foliage and root burns. Compost and composted manure will improve the soil and give stronger vines. Large pumpkins are subject to sunburn and cooking in the hot summer sun when they stick up above the leaves. This causes them to collapse. Consider placing some type of sun screen or shade over the pumpkin but not the vines.

pared people who consumed moderate versus high amounts of sugar and found no connection between added sugar and excess body weight.

Nor does sugar cause diabetes. The only tie between sugar and diabetes is that consuming uncontrolled amounts of sugar when you have the disease can aggravate the condition.

Furthermore, a 1986 FDA study by the Sugars Task Force found no conclusive evidence that sugar intake is linked to childhood hyperactivity. Studies published this past winter in leading medical journals also reported that sugar does not affect children's behavior.

Here's what you should consider about sugar.

*The total amount of sugar in your diet. Excess calories from any food, not just sugar, can lead to weight gain.

*The source of the sugar. Fruits and milk contain sugar, but they also supply essential vitamins and minerals. On the other hand, candy and soda pop are sugar sources that supply calories with few other nutritional benefits.

*The company that sugar keeps. Some foods contribute both sugar and fat. Fat has 9 calories per gram, compared with 4 calories per gram for sugar. The calories from fat, rather than sugar, may have a greater impact on overall health.

*The merits of sugar. It adds a sweet taste that's pleasing to many people. And it acts as a preservative.

Remember, that moderation is the key when it comes to sugar consumption.

MYOPIA AND LITERACY

Myopia, or nearsightedness, is the most commonly treated vision defect. Surprisingly, its incidence in a given population is most directly related to the literacy rate. Among the world's most literate populations, the orientals, myopia rates as high as 70 percent have been documented. In the U.S.A., about 40 percent of us are myopic. Totally illiterate peoples typically have only a 2 percent rate of myopia.

Myopia is produced, most often, by an elongation of the eye. The rear half of the globe of the eye grows more than it should. The most sensitive measure of this growth is a nearsighted shift in vision. Myopia can also be measured directly with ultrasound. This is a common procedure employed prior to cataract surgery.

A small number of people become myopic because of corneal disease. Changes in the lens of the eye can also produce myopia. It is changes in this structure which most frequently produce myopia of the rapid onset type.

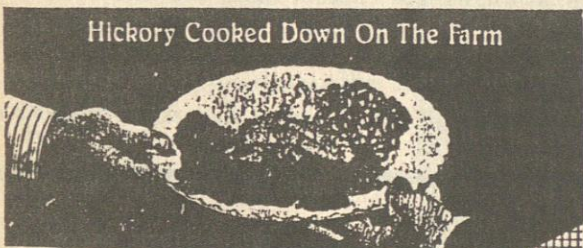

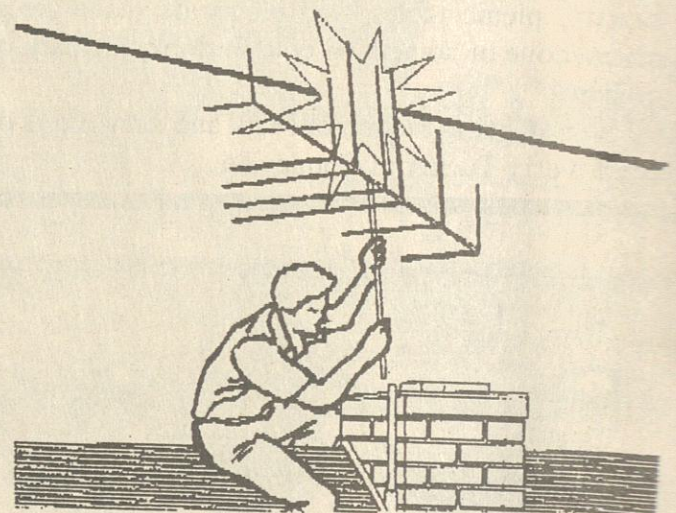
SAFETY FIRST

IN CASE OF AN EMERGENCY....

What you do in an emergency may save your pet's life. Remember, however, that emergency first aid will not take the place of experienced medical attention. Take your pet to your veterinarian as soon as possible after an accident or if your pet becomes suddenly ill.

The most common reason for emergency attention is when an animal is hit by an automobile. If a dog is hit, it is always frightened and generally in pain. Be very careful in the way you handle the animal.

In an accident case, there are three important steps you should follow: (1) Protect yourself from being bitten. Wrap a cloth around the animal's mouth and tie it behind the ears. (2) Be careful and prevent the animal from running off. Most pets will try to hide when badly hurt. (3) Prevent further shock to the animal by careful handling. Keep the pet warm and quiet.

If a leg is broken, do not try to apply a splint. A splint improperly applied may do more harm than good. Instead, carefully slide the animal onto a rug, heavy blanket or board and take it to the veterinarian at once. Try to keep the animal immobilized.

If there is heavy bleeding, apply pressure directly over the wound after covering it with clean gauze or cloth.

To help prevent infection of a cut or wound, keep it clean and healthy by covering with a moist clean cloth. Keep the cloth moist. Never put strong antiseptics or ointments on wounds. If you do, it may be difficult for the veterinarian to close the wound by suturing.

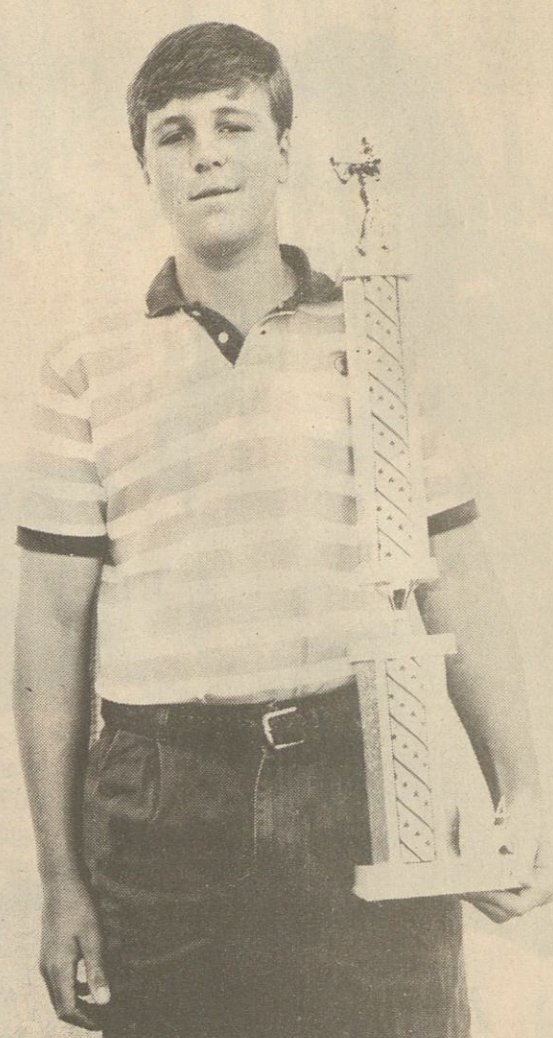
If poisoning is suspected, the animal must be taken to the veterinarian at once. Every minute counts. If possible take along the container so the exact poison can be determined. This makes administering the proper antidote easier and quicker.

When a dog or cat continually claws at its mouth, use extreme care. It may indicate rabies or a foreign object, such as a piece of bone or stick, caught in the teeth. Gently remove the object if you can see it.

If the object has been swallowed and is lodged in the throat, it may be necessary for your veterinarian to administer anesthesia or sedation so that it can be safely extracted from the esophagus.

Red, inflamed or blistered skin may be caused by a burn. To relieve the pain, apply cool, wet packs to the damaged area. Do not use grease or ointment. Extensive burns require professional treatment as soon as possible.

Use common sense to keep your pet out of emergency situations. But when they do occur, be ready to help with first aid treatment.

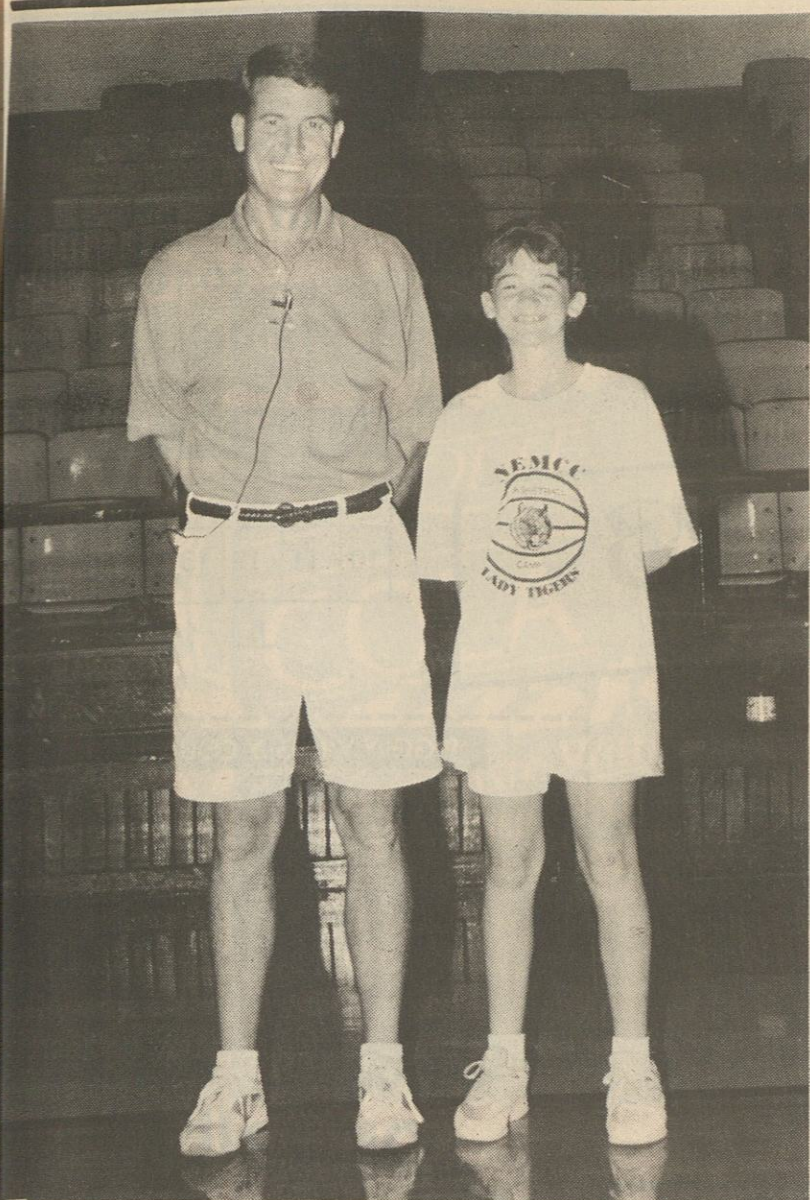

Recovery From Spider, Snake Bites Relies On Quick Detection

Because two types of poisonous spiders and six types of venomous snakes are found in Mississippi, residents run the risk of being bitten by one of these species.

Residents should know both how to recognize these spiders and snakes and, if an unfortunate encounter occurs, what action to take.

SPIDERS

According to Dr. Gary Miller, associate professor of biology at The University of Mississippi, state residents should be concerned about bites from brown recluse and black widow spiders (excepting allergic reactions to bites from other spiders).

■The black widow is shiny with a perfectly round body about the size of an English pea. It also has a bright red hourglass-shaped mark on its abdomen. "Basically, the best policy is just to avoid any shiny, jet-black spider you see," Miller said.

The black widow is often found in hardwood forests, around the foundations of window-wells or under rarely-used items like old canoes, etc.

■The brown recluse has delicate, hair-like legs and is usually no bigger than one-half

inch in length. It has a darker brown, fiddle-shaped mark on its back. However, the mark is difficult to see without getting close enough to be bitten by this aggressive spider, according to Miller.

"Brown recluses are very common in older houses, but are often found even in newer houses in this area," said the Ole Miss professor.

The brown recluse prefers dark corners and can be found in rarely used storage areas such as closets, attics and behind wallboards, hence the name "recluse". Most people are bitten when trying on old clothes or shoes, or when they stick their hand back into a dark corner to retrieve something.

According to Dr. Eric Dahl, director of the Ole Miss Student Health Service, the bites of the black widow and the brown recluse can be dangerous if not treated properly.

The black widow's bite is most dangerous to the very young and the very old. It produces severe abdominal pain, rigidity of muscles that is most intense in the stomach area, a slight swelling at the point of the bite, and usually faint, red bite marks.

Symptoms of a brown recluse bite include a burning, stinging sensation at the point of the bite. Within two hours, a red, flat pimple rises and is usually surrounded with a violet or purple ring about the size of a quarter and is accompanied by increasing pain. The venom from the spider can destroy the tissue surround the bite, so prompt

medical attention is very important.

If you suspect someone has been bitten by one of these spiders, try to collect the spider in a plastic bag, and seek medical attention immediately.

SNAKES

If you are bitten by a snake, stay calm but quick reaction is vital. Your chances of recovery are good if you first try to look at the situation. Try to determine if the snake bite is from a poisonous snake, a serious envenomation is what type of snake bit you.

"Look to see if there were actually any puncture marks or was just a scratch. Check to see if the bite marks and the area around them are turning red. Try to identify the most striking markings of the snake. The doctor knows about snake bites, the more effective treatment will be," he said. Symptoms of a poisonous snake bite include intense burning, swelling around the bite area. Dahl stresses the importance of staying calm and seeking help as soon as possible. Quickly seek medical attention, but stay calm and avoid increasing the swelling. An elevated heart rate only spread the venom faster. Remember the death rate from snakebites is very low (less than one percent), and chances for complete recovery are very good.

Dahl advises against squeezing or cutting the patient to suck out the venom.

Consider Health And Food Safety At Grilling Time

Summertime inspires many
Mississippians to fire up their
grills. This alternative cooking
method is not only tasty, but
healthy when basic food safety
considerations are made.

"Compared to frying or
baking without putting the meat
on a rack, grilling is a much
healthier way to prepare foods as

the fat drips away from the meat
while cooking," said Dr. Barbara
McLaurin, extension human
nutrition specialist at Mississippi
State University. "The health
benefit increases when meats that
already are low fat are grilled,
such as chicken, fish and lean
cuts of beef and pork."

McLaurin said health factors
apply to more than just low fat.
Healthy means free of food
poisoning bacteria. Incidents of
food-borne illness increase
during the hot summer months.
Careful food handling practices,
especially when choosing outdoor
cooking methods, is the best way
to avoid an unwanted "bug".

"Cross contamination is one
of the most common mistakes
people make when cooking,"
McLaurin said. "Cooked meat
should never touch an uncleaned
plate, cutting board or tray that
raw meat has touched."

Cross contamination also can
occur when using marinades.

"If you want to make a dip for
cooked food from your
marinade, reserve a separate por-
tion for dipping," McLaurin
said. "Don't re-use any of the
marinade used on the raw meat.
It could contain bacteria."

McLaurin said to be careful
with forks and brushes used on
raw meat. Wash utensils before
using them again with cooked
food.

Cook-outs at a park or any
place away from refrigeration
require advance food safety
planning.

"It is critically important to
keep perishable foods cold
especially in hot weather. Bacteria
can grow on raw or cooked
foods rapidly at warm tempera-
ture to levels that can cause
food poisoning," McLaurin said.
"Use an insulated cooler when
transporting perishables. Start
with cold food when possible and
pack a cold source -- like ice and
frozen blue ice jells."

Put the cooler in the shade and
keep the lid closed. Hamburger
patties and hotdogs can be frozen
ahead of time and will thaw suf-
ficiently by cooking time.
Grilling partially frozen meat is
acceptable.

Two health factors to consider
when grilling are the importance
of cooking completely and of not
charring the meat.

"When cooking ground beef
and poultry, the juices should run
clear and the meat should not be
pink. Fish is done when you can
flake the meat with a fork,"
McLaurin said.

"Charred meat and smoke
from fat dripping on coals has
been linked to cancer in some
studies," she said. "To be on the
safe side, remove any visible fat
which will reduce flame-ups and
raise the level of the grill so the
food is further from the heat.
Remove any charred portion if it
occurs."

The nutritionist said moderate
amounts should reduce any risks.
For people who eat grilled food
more than several times a week,
precook the meat or poultry im-
mediately before grilling so it is
not on the grill so long.



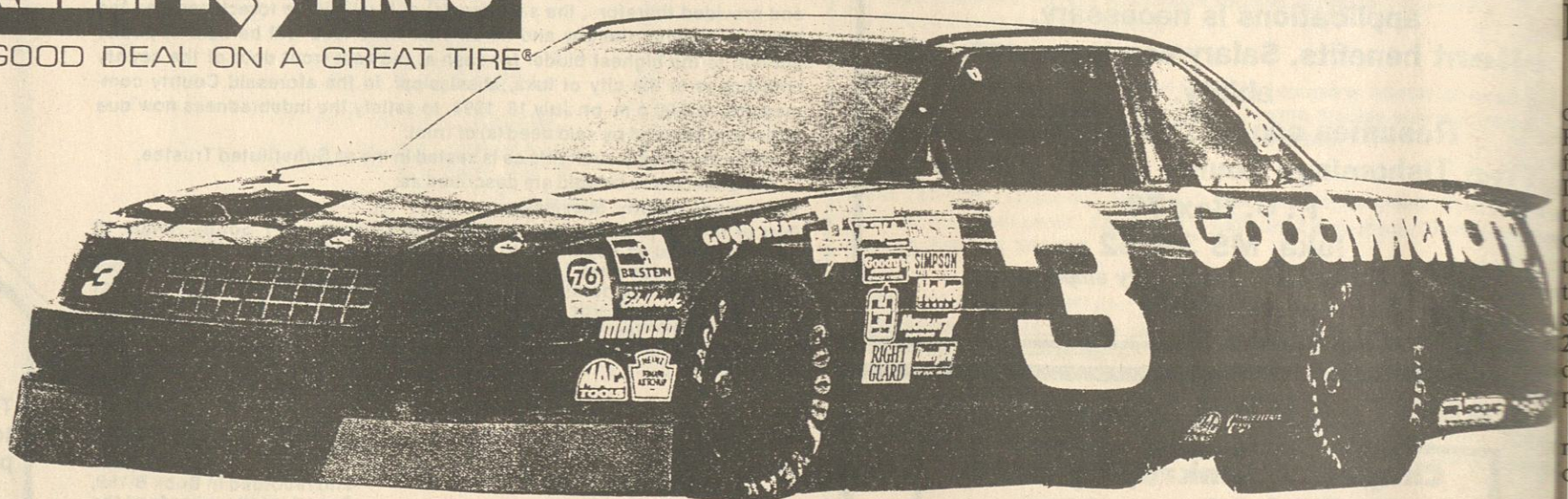
