## TCHS Seniors Provide Leadership For School

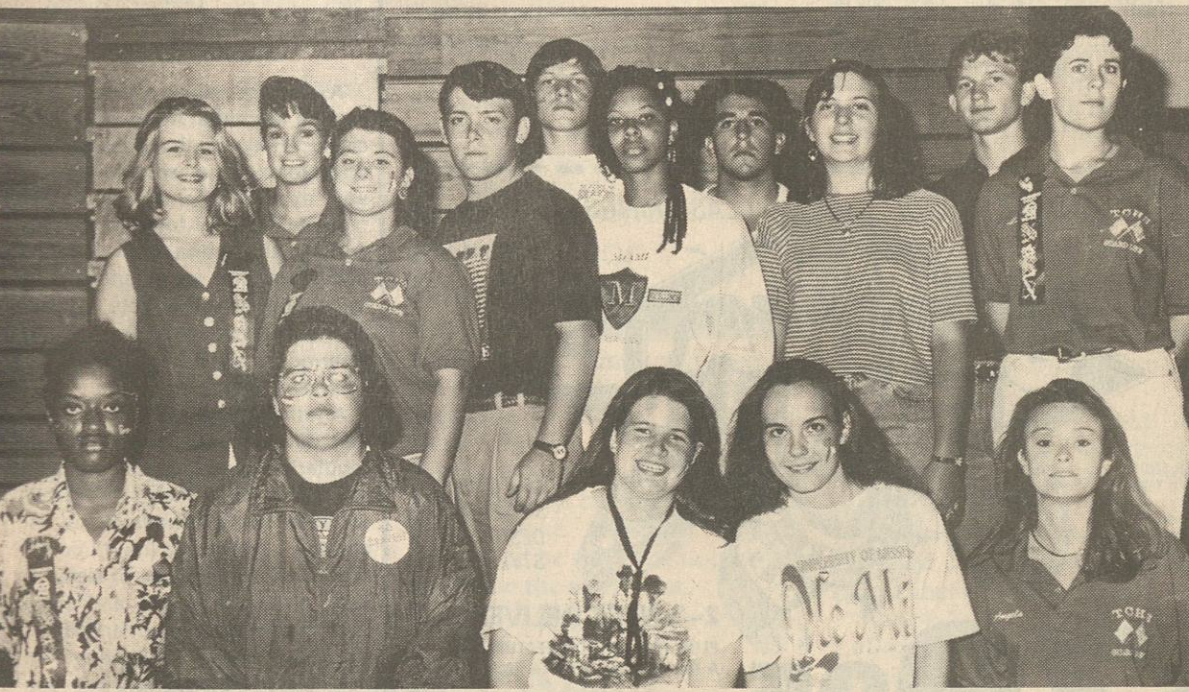
Behind the front lines of any successful group, good leaders are to be found, and at TCHS this year, this can be proven.

## Home Economics Tips

**PREVENTING MILDEW ON CLOTHING**

Warm, humid summer days can bring on two unwanted guests if precautions are not made. These unwanted guests are mold and mildew. They both are fungi and will flourish in dark, damp, poorly ventilated and/or improperly cleaned environments. They can cause particular problems during warm days in this area of the country because of increased humidity.

Summer months are also a problem because of increased perspiration and other means of frequent dampness on clothes. The best way to prevent mildew is to keep garments and surfaces they may come in contact with dry. If clothes are damp or wet when changing them, hang or spread them to dry before placing them in the clothes hamper.

Organic residue from soap, soil, smoke and cooking oils often provide food for mildew. Mildew thrives when the air temperature is between 77 and 86 degrees, especially if there is something to feed on.

Mildew needs a relatively high humidity level to grow, which can be accomplished around damp surfaces or other items. Areas that can trap warm air and humidity (such as behind draperies, closed shower stalls, and inside hampers and closets) can become breeding places for mold and mildew.

When mildew appears, remove it immediately. For clothing, brush items and hang them in the sun for several hours. Always brush them outdoors to avoid spreading the mildew fungi indoors.

If garments need additional treatment, soak or launder the stained items, using chlorine bleach if safe for fabric. Otherwise, soak in an oxygen bleach and the hottest water safe for fabric, then launder.

Pay careful attention to walls, closets, clothes hamper, air condition vents, other textiles, shower stalls, tubs, toilet bowls

## Teachers Attend Supercomputing Seminar

Teachers from TCHS, Belmont High School, Pulaski, TN, Adamsville, TN, Conway, Ark. and Duvall's Bluff, Ark. attended the second of two, two week classes in "Explorations in Supercomputing" at the Alabama Supercomputer in Huntsville, Ala.

Teachers were instructed on the use of pine mail systems, unix systems and Fortran programming.

Emphasis was placed in the area of computational science where students will be able to write programs and send them to the supercomputer for solutions.

Computational science involves "number crunching" problems that cannot be solved by conventional calculators.

Upon completion of the course, attending school districts were presented with seven computers which were installed and networked at their schools. Also, the computers were linked to the Alabama Supercomputer network and all schools attending have the capability to communicate with each other via the computer.

Students may also enter Supercomputer competitions. This class was made available through NASA, University of Alabama, Huntsville and Nichols Research Corporation.

Also available will be the many interest services such as Cello, Gopher and Mosaic that allows students to find information about a wealth of topics world wide.

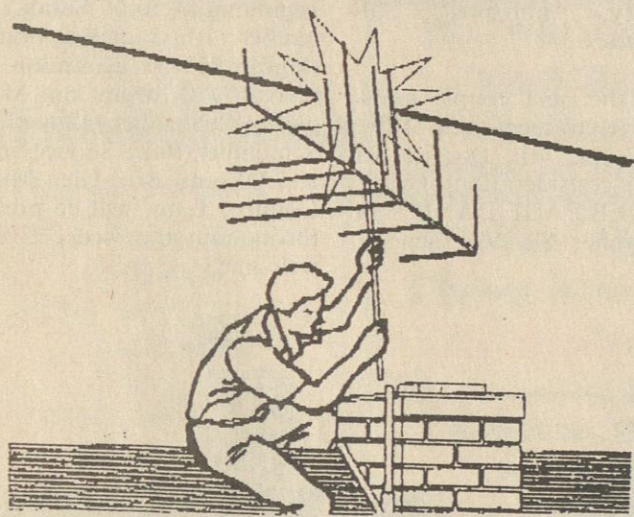
## SAFETY FIRST

## Mexican Fare for Winter Menus

**TACO SALAD**  
Yield: 8 servings

### Dressing:

- 1 cup dairy sour cream
- 1/4 cup chunky taco salsa, mild or hot
- 1 tablespoon sliced green onion

### Salad:

- 1 pound lean ground beef
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1 can (15 1/2 ounces) red kidney beans, drained
- 1 package (1 1/4 ounces) taco seasoning mix
- 1 cup water
- 2 quarts chilled, torn romaine lettuce OR salad greens
- 1 large avocado, peeled and sliced
- 3 to 4 tomatoes, quartered
- 1/2 cup sliced pitted ripe olives
- 2 cups (8 ounces) shredded Cheddar cheese
- 2 cups slightly broken tortilla chips

For Dressing: Combine dressing ingredients; cover and chill to blend flavors.

For Salad: Brown beef with onion, drain off drippings. Add kidney beans, taco seasoning mix and water. Cover and simmer 10 minutes. Drain and chill thoroughly.

To Assemble Salad: Toss chilled meat mixture with lettuce, avocado, tomatoes, olives and cheese. Just before serving, sprinkle tortilla chips over all. Pass dressing.

**GOLDEN CORN SOUP**  
Yield: 5 1/2 cups

- 1/4 cup (1/2 stick) butter
- 1/4 cup chopped onion
- 1 package (10 ounces) frozen corn
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon thyme
- 1/8 teaspoon dill weed
- Dash pepper
- 3 cups milk
- 1 can (10 3/4 ounces) condensed cream of potato soup
- 1 cup (4 ounces) shredded Cheddar cheese

Melt butter in heavy saucepan. Add onion and corn; saute until tender about 5 minutes. Combine flour, salt, thyme, dill weed, pepper and 1/2 cup milk; stir until smooth. Pour into corn mixture. Cook and stir 1 minute. Add remaining milk and condensed soup. Cook, stirring constantly, until thickened and desired serving temperature. Stir in cheese until melted. Do not boil.

and tanks. Whenever possible, expose these areas to natural or artificial light. Also, avoid using the washer as a place to store dirty laundry, especially if damp.

Reduce moisture in the house whenever possible. Cover pots when cooking, use the air conditioner or another type of dehumidifier, and take shorter/cooler showers.

Desiccants (drying agents), such as silica gel or alumina, in open containers, can help in small closed areas. Commercial fungicidal products also can provide protection. By reducing soil and moisture, using water-repellent and soil-resistant spray treatments, you can inhibit growth of mold and mildew on your clothes and other surfaces.

## County Agents Notes

### BOLL WEEVIL ERADICATION

On August 15, 1994 we embarked on, "what should be," the beginning of the end for the boll weevil in Tishomingo County. You may have already seen activity around the local airports at Iuka and at Belmont. Planes will be spraying cotton fields on a 7-10 day schedule until killing frost or stalk destruction. The material being used in "malathion". It is more expensive than some of the other boll weevil compounds but it works as well and it is less toxic in the environment.

A joint effort between the

Federal government and cotton producers will control the cotton pest until it can no longer be found. Cotton producers will be paying over a hundred dollars an acre over the next five years in order to fund the program. If the boll weevil is eliminated as a pest in cotton, there WILL be cotton produced that has virtually no insecticides applied to it. --more cotton, less cost, better for the environment, better for the farmer, better for everyone.

Periodic health examinations will help determine the general well-being of your family pet and identify potential problems.

Early detection can insure prompt action which may prevent suffering -- or even early death.

When your pet gets its physical, the veterinarian will note the animal's temperature, pulse and respiration rate and then examine the animal from nose to tail. The veterinarian will listen to your pet's heart and to the sound of its breathing and check its weight -- much like your family physician does when you visit him.

Beginning with the nose, your veterinarian will check for discharges or irregularities and examine the nasal passages for general condition.

A pet's deep, curved ear canals provide protection for the inner ear, but also provide a snug home for parasites and infections. An animal's ear should be checked periodically.

Many conditions, such as anemia, infections and jaundice are often discovered through eye examinations. Injuries to or ulcers of the eye can also be detected during a regular health checkup.

And with pets, health is sometimes only skin deep. Your pet's skin and hair coat should be examined for their general condition as well as for fleas, ticks, other parasites, tumors, wounds and infections.

Seeing that your pet has an annual physical examination can insure that the animal enjoys a healthy life. And preventing health problems before they start is frequently easier than curing the problem.

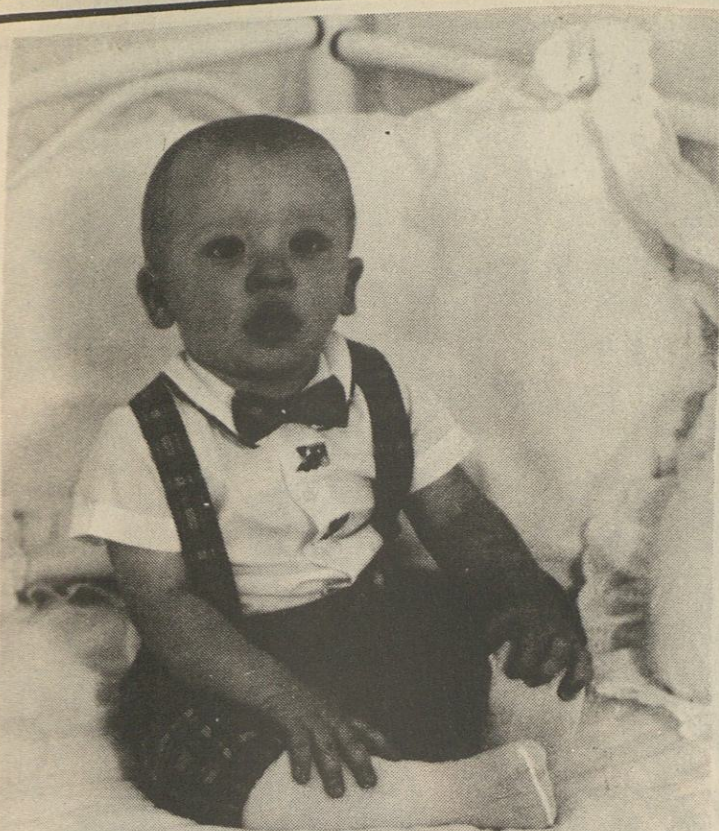

As we age, our eyes change in several ways that make vision less clear. Many of the changes are unavoidable, but, since excessive sun exposure is known to accelerate cataract formation and to damage the retina (both of which occur in aging), we should at least try to slow these effects of aging as much as possible by regularly wearing proper sunglasses whenever we are in the sun.

Another thing that we can do to help ourselves is to have eye tests regularly for glaucoma. It's symptoms are more likely to worsen if we take certain medications, including antihistamines, cough medicine, some types of sleeping pills, antidepressants, and drugs for dizziness or Parkinson's disease. These medications do not cause glaucoma but can aggravate it if it already exists.

Furthermore, since these medications are often essential, never discontinue them on this account without a doctor's orders. If you are taking these medicines, regular glaucoma testing is especially important.

### Timely Preparation Key To Tasty Doves

With dove season beginning in most of Mississippi, many cooks across the state are wondering how to begin to prepare the birds brought back from hunting trips.

Hunters can help their cooks to prepare tasty doves by handling the birds properly in the field.

Dean Stewart, extension wildlife specialist at Mississippi State University, said doves should be kept as cool as possible after they are harvested in the field.

"Most dove hunters begin hunting in early September when we still have a lot of hot weather," Stewart said. "Hunters should keep the birds cool in the field by laying them singly in the shade, dressing them or placing them on ice in a cooler."

Doves usually will not spoil in the field, but they should be dressed within a few hours of harvesting. The birds should be cleaned and washed. If they are not going to be eaten immediately, the birds should be frozen.

"It's really easy to dress doves," Stewart said. "First, remove the entrails by either splitting at the back or just under the breast. Next, pluck the feathers or remove the skin with the feathers. Hot water can help to remove feathers."

Doves are a good nutritional meal choice because they do not have as much fat or cholesterol as many other meats.

"Most wild game is lower in fat content and cholesterol than the processed meats, which makes it a lot healthier for you," Stewart said.

Doves are cooked in many

ways. The most popular methods are frying, roasting, baking, barbecuing and braising.

"When frying doves, I always marinate them in whole milk and roll them in seasoned flour," said Billy Joe Cross, a wild game cook from Brandon. "Then I make sure the oil is good and hot with the temperature no higher than 325 degrees before I begin to fry them."

Another popular method for preparing doves is to marinate the breasts after removing them from the birds, wrap them in a bacon strip and grill them. Stewart recommended using butter and seasonings, such as lemon pepper, on the meat.

"Since doves don't have a lot of fat, the bacon and butter help to keep them moist," Stewart said. "Basting the meat helps to keep the meat from becoming too dry."

Cross suggested putting deseeded and deveined jalapeno peppers in the middle of the breasts before grilling them for added flavor.

Many people complain about wild game having a gamey taste, but proper preparation usually eliminates the taste.

"If you cook the doves with different seasonings and spices, you usually won't have any wild taste at all," Stewart said.

### Record Yields Push Soybean Prices Low

Better-than-average yields are expected for Mississippi's soybean crop, even though it has battled its share of problems with the weather, insects and diseases.

State soybean production is forecast at more than 51 million bushels, up 20 percent from last year. National soybean production is forecast at a record high of 2.3 billion bushels.

Dr. Bob Williams, extension state agriculture program leader at Mississippi State University, said the national production forecast is keeping prices low.

"Prices dropped about \$1.50 per bushel from mid-June to early August as a bumper crop became apparent," Williams said. "The only thing keeping prices at the current level of about \$5.75 is a strong worldwide demand for U.S. soybeans."

Prices are expected to further drop around harvest time in mid-October but may rebound slightly in early November.

As prices remain low, state farmers are waiting for rain and insect numbers to fall.

"The bulk of the crop still needs moisture right now for good pod fill," said Dr. Alan Blaine, extension agronomist at MSU. "Maturity for the crop was expected to be delayed due to all the rainfall we have experienced, but the cool nights are helping to hasten maturity and pod fill."

During mid-to late August, the crop was hurting the rain, but recent scattered showers across the state have provided some moisture to the crop. The crop had an excess of rain in June and July, resulting in loss of root systems.

"Farmers statewide experienced problems with aerial web blight earlier in the season, but the warmer, drier weather has helped the disease to taper off," Blaine said. "This disease caused 20 to 30 percent fruit loss in some cases."

Aerial web blight may contribute to harvest problems in severely infected fields. Infected plants that shed fruit often try to re-bloom or re-set the portion of the shed crop, resulting in green plants that can slow harvest.

Randy Smith, county agent in Leflore and Carroll counties, is optimistic for the crop as harvest approaches.

"Growers had problems with aerial web blight disease in July, but those have tapered off with the drier weather," Smith said. "Loopers have been very bad this year -- most fields have been sprayed for them, and some fields have been sprayed twice."

In Yazoo County, loopers are

one of the crop's biggest obstacles.

"The crop is maturing very rapidly, but loopers can defoliate a field in just a few days" said Tim Pepper, Yazoo County agent. "We're hoping for forecasted cooler temperatures which promote a disease that kills a lot of the loopers."

In the northern part of the state, growers also are hoping for cooler, wetter weather.

"We've got a good crop, but the dry weather is causing some concerns," said Dr. Dennis Reginelli, Noxubee County agent. "Disease and insect pressure are fairly light, but rain is needed to finish out the crop."

Blaine encouraged farmers to continue watching for possible stem canker problems.

"Although the bulk of this crop was planted early, we expect stem canker to be a concern," Blaine said. "However, we know how to manage this problem, and, in the future, growers must attempt to utilize resistant varieties on early plantings."

Growers in the state planted about 25 percent of the crop in early maturing varieties. Harvest is underway, and yields have been much higher than average.

### National Guard Members Receive Tuition Assistance

Gov. Kirk Fordice recently signed a bill that increased the amount of tuition assistance available to Mississippi National Guard members under the State Education Assistance Program (SEAP).

Maj. Gen. James H. Garner, the Adjutant General, said the bill doubles the programs' previous benefits. Under the new law, active members of the Mississippi National Guard enrolled full time in junior college level institutions within

Eligibility for SEAP requires that Guard members be a Mississippi resident and a registered voter; they must also incur an initial six year military obligation; and maintain a 2.0 (or better) grade point average in undergraduate (only) studies at an accredited, Mississippi institution of higher learning.

## Sun Is Powering Roberts To World Record

Bud Roberts of Athens, Tenn., gives new meaning to the term "fun in the sun" as he travels in his solar-powered boat from Knoxville, Tenn. to Apalachicola, Fla., hoping to set a new world record for solar boat travel.

Bud made a stop on his history-making voyage recently at Eastport Marina in Iuka. The stop at Eastport, according to Roberts, was a planned one. "It said in the Tennessee Tombigbee Waterway guide that Eastport Marina was noted for being friendly," Roberts said. "I was looking forward to it for 400 miles and it certainly lived up to its reputation. It is the friendliest place, so far, that I've stopped."

Robert's craft, a 26 ft. long, 4 ft. wide, plywood boat which he named "The Riddler?", collects the power of the sun with a series

of Photocomm solar panels on its roof. Solar energy is stored in a number of Exide brand batteries in the boat's bottom. The solar power runs the boat's 3 1/2 HP Ray Electric Outboard motor. "My boat is sanctioned by the Electric Boat Association in Naples, Fla.," Roberts said. "It has a top speed of 10 MPH, but it cruises at about 3 to 4 MPH. I've been averaging about 20 miles a day." With such a slow cruising speed, Roberts said that he does a lot of reading. He confirmed that the solar powered vessel does have its advantages, however. "The two advantages of having a boat powered by an electric motor are, one, that you don't have to buy gas and two, it is very quiet," Roberts explained.

Roberts is a beef producer by trade. He said that he has also worked in diesel truck repair and

as a commercial pilot. He explained that he and a friend built the boat originally as a hobby.

Roberts explained that his is one of only about 100 solar powered crafts in the world. He said that there is, in the works, the production of solar powered boats to be used for such tasks as canal travel in Europe. The slow speeds would work fine for the low speeds required in many of the canals and he hopes that his trip will give evidence of their efficiency and practicality for this purpose.

Starting in Knoxville, Tenn. at the mouth of the Tennessee River about three weeks ago, Roberts hopes to conclude his journey in about another month, more or less. "My son, Dale travelled with me for the first two weeks of the trip before school started," Roberts said. "My wife, Penny, will be joining me a little later."

The current world record for solar boat travel in the world is 1,117 miles. Roberts stated that when he and "The Riddler?" reach Apalachicola, he will have travelled around 1,200 miles --thereby setting a new world record.

## New Checkoff-Funded Study....

Checkoff dollars invested by Tishomingo County cattle producers were used to help fund a new study from Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, which shows people concerned about their diets don't have to eat chicken instead of beef. The study confirms that beef and chicken are equally low in fat have virtually the same effect on reducing cholesterol levels in the body. According to the research, selection, preparation and portion sizes are what makes the difference.

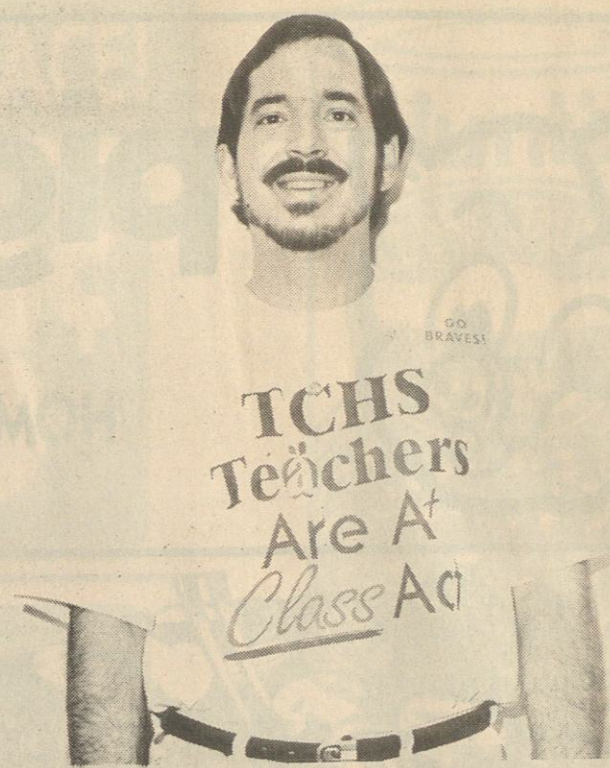
The 13-week study, published in a recent issue of the Journal Archives of Internal Medicine, put two groups of men with high blood cholesterol on a heart-healthy diet with 30 percent of daily calories from fat. The only difference was that one group of study participants ate chicken as their source of meat, while the other group ate beef. The meat portions were the same and the amount of fat, saturated fat, and cholesterol in the two test diets were very similar.

The men on the beef test diet ate meals including Lemon Beef (trimmed, broiled top loin with lemon), Teriyaki Beef (marinated, trimmed top loin), and Shredded Beef (top round). Participants on the chicken-only test diet received Lemon Pepper Chicken, Italian-style Chicken and Natural Chicken (seasoned, broiled, partially-skinned chicken breasts).

Both the chicken and beef entrees for the test meals contained only 7 or 8 grams of fat per 3.5 ounce serving and were low in saturated fat. The study participants made other lower-fat changes in their overall diet, like substituting part-skim mozzarella cheese for cheddar.

Both test diets produced significant decreases in average total blood cholesterol and low-density lipoprotein (LDL) cholesterol levels. Both beef and chicken lowered "bad" (LDL) cholesterol levels 9 to 11 percent.

"This research shows that it's the amount of fat and saturated fat—not the type of meat eaten—that correlates with blood cholesterol levels," said Lynne

Scott, M.A., R.D., director of the Diet Modification Clinic at Baylor College of Medicine and one of the study's lead researchers.

Added Mei Mei Newsome, Director, Promotions & Information for the Mississippi Cattle Industry Board, "The study found that when beef and chicken have comparable amounts of fat, they are virtually interchangeable in regard to their effect on cholesterol levels. The important thing is how the products are prepared."

According to Newsome, families can apply the study's findings at home. "You can serve a three-ounce portion of beef top sirloin, trimmed and broiled, which has 6 grams of fat and 75 milligrams of cholesterol. Compare that to a three-ounce serving of roasted skinless chicken drumstick meat, which has 4 grams of fat and 80 milligrams of cholesterol."

Scott said that people concerned about cholesterol don't need to eliminate beef from the diet. "Long-term changes in eating habits are what's needed to lower blood cholesterol levels," she explained. "It's a matter of combining a wide variety of foods in a diet that's effective over time."

## Powe Named To Serve Board

Dr. David Powe, NASA education program manager for Tri-State Education Initiative (TSEI) in Iuka, Miss., has been named to the newly formed regional coordinating board of the SERVE Eisenhower Consortium for Math and Science Education.

SERVE, the Southeastern Regional Vision for Education, is a partner of the Tri-State Education Initiative. A federally funded, non-profit organization, SERVE provides leadership, support and research assistance to state and local efforts in improving educational outcomes, especially for at-risk and rural students.

In 1992 Congress established a national network of 10 Eisenhower Consortia for the improvement of science, mathematics and technology education. SERVE is the sponsor of this consortium, which has been operating in a six-state region, including Alabama, Tennessee, Florida, Mississippi and North and South Carolina, since March 1993.

The new SERVE board is comprised of education, business, government and civic leaders who will provide input to the Consortium concerning national, state, and local issues. The group will also identify problems and opportunities within the region, and suggest direction and focus for consortium activities.

Since 1992 Powe has served as on-site NASA program manager of TSEI, an area within a 50-mile radius of Iuka. Powe works closely with the TSEI Consortium and its 30 school district members in Mississippi, Alabama and Tennessee. He has secured both public and private entities for TSEI support. In 1993 Powe assumed responsibilities as manager of NASA Education Programs, Stennis Space Center (SSC), with offices at SSC and NASA headquarters in Washington, D.C.

He received his doctorate in education administration from the University of Southern Mississippi in 1984, his master's degree in social science in 1975 and his bachelor's degree in social work and psychology from Mississippi State University in 1969.

Former President of Mississippi Delta Community College, Powe serves on the Jobs for Mississippi Graduates (JMG) board of directors and is a member of the regional committee for planning and innovation for the Mississippi State Board for Junior and Community Colleges.

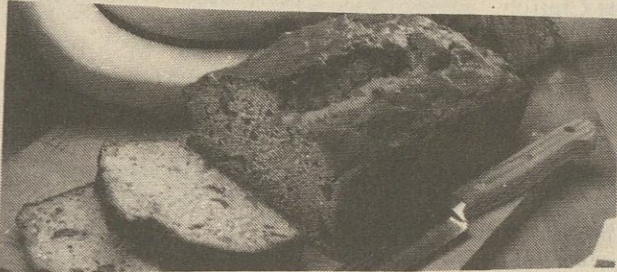
## Furniture Assembly Training

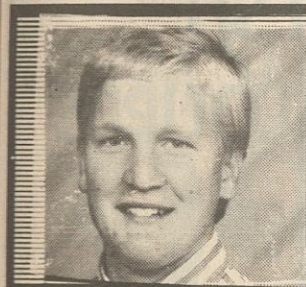

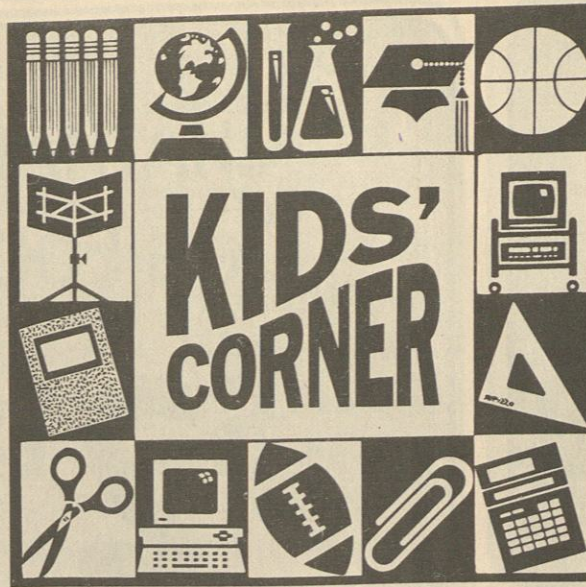

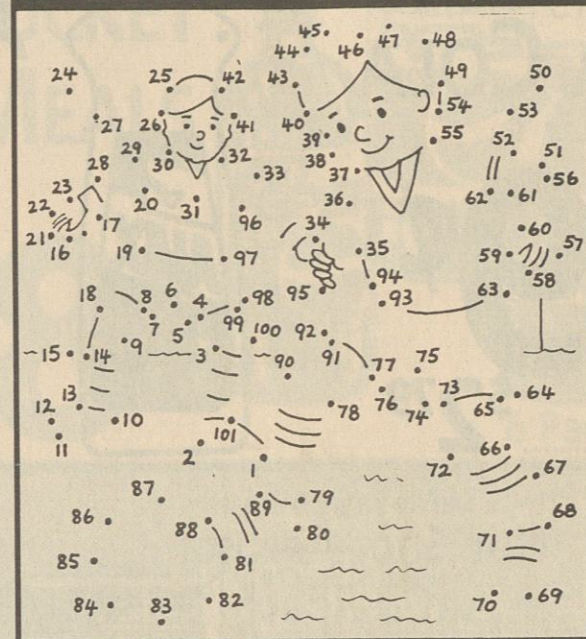
## TCHS Receives Sportmanship Award

Homer L. Wilkes is State Conservationist For Mississippi



## Mosquitos Can Cause Encephalitis

By protecting themselves now, Mississippians could prevent their families from becoming victims of a mosquito-borne disease called St. Louis encephalitis.

Public health officials in Louisiana confirmed five cases of St. Louis encephalitis (SLE) during the past two weeks. One victim lives in Bogalusa, and four live in the New Orleans area.

"Mississippi has not had confirmed cases of SLE since the mid 1970s," said State Epidemiologist Mary Currier, MD, MPH. "In the past, the illness has occurred in epidemics, with hundreds of Mississippi cases in 10-to-20-year cycles."

In 1975 and 1976, the entire country experienced a major SLE epidemic, with nearly 3,000 cases reported. That year Mississippi confirmed 299 cases, with 36 deaths.

Mosquitoes carry the virus that causes SLE. Disease symptoms can include headache, fever, chills, nausea, and vomiting. About five to 15 percent of those who develop symptoms die, with the elderly at a greater risk of severe disease.

MSDH urges people to protect

themselves through eliminating mosquito-breeding and preventing mosquito bites.

"For every one person with symptoms from this virus, hundreds of people can be infected but have no symptoms," Currier said.

The illness does not spread from person to person.

The SLE virus exists mainly as a bird infection transmitted to people by the Southern household mosquito *Culex pipiens quinquefasciatus*. These mosquitoes breed in stagnant water found in ditches, bird baths, and other containers.

MSDH confirmed another strain of encephalitis - eastern equine encephalitis (EEE) - among four horses that died in Mississippi during August 1994. Another horse had died from EEE in July. The horses were kept in Forrest, Hancock, Lincoln, Pearl River, and Smith Counties.

Mississippi has confirmed no EEE among humans this year, but one Louisiana case was diagnosed in Baton Rouge.

Like SLE, EEE is carried to people by mosquitoes, usually a saltwater marsh mosquito or a freshwater swamp species.

Horses can contract the disease, but the illness is not con-

tagious from person to person or from horse to person. EEE usually occurs in mid to late summer months within southeastern Mississippi.

"EEE is generally a more serious disease than SLE," Currier said. "The initial symptoms of the disease are the same as SLE. Mental confusion and sleepiness occur within a few days, sometimes accompanied by a stiff neck."

Severe cases can cause coma and even death.

Controlling the two diseases depends on both community mosquito control programs and personal protective measures. To protect against encephalitis, Mississippians should:

- Empty outside water containers to eliminate mosquito breeding areas.
- Put screens on windows and doors. Patch any holes.
- Avoid mosquitoes when they feel - usually around sunset and sunrise.

- If out after dark, use mosquito repellents - preferably those containing 20 to 60 percent DEET - on all exposed skin. Do not use products containing 100 percent DEET on infants or small children.

## Forestry Equipment Show Set For Early September

Local foresters can learn the latest in forest engineering technology and equipment during the Mid-South Forestry Equipment Show September 16 and 17.

The event will be held at Mississippi State University's John W. Starr Memorial Forest, located 15 miles south of Starkville on Highway 25. Registration and demonstrations begin at 9 a.m. The show concludes at 3:30 p.m. each day.

Equipment manufacturers and dealers will demonstrate their equipment, products and supplies in different timber types and stand conditions.

Equipment demonstrations will include skidders, loaders, graders, backhoes, bulldozers, fire plows, planters, chainsaws and hydraulics. Product and supply exhibits will include radios, tires, service, safety, maintenance and insurance.

Visitors also may compete for cash awards in contests using skidders. Contestants will be taken at registration each day.

The event is sponsored by MSU's School of Forest Resources, Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service and the Mississippi Forestry Association.

## Mississippi's Employment On The Rise

In April 1994, 12,300 more Mississippians were working than in April 1993, recent figures show. According to the Mississippi Employment Security Commission's (MESC) "Civilian Labor Force and Employment" statistics, the number of residence-based persons employed in April 1993 stood at 1,123,500 and in April 1994 the number increased to 1,135,800.

"The news of Mississippi's employment growth this month is like a breath of fresh spring air," said Governor Kirk Fordice. "Employment growth is a clear signal that our economic development strategy, which focuses on job creation, is

benefitting Mississippi citizens."

The state's April 1994 employment figures are a 1.09 percentage point increase from the prior year while total employment increased in April over March by 7,600 persons. The significant monthly employment increase in attributed to spring planting and growth in industry.

"Mississippi's employment growth is one of the primary indicators of our success in working with new and existing industry," said Jimmy Heidel, MDEC executive director. "Mississippi continues to experience employment growth in several sectors, reflecting the diversity of our economic base."

Services, manufacturing, and construction continue to show the strongest employment growth among Mississippi's major business sectors compared to April 1993 levels. In the services sector the most significant employment increase occurred in retail trade growing by 7,200 persons, from 165,400 to 172,600. Under the manufacturing sector, the strongest growth occurred in durable goods which increased by 4,900 persons, from 143,300 to 148,200. In construction, employment grew from 38,300 to 41,300, an increase of 3,000 persons.

The individual sector figures are establishment-based which is employment computed by place of work within a specified geographic area.

MESC is an independent state agency required by law to administer unemployment compensation contributions and payment of benefits. About 95 percent of all industries in Mississippi are covered by unemployment compensation insurance and must report to this agency. As a result of this reporting, MESC is able to make accurate projections about Mississippi's labor market.

This program is a five month, military style, life skills education and GED program. After Hard Care the cadets will begin their academics of the program. Cadet Brown will be awarded \$2,200 toward further job training or higher education upon completion and graduation.
