Accident Fatal To One

A Wednesday morning, November 16, accident at the intersection of Highway 25 and

County Road 123 North of the Tishomingo County Vo-Tech Center claimed the life of a Tishomingo man.

According to Mississippi Highway Safety Patrol Trooper Mike Dooley, Louis P. Sappington, 75, of Tishomingo pulled out in his 1994 Dodge pickup from County Road 123 into the path of an 1987 Volvo 18-wheeler which was headed south, driven by William Long of Booneville.

Sappington's vehicle was struck on the passenger side. He was pronounced dead following the accident. Long sustained only minor injuries in the wreck, Dooley said.

Louis Sappington was a native of Mississippi. He was a retired employee of U.S. Steel with 20 years of service, an Army Veteran of World War II and a member of Tishomingo Baptist Church.

Services were at 1 p.m. Thursday at Emmanuel Baptist Church with the Rev. Jerry George and the Rev. William H. Burcham officiating. Burial was in Tishomingo City Cemetery. Deaton Funeral Home of Belmont was in charge of the arrangements.

Survivors include several cousins.

Pallbearers were Wayne Gray, Freeman Gray, Tommy Nunley, Doug Nunley, Ray Dawson and LaRay Epps.

Grand Opening Activities Planned For Iuka Hospital

The public is invited to attend the grand opening festivities at Iuka Hospital, 1777 Curtis Drive, from 2 to 4 p.m. December 4.

A grand opening ceremony will be held at 2 p.m., and tours of the facility and refreshments will be available from 2:30 to 4 p.m. Gerald Wages, North Mississippi Health Services Interim Chief Executive Officer, and Kelly Segars, M.D., chairman of the hospital's medical staff, will be the featured speakers.

"North Mississippi Health Services is proud to be a part of health care delivery in Tishomingo County, which is an important part of our service area. Our investment in the new hospital facility represents our commitment to providing health care services in a modern facility, with the latest technology available for diagnosis and

treatment. With the new Iuka Hospital, NMHS will be an important part of the continuing development taking place in Tishomingo County," Wages said.

Iuka Hospital was originally planned as a \$5.8 million project with \$3.2 committed by North Mississippi Health Services and \$2.6 committed by the Department of Economic and Community Development. "During the design phase for the facility it became evident that we would need to expand the scope of the facility in order to adequately meet the health care needs of this community. We increased NMHS' financial commitment to ensure that the facility would meet all of the needs envisioned for health care in the Tishomingo County area," Wages said. The final cost of the project was \$8.7

million, with \$6.1 million of the total contributed by NMHS.

"For many years this community has been fortunate to have an excellent medical staff backed up by Iuka Hospital's solid group of dedicated employees. What we have lacked in Iuka has been adequate facilities in which to provide the care that has been given. With the completion of the new Iuka Hospital, we now have an up-to-date modern facility to complement the medical staff and the hospital employees, and the programs and services needed to meet the health care needs of the community. North Mississippi Health Services is pleased to be a part of the continuing development of health care in Tishomingo County," Wages said.

Iuka Hospital To Open New ER On December 7th

Beginning at 6 a.m. December 7, Iuka Hospital will provide emergency medical care at the new facility, located at 1777 Curtis Drive.

"We are having a definite start time to help this transition in services go as smoothly as possible," said Glendon Spigner, Iuka Hospital Administrator.

The new Emergency Services Department is more spacious than the existing one. "Our current ER is one large open area, while the new hospital's Emergency Services has four trauma beds, which will enable us to handle multiple trauma cases. The space also includes four examination rooms, three are private and the fourth is designed to handle two patients at the same time," he said. "We are well positioned to handle emergencies for our community."

Privacy isn't the only advantage that emergency patients will realize. The area is located near

many of the hospital's support services. "The design of the new building made it possible for lab and x-ray services to be located closer to our emergency department. The area is also located adjacent to our surgery suite," Spigner said.

Local physicians provide emergency coverage for the Emergency Services Department during daylight hours on weekdays. Physician coverage is provided by doctors who contract their services to work in Iuka on nights and weekends. All of Iuka Hospital's emergency personnel, including RNs and LPNs are certified EMTs. In addition, the registered nurses are certified in advance cardiac life support and pediatric advance life support.

Iuka Hospital provides 24-hour emergency ambulance coverage, with a paramedic on duty at all times. A paramedic is an advanced life support care giver who is certified and trained to do IV therapy, drug ad-

ministration and EKG heart monitoring. A basic or intermediate level EMT is also on duty to assist the paramedic in emergency situations.

In the event of serious trauma injuries, such as a moving vehicle accident or industrial accident, medical helicopter response within 21 minutes is available from North Mississippi Medical Center.

Home Economics Tips

TIME SMART PLANNING
Spending a little time each week planning meals can save time and money at the grocery store, and put more nutritious meals on the table faster. Here are some guidelines to help the process along. They may sound simple, but you'll be amazed by how much time they can save!

*Use fast-cooking or convenience foods whenever possible.

possible. Choose a main dish that's quick to cook, then plan the rest of the meal around it. Keep the other courses simple: lettuce with bottled dressing and sherbet or ice cream prepared topping are real time savers.

*Note menus your family really lives and save time. Soon you'll have a good collection of family favorites that'll make your meal planning even easier and faster.

*Learn to love lists. Prepare

your shopping list at the same time you plan a week's menus, noting package and can sizes whenever possible. Keep an ongoing list on the refrigerator so you and others can jot down items as they're used up. Organize items on your list by categories and arrange them to match the order in which items appear in your favorite supermarket.

*Before you go shopping, check your newspaper and advertised specials and coupons. Note these, with brands and prices, right on your list. But remember, don't buy something just because it's on sale; it's never a bargain if you don't use it, no matter how low the price is.

best time for sample collection is during autumn or winter. Soil should be moist at time of collection; do not sample gardens where standing water is present. (2) If possible, collect the sample in the row, with cores coming from the root zone area. (3) Collect at least 20 cores from 6 to 8 inches deep per 5,000 to 10,000 square feet of gardening area (a 5,000 square foot area would represent an area 50 ft. by 100 ft., for example). Use a spade, soil collection probe, or similar sampling device. The key point here is to collect a sufficient number of subsamples to give a representative picture of the nematode situation. (4) Mix this soil thoroughly and put about one pint in a nematode soil sample bag (available from our office) or in a plastic freezer bag and seal. (5) Mark the sample number on the collection container. After collection, samples must be cared for properly until sent to the Nematode Analysis Laboratory for processing. (6) Soil samples for nematode analysis should be regarded as perishable and handled accordingly. Keep samples in a cool place; exposure to temperatures over 100 degrees F., even for a short time, kills some species of nematodes. (7) Bring the samples to our office as soon as possible for routing to the Nematode Analysis Laboratory at Mississippi State University. There is no charge for analysis of the sample for nematodes.

GARDEN NEMATODES

What soil-borne plant nematodes lack in size, they make up for in numbers and capacity to damage many crops grown in our gardens. Your garden could have been a victim this season, and now's the time to find out for sure! Nematodes are slender, worm-like animals too small to be seen with the unaided eye. Most are between 1/64 and 1/16 inch in length and less than 1/512 inch width. There is only one way to positively identify the type and extent of a nematode problem: soil and/or root sampling and laboratory testing. Collecting soil samples for nematode analysis should be a routine part of your gardening program. To obtain meaningful information on the types and population densities in your fields, soil samples should be collected as follows: (1) The

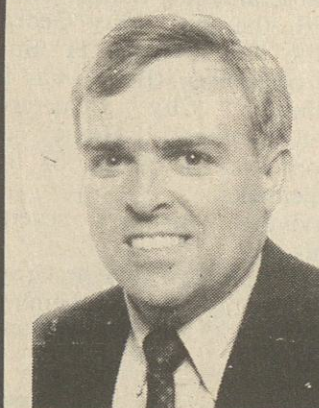

DAILY WEAR SOFT LENSES

Daily-wear soft contact lenses have evolved over the years to a sophisticated state. Many of the lenses transfer a sufficient supply of oxygen to the cornea and they are very comfortable. Certain varieties of these lenses are even used as a "bandage" for damaged corneas by releasing medication to the cornea's surface.

Unfortunately, these lenses feel so good that people often overwear them. Listen to your doctor about the maximum wearing times and make sure you go in for your follow-up examinations.

Wearers of daily-wear soft contact lenses often do not follow instructions on the lenses' care and usage, which causes problems. Invariably, problems caused by contact lens wearing is not found in the lens but in the patient's improper usage. Both overuse and improper care are potentially dangerous. However, if daily-wear soft lenses are well cared for, they are a relatively safe option with a good, long track record.

WINTER PET CARE TIPS

Winter presents many problems for pets. Help keep your pet healthier and safer during cold weather by doing the following:

Keep indoor pets in a dry, warm and draft free area. If possible, elevate your pet's bed off the floor.

Provide outdoor pets with a dry, insulated pet house or shelter out of the wind. Keeping warm demands extra calories, so you may need to feed your pet extra when temperatures drop. Bring your pet inside if the wind chill or weather conditions become severe.

Always have fresh, clean water available. During freezing weather, make sure that the water bowls of outdoor pets are not frozen.

Seeking warm shelter, cats and kittens often nap under car hoods. Knock on the hood or honk the horn before starting the car.

To avoid stomach upsets, keep your pet on its regular diet. Do not give pets ham-bones or poultry bones. And remember, chocolate can be toxic to dogs, so be safe and avoid it completely.

With a little extra care and caution on your part, pets can have safe and healthy winter and holiday seasons.

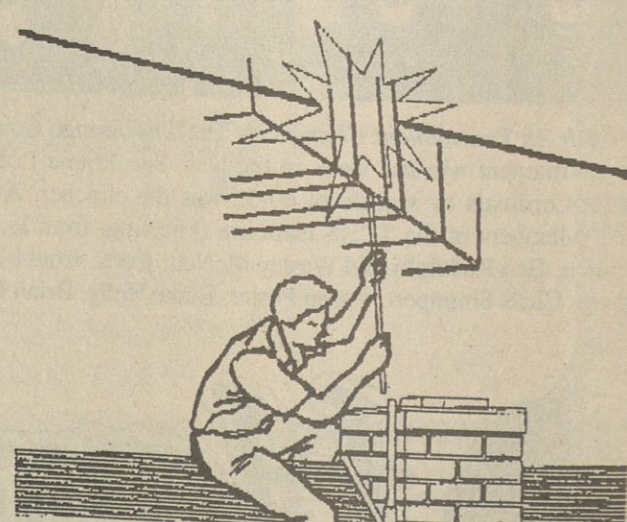
SAFETY FIRST

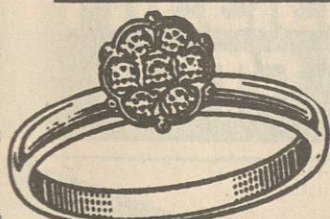

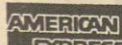

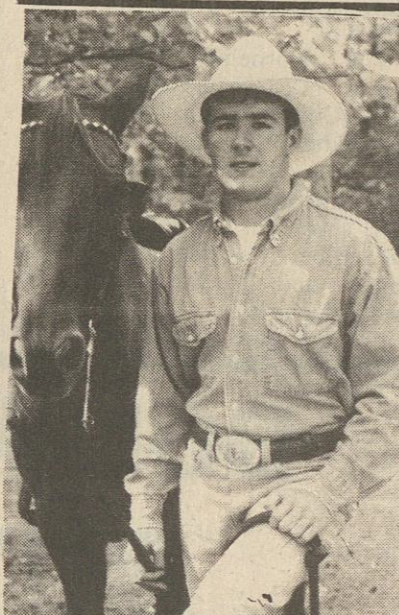

Eligibility for assistance is based on household income. The 130% poverty guidelines is used in determining eligibility for assistance. The amount of payment or financial assistance to an eligible household will be determined by income, family size, and fuel type (natural gas, l.p gas, wood, electricity).

In order to receive assistance, you must call the Outreach Office in your county and have your name, age, address, and telephone number placed on the program master appointment list. All applications are taken on a first-come, first-served basis by appointment from the master appointment list. Home visits will be made to homebound applicants. If for some reason during the year your address or telephone number changes, please call the Outreach Office and give them the changes. Without your correct address and telephone number, you will not receive

assistance. Eligible households will receive assistance if funds are available.

Please call 423-7013 (Tishomingo County residents only), and place your name, address, age, and telephone number on the appointment list. The appointment list is a kept year around. If you called in your name in last year and did not receive assistance, then your name is still on our list, and you do not have to call it in this year.

This program is authorized by the Low-Income Home Energy Act of 1981 as amended, (Title XXVI of the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1981). The Division of Community Services (DCS) by Executive Order, is responsible through the Mississippi Department of Human Services, to the Department of Health and Human Services, Office of Community Services, Washington, D.C. for the administration of LIHEAP in Mississippi.

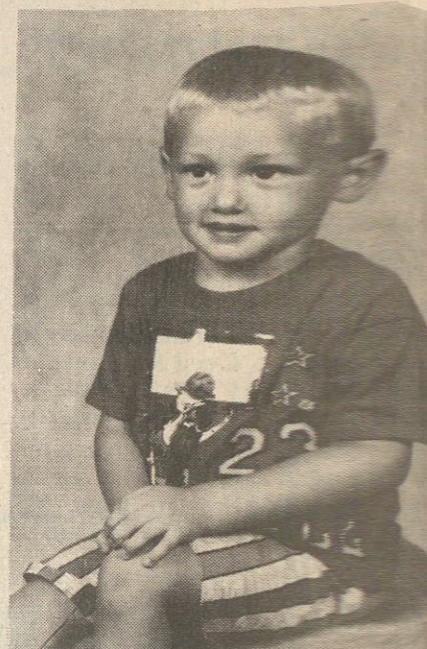

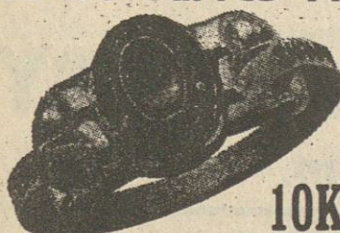

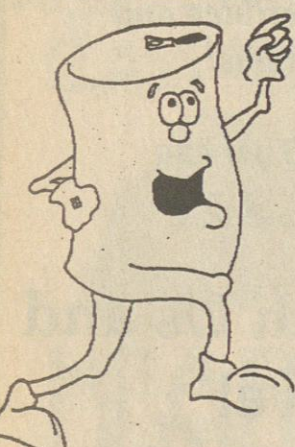

Congressman Jamie Whitten, who is retiring from Congress after 53 years, will be honored Sunday, December 4, with a welcome home celebration in his hometown of Charleston.

Festivities for Congressman Whitten and his wife, Rebecca, will begin at 2:30 p.m. in the Morgan Freeman Auditorium at Charleston High School, and a reception will follow in the school's cafeteria.

"Rebecca and I are looking forward to coming home," Congressman Whitten said. "Even though for me, personally, it is difficult to leave Congress with so much unfinished business, we will both be glad to renew old friendships and re-establish our close ties to the community."

Buddy Bishop, who is also retiring after more than 33 years on Congressman Whitten's staff, said everyone is invited to the celebration, but no formal invitations are being sent.

Congressman Whitten, who leaves the House of Representatives after seeing a record for length of service in the House, took office in 1941, just before Pearl Harbor was attacked and the United States entered World War II.

Congressman Whitten became a member of the House Committee on Appropriations 14 months after he was elected to the House. In 1949, he was elected Chairman of the Appropriations Subcommittee on Rural Development and Agriculture. In 1979, he was elected Chairman of the full Committee on Appropriations and served in that role for 13 years.

He was instrumental in bringing about many projects that benefitted Mississippi and the First District.

HE noted that the regional power agency has just begun its eighth year without a rate increase and has plans to continue this trend through the next two years, at least.

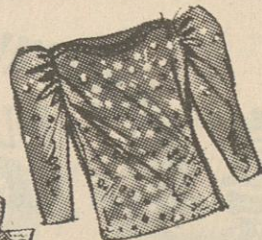

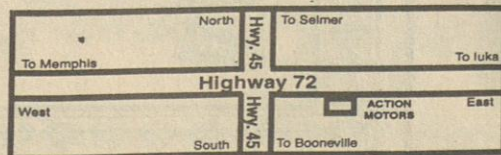

MSES Places More Workers In '94

Workers in the Iuka area found 968 jobs through the Mississippi State Employment Service last year, according to Wilborn Young, Iuka, MSES office Manager. The office referred a total of 2,117 applicants for job interviews during the program year. MSES operates on a program year from July 1 through June 30.

Statewide, the Employment Service placed 84,091 job-hunters in positions during the last program year, up from 83,005 the previous year. Since 1991, MSES has averaged an increase of about 5,000 placement each

year. "This growth in placement reflects the state's improving economy during the last few years," Young said. "All facets of the economy seem to be strong with only a few specific geographic areas of the state experiencing a continued softness."

MSES is one branch of the Mississippi Employment Security Commission, which also administers unemployment insurance and compiles and disseminates labor market information. In addition to job placement, the employment service screens workers for Job Training Partnership Act programs, recruits young people for the Job Corps and administers job services for the nation's armed forces veterans.

Department Of Public Safety News....

The Mississippi Highway Patrol is extending a Thanksgiving holiday offer to drivers -- one that can't be refused.

"The offer," said Col. Jay F. Clark, Highway Patrol director, "is that drivers who have a valid driver's license, wear safety belts, don't drink and drive, obey all other traffic and drug laws and

have a valid inspection sticker and up-to-date license plate decal on their motor vehicle will not be ticketed. Otherwise, look out."

The Highway Patrol asked for voluntary compliance of posted speeds, but did not get the response that was needed to reduce the frequency of fatality-producing motor vehicle crashes occurring on state and federal highways.

"Since April 1 we have used Lifesaver details, a concentrated enforcement effort in specific

locations, to effectively reduce speeds and remove drunken drivers from behind the wheel. Eighteen details and the issuance of 19,286 citations, which includes 717 DUI arrests, have decreased fatality-producing crashes," Clark said.

The statewide fatality count was 813 in 1993 compared to 766 in 1992. Had the upward trend in deaths from motor vehicle crashes continued the way they were the first quarter of 1994, this would be a record-breaking

year for deaths occurring Mississippi highways. Through November 15, the fatality count was 650 compared to 717 recorded through the same date in 1993.

The Highway Patrol has troopers available Thanksgiving to assist motorists and step up enforcement activities on state and federal highways than during last holiday, Clark said.

"We have added 65 officers Highway Patrol Thanksgiving 1993 and are three months away from graduating another class of more," he said. There were people killed in crashes Mississippi during last year's service; five on state federal highways, four on city roads and two on city streets. Troopers arrested 106 drivers on DUI charges and issued 40 speeding citations during four-day observance.

"The influx of traffic on ways around the state's gaming casinos has been a contributing factor in the number of motor vehicle crashes since the patrons are traveling unfamiliar roads. Another factor in our economy is on an upward resulting in more people traveling," he said.

One of the side benefits of additional manpower on the Lifesaver program has been a reduction in speeds on highways under patrol jurisdiction. Various times since 1987 when speed limit was reduced to 55 mph, speed monitoring by the Mississippi Department of Transportation has shown that more than 50 percent of motorists exceeding the posted speed limit placed the state at risk of federal highway dollars.

Since Lifesaver has been in operation, the number of motorists driving in excess of 50 mph has dropped from 50.6 percent the first quarter of the fiscal year to 46.8 percent the last quarter. Not since 1989 has Mississippi recorded a year-end total as low as the 46.5 percent recorded in FY94 that ended in September.

The 102-hour Thanksgiving holiday begins at 6 p.m. on Wednesday, November 23 and ends at midnight Sunday, November 27.

Random sobriety checkpoints will be set up in different areas of the state. Officers ordinarily duty will be paid with federal funds to work "Call Back" details giving the agency additional manpower during holidays. Trooper pilots augment the ground units.

Clark said one of the most important laws in Mississippi is that children up to 18 years of age must be transported in a child restraint device or driver of the vehicle can be fined. He said he believes that drivers failing to put children in proper safety seats are committing a form of child abuse. Drivers report the license plate number of vehicles transporting unrestrained children to 1-800-9BUCKLE. Owners of motor vehicles in which unrestrained children are observed will receive educational materials about law when the license plate number is reported.

Navy Fireman Jeffrey W. Patrick, son of Jerry W. and Linda F. Patrick of Route 3, Cherokee, Ala., recently participated in an historical decommissioning ceremony while serving as one of final crew members of the 38-year-old aircraft carrier USS Saratoga.

Patrick was one more than 200 Sailors and Marines who took part in the ceremony held in Port, Fla., which marked the end of one of the first "super" carriers built after World War II. Commissioned April 14, 1956, the "Super Sara" patrolled the waters off Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, during the Cuban Missile Crisis of 1962, launched counterattacks against the North Vietnamese in 1972, and played a major role in the capture of the luxury liner Achille Lauro during the 1985.

More recently, Patrick and the crew of the 1,063-foot-long aircraft carrier spent two months on the coast of the former Yugoslavia supporting international sanctions in Bosnia-Herzegovina. After leaving the Adriatic Sea, Patrick joined ships from 12 other nations for a large-scale exercise in the Eastern Mediterranean.

One of USS Saratoga's most memorable deployments began August 7, 1990, just days after Iraq tanks invaded Kuwait. "Super Sara" took up station in the Red Sea, and six months later began Operation Desert Shield. When Operation Desert Storm began, the aircraft began an air campaign against Iraq which would last more than seven months. USS Saratoga is just one of many older Navy ships being decommissioned. They are being replaced by fewer but more capable ships. Equipped with the latest technology, the newer ships require highly motivated and skilled young men and women to operate them.

The 1992 graduate of Cherokee High School joined the Navy in 1992.

Rains Reduce Cotton Yields And Quality

Mississippi's cotton crop suffered a recent setback as rainy weather throughout October muddied fields, delayed harvest and reduced yields and quality. So far November's sunny days have been a welcome relief from October's weather, but the threat of rainfall has growers hurrying to complete harvest.

About 75 percent of the state's crop has been harvested.

"It's too early to tell the effects of last month's weather on yields, but we are seeing a definite impact on quality," said Dr. Will McCarty, extension cotton specialist at Mississippi State University. "The cotton bolls were exposed to the moisture, and the resulting lowered quality will reduce prices to growers." Before the rains, state cotton producers had a chance of harvesting 800-plus pounds per acre, but growers still have a chance to meet the USDA's estimated yield of 788 pounds per acre. Cotton prices have improved during the past few weeks, driven by wet weather throughout the Cotton Belt.

"As of November 1, December futures were trading at 72 cents per pound," said DeWitt Caillavet, extension agricultural economist at MSU. "Unfortunately, growers may see prices reduced anywhere from 1 to 7 cents per pound because of lower

quality."

The wet weather increased the costs of harvesting for many state growers.

"Because of the moisture, many growers had problems with regrowth in cotton plants after defoliation," McCarty said.

"The resulting extra applications of defoliant and desiccants, or drying agents, has increased harvest costs."

Last month's break in cotton harvesting gave many state gins a chance to catch up with the

state's high yields.

Ernie Flint, agricultural agent for Attala and Holmes counties, said despite the rains, growers are expecting a great crop.

"The rains definitely will affect quality grades, but so far

have not set yields back," Flint said. "Some yields are in the 750 to 1,200 pound per acre range."

In Sharkey County, some growers have lost as much as 100 pounds of lint per acre because of harvest delays.

"We hope to finish harvest before more rains further damage yields and quality," said John Coccaro, Sharkey County agent. "Growers also are working with fall tillage and subsoiling to prepare for next year's crop."

There came on for consideration the matter of issuing special obligation, negotiable, interest-bearing combined water and sewer system revenue bonds of the City of Iuka, Mississippi, and after a discussion of the subject matter, Alderman Bess Young offered and moved the adoption of the following resolution:

A RESOLUTION DECLARING THE

INTENTION OF THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF IUKA, MISSISSIPPI, TO ISSUE COMBINED WATER AND SEWER SYSTEM REVENUE BONDS OF SAID MUNICIPALITY IN THE MAXIMUM PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF FIVE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$500,000) TO RAISE MONEY FOR IMPROVING, REPAIRING AND EXTENDING THE COMBINED WATER AND SEWER SYSTEM OF SAID MUNICIPALITY, CONSISTING PRIMARILY OF IMPROVEMENTS, REPAIRS AND EXTENSIONS TO THE SEWAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL FACILITIES OF SAID SYSTEM.

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Iuka, Mississippi (the "Municipality"), acting for and on behalf of the Municipality, hereby finds, determines, adjudicates and declares as follows:

1. The waterworks, water supply, sewerage, and sewage disposal facilities of the Municipality have heretofore been combined and are operated as a combined system known as the combined water and sewer system of the Municipality (the "System").

2. It is necessary and advisable and in the best interest of the Municipality and its inhabitants to issue combined water and sewer system revenue bonds of the Municipality in the maximum principal amount of Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$500,000) to raise money for improving, repairing and extending the System, consisting primarily of improvements, repairs and extensions to the sewage and sewage disposal facilities of the System, for which purpose there are no other available funds on hand.

3. The Governing Body has employed Cook-Coggin Engineers, Inc., Tupelo, Mississippi, a competent engineering firm, to study the System, determine the nature and extent of the improvements, repairs and extensions necessary thereto, and make an estimate of the cost thereof.

4. Said engineers have determined the nature and extent of the necessary improvements, repairs and extensions to the System and have made an estimate of the cost thereof, which estimate is the aggregate amount of One Million Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,200,000).

5. Said improvements, repairs and extensions are necessary, are economically feasible and would be in the public interest and of benefit to the Municipality, and the findings of said engineers are hereby adopted, including the estimate of the costs of said improvements, repairs and extensions.

6. Under the provisions of Sections 21-27-11 through 21-27-69, Mississippi Code of 1972 (the "Act"), the Municipality is authorized to make such improvements, repairs and extensions and to provide for the payment of the costs thereof, or any portion of such costs, by and through the issuance of bonds, the principal and interest of and on which shall be payable from the revenues of the System.

7. The Municipality reasonable expects that it will incur expenditures for the aforesaid purpose prior to the issuance of said bonds and that it should declare its official intent to reimburse such expenditures made in anticipation of the issuance of said

bonds.

8. A sum not exceeding Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$500,000) must be provided and raised by the issuance of special obligation bonds in said amount, payable both as to principal and interest from the revenues of the System, as authorized by the Act.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION D1. The Governing Body does hereby declare its intention to issue combined water and sewer system revenue bonds of the Municipality in the maximum principal amount of Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$500,000) (the "Bonds") to raise money for improving, repairing and extending the System, consisting primarily of improvements, repairs and extensions to the sewage and sewage disposal facilities of the System (the "Authorized Purpose"). Pursuant to Section 1.150-2 of the Treasury Regulation (the "Reimbursement Regulations"), the Governing Body hereby declares its official intent to reimburse expenditures made for the Authorized Purpose prior to the issuance of the Bonds with proceeds of the Bonds to the extent permitted by the Reimbursement Regulations.

SECTION 2. Said bonds in the amount, for the purpose and secured as aforesaid will be authorized to be issued at a meeting of the Governing Body to be held at the City Hall on December 6, 1994, at 7:00 o'clock P.M., which date so fixed will be more than ten (10) days after the third date of publication of this resolution, as directed by Section 3 hereof. If a petition signed by not less than twenty percent (20%) of the qualified electors of the Municipality be filed objecting to and protesting the issuance of such revenue bond issue on or before the aforesaid date and hour, then an election on the question of the issuance of such bonds shall be called and held as provided by law. If no such protest be filed, then such bonds may be issued without an election on the question of the issuance thereof, and may be sold under the regular procedure for selling such bonds.

SECTION 3. This resolution shall be published once a week for at least three (3) consecutive weeks in the Tishomingo County News, a

newspaper published in and having a general circulation in the Municipality, and being a qualified newspaper under the provisions of Section 13-3-31, Mississippi Code of 1972, the first publication of this resolution shall be made not less than twenty-five (25) days prior to the date fixed herein for issuance of said bonds, and the third such publication to be more than ten (10) days prior to the date specified in Section 2 hereof.

SECTION 4. The Clerk of the Municipality shall be and is hereby directed to procure from the publisher of the aforesaid newspaper the customary proof of publication of this resolution and to have the same before the Governing Body on the date and hour specified in Section 2 hereof.

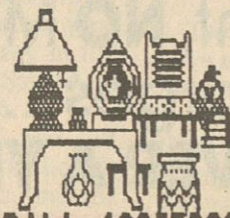
